Hell froze over: The Lynn Aas Story

Just got choked up there," he said, wiping his nose with a handkerchief. "I'm normally not that way."

I hadn't even noticed his emotion. There were no tears in his eyes. His voice didn't crack. If he hadn't mentioned it, I never would have known he missed a beat. I could tell during our hour-long interview this was the norm for him. He doesn't have a weak bone in his body.

Lynn Aas is a 94-yearold World War II veteran. He served during the Battle of the Bulge as a combat infantry rifleman and is a Bronze Star and Purple Heart recipient. He attended the Massachusetts Institute of Technology for engineering. He is an educated accountant and has a law degree. He served as a member of Legislature. He was a devoted husband and is a father to four boys. Simply put, he is inspiring.

As we sat down to talk in the unheated air museum hangar, I apologized for how cold it was. It was February in Minot, North Dakota so the room temperature was uncomfortable. Wasting no time at all, Lynn replied, "I've been colder," with a knowing smile on his face. Slightly embarrassed by my own ignorance, I instantly knew it was going to be a fantastic interview.

Lynn began his story by telling me how the bombings of Pearl Harbor inspired him to leave college and enlist in the U.S. Army in order to do his part.

"I think everybody actually felt it was their duty, obligation and desire to serve their country," Lynn said. "After Pearl Harbor, the loyalty of everybody was strong and we wanted to find a life. Even though he was an excellent shot, he told me the thought of being a rifleman didn't thrill him. "It wasn't easy, but I accepted what was given to

By this time in the interview, I realized I had started bouncing my legs and rubbing my hands together to stay warm. That hangar felt like it

Shipped off to Macon, Georgia for basic training, it was there Lynn was given the job of infantry rifleman, a job he said he became quite good at while hunting in the North Dakota countryside his entire me, and I don't think I ever complained to anybody about it," Lynn said. "Nobody liked combat. War is hell. I can't say I liked it, but I was an expert shot and was trained beyond my years, beyond my assignment."

was getting colder by the minute. Then Lynn began talking about the Battle of the Bulge. I instantly forgot about the temperature.

"Staying alive is

something you learn real fast," Lynn said. "You learn how to duck bullets, you learn how to dodge the various artillery that came in, and you learn how to survive in deep snow. My mission became survival you might say, plus watching out for my buddies."

As Lynn recalled those brutal 45 days in combat near Bastogne, Belgium, he spoke with ease. He described how terrible the weather was with blizzardlike conditions and no shelter to protect them from it. He named each soldier he had been paired up with throughout battle. He remembered each date of each movement his unit made, something I was especially impressed with. As if I wasn't already hooked, Lynn then started on the difficult topics. The day of January 7, 1945 was particularly hard, beginning with Lynn trying to console his foxhole partner.

"He was scared to death and fearful," Lynn recalled. "He said to me, 'I know I'll be killed,' and I tried to encourage him. At 11 that morning I was laying

23rd Bomber Barons Return from Guam

MINOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. -- Returning home to a hero's welcome, Airmen of the 5th Bomb Wing reunited with friends and family at the base theater today following a sixmonth deployment in the Pacific region supporting the continuous bomber presence mission.

During the deployment, approximately 275 Airmen and four B-52 Stratofortresses from the 23rd Bomb Squadron were based at Andersen Air Force Base, Guam where U.S. Pacific Command has maintained a continuous bomber presence in the region for more than a decade.

"I am so proud of the men and women of the 23rd Bomb Squadron and supporting squadrons for their service this deployment," said Katie Gorecki, wife of Lt. Col. Ryan Gorecki, commander of the 23rd Bomb Squadron. "I watched with pride seeing their accomplishments in international news headlines and missed them here at home especially over the holidays."

Air Force Global Strike aircraft conducting CBP missions include the B-52 Stratofortress, B-1 Lancer and the B-2 Spirit aircraft. These aircraft, according to officials and the men and women who fly and support them, provide a significant capability that enables readiness and commitment to deterrence, provides assurances allies and strengthens regional security and stability in the Indo-Asia-Pacific region.

"It's very exciting to see families being reunited," said Capt. Margaret Ingerslew, 69th Bomb Squadron. "There is a huge support system in place here at Minot for those here and away, but nothing beats having your family complete again. We are so proud of what all the Barons accomplished while away - they represented the B-52 community incredibly well and are a true testament to our global mission of providing continuous assurance and deterrence."

