Minot Airman named one of 12 Outstanding Airmen of the Year

Minning any Air Forcelevel award is a highly sought out accomplishment and shouldn't be taken lightly by anyone who wins or is nominated at that level, but being named one of the 12 Outstanding Airmen of the Year in the entire Air Force is a rare honor.

Tech. Sgt. Michael Asuncion Jr., 5th Bomb Wing NCO in charge of administration, was one of the Airmen selected for this prestigious award. Remaining humble, he doesn't take all the credit for his award

"I lead some really good people and teamed up with a lot of great people," Asuncion said. "The family at home really did their part by sending me to work every day ready to do my best."

Asuncion had to beat other Airmen at four different levels all across the Air Force before he was chosen as one of the final 12.

"The 12 OAY is an annual award, so first you compete at the wing level, then the numbered Air Force, then the MAJCOM and then the Air Force level," Asuncion said. "I just found out recently that I won at the Air Force level."

Asuncion was originally nominated for this award

while he was still in pavement and equipment, or more commonly known as a "dirt boy," stationed at Patrick Air Force Base, Florida.

"It's really not a reflection of me, it's the teams I've been on," Asuncion said. "The Airmen over there at Patrick were great. Once we pointed in a direction, the Airmen were already running that way."

"I did get BTZ, first sergeant's sharp troop award as an Airman, NCO of the quarter for the 4th quarter in 2014, distinguished graduate for the NCOA in 2015," Asuncion said. "I also got distinguished graduate in tech school for both pavement and equipment in 2012 and tech school for administration in 2016."

Even though he has already known for some time now, Asuncion is still getting used to this high honor.

"I still don't even know what to expect from this, people are saying it's a big deal," Asuncion said. "I know it's a huge deal, it just really hasn't sunk in yet. I think it will when my wife and I go to D.C. and we're actually talking to Chief Cody. Right now it feels like another day just trying to do the job." Asuncion found out by getting a phone call from two very high-ranking individuals in his previous command.

"General Hyten, the Air Force Space Command commander, along with Chief McMahon, the command chief, called me up and said, 'Congratulations, you made master sergeant, oh and you made 12 OAY'," Asuncion said. "I was overwhelmed that day; the first thing I did was go home and tell my family what we've done because they are a big part of my success. Then I called up all the dirt boys back at home station and my mentors and everyone that had an impact on me and reciprocated the success because I'm representing them."

Although this is a very high point in his career, Asuncion views this accomplishment not as a complacency point, but a launch pad to take his career even further and fulfill his long and shortterm goals.

"Long term, my wife and I are still on the fence if I want to go through with the enlisted route and make chief or to take the officer route," Asuncion said. "Short term, I just retrained into administration and I just got my three-level, so my current goal is to get good at my job and make this office the best it's





ever been. But I definitely want to stay in and retire to serve my country another 10 years, whether it's as an officer or enlisted."

Asuncion said that he is an example that you don't have to do anything crazy to be recognized for doing a good job, just to make sure when you do something, to do it right.

"I just try to live the core values and try my best in everything I do," Asuncion said. "Anyone can do it if you keep trying. It's out there for anyone to get, it's not just for the elite. You just have to wake up first and go to sleep last and do your best between those two points at whatever it is you do. If it's putting binders away, make sure the binders are straight. If it's lining up chairs, make sure there's no dust on them, it's the simple things that stand out."

Minot AFB Article 15s

A vast majority of members of Team Minot will never have to experience the nonjudicial punishment process pursuant to Article 15 of the Uniform Code of Military Justice (UCMJ). However, it is important for members to understand the different types of misconduct that can warrant nonjudicial punishment and how commanders can punish. Under Article 15 of the UCMJ, all commanders may initiate non-judicial punishment. The member is given the right to accept nonjudicial punishment or demand trial by courtmartial. If the member accepts the Article 15 process they are provided an opportunity to respond before guilt and punishment is determined by the Commander. After the Commander reviews the member's submitted matters, the circumstances of the offense, any factors in mitigation or extenuation, and the member's history of misconduct (if any), the Commander will then determine guilt or innocence and if found guilty an appropriate punishment. The maximum punishment for an Article 15 action depends on the rank of the member being punished and the rank of the officer imposing punishment. Typical punishments include, but are not limited to, reduction in rank, forfeitures of pay, extra duties, restriction to base and a reprimand. The Commander can also choose to suspend a

portion of the punishment. The suspended punishment acts as a probation period no more than six months. If the member commits further misconduct the suspended punishment can be vacated, meaning the suspended punishment will take effect. For the month of April, May, and June 2016, the Minot AFB Legal Office processed forty Article 15s. Listed below are short summaries of these cases to inform the base community of the serious nature of nonjudicial punishment and the potential severity of punishment.

