20 AF Women's Leadership Symposium: Shaping the future force

F.E. WARREN AIR FORCE BASE, Wyo. --

The opportunity to engage in candid conversations with senior military leaders can be a once-in-a-lifetime experience. Both male and female Airmen who attended the second 20th Air Force Women's Leadership Symposium, Sept. 26 to 28 at Kirtland Air Force Base, New Mexico, interacted with military pioneers who paved the way for the current generation.

The professional development event featured Airmen and a Soldier who shared about their past mistakes, overcoming challenges, and how they remained true to their character and core values through adversity.

"One of the biggest things that stuck with me from listening to the senior leaders was the need to accept every opportunity, even if it presents itself

as a challenge," said Staff Sgt. Nicholas Garcia, Airmen Leadership School instructor, Kirtland AFB. "Sometimes when you take on new opportunities, you make mistakes; but I've learned that bouncing back, learning from those mistakes and continuing to take care of your Airmen are what matter."

This year men were invited to share in the discussions with women across the Numbered Air Force. By exposing attendees to lessons-learned from top leaders and providing insight into ongoing initiatives, the three-day event served to encourage diversity of thought and to broaden perspectives.

Maj. Gen. Sandra Finan, Deputy Chief Information Officer for Command, Control, Communications and Computers and Information Infrastructure

Capabilities, Office of the Secretary of Defense, Pentagon, Washington D.C., attended the symposium as a mentor, sharing stories from her 33-year career, which included being among the first women to serve as a combat missile operator at Malmstrom AFB, Montana. She also expressed the need for Airmen to continue executing the ICBM mission with skill and excellence.

"We put a lot of responsibility on you to operate, maintain and secure the world's most powerful weapons, and never forget your actions maintain our nation's strength," said Finan. "You set the foundation for strength against enemies to achieve peace. What you do every single day affects that because deterrence depends on having the will and the capability to do what is necessary in the pursuit of what is good and right."

Other briefers shared their experiences leading inside and outside of the ICBM mission and expressed the need for supervisors to be impactful leaders by inspiring their units to strive for excellence.

"I learned we have to truly know our Airmen and challenge ourselves to motivate them in different ways because they're all different people," said Staff Sgt. Jennifer Zemke Macelman, 91st Security Forces Group unit security manager, Minot AFB, North Dakota. "Hearing how other people think and what they are going through is important. We need to acknowledge and accept all of the characteristics that make our Airmen unique because diversity is what makes our Air Force the best it can be."

The 20 AF missileers, maintainers, defenders and mission support Airmen in the audience were transfixed as senior leaders relayed their leadership philosophies, answered questions about maintaining balance between family and work, and unveiled how they made tough decisions by accepting risk in their careers.

Capt. June Richards, married mother of two and missile crew instructor, 341st Missile Wing, Malmstrom AFB, Montana, shared the symposium's impact on her decision to reevaluate her career in the Air Force.

"I was really on the fence about separating, but this has really helped me put things into perspective that having a successful career and spending time with my family can work," Richards

said. "I definitely feel more motivated to keep going, and I'm not thinking about separating anymore."

At the end of the event, both Maj. Gen. Anthony Cotton, 20th AF commander, and Chief Master Sgt. Calvin Williams, Air Force Global Strike Command command chief, shared their mutual goal of making the event even bigger next year.

"To me this needs to be an AFGSC initiative to build upon the things 20th AF has set forward to do," Williams said. "It's a powerful forum for young Airmen to see that their command is investing in them as future leaders in our Air Force."

The 20th AF commander encouraged attendees to take the information they learned and educate their fellow Airmen to accept diversity, foster an environment of dignity and respect, and to execute the mission to the best of their abilities.

"Our Air Force still has work to do, and it's up to you to take this message and spread it like wildfire," Cotton said. "Share your experience with the men and women within your command, and inspire change by being the best you."