Earlier in the week. the 69th Expeditionary Bomb Squadron and support personnel, also located at Minot, departed North Dakota to replace the 23rd in the Pacific region. Minot AFB is the only dual-wing, nuclear-capable base in the Air Force, hosting two legs of the strategic deterrence triad.

AF senior leaders brief State of the Air Force

ASHINGTON (AFNS) -- Air Force Secretary Deborah Lee James and Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Mark A. Welsh III discussed the State of the Air Force during a press conference at the Pentagon March 7.

James acknowledged a lot has happened since the last State of the Air Force address in August 2015.

"In October, Russia launched its first airstrikes in Syria. In November, (Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant) terrorists attacked Paris again, as well as Lebanon, Mali, and here at home in San Bernadino. In January, China landed an aircraft on a newly built runway in the South China Sea ... and then a few weeks ago, North Korea tested a nuclear weapon," she said.

James added in Afghanistan, the Taliban, al-Qaida, ISIL and other anti-government groups, continue to conduct attacks, undermine security, and create challenges to the people and government of Afghanistan.

"Your Air Force has been extremely busy and extremely effective," James said. "In the past year, coalition forces upped the ante against (ISIL), flying more than 55,000 sorties in support of Operation Inherent Resolve."

However, the service's persistent effort takes a toll on aircraft, readiness and

Airmen. James said the service's Airmen are high demand, low density, using one career field to highlight the strain on the force.

"In the maintenance arena, because we have aging platforms ... the maintenance needs are going up," James said. "We have thousands of maintainers in the force, but we actually need more maintainers going forward."

Welsh agreed, adding maintenance professionals are working hard and retention could be a challenge.

"With six fleets of airplanes now over 50 years old, 21 or so fleets over 25 years old, it just gets tougher to keep them flying and we see that all over the Air Force," he said.

James said after 20 years of downsizing, the Air Force has focused on infusing resources into both the recruiting force and the technical training bases.

"When you're recruiting more and you're retaining more ... that is how you grow. That's the approach that we're taking," James said. "We hope to reach the 317,000 number on the active duty side by the end of this fiscal year." Welsh also spoke about remotely piloted aircraft training and crews, saying he expects the Air Force will train about 334 RPA pilots in fiscal year 2016, up from about 180 in past years.

Modernizing aircraft, James said, will provide warfighters with enhanced capabilities.

One example of the service's effort to modernize is the B-21. James said in the case of the 21st century bomber the Air Force is leaning forward and trying to be more transparent. "Wo've given

"We've given the bomber a designation, shown you an artist's rendering, given a detailed explanation of the acquisition approach, and told you how we'll hold down costs," James said.

James also announced that Airmen and families can now go online and submit their idea for naming the B-21 by clicking here. As part of her














Cancer: The Thief of Loved Ones

BASE, N.D. -- The transition from growing up living within a few miles of your family and closest friends to starting your military career thousands of miles away can be difficult for some incoming Airmen, including myself. The idea of joining the Air Force was always in the back of my mind, but I was hesitant to join because I did not want to leave my family or my friends. When I finally got the courage to join, my family and friends supported me more than I ever even dreamed. I felt invincible knowing they were behind me every step of the way. My support system was strong, and I was motivated to conquer basic training. All was right in the world of Jessie. All except my best friend.

In November 2014, seven months before I left for basic military training, my best friend Michael Alexander Young, or Alex, was



diagnosed with a rare and aggressive form of testicular cancer. He received the news a month before his 21st birthday.

Although he was diagnosed well before I left for boot camp, it was still hard to complete each day without wondering if he was doing okay, but I received daily letters from my family updating me on his battle. In August, I graduated

BMT and was headed off to technical training school. I talked with him every chance I could. We would text, call and even FaceTime. He was always positive, he always motivated me to stay resilient and he always told me to keep my head in the game. His motivation was the key to my success in school.

Throughout August and the beginning of September, he seemed to be doing well. He bought a motorcycle, a new truck and he even bought a surprise shotgun for his gunenthusiast father, Todd.

However, things started to take a turn for the worse.

In the middle of September 2015, Alex was placed into hospice. Throughout the month, he had many visitors, but I was not one of them. Not being able to see Alex started to take a toll on my training. It was was lost in Clinton, Indiana, his hometown. Facebook updates and texts ensured me that Alex was remaining positive, was enjoying his time left on Earth and was not afraid to meet his Father in Heaven.

Wednesday, October 21, 2015, came too soon.