1. A Senior Airman from the 5th Logistics Readiness Squadron received a reduction to the grade of Airman First Class, suspended forfeitures of \$1041.00 pay per month for two months, and a reprimand for one specification in violation of Article 92, Neglect; Dereliction of Duty and one specification in violation of Article 108, Damage, Destroy, or Loss of Military Property, \$500.00 or less.

2. A Senior Airman from the 5th Aircraft Maintenance Squadron received a suspended reduction to the grade of Airman First Class, suspended forfeitures of \$1041.000 pay per month for two months, 45 days restriction to the base with 15 days suspended, 45 days extra duty with 15 days suspended and a reprimand for one specification in violation of Article 92, Misuse of GTC Travel Card, and one specification in violation

of 134, Uttering Worthless Checks.

3. A Senior Airman from 91st Missile Security Forces Squadron received a reduction to the grade of Airman First Class, suspended forfeiture of \$1041.00 pay for one month, 15 days extra duty and a reprimand for two specifications in violation of Article 86, Failure to Go.

4. A Senior Airman from 5th Aircraft Maintenance Squadron received a reduction to the grade of Airman Basic with reduction below Airman First Class suspended, suspended forfeiture of \$783.00 pay per month for two months, 45 days extra duty with 30 days suspended and a reprimand for one specification in violation of Article 86, Going From Place of Duty.

5. A Senior Airman from 91st Operations Support Squadron received a reduction to the grade of Airman First Class, suspended forfeiture of \$1041.00 pay per month for two months, 45 days extra duty with 10 days suspended and a reprimand for one specification in violation of Article 111, Drunken Driving.

6. A Senior Airman from 791st Missile Security Forces Squadron received a reduction to the grade of Airman First Class, suspended forfeiture of \$1041.00 pay per month for two months, 60 days restriction to the base suspended and a reprimand for one specification in violation of Article 111, Drunken Driving.

7. A Senior Airman from 5th Maintenance Squadron received a reduction to the grade of Airman First Class, suspended forfeiture of \$1041.00 pay per month for two months, 15 days extra duty and a reprimand for one specification in violation of Article 107, False Official Statement. 8. A Senior Airman from **5th Logistics Readiness** Squadron received a suspended reduction to the grade of Airman First

Class, forfeitures of \$1041.00 pay per month for two months with one month suspended, 14 days extra duty and a reprimand for one specification in violation of Article 128, Assault Consummated by a Battery and one specification in violation of Article 134, Drunk and Disorderly. 9. A Senior Airman from 5th Aircraft Maintenance Squadron received a reduction to the grade of Airman with reduction below Airman First Class suspended, suspended forfeitures of \$878.00 pay per month for two months, 45 days extra duty with 15 days suspended and a reprimand for two specifications in violation of Article 128, Assault Consummated by a Battery and one specification in violation of 134, Drunk and Disorderly. 10. A Senior Airman from 5th Security Forces Squadron received a reduction to the grade of Airman Basic with reduction below Airman suspended, suspended forfeitures of \$783.00 pay per month for two months and a reprimand for one specification in violation of Article 107, False Official Statement, one specification in

Green Dot: Changing the Culture

Green Dot is a violence prevention program that is meant to give people avenues or ways to be able to intervene and help stop violence from occurring, whether it is sexual assault, stalking, or dating/domestic violence.

Green Dot started in high schools and colleges. The program has had such a dramatic reduction in sexual assault, dating and domestic violence and stalking in those settings, the Air Force bought into the program to help reduce interpersonal violence within the Air Force.

"The Air Force purchased a 5-year plan for Green Dot, which started at the end of 2015. The actual training started in January of 2016," said Master Sgt. Kristy Wiener, 5th Bomb Wing Protocol Superintendent and Green Dot Installation Coordinator for Team Minot. "Some bases started rolling the program out in April, which is when it started here at Minot Air Force Base as well."

There are roughly 25-50 people per training session, and each person is given an anonymous clicker to use during that session. The class is able to see actual, real-time statistics from only those participating in that training.

"Usually in Air Force training, the statistics are so broad: Air Force, U.S. or Department of Defense wide. In Green Dot Training, no statistic comes from outside of the classroom," said Wiener. "Every statistic is from the people participating in the training, anonymously. By these statistics only coming from those in the classroom, you can truly see how many people in our environment have been effected by interpersonal violence in some manner

coming in as India and not Staff Sergeant, then people may be more comfortable to speak out."

