INOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. -- Minot Air Force Base, North Dakota flexed its bomber muscles April 20, 2016, as they sent one of their B-52H Stratofortresses to the U.S. European Command area of responsibility for a mission.

The deterrence and assurance mission consisted of interoperability training and flight intercepts with the French air force as well as performed a flyover of the Lafayette Escadrille Memorial during the 100th

Anniversary of the formation of the Escadrille ceremony.

Minot's B-52s were not alone in this mission as they were accompanied by U.S. Air Force F-22s, a French Mirage 2000N and French Rafales.





administrative personnel, the training event forced almost all of the command's personnel to remain alert and operationally ready to execute the mission at a moment's notice.

"This is the first time that we've incorporated all of these elements into a single exercise here at the major command level," said Maj. Ryan Graves, chief of AFGSC exercises. "It requires a great deal of communication between all operational levels and as well as support organizations, which have largely remained untested in these types of exercises until this point."

Exercise elements like cyber attacks and force protection scenarios tested base-level AFGSC headquarters responses.

Although AFGSC hosts the exercise annually, new this year was the incorporation of the 7th and 28th Bomb Wing's B-1s and the 377th Air Base Wing at Kirtland AFB, New Mexico.

Overall, Constant Vigilance tested the command's ability to respond to conventional and nuclear operations as well as its ability to protect itself against small ground attacks against its wings in northern tier areas. The event is only one of several annual exercises that AFGSC participates in to include Global Lightning and Global Thunder.


"We wanted to test the command's ability to communicate with all of its components and stress those assets in an effort to make the scenario as realistic

"Its impacts are felt in every county in the state and it remains a solid contributor to North Dakota's economic well-being. The industry professionals being honored today for their dedication, innovation and leadership are ambassadors for our state. Their hard work and commitment are shining examples of why North Dakota has become a worldwide player in the tourism industry. We are proud to honor them, as well as all of our tourism partners, for their service to our state."

Medora Musical 50th Year Anniversary, Attraction of the Year. For more than 50 years, the Medora Musical has been a summer tradition for many North Dakota families. In 2015, the entertaining script took more than 124,000 guests from 24 states and several countries down memory lane. Previous cast members from 50 years gathered for a reunion and shared their favorite stories of wooden bench seating, dirt floors and muddy hills. All of the employees worked diligently from dawn to dusk, making sure the show and town were perfect each night. The marketing team worked hard all year long to get the word out through surprising flash mob performances, new commercials and other new approaches. Through a half-century, each year's production has been a new story with the same spirit and dedication to Teddy Roosevelt's time in the Badlands.

Mike Beaudoin, Travel and Tourism Industry Leader. The COO of the Theodore Roosevelt Medora Foundation is usually the first into the office and the last to leave. Mike Beaudoin manages the teamwork of the board of directors, a full-time staff of 45, more than 300 seasonal employees

from 36 countries and 500 seasonal volunteers. He has overseen renovation of two Foundation-owned hotels, which boast a summer occupancy rate of 95%. His willingness to make hard choices for the benefit of the traveling public makes him an example of a tourism leader. As a community leader, he balances the historic character of the city while presenting new opportunities for guests.

Victoria Solis, Behind the Scenes Tourism Employee. Victoria Solis is more than a housekeeper at the Hyatt House in Minot. She is the smiling face that greets guests, the listening ear when someone has a problem and the welcoming spirit for those going through tough times. A recent guest was going through chemo at a local hospital and opened up to Solis, who came in early to service the room. She deep cleaned and disinfected everything so that it would be fresh once the guest got back to the hotel. She also asked the front desk to research products that would be helpful to someone undergoing chemotherapy. Solis left lotions, lip balm, a special mouthwash, ginger gum and a gift basket in the room.

Guests glow about Solis every day and her concern for people makes everyone love her.

North Dakota State Fair, Event of the Year. The annual mid-summer event in Minot includes entertainment for all ages and continues to be, arguably, the largest event in North Dakota. It includes a carnival, full cafeteria, three buildings of commercial vendors, competitive events and static exhibits, as well as a celebration of North Dakota's agriculture. Attendance has increased by 100,000 in the last 15 years. In 2015, the State Fair capped its 50th year in Minot with a memorable Aerosmith concert that brought attendance to just more than 300,000. The Fair works with Visit Minot to put heads in beds and bring families in to shop, eat and sleep in the city and is a great partner with North Dakota Tourism.

