Growing up, my father always taught me the importance of conducting a thorough safety check on your vehicle prior to a trip. He taught me to check all the fluids, lights, tire pressures, brakes, and the condition of all belts and hoses.

Last summer while traveling with my family on another "Adventure Club" road trip we drove during the day, making frequent stops "sight seeing" along the way, of course always looking for old cars and trucks. We used all the safety rules that we stress to others: We got plenty of sleep the night prior to traveling and I as the primary driver was ready to take a break if I needed to, even if this delayed our return home and increased the cost of the trip.

As we were traveling from state to state I took notice of the changes in road signs, road surfaces and the occasional appearance of emergency vehicles. When we were coming through Wyoming we saw a car in the ditch that had evidently rolled over. The state patrol was already on site.

Thinking about what might have caused their accident prompted me to think about how I was driving. If you can identify the


cause of the accident you can adjust your driving to avoid the same fate.

We also noticed other signs along the road and considered what we could learn from them. As we traveled a mere 700 miles, we noticed cores of crosses and wreathes on the side of the road, memorials to people that lost their life on that particular spot on that stretch of road. At one place there was a group of seven crosses, was this a whole family that was lost? Discussing this with my wife, we came up with no real answers, only a lesson learned, traveling on the road is serious business, and lives can be lost.

Be prepared when you head out on the roadways, do the "Vehicle Check," plan for emergencies and delays, look for visual indicators of problem areas and come home safely. Don't make someone put up a cross for you, but rather have a safe and enjoyable road trip!



Medora Vacation Ideas

Medora is located in the Badlands of North Dakota. Plan a vacation to this historical town and enjoy the beautiful scenery it has to offer. Theodore Roosevelt National Park is an outdoor enthusiasts dream offering amazing bike and hiking trails, camping and relaxation.

The Medora Musical

The Medora Musical is the rootin'-tootinest, boot-scootinest show in all the west! There's no other show quite like it.

Set in the outdoor splendor of the rugged North Dakota Badlands, this professionally produced, high energy, western-style musical show is proudly dedicated to the legacy of America's 26th President, Theodore Roosevelt, and the time he spent here in the Badlands of the Dakota Territory.

Bully Pulpit Golf Course

Some courses impose themselves on the landscape, but at Bully Pulpit Golf Course you'll find yourself climbing through meadows and woodlands and meandering along the Little Missouri River, fully immersed in the beauty of the landscape all around you!

The kids can have a blast on our massive Inflatable Water Slide, catch some air on the bungee jump, scale a kid-friendly rock wall, or soak each other in Water Wars -- a water balloon sling shot stand off!





The museum tells a rich and varied story of region's aviation history. In addition to a replica of the Wright Flyer, the museum displays military and civilian aircraft from 1903 through the present. There are exhibits, narratives, kiosks, military uniforms, aviation items, memorabilia, paintings, photographs and a gift shop.

Railroad Museum of Minot

Minot, ND | 19 1st St NE | 701-852-7091

This museum is dedicated to the railroad history and culture that established many of the state's cities. Displays and artifacts trace the vital impact of the railroads on the communities and the way of life the railroads provided for many individuals. The museum focuses on the time period from 1886 to present and has many hands on displays and information for visitors for all ages.

Old Soo Transportation Museum

Minot, ND | 15 North Main Street | 701-852-2234

The museum focuses on the history of transportation in the American West including railroads, automobiles, buses and aviation. Permanent exhibits include BNSF, Amtrak, Great Northern Railway, Milwaukee Road, Northern Pacific Railway, Soo Line/ Canadian Pacific, Railway Express Agency and Westland Oil Company.

Prairie Village Museum

Rugby, ND | 102 US-2 | 701-776-6414

This museum at the Geographical Center of North America features 23 historic buildings and six exhibition halls arranged around a quaint village square. The museum's expansive collection includes everything from Native American powwow dresses to antique cars and farm machinery, to a real iron lung.

Chateau de Mores Historic Site

Medora, ND | 3426 Chateau Rd | 701-623-4355

A 26-room, 1883 hunting lodge built by the Marquis de Mores, an entrepreneurial French aristocrat who hoped to find his fortune in the Dakota Territory, overlooks Medora. His meatpacking business failed, but the town he named for his wife, Medora, prospered. The lavish home where he and his wife lived still contains many original furnishings. Eager docents stationed throughout Chateau de Mores State Historic Site offer insights and tours.