E-4Bs realign under Eighth Air Force, 595th CACG stands up

BARKSDALE AIR FORCE BASE, La. --

The Eighth Air Force has another aircraft in its inventory, and it's not a bomber.

The E-4B, which serves as the National Airborne Operations Center (NAOC) and is a key component of the National Military Command System for the President, the Secretary of Defense, and the Joint Chiefs of Staff, recently transferred from Air Combat Command to Air Force Global Strike Command.

A transfer ceremony was held at Offutt Air Force Base, Neb., today,

commemorating the occasion. The Air Force's four E-4Bs are based out of Offutt.

"The Air Force is continuing on a path to improve how its nuclear forces are organized, trained and equipped," said Maj. Gen. Thomas Bussiere, Eighth Air Force commander who officiated the ceremony. "The E-4B may not function in the same capacity as our bomber force, but it certainly has a role to play within the nuclear enterprise and seems only fitting that it resides within the command responsible for nuclear operations."

The aircraft realignment is a part of a larger effort to centrally manage the Air Force's nuclear enterprise and supporting systems.

To improve central management of the nuclear enterprise, Secretary of the Air Force Deborah Lee James and former Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Mark A. Welsh directed that the Air Force create an organization with a clear line of communication between the president and members of the nuclear task forces. Air Force Global Strike Command was designated as the Air Force lead for Nuclear Command, Control and Communications or NC3. The nation's NC3 systems are vital for the president to collaborate with combatant commanders and communicate his authorities to the nuclear command.

As a key component of the National Military Command System, which keeps the president connected to nuclear and conventional forces around the world, the E-4B fell within the restructuring initiative.

Also acknowledged during the transfer ceremony was the activation of the 595th Command and Control

Group, the Eighth Air Force unit responsible for the E-4B.

"The realignment helps us better advocate for nuclear C2 and simplifies the chain of command," said Col. Robert Billings, 595th CACG commander. "One of my first steps as commander will be to address manpower needs and develop the group."

The 595th CACG is comprised of four squadrons: the 1st Airborne Command Control Squadron, which operates the aircraft; the 595th Strategic Communication Squadron, which provides real-time, secure, nuclear survivable missile warning and C3 capabilities; the 595th Aircraft Maintenance Squadron, responsible for sustainment and upkeep of the E-4B as well as the 625th Strategic Operations Squadron.

"Ultimately, the realignment of the E-4B and activation of the 595th CACG marks another step in our journey to strengthen the enterprise as our nuclear deterrent forces remain at the forefront of our nation's security," Bussiere said.





Fifty-second Eighth Air Force commander departs, new leader takes helm of bomber force

BARKSDALE AIR FORCE BASE, La.

Maj. Gen. Richard M. Clark, the 52nd commander of Eighth Air Force, relinquished command of the nation's bomber force to Maj. Gen. Thomas Bussiere during a change of command ceremony here today.

Formations of Airmen lined the ceremony as friends, family, local and state community leaders and Airmen across the bomber community paid tribute to Clark and welcomed the new commander.

The commander of Air Force Global Strike Command officiated the event.

"General Clark's accomplishments as commander have been no less than stellar," Gen. Robin Rand, AFGSC commander said. "No one has led this command better than Rich Clark."

In his final moments as commander, Clark reflected upon his time within "The Mighty Eighth."

"We are a family," Clark said. "As your commander, it has been the single greatest honor of my career to serve with this family. However, I will rest easy knowing that the Airmen here and your new commander will carry on the legacy of the greatest bomber force ever known."

With the passing of the Eighth Air Force flag, Bussiere officially became the 53rd commander of The Mighty Eighth, an organization with more than 20,000 Airmen and upwards

of 150 B-1, B-2 and B-52 bombers.

"The formation of bomber Airmen here today represent not only the strength of our Air Force, but the strength of our nation," Bussiere said. "There is not an Airman among you not responsible for making this the greatest bomber command in all of history."