Norsk Høstfest. International Tourism Award. Founded by the late Chester and Joy Reiten, Norsk Høstfest has become the largest Scandinavian festival in North America. Approximately 60,000 attendees and 100-plus vendors from all over the world attend this festival,

now in its 39th year. Formed by friendship and shared Nordic heritage, it has become the foundation of local, statewide and international tourism and business commerce. This festival caters to all ages and features world-class entertainment, authentic food, handcrafted art and jewelry and much more. Some of Scandinavia's finest chefs prepare unique Scandinavian delicacies. The success of the event has created many opportunities for international business.

Carolyn Schweitzer, Front-line Tourism Employee. As Visitor Center Coordinator at Visit Minot, Schweitzer assists visitors daily, often going above and beyond to ensure travelers leave North Dakota with a Legendary impression of our state. She recently made several trips to one of Minot's largest festivals in her personal vehicle to assist tourists who missed their shuttle. She has spent a lunch break scouring Scandinavian Heritage Park for a little guest's missing stuffed giraffe. Profits at the Gift Shop have soared and many visitors comment on the excellent selection of North Dakota products. Schweitzer often refers travelers to other attractions and cities across the state.

Jamestown Tourism, Tourism Organization of the Year. The winner of the Tourism Organization of the Year Award has gone through some major changes in the last year and a half; from rebranding to the very name of the organization. This year, Jamestown Tourism partnered with smaller surrounding communities on ads and projects to lift up multiple communities at the same time. One such project was "Lunch & Learn" in Sioux Falls, S.D. for 30-plus international tour operators as part of the RMI Roundup. Additional partnerships were formed to help improve and promote outdoor opportunities and the marketing program at the local university to help generate a greater interest in the hospitality industry.

<u>but bees have summer and fall.</u> been a buzzword lately. And think back, did you see a monarch butterfly last year?

With declining pollingtor populations throughout the world potentially threatening human food supplies, the importance of honeybees, butterflies, and other native pollinators has taken center

That's why Burpee Seed Co. teamed with the U.S. Department of Agriculture Natural Resource Service Conservation (NRCS) to get the facts out about pollinators and why people should care.

Burpee also put their money where their mouth is, providing local NRCS offices with free native plant seed packets for people interested in doing their part in their own little corner of the world.

West McLean County NRCS District Conservationist Roberto Luciano said the packets provide enough seed for about a 100-square-foot plot. All people have to do is remove existing grass and prepare the soil, spread seeds as evenly as possible, gently smooth the ground out with the back of a rake – don't bury the seeds, though – and wa-

Keep the soil moist until seedlings are about 4 inches tall. "It's not a lot, but it's something," Luciano suggested.

Oh, sure, North Da-kota abounds with flowering crops like canola and sunflowers. It still has a fair share of native prairie with flowering plants for pollinators to feed.

But that might not be enough to sustain, let alone grow, pollinator populations.

The key thing to recognize is that just as people need food throughout their busy day, pollina-tors need food throughout their busy life cycle.

The bottom line is they need food in the spring especially early spring when fewer plants are

ardon the pun, flowering — as well as

Think of those three seasons as a pollinator's version of a human's breakfast, lunch, and supper.

'The Burpee seed packets contain a mix of plant species that flower throughout the spring, summer, and fall for pollinators.

A nice mix of perennial plants, including flowering shrubs, and annual plants provide foraging opportunities for pollina-

Something else to consider is that just as people need food and shelter to survive, pollinators need shelter, too.

And nesting cover, just like other, more readily identifiable wildlife.

For pollinators, that nesting cover and shelter could be something as easy as a small patch of undisturbed area around some trees in a shelterbelt, for example. It could be ditches, around utility poles, a trashy area of vegetation in a garden, or tough-to-mow spot in a yard.

Leaving those little areas could help a new generation of pollinators live to see another day.

It also helps if gardeners and property owners reduce chemical use such as pesticides, and be sure to select appropriate ones for the targeted species.

To learn more about the importance of pollinators go to the web-(www.xerces.org). The organization has two publications "Attracting Native Pollinators" and "Gardening for Butter-flies", as well a wealth of other information.

Check with a local NRCS office (463-2851, extension 3, for West McLean County) for more specific information about planting with plants native for one's particular area in North Dakota and see if they have a free packet of "Burpee's Bee Garden – Butterflies are Welcome" seeds.

