


Come explore the region and embark on a journey that will take you into the past when legends made history.

For An Hour

Energize your brain visit the Mercer County Historical Museum or the fascinating Pfennig Wildlife Museum or take a tour of the amazing local mines and power plants.

For The Day

Fun for all ages at the Beulah Water Park and then visit the Energy Wellness Center that offers activities year-round.

For The Weekend

Laka Sakakawea is 17 miles north of town and offers fishing, boating, skiing, and camping.

Stop by main street for boutique shopping and self-care.



For An Hour

Tourists can visit the scientific center of North America, which is located on Highway 48 north of Center. There is a big disagreement about where the true center of North America is. The cities of Rugby and Robinson have been debating where the center of North America is. But a spot just north of Center has earned the title. Tourists have been visiting a site named "The Center – just ask the scientist" since July of 2018.

For The Day

Come check out Center's recently renovated indoor olympic sized pool. It's open year-round and swimmers can even take laps in the winter.

For The Weekend

Center's Community Club puts on an event called "Old Settlers Days" every summer. The purpose of Old Settlers Days is to honor the city's roots. The weekend contains a parade, concert, softball tournament and many other fun family-friendly events.

RECREATION, RELAXATION

Center is a rural small town surrounded by the energy industry. Visitors can check out the scientific center of North America, hang out at Old Settlers Days and cast their vote for the best ribs at Ribfest or enjoy the indoor olympic sized pool at any point during the year.

AT THE HEART OF SAKAKAWEA COUNTRY

Located right along ND
Highway 83, Coleharbor
is a charming community
of under 100 residents,
conveniently situated along
a route to many larger
destinations. Travel is part of
its DNA – the original town of
"Coal Harbor" was moved in
1905 from its location beside
the Missouri River to be closer
to modern transportation.

For An Hour

Stop by the Harbor Bar and Grill for a bite to eat. They're known for their ribeye and prime rib sandwiches.

For The Day Head over to the Wolf Creek

Head over to the Wolf Creek Recreation Area, four miles west of town, for campsites, a boat ramp, playground, volleyball court and fish cleaning station.

For The Weekend

A nature trail here is linked to the North Country Scenic Trail, a 4,800 mile trail that goes from Lake Sakakawea State Park to Middlebury, Vermont. This trail is twice as long as the Appalachian Trail; come and walk a little bit of history here!



For An Hour

Stop into the Douglas Bar, a gathering place for the community.

For The Day

With a swim beach, fire pits, picnic tables and areas to camp, Nelson Carlson Lake – located 15 minutes north of Douglas – is an excellent place to spend the afternoon.

For The Weekend

Each year in October, the Douglas Sportsmen Club hosts Douglas Duck Days, a duck hunting event for two to four person teams. The weekend has prizes, and not just for the best sportsmen. Everybody gets a chance, even if no birds are taken.

THE LITTLE TOWN THAT COULD

Named after Douglas Creek, which itself was named after a captain who served at nearby Fort Stevenson, this agricultural community has grown smaller over the years. However, it remains a tight-knit community for its residents.



DMB COUNTED

YOUR HOME ON THE RANGE

The Killdeer Mountain
Round-up Rodeo began in 1922
and is North Dakota's oldest
professional sporting event.
Originally, the rodeo was held
in a natural arena in the Killdeer
Mountains surrounded by cars,
then it was part of the county
fair. Families brought picnic
lunches to the rodeo and later
danced the night away.
Then after 1955, the rodeo
moved to the city of Killdeer.
During rodeo week, Killdeer
kicks up its heels and celebrates.

For An Hour

Check out the history of the area. The Dunn County Museum offers a post office, bank, music room, kitchen and railroad displays, dressmaker's shop, barber shop, toys, dolls, local church history and models, photographs and oral history collection. The Hutmacher Farm is undergoing restoration to return it to its "green" origins.

For The Day

Take a drive through the Killdeer Mountain Four Bears Scenic Byway. The Killdeer Mountain Battlefield honors those of both sides who fought during the Plains Indian War.

For The Weekend

Horse owners looking for a more leisurely ride enjoy the ruggedly beautiful trails of Little Missouri State Park north of Killdeer along the scenic byway. Watch the sun set and rise at a cabin at Eastview Campground, adjacent to the national park and overlooking the Badlands.



For An Hour

Visit Wally the Walleye at the end of Main Street for great photo opportunities before grabbing a bite to eat at a downtown restaurant.