However, more than one flag passed into the hands of the new commander during the ceremony.

As the leader for U.S. bomber forces, Bussiere assumed the role of commander of Joint Functional Component Command for Global Strike, which plans and executes strategic deterrence and global strike operations for U.S. Strategic Command. Additionally, Bussiere also commands Task Force 204, which oversees the Air Force nuclear bomber and reconnaissance activities in support of USSTRATCOM.

The roles and responsibilities as the leader of the Air Force's bomber force are many, but Bussiere said he remains eager for the challenge.

"Together we will nurture and care for our Airmen and our families. Together we will fly, fight and win. Together we will carry our legacy with us into the future and add even more firsts to the history books," Bussiere said. "The challenges are and will continue to be significant, but who better to meet those challenges than the Mighty Eighth."

Start the Conversation About Breast Cancer Risk October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month

BISMARCK, N.D. — In observation of Breast Cancer Awareness Month, the North Dakota Department of Health (NDDoH) encourages women to start the conversation about breast cancer risk with their healthcare provider. About one in eight North Dakotan women will get breast cancer during their life. Breast cancer remains the second leading cause of cancer deaths for women in the state. The American Cancer Society estimates that in 2016, 530 women will be diagnosed and 80 women will die from breast cancer in North Dakota. However, early detection, better treatment, and better follow-up care have made it possible for more women to survive breast cancer.

Breast cancer risk

factors include age, a family history of breast cancer, and personal behaviors. Limiting alcohol consumption to less than one drink a day, keeping a healthy weight, staying physically active, and maintaining a balanced diet are steps women can take to possibly reduce risk of developing breast cancer. Furthermore, women can take advantage of breast cancer screening tests, which may help find cancers early when they are easiest to treat.

Talk with your doctor about your risk factors for breast cancer and find out when and how often breast cancer screening is appropriate for you.

“While most women are aware of breast cancer, many do not take the steps to detect the disease in its early

stages,” said Susan Mormann, director of the Division of Cancer Prevention and Control for the NDDoH. “I encourage women to discuss their risk factors for breast cancer with their doctor. Together you can decide when to begin and how often to screen for breast cancer. This is something women can do to detect this disease earlier when it may be most treatable.”

For women who are concerned about the cost for cancer screening there are a number of options for financial assistance including Women’s Way (www.ndhealth.gov/womensway), Medicaid Expansion (www.nd.gov/dhs/medicaidexpansion), and Marketplace insurance plans (www.healthcare.gov/marketplace).

PRAIRIE ADVENTURES

Roosters are king. There’s no disputing that among upland bird hunters, the critter of choice is the glitzy, gaudy, and boisterous rooster pheasant.

Like many states, it’s illegal to shoot hen pheasants in North Dakota, which begs a question — why, when female partridge and grouse are legal, aren’t hen pheasants?

The bottom line, explained N.D. Game and Fish Department wildlife division chief Jeb Williams, is it’s a social thing: People don’t like the idea.

Maybe one reason is that it’s usually easy to differentiate hen and rooster pheasants. Granted, sometimes lighting is a tad tricky, a bird flies straight away, or it’s early in the season and young roosters might not be in full glitz mode. It’s those times when one of the cardinal rules of Hunter Education should kick into gear—don’t shoot what you can’t identify.

While there are differences in coloration between female and male partridge and sharptail grouse, it takes a skilled eye, excellent lighting conditions, and darned near perfect alignment of the stars for a hunter to make a positive identification between male and female.

There really isn’t a biological explanation not to harvest hen pheasants, Williams added. Granted, without trying to crawl into the mindset of the early wildlife managers who brought the Chinese import to the United States and North Dakota, it’s possible the reasoning for rooster-only regulations was to protect relatively small populations when first introduced, helping them to get a foothold. It made sense because it’s easy to tell the difference.

Whatever the reason for a rooster-only season, it’s so accepted there is no reason to change it.