Steeled and shaped by a childhood of rejection in an orphanage, Michelle Darnell grew up to become a she-wolf of self-made business savvy. Now she's a superstar investment titan and motivational-mojo guru who descends to the stage of frenzied fan events atop a giant golden phoenix in a spray of dollar bills, celebrating her brazen, competition-crushing excess like a carrot-topped combination of Donald Trump, Suze Orman and Richie Rich.

But the bigger they come, the harder they fall. And Michelle (Melissa Mc-Carthy) tumbles with a titanic thud when she's arrested for insider trading, loses her company and her home and has to serve a stint of white-collar jail time. When she's released, with no friends and no family to call on, she bullies her way back to her former assistant, Claire (Kristen Bell), and her young daughter, Rachel (Ella Anderson).

Since making her film breakthrough as part of the ensemble in Bridesmaids (2011), McCarthy moved

confidently into the lead for Identity Thief, Tammy, The Heat and Spy, proving her comedic bravura and her raucous adaptability for broad physical humor. She's a cherub-faced spark plug who'll go to just about any lengths for a laugh. The Boss is the second of her movies directed by her husband, actor-comedian Ben Falcone, who also makes a brief appearance (as he's done in several of her films).

Hollywood has always loved a good rags-to-riches tale, and McCarthy and Falcone (who also collaborated on the screenplay, along with Steve Mallory) wring this one for raunchy, R-rated guffaws and give it some crisp contemporary pops that seem deliberately, satirically timed and tuned for the Áge of Trump. But it's also a bit of a flopping mess, a hammy hodgepodge of crude jokes, awkward slapstick gags and sometimes mean-spirited, vulgar humor that just isn't funny.

As Michelle plots her comeback, she poaches Rachel's Dandelions scout troop to spin off her own group, Darwin's Darlings, and creates a bustling new enterprise—built on Claire's homemade brownies—to compete with the Dandelions' cookie sales.

Forget Batman v Superman. When it's Dandelions v Darlings, things get really ugly. If you ever wondered what a Quentin Tarantinoinspired, Kill Bill-esque tween cookie-brownie street brawl might look like, well, The Boss has it.

Peter Dinklage (from TV's Game of Thrones) gets chuckles as Michelle's spurned lover, now himself a preen-y mini-mogul obsessed with samurais. Saturday Night Live's Cecily Strong plays Claire's quirky supervisor at her depressing new office job. Kathy Bates has a scene as a wealthy mentor from Michelle's past.

There are underlying themes about family and belonging, about rebuilding and reconnecting, about trust and ethics. But mostly The Boss is about laughing—all the way to the bank.

### Vanilla Cupcake Flower Bouquet



#### **INGREDIENTS:**

2 large eggs

2/3 cup sugar

1 1/2 sticks unsalted butter (melted)

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

1/2 cup milk

1 1/2 cups flour 1/4 teaspoon salt

1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder

You'll also need: mini muffin pan/wrappers, favorite icing, piping bag, (affiliate) wilton 2D tip, flower pot, styrofoam ball that fits inside pot, toothpicks

#### **INSTRUCTIONS:**

Step 1: Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Line a mini muffin tin with 24 mini wrappers. Beat eggs, sugar, butter, vanilla and milk together until smooth. Add in flour, salt and baking powder. Mix until smooth, but don't over mix. Divide batter between the 24 mini wrappers. Bake for 10-15 minutes or until you insert a toothpick in the middle of a cupcake and it comes out clean. Allow to cool.

Step 2: Place the styrofoam ball in the pot.

Step 3: Working your way around the styrofoam ball, place toothpicks on the ball and add the mini cupcakes, staggering rows. Angle the toothpicks up, so the cupcakes will stay on. Step 4: Fill piping bags with your favorite frosting. Pipe a frosting rose on each cupcake using a wilton 2D tip. Hold the piping bag perpendicular to the cupcake. Starting on the outside, squeeze the piping bag and create a spiral until your reach the middle of the cupcake. See the video below for visual instruction.

Step 5: Once the cupcakes all have flowers on them, enjoy!