North Dakota Heritage Center

Bismarck, ND | 612 E Boulevard Ave | 701-328-2666

New galleries almost doubled the size of the North Dakota Heritage Center in Bismarck. Explore the dinosaur age, native tribes and modern cultural issues. Exhibits in the Treehouse, scheduled to open in 2015, will cater to tykes.

Fort Union Trading Post

Williston, ND | 15550 ND-1804 | 701-572-9083

Now reconstructed, Fort Union was the most important furtrading site on the upper Missouri from 1828 to 1867. A selfguided tour, ranger-guided tours and living history programs are available for visitors.

Lake Region Heritage Center

Devil's Lake, ND | 6502 4th St NE | 701-662-3701

The Lake Region Heritage Center, Inc. is located in the old post office in downtown Devils Lake. The former three story federal building is now home to a vast collection of displays that tell the history of the Lake Region. The museum also hosts artist displays and historical presentations throughout the year.

Fort Totten State Historic Site

Fort Totten, ND | 417 Cavalry Cir | 701-766-4441

The Fort Totten State Historic Site got its start in 1867 when soldiers built a log structure that in no time was enlarged and expanded to include dozens of buildings. There is a lot more history to explore.

National Buffalo Museum

Jamestown, ND | 500 17th St SE | 701-252-8648

Seeing one albino bison in a lifetime puts you among a lucky few. Find three of them—in one place—and you must be in North Dakota. The National Buffalo Museum has long been known for its albino cow White Cloud, a sacred animal in many Native American cultures.

Fort Seward Military Post

Jamestown, ND | 605 10th St SW | 701-252-6682

An active military fort from 1872-1877, Fort Seward now houses an interpretive center displaying artifacts excavated from the site's archaeological digs. The grounds are also home to a Veterans' Memorial and scenic views of the James River Valley. Also, the largest United States flag on display in North Dakota flies here when weather permits.

Knife River Indian Villages

Stanton, ND | 564 County Rd 37 | 701-745-3309

Explore a reconstructed, furnished Hidatsa earth lodge, 15 miles of trails and a museum. A rich culture thrived along the banks of the Missouri River in west-central North Dakota when Meriwether Lewis and William Clark arrived in 1804. Today, trails weave through the sage and wildflower-dappled prairie to the remains of villages, including one where Sakakawea lived before she joined Lewis and Clark.

Bonanzaville USA

West Fargo, ND | 1351 Main Ave W | 701-282-2822

Interpreters and 40 buildings on 12 acres re-create life when "bonanza" farms ruled the prairies in the late 1800s. Bonanzaville USA includes just about every type of building and business that might have made up a small North Dakota town when the area was being settled.

Lewis & Clark Interpretive Center & Fort Mandan Historic Site


Ronald Reagan Minuteman Missile State Historic Site

The Ronald Reagan Minuteman Missile State Historic Site consists of two sites telling the story of the Cold War years in North Dakota; Oscar-Zero Missile Alert Facility and the November-33 Launch Facility. They are the last remnants of the 321st Missile Wing, a cluster of intercontinental ballistic missile launch sites that were spread over a 6,500-square-mile area around the Grand Forks Air Force Base. Both played an integral part in the Cold War in North Dakota and the world.



Kenmare, Upham and Foxholm, ND

While waterfowl, pelicans, tundra swans, grouse and cranes are spectacular, a variety of other species of interest may be found. Birders come from all over the country looking for Sprague's Pipits, and Baird's and Le Conte's sparrows.

Audubon National Wildlife Refuge

Coleharbor, ND

Bird checklist includes 239 birds. 95 of these species nest on the Refuge. $\,$

Sully's Hill National Game Preserve

Devils Lake, ND

The preserve's wooded hills are attractive to birds not normally seen in the open areas of the state.

Lake Metigoshe State Park

Turtle Mountains - Bottineau, ND

A summer breeding haven for many species of birds and migrating stopover for others.

Theodore Roosevelt National Park

Medora, ND

This list includes 186 species which have been observed in Theodore Roosevelt National Park plus 22 species that have not yet been observed but are suspected of occurring since they have been seen in the immediate area.

Des Lacs Scenic Backway

Found in the northwest corner of North Dakota, this backway provides excellent opportunities to view the rolling hills and wooded draws of the Des Lacs Valley. The most striking experience is the excellent wildlife viewing opportunities found at the refuge. Over 250 species of birds, deer, moose, and other wildlife are all seen along this route.