Most pheasants harvested are young-of-the-year roosters, Williams de-

scribed.

Unlike big game where hunting and the gun are key to population management, hunting has limited influence on North Dakota’s upland game bird populations. The drivers in pheasant, grouse, and partridge numbers are weather, weather, and weather with a healthy dose of habitat mixed in.

Winter and good weather conditions during hatch are critical, Williams described.

It’s when upland bird species populations are low that factors such as hunting, predation, weather extremes, and human presence like vehicle collisions play a role in success or demise of a species.

North Dakota’s prairie chickens could be an example: While the two areas in the state with stable — and even increasing — prairie chicken populations a decade or so ago, several horrifically wet springs washed away nesting success. Populations once again declined. At that point, adding in hunting pressure and habitat loss, and the stars weren’t aligned in favor of prairie chicken numbers. The season has remained closed.


Sage grouse numbers have historically been low because North Dakota is on the far eastern fringe of their habitat range. Add in disease and habitat issues, and like prairie chickens, the birds just didn’t need hunting pressure.

However, they’re the exception.

The Game and Fish Department estimates hunters will have to work harder for their roosters this fall.

But folks afield can appreciate that pheasant, grouse, and even partridge populations allow for traditional daily and possession bag limits and season length traditions that hunters for generations have come to know, appreciate, and expect.

Ride 'Em, Cowboys

Magnificent Seven brings western past into focus with Hollywood present

The western pretty much trotted into the sunset decades ago, but every once in a while something gallops out of Hollywood that reminds us just what a big deal cowboys used to be. And the cowboy, as depicted and polished by Hollywood and pop culture, remains one of America's most potent mythic figures—a rugged, rustic, stoic, individualistic, self-sacrificing hero, good with a gun and sometimes even better with women.

The Magnificent Seven gets a lot of its retro dust honestly. For starters, it's a remake of a remake: The original Seven, in 1960, was an all-star Americanized version of a 1954 Japanese classic, Seven Samurai, in which a samurai warrior and six others band together to defend a village from marauding bandits.

Director Antoine Fuqua certainly knows how to make an action-packed project click into place, with clear-cut lines between good guys and bad guys, a lofty morality-lesson overlay and a dark undertow of bloody revenge.

The star here is clearly Denzel Washington—his collaboration with Fuqua in Training Day brought him an Oscar, and the two also worked together in The Equalizer. He plays sure-shot bounty hunter Sam Chisholm, who comes to the aid of a small frontier town under the rule of ruthless robber baron Bartholomew Bogue (Peter Sarsgaard) and his murderous cutthroat bodyguards. Bogue has poisoned the water supply, set fire to the church, enslaved the local men to work in his gold mine and demanded that the residents either sell out, move out—or else.

Beseched by a fire-brand widow (Haley Bennett) whose husband was killed by Bogue's thugs, Chisholm—whose very name evokes the title of

a 1970 John Wayne western, Chisum—assembles a group to help reclaim the town.

The multinational, cross-cultural rainbow coalition looks awesome onscreen, but it feels more like an Old West Suicide Squad—or a colorful team of Avengers assembled by way of High Noon—much more than an organic group of renegades and rogues, despite all the grime, grit, dirt, sweat, stubble and scruff.

Chris Pratt is heavy-drinking, wisecracking Josh Faraday, whose skill with cards helps him in more ways than one. Ethan Hawke's erudite former Confederate sharpshooter is haunted by ghosts of his wartime past. His Chinese partner (Byung-hun Lee) can do lethal wonders with any type of blade or firearm.

Manuel Garcia-Rulfo is a hunky Mexican outlaw whose vicious skillset makes him a valuable member of the seven. A young renegade Comanche (Martin Sensmeier) likes the gallant cause and wants to come aboard. Vincent D'Onofrio's big, Bible-quoting mountain man is a holy terror—and an audience favorite.

