INOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. --The Minot Air Force Base Tax Center is now open and will remain open until April 18. The tax center offers free advice, assistance, preparation and electronic filing of federal and state income

tax returns through the Internal Revenue Service's Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Program. Tax assistance priority will be given to active duty military; however, military dependents, retirees and DoD civilian personnel may receive assistance on a space-available basis.

The tax center is located in the Pride Building, west entrance, 2nd floor. The tax center will be open Monday -Thursday from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. by appointment only. Fridays will be walk-in hours from 8:30 a.m. to noon. Many squadrons also have unit tax advisors who can

Some victims don't ask for help because they fear for their safety or the safety of their children. Victims of domestic violence don't always recognize they are victims and feel the violence is normal. Unfortunately, it is often only when someone is seriously hurt that their friends, family or professionals become aware of the situation.

If you are a victim of abuse or know someone who is, the Family Advocacy Program (FAP) offers Domestic Abuse Victim Advocate (DAVA) services. The DAVA program is designed to

provide a voice to victims who need support to speak about their experience. The DAVA works 24/7 as needed to provide victim advocacy to all active duty personnel, their family members or intimate partners who are eligible beneficiaries of the military health care system.

The DAVA's duties include, but are not limited to:

- safety planning and linkage to needed installation and community services

- regional and local resources

- getting a protection order with both military and civil court

- support during court proceedings. Accompaniment is

provided to the victim for medical appointments, law enforcement investigations, counseling and any judicial processes.

Each individual who is a victim of domestic violence has the option of either making a restricted or unrestricted report. An unrestricted report is for victims who want the military chain-of-command to know of an incident and to have it investigated. A restricted report allows victims of abuse to report details of the abuse to victim advocates, FAP and health care providers to access services or care without command's involvement. However, if a restricted report becomes known to command outside of those listed above, the

incident will then be investigated as if it were an unrestricted report. In addition, if safety becomes a concern, the Family Advocacy Officer has the discretion to change a restricted report to an unrestricted report. A limitation of a restricted report is command's inability to implement safety measures, such as military no-contact orders.

Hurricane Hunters gather forecast data on record-breaking blizzard

dropping snow on the area early Jan. 22, and was a record-setter for three cities, leaving 29.2 inches in Baltimore, 31.9 inches in (AFNS) -- The Hurricane Allentown, Pennsylvania, and 34 inches in Weather Reconnaissance Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, Squadron flew a different according to the National Weather Service. Keesler Air Force Base Jan.

The 53rd WRS crew flew along the eastern coast from Florida up to the New York City area over the Atlantic Ocean, dropping

sondes ahead of the storm to gather information and to send it back to the NWS, where forecasts and predictions are made.

While the Hurricane Hunters are best known for flying into hurricanes, the winter storm mission is a bit different.

"A hurricane is more of a fluid flight with lots of changes, whereas with winter storms, everything is already set," said 1st Lt. Leesa Froelich, a 53rd WRS aerial reconnaissance weather officer. "We also fly as high as we possibly can, but in a hurricane we're at 10,000 feet." "Much like in a hurricane,

we drop sondes down to the surface that collect information on the storm's wind speed and direction, as well as the barometric pressure and temperature," said Staff Sgt. Jesse Jordan, a 53rd WRS loadmaster.

During the flight, reports were coming in that Washington D.C. had received 19 inches of snow. said Froelich. By Sunday, the city saw 22-35 inches of snow to the west, north and northwest of the Beltway, and 18-24 inches inside the Beltway. The Hurricane Hunters flew two flights in this storm. This is the second winter storm the squadron has flown this year, but they continue to be ready for anything else that develops during this winter storm season.

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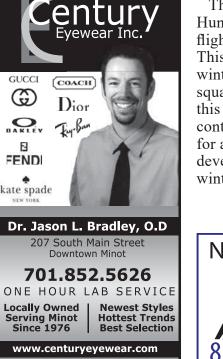

Airman helps search for Vietnam War remains

TRAVIS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AFNS) --(This feature is part of the "Through Airmen's Eyes" series. These stories focus on individual Airmen, highlighting their Air

Force story.) When Tech. Sgt. Robin Bailon enlisted in Air Force in 2000, she didn't expect her career to place her in Vietnam, serving as a life science investigator.

But Bailon, an aircrew flight equipment specialist by trade, had the opportunity to venture far outside the scope of her traditional duties, recently returning from a trip working for the Defense Prisoner of War/Missing in Action Accounting Agency in Vietnam.