The Green Dot training will be required for every Air Force member. There are three phases. Phase one is leadership; which will be all of the wing, group and squadron commanders, chiefs and first sergeants. Phase two is the bystander training, which is a fourhour interactive training. Only people chosen by their commanders are allowed to attend phase two of Green Dot, and it is only 12-15% of each unit. Phase three will be the overview training, which is a 50-60 minute training for the masses. Personnel are only required to attend one of the three phases.

"This year Green Dot will count towards the annual SAPR training; however, Green Dot is not SAPR, and it covers more than sexual assault. It is a prevention strategy," said Middleton. "SAPR is still in place if a sexual assault were to occur. You will still utilize the SARC for restricted or unrestricted reporting options. You can't do that through Green Dot."

In Green Dot, positive and negative actions are signified by green and red dots. Red dots are negative words or actions used to cause someone else harm. Opposed to the red, there are two types of green dots, reactive and proactive. A reactive green dot is positive words or actions taken in response to the negative red dot action to help deescalate the situation. Proactive green dots are positive things you can do in your personal/ work spaces to begin stopping red dots before they even (happen) start.

"One of the main things we talk about in Green Dot is barriers," said Middleton. "Everyone, regardless of what they see going on, has that barrier where they see something that they know shouldn't be happening, but they don't want to step in because they may feel like it is none of their business or maybe someone else will do it." People also may not intervene because they think they have to be the person who has to directly stop the negative action, but that is not the only way to help stop a red dot. During this point in the Green Dot training, the Implementers talk about the three D's of intervening in a situation: direct, delegate, and distract. Then they work with everyone to help

them identify which way works best for them in each situation.

"Some people may be more apt to directly confront the red dot action as it's occurring, whereas someone else may decide to use the distract approach by taking the attention off of the red dot action onto themselves or some other form of distraction," said Wiener. "Green Dot is all about reactive and proactive Green Dots using one of the three D's in different situations. Not one of the three D's, is better than the other; it is just about what fits you and how you would react in each situation."

The goal of the program is to reduce power based personal violence by promoting an environment where people can step in and respond, regardless of any barrier they may have.

The Team Minot Green Dot Coordinators and Implementers are very excited to start initiating this new program for Team Minot.

"I started as a Victim Advocate along with Master Sgt. Wiener, and when the Air Force invested into the Green Dot program, we were asked if we wanted to help implement it, but we knew nothing about it," said Middleton. "When we went to the training, we found out that the spectrum had truly been broadened. The talk now wasn't just about sexual assault, but also stalking and dating/ domestic violence. I love the program because of what it stands for."

In the future, Green Dot is projected to expand into additional environments such as family advocacy and suicide awareness.

"Green Dot is all about changing our culture. It's important that everyone understands that we all have some sort of barrier

whether directly or indirectly."

"Everyone must wear civilian clothes in this training to promote an environment where people will feel comfortable and be more apt to participate. A lot of times when you look to your left or your right, all you see is rank," said Staff Sgt. India Middleton, 5th Civil Engineer Squadron furnishings management officer and Green Dot installation coordinator for Team Minot. "Someone may be more hesitant to speak because there may be someone in their chain of command or they may have a fear of rank in general. So if we shed that and I'm just

and that's okay," said Wiener. "This program will give us the tools needed to help change the culture where people will feel comfortable to intervene in some manner. In the future, we want to have only proactive Green Dots, where people always stand up for interpersonal violence, no matter what. We want to change the culture from where we are now to a much safer environment."

With its motto being, "No one has to do everything, but everyone has to do something," the Green Dot program is creating a safe and effective path for victims and bystanders alike.

On August 25th the Centennial Celebration and Quarter Launch will get underway at the Painted Canyon Overlook inside Theodore Roosevelt National Park. Guest speakers will include Congressman Kevin Cramer, Senator John Hoeven, National Park Service Deputy Regional Director for the Midwest Region Patty Trap and author and historian Clay Jenkinson. The US

Mint will release the newly designed Theodore Roosevelt National Park quarter following this event and a Pictorial Postmark commemorating the National Park Service Centennial will be available at the Medora Post Office from 8:00 A.M. to 4:30 P.M. Mountain Time.

That evening visitors will have the opportunity to listen to author Clay Jenkinson speak on the history, development and future of the National Park Service at the Cottonwood Campground Amphitheater. In relative solitude, visitors can hike for miles over rounded buttes and through scenic ravines to get a sense for this undeveloped, austere terrain. It all began in a log cabin on the prairie...well, OK, maybe that's not quite the way the story goes but it's still an interesting journey.