Bullets fly, bodies fall, blood flows, hooves thunder, jokey banter gets bantered, dynamite goes kaboom. There's a particularly twisty twist at the end that you won't see coming. You may catch—or imagine—wispily glimpses of the ghosts of Clint Eastwood, John Wayne and other western icons looming and lurking around the edges of some of the scenes.

With a winning combo of gunpowder and star power, The Magnificent Seven brings the cowboy past into focus with the Hollywood present. If you like your popcorn sprinkled with old-fashioned, good-guy gusto, it's as rip-roaring a time that's come along on horseback in years.



Rice Krispie Treat Monsters



INGREDIENTS:

For the Rice Krispie Treats:

¼ cup Butter
1 Bag Large Marshmallows (approx. 40 marshmallows)
½ teaspoon Vanilla Extract
6 cups Rice Krispies

For the Monster Coating:

Candy Melts (Pink, Orange, Blue and Vibrant Green)
Candy Eyes (Small, Medium and Large)
Cooking Oil

INSTRUCTIONS:

For the Rice Krispie Treats:

Spray a 9" x 13" baking pan with cooking spray. In a large pot, melt the butter over low heat until melted. Add the marshmallows and stir until completely melted and combined with the butter. Remove from the heat and add the vanilla extract and the Rice Krispies. Stir to combine. Pour the mixture into the baking pan. Using a spatula sprayed with cooking spray gently press down until the pan is evenly coated. Allow to cool until firm.

For the Monster Coating:

Melt approximately 1 cup of candy melts in a small bowl in the microwave at 50% power for 1 minute. Stir and then continue microwaving at 50% power for 30 seconds at a time until completely melted. Add approximately ½ teaspoon to 2 teaspoons cooking oil (the more you add the smoother the finish, but go slowly) to the melted candy melts and stir to combine. Dip the Rice Krispie Treats in the candy melts and set on parchment paper. Gently press the candy eyes into the candy melt coating to create your monster faces. Gently push the eyes slightly up towards the top of the monster's "head" to create upper eye lids. Allow to cool at room temperature for approximately 40 minutes or until candy melts have completely hardened.



AF agreement enables collaboration on aircraft anti-icing technology

The Air Force Life Cycle Management Center and Battelle Memorial Institute established a cooperative research and development agreement to develop affordable, lightweight, easily adaptable ice protection technology.

In order to achieve maximum operational performance, unmanned aircraft systems must be able to complete missions in adverse weather conditions, such as light to moderate icing. Decreased flight performance and aborted missions occur when a UAS is unable to meet these challenges.

For the Air Force, this agreement supports research and development efforts for discovering an

ice protection system that contributes to enhanced performance and less aborted missions. These types of agreements also allow the Air Force to explore technological developments without committing funding.

"From a traditional viewpoint, technological advancements achieved as a result of this collaboration would not have been made possible without structured and formalized research and development agreements," said Maj. Andrew Soine, Intelligence, Surveillance and Reconnaissance Technology Development chief. "These agreements allow the Air Force to express a mutual interest in the future of the technology as both parties

collaborate for a solution by utilizing resources other than taxpayer money."

As of recently, the final stages for developing a cutting-edge ice protection system that uses a carbon nanotube dispersant as a resistive heater for anti-ice/de-ice capability are being conducted by Battelle. Coupled with an autonomous, intelligent, closed-loop controller, the system provides the lowest size, weight, and power electrothermal solution available.

In addition, this agreement will allow Battelle to continue to test and validate their research and development efforts on test wings and engine air inlets from operational systems. Battelle will also

leverage their collaboration with the Air Force for acquiring additional external funding through various proposals and grants.

"Access to government furnished equipment allowed Battelle to validate multiple modeling and simulation tests and brought developments to the current integration stage on operational aircraft," said Randy Johnson, Battelle's program manager. "This

agreement will also allow the Air Force to provide us with detailed technical information required for the actual integration."