For The Day

After spending a morning on one of Fort Stevenson State Park's many trails (no matter the season), utilize the Talking Trail around town to learn more about the city's points of location. .

For The Weekend

One of the best weekends to visit Garrison is during its Dickens Village Festival, which starts Thanksgiving weekend and runs through the next two weekends. It's Victorian Christmas themed and features a craft vendor show, lighted parade and street food vendors. It culminates in "A Christmas Carol" play. Visitors can also ride the "Queen Elizabus," a festive double-decker bus.

EASY TO GET HOOKED ON

Garrison is a charming lakeside community that has worked hard in recent years to create a vibrant downtown atmosphere. For a community of only 1,500, there's a lot happening. The town is famous statewide for its annual Dickens Festival and sits right next to the highest-attended state park in North Dakota.



UNIQUE OPPORTUNITIES

Hazen is a small, rural community with a vibrant life. The arts thrive in this town, from Music in the Parks performances in the summer to a Christmas chorale in the winter, and with major festivals like Chalkfest in August and Harvestfest in early September drawing lots of visitors to town. In addition to its arts, movie theater and eateries, the town is also just 12 miles away from the Hazen Bay Campground on Lake Sakakawea.

For An Hour

Hazen thrives on parks and recreation, with over 4 miles of paved walking and biking trails. Besides parks and playgrounds in residential areas, there is the Pocket Park and Sensory Garden right in downtown Hazen, and further east along Main Street the renovated Heritage Park, which includes outdoor instruments at the Musical Play Park. Wherever you go, you'll find a place you and your family are sure to enjoy.

For The Day

Enjoy a favorite movie in Hazen's own movie theater. Get a meal at a variety of local restaurants, and relax in the sun at the pool outside the high school.

For The Weekend

Hazen Bay is located just a 20 minute drive north of town. Every kind of camping, from primitive to full hookup, is available, with easy access to the lake.



For An Hour

Stop by the town's quaint Main Street and sit for a spell at the K-Bar

For The Day

Experience great fishing opportunities at Hiddenwood Lake, on shore or by boat, located about eight miles south of town.

For The Weekend

Each year, the Makoti Threshing Show is held the last weekend in September. Visitors can take a step back in time at the antique tractor pull, operational saw mill and pioneer village. There's also a parade and giant pumpkin contest, among other attractions.


Camping is available on the grounds.





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
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NORTHERN GATEWAY

Max, a small community of less than 300, describes itself as being defined "less by boundaries on a map than by a shared sense of values our residents hold dear." Its business district includes a cafe, library and convenience items.

For An Hour

Visit the lush city park, Memorial Park and Armed Forces Honor Roll, located on Main Street.

For The Day

The Max Museum and Collectibles features a look into life in the early 1900s. See a one-room school setting, miniature tractors and other antiques – and be sure to check out the Christmas display later in the year.

For The Weekend

In the summertime, community organizations come together to host the Max Rodeo, complete with rodeo events, a vendor show and a street dance.



WEEKENDS OF FUN

For An Hour

Grab a bite to eat from the Bison Room or Cache Restaurant at the 4 Bears Lodge and Casino, fine dining at its best.

For The Day

Rent a kayak at the MHA Tourism Indian Village or a paddle board at the Van Hook Recreation Area and experience Lake Sakakawea directly.

For The Weekend

Enjoy the action at one of the rodeos hosted at New Town Rodeo Grounds.

New Town, in the heart of the Bakken, is a growing, bustling community with a newly renovated nine hole golf course and country club, restaurants, shopping, and is the hub of the Mandan, Hidatsa and Arikara Nations and offers incredible outdoor recreation and cultural activities.



A PLACE TO GROW AND PROSPER

Parshall is a progressive community with a newly built high school, grain elevator, stores and restaurants. It offers easy access to fishing and camping at Lake Sakakawea and a host of outdoor and cultural activities.

For An Hour

Check out the world renowned Broste Rock Museum with exotic minerals from all over the world.

For The Day

Whether you're a pro on horseback or just learning the ropes, the Healing Horse Ranch near Parshall can help give you a place to bask in the joys of riding.

For The Weekend

Take in all your favorite lakeside amenities at the Parshall Bay Recreation Area, including a convenience store at Brendles Bay Resort to handle all your boating and fishing needs.



For An Hour

Pick City recently got an entirely new playground set up. The kids will have a blast with the multitude of options the park provides, while parents enjoy good conversation in the lakeside breeze.

For The Day

The Garrison Dam is located just on the outskirts of Pick City. Travelers will want to check out this historic site, including tours of the actual plant powering the dam.

