Concealed carry transport, storage

Any personnel living on or visiting Minot Air Force Base, North Dakota, must take the proper steps of registering their privately owned firearms to be allowed to store them on base.

While personnel can follow certain guidelines to store and transport weaponry on base, this does not authorize them to carry a concealed firearm while on the installation.

A firearm is defined as any weapon which will or may be readily converted to expel a projectile through a barrel by the action of an explosive, according to Minot AFB Integrated Defense Plan 31-1.

The Minot AFB IDP 31-1 has three categories for weapons. Category I weapons are instruments capable of propelling a projectile by compressed air, gasses, springs or other mechanical or physical means. Category I weapons include, but are not limited to, pellet guns, bows and arrows, throwing stars or electrical shock and other similar self-defense weapons. Category II weapons include, but are not limited to, knives with blades in excess of three and a half inches,

swords, metal knuckles and nunchakus. Category III weapons are defined as explosive material. This material consists of, but is not limited to, ammunition, gunpowder, firecrackers or any substance prepared for the purpose of producing a visible or an audible effect by combustion, explosion or detonation.

Base Housing residents are authorized to store and retain firearms and category I weapons, however, they must be pre-registered with the 5th Security Forces Squadron armory and should be stored in a locked container separate from ammunition. Category II weapons are authorized only when the weapon is part of the owner's lawful "tools of the trade", such as craftsmen, hunters, fishermen and those individuals practicing selfdefense methods.

Firearms and Category I, II or III weapons are not authorized to be stored in dormitories or on-base lodging and under no circumstances are to be stored by on-base housing residents for people within these living quarters.

"Airmen living in the dorms are not allowed to store their weapons in their rooms," said Staff Sgt. Alexander Northrup, NCO in charge of police services at the 5th Security

Forces Squadron. "They are required to bring their unloaded weapon in a container that can be locked while stored within the armory. If dorm residents want to check it out at any time they must have a letter signed off by the commander." There is no limitation

to the number of firearms registered by personnel or the quantity of ammunition owned.

Unauthorized weapons include, but are not limited to, switchblade knives, fully-automatic firearms, nitroglycerin, dynamite or any other dangerous explosive, and fireworks, unless approved by the commander of the 5th Maintenance Support Group for special events, such as July 4th.

The use of approved weapons is limited to and approval is required prior to firing from the following areas: base firing-range complex, indoor archery range, outdoor archery and paintball range and other areas approved by the 5th MSG/CC for entomology purposes.

Residents of Minot AFB may only transport weapons to and from authorized storage facilities for offbase activities, such as purchase or sale, collector's events and gun shows. "The weapon and ammunition needs to be separated as much as possible during transport," said Northrup. "The ammo can be in the glove box, while the firearm is in the back seat away from the driver. The weapon should be behind the driver where the weapon cannot be reached easily."

Team Minot personnel who live off base may transport firearms and associated ammunition onto the installation for authorized activities such as target, skeet and trap shooting or hunting, if such activities take place immediately after duty hours and if properly licensed during valid North Dakota state hunting seasons.

Base-housing residents that sponsor guests onto base may retain their weapons within the sponsor's base-housing quarters. However, if the guest resides on base for more than 15 days, the weapon must be registered by the sponsor at the 5th SFS armory.

state issued permit, are prohibited from carrying a concealed weapon on base, unless sanctioned by the commander of the



5th Bomb Wing. There are credentials that Airmen with the 5th Security Forces Squadron can obtain to carry concealed weapons off duty under the Law Enforcement Officers Safety Act.

