Black History Month: A proud Airman's inspirations

MINOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. -- "My mom told me to live life with no regrets. Any opportunity I thought I could excel at, she told me to not be afraid to put that first foot in the door."

For Staff Sgt. De'Mario Greene, 54th Helicopter Squadron special missions aviator, his mother's words are something he thinks about often. He takes risks, works hard and takes advantage of the opportunities in front of him, he said.

'My mom always held me to a higher standard," he said. "It was intense sometimes, but I grew up to appreciate

Greene, a Hampton, Virginia native, heeded his mother's advice when he decided to join the Air Force. She fell ill after a bad chemical reaction to medication, and Greene stepped up to care for her. Despite finishing in the top 10% in his high school, he forwent college and enlisted in the U.S. Air Force instead. "Since I've joined the

Air Force, I know this is the greatest opportunity I could've taken after high school," Greene said. "I've been to 38 different states, meet new people, see different cultures and backgrounds. I'm thankful to be here."

Background stories are important to Greene. While he loves learning about others' stories, he takes pride in his own too.

"I think right now, being black in the Air Force and still having pride of where you come from is important," Greene said. "Emotions are really high in the black community right now, but I think about all the things I'm able to take advantage of now, it just gives me hope. We can get through this.'

Although Greene may have been swayed to enlist because of his mother's encouragement, he has since learned to appreciate the men who paved the way for African American service members, especially during the month of February.

"When I think about Black

History Month, I think about what steps were taken for me to be in the position I'm in right now," Greene said. "The Tuskegee Airmen are a huge inspiration. If you look at all the history and the acts they did, especially when we needed them the most, I don't think I would be able to be in this position if it wasn't for them."

Greene also credits Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and Langston Hughes as having an impact on his life. He believes their words and actions changed the culture for all African Americans.

"Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. is the prime example of

why we have diversity in the Air Force today," Greene said. "And Langston Hughes, he stood for freedom. You have to be that way in life. Never doubt yourself. If you have a goal, make a plan and execute."

Although black history is only celebrated one month out of the year, Greene has made it a priority to honor his rich heritage every single day, not just in his personal life, but in uniform too.

"I am black in the Air force, and I am successful," Greene said. "You have to remember where you come from. All these people put in so much time to actually

show the world we want to matter, we do matter, and you matter to us as well."

Greene is a proud man. He celebrates the men and women who fought so desperately for what he has today. He cherishes his roots, roots that started back in Hampton with tough, motivating words from the biggest inspiration in his life: his mother.

A child's accomplishments are a result of education, whether from school, home or from interacting with others. However, not every child learns the same way.

Sometimes, children need a little help to discover how they learn and focus on it. Those who have special needs need more help than others.

The Air Force can provide assistance through the Exceptional Family Member Program. The EFMP is a mandatory enrollment process that ensures the availability of educational and medical services required for your family members who have special needs prior to reassignment.

"The overarching goal

for the EFMP is to provide support to families that have a family member with special needs," said Nancy Bowers, 5th Force Support Squadron community readiness consultant.

The EFMP has three components: medical, assignments and family support. All components work cooperatively to identify a child who has educational, developmental or mental health needs.

"The Air Force defines a special medical need as any condition that cannot be resolved by a family practice physician and requires ongoing care or treatment by a specialist," said Bowers.

After a child is identified to need special help, **EFMP-Family Support** ensures the family receives as much help as required.

"Our role is to keep up to date on resources that are available in the community so we can help get their

needs met," said Bowers. They work with EFMP families to refer them to community based services, coordinate training and connect them with resources.

"I would refer to my database and see in the community who is available," said Bowers. "They can also check out material from our resource center."

The Airman & Family Readiness Center has a library of books and DVDs that address all special needs issues, as well as online resources.

The program holds free events for EFMP families.

"We receive grant money from the Air Force and

we hold events throughout the year for the families," said Bowers.

EFMP is scheduled to host a painting class for all EFMPenrolled school-age children at the Arts and Crafts Center on base Feb. 4 from 11 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Parents must register by noon on Feb. 2.

75 years of American Airmen: Past, present, future

ARKSDALE AIR FORCE BASE, La. - On Feb. 1, 1942, the history of today's 8th Air Force began to write its story. With milestones such as the Doolittle Raid and Operation Linebacker II, it's no surprise that the 8th Air Force made a lasting legacy and is known today as the "Mighty Eighth."

Lining the corridors of the historic 8th Air Force headquarters building at Barksdale Air Force Base are photographs, paintings and mementos that illustrate

to all Airmen who walk the halls the triumphant history and feats the Eighth has made over the past 75 years.

Today's Mighty Eighth actually activated under the designation of VIII Bomber Command (BC) at Langley Field, Virginia, as part of an expansion of the U.S. Army Air Corps during World War II. The VIII BC was a subordinate unit to the former 8th Air Force, today known as U.S. Air Forces in Europe that relocated to Savannah, Georgia, within days after settling in Virginia. Soon after, the VIII BC deployed to the European theater of

operations where it found a permanent war-time home at the former Wycombe Abbey School for Girls in High Wycombe, England, under its first commander, Ira C. Eaker.