For The Weekend

Take a week up at the lake and enjoy Lake Sakakawea State Park. Just east of Pick City city limits, the park offers boating, fishing, swimming and camping recreation for all ages.

THE HEART OF SAKAKAWEA

In summertime, the population of Pick City suddenly explodes. The reason is simple: few places in North Dakota can rival the lake feel of this small town.

Situated just beside the Garrison Dam, Pick City is embedded in the heart of both North Dakota history and North Dakota recreation. Indeed, it might be said to be as much a large resort as it is a small city.



RICH HISTORY

Though the first major discovery of oil in North Dakota occurred in Tioga in 1951, some historical sources say the very first discovery of oil in the state happened here in 1908 when oil began seeping into a water well. Though it is small, Ryder has an active and dedicated community.

For An Hour

Try the Ryder Star Bar and Grill. Besides their cold beer and drinks, they offer reubens, burgers, French dips and a hug from Mary for everyone who comes in.

For The DayThe Ryder Historical Museum is filled

The Ryder Historical Museum is filled with items related to the history of Ryder that include military, music, dentistry, barbershop, schools and churches.

For The Weekend

Each February, the Douglas Sportsmen Club host its annual Ice Fishing Derby on North and South Nelson Carlson Lakes. This derby is open to all ages, so bring the whole family for fun and fishing.



For An Hour

If your taste buds are tingling, Riverdale offers some excellent eatery options for you. The Iron Oar Bar and Grill, Spillway Coffee House and Knights Bar and Grill provide many options for the small town.

For The Day

Interested in learning more about the fish in the Missouri River and Lake Sakakawea? Take a trip to the Garrison Dam National Fish Hatchery to learn all about how they are raised and stocked.

For The Weekend

The Morning Star Campground has 111 developed sites where campers can enjoy the lake. Other camping is also available throughout the area, including the Downstream Campground, Wolf Creek Campground and Lake Sakakawea State Park.

SMALL TOWN CHARM

Situated with a scenic view toward Lake Sakakawea, the Garrison Dam and the Missouri River valley, the town of Riverdale is a central hub in North Dakota, a gateway to some of the most beautiful and enjoyable areas of the Upper Midwest. Just a little west of U.S. Highway 83, the town and its attractions are easily accessible.

Hunting Requirements

It's a hunter's responsibility to know hunting regulations before going afield but here is an overview:

Licensing:

- •All hunters must possess a North Dakota Fishing, Hunting, and Furbearer Certificate and General Game and Habitat Stamp (furbearer hunters only need certificate).
- •Migratory bird and dove hunters must have North Dakota HIP (Harvest Information Program) certification.
- •Migratory bird hunters 16 years of age and older must possess a Federal Migratory Bird (Duck) Stamp.
- •All big game and turkey hunters must also have a license and tag for the species they're hunting.
- •Mountain lion hunters must also possess a furbearer license.
- •Resident upland and small game hunters must also possess a small game license (unless under 16 years of age).
- •Nonresident upland game hunters must also possess a nonresident small game license.
- •Resident waterfowl hunters must also possess a small game license (unless under 16 years of age).
- •Nonresident waterfowl hunters must also possess a nonresident waterfowl license.
- •Sandhill crane hunters must possess a crane permit.
- •Residents must possess an \$5 early Canada goose season license.

Baiting:

- •Hunting over bait of any type, including grain, minerals, salt, fruits, vegetables, hay, or manufactured feed, is illegal on N.D. Game and Fish Department Wildlife Management Areas. Baiting doesn't include scent or liquid attractants.
- •Hunting big game over bait is also prohibited on U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service National Wildlife Refuges and Waterfowl Production Areas, U. S. Forest Service National Grasslands, U.S Army Corps of Engineers, North Dakota School Trust Lands, N.D. State Parks, and N.D. Forest Service State Forests.
- •Hunting over bait is prohibited in big game units with confirmed chronic wasting disease


N.D. Game and Fish Department WMA Regulations:

- •Drones, permanent tree stands, geocaching, and paintball are prohibited.
- •Portable stands and ground blinds, steps, screw-in steps, and natural stands are allowed but can't be placed before Aug. 20 and removed by Jan. 31 each year.
- •Tree stands and blinds must have identification, either owner's name and address, hunter education certification number, or Game and Fish Department identification number.
- Camping restrictions are in place on some WMAs. Check WMA regulations for potential restrictions.

Detailed license information is available in all hunting regulation guides and the Game and Fish Department Web site, (gf.nd.gov).

