## Newly renovated visiting quarters lodging facility opens

MINOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. -- The grand opening of the newly renovated visiting quarters lodging facility, hosted by Minot Air Force Base's Sakakawea Inn, occurred Feb. 3, 2016.

"The goal for Air Force lodging is to have private room and bathroom facilities suitable for use by any rank," said Cori Esselman, general manager of the Sakakawea Inn. "Our new visiting quarters meet this goal and it is a big step forward for Minot Air Force Base."

The former honor guard



dormitory, comprised of 30 rooms and 8 suites, is now equipped with big sunny windows, private baths and kitchenettes for those who prefer not to eat out during their stay, said Esselman.

The old visiting quarters, set in place in 1972, were built as temporary structures, said Esselman.

"The floors were spongy, the plumbing froze in the severe winter weather, and the kitchens and bathrooms had a lot of use."

Frequent maintenance to the three now-retired legacy buildings, is a drain on manpower and material resources, said Richard Helgeson, 5th Civil Engineer Squadron operations chief. "That is why we enthusiastically supported converting this facility to lodging."

Lt. Col. Darryl Lee, commander of the 5th Force Support Squadron, said that the new VQ facility shows a significant commitment by Air Force leadership to further modernize Minot AFB.

Plans to change the building from a dormitory to lodging started in 2009, however, due to the oil boom, flood and Minot's housing shortage, the plans were delayed, said Esselman. The facility could not be converted until it was no longer needed as a dormitory.

Minot AFB initiated a \$102,000 construction project using small project funds to create rooms for clean and dirty linens, install sensor-operated entrance doors and mount keyless locks on new guest room doors, said Esselman.

An additional \$67,000 from CE's operations budget was spent on labor and materials for plumbing and electrical repairs, windows and screens, she added.

AF Lodging's interior designer provided six themes for the interior design of the new visiting quarters building.

A total of \$575,000 in non-appropriated funds was spent to renovate the interior décor, to include, paint, carpet, furniture, draperies, light fixtures and bathtubs.

"From each room charge paid to Air Force lodges, \$10 per bed goes to fund renovation and construction of facilities," said Esselman, who added that the new Transient Living Facility under construction on Missile Avenue here is funded from the same money.

AF Innkeeper standards require artwork hung throughout the VQ to reflect the local area, so all of the artwork in the new VQ represents North Dakota scenery, said Esselman.

The new VQ benefits not only guests visiting Minot AFB, but also the employees of Sakakawea Inn, said Esselman.

"This VQ, and soon the new TLF for families to open a year from now, will transform the first and last impression of those coming to Minot AFB," said Lee. "Only the best for the best who come north!"

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## Defense Spending, Terrorism, and the Shrinking Military

INOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. -- As an election year, 2016 will be filled with national dialogue about government spending, and that includes discussion of money and the military. Some see reduced defense spending as a step in the right direction, and others see it as a problem. Will military spending go up or down with a new president? Is the military really shrinking? How does that affect national security?

On the whole, military spending really has declined. Defense spending made up 20 percent of the national budget in 2010. In 2015, it was less than 16 percent. Some reasons for that include pulling troops out of Iraq and Afghanistan, and the fact that spending was literally forced down by America's brush with sequestration in 2013. However, for the future,

the Obama Administration has proposed a budget that would increase defense spending by approximately 8 percent.

So defense spending will be on its way up, but as some presidential candidates continue to point out, the military itself is shrinking. Over the past four years, the U.S. Army had shed approximately 80,000 positions, and there are new cuts on the way. In a broad sense, all branches of the armed forces are being consolidated. These statistics are sometimes used as evidence of declining national security, particularly from terrorism. However, that sort of rhetoric is business as usual in elections, and it doesn't reflect reality.

American armed forces are

still globally dominant, and even with recent reductions the United States is still the biggest military spender in the world, spending more than twice as much on defense as China -- the next largest spender. But the national security debate isn't limited to the balance of national power, because terrorism is also a major talking point in American politics.

Fortunately, terrorism is not a statistically meaningful threat to American citizens. Americans are more likely to be killed by lightning strikes than terrorism -- and even death by lightning is extremely rare, unlike obesity, which contributes to the deaths of half a million Americans annually.

Presidential candidates will talk about a shrinking military being equivalent to shrinking security, but American citizens are thousands of times more likely to be killed by heart disease or car accidents than any form of hostile action -- yet it's unlikely this year's candidates will have much to say about seatbelts or fast food, because these things don't provoke an emotional reaction the same way terrorism does.