"Some monikers from WWII have stood the test of time and are still in use today across the command," said Lane Callaway, 8th Air Force historian.

For example, the wartime codename for the VIII BC headquarters was "pinetree," and now is the name of the command conference room in the Eighth's headquarters building, where meetings address issues impacting worldwide operations and items of national interest.

However, with great feats also come trial and tragedy. From May 1942 to July 1945, the Eighth was responsible for America's daylight and strategic bombing campaign against Nazi-occupied Europe. With this responsibility, the Eighth suffered large losses. Out of 115,332 troops, more than 47,000 were taken out of the fight, including more than 26,000 killed in action. With this, the Eighth's brave men, from general officer to enlisted, earned 17 Medals of Honor, 220 Distinguished Service Crosses and 442,000 Air Medals.

On Feb. 28, 1944, the VIII BC was given the official designation of 8th Air Force. By mid-1944, the Eighth received its nickname, the Mighty Eighth, in recognition of its strength and ability to

send more than 2,000 four-engine bombers and 1,000 fighters in a single mission against enemy targets in Europe. The unit was composed of more than 200,000 people.

Finally in January 1975, Eighth Air Force moved to Barksdale, its ninth location and has since called the Bossier City and Shreveport area home. Barksdale also serves as the unit's longest standing home station in its history.

While the Mighty Eighth was born into battle in the 1940s, its influence and impact can be seen spanning the post WWII and modern day eras.

The Mighty Eighth has participated in a string of contingency operations in support of bomber assurance and deterrence missions using the world's most advanced and equipped bombers. Some examples being:

1. 1991: Gulf War involving the 2nd Bomb Wing 2. 1996: **OPERATION** DESERT STRIKE against Iraq

3. 1998: Operation DESERT FOX against

4. 1999: Operation ALLIED FORCE

Pembina Gorge's forested valley serves as an ideal backdrop for snowmobiling, and the nearby Frost Fire Ski Area features a snow-tubing area that is ideal fun for all ages (http://www.parkrec. nd.gov/recreationareas/ pgra/pgra.html). Huff Hills is North Dakota's largest ski area and skiers and snowboarders have access to four lifts, a range of terrain and opportunities for free lessons from available ski patrol (http://huffhills.com/). Bottineau's Winter Park,

in the Turtle Mountains, is a family-friendly ski resort featuring five lifts, nine trails and night skiing (http://skibwp.com/). If the solitude of cross country skiing appeals to you there is an array of groomed trails - rated from novice to advanced – in North Dakota's state parks (http:// www.parkrec.nd.gov/ activities/skiing.html).

The winter of 2016-2017 is taking a deadly toll on stressed wildlife.

Vehicles are crushing deer along highways to the point described by a game warden as "gruesome."

Sadly, highways are often the easiest way for deer to travel with so much snow blanketing the countryside. Plus, it's easier for predators to catch deer and other wildlife struggling to maneuver through heavy snow.

Some snowmobiles and tracked vehicle users are compounding the situation by traveling in some of the remaining available shelter wildlife. "Wildlife are just trying to survive this tough winter," Report All Poachers (RAP) committee member Pat Lothspeich described.

Animals forced out of cover by motorized vehicles are more vulnerable to predators, expending valuable fat reserves needed to survive a sustained hard winter. "The more times wildlife is forced from cover the more stress is put on them. This could mean the difference of wildlife surviving the winter or dying," he explained.

Snowmobile and tracked vehicle usage has become so bad on several Game and Fish Department Wildlife Management Areas (WMA) the RAP committee, a statewide organization administering the Report All Poachers Program, is offering \$250 rewards to anyone reporting snowmobile or tracked vehicles on WMAs.

The group didn't stop there: A \$500 reward is offered to anyone reporting harassing, chasing or killing any wildlife with snowmobiles or tracked vehicles.

Any type of wildlife, including coyotes. "Anywhere in the state, not just WMAs," Lothspeich added.

The committee isn't anti-snowmobile Lothspeich stressed. "Most snowmobile operators have been good about staying away from

wildlife and WMAs but we seem to have a problem with a few of them. Every time they (wildlife) get forced out (of cover), it lessens their chances of survival."

The Wilton WMA near Wilton and Henderson WMA east of Bismarck are "all torn up," Lothspeich described. While busting deer, pheasants, and other wildlife out of cover can be unintentional, snowmobiling or driving tracked vehicles on WMAs isn't accidental, Lothspeich continued: WMAs are expressly signed regarding vehicular usage and snowmobiles are pro-

Not only could reporting a violation net someone a \$250 or \$500 reward, it could prove costly to the violator: Snowmobile use on a WMA is \$100 noncriminal citation. However, Lothspeich added that game wardens could issue driving off trail citations or the perpetrator charged with a Class B misdemeanor if caught harassing or chasing wildlife. While it might not sound like much, Lothspeich reminded people that a guilty verdict could net a \$1,000 fine, possible 30 days in jail, and the real kicker – potential confiscation of the snowmobile or tracked vehicle.

