Fire Up The Grill!

MINOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. -- Summer is officially here. Outdoor activities are already starting to happen due to the warmer weather. It's time once again to start thinking and practicing grilling safety. Below are some important safety tips and tools to ensure safe practices when grilling. Pick a safe area -Position the grill in a

well-ventilated, flat, level surface away from overhangs, deck railings and shrubbery. Keep children and pets away from the grill when in use.

Handle charcoal carefully

- Never add lighter fluid directly to hot coals since flames could travel up the fluid stream. Instead, place several new briquettes in a metal can and apply lighter fluid. Transfer the briquettes into the pyramid in the grill with pair of long-handled tongs and light with a match. Use proper utensils for safe handling of food and coals.

Putting out the fire -Place the cover on the grill, close the vents and allow the coals to burn out completely. Let ashes cool for at least 48 hours, and dispose in a noncombustible container.

When using a gas grill, remember to allow it to completely cool before placing the cover over it. Before placing food on grilling surface, preheat the grill. Remove charred food debris to reduce exposure to possible cancer-causing substances formed during high-heat cooking. Avoid fire flare-ups

by using lean meats and trimming away all visible fat. Raise the rack to the highest position away from the heat and keep food on one side of the grill and coals or other heat source on the other side.

When barbecuing for

family or friends, give careful consideration to where the grill will be placed. Make sure children and pets a place to play. Also, don't cook under any paper decorations. The best way to enjoy your summer outdoor grilling is to take the necessary steps to prevent accidents, which includes maintaining and using your grill

safely.

The team's next project includes working with the Air Force Institute of Technology to allow visualization specialists across the intelligence community to use and share 3-D models, textures and other animation elements.




791ST TRAIN LIKE YOU FIGHT

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The Real Ghost Busters

Husband and wife partners fight 1970s demons across the pond

eating the much-bal-Blyhooed new Ghostbusters to the screen by several weeks, director James Wan shakes things up with a spook-fest of another kind—the second serving of his Conjuring series, based on the case files of real-life paranormal investigators Ed and Lorraine Warren, who claimed to have investigated more than 10,000 incidents since the 1950s.

This time, fresh off the 1970s investigation that became New York's "Amityville Horror," the Warrens are summoned across the pond to a working-class London borough, where a single mother and her four young children are being tormented by what seem to be malicious spirits.

Oh, yeah!

Patrick Wilson and Vera Farmiga once again portray the Warrens, a couple whose individual childhood brushes with the supernatural eventually led them to each other, into a paranormal partnership and marriage. The movie's soft little subplot about their strong bond, scored to the recurring Elvis hit "Can't Help Falling in Love" (which Wilson even gets to sing as a serenade, with a guitar!), is a dollop of pure sweetness frames the Enfield hauntin the carnival of creepiness. Young Madison Wolfe, 11, who plays the Janet, the "possessed" young-est daughter of the British family, may look like a greenhorn, but you've likely already seen her if you watch TV, on Zoo, Scream, The Astronaut Wives Club or True Detective, or in the movies The Campaign, Trumbo or Joy. She's terrific as the bedevilments in her home send her flying into the air, crashing into walls, teleporting from room to room and taking control of her voice, personality and body. Wan, who also directed the original Saw and Insidious, certainly knows his way around a haunted

house. He never overdoes the cheap thrills or gotchas, and he gets genuine jolts out of some truly nightmarish images-particularly a demonic nun and the "crooked man" from the old nursery rhyme. But he also has fun with bone-chilling scares he builds around mundane, everyday objects, like a blinking, bleeping toy fire truck, a bedroom poster of smiling actor-singer David Soul and a TV remote that won't stay where it's put.

The movie will probably feel a bit familiar, at times, to anyone who's seen The Exorcist, it could stand to be trimmed by at least 20-25 minutes, and someone should have told the music department that just because a movie is set in England, you don't have to use songs by the Bee Gees, the Hollies and the Clash if they don't really fit.

As the Warrens wrestle with demons, they also wrangle with questions of belief and doubt, skepticism and proof. "Your visions are a gift from God," Ed reassures Lorriane, who worries that her trance-like visits to the "dark side" have shown her too much, especially about what might become her own future. The movie ings, which actually took place over a two-year period, in a Christmas setting, with prominent decorations on display and weirdly dissonant versions of familiar carols signaling that something unholy is afoot. In one scene, a freaked-out Lorraine stabs and shreds pages of her Bible with an ink pen. If you're easily spooked, The Conjuring 2 may not be the most relaxing way to spend your popcorn dollar. On the other hand, if you like getting the good, oldfashioned hell scared out of you, then step right up for a retro terror trip to re-live another harrowing, reallife event from the annals of America's original ghost busters.