"This authorizes active security forces members and anyone who has been involved in the federal law enforcement for more than 10 years to carry," said Staff Sgt. Alexander Northrup, NCO in charge of police services at the 5th SFS. "This allows us a wider range of where we can conceal, and instead of receiving state certification, it is a blanket credential issued by a governing agency." Personnel that do not meet the criteria for LEOSA must apply for a state-issued concealed carry permit. "Military members must show proof of military orders or a utility bill showing

they have taken residency to apply for a North Dakota stateissued license," said Senior Officer Aaron Moss, a crime prevention officer with the Minot Police Department. "If we have reciprocity, meaning if their home state recognizes our permits, they do not need a North Dakota license as we will recognize their permits, however, if there is not reciprocity, they must start the application from the beginning as there is no transfer process." All firearm owners on base may transport weapons to and from authorized storage




MARE TESTS EMERGENCY RESPONDERS



Cost for participating in the Missoula Children's Theatre is \$10 for Youth Center members and \$20 for non-members.



Individuals interested in participating do not need to register in advance however teams should register by July 29th. For additional information, contact the Base Library at 723-3344.





INGREDIENTS:

Crumb layers:

1 1/3 cups all-purpose flour 1/2 tsp baking soda 1/4 tsp salt 1 1/3 cups rolled old fashioned oats 1/2 cup packed light brown sugar 1/2 cup granulated sugar 3/4 cup unsalted butter, melted 2 tsp vanilla extract

Filling: 1 3/4 cups hulled and diced strawberries (from 12 oz whole) 1 1/2 cups1/4-inch thick diced rhubarb 1 Tbsp fresh lemon juice /3 cup granulated sugar 1 Tbsp cornstarch

INSTRUCTIONS:

For the crumb layer:

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Butter a 9 by 9-inch baking dish and line with parchment paper, butter parchment (if you don't care to lift the bars out of the pan before cutting you can just butter the dish, no parchment needed). In a mixing bowl whisk together flour, baking soda and salt for 20 seconds. Add in oats, brown sugar and granulated sugar and whisk to be block while the back we have been with a second s to blend, while using fingertips to break up small clumps of brown sugar. Whisk vanilla into melted butter then pour melted butter over oat mixture. Stir with a spatula until mixture is evenly moistened. Press 2/3 of the mixture into prepared baking dish, set aside remaining 1/3.

For the filling:

Add diced strawberries and rhubarb to a medium mixing bowl. Toss with lemon juice. In a small mixing bowl whisk together sugar and cornstarch. Pour sugar mixture over strawberry mixture and toss to coat. Pour straw-berry mixture over bottom crumb layer in baking dish. Evenly sprinkle remaining 1/3 crumb mixture over top. Bake in preheated oven until top is golden brown and crisp and filling is bubbling, about 45 - 50 minutes. Cool on a wire rack until warm then cut into squares. Serve warm with vanilla ice cream if desired.

Watermelon Lemonade

INGREDIENTS:

6 cups cubed seedless watermelon, chilled (2 lbs after peeling)* 4 cups cold water 3/4 cup fresh strained lemon juice, chilled 2/3 cup granulated sugar (more or less to taste) Ice and fresh mint for serving

INSTRUCTIONS:

Add watermelon to a blender and pulse until well pureed (there should be about 4 cups). Pour through a fine mesh strainer into a bowl. In a large pitcher whisk together water, lemon juice and sugar until sugar has dissolved. Stir in pureed watermelon. Stir in ice and mint (alternately add ice and mint directly to individual cups and pour lemonade over). Store in refrigerator. *If you don't have time to chill the ingredients then just use more ice in

place of some of the water.

Summer Exhibits at the Northwest Art Center

Summer exhibits in the Northwest Art Center galleries at Minot State University feature mixed media, sculpture, and photography by Wendy Kimble and ceramics by Emilie Marquardt.

The exhibit runs through August 12.

Both exhibits are free and open to the public. The Hartnett gallery is open 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, and the library gallery is open during regular library hours. These programs are funded in part by a grant from the North Dakota Council on the Arts, which receives funding from the state legislature and the National Endowment for the Arts.

Public Art Installation of Children's Artwork to Pop Up on 42nd Street

Grand Forks, ND -Hundreds of colorful, hand-made flowers have filled the landscape on 42nd Street near 17th Avenue South, in an open lot south of the Alerus Center. The flowers were installed this morning and will be on view until Thursday, July 21.