### Salt Dough Footprint Keepsakes

**INGREDIENTS:** 

1 cup salt 1 cup plain flour Half a cup of warm water

#### **INSTRUCTIONS:**

Mix together into a large bowl and knead it until smooth and stretchy. This last part is important otherwise the dough remains sticky and quite granular from the salt. If it is still too sticky add a bit more flour, if too dry and crumbly then add a tiny touch more water. A little bit of trial and error is all that is needed and it really is so easy! Once the dough was kneaded I divided it into equal parts use a shallow bowl that is big enough to accommodate the full length of your childs foot. Then squish one part into the bowl and flatten it around to the edges. Tease it away from the edges slightly and flip it out onto a plate. Put into the oven for 3 hours at around 200 degrees F. They need to be placed on baking parchment or greaseproof paper so that they don't stick. It needs to be on a very low heat for a length of time to thoroughly dry out and harden. If the oven is too hot they will rise and "cook". The thinner the dough and the lower the temperature, the better these will turn out! If they are still doughy in the centre after 3 hours then turn them over and put them back in for another 2 hours. If you want to hang yours on the wall then you need to add a hole with a straw before it goes in the oven. Paint with acrylic to finish.



# Airman swims into university's hall of fame

EGLIN AIR FORCE BASE, Fla. (AFNS) --(This feature is part of the 'Through Airmen's Eyes" series. These stories focus on individual Airmen, highlighting their Air Force story.)

For one 96th Test Wing Airman, the wild blue yonder isn't overhead but below and in front of his gaze as he stands on the starting block waiting for his signal. Upon the alert, he blasts off and pierces his calm blue horizon to begin a competitive swim.

Senior Airman Francisco Perez Castillo, a 96th Maintenance Group administrator, has been swimming since age 4. He joined his first swim team a year after that.

About 20 years later, Perez Castillo was inducted into the Pontifical Catholic University of Puerto Rico's sports hall of fame in December 2015 for his swimming accomplishments.

"It is a real honor and I am blessed that God gave me the talent to be successful in the sport I've loved and

Through those competitions, Perez Castillo racked up the medals and even broke a few records in his preferred swimming technique, the breaststroke. He said he knew by age 13 the breaststroke was his strongest technique and if he focused on it, he could reach the top levels.

Because of his abilities, he was selected for specialized sports during high school where he trained before and after his daily classes and eventually earned a

full scholarship to the Catholic university. Both he and his brother, who continued to swim and train together as they grew up, were part of the

university's swim team.

There, his focus was the 50, 100 and 200-meter breaststroke and the team relay events where he broke records and earned more than 30 medals. He was also selected as team captain.

"I believe breaststroke swimmers are born, not made. It takes a kind of physicality few people have," said Ralph Ramirez, his university swimming coach. "What made him excel at it was the amount of dedication and training he put in."

According to Ramirez, Perez Castillo didn't need much coaching, but the coach provided him help with staying focused and concentrating on his goals.

Throughout his swimming career, his training was extensive. During his high school and college years, he could be in the pool three to five hours per day, six days a week.

That effort and dedication to swimming was recognized when he and his brother were both inducted in their university's sports hall of



# Eglin pathology lab probes for answers

**GLIN AIR FORCE** BASE, Fla. (AFNS) -- On any day, the pathology and histology lab professionals at Eglin Air Force Base handle about 125 patient specimens from livers, prostates to tonsils.

They evaluate, prepare and transform tissue onto microscope slides studied by pathologists. These doctors study tissues to make a diagnosis or determine the stage of a disease. This is where patient tissue and organs from the base's hospital come to be studied.

"We get everything. Our purpose is to find out what happened," said Lt. Col. Rolando Ramos, medical director of pathology and laboratory services. "When doctors or surgeons remove tissue or body parts, we determine if the disease is malignant or benign, so clinicians or surgeons can apply proper treatment."

Before doctors can accomplish their research, histology lab technicians begin the detail-oriented process of sample verification and accessioning.

"It is extremely meticulous work," Ramos said. "We check and double check names, numbers with corresponding specimens to avoid risks. We kid that to work in this lab you almost have to have obsessive compulsive disorder."

For example, if two biopsies from the same woman -- Part A from the left breast and Part

B from the right -- are inadvertently switched, doctors may remove the wrong breast, Ramos noted.

The two-day complex process preserves and dehydrates the tissue to prepare it for a complete examination. The tissue is then cut and encased into numbered cassettes. The larger organs are examined by lab pathologists, and smaller samples like pieces of skin are handled by histology technicians.

The technicians then stabilize the tissue by pouring paraffin wax in the cassettes. Once each block of tissue hardens, it is sliced with a machine that looks like a miniature deli slicer. The thin ribbons of cut tissue are immediately soaked in water to ensure they don't break apart before technicians can scoop it with tweezers and place it on a submerged slide.