There, she searched for the remains of fallen service members and aircraft parts from a helicopter crash during the Vietnam War.

Headquartered in District of Columbia with an operational office in Hawaii, the DPAA is responsible for both the recovery and accounting of missing service members from past conflicts.

When the message came down from Air Mobility Command that it was looking for a team member, Bailon was



excited to apply. She became interested in the program when she heard about it from co-workers who served on previous DPAA teams.

Her work with aircrew flight equipment opened the door for her to go to life science equipment investigation training, where she further developed her skills to contribute to the effort of Recovery Team 5, the DPAA team to which she was assigned to.

This past year, RT-5 was able to successfully clear the area around a crash site that was identified by the agency in 2007 and began the excavation. During her time there, Bailon worked closely with a civilian forensic anthropologist, a photographer, an explosive ordinance specialist, and a Vietnamese linguist to search for and recover aircraft pieces.

Bailon's hard work was noticed by both her teammates, and also her supervisor U.S. Army Capt. Jonathan Duncan, a 121st Joint Field Activity DPAA recovery team leader.

"Tech. Sgt. Bailon was instrumental in helping our team identify wreckage associated with the crash as she was the only subject matter expert on the team who could provide authoritative positive identification of aircraft pieces and parts," Duncan said. "Her expertise was crucial in allowing us to fulfill our mission." Duncan was responsible

for leading 15 U.S. personnel on the mission, directing their work and coordinating with the Vietnamese Office for Seeking Missing Persons.

There were many challenges faced during the 21 days that Bailon spent in Vietnam with RT-5.

The remote and austere conditions at the site created logistical, manpower and life support problems that the team was able to overcome. The mountainous terrain was cold and rainy, which made the job more difficult. The ground was muddy and insects also created challenges for the team, but she refused to let the poor conditions get her down.

"I remember Tech. Sgt. Bailon was always willing to pitch in and do more than her fair share of the dirtiest, most grueling work we had to do," Duncan said. "She hauled buckets up and down steep muddy slopes, shoveled out mud from the holes we excavated, and stood in dirt, mud, and water, for up to eight hours for each of those days. She did all of those things happily despite knowing that she would have no chance to change into clean or dry clothes, or take a warm shower, until we got off the mountain and went back to town."

A positive attitude was paramount to the team's success.

"Bailon's willingness to support the team was a significant boost to overall

team morale" Duncan added. "She consistently produced excellent work despite a lack of life support conveniences that are typically taken for granted in daily life, like running water, flushing toilets, reliable showers or warm water for bathing."

Despite challenges that RT-5 faced in Vietnam, their efforts bared results. On Dec. 14, four boxes of remains, which are thought to be those of U.S. service members killed in action during the Vietnam War, were given to DPAA at a repatriation ceremony held at a Hanoi airport in Vietnam.

During her time in Vietnam, Bailon worked with members from each branch of service and said she enjoyed working with and learning about their similarities and differences. She also embraced the cultural aspects of the trip.

"I not only enjoyed the joint mission, but I also enjoyed working hand in hand with the Vietnamese," she said. "It was interesting. A lot of them don't really speak or understand English, so trying to communicate was challenging but it was fun experiencing their culture."

Something she cherishes from her trip is the camaraderie shared between not only the joint forces, but the Vietnamese military.

On Thanksgiving Day, Bailon's Vietnamese counterparts prepared a pig for the DPAA team. The DPAA members were also able to prepare a Thanksgiving meal and to share American culture with the Vietnamese as they celebrated what they were thankful for.

"What better time to be on this mission than just after Veterans Day," Bailon said.

North Dakota Department of Health Urges Parents to Vaccinate Their Children Against Human Papillomavirus

ISMARCK. N.D.-The North Dakota Department of Health (NDDoH) reminds the public that everyone, girls and boys, between the ages of 11 and 26 should receive the human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine for the prevention of cervical and other cancers during National Cervical Health Awareness Month in January.

According to Molly Howell, Immunization Program Manager with the NDDoH, every 20 minutes someone in the United States is diagnosed with HPVrelated cancer. "We have an amazing opportunity to prevent certain types of cancer in future generations through HPV vaccination," said Howell. "Sadly, only 41.7 percent of girls and 25.3 percent of boys between 13 and 17 years of age in North Dakota are completely vaccinated against HPV.