Hunter Education:

- •Hunter Education certification is required for all hunters born after Dec. 31, 1961.
- •Hunters under the age of 12 don't need Hunter Education certification but must be accompanied by a parent or guardian.
- •A one-time Hunter Apprentice License is available to beginning hunters born after 1961 for certain species. Contact the Game and Fish Department for details.

Arrowhead Collection (Courthouse)

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The N.D. Game and Fish Department Private Land Open To Sportsmen (PLOTS) Program has provided private land hunting access and opportunities for more than 20 years.

Look for bright yellow upside-down triangular signs designating PLOTS acreages. The shape represents the program's three pillars – landowners, sportsmen, and wildlife. Several

Sakakawea Country landowners enroll PLOTS tracts each year.

Updated annually, the free PLOTS guide is a valuable information source. It can be downloaded at gf.nd.gov/plots/guide with hard copies at many Sakakawea Country vendors.







Fishing in North Dakota

General Fishing License Regulations

- * A fishing year is from April 1 through March 31 of the following year.
- * Residents and nonresidents 16 years of age and older must possess a valid fishing license for the current fishing year.
- * Nonresidents under 16 years of age may fish if accompanied by a valid licensed angler. Go to the N.D. Game and Fish Department website, (gf.nd.gov) or telephone, 701-328-6300, for residency qualifications, license fees, and additional details.
- * No fish can be transported in water away from the water body where it was taken.
- * Only fathead minnows, creek chubs, sticklebacks, white suckers, or rainbow smelt are legal live baitfish. Leeches, native frogs, salamanders, and crayfish are legal live aquatic bait. No live aquatic bait can be imported into North Dakota.
- * Some lake-specific regulations apply.

The North Dakota Fishing Guide provides detailed fishing and aquatic nuisance species regulations and is available at vendors or online, (gf.nd.gov).









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



For The Day




SAKAKAWEA'S HOME

For An Hour

Take a photo with Rusty, Turtle Lake's twoton turtle sculpture as you head into town on Highway 41. Head east to City Park and enjoy a game of frisbee golf or relax in a gazebo and have a barbecue on the fire pit grills.

For The Day

Take a lake day road trip. Turtle Lake is within 20 minutes of a dozen small lakes. Start at Lake Brekken, located just 2 miles out of town, and explore a plethora of nearby lakes, such as Lake Holmes, Lightening Lake, East Park Lake, New John's, Crooked Lake, Strawberry Lake, and Brush Lake, just to name a few.

For The Weekend



North Dakota's Cross Ranch Centennial State Park is rich in both cultural and natural history.

The River Peoples Visitor Center has displays and information about the once mighty Missouri River, which has now been tamed through a series of major dams and reservoirs along its length.

Fort Stevenson State Park

On the north shore of giant Lake Sakakawea, Ft. Stevenson State Park is known as the walleye capital of North Dakota. A favorite spot for sportsmen to experience the great fishing on the lake, it is home to the Governor's Cup Walleye Fishing Derby, as well as a variety of other fishing tournaments.

<u>LOCATION</u>: 3 miles south of Garrison on 41st Ave. NW. <u>FEES</u>: Entrance fee, \$5/day per vehicle or \$25 annual vehicle permit.

Lake Sakakawea State Park

The park has a full-service marina, including convenience store and boat and camper storage. Lewis And Clark State Park

Lewis and Clark State Park is situated on one of the upper bays of Lake Sakakawea. The rugged buttes of the North Dakota Badlands display a towering backdrop to one of the state's best recreation areas. The park, of course, is named for the Corps of Discovery explorers, Meriwether Lewis and William Clark. The expedition camped nearby on April 17, 1805, and an interpretive trail marker has been placed within the park to commemorate their historic journey through North Dakota.

LOCATION: Lewis and Clark State Park is located 19 miles southeast of Williston on Highway 1804. <u>FEES:</u> Entrance fee, \$5/day per vehicle or \$25 annual vehicle permit.

<u>CAMPING:</u> \$20/night campsite with electricity; \$12/night campsite without electricity; Cabins: \$40/night.

Knife River Indian Villages

In 1804, the Lewis and Clark Expedition traveled through the area and were greeted by the Mandan and Hidatsa as they spent a winter at Fort Mandan. Among those living in the villages at the time was the Shoshone native Sacagawea, who ultimately joined Meriwether Lewis, William Clark and the rest of the expedition on their journey west, acting as a guide and an interpreter as the explorers entered unfamiliar territory and encountered new Native tribes.