The Air Force Technology Transfer Program was created to link technology, the Air Force mission, and the commercial marketplace by ensuring that Air Force science and engineering activities are transferred or intentionally shared with state and local governments, academia and industry.

Flexible batteries: Evolving energy for the 'new' reality

WRIGHT-PATTERSON AIR FORCE BASE, Ohio (AFNS) -- It's a \$7 million research industry today, expected to be worth \$400 million by 2025. For researchers at the Air Force Research Laboratory's Materials and Manufacturing Directorate, the "energy" spent in this research area is worth much more.

By using highly conductive, flexible carbon nanotube mats, scientists here have developed a new type of flexible lithium-ion battery that not only stores energy, but can be folded, bent and manipulated hundreds of times without voltage fluctuations, revolutionizing power sources for the warfighter technology of today.

"It's time to 'rethink' energy," said Ryan Kohlmeyer, a materials research scientist with UES, Inc. and contractor at AFRL. "There is great interest in flexible electronics. People want to have things like wearable sensors and flexible displays that need power. Traditional lithium-ion batteries, which are hard and rigid, need to evolve to meet the new reality."

Lithium-ion batteries are common in many home and portable electronics, including computers, mobile phones and wearable fitness trackers. Compared to traditional batteries, lithium-ion batteries charge faster, last longer and have a high-energy capacity, enabling them to deliver a large amount of power in a small package.

Given these benefits, lithium-ion batteries

provide a platform for powering small sensors and battlefield devices -- if the form factor can be changed to meet the application needs.

"If you're moving around in the field, you don't want to wear something that is bulky and rigid," Kohlmeyer said. "Flexible batteries are conformal, meaning that they can move with the person and the device they power. The applications for this type of technology are limitless."

Traditional lithium-ion batteries consist of a negative electrode, or anode, and a positive electrode, or cathode, coated on a metal foil current collector. Between these electrodes is a thin polymer separator, which keeps the electrodes from touching and allows lithium ions to pass through during charging or discharging.

To fabricate their flexible power source, Kohlmeyer and fellow researcher Aaron Blake, a graduate student at Wright State University, exchanged the commonly used metal foil current collectors for chemical vapor deposition-grown carbon nanotube mats. Carbon nanotubes are known to be highly conductive and extremely strong -- two features a flexible battery would need in order to generate power in diverse forms.

The researchers prepared the batteries by placing a separator between a carbon nanotube-based anode and cathode that they then encapsulated in a thin, flexible plastic film. The battery was then charged and placed under mechanical testing where it was bent and creased to see if it could perform

consistently under extreme mechanical abuse.

The battery's performance exceeded expectations, maintaining a steady voltage even after more than 288 folds and manipulations. In contrast, a similar device made with traditional metal foil current collectors showed a performance loss with each crease and catastrophic fracture after only 94 folds.

"The voltage of the flexible battery remained steady even when it was flexed or creased hundreds of times. We only started to lose power when the material encapsulating our battery began to allow moisture to get inside the system and degrade the electrolyte and active materials," Kohlmeyer said. "We believe that our system is way ahead of anything else in this area."

The research team, led by Dr. Michael F. Durstock and supported by Dr. Les Lee, with funding from the Air Force Office of Scientific Research, has filed a provisional patent related to this system and is excited at the potential to see the technology get into the field.

"Flexible batteries are a natural extension of AFRL's research in flexible electronics. Our battery can help meet the new power needs for flexible devices. We now know that we can completely deform batteries and still get excellent performance. The implications are enormous," Kohlmeyer said.

As human performance sensors and flexible device development continues, the flexible battery will be there to meet the power needs of the future.

KEESLER AIR FORCE BASE, Miss. (AFNS) -- The Air Force Reserve's 53rd Weather Reconnaissance Squadron has been conducting around-the-clock operations flying into Hurricane Matthew to collect critical weather data for the National Hurricane Center in Miami to improve the center's computer models that forecast movement and intensity.