A three-dose series of HPV vaccine for all adolescents 11 to 12 years of age, with catchup vaccination at ages 13 to 26, can prevent HPV infection and its associated cancers. "It is important to be vaccinated against HPV early, before being exposed," said Howell. "Three out of four new HPV cases are found in people ages 15 to 24."

"HPV vaccines were studied extensively for years prior to being approved by the Food and Drug Administration," said Howell. "They continue to be monitored for safety since their licensure almost ten years ago. The most common side effects of HPV vaccine are soreness and redness at the injection site, fever, headache, nausea, and muscle pain. More than 86 million doses of HPV vaccine have been given out in the United States, with millions more administered worldwide, and vaccine studies continue to show that HPV vaccines are safe."

North Dakota participates in the Vaccines For Children (VFC) federal entitlement program, which provides free vaccine for children 18 years of age and younger who are American Indian, Medicaideligible, uninsured or have insurance that does not cover vaccinations. However, most insurance plans do cover HPV vaccine. The North Dakota Immunization Program also has an adult vaccination program that provides HPV vaccines to uninsured or underinsured adults. Contact your health care provider or local public health unit for more information about these vaccine programs.

In an effort to increase HPV vaccination rates. the North Dakota Immunization Program has been sending recall notices to parents of adolescents ages 12 to17 who are 30 or more days behind on their adolescent immunizations, including those who have started but not completed the HPV series. HPV informational postcards are sent to the parents of adolescents turning 11, encouraging them to vaccinate their children against HPV. Additionally, the North Dakota Immunization Program is conducting a statewide television, radio and online media campaign to promote HPV vaccination. We're not talking groundbreaking scientific research here, folks, but there is a little bit of a technique in determining when Lake Sakakawea officially ices over –or goes ice-free, for that matter.

Perhaps tradition is a better way to describe the fine art of determining whether or not any water remains exposed to the North Dakota elements or if the Big Lake is a big sheet of treacherous ice.

As winter locks its grip, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Garrison Power Plant mechanics begin scouting the lake's ice situation. They trek to the top of the power plant's water intake structure on the west side of Garrison Dam, scanning with binoculars for any hints of remaining water. They also head over to an excellent vantage point in Sakakawea State Park, scanning the lake there, as well. The bluffs above Government Bay provide yet another angle.

Granted, there may be a hidden bit of open water on occasion but if enough of Lake Sakakawea is deemed encased in ice, an official decree is made: It iced-over, most recently Jan. 13, 2016.

The corps has 63 years of Lake Sakakawea iceover and ice-out records beginning when Garrison Dam closed in 1953.

Over the years, there is some interesting ice-over trivia:

The lake was just beginning to fill in 1955-1956. At the time the Missouri River was still somewhat a remnant of its former self so lake elevations weren't anywhere near full pool. It iced over Nov. 23, 1955 and wasn't ice-free until well into the spring of 1956 – May 8, to be exact. That's a record whopping 165 days of ice. The next longest iceover period occurred in the winter of 1978-1979 when the big lake had ice for 145 days, Dec. 22, 1978

through May 17, 1979. The flip side of that oc-

curred in 2011-2012. After spillway emergency floodgates were opened for the first time in history to address June 2011 flooding, the lake was still at high elevations going into winter. It didn't ice-over until Jan. 18, 2012. It was deemed ice-free a mere 69 days later on March 27.

Typically, though, Lake Sakakawea ices over in December – 41 of its 63 years of ice-over, ice-out history. Only twice – in 1955 and again in 1985 – did it ice-over in November. Otherwise Lake Sakakawea iced over in January for the remaining 20 years of its history.

It iced over Christmas Eve in 1964 and Christmas Day in 1971. New Year's Eve was celebrated with ice-over in 1957, 1965, and again in 1998 while ice-over greeted New Year's Day in 1979.

Somehow, Lake Sakakawea managed to iceover and become ice-free on the exact dates two consecutive years: Dec. 19 in 1995 and again that same day in 1996. Power plant officials deemed it ice-free on May 6, 1996 and again May 6, 1997, a total of 137 days both years.

The latest Sakakawea iced over was also as it filled – Jan. 26, 1954.

Records are kept for all six reservoirs but they don't all ice-over annually, Joel Knofczynksi, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers hydraulic engineer, Omaha, Neb., described. South Dakota's Lake Oahe is large enough and far enough south so it doesn't always completely freeze. While Mother Nature plays the largest role in determining ice-over - air and water temperatures and wind speeds -reservoir elevations could, at times, be a factor. "That's a lot of energy and heat," Knofczynski explained, to cool and freeze.