Pop-Up Pop-Bottle Flowers, a public art installation organized by ArtWise and created in collaboration with hundreds of local children, features recycled water bottles transformed in to a vibrant display of colorful flowers blooming on the landscape. The flowers were painted and shaped by hundreds of children under the direction of ArtWise staff and volunteers. The land used for the installation was generously provided by the Alerus Center.

Children began creating flowers for the installation at events such as the 2016 ArtWise Art Camps, and throughout the summer of 2015 and 2016 at University Park during the summer lunch program. "The

children have shown such enthusiasm for this project, and have expressed such creativity when making the flowers", said Martha Keifenhiem, ArtWise Executive Director. "We are excited to share the children's artwork with the community and invite everyone to enjoy the installation".


The Pop-Up Pop-Bottle Flower project began as a one-minute pitch to panelists at the Forkin' It Over for Public Art grant competition in December 2015, which was organized in conjunction with the release of the Grand Forks Arts & Culture Master Plan. Funded by the **Community Foundation** of Grand Forks, East Grand Forks and Region, the Forkin' It Over for Public Art grant program supported temporary displays of public art ranging from installations to performances in public spaces.

"This public art project celebrates the collective expression of local children in a joyful and whimsical

artistic display", said Nicole Derenne, Public Art Commission Coordinator. "In this project, ArtWise demonstrates its continued commitment to encouraging children's creativity by playfully showcasing children's artwork in public spaces."

A closing reception will be held on July 21 from 6:00-7:30 p.m. at the installation site. At the reception, children are invited to pick flowers and take them home. Any remaining flowers will be made available at University Park on Friday, July 22 from noon- 1:30 p.m. for children to select.

Pop-Up Pop-Bottle Flowers is made possible by generous support from the Community Foundation of Grand Forks, East Grand Forks, and Region. The Public Arts Commission facilitated the production of the work. Project organizers are especially grateful to the Alerus Center and the City of Grand Forks for lending the installation space, a perfect background for the flower display.

And keep swimming she has—Dory now splashes right into her own movie, a sea-worthy spin-off about her own search for the loving parents she barely even remembers.


In Finding Dory, which takes place one year af-ter the events of Finding Nemo, Dory—still coping with her lifelong inability to remember anythingsuddenly recalls a memory fragment of her mother and father (Diane Keaton and Eugene Levy). Overjoyed that she has a family, she sets out on a quest to locate them, bringing along young Nemo and Marlin, his reluctant dad.


Ellen DeGeneres once again provides the voice of Dory, with a perfect grasp of the delicate emotional shadings of comedy, drama also steered WALL-E and and trauma in her struggle Finding Nemo, and coto piece together the shards of her past as she leaves her colorful coral reef and heads to the dark, debrisclogged shores of California. Albert Brooks reprises his role as Marlin, and newcomer Hayden Rolence is Nemo. The new movie does a great job, just like Nemo, of creating a world teeming with aquatic creatures—although we meet most of them not under the sea, but inside a marine institute, which is where Dory, Nemo and Marlin eventually come to the surface. camouflaging "septopus" (an octopus with only seven tentacles) who longs to remain in captivity rather than return to the wilds of the ocean. Modern Family's Ty Burrell cracked me up as Bailey the beluga whale, so proud of his abilities of echolocation, the sonarlike location of objects by reflected sound. Paired with Destiny (Kaitlin Olsen from It's Always Sunny in Philadelphia), a nearsighted whale shark, they're quite a team.

There's a road full of adorable otters, a loveably dorky ocean loon, Becky, who doesn't say a word, and a great running joke about real-life actress Sigourney Weaver, who's heard but never seen.

