


> "Ruhland is our lone senior and has been a great leader for the team." Coach Ruhland said, "The team is a really good

Young Cardinal team looking to surprise

The Washburn/Center-Stanton Cardinals may look unassuming based on the roster, but the young team is fielding some secret weapons this year.

After graduating some central players in 2022, Head Coach Katie Kulzer-Yetterboe said the Cardinal softball team has some big shoes to fill with some young athletes.

"We only have 15 girls out this year and out of those 15 girls, for six of them this is their very first year and for four of them their second year," Kulzer-Yetterboe said.

It will be vital for the young players to ramp up both their skill on the field and their comfortability, Kulzer-Yetterboe said.

"Many of these new girls will be taking the field in a varsity position and facing pitchers that throw 60 mph," Kulzer-Yetterboe said. "That's scary for an experienced player, so it's all about building confidence this year."

The Cardinal team consists of one senior, four juniors, one sophomore, four freshmen and five seventh graders, but even the less experienced players have a foundation already laid.

"Our greatest weakness is that we are a very young team, but thanks to Washburn's summer softball program these girls are coming into a varsity sport knowing more of the fundamentals than girls in the past, which is huge," Kulzer-Yetterboe said.

Kulzer-Yetterboe said that the team returns some of its pillars with pitcher Kya Kulzer and catcher Ashlyn Schmitz, both All-Region athletes in 2022.

"Ashlyn, Kya, Lauren Braun, Kerrah Nelson (Center-Stanton) and Maddie (Mad-Dog) Jaeger will all play huge roles for us this year and you will see them all at the top of the line-up," Kulzer-Yetterboe said.

Along with the upperclassmen, Kulzer-Yetterboe said the team has a few younger athletes that may surprise the competition.

"A new face to watch out for is Kayla Hammons (Center-Stanton)," Kulzer-Yetterboe said. "She may only be 12 but she is a big presence on varsity this year with a hot bat, and also strong behind the plate. She's a fun one to watch."

Kulzer-Yetterboe said Elizabeth Neumiller, Hannah Klabunde, and Lexi Braun will return as freshmen this year after "exceeded expectations" last season.

With weather continuing to hamper outdoor play in the area, Kulzer-Yetterboe said the team is resorting to indoor practices which are better than nothing, but not ideal.


"The winter was brutal for

our softball complex and it really hurts us that we are going into our first 4 games without even seeing outside or being able to take pop-flys to the outfield," Kulzer Yetterboe said. "We are kind of going into these games blind until the diamond is ready and we can get outside to practice."

Kulzer-Yetterboe said despite less-than-ideal conditions, the team is progressing and setting themselves up for a great year and a happy coach.

"There is only so much you can do indoors with half of a gym, but the growth I have seen in these young girls in the last 3 weeks is really cool," Kulzer-Yetterboe said. "It reminds me why I love this job!"

Yetterboe said Kalyssa Schock will return as the lead pitcher, with freshman Taylor Zimmerman behind the plate.

"Kalyssa is a returning pitcher who does a great job of throwing strikes and staying around the zone consistently," Yetterboe said. "Taylor is a freshman who has been starting since 7th grade, she led us in a number of offensive categories last year."

Also starting for the Miners will be eighth graders Ella Witt and Sidney Mock, at centerfield and shortstop, respectively. Seventh grader Tessa Miller and eighth grader Lydia Hutzenbiler

may also see some play time, Yetterboe said.

Yetterboe said the athletes are working on developing not only their skills but their mindset as the season ramps up.

"A young team will make some mistakes, as long as we learn from it," Yetterboe said. "The mental part of the game will take a bit more time, they have been working hard so hopefully they will be ready by regionals."

Yetterboe said Wilton-Wing will be fighting for a top three spot in Region 4, which includes some hard-hitting competition.

"Beulah and Velva are definitely the teams to beat in our region," Yetterboe said. "They both bring back experienced teams with great pitching."


practice that will help them develop into very sound players by the end of the season.





With this drive, I believe our players will make strides in their personal golf games."



However, there are a few novices on the team to watch out for.