Lab technicians on base are experienced and well trained. Their tissue preparation work is essential, according to Maj. Michael McFall, a pathologist. Without them to process the tissue and make the glass slides, pathologists would be unable to examine the tissue under the microscope to make a diagnosis. Although they don't interact face to face with patients, their expertise is critical to treatment and to the patient's outcome.

"Doctors look for specific things, such as the size and shape of the cells. If we mishandle or cut the tissue the wrong way, we could miss something and

the pathologists won't see what they need under the microscope," said Airman 1st Class Emily Bodden, a histology lab technician. "You have to get it right the first time."

To learn this, Airmen attend a nine-month technical school and train daily to hone their skills. At the end of the school they test for a histology certification, according to Bodden.

The final products are small glass microscope slides with patient tissue the pathologists review under a high-powered microscope.

"Pathology is recognizing tissue patterns, seeing what is different from what is normal and figuring out how to classify it," McFall said. "The human body is complex and fascinating. To be able to see all of that and combine it with book knowledge and apply is the best part."

Pathologists and a transcriptionist input the findings in the patient's electronic file and notify primary physicians.

Eglin's pathology lab is manned by four pathologists, one contractor, five activeduty histology technicians and a transcriptionist. Lab personnel are on call every day to respond to emergencies or process early morning specimens for clinicians.

"I like knowing what I do helps someone," Bodden said. "It's very interesting work and the doctors here are great at educating and exposing us to unusual samples when they can."

Even though he doesn't compete regularly, he can't give up that fitness routine he's had for three-fourths of his life. It's now a part of

an hour and a half. He still completes breaststroke laps and swims at a competitive


More than two and a half years into his enlistment, Perez Castillo compared his military life to that of a student athlete.




participants will receive their mobility folder and other deployment items on the day of the event.



# McGuire hosts rapid response training with FEMA

OINT BASE MCGUIRE-DIX-LAKEHURST, N.J. (AFNS) --The 305th Aerial Port Squadron welcomed members of the Federal **Emergency Management** Agency's Pennsylvania Task Force 1 to Joint Base McGuire-Dix-Lakehurst for rapid air mobilization training April 21, as part of an ongoing partnership initiative.

FEMA are the nation's experts in rapid response in case of humanitarian crises and to maintain their qualifications in air transport, they reached out to base officials for training.

"You can talk to people on the phone, but when you get boots on the ground and you're lifting boxes

with them and you're working side by side, that really helps substantiate the relationship," said FEMA Lt. Ken Pagurek, the Pennsylvania Task Force 1 program manager. "Our cargo being packaged correctly and labeled correctly with the proper paperwork is a very important requirement. By working together, it's more easily achieved."

The training was a culmination of nearly two years of collaboration between the agencies and consisted of both lecture and practical application, all geared toward optimizing FEMA's ability to rapidly deploy in case of a natural disaster requiring airlift.

"It's like playing Tetris with big, odd shaped cargo," said Staff Sgt. Amanda

Cave, the 305th APS training instructor. "We're taking their equipment and getting them ready for rapid global mobility, showing them how to place it on the pallet so they can get where they need to go in a timely manner."

FEMA responds to natural disasters like Hurricanes Sandy and Ike, as well as earthquakes like the one that devastated Haiti in 2010. Mobile teams consisting of approximately 80 personnel, trained in search and rescue, extraction and triage care, as well as relief workers deploy to aid affected communities. The joint base is Pennsylvania Task Force 1's point of departure should they need to be airlifted.

"They have a six-hour window to get here, build their cargo up, get it joint inspected and on a plane

out of here," Cave said. "So hopefully, we've given them the tools they need to do that, if it were to ever happen."

During the training, instructors from the 305th APS and members of the task force's mobile search and rescue team went through the process from notification to departure. They discussed previous scenarios, paperwork and cargo requirements. Finally, together they built a pallet with required cargo based on aircraft specifications.

"An event like this helps us identify deficiencies that either they or we didn't think of, and then we can go back, put them down on paper and formulate a plan and move forward so that when there is a national crisis, we can execute as efficiently as

possible," Pagurek said.

"We identified some issues today -- getting onto the base was a bit of an issue for us, but if we didn't do this event, we never would have identified that," he continued. "We've already put the wheels in motion to resolve that."

According to training team members, both instructors and students gained something from the training.

"Some of them are retired military, who work as police officers, EMTs or firefighters, and also work for FEMA," Cave said. "They have to go somewhere at the drop of a dime and help people get through some devastating situations. I was just like 'wow.' I only hope that when I get to the point of retirement, that I'm as willing to help people."






iMagicon 2016