From the opening Pixar short (Piper, about a little sandpiper) to the credits (when Hank the octopus gets one last time in the spotlight), it's all great fun, rollicking adventure and quite heartwarming. Director Andrew Stanton, who director Angus MacLane keep the pace lively, the jokes funny and the message clear: Friends are family, too. There may be tears, and little ones, especially, may be more affected than arownups about Dory's wrenching separation from her parents and her unflappable hopes that she will find them. This is, after all, the House of Mouse, the company that gave us Bambi, Pinocchio and Dumbo not to mention Old Yeller, The Lion King and that flashback scene in Up. But remember what Dory says: Just keep swimming, just keep swimming. You'll make it.

Case of Zika Virus Reported in North Dakota

NORTH DAKOTA DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH

Bismarck, N.D.— The North Dakota Department of Health (NDDoH) recently received confirmation from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) that a woman who traveled to Jamaica has tested positive for Zika virus. The woman is not pregnant and was not hospitalized for her illness.

"This case is a reminder that travelers to areas with Zika virus need to take precautions to prevent mosquito bites," said Michelle Feist, Epidemiologist with the NDDoH. "Pregnant women should not travel to countries with Zika transmission, and if they must travel, should be extremely careful to avoid mosquito bites."

Many diseases, including Zika, dengue fever and yellow fever, can be transmitted by mosquitoes. All travelers should protect themselves from mosquito bites in the same way they would at home, and by following the recommendations

at www.cdc.gov/zika/ prevention. After returning from Zika affected areas, the

NDDoH recommends: All travelers should consult their health care provider if they develop illness, such as sudden onset of fever, rash, conjunctivitis (red eyes), joint pain, muscle soreness or pain, or headache, within 14 days of returning from Zika affected areas

Men returning from an area with Zika virus transmission should either abstain from sexual activity or correctly and consistently use condoms for all sexual acts; men should contact their healthcare provider for advice on how long they need to abstain or use condoms Pregnant women should

consult their health care provider and seek testing for Zika virus between two and 12 weeks after returning from a Zika affected area

Even if they do not feel sick, all travelers returning to the United States from an area with Zika should take steps to prevent

mosquito bites for three weeks following their return

Travelers who become ill should be particularly careful to avoid getting additional bites from other mosquitos during the first week of illness

Travelers should not use nonsteroidal antiinflammatory drugs (NSAIDs) like aspirin, ibuprofen and naproxen, to treat symptoms

Anyone who plans to travel outside of the United States should consult a health care provider prior to traveling (ideally six months prior), as certain vaccines and medications may be recommended to prevent disease. Blue-green Algae Identified in Lake LaMoure and Twin Lakes; Health Officials Advise Caution When Recreating

ISMARCK, N.D. – The North Dakota Departments of Health (NDDoH) and Agriculture (NDDA), Animal Health Division, have issued a blue-green algae advisory for Lake LaMoure and Twin Lakes (located in LaMoure County) due to detectable levels of microcystin in the water. Microcystin is a cyanotoxin numb lips, tingling fingers caused by blue-green algae. When present in water, cyanotoxins are dangerous for both people and animals. Although the level of cyanotoxin was below the state threshold for issuing warnings, the algae can reproduce rapidly, with a corresponding rise in the cyanotoxin levels. With the upcoming warm weekend ahead, the NDDoH and NDDA urge residents to err on the side of caution and avoid waters that look discolored or scummy, or that have a foul odor in these lakes. The production of bluegreen algae often happens in hot weather in bodies of water that are used by people, pets and livestock. Exposure from ingesting affected water can cause

illness in people and animals. and can result in death. There are no known antidotes for the toxins.

Blue-green algae discolor the water they live in, and can cause foam, scum or mats to appear on the surface. People and animals that swallow water containing cyanotoxins can become sick with severe diarrhea and vomiting; and toes; dizziness; or rashes, hives or skin blisters. Children are at

cyanobacteria bloom, rinse off with fresh water as soon as possible.

• Do not let pets or livestock swim in or drink from areas where the water is discolored or where you see foam, scum or mats of algae on the water.

