All gave some, some gave all

MINOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. -- Every year, a day is set aside to remember those who have fallen in the line of duty. The 5th Logistics Readiness Squadron vehicle operations flight at Minot Air Force Base wanted to build a memorial to recognize their fellow vehicle operators who were killed in action and honor them every single day.

"With the younger generation that is coming into the military, they need to understand, no matter what AFSC, we have history," said Tech Sgt. Justin Wilkersen, 5th Logistics Readiness Squadron training and validation NCOIC. "We need to instill our legacy into the next generation."

To do so, the 5th LRS built a 4-by-8 shadow box commemorating those who gave the ultimate sacrifice in support of the mission from 2003-2011.

"In that time frame we lost three vehicle operators and four security forces members who were on the convoy missions," said Wilkersen. Back in 2003, the Army asked the Air Force to give them vehicle operators to support with convoy operations in Iraq and Afghanistan. Vehicle operators along with security forces members stepped up to the plate to help the Army.

"The biggest thing for us is to pay homage to those that made the ultimate sacrifice," said Wilkersen. "We wanted to honor them by building this shadow box."

The box consists of pictures of all of the individuals that were killed in action. Above their pictures is their name, location and date they were killed. Under their pictures are the medals they were awarded. There are also other items in the box that are significant for vehicle operators and security forces members who did those missions such as a training M4, a training M9 as well as a K-9 training collar.

"We started in October of 2016 and finished January

2017," said Senior Airman Jakeb Newlan, 5th Logistics Readiness Squadron vehicle operator/dispatcher. "We are all really excited. Most of the time when you see a shadow box, it's not that big, it's something small that one person can carry."

With the help of local and national companies, the shadow box was recently completed and ready for display. Fargo glass donated the plexiglass and Vanguard donated the medals that each individual had earned, 24 in total.

"Numerous Airmen from the vehicle operations shop pitched in to help build the box," said Wilkersen. "It really has been a team effort, with Senior Airman Newlan and Staff Sgt. Richard Gajewski as the leads. They have been the two to take the project to a whole new level."

The shadow box will be displayed in the main entrance of the vehicle ops building. Along with the shadow box, there will be a set of boots with a rifle and helmet, known as the battlefield cross.

"We don't want these guys to be forgotten about," said Wilkersen. "They made the ultimate sacrifice, the least we could do is get their names out there and keep it going, continue their legacy. The biggest end game is to make sure they are always honored and never forgotten."

Operation Supplement Safety keeps Airmen healthy

Military readiness has been defined by the ability of a military unit to accomplish its assigned mission.

The Air Force Surgeon General Public Affairs office states Airmen should eat healthy and exercise regularly to maintain peak performance, although many Airmen resort to dietary supplements.

Operation Supplement Safety is a joint educational campaign between the Human Performance Resource Center and the Department of Defense that educates the warfighter and healthcare provider on responsible dietary supplement use.

While some supplements such as multivitamins are generally safe, other supplements can pose a hazard to health and jeopardize careers from ingredients that cause a positive urine drug screen.

"One third of Airmen

report using legal body building supplements and one in six report weight loss supplements in the past year," said Col. (Dr.) John Oh, the chief of health promotion for the Air Force Medical Support Agency. "Body building and weight loss supplements, as well as sexual enhancement and diabetes supplements, are high-risk categories that should raise red flags."

Ephedra is a cautionary tale of a problematic dietary supplement. Heavily marketed as a supplement to help improve athletic performance and promote weight loss, serious health events, including deaths first reported in the military, led the Food and Drug Administration to ban ephedra in 2004.

The OPSS website contains videos, fact sheets, FAQs and briefings to help Airmen make informed, responsible decisions on supplement use, as well as an "Ask the Expert" feature in which Airmen can directly pose a question to a supplement expert.

"The OPSS website is a must read source for Airmen, commanders, first shirts, superintendents and their healthcare providers," Oh said. "People think if a dietary supplement is sold on base, it must be safe, but that's not necessarily true."

Unlike prescription meds, the FDA does not approve dietary supplements for safety and effectiveness prior to marketing.

"For prescription drugs, the manufacturer must show that the drug works and is safe before putting it on market," Oh said. "But most supplements are marketed first, and the burden is on the FDA to prove they are unsafe."