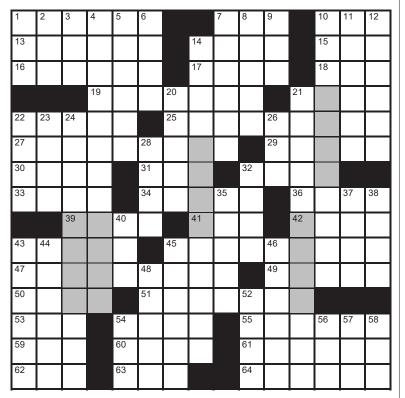

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Will Smith tackles the NFL in "Concussion" NEIL POND | PARADE MAGAZINE National Football League.

Will Smith has fought zombies, space aliens and killer robots. Now he's squaring off against an even bigger, completely human foeand certainly a much more popular one.

In Concussion, he plays Dr. Bennett Omalu, who discovers the link between football and CTE, chronic traumatic encephalopathypotentially fatal brain damage from repeated concussions.

The true story (originally told in a 2009 article in GQ magazine) begins as we meet Nigerian-born Omalu in 2002, while he's working in Pittsburgh as the county coroner's forensic pathologist. The untimely death, and bizarre final days, of a former Pittsburgh Steeler football Hall of Famer, Mike Webster (David Morse), troubles him: Webster's autopsy reveals severe brain trauma that caused him to go crazy, freak out and eventually expire of a heart attack. When Omalu learns of other NFL players dying in similar fashion, he investigates further and comes to a conclusion that almost no one wants to hear-especially not the

creatures, such as the woodpecker or the bighorn sheep, Omalu points out, humans have no natural shock absorber in our skulls to cushion the blow when one of our noggins impact with something hard—like another noggin. Nature, or providence, simply did not equip us that way. Therefore, Omalu reasons, "God did not intend for us to play football."

Smith, a bona fide movie star, is outstanding in a non-flashy role that doesn't involve car chases, spaceships, shootouts or CGI special effectsjust straight-up, strong, dig-in acting and a very plausible, start-to-finish nail-down of Dr. O's West African accent and mannerisms. He makes you feel Omalu's passionate sense of commitment-and his dream to be accepted as "American"—as the NFL tries to quash his research and discredit him.

Albert Brooks is Cyril Wecht, the county coroner who helps Omalu while warning him of squaring off against with the NFL. "You're going to war with



British actress Gugu Mbatha-Raw plays Prema, the Nigerian student who becomes Omalu's wife, reminding him that his family name means "He who knows, speaks."

But the movie belongs to Smith, who tackles what might be his one of his trickiest, juiciest roles-a crusading underdog with a potentially life-saving message that falls on mostly deaf ears. "Tell the truth—tell the truth!" a frustrated Omalu jabs at a NFL team neurosurgeon who refuses to admit there's any connection between football and brain injury.

As millions of football fans tune into games this weekend, it's a truth that will likely be drowned out by the symphony of cheers in stadiums all across America.

INGREDIENTS

1 lb lean ground beef, browned and drained

envelope (3 tablespoons) taco seasoning (10-oz) can Ro-Tel Diced Tomatoes and Green Chiles 1¹/₂ cups sharp cheddar cheese, shredded (or Mexican blend)

24 wonton wrappers

INSTRUCTIONS:

Preheat oven to 375 degrees F. Generously coat a standard size muffin tin with nonstick cooking spray. Combine cooked beef, taco seasoning, and tomatoes in a bowl and stir to combine. Line each cup of prepared muffin tin with a wonton wrapper. Add 1.5 tablespoons taco mixture. Top with 1 tablespoon of cheese. Press down and add another layer of wonton wrapper, taco mixture, and a final layer of cheese. Bake at 375 for 11-13 minutes until cups are heated through and edges are golden.