The squadron, part of the 403rd Wing and better known as the Hurricane Hunters, has been flying the storm since Sept. 26. They started flying the storm from the Henry Rohlsen Airport, St. Croix, U.S. Virgin Islands, and moved operations to Keesler Air Force Base Oct. 5.

Hurricane Matthew formed off the coast of Africa in late September, became a hurricane Sept. 29 and rapidly intensified to Category 5. It hit Haiti Oct. 4, the Bahamas Oct. 6, and made its way up the Florida coastline Oct. 7 as a Category 2 storm.

First Lt. J. Kelsie Carpenter was the aerial reconnaissance weather officer on a flight that left at

4 a.m. Oct. 7 and returned at 2 p.m. In addition to the aerial reconnaissance weather officer, the crew consists of a pilot, co-pilot, navigator and a weather loadmaster. They work together to collect vital data on a storm's intensity and direction that assists the NHC with their forecasts and storm warnings.

"We got a lot of good information and data today," Carpenter said. "We learned it's a strong storm; it's slowly weakening, but its proximity to coast is why it's important and why we are flying it around the clock."

To gather this data, the aircrew flew through the eye of Hurricane Matthew six times to locate the low-pressure center and circulation of the storm. During each pass through the eye, they released a dropsonde, which collects weather data on its descent to the ocean surface, measuring wind speed and direction, temperature, dew point and pressure. During storm flights, the aircrews transmit weather data via satellite communication every 10 minutes to the NHC.

On Oct. 7, the Hurricane Hunters found winds up to 120 mph at an elevation of 10,000 feet and 110 mph at the surface, said Carpenter.

"With this kind of storm, where it's so close to the East Coast, any variation or diversion in track, whether that's five or 10 miles, can mean a lot to those people who live in those impacted areas. The more accurate information we get the more they can fine tune the forecast and keep people safe," Carpenter said.

The storm currently has taken more than 800 lives and left thousands without power.

Capt. Lucas Caulder, a 53rd WRS pilot who has flown through the eye of Matthew 27 times, stressed the importance of heeding storm warnings and evacuation orders. He said he is proud of the mission and service the Hurricane Hunters provide to the people in the community and the U.S.

"This way people can make an informed decision on whether to hunker down or get out of town," he said.

Non-rated Line Officer board rescheduled

JOINT BASE SAN ANTONIO-RANDOLPH, Texas (AFNS) -- During fiscal year 2016 line officer recruiting, all 1,107 jobs for fiscal 2017 were filled, as well as the first quarter of fiscal 2018.

While more than 2,800 applications were received and 1,833 candidates selected, the sheer numbers have resulted in a postponing of the October 2016 Non-rated Line Officer board.

According to Air Force Recruiting Service, the delay will allow recruiting officials to decrease the queue before filling additional fiscal 2018 vacancies, resulting in shorter wait times for training. Current wait times range from 18 to 20 months.

Although the board has been delayed, AFRS will not accept new applications to meet the March 2017 board and active-duty applicants will not be notified of the delay on an individual basis. Rather, an announcement will be posted on the "Apply for a Commission" page on the Air Force Portal and recruiters will contact civilian applicants.

Results from the selection board are

expected to be released in April 2017.

Because of the delay, recruiting personnel recognize many candidates may no longer meet some requirements, such as age or time on station. In these cases, applicants are encouraged to work with their recruiters, military personnel flights or installation education offices to submit any necessary waivers.

While the delay may cause issues for some applicants, it also has the added benefit of increasing the percentage of candidates selected for a commission, as more vacancies become available.

In addition to delaying the October 2016 Non-rated Line Officer board, AFRS is moving to smaller, more frequent boards beginning in mid-fiscal 2017, in a further effort to reduce wait times. Board dates are expected to be released at least 30 days prior to the application cutoff date and will focus on selecting candidates for specific career fields available at the time of the board.