Points of Interest

- Historic Danish Mill: Built in 1902 on a homestead, the Mill was used by area farmers for grinding grains into flour. Now located in the center of the Park on the Square in Kenmare.
- Des Lacs National Wildlife Refuge Visitor Center: The visitor center at Des Lacs National Wildlife Refuge Headquarters features displays of local history and native wildlife.
- Munch's Coulee National Recreation Trail: From this trail, excellent bird watching opportunities abound.

Sakakawea Scenic Byway

This byway highlights fantastic views of the Missouri River Valley along with some of the state's most outstanding Lewis and Clark destinations. Visitors are able to follow the course of this great journey and discover the history and culture of the people who lived in the rolling hills and wooded valleys of the Missouri and Knife Rivers.

Points of Interest


- Fort Clark State Historic Site: protects the archeological remains of a large earth lodge village, cemetery, two fur trade posts, and was the scene of devastating smallpox and cholera epidemics that decimated most of the inhabitants of a Mandan and later an Arikara Indian village.
- Fort Mandan Historic Site: The reconstructed Fort Mandan rests in the riparian forests of the Missouri River and features refurnished rooms filled with the equipage of the Lewis & Clark Expedition. Onsite interpreters provide programs and year-round tours of Lewis & Clark's 1804-1805 wintering post.

Enchanted Highway


The Enchanted Highway is a great summer diversion located just off Interstate 94 (Exit 72) approximately 20 miles east of Dickinson, ND. Here you will find six sculptures that are spread out along the 32 miles. The works of art are created by Gary Greff, a native of Regent, North Dakota.

Points of Interest

- The Tin Family: The Family includes a 45' tall Tin Man, 44' tall Tin Lady and a 23' tall Tin Boy.
- Grasshoppers in the Field: The 40' tall and 50' long main grasshopper is flanked by smaller grasshoppers in the 12' tall to 24' long range.
- Pheasants on the Prairie: The colorful rooster stands 40' tall and 70' long. To the east stand a 35' x 60' hen and three chicks.
- Teddy Roosevelt Rides Again: The silhouette of President Theodore Roosevelt on horseback rises 51' above the prairie bluff where it stands.
- Geese in Flight: Features a flock of geese flying across the golden setting sun above the buttes.
- The Deer Family: A giant buck, 75' tall and 60' long, jumps the fence on the Enchanted Highway. A doe, standing 50' tall and 50' long, stands alongside.
- Regent, ND: Enjoy the Enchanted Highway Gift Shop, the Hettinger County Historical Museum, local craft shops, and the many other attractions in the community. Visit the Enchanted Castle, a school that was renovated and is now a hotel.

International Peace Garden

Since 1932, nestled in the Turtle Mountains of North Dakota and Manitoba, the International Peace Garden is one of the continent's most symbolic and scenic attractions. Thousands of tourists flock to this unique tribute to peace and friendship between the United States of America and Canada.

The park plants over 150,000 flowers each year. Main features of the garden include an 18-foot floral clock display, fountains, a chime, and twin 120-foot concrete towers straddling the border with a peace chapel at their base. The Arma Sifton bells were a gift from Central United Church of Brandon, Manitoba, in 1972. The tower was supplied by North Dakota Veterans and dedicated in 1976. Some building remains of the World Trade Center attacks of September 11, 2001, have been placed in part of the garden.

The International Peace Garden, "Like No Other Place on Earth," is a perfect and memorable retreat, where people and nature meet.

Rainbow Garden & Sculpture Walk

Mayville, ND | 367 3rd St SW (HWY 200)

Rainbow Garden has seven plots, each demonstrating a different theme. Their goal is that the variety in the gardens gives visitors ideas for their own yards.

The seven gardens are The English Garden, The White Garden, The Cottage Garden, The Rock Garden, The Children's Garden, The Herb Garden, and The Labyrinth.

Since they have become fairly competent at the craft of gardening, they have graduated to the art of design by concentrating on color, texture, shape and arrangement.

They are building a collection of commissioned sculptures from artists around the nation. Currently there are 15 sculptures and poems in the Sculpture Walk.