• If pets (especially dogs) swim in scummy water, rinse them off immediately – do not let them lick the algae (and toxins) off their fur.

• Don't irrigate lawns or golf courses with pond water that looks scummy or

It's not that U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Garrison Dam National Fish Hatchery manager Rob Holm isn't confident his staff can't raise young fish. After all, the hatchery is a major reason North Dakota lakes produce such good sport fishing.

But what Holm and his staff were asked to do to learn more about endangered pallid sturgeon was unprecedented: They needed to provide a statistically valid enough number of newly hatched pallids to conduct a larval drift study.

And after successfully spawning adult female and male pallid sturgeon to get more than 700,000 eggs to hatch simultaneously, he's not sure it can be duplicated.

Pallid sturgeon spawn upstream in the Missouri and Yellowstone rivers in Montana. Once hatched the tiny larvae drift and float downstream where, as a bottom feeding young fish, they feed and grow.

The problem is they don't seem to be surviving in Lake Sakakawea's headwaters where they drift. Scientists think decomposing vegetative matter robs oxygen and they suffocate.

To test the theory, researchers needed to study movements of a voluminous number of newly hatched pallid sturgeon. So many things had to come together that Holm wasn't sure his staff would be successful. They needed adult males and females to spawn at the same time. They needed to be there when they did to collect eggs and spawn the fish. They needed exact water temperatures so

biologists began collecting eggs. They worked steady until the remaining staff, seasonal workers, and YCĆ students joined in the effort the following morning, working until 3 p.m.

The hatchlings were loaded on trucks and immediately transported to a release site at the confluence of the Milk and Missouri rivers in Montana. There, an army of people released 110 bags containing 700,000 larval pallids, filling 55 coolers.

However, the work wasn't over.

Teams of researchers monitored their downstream drift continuously as the tiny fish made their to Lake Sakakawea headwaters, collecting them with fine nets at various levels in the river's water column as researchers and fish floated their way downstream.

The study will document the river distance needed to provide successful recruitment downstream of a pallid sturgeon spawning site.

The next step is analyzing the data, including studying genetics to identify which female and male the larvae came from, Holm described. "It will give us information as to why we're losing them (pallid sturgeon)."

The data will benefit more than an endangered species: It will help determine if a bypass channel on a diversion dam on the Yellowstone River would provide access to enough upstream spawning habitat to allow successful recruitment to occur, opening river passage all the way to Forsythe, Mont. That, in turn, benefits all species traveling upstream in the Yellowstone to spawn. Holm admitted he had initial doubts the hatchery could be successful given the huge number of newly hatched fish required. "The stars are definitely aligned on this baby," Holm mused.

INOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. --There is one thing that North Dakota doesn't have a shortage of, and that is long stretches of open roads. During the summer, a great way to enjoy the area is to start up the motorcycle and hit the road.

Before you even get out of the garage, it's important to inspect your ride. Not only are pre-season inspections important, but going through your pre-ride checklist is crucial.

The Motorcycle Safety Foundation (MSF) has come up with the helpful acronym "T-CLOCS" to help riders thoroughly inspect their machines before riding.

T - Stands for tires,

wheels and brakes. Your tire pressure can fluctuate just as often as the Minot weather, which can affect your fuel economy and traction.

C - Stands for controls. Make sure your throttle doesn't stick and returns to its natural position when released. Levers and pedals should be properly adjusted and move freely.

L – Stands for lights and electronics. Do your brake lights and turn signals all function properly?

O – Stands for oil and fluids. Check for the levels and if any fluids need to be replaced. C – Stands for chassis.

C – Stands for chassis. Your handlebars and suspension should move freely and smoothly. S – Is for stand. Check to make ensure your side or center stand supports your motorcycle and that the springs keep the stand from dropping down during your ride.