That morning, I found myself unable to sleep. I reached across my bed for my phone to check the time, 12:43 a.m. A time I will never forget. Though, it wasn't the only thing on my screen.

A message from Michael caught my attention. It read: "call me when you wake up please." I instantly got nauseous. Without hesitation, I called Michael.

He answered the phone in a sleepless and somber voice.

"Hey," he said softly. "Hey, what is going on? Why did you text me in the middle of the night? Is everything okay?" I asked impatiently.

There was a hesitation that seemed to last forever, and all I could hear was Michael let out a quick-pulsing sigh, as if he were holding back tears.

"Jessie, Alex is gone," was all he said.

I was speechless. My jaw dropped in shock, and I

worriedly.

"You're joking right? Please, tell me you're joking," I said vacantly. "No, Jess, I am sorry," he

"No, Jess, I am sorry," he said delicately. "Todd just called me. He told me he was with Alex all night, and was holding him as he went home to Heaven."

Alex's last words were, "Dad, I'm going."

Immediately, memories of us together filled my mind. The baseball game where we first met, visiting him in the hospital and talking with him in his last few days are things I will always remember. Just a few days before he passed away, we talked about me visiting him after I graduated tech school. We talked about relationships and we talked about having a drink to finally celebrate his 21st birthday together. Although I wasn't able to hug him during my visit, I did go to his burial site and talk with him, just like I promised.

Gaining a new best friend means you always have someone there to talk to about your problems and someone who will always laugh with you at your silly, not-so-funny, jokes. Losing your best friend means you will always have someone watching over you from Heaven and ensuring you live a high-quality life. Rest easy, my dear friend.

B ISMARCK - The ninth annual Arthur A. Link Fiddle Festival will take place at the Former Governors' Mansion State Historic Site on March 11 and 12, with a free concert at the North Dakota Heritage Center & State Museum on March 12.

Friday and Saturday afternoon events will be at the Former Governors' Mansion located at 320 E. Ave. B, Bismarck. At 7 p.m. Friday, March 11, Everaldo Martinez, concertmaster for the **Bismarck Mandan** Symphony, will be performing and speaking about the music that influenced him as a young musician and South American folk music.

Saturday, March 12,

events begin at the Former Governors' Mansion at 12 p.m. with a performance by John Lardinois, known locally as Fiddlin' Johnny. Performances by local string students will begin at 12:30 p.m., and the Strolling Strings of Bismarck will perform at 3:30 p.m. All performances are free to the public, but due to the number of students and families participating, seating will be limited. Free-will donations will be accepted to fund future Arthur A. Link Fiddle Festivals.

Saturday evening's free concert begins at 7 p.m. and will feature Fiddlin' Johnny, select string students, and a performance by the Frog Holler String Band at the North Dakota Heritage Center & State Museum in Bismarck.

The Arthur A. Link Fiddle Festival is sponsored each year by the Society for the Preservation of the Former Governors' Mansion, the State Historical Society of North Dakota, Bismarck Public Schools, and the North Dakota Council on the Arts. The purpose of the concert is to promote string music education and appreciation, in honor of Governor Arthur A. Link and his love of playing the violin.

"We're pleased to once again announce that we can issue our "Big Three" (bighorn sheep, moose, and elk) licenses again..."Big Two" didn't roll off the tongue real well."

 N.D. Game and Fish Department wildlife division chief Jeb Williams announcing that North Dakota might – emphasis on "might" - be able to issue bighorn sheep hunting licenses in 2016.

They looked at numbers, research, history, studied, analyzed the situation, and came up with the best possible scenario in what otherwise is a difficult situation.

"They" is the N.D. Game and Fish Department. After a 1-year hiatus when an outbreak of pneumonia hit the state's bighorn sheep and forcing the agency to close the hunting season, Game and Fish Department wildlife division chief Jeb Williams said hunters might have an opportunity to hunt bighorns in 2016.

Emphasize the word "might".

Typically, hunters applied for the "Big Three" – bighorn sheep, elk, and moose – at the same time in March. The drawing is held in April and hunters notified they received a license.

This year the bighorn application is a different – and only for bighorns. Moose and elk drawings will be held and hunters notified as usual in April.

However, North Dakota's bighorn sheep population isn't large in the first place and coupled with the fact that biologists know pneumonia is still present; hunters will still apply in March.

Erring on the side of caution, though, the Game and Fish Department won't determine if there is a season, how many licenses, or which units will be open until aerial population surveys are conducted in August.