Wildlife of all sizes and types are stressed even with the January reprieve. Extremely stressed.

As snow piles up there are fewer places to find shelter. The solution is simple: Watch for wildlife.

Avoid winter cover, including thickets, cattails, and woody areas.

Stay away from any visible wildlife.







Peanut Butter Dog Treats



INGREDIENTS:

2/3 cup pumpkin puree 1/4 cup peanut butter

3 cups whole wheat flour, or more, as needed

INSTRUCTIONS:

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper or a silicone baking mat; set aside. In the bowl of an electric mixer fitted with the paddle attachment, beat pumpkin puree, peanut butter and eggs on medium-high until well combined, about 1-2 minutes. Gradually add 2 1/2 cups flour at low speed, beating just until incorporated. Add an additional 1/4 cup flour at a time just until the dough is no longer sticky. Working on a lightly floured surface, knead the dough 3-4 times until it comes together. Using a rolling pin, roll the dough to 1/4-inch thickness. Using cookie cutters, cut out desired shapes and place onto the prepared baking sheet. Place into oven and bake until the edges are golden brown, about 20-25 minutes.* Let cool completely.

"As part of the presentation software segment, the students must present their presentation to a panel of judges," Repnow said.

The school with the most points for placements in all competitions will receive a sweepstakes trophy. Participating high schools are Berthold, Bowbells, Burke Central, Des Lacs-Burlington, Kenmare, Max, Nedrose, Powers Lake, Stanley, Surrey, TGU Granville, TGU Towner, Tioga, Underwood and Westhope.

BIT faculty members and business teachereducation students will supervise the competition, which starts at 9:30 a.m. in Old Main and the Conference Center. At 11:45 a.m., Vernon Dosch, president and chief executive officer of National Information Solutions Cooperative, is the keynote speaker in the Conference Center. An awards ceremony is scheduled for 12:30 p.m. in the Conference Center.

an army medic, then earned a doctorate from University of Tennessee. He was professor and curator in the Museum of Vertebrate Zoology, University of California, Berkeley and began teaching at Cornell University in 1999. Greene's honors include Berkeley's Distinguished Edward O. Wilson Naturalist Award; American Society of Ichthyologists presidency and Herpetologists; and Cornell's Stephen H. Weiss Presidential Fellowship. In 2014, Business Insider named him one of Cornell's "Top Ten Professors," and he was elected to the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. His book, "Snakes: the Evolution of Mystery in Nature." won a PEN Literary Award, garnered a twopage spread in Time magazine and made the New York Times' annual list of 100 Most Notable Books.

a.m. to noon, the Cyril Moore Science Center will host a variety of biology activities about evolution, geared toward high school level students. Home schooled students are welcome. Individuals may tour the greenhouse and research labs. On the greenhouse tours, they will learn about plant diversity. At noon in Aleshire Theater, guest artist Jessica Christy will present "The Evolving Narrative: Keeping Tradition in the Contemporary."







against the Federal Republic of Yugoslavia -- bombers flew 325 sorties to drop over 7 million pounds of ordnance on enemy targets.

Even in today's operations, Eighth Air Force's bomber presence is felt globally.

The Mighty Eighth continues to maintain a continuous bomber presence in the Pacific where B-1s not only deter aggression, but assure our allies that the U.S. is committed to international security. In the Central Command region, B-52s carry out a bombing campaign against ISIS, ISIL forces. And the B-2 operates globally as well, most recently seen striking terrorist training camps in Libya.

"There is no doubt that Mighty Eighth forces are as relevant today as they were in the early years," said Callaway.

Today, the 8th Air Force celebrates its 75th anniversary; 75 years of progression, strength, national assurance and pride. The Mighty Eighth commands the U.S. Air Force's entire fleet of longrange, stealth and heavybombers, in addition to the recently added E4-B National Airborne Operations Center

To commemorate the occasion, bomber Airmen from across the country have gathered at Barksdale AFB for a special retreat and flyover. Additional scheduled events include a building dedication, memorial run, WWII veteran dog tag presentation and a gala hosted by a local support organization to commemorate the American Airmen of the Mighty Eighth.

Within the next decade, the

Eighth will boast their newest capability -- the B-21 Raider -- a long-range strike bomber, named after the surprise attack against Japan during WWII in 1942 -- the Doolittle Raid. This bomber will play in allowing the Air Force to operate in tomorrow's high end threat environment, and in providing the Air Force the flexibility and capability to launch from the continental U.S. and deliver air strikes on any location in the world. The Air Force plans to field the initial capability of the bomber in the mid-2020s.

"I am extremely proud to be part of a unit engrained with such a rich heritage," said Maj. Gen. Thomas Bussiere, 8th Air Force commander. "From early on, Eighth Air Force has played a major role in our nation's security, and we will carry that legacy into the future."