The military really has been scaled back, though there's no credible evidence that's resulted in any strategic or security shortfall. While defense spending has gone down, it will inevitably go back up, as will the size of the military, for better or worse.

Through MilitaryChildCare.com, eligible families can search and request care for full day and part day options in facility-based and homebased programs for children from birth through age 12. Families at Minot AFB who are currently on waitlists will be automatically transitioned to the new web-based system. 












#### Information, Tickets, & Travel Office Announces Grand Opening







## North Dakota Department of Health's Lead Surveillance **Programs Protect the Public**

#### NORTH DAKOTA DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH

ISMARCK – The news from Flint, Michigan, regarding lead in drinking water has drawn national attention to adverse health effects related to lead exposure. The North Dakota Department of Health (NDDoH) assures residents that the lead problems facing Flint are not likely to happen in North Dakota, although North Dakota residents can be exposed to other sources of lead that are of concern. Regardless of the source of lead, the NDDoH has several systems in place to monitor, test, and remediate lead problems.

Lead is a common metal found in the environment that can pose a significant risk to health if too much of it enters the body. Lead can cause damage to the brain, red blood cells and kidneys. The greatest threat is to young children and pregnant women because it can slow mental and physical development.

Lead seldom occurs naturally in drinking water supplies. Lead primarily enters drinking water from the corrosion of leadcontaining materials in the water distribution system and household plumbing. In Flint's case, the city switched its water source from Detroit's water system to the Flint River in 2014. The river water was not treated properly and lead from older city water pipes leached into the water supplied to Flint homes.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) published the Lead and Copper Rule in 1991, and the NDDoH administers

this rule in the state. Under lead. Approximately half the rule, most public water systems must collect samples from a targeted sampling pool of those sites with the greatest risk of lead leaching. The rule requires that water systems provide the homeowner with the information about the lead levels in the water coming out of the taps whenever a sample is collected. If the water exceeds EPA's action level (0.015 milligrams of lead per liter of water) in more than 10 percent of the sites sampled, the system must provide public education, source water treatment and corrosion control.

In North Dakota, 406 public water systems collected about 4,700 water samples to test for lead during the latest three-year compliance period of 2013 to 2015. Lead concentrations above the action level were detected in about 1 percent of the samples. The systems with those levels have implemented remedial efforts to bring lead concentrations below the action level, which is confirmed by follow-up sampling.

Of greater concern in North Dakota are leadcontaining products in and around homes. Leadbased paint is the most common source of lead in the home, even though residential use was banned in 1978. Other potential sources of lead include lead-based stains; certain types of pottery, porcelain and pewter; and antique toys or toys manufactured outside the country.


Children ages 6 and younger are at the most risk for health effects from a million U.S. children ages 1 to 5 have blood lead levels above 5 micrograms per deciliter, the reference level at which the national Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends public health actions be initiated. In North Dakota, about 3,700 children ages 0 to 7 were tested for lead in 2014. About 2.4 percent of these children were found to have blood lead levels above the reference level.

Since 2003, the NDDoH has investigated 102 residences for elevated blood lead levels. Of those investigations, 93 cases were caused by the ingestion of paint chips or dust due to the peeling of lead-based paint or renovating in homes with lead-based paint. The remaining nine cases included sources such as foreign-made toys, antique toys, and old dishes with lead glazing. None of the cases were linked to a municipal water system.

The only way to diagnose lead poisoning is through a blood test. Parents should consult with their doctor if they are concerned about their children being exposed to lead.

Lake Sakakawea and the Missouri River draw their fair share of nonresident interest.

And don't forget those smaller lakes. Even smaller mid-sized reservoirs and small lakes – especially in the southeast – catch the states for duck and goose hunting

Simply put, North Dakota isn't Minnesota, Iowa, Illinois, or other Midwestern states.

We haven't lost 99 percent of our native prairie and wetlands.

In addition, we generally still have easier access to hunting opportunities despite the fact that more than 90 percent of North Dakota is privately owned.

North Dakota is one of only two states in the nation where hunting on private land is allowed unless posted closed.

While we don't have large amounts of public land, our PLOTS – Public Land Open To Sportsmen walk-in hunting access program through the N.D. Game and Fish Department is one of the easiest to use, access, and locate PLOTS-enrolled land.

Plus we have the highest number of U.S. Fish and Wildlife Waterfowl Production Areas in the U.S., which are mandated by federal law to be open for hunting, fishing, and trapping.