And, no, this isn't a story about Pres. Abraham Lincoln growing up in an Illinois log cabin.

Instead, it's a look at the North Dakota Fishing Hall of Fame.

Granted, it didn't originally begin in a log cabin, although for years photos of Hall of Fame inductees lined walls in a log building in Garrison's Main Street City Park. Glass-topped display cases also featured fishing memorabilia from decades past.

The brainchild of several Garrison residents, the Fishing Hall of Fame inducted its first honorees in 1981.

The Hall now calls North Country Marine and Motorsports home, located on the east side of Garrison amidst shiny boats, high tech fishing equipment, and a litany of parts to keep those boats on the move.

The Hall of Fame is really about the people, described North Country Marine's Kevin Bosch.

It's about difference makers ranging from dedicated biologists, resource advocates, and anglers who simply loved to share their passion. "It's been all across the range of people and organizations," described Fishing Hall of Fame board member Keith Witt, Garrison.

Lee Klapprodt, for example, was inducted in 2004 in recognition of his dedication to promoting salmon fishing in North Dakota.

Former N.D. Game and Fish Department directors are honored, as well, includcommittee chair, was inducted in 2005.

One of the 2015 inductees, Tolly Holtan, elevated Lake Sakakawea and McLean County's role as a tourist destination when she her husband, Byron, developed Indian Hills Resort. Her dedication to fishing and Lake Sakakawea put the Big Lake on the map for anglers throughout not just North Dakota but the Midwest and beyond.

Inductions are held in conjunction with the Governor's Cup rules meeting kicking off the state's oldest consecutive running fishing tournament.

The original 11-member Fishing Hall of Fame board of directors was comprised entirely of folks from Garrison, However, in 2012 the board of directors was broadened to include a mix of local Garrison residents and people throughout the state, Witt said. "The intent was to spread the exposure and get more interest in nominations," he explained.

Fishing Hall of Fame inductions were held in 1981, 1983, and 1988 through 1992. The board then took a hiatus from nominations until 2003, inducting five people between 2003 and 2005. The restructured board has inducted new Hall of Fame Members annually since 2013 when Garrison's Dennis Jeffrey and Cayuga's Louis Gaukler joined the previous 20 inductees.

The Hall of Fame recognized an organization, Fargo-based FM Walleyes Unlimited, Inc., in 2015. Founded in 1977, the organization's mission is to promote conservation, sportsmanship, and education of





Like Toy Story did with playthings, this wildly imaginative animated family flick—from the makers of Despicable Me and Minions—starts with a very simple premise: What do our domesticated animals do when we're away?

Quite a lot, it turns out! In a Manhattan high-rise, we're quickly introduced to Max, a well-groomed Jack Russell terrier (voiced by Louis C.K.); Chloe, the tubby tabby cat next door (Lake Bell); and Gidget (Jenny Slate), a prissy puffball of a Pomeranian down the street who has a crush on Max.

Max's walking buddies include Buddy, a slinky (Hannibal dachshund Burress), and Mel, a squirrel-obsessed pug (Bobby Moynihan).

Things are sailing along fine for Max until his owner brings home a second pet, a big, slobbery, rescue-dog mongrel named Duke (Eric Stonestreet). Max and Duke don't get along, and soon they're in a real doggie

whose resume includes the Despicable Me franchise and The Lorax, and codirector Yarrow Cheney, a former production designer and animator,

keep the jokes flying fast and funny and the plot moving at a brisk, lively trot as Max and Duke try to make their way home. Things get especially hairy when Snowball's subterranean army a motley crew of critters, from alligators, turtles and snakes to cats, a tattooed pig and "Sea Monkeys" turns against them when they find out they're really "domesticated" and not truly "liberated."

There's a chaotic trafficjam cliffhanger on a New York City bridge, with a bus driven by a Max and Snowball ("You drive like an animal!"). In one dream sequence, hot dogs dance to "We Go Together," the "rama lama lama ding dong" song from Grease. A poodle rocks out to heavy metal the second his owner is out the door. One tiny pooch, with a camera atop delimma, rounded up by his head, films funny cat Animal Rescue without their videos and uploads then to a Times Square jumbotron. It's all great, clever, whimsical fun, with a heartwarming, cuddly overlay of friendship and "family." You may not (or may!) have a dog or cat as adventurous as Max, Duke, Gidget, Chloe, Buddy and Mel, but just about anyone can relate to the montage at the end of the movie—when all the pets exuberantly welcome their owners home to the tune of Al Green's "Lovely Day." Any pet owner knows, and it's no secret: That display of loyalty, love and affection from a pet-no matter where they've been or what they've donemakes it a positively lovely day, indeed.