Then and only then will they know if mature ram they're not out of the woods yet," Williams described.

Tentative plans call for the bighorn sheep license lottery drawing approximately Sept. 1 if there is a season.

Successful applicants for however many licenses issued will be notified by telephone. They can decline the license and still be eligible to apply if future bighorn sheep hunting seasons are held without losing their once-in-alifetime opportunity if they decline.


One thing they won't get back, though, is the \$5 non-refundable application fee.

Just consider it a donation to helping manage North Dakota's bighorns.

The best advice Williams has for hunters considering applying for a bighorn sheep license this year is if they have any concern about not getting their application fee back if there isn't a season, they don't think they would get the unit they want, or it's too short of notice with the season opening in October is not to apply. "My guess is they will be excited to receive that phone call," Williams said.

Historically, a bighorn sheep license has been available for auction at the Midwest Chapter of the Wild Sheep Foundation convention with 100 percent of the revenue supporting North Dakota's bighorn sheep management and research. The tag will only be issued if there is a season with at least two licenses avail-

The bottom line is the pneumonia die-off was challenging, at best. Things are looking a little brighter but the state's wild sheep are still on the edge when it comes recovering. This is the only viable option for North Dakota's wild sheep and hunters alike.



10 Unique ways to have an Easter Egg Hunt



1. COLOR CODED EGGS:

To make things more fair and challenging than just grabbing handfuls of eggs, assign every child their own color to hunt for.

2. WINNING NUMBERS:

Fill a few plastic Easter Eggs with a numbered piece of paper instead of a treat. The numbers will coincide with special prizes, like activity sets or stuffed animals. Hide the special eggs along with the rest of the Easter eggs. When the kids open all their eggs, the ones with a winning number can cash it in for their prize.

3. ABC EGG HUNT:

Make Easter egg hunting a learning game by writing A-Z on your plastic eggs. Everyone must find all the letters of the alphabet with no doubles. You can provide an ABC checklist for them to cross off each letter they find.

4. MATH GAMES EGG HUNT:

Incorporate math into the festivities to give the traditional egg hunt a fun twist. You can place numbers inside each egg, along with candies or small toys. At the end of the egg hunt, kids can add up their numbers and the three highest numbers win a prize. To create a challenge for older egg hunters, you can number the eggs, then at the end when their baskets are full, create a story problem for them to work out in order to win a prize. For example, you could say, "Choose two eggs. Add the two together. Choose another egg. Subtract that number..." etc.

5. GLOW-IN-THE-DARK EGG HUNT:

For a super fun time, host your Easter egg hunt at night time with glow-in-the-dark eggs, or plastic eggs with small glow sticks inside. Give every person a flashlight and get hunting!

6. LETTERS IN YOUR NAME:

For toddlers, make Easter egg hunting fair and fun by having them search for the letters of their name, written on the outside of each egg.

7. ODDS AND EVENS:

Again, to keep one kid from hoarding all the eggs from the others, keep things fair and interesting by numbering all eggs and then assigning each person odds or evens. They can only keep eggs that are their designated odd or even number.

8. KEEP OR TRADE?:

When your Easter egg hunt is over, gather the troops and give each person an option to choose an egg from their basket at random. They can open their egg and see what is inside. You will have a basket of plastic eggs that can contain money, toys, coupons, a gag gift, or nothing at all. Give each person the option of keeping the egg in their hand, or trading it for one egg in your basket. They must choose the basket egg blindly (no shaking!)



alongside him, and I watched the artillery [men] come walking toward us in a German pattern. I said, 'Let's get out of here, it's getting too hot!' and he said, 'Any place is good enough, it isn't going to make any difference.' Well I moved, and he got killed."

Not wasting any time, Lynn jumped right in to the story of that same evening, when he had another close call.

"We were retreating and as I was moving away, the machine gun started shooting in my direction," he said. "I ducked in a trail that was made by wheels. The ground was frozen and I could see the machine gun tracers over my shoulder, but they were not reaching me."

Lynn said a soldier, who was taking cover just a few yards behind him, got up to make a run for it and was shot just above him. The soldier's lifeless body fell on the hard ground next to Lynn. For just a flash of a moment, he paused in his story and as I sat staring at him, it dawned on me. He thought he was going to lose his life that night. He thought he would be next.