North Dakota lacks the vast amount of U.S. Forest Service National Forest lands but we still have more than 1 million acres of National Grasslands.

So, yes, there is a lot to love about North Dakota's natural resources.

We just have to realize just how darn lucky we are.

That means we have to work together to keep what we have, working with landowners to maintain good hunter-landowner relations, keeping an eye on state and federal legislative issues affecting fish and wildlife, and supporting efforts to keep, enhance, and even grow the opportunities and resources we have. That's one way to say "I love you" to something near and dear to many North Dakotans – our abundant outdoor recreation opportunities.





## Col. Richard Toliver: Pioneering combat pilot

WASHINGTON (AFNS) -- Retired Col. Richard Toliver graduated from Tuskegee Institute University in January 1963 with a Bachelor of Science degree in mechanical engineering.

He began his Air Force career in February 1963 as a project engineer and completed pilot training in June 1965. He was one of the first five African American F-4 Phantom II pilots to serve under the famed Tuskegee Airman Gen. Daniel "Chappie" James.

Toliver was twice deployed during the Vietnam War and flew 446 missions and 860 combat hours in fighter jets.

During his 26 years of service, Toliver served throughout the United States, Southeast Asia, Europe, North Africa, and the Persian Gulf. He commanded a number of units and held key staff positions in major commands of the Air Force. He was a command pilot with 4,000 flying hours in the F-4, F-15 Eagle, F-16 Fighting Falcon, OT-37 Tweet, O-2 Skymaster, T-33 Shooting Star, and several civilian aircraft.

His many military decorations include the Legion of Merit, Distinguished Flying Cross, Meritorious Service Medal with two oak leaf clusters, Air Medal with 27 oak leaf clusters, and the Air Force Commendation Medal.

#### MAFB Economic Impact Report Presented at MAC Luncheon

MINOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. -- The monthly Military Affairs Committee luncheon was held at the Grand Hotel Thursday, Feb. 4 at 12 p.m., and included a presentation of Minot AFB's annual economic impact report, presented by Lt. Col. Raymond Castro, 5th Comptroller Squadron commander.

The base contributed more than \$597 million to the area's economy in fiscal year 2015. In fiscal year 2014, Minot AFB had an impact of nearly \$578 million, a significant the TRICARE system total more than \$10 million."

The economic data is calculated on regulations from the Air Force and is current as of Sept. 30, 2015. The total economic impact was calculated by combining expenses: the annual payroll of the base, worth \$368 million; annual expenditures for construction, services and materials, costing \$93.4 million; and the value of indirect jobs created, \$135.7 million, Castro said.

The amount paid to local schools was also significant, accounting for almost \$7.2 million. This accounts for off-base education for many of the young Airmen from Minot AFB.

MINOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. -- Hero. Veteran. Partner. Friend. Those were some of the words Staff Sgt. Roland Garcia, 5th Security Forces Squadron military working dog handler, used to describe Kitty, a military working dog at Minot Air Force Base, who passed in her sleep Jan. 20.

Kitty was set to retire in February after serving as an MWD for nine years. Instead, on her birthday, members from around the base honored her sacrifices.

"She was deployed once in 2008 to Southwest Asia, which is rare for being stationed here (Minot). She's the only dog that I know of from here that's been deployed to that location," Garcia said. "She's been on over 20 secret service missions to provide protection for the president, heads of state, vice president, things of that nature."

Like all other Air Force MWD's, Kitty completed her initial K-9 training at Lackland Air Force Base in San Antonio, Texas. There, she was part of a class that received training in patrolling, drugs, explosives and detection. According to the 341st Training Squadron's website, K-9s are used as a force multiplier with their unique skills offering the ability to prevent current and future attacks. Once K-9s complete their training at Lackland, they are then sent to operational units throughout the Department of Defense.

"Her initial training was completed at Lackland Air Force Base at the dog training school, where she received her basic training," Garcia said. "There she learned obedience, patrol and detection training which

months." According to officials, K-9s are usually German Shepherds, Belgian Malinois, Labrador Retrievers and occasionally a mixed breed or other sporting or herding type dogs.

"She was an explosives dog, so we had to make sure that she's trained in explosives at least twice a month," Garcia said. "She was also an attack dog, which means she's patrol trained. She was also trained to find people stuck in buildings and in open areas." According to MWD

handlers on base, Kitty was set to retire early due to medical complications that prevented her from performing at levels the Air Force requires.