For the next couple decades after the Lewis and Clark Expedition passed by, the Knife River tribes continued to live autonomous lives in the area, but smallpox epidemics later weakened the Mandan and Hidatsa and caused them to remove upstream.

Knife River Indian Villages is now a national park that aims to preserve both the history and the native landscape of the area. Several depressions in the ground, bearing witness to the sites where the buildings of the tribal villages once sat, are still preserved, with three village sites part of the park.

The national park strives not only for preservation, but also public awareness and education. Numerous interactive programs allow people from around the state, the nation and the world to learn about Native practices and try their own hands at specialized skills. Other programs and tours allow interested visitors the opportunity to learn not just about the tribes, but about the Knife River valley and the original flora and fauna of the land.

Many programs are geared toward kids, like summer camps and the addition of the ArcheoBlitz. This latter event pairs students with archeologists to learn skills and techniques related to locating, studying and sorting artifacts.

The park includes three trails hikers can take, many of them associated with the sites of the villages. There is also a full-scale earth lodge replica just outside the visitor center, which showcases better than any screen the challenges, opportunities and lifestyles of the land's original inhabitants, as well as traditional gardens just outside the lodge.. The visitor center itself includes a gift shop, a museum and a small theater where presentations are offered.

AUDUBON NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE

<u>WHERE:</u> Lake Audubon's south shore, three miles north of Coleharbor, N.D. on the east side of U.S. Highway 83 between Lake Sakakawea and Lake Audubon.

<u>WHAT:</u> U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service National Wildlife Refuge established as Snake Creek NWR in 1956. Renamed Audubon NWR in 1967, it includes 14,735 acres of wetlands, native prairie, re-established grasslands, and part of Lake Audubon.

MISSION: Migratory bird, endangered species, and resident wildlife habitat.

<u>WILDLIFE</u>: 246 bird, 34 mammal, and 37 fish documented species.

VISITOR OPPORTUNITIES:

*Free public access.

*Visitor Center and Exhibit Hall: A mile east of Highway 83 on the south shore of Lake Audubon. Open 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, except federal holidays, it features wetland and grassland, migratory birds, refuge history and wildlife exhibits, etc.

*Prairie Nature Trail: Beginning near the Visitor Center, the mile-long, self-guided gravel walking path winds through native prairie, grasslands, and along wetlands, providing bird, plant, and animal viewing opportunities.

*Auto Tour Route: Eight-mile gravel road starts near the Visitor Center, traveling along Lake Audubon's south shore. A brochure details the route's interpretive kiosks.


*Wildlife observation: Spring and fall migration offers an array of migratory wildlife with best viewing opportunities in the early morning and evening. Bring binoculars for better viewing. Wildlife checklists are available at the refuge.

*Hunting: The refuge's upland bird season begins the Monday after North Dakota's regular deer gun season closes. It's open for archery, gun, and muzzleloader deer hunting. Special regulations apply.

*Ice fishing: The refuge portion of Lake Audubon opens for ice fishing once the lake ices over. Special regulations apply.

The need to provide and protect migratory bird habitat prompted creation of most of North Dakota's U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service National Wildlife Refuges (NWR), including Dunn County's Lake Ilo NWR. Audubon National Wildlife Refuge, however, is different --- it mitigates for lost wildlife habitat after the building of Garrison Dam, which flooded thousands of acres of Missouri River bottom land. Yet ample public opportunities coexist and compliment both refuges as wildlife and habitat remains their mission:

LAKE ILO NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE

MISSION: Migratory bird breeding habitat.

WILDLIFE: 227 bird and 11 documented fish species.

*Free public access.

*Open sunrise to sunset. Refuge headquarters along the southeast shore of Lake IIo are open 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, except federal holidays.

*Lake Ilo Park day use area offers fishing pier, charcoal grills, picnic tables, restrooms, and trash containers.

*North Shore Nature Trail: A mile-long trail with benches and kiosks begins at Lake IIo Park and winds along the lake's north shore.

*Wildlife observation: Spring and fall migration offers an array of migratory wildlife. The best viewing opportunities are early morning and evening. Bring binoculars for better viewing. Wildlife checklists are available at the refuge.

*Fishing: Parts of Lake IIo are open to shore, boat, and icefishing. A boat ramp is west of the park on the lake's north shore.

*Cultural interpretation: The refuge is a major archeological site providing insight into prehistoric Plains Indian dwellers. Interpretive kiosks near the North Shore Nature Trailhead explore its ancient cultural history.