"I was frozen in that position for some time,' Lynn said. "I don't Purple Heart for his sacrifices. exactly recall everything that happened, but a big storm came and

"On March 25th, during the day it was rather peaceful, but come evening the Germans opened up with their artillery," Lynn remembered. "I was laying in the foxhole and one of them hit me. I could feel

coping with what he now knows is Post Traumatic Stress Syndrome. He remembers having a particularly bad day, which caused him to miss an exam at school. He approached the Dean, who had served

in World War I, hoping he would understand and allow him to make up the test. No such luck.

"He looked at me and said, 'You've gone through some difficult times, but it's time to move forward,"" Lynn said, smiling as he remembered the Dean's tough words. "So I decided yeah, I have to move forward. It wasn't always easy, but that's the way it went."

I stopped the interview there. I had been searching for a chink in Lynn's armor for over an hour now. I clearly wasn't going to find it. This man, like so many others from the Greatest Generation, is the epitome of a warrior. As he sat across from me 70 years later, giving me detailed a play-by-play, I finally reached a realization. I didn't need to hear anymore. My mind was made up. At 94-yearsold, this man is the strongest person I have ever met, for he survived a frozen

> I was hit and the blood started flowing, so I got out of there and got back to the first aid station. They bedded me down and took care of me."



1 got out of there. I did survive."

We were about 40 minutes into the interview by now and I didn't even feel the cold anymore. Listening to these stories, I realized I didn't deserve to be uncomfortable. I didn't have the right to complain about a little cold. This man was sitting in the same frigid room, reliving some of the most horrific moments anyone has to experience in a lifetime, and he was doing it with grace. The gold, heartshaped medal hanging off his 70-year-old military jacket by a purple ribbon caught my eye. I was eager to hear that story.

While telling the story, Lynn pointed to a small hole in the left arm of his jacket. My eyes fixated on the hole, amazed. After all this man went through, he came out of it with just that one small hole. The hole that ultimately sent him back home to safety, one of five in his 55-man unit who survived the Bulge.

We transitioned the topic to post war, but my interest didn't fade. After the war, Lynn went back to college at the University of North Dakota, but he mentioned he was having a hard time

69th Expeditionary Bomb Squadron to continue Pacific presence

FORCE BASE, Guam -- Airmen assigned to the 69th Expeditionary Bomb Squadron, deployed from Minot Air Force Base, North Dakota, to Andersen AFB, Guam to replace their sister unit, the 23rd EBS in support of the U.S. Pacific Command's continuous bomber presence.

Since March 2004, Andersen AFB has hosted the CBP mission, which is designed to enhance regional security and provides reassurance to allies and partners that the United States is capable of defending its national security interests in the Indo-Asia-Pacific region.

"The main goal out here is to advance and strengthen alliances," said Capt. Matthew Reoch, 23rd EBS pilot and resource adviser. "Our continual presence out here, showing commitment to our allies and having our aircraft ready is critical in showing that the U.S. is always prepared to respond to any threats that arise."

The missions carried out in the Pacific region provide a different training environment and opportunities that differ greatly from Minot AFB.

"Andersen provides a great experience when it comes to training with joint and international partners," said Capt. Erik Nelson, 23rd EBS B-52 Stratofortress aircraft commander. "Also, the key to performing missions to the best of our ability was to remain flexible throughout all the missions, especially those that were short notice. That kind of ingenuity and flexibility is crucial and all of our guys have the capacity to do that."

While stationed here, the outbound aircrew and maintainers assigned to the 23rd EBS exceeded their flightline and training goals by logging 1,428 hours of flight time, performing more than 200 sorties and dropping over 300 munitions totaling 197,000 pounds.

The Airmen arriving from the 69th EBS will be stationed in Guam for the next six months to conduct CBP operations and training.

"The B-52 is a symbol and a strategic projection of power," said Maj. Luke Dellenbach, 69th EBS assistant director of operations. "The training environment and airspace out here is great. There are a lot of individuals in the squadron that have not had the experience flying a long-range distance over oceanic waters, so this will be a great opportunity for them."

In between flying missions, members from the 69th EBS hope to build good rapport and take an active role in the community while stationed on Guam through volunteering and partnership events, Dellenbach said.

The upcoming months present a unique opportunity for the 69th EBS in training and deployment experience in an environment unlike any found in the continental U.S.

"Knowing you're a part of these Pacific power projection missions, which help to shape the best interest of the U.S. and parts of the world, is very rewarding," Dellenbach said. "It's a great opportunity to represent the 69th EBS and fly out to Andersen AFB to promote deterrence and assurance."