Northern Plains Botanic Garden

Open throughout the year from sunrise until sunset and free to the public, the Botanic Garden is an incredible destination for those in the entire region. It consists of 7 separate gardens including the Woodland Garden, Alerus Financial Butterfly Garden, Chrysanthemum Test Garden, Alphabet Garden, Rain Garden, The Turnaround Garden, Seeds of Opportunity Garden and a humming bird patio. The next project slated is the development of the Garden of Mind which is a Japanese-style garden.



Upper Souris National Wildlife Refuge

Carpio, ND | 30 Miles NW of Minot | 701-468-5467

Upper Souris NWR lies in the beautiful Souris River Valley of northwestern North Dakota and extends for nearly 35 miles along the Souris River corridor. This 32,092-acre Refuge, managed by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, is an important unit in a series of national wildlife refuges in the great waterfowl migration corridor known as the Central Flyway.

Interpretive exhibits and a book sales outlet at the Office/Visitor Center allow visitors to learn more about the Refuge and its management. The Refuge offers so many opportunities to get out and enjoy some fresh air. Some of these activities include hiking, canoeing, fishing, hunting, observing wildlife and photography. Stop by the visitors center at Refuge Headquarters if you are interested in checking out a backpack to explore.

There are "Connecting People with Nature - Let's Go Outside" backpacks that will assist little explorers in their adventures. Each backpack includes a pair of binoculars, a bug jar, petri dishes, dip net, magnifying glass, thermometer/compass, weather window, butterfly net, fly eye kaleidoscope, forceps, field guides, writing tools and an activity journal.

Sully's Hill National Game Preserve

St. Michael, ND| SE of Devils Lake | 701-766-4272

Sullys Hill National Game Preserve is a 1,674-acre national wildlife refuge sitting on the south shores of Devils Lake, about 10 miles south of Devils Lake, North Dakota. The refuge was first established on April 27, 1904, as a national park, but was later transferred to the Department of Agriculture in 1921 and designated as a big game preserve, refuge and breeding ground

for wild animals and migratory birds. The Preserve supports a unique community of habitats such as an oak, ash, basswood, and aspen woodland; and mixed-grass prairie, interspersed with some natural and created wetlands.

Des Lacs National Wildlife Refuge

Kenmare, ND| County Rd 1A | 701-385-4046

Des Lacs National Wildlife Refuge is found in a 28-mile long river valley with three natural lakes. The northern boundary of the Refuge is at the Canadian border. The Refuge was established during the Dust Bowl era of the 1930s. The original Refuge facilities were constructed by the Civilian Conservation Corps to benefit waterfowl production and protection. Des Lacs NWR is well known for spectacular snow goose populations of 200,000 to 300,000 geese in the fall. The local community of Kenmare hosts the annual "Goosefest" in October to celebrate the fall migration.

Lostwood National Wildlife Refuge

Kenmare, ND| 8315 ND-8 | 701-848-2722

Lostwood National Wildlife Refuge (NWR) lies in the heart of the Missouri Coteau region, an ancient glacial moraine area. Topography ranges from rolling to steep hills and is covered by mixed-grass prairie. The area is dotted with wetlands that are often called "potholes." At 26,904 acres, the Refuge contains a 5,577-acre Wilderness Area established in 1975. Lostwood National Wildlife Refuge provides cover, food, and nesting territory for many species of waterfowl. Refuge managers and staff focus their efforts to meet the needs of waterfowl as well as other migratory species.



Located 30 miles NW of Minot, the Upper Souris National

Wildlife Refuge has five nature trails for walking and hiking, two canoe trails and one auto tour route.

Oxbow Nature Trail: Your walk along this trail will take you

on either a ½ mile or 1 mile journey through prime river bottom habitat of the Souris River. This trail is hard-surfaced and benches are available along the route. Interpretive signs are provided to increase your enjoyment of this area.

Overlook Nature Trail: This mowed grass trail winds over the prairie grass-covered hills where a spectacular panoramic view of the Souris River valley will unfold before you. Benches are available.

Pelican Nature Trail: This trail offers a ½ mile interpretive hike to the Pool A Spillway. You are welcome to use the photo blind at the end of the trail to "hide" and let the wildlife come to you.

Cottonwood Nature Trail: This trail is named for the large number of cottonwood trees planted in the late 1930's by the Civilian Conservation Corp. It consists of two mowed grass loops. The first loop is ½ mile long and features a scenic overlook with a bench. The second loop is 1 mile long and continues from the overlook area west through the coulee and around the surrounding ridges.