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Camping Mac N' Cheese



INGREDIENTS

1 1/2 cups elbow macaroni

- 8 oz prepared Alfredo sauce {just over half a jar} 1/2 cup grated sharp cheddar cheese
- 1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese
- 1/4 cup mozzarella cheese
- 1/4-1/2 cup half and half or whole milk
- Salt and pepper, to taste

INSTRUCTIONS:

Cook pasta according to package directions. Drain and rinse with cold water. Stir alfredo sauce into the cooked pasta with the three cheeses and enough milk to keep things loosey goosey. {This is so your mac and cheese doesn't dry out while it's staying cool.} Stir in salt and pepper to taste. Divide between four mini aluminum pie tins {or one big one}, sprayed with nonstick cooking spray. Spray one side of aluminum foil with more nonstick cooking spray and cover each individual mac and cheese portion, sprayed side down, facing the food. Seal well. Store in a large plastic food storage bag in a cooler until ready to cook. Prepare a fire and let it burn down to the coals. Place a cooking rack over top that would be 2-3 inches above. Place each pie tin over the hot coals and cook 8-10 minutes or until hot. Remove from fire and serve immediately. *You can also just bake these at home in a glass baking dish at 350 degree oven for 20 minutes or so. Easy peasy!

Campfire S'mores Granola

INGREDIENTS

The base granola: 3 cups gluten free rolled oats 1/4 cup oat bran pinch cinnamon pinch sea salt

1 T oil of choice or butter 1/4 cup pure maple syrup Post grilling | foil baking: 1 cup + mini marshmallows 1 cup + dairy free chocolatechips

INSTRUCTIONS:

Over the campfire: Coat a large sheet of tin foil generously with oil cooking spray and set aside ensuring it is completely covered, includ-ing the edges. In a large mixing bowl, combine the oats, oat bran, cinnamon, sea salt and mix well. Add the oil of choice and maple of the tin foil, preferably in a single layer, ensuring there is sufficient room to around the edges to wrap. Wrap the granola up without any room for air- We don't want steamed granola here. Lay the foil patch on the heated stone/coal and allow to heat for 5-10 minutes. Using tongs, shake the foil pack roughly every 2-3 minutes to avoid sticking. Remove and carefully open and allow to cool for 5 minutes. If you want melted chocolate and marshmallows, add now and mix through and allow to cool. For the grilled version: Coat a large sheet of tin foil generously with oil cooking spray and set aside. In a large mixing bowl, combine the cats, cat bran, cinnamon, sea salt and mix well. Add the oil of choice and maple syrup and stir until fully incorporated. Lay the mixture in the centre part of the tin foil, preferably in a single layer, ensuring there is sufficient room to around the edges to wrap. Place tin pouch directly on the grill on medium heat. If possible, stir every 3-4 minutes, or give it a shake and grill the granola for approximately 10-12 minutes. Remove from grill and be careful when opening pouch and give the granola another stir before allowing it to cool completely. Add in the marshmallows and chocolate chips.

Summer Exhibits at the Northwest Art Center

ummer exhibits in the Northwest Art Center galleries at Minot State University feature mixed media, sculpture, and photography by Wendy Kimble and ceramics by Emilie Marquardt. Kimble's exhibit,

"Modern Venus," July 12 through August 10 in the Gordon B. Olson Library Gallery, explores society's evolving expectations of the female form "from the voluptuous 24,000 BCE Venus of Willendorf to society's expectations of the modern day ideal body type." Kimble, an adjunct art instructor at Minot State University, said her exhibit focuses on "the acceptance of ourselves, and teaching our daughters that the true beauty is within us."

"Hollow Innocence," Marquardt's display of scores of empty ceramic vessels, opens July 22 in the Hartnett Hall Gallery with a public reception from 5 to 7 p.m. Marquardt's installation seeks to raise awareness of hunger among school age children in the Minot area. The exhibit runs through August 12.

"Each vessel represents a student in the Minot Public School system who is supported by Souris Valley United Way through their Backpack Buddy Program," said Marquardt. Four Minot elementary schools, Sunnyside, McKinley, Roosevelt, and Washington, participate in the program. Each week, volunteers coordinate the purchase of food and transport it to the schools. Teachers place bags of food into certain backpacks at the end of the day on Fridays to provide meals for children who might not

otherwise have substantial meals over the weekend. Visitors to the exhibit may make a \$10 donation to the program in exchange for one of the vessels.