Oreo Truffles Valentine's Hearts



INGREDIENTS:

24 Oreo cookies-crushed into fine crumbs

5 oz. softened cream cheese

12-14 oz. high quality white chocolate (you can use white chocolate candy coating or vanilla almond bark) Heart shaped sprinkles-optional

INSTRUCTIONS:

Line a tray with baking paper. Crush whole Oreos with the filling in a really fine crumbs and combine it with softened cream cheese You can do this by hands, press it with a back of the spoon, or use a mixer with paddle attachment(the mixture is really thick and I prefer to knead it by hand). When it's all evenly combined transfer the mixture onto baking paper and spread it in an even layer about 1/2 inch thick (or more, depending how large is your cookie cuter). Place the tray in the freezer for 45 mins (or more) until it's harden enough for cutting. Cut out the truffles with heart shaped cookie cuter and place them back in the freezer for 20-30 mins(truffles must be frozen before dipping into chocolate). Line another tray with baking paper and set aside. Take a few hearts from the freezer (so the rest won't soften while you are working) and dip one frozen hearts at the time into melted chocolate with a fork. Tap off the excess chocolate and transfer the hearts onto baking paper and top with sprinkles (if you don't want to dip them twice in the chocolate). If you want to cover the truffles with second layer of chocolate(like I did), then after first dipping into chocolate, place chocolate covered hearts in the freezer to harden the chocolate faster and repeat the dipping process, and then top with sprinkles. Work in small batches because the heart must be frozen when place them into melted chocolate. Store in an airtight container in the fridge(or freezer for longer storage). This recipe makes 16-20 small (about1.5 inch) hearts.



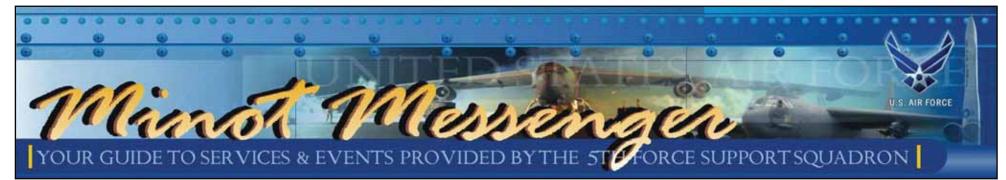

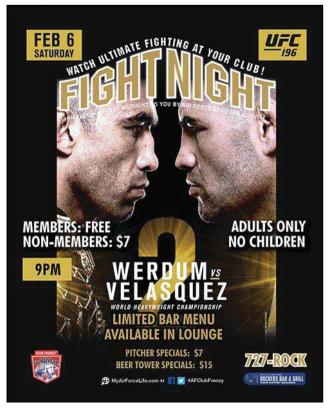

Parking: The Winter Months

INOT AIR FORCE BASE. N.D. -- With the winter season in full swing, the 5th Security Forces Squadron reminds everyone that parking in base housing is limited and must be regulated for safety. Proper parking helps everyone by ensuring the flow of traffic remains unimpeded and snow management is possible.

Vehicles parked on the side of the road increase the challenge associated with snow management and the risk associated with traveling on snowy or icy roads. Vehicles parked on the street improperly can inhibit visibility, lessen travel space and in certain cases, block the entire roadway.

It is important to keep in mind that traffic in housing is not only limited to small personal vehicles but also includes other sized vehicles such as snow control machinery, school buses and large moving vehicles.

In order to ensure the smooth flow of traffic the following parking regulations have been established and need to

- Housing Parking. Parking on roadways or streets in the housing area is authorized only on the odd-numbered housing side of the street

be followed:

(example: 123, 125, 127 Winding Way). The apartment numbers will not be used to determine the even or odd side of the street.

- Snow Removal. Do not park in a place or manner that inhibits effective snow removal operations.

- Traffic Control Devices. Vehicles will not be parked within 15 feet of any stop sign, yield sign or any other such marking on the pavement.

Ensuring the safety of all travelers is our main objective, however, it takes the entire community to make it happen.

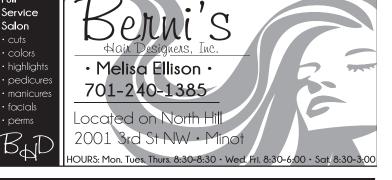

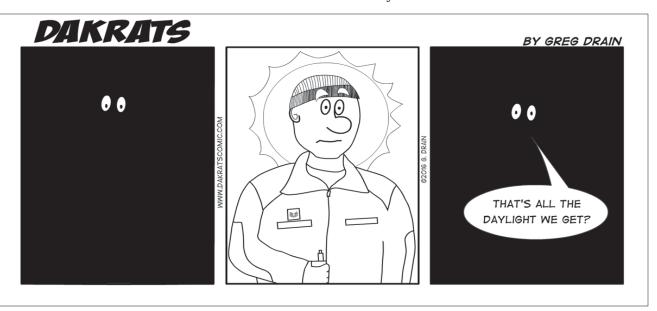