Since supplements may contain certain prescription and illegal drugs, Airmen may put their careers at risk with a positive drug screen. Service members who choose to use supplements are encouraged to stick with brands that have undergone third party certification by independent companies such as USP, Informed Choice, NSF International and ConsumerLab. com. Third party certification does not guarantee that the supplement is safe or effective, but does validate manufacturing practices, purity, and/or quality for accurate labels.

Airmen are encouraged to be strong Wingmen for each other and help spread the word on supplement safety.

"The aim of Operation Supplement Safety is to not stamp out supplement use," Oh said. "We want Airmen who use supplements to be informed consumers and choose wisely." For more


54TH HS SAFEGUARDS THE MISSILE COMPLEX

Jamestown's Lyle Hanson educator, legislator, basketball official, and dedicated hunter - has another credit to his long list of accomplishments: Founder and compiler of the North Dakota Big Game Records Book.

After more than two decades and six editions of the book, published every four years, Hanson passed the torch with the words, "Pat, I want you to take over the book."

The phone call came as a surprise. Lyle cherished the opportunity to compile the information, meeting and visiting with hunters and their families and friends as they talked about the hunt that would yield such a treasured animal.

And to be asked - actually, to be told – you were the one to assume that role takes one aback.

But Lyle wanted to retire and enjoy more time at his Spiritwood Lake cabin, fishing, and hunting.

So the book is now in my creative care. It's an honor and privilege to carry on a tradition two extremely talented individuals launched almost 25 years ago.

Lyle had a partner in the background urging him on when he established the North Dakota Big Game Records Book- the late Jim McKenzie.

Jim, long time N.D. Game and Fish Department big game biologist, was instrumental in North Dakota's big game management for decades:

Bighorn sheep.

He was deeply involved in bringing the grand species back onto the North Dakota

Badlands landscape. He was instrumental in

edition.

Records Book seventh edition will be published in the spring of 2017. It will have some tweaks compared to previous editions, but then again, Lyle often tweaked each edition, as well. More than anything, nearly 25 years ago.

many North American big game species. He hunted ducks, geese, and upland game.

As a legislator, he generally had the sportsman and sportswoman's back.

And he has the backs of North Dakota's wildlife.

He cares deeply about wildlife and their habitat they call home.

Other states have books similar to the "North Dakota Big Game Records Book".

Jim felt North Dakota's big game animals deserved recognition.

Lyle agreed.

They also agreed that qualifying minimums for white-tailed deer typical and non-typical, mule deer typical and non-typical antlers, moose, elk, and pronghorn needed to be somewhere between standard minimums established by the Boone and Crockett Club for firearms and Pope and Young's archery qualifiers.

And so it came to be.

The North Dakota Big Game Records Book, first edition, was published in 1993, a mix of short histories of the state's big game species, listings of qualifying animals - including actual measurements - beautiful pen-and-ink big game illustrations, understanding of "fair chase", and copies of Boone and Crockett scoring forms for each species, as well.

Lyle tweaked the book over the years but the constant was including new qualifiers in every updated







Roasted Red Pepper, Mozzerella and Basil Stuffed Chicken



INGREDIENTS:

4 boneless skinless chicken breasts

8 ounces fresh mozzarella, sliced into 8 slices 1 12 oz jar of roasted red peppers sliced into 1 inch pieces (about two whole red peppers if you roast your own)

1 bunch of basil, whole leaves

1/4 cup fresh grated parmesan

1 tablespoon Italian seasoning Salt and pepper for seasoning

INSTRUCTIONS:

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Grease a 9x12 casserole dish. Butterfly chicken breasts by slicing into the long side of the breast, stopping just about 1/4 of an inch from the opposite side. Lay chicken breast in casserole dish opened up. Sprinkle the exposed insides of the chicken breast with 1/2 of the Italian seasoning and salt and pepper. Stack the roasted red pepper, basil, and 1 slice of the mozzarella on the bottom side of the chicken. Fold the top flap of the chicken over, tucking in the mozzarella, basil and roasted red pepper as necessary. Sprinkle with the remaining Italian seasoning. Bake chicken for 30-40 minutes (until chicken is no longer pink). Pull chicken out of oven and turn the oven to a high broil. Top chicken with remaining mozzarella slices and sprinkle with Parmesan cheese. Broil until cheese is browned and bubbly, about 5 minutes.