Marquardt graduated from MSU in May 2016 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Art Education and a concentration in Special Education. She will teach art at Glenburn Public School this fall.

Both exhibits are free and open to the public. The Hartnett gallery is open 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, and the library gallery is open during regular library hours.

These programs are funded in part by a grant from the North Dakota Council on the Arts, which receives funding from the state legislature and the National Endowment for the Arts.





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

A Baby's First Test -The Answer's Might Save a Life

NORTH DAKOTA DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH

BISMARCK, N.D. The North Dakota Department of Health (NDDoH) is pleased to announce that July 1 marked an important step in saving the lives of babies born in North Dakota. The state newborn screening program expanded their newborn screening panel to include a disorder called Severe Combined Immune Deficiency (SCID).

SCID, also known as "Bubble Boy Syndrome," is a rare, but serious primary immune deficiency characterized by lack of a functioning immune system. Newborns with SCID often appear healthy at birth, but are at increased risk to develop infections that may become

severe. If not identified early through newborn screening, babies with SCID often die by age 1. "Early detection and treatment saves lives and improves outcomes for SCID and all disorders included on the newborn screening panel," said Joyal Meyer, Newborn Screening Program Director.

Treatment for SCID includes a bone marrow transplant, which is often done within the first few months of life. "The five-year survival rate for infants diagnosed with SCID who receive treatment by three and a half months of age is approximately 94 percent," according to Dr. Chris Cleveland, Pediatric Immunologist at Sanford Health in

Fargo and SCID Medical Consultant for NDDoH.

Newborn screening is done by taking a few drops of blood from a baby's heel 24 to 48 hours after birth. The blood is tested for 51 rare, but serious disorders. All of the disorders screened for can be treated, and most babies, if identified early, can grow up to be healthy with normal development.

nitially, the idea of a more.

children's trout fishing pond near the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Downstream Campground seemed like a great idea – a way to involve children in fishing, making use of water expended from Garrison Dam National Fish Hatchery, and shoring up a problematic area with an erosion problem.

Tucked below Garrison Dam on the road going south of Garrison Dam National Fish Hatchery, the pond was a great fishing adventure for children when camping nearby with family or friends or just spending some time enjoying the area.

It worked for a few years, described Garrison Dam National Fish Hatchery manager Rob Holm. Camp Loop Pond, as it's called on official N.D. Game and Fish Department fishing information, was created in the late 1990s. It even had a waterfowl nesting island.

The problem, though, is that the sandy Missouri River bottomland soil coupled with water movement from the creek feeding from the hatchery into the pond quickly silted it in.

It was shallow when built but could sustain trout. "But being it was sand, it became shallower even quicker," Holm described. It didn't take the wily rainbow trout that the Game and Fish Department stocked through the hatchery's rearing efforts long to find their way back home, which was upstream in the little feeder creek and back to the hatchery.

Stocked bluegill also

However, in 2014 the Game and Fish Department's Save Our Lakes lived, yet again, up to its moniker and assisted with funding the pond's restoration. The island, as beneficial as it was for waterfowl nesting, was contributing to siltation build-up so it was removed. The pond was deepened, re-sloped, large stabilization rock was added to reduce erosion, and "we've got a regular drain outlet," Holm added. It even has its own little spillway.

Camp Loop Pond is now 4.2 acres in size, its entire shoreline covers 1/2-mile, and is about 14 feet deep. It's annually stocked in April and May with a total of 700 ¹/₂-pound rainbow trout. It was stocked with catfish in its early years and the Game and Fish Department is considering future catfish stocking options.

In addition to the fishing pier, the pond has benches and the hatchery's hiking trail loops through the area. Parking is available shortly before entering the Downstream Campground and campground hosts have free children's fishing equipment available through a loaner program, Holm continued.

The 1.67-mile hiking trail near the pond treks along the river bottom. Its crushed gravel, hardpacked surface is also handicapped-accessible. The first portion, called the Wetlands Loop, near the hatchery was built in 1997, Holm said, with the remainder completed during the Lewis and Clark Bicentennial tenure through a program funding multiuse trails throughout the entire Lewis and Clark route to the West Coast. Trail signage is located on the north end at the hatchery and near Camp Loop Pond with a kiosk near a "Wildlife Observation" sign. The trail and Camp Loop Pond are free and open to the public of all ages.



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ventured outward, only they found an exit allowing them to get to the nearby Missouri River.