"She had an issue where her body wasn't processing her proteins, so fluid would escape her intestines, which made her start to bloat and underperform," Garcia said.

After almost a decade of military service, Garcia was set to adopt Kitty.

"I was able to adopt her," Garcia said. "President Bill Clinton passed a law in 2000 that allowed MWDs to be adopted by their handlers, someone in the military in general or even a civilian instead of being put down."

Although Kitty was only retired for one month, her handlers indicated her service to the DoD and members of the base will leave a lifetime of memories.

"We went on a temporary duty assignment for a secret service mission to La Crosse, Wisconsin and everyone was giving her so much praise for her work ethic," Garcia said. "She wouldn't stop searching in every building. She ended up finding an empty magazine in a news van that all the other dogs missed."

A memorial service was held for Kitty Feb. 2, at the base theater.





#### Tactical Fitness classes available at McAdoo

tactical fitness class for all active duty military and their families is now being offered daily at the McAdoo Fitness Center.

Nicole Goss, a contracted personal trainer at McAdoo, recently became a certified level one CrossFit instructor and began offering classes at the beginning of the year.

Athletes interested in starting the tactical fitness program can sign up at the front desk of the fitness center to either take the beginner's course or to test out of the beginner's course, said Goss.

Anyone that has no prior tactical fitness experience must go to the OnRamp class, which is a 10-session beginner's course, offered at 11 a.m. and 5 p.m. on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

"The focus of the OnRamp class is on form and mechanics," said Goss. "I want to make sure everyone is safe and that they know how to perform all of the exercises effectively and proficiently."

Athletes with prior tactical fitness experience can sign up to perform a ninemovement test-out to start immediately in an open class.

"The nine-movement test-out shows us that the athletes are competent with the mechanics and form," said Goss. Open classes are offered every day of the week at 6 a.m. and 4 p.m. at McAdoo. There is an additional open class offered at 11 a.m. every Tuesday and Thursday. As the founder, Nicole Goss asked for volunteers to help jump start the program. Her team of volunteer coaches include: Lt. Col.

Nate Naidas, Capt. Megan McDonough, Master Sgt. Dan Mueller, Tech. Sgt. Kyle Douglass, Staff Sgt. Coty Raphael, Senior Airman John Veirs, Jean Granger and Elise Hobson.

Goss and her team sit down one weekend a month and plan their goals for the following month.

"We come up with all the workouts and all the skills for every single day for that month, so that at the end of the month we can actually see progress and they're actually achieving a goal and not just coming and working out," she said. "There is a science behind what we do and why we program, and we want to make sure we actually see something out of what we are doing."

Douglass, a flight chief assigned to the 91st Missile Security Forces Squadron, volunteers his skills to help people. Douglass has been participating in CrossFit for two years, and just recently received his level one certification as well.

"It is functional fitness," said Douglass. "It is not isolation, in fact, it is the exact opposite. I want to spread that message by helping, instructing and continuing to learn for myself."

OnRamp classes are full for the month of February. However, one class is available for sign-up in March.

#### North Dakota Security Forces Airmen to Return Home from Deployment

MINOT, N.D. — A small group of North Dakota Air National Guard Airmen, assigned to the Minotbased 219th Security Forces Squadron, are scheduled to return home tonight, after a six-month deployment to Southwest Asia, where they served in support U.S. Central Command (CENTCOM) operations. The security forces Airmen will return to North Dakota on separate civilian flights scheduled to land at Minot International Airport. Eleven are slated to arrive today. Three of the 11 will arrive on Delta flight 4155 at 9:55 p.m. The other eight will land at 10:48 p.m. on United Airlines flight 5270. Two more Airmen are scheduled to arrive Friday, at 4:47 p.m. on Delta flight 4789. All of the Airmen had volunteered for the base defense and security operations mission led by Tech Sgt. Michael Clow. The Airmen are proficient in implementing critical protection measures for military personnel and other important assets. They took advantage of the experience and training provided by their home unit, which made history by becoming the first National Guard unit to team up with an activeduty Air Force unit to provide security for one of the nation's three missile fields. "We are so proud of the 219th Security Forces Squadron," said Maj. Gen. Al Dohrmann, North Dakota adjutant general. "Their level of professionalism and expertise are outdone only by a steadfast commitment to the safety of our nation. We're grateful they're returning safely from a successful sixmonth mission in support of CENTCOM, and we look forward to joining their families and the community in welcoming them back home to North Dakota." CENTCOM is one of nine unified combatant commands in the U.S. military.