Centennial Wildlife Nature Trail: Located at the north end of Renville County Memorial Park, this mowed grass trail meanders through bottomland grasslands. The trail length will depend upon how wet the meadows are, but it will be from 2 to 2½ miles round-trip.

Bison Plant Trail

This is Minot's little jewel, located a few miles east of Minot off of Highway 52. The 3.5 mile trail is now entirely comprised of single track trail looping through a beautiful stash of city owned wooded land. It offers excellent shade and varies from fast hard pack dirt cruising sections to tight technical sections. Its location just outside of town makes it a great place to go pump out a couple laps after work. There is also a shorter variation of the trail (2.1 miles) used for running. All trails are well maintained.

Black Butte Adventures Trail

Located near Sawyer, this is a beautiful ride that traverses pasture land above the river and climbs over Black Butte. The trail is a tight single track with occasional rock technical sections, and one muddy water crossing. The main loop is about 5 miles and there is a secondary 3 mile loop across the cattle guard in the southwest. This trail is entirely on private property so please take care of it and consider making donations at the trail head toward its upkeep. The trails also cross active pasture land so treat the cattle and horses with respect.

Burlington Walking Path

The Burlington Walking Path is a paved trail through rural, rolling countryside that connects the cities of Minot and Burlington in north-central North Dakota. It parallels County Road 15 for most of its length, which becomes 4th Avenue as the trail approaches Minot. On this eastern end of the trail, it is known as the 4th Avenue Trail.

From the trail's end in Minot, you could continue east on the sidewalk along 4th Avenue for another mile to reach Oak Park. At 90 acres, it's one of the city's largest parks; here, you'll find restrooms, picnic shelters, walking paths, and many bur oaks for which the park is named.

Maah Daah Hey Trail

Located in the Theodore Roosevelt National Park, the Maah Daah Hey Trail is a 120-mile non-motorized trail open for biking, hiking and horseback riding. The trail begins at Sully Creek State Park approximately five miles south of historic Medora and meanders north through the south and north units of Theodore Roosevelt National Park. Biking within TRNP is not allowed; bikers should use Buffalo Gap Trail.

Tatman Branch Trail

The Tatman Branch Trail follows a spur of the Great Northern Railroad, the construction of which lead to the 1886 founding of nearby Minot. The transcontinental railroad, now part of the BNSF Railway, ran from St. Paul, Minnesota to Seattle, Washington.

The trail begins on the outskirts of Minot and travels north for 10 miles along the former Tatman Branch Line right-of-way, named for the Tatman township and constructed in 1957 to serve the Minot Air Force Base. The line was abandoned by BNSF in 1997, when it was purchased by Ward County. It remains unimproved with a gravel surface, but is open to the public. The path parallels 27th Street NE for most of its length, offering a straight, flat route through the countryside that ends at Minot Gate, the main entrance to the military base.

Lake Metigoshe State Park

Old Oak Trail: This is North Dakota's first National Recreation Trail. Built by the Youth Conservation Corps in 1974, it was dedicated by Governor Arthur Link in 1976. This self-guided interpretive trail is approximately three miles in length and takes about two hours to hike. Interpretive brochures are available at the trailhead or at the park office.

Multi-Use Trails: These consist of four loops totalling a distance of approximately 8.5 miles. These trails are open to hiking, mountain biking, cross-country skiing and snowshoeing. Users should

keep an eye out for a variety of wildlife, including moose, whitetailed deer, ruffed grouse and loons as these trails run through aspen forests and across wetlands.

Long Distance Biking Routes

With its low traffic and excellent country roads, North Dakota is great for cross-country bike trips. For particularly scenic treks, check out North Dakota's designated scenic byways and backways on the N.D. State Highway Map. Before riding, check at area Chamber of Commerce offices, state and federal parks, state and federal Forest Service offices and local bike shops for their recommendations on the best routes.

Theodore Roosevelt National Park

Whether you're an avid camper, a hiking expert or just love beautiful scenery, there is something for everyone to enjoy at Theodore Roosevelt National Park. The park spans a total of 70,447 acres and is open year-round, although some trails and facilities are only open seasonally.

The North Unit Visitor Center is open daily April to mid-October and Friday, Saturday and Sunday through the rest of the year. Be sure to drive the 14-mile Scenic Drive that leads in from the entrance of the park to Oxbow Overlook..