The T-CLOCS inspection is just the start to making sure you have a safe motorcycle ride. It can help eliminate problems before they become a safety hazard on the road.

facilities while unloaded and placed in the rearmost compartment of the vehicle with ammunition stored in a separate area. Weapons must be cleared and placed on safe, and it is recommend to equip all weapons with a tamperresistant mechanical lock or other safety device. For those personnel who do not have a concealed carry permit or proper LEOSA credentials, they will not stow their weapon in a manner to appear as concealed.

All personnel that own or possess privately owned firearms member is employed in any capacity on base, within the bar areas of J.R. Rockers and the Jimmy Doolittle Center, within any restricted areas or within the 5th Medical Group facility.

If a LEOSA credentialed member must enter an unauthorized area, he must secure his firearm in a locked vehicle in a locked compartment placed in an area not visible from the outside of the vehicle.

If any personnel have any type of firearm, locked or concealed, they are required to

must comply with requirements outlined in Air Force Instruction 31-101, Integrated Defense, Minot Air Force Base Integrated Defense Plan 31-1 and Air Force Manual 31-125, Security Forces Implementation of the Law Enforcement Officers Safety Act.

LEOSA credentialed personnel may carry concealed weapons in accordance with AFMAN 31-125 and Minot AFB IDP 31-1 while on the installation.

Personnel that acquire LEOSA credentials are unauthorized to carry concealed at work if the immediately identify the presence of the weapon to any law enforcement officer if they have interaction with them, whether it be at the entrance gates to the installation or while local law enforcement are fulfilling their duties.

If stopped by law enforcement while carrying concealed on base, LEOSA members must produce their credentials and proof of training to the law enforcement officer.

LEOSA credentials do not supersede the rules for on base storage, registration and safety. "These exercises with allies, some of whom the U.S. has been allies with for decades, allow the 5th Bomb Wing to connect personally, professionally and tactically," Denehan said. "They also demonstrated the B-52Hs ability to assure allies and deter potential adversaries."

Lt. Col. Mike Maginness, 23rd Bomb Squadron commander, lead the exercise and noted a few big feats during the 5th Bomb Wing commander's call.

"Within 24 hours of arrival we had the ramp secured, we have a flight doctor on station who's coordinating medical treatment, and some cultural opportunities planned," Maginness said. vast majority of members of Team Minot will never have to experience the nonjudicial punishment process pursuant to Article 15 of the Uniform Code of Military Justice (UCMJ). However, it is important for members to understand the different types of misconduct that can warrant nonjudicial punishment and how commanders can punish. Under Article 15 of the UCMJ, all commanders may initiate nonjudicial punishment. The member is given the right to accept nonjudicial punishment or demand trial by court-martial. If the member accepts the Article 15 process they are provided an opportunity to respond before guilt and punishment is determined by the Commander. After the Commander reviews the member's submitted matters, the circumstances of the offense, any factors in mitigation or extenuation, and the member's history of

misconduct (if any), the Commander will then determine guilt or innocence and if found guilty an appropriate punishment. The maximum punishment for an Article 15 action depends on the rank of the member being punished and the rank of the officer imposing punishment. Typical punishments include, but are not limited to, reduction in rank, forfeitures of pay, extra duties, restriction to base and a reprimand. The Commander can also choose to suspend a portion of the punishment. The suspended punishment acts as a probation period no more than six months. If the member commits further misconduct the suspended punishment can be vacated, meaning the suspended punishment will take effect. For the month of April, May, and June 2016, the Minot AFB Legal Office processed forty Article 15s. Listed below are short summaries of these cases to inform the base community of the serious nature of nonjudicial punishment and the potential severity of

punishment. 1. A Master Sergeant from the 5th Maintenance Group received reduction to the grade of Technical Sergeant and a reprimand for one specification in violation of Article 134, Adultery.

2. A Master Sergeant from the 5th Force Support Squadron received a suspended reduction to the grade of Technical Sergeant, forfeitures of \$1886.00 pay per month for one month, 30 days extra duty and a reprimand for one specification in violation of Article 86. Failure to Go and one specification in violation of Article 92, Fail to Obey Lawful Order.

3. 