Brownie Batter Coffee 9ce Cream INGREDIENTS:

1 - 14 ounce can sweetened condensed milk cup mini chocolate chips 1 1/4 cup dry brownie mix 2 Tablespoons oil 4 Tablespoons water

INSTRUCTIONS:

Sprinkle the instant coffee over the whipping cream. Stir gently until dissolved. Beat on high until stiff peaks form. Beat the cream cheese until creamy. Slowly beat in the sweetened condensed milk Fold the whipping cream into the cream cheese mixture. Stir in the chocolate chips gently. Stir together the brownie mix, oil, and water. Spoon 1/3 of the ice cream mixture into a bowl. Swirl in 1/3 of brownie mixture. Repeat 2 more times. Freeze for 6 hours. Makes about 8 cups ice cream. Keep frozen. Notes *Freeze your metal bowl and mixer attachment for at least 30 minutes before whipping the cream.





Air-launched cruise missile passes tests

KIRTLAND AIR FORCE BASE, N.M., --Air Force B-52H

Stratofortress aircrews recently tested three unarmed AGM-86B airlaunched cruise missiles, demonstrating the bomber force's ability to configure, load, fly and deliver the nation's only nuclear cruise missile.

The B-52H aircrews departed Minot Air Force Base, North Dakota, for the Utah Test and Training Range, about 80 miles west of Salt Lake City, Utah, and launched the unarmed ALCMs during three separate sorties.

The ALCM is a key air component of the nuclear triad, providing the nation a strategic capability to assure our allies and deter potential adversaries. It provides a clear, visible and tailorable deterrent effect, and denies geographic sanctuaries to potential adversaries.

The AGM-86B is designed to deliver a nuclear payload on target, destroying it on impact. As a standoff weapon, the ALCM can be launched from outside the combat area, allowing aircrews to strike distant targets with a high degree of accuracy without exposing themselves to potentially deadly enemy fire. A B-52H can carry six ALCMs on each of the two externally-mounted pylons and eight internally on a rotary launcher, giving the B-52H a maximum

capacity of 20 missiles.

The ALCM sustainment program is managed by the Air Force Nuclear Weapons Center and the tests were conducted under Air Force Global Strike Command's Nuclear Weapon System Evaluation Program, part of the Air Force's ongoing effort to test weapons systems in training missions and prepare aircrews for future mission requirements. The integrated test team also included personnel, assets and aircraft from AFGSC's 5th Bomb Wing at Minot AFB, its 2nd Bomb Wing at Barksdale AFB, Louisiana, and Air Combat Command's 53rd Wing at Eglin AFB, Florida.

The ALCM was initially designed with a 10-year life span but has been in use for about 35 years, largely due to successful sustainment programs. While the current ALCM remains a safe, secure, effective and viable nuclear capability, it faces increasing sustainment and operational challenges against emerging threats as it continues to age. The Long Range Stand Off weapon is being developed to replace the ALCM, which the Air Force expects to start fielding by 2030.

"The LRSO will be a critical element of the United States' nuclear deterrence strategy, but we must continue to support the ALCM program until it is fielded and these recent

tests are clear indicators of the ALCM's effectiveness and reliability," said Maj. Gen. Scott Jansson, AFNWC commander and Air Force program executive officer for Strategic Systems.

The LRSO weapon system will be a costeffective force multiplier for B-52, B-2 and B-21 aircraft to credibly deter adversaries and assure U.S. allies of our deterrent capabilities. Currently in source selection, up to two LRSO contracts are expected to be awarded in the fourth quarter of fiscal 2017.

About 200 personnel in AFNWC's Air-Delivered Capabilities Directorate deliver, sustain and support air-delivered nuclear weapon systems. The directorate is located at Kirtland AFB and oversees locations at Tinker AFB, Oklahoma; Eglin AFB, Florida; Joint Base San Antonio, Texas: Ramstein AB, Germany; Robins AFB, Georgia; and Wright-Patterson AFB. Ohio. The ALCM sustainment program is managed at the Tinker AFB location.

The AFNWC is responsible for synchronizing all aspects of nuclear materiel management on behalf of Air Force Materiel Command in direct support of AFGSC. Headquartered at Kirtland AFB, the center has about 1,000 personnel assigned at 17 locations worldwide.