The South Unit Visitor Center is located at the park entrance in Medora, North Dakota. It has an info desk, museum, movie and offers plenty of opportunities to learn about Theodore Roosevelt and his experience in the badlands. A major feature of the South Unit is the paved, 26-mile Scenic Loop Drive with interpretive stops that illustrate the parks history and natural features.

Fees for private vehicles are \$10, individuals (including horse-back and bicycle) are \$5 and \$20 gets you an Annual Park Pass. Camping fees are \$10 per day and \$20 per day for group camping.

Over 100 miles of trail make it a first-class hiking park, although because prairie and grasslands mostly surround the park, water and shade are limited along trails. Some are short self-guided trails while other trails span the length of the park.

Beaver Lake State Park

Located on the west shore of Beaver Lake, the park's gently rolling prairie provides scenic views for leisurely walks. In the summer, the lake attracts visitors for boating, canoeing, water skiing and fishing. Camping, picnicking and water-based activities available from mid-May through the end of September.

Located along 7 miles of the last free-flowing, undeveloped stretches of the Missouri River, North Dakota's Cross Ranch Centennial State Park is rich in cultural and natural history.

Fort Lincoln State Park

Rich in both military and early Native American history, Fort Abraham Lincoln was once an important infantry and calvary post. Portions of the military post, including the Custer House, have been reconstructed.

Fort Ransom State Park

The park, nestled in the picturesque and heavily-wooded Sheyenne River Valley, is managed as a natural and scenic area, and is located on one of North Dakota's officially designated Scenic Byways and Backways.

Fort Stevenson State Park

On the north shore of giant Lake Sakakawea, 3 miles south of Garrison, Ft. Stevenson State Park is known as the walleye capital of North Dakota. Visitors will find a modern campground, sleeping cabins, visitor center, interpretive trails and prairie dog town, as well as boat launching facilities.

Grahams Island State Park

The lake features some of the best fishing in North Dakota, both summer and winter. Amenities at Grahams Island State Park include a boat ramp, bait shop, modern and primitive camping facilities and camping cabins.

Icelandic State Park

Located on the north shore of Lake Renwick, Icelandic State Park offers visitors a wide array of recreational opportunities and glimpses of North Dakota's homesteading heritage.

Lake Sakakawea State Park

Located on the south shore of Lake Sakakawea, adjacent to Garrison Dam, Lake Sakakawea State Park offers a wide range of water based recreational activities and facilities. The park has a full service marina, including convenience store, fishing guide services and boat and camper storage.

Lake Metigoshe State Park

Nestled in the scenic Turtle Mountains on the shores of Lake Metigoshe, Lake Metigoshe State Park was constructed by the Works Progress Administration in the 1930s and is one of the most popular year-round vacation spots in North Dakota.

Lewis and Clark State Park

Lewis and Clark State Park is situated on one of the upper bays of Lake Sakakawea. The rugged buttes of the North Dakota Badlands display a towering backdrop to one of the state's best recreation areas.

Little Missouri State Park

Some of the most picturesque Badlands scenery can be found at Little Missouri State Park. Most of this primitive park is accessible only on foot or horseback. Electrical hookups are available to campers, however, all other facilities are primitive.

Sully Creek State Park

Located in the heart of the North Dakota badlands, Sully Creek is just minutes away from the historic town of Medora and Theodore Roosevelt National Park. Corrals are available for those bringing in their own horses.

Turtle River State Park

Situated on the meandering Turtle River, Turtle River State Park is located in a beautiful wooded valley. Constructed in the 1930s by the Civilian Conservation Corps, the park offers year-round recreational activities, including camping, picnicking, fishing and trails for hiking, mountain biking and cross country skiing.

Downstream Campground

Downstream Campground is located on the east bank of the Missouri River below Garrison Dam, which forms Lake Sakakawea. The area offers a wide variety of recreational activities, including boating, fishing and hunting.





A popular summer activity for all ages, both canoeing & kayaking bring together physical activity and exploration into one exciting adventure. Here are a few local places to hit up this summer.