Peanut Butter Marshmallow Cookie Pie



INGREDIENTS:

- 1 package peanut butter cookie dough or 1 recipe of dough 1/2 cup chocolate chips 12 reese's peanut butter cups $1 \frac{1}{2}$ to 2 cups of mini marshmallows
- hot fudge for drizzle

INSTRUCTIONS:

Heat the oven to 350. Spray a pie pan with nonstick cooking spray. Press 2/3 of the dough all over the bottom and sides of the pie plate. Bake for 5 to 8 minutes or until, as seen in the photo, it's starting to set up, but is not baked through. Sprinkle chocolate chips evenly over the bottom, and add the peanut butter cups. Sprinkle marshmallows over the top. press 1/4 cup sized balls of remaining dough into the palm of your hand and carefully place on the top of the pie. Bake for an additional 15-18 minutes or until golden brown. Remember, the insides are gooey so it will jiggle a little coming out. Cool for 6-10 minutes before slicing or 20 minutes for the perfect piece to come out. drizzle with hot fudge for serving.








INOT AIR FORCE BASE,

Before meeting face-toface with the NCO in charge, a young Airman slowly walked into the Honor Guard building, nervous to make a good first impression at a meeting that would decide his future.

When faced with the question of why he wanted to join the Minot Air Force Base Honor Guard, a million different answers raced through his mind.

"I want to become part of an organization that is truly passionate about what it does," said the eager Airman. Immediately following

their meeting, Airman 1st Class Alessio Johnson was enrolled in a two-week training course, where he would eventually graduate and earn the title of Ceremonial Guardsman. Johnson was born and

raised in small-town Pordenone, Italy, near Aviano AFB and graduated from Kaiserslautern American High School in Germany. Growing up around Air Force bases, the urge to join the United States Air Force developed early on for Johnson.

"Growing up in a whole different country surrounded by other Americans, you feel that sense of comradery," he said. "That is one of the main reasons I wanted to join. No matter where I would go, I knew that I would be able to meet other people who share common interests."

Being raised by a U.S. Navy veteran, Johnson discovered quickly during Basic Military Training that he had already experienced many military aspects throughout his life. However, working alongside other Airmen, he said he realized he was now, finally, part of the team.

"We all had to strive to complete the mission, no matter how big or how small it might be," he said.

After completing technical training in his respective Air Force Specialty Code 3D0X3, Cyber Surety, Johnson was assigned to Minot Air Force Base, North Dakota, where he has spent the entirety of his career in the 5th Communications Squadron. The day he completed his Career Development Course, Johnson called Tech. Sgt. Joshua Hull, the NCOIC of the base Honor Guard, to say he was interested in joining.

"Everyone joins the Honor Guard for their own personal reasons," said Hull. "Several Airmen have had family members receive military funeral honors, which gives them the desire to give back. We have an amazing opportunity to represent every member, past and present."

Which is the exact reasoning Johnson said he gave to why he wanted to be a guardsman.

"I wanted to honor the memory of each and every veteran, retiree and active duty Airman who passes away to the best of my ability," Johnson said. "At the same time, I want to give the family an even greater sense of pride for their family member."

Johnson, who recently surpassed his one-year anniversary with the base Honor Guard, was selected to attend a training course with the Air Force Honor Guard at Joint Base Anacostia-Bolling in the District of Colombia. Only 25 positions were open for guardsmen Air Force-wide, and Johnson was one of two selected from Air Force Global Strike Command.

The goal of the course was to teach Airmen from base programs to perform military funeral honors at the same standard held by the Air Force Honor Guard, Johnson explained. Airmen sharpened their skills in firing party, body bearing and colors team.

"We were constantly training how to perform in all aspects of a military funeral down to the finest detail because it's that attention to detail that keeps all of us performing at the highest standard," he said. High standards are

expected in details, as well as in dress and appearance.

Starting with string-free blues shirt and service coat and finishing with smudgefree shoes and ceremonial cap, Airmen are expected to uphold standards explained in the Honor Guard manual given to them early on in their Honor Guard career.

Impressions are important for Honor Guardsmen, whether they're going in to meet their base NCOIC for the first time, or performing detail at a high-visual funeral, they always have to be flawless and precise.