Souris River

- Beaver Lodge Canoe Trail (6 miles round trip) 3 to 5 hours. Canoeists must canoe both upstream and downstream on the same route, since there is only one access. The trail extends downstream to a dam and water control structure, where you must return to the put-in point. Hazards - Several short portages.
- 2.5-Mile Trail (5 miles round trip), 3 to 6 hours. Begin at Renville County Memorial and canoe upstream to refuge boundary and back. Fishing is allowed.
- J.Clark Salyer National Wildlife Refuge Flows north into Canada. A 5½ mile route (2 to 3 hours) or a 13 mile route (5 to 7 hours) can be taken. The trail is well marked. Hazards - Log jams, strong current. Not recommended for novices or for children.

Missouri River

- Garrison Dam to UPA Boat Ramp Near Stanton 4 to 6 hours. This is a very scenic stretch of the river, with beautiful river bluffs near waters edge, but very undeveloped. Hazards - Underwater deadfall, sandbars, swift current.
- Washburn City Park to Cross Ranch State Park 2 to 4 hours or Fort Mandan Historic Site to Cross Ranch State Park - 3 to 5 hours. Hazards - Underwater deadfall, sandbars, swift current.
- Cross Ranch State Park to Steckel Boat Ramp 1 to 2 hours or to Burnt Boat ramp - 5.5 miles, 2 hours. Hazards - Underwater deadfall, sandbars, swift current.

Swimmina

For a fun way to beat the heat this summer, splash around in one of the local pools or head to the nearest splash pad or water park! Swimming is an excellent form of exercise and is fun for all ages!

Minot Air Force Base Pools

Aquatics are a large part of Outdoor Recreation in both the winter and summer. There is an indoor pool located in the Fitness Center mainly for lap swimmers and an outdoor pool with a baby pool and water slide.

Roosevelt Park Pool

The Roosevelt Park Pool is one the best places to cool off and have fun in Minot. The pool features a waterslide, a wading pool, and a recently finished expansion of the locker room facilities. Located in Roosevelt Park.

Minot Family YMCA



Registered OHVs literally have thousands of miles of riding opportunities in North Dakota. An off-highway vehicle is any wheeled motorized vehicle not designed for use on a highway and capable of cross-country travel on land, snow, ice, marsh, swampland, or other natural terrain.

Riding is allowed on:

- A paved highway posted with a speed limit not exceeding 55 miles per hour.
- A licensed driver over 16 years of age may operate a registered Class III OHV on a paved highway designated and posted at a speed not exceeding 65 miles per hour.
- The highway right of way, bottom of the ditch or along the outslope. It is illegal to operate on the shoulder or inside slope.
 - A gravel, dirt, or loose surface roadway.

Riding is NOT allowed on:

- Controlled access highways/interstates
- Posted or restricted public/private property that is regulated by local ordinances
- State Parks, State Recreation Areas, Historic Sites or Wildlife Protection and Management Areas
 - Tree nursery or planting areas
 - Railroad right of ways
 - Motorized trails designed and leased for snowmobiles

Public lands open to OHV riding:

- Pembina Gorge Pembina Gorge trails will be open to OHV recreation starting Memorial Day weekend.
- St. John's OHV Park —Located NW of Rolla in the town of St. John
- Little Missouri National Grasslands —Riders will find several hundred miles of riding opportunities. OHVs must stay on established roads and trails.
- Roughrider OHV Trail—A 16-mile trail managed by the North Dakota Parks and Recreation Department. The trail is located 30 miles south of Mandan on Highway 1806; it begins at the Fort Rice Campground, travels north on an old railroad bed, and ends at Little Heart Bottoms.
- Kimball Bottoms Recreation Area Also known as, The Desert, this 400-acre play area is managed by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and is located 8 miles south of Bismarck, ND.



- · Lake Korslein: 5 miles west, 3 miles north, .5 miles east of the junction of U.S. Highway 83 and ND Highway 23. New perch lake, first stocked in 2014.
- Makoti Lake: 6 miles south of Makoti. Good number of 24- to 28-inch northern pike.
- North Carlson Lake: 10 miles east of Ryder. Good number of pike, making it a good place to take a kid fishing.
- Rice Lake: 4 miles north, 7 miles east, 2 miles north of Ryder. Winterkilled in 2011, but pike and perch coming back nicely.
- South Carlson Lake: 10 miles east of Ryder. Good fishing in recent years for mostly smaller pike.
- State Fair Pond: North end of state fair grounds. Small pond stocked annually with trout and panfish.
- Velva Sportsmen's Pond: 7 miles south, 1.5 miles west, 1 mile south, .5 miles west of Velva.


