## Seeking higher education part one

Education is often a door left unopened by many who have been provided the chance.

Some with this opportunity may make a decision on their education based on their location or a recent fad, but that may not be the best for them.

The Education Center on Minot Air Force Base, N.D., is here to help inform base personnel about the different opportunities they have to seek a higher education and assist them in choosing the best opportunity.

"Our primary purpose, provided to both our active duty and dependents, is to make sure they get the most bank for their buck," said Ron Filkins, 5th Force Support Squadron base training and education section chief. "If they're thinking about taking classes or they want to get into a specific degree program, we try to give them the guidance to

make sure they're picking what's right for them. There are a lot of options out there for people and our main thing is to let them know what they are."

At the Education Center, there are four colleges on location: Central Michigan University, Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University, Minot State University and Park University.

CMU primarily offers base classes for graduate degrees, PU and ERAU primarily offer base classes for undergraduate degrees, and MSU primarily offers base and on-campus classes for bachelor's degrees, said Filkins. CMU also offers undergraduate courses online and PU and ERAU offer graduate courses online.

There are also other courses not taught by the colleges at the Education Center, such as an Accessing Higher Education Course, Winter Driving Safety Class, Tuition Assistance Briefings, Resiliency Training among others.



be taught on location to save time, Filkins said. Everybody would still get credit for the course.

Every year, the **Education Center hosts** an Education Fair. This year's is scheduled to occur July 19.

"We go in and look at the top 20 schools people at Minot (AFB) are taking classes through," said Filkins. "We extend an invitation to them. Reps come in from the schools and set up an information station."

Schools will also call to ask if a rep can come to the base to talk with current students of their school, said Filkins. Emails would go out to the students and Filkins would coordinate a time and location for these meetings.

The Education Center also holds testing for all Air Force tests. Every test is scheduled Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday at either 8 a.m. or 1 p.m.

Although there are selected test days and times, there are a few exceptions, Filkins said. Most tests in the Air Force have due dates or need to

be set for a specific day and time. Due to this, they have computer labs open Monday to Friday during business hours.

## **USSTRATCOM Commander Announces 2016 Omaha Trophy Winners**

OFFUTT AIR FORCE BASE, Neb. -- In recognition of outstanding support to U.S. Strategic Command's (USSTRATCOM) strategic deterrence, space and cyberspace missions, U.S. Air Force Gen. John E. Hyten, commander of USSTRATCOM, announced the winners of the 2016 Omaha Trophies at the command's headquarters Feb. 16, 2017.

"These awards are a direct reflection of the hard work and tireless effort demonstrated by the men and women, in and out of uniform, who support the command," Hyten said. "USSTRATCOM is a powerful, dominant warfighting command whose ultimate strength is its people, joint and allied warfighters – officers, enlisted and civilians."

Hyten added that the winning organizations "distinguished themselves as the top performers in a field of extraordinary competition."

He also lauded the efforts and achievements of the other nominated units for

their dedication to providing a safe, secure, effective and ready deterrent force.

"Every one of these nominees is a winner and an outstanding representative of their task force, joint task force, or functional component," Hyten said. "This command's leadership staff and I are extremely proud of each and every one of them for their contributions towards preserving peace."

The Omaha Trophy, dating back to the U.S. Air Force's Strategic Air Command, was originally created by the Strategic **Command Consultation** (SCC) Committee – an advisory group comprised of business leaders in the Omaha area – in 1971. At the time, a single trophy was presented annually as a token of appreciation to the command's best wing.

Since then, the tradition has evolved to unit-level awards that recognize USSTRATCOM's premier intercontinental ballistic missile (ICBM) wing, ballistic missile submarine. strategic bomber wing and

global operations (space/ cyberspace) unit. Last year, a new category was added to include the combatant command's top strategic aircraft wing.

Those receiving awards represent organizations throughout USSTRATCOM that are critical to fulfilling the combatant command's vision of fighting and delivering integrated multi-domain combat effects across the globe, wherever and whenever needed.

"On behalf of the great people of Omaha and the surrounding area, we are proud to recognize the 2016 Omaha Trophy winners," said Ken Stinson, chairman of the SCC. "Congratulations and thank you for your hard work and the many sacrifices you and your families make in service to this great nation."

patrol vessel in honor of Senior Airman Nathan Sartain, a fallen defender at Eglin Air Force Base, Florida, February 24, 2017.

Sartain, a Pensacola native, was a member of the 66th Security Forces Squadron, from Hanscom AFB, Massachusetts, and died October 2, 2015, when a C-130J Hercules crashed shortly after takeoff from Jalalabad Airfield in Afghanistan.

The new patrol vessel, Sartain-20 was christened by his mother, Janice Sartain, while his father unveiled the name on the side of it.

"I am so honored to have been a part of this ceremony and that Nathan's Air Force family thought to honor him in this way," she said.

Also in attendance was Sartain's friend, Staff Sgt. Travis Jones, a 96th SFS member, whom was stationed with Sartain before his death."I am privileged to be

a part of this ceremony and to be stationed at a base that found a way to honor a fellow defender," Jones said. "From here on out, when I hear the call sign Sartain-20, it will always remind me of Nathan."

The new marine vessel will provide waterborne deterrence, detection and response to any threat against the base. Its area of responsibility will be the 153 miles of shoreline that make up Eglin Main, Camp Pinchot, Weekly Bayou and Ben's Lake Marina.

It joins another security forces vessel, the Nathan-25, also named after a fallen defender, Senior Airman Jason Nathan, who died in Iraq in 2007.



## North Dakota's Kindergarten **Vaccination Rates Increase**

BISMARCK, N.D. – Data from the 2016-2017 school immunization assessment indicate that North Dakota's kindergarten immunization rates have increased from last year. The school immunization assessment is conducted annually by the North Dakota Department of Health (NDDoH). Results from this year's assessment show kindergarten vaccine rates have increased from about 91 percent last year to about 94 percent this year in North Dakota.

Measles, mumps, and rubella (MMR), diphtheria, tetanus, and pertussis (DTaP) and chickenpox (varicella) vaccination coverage is important for kindergarteners. "Low vaccination rates leave North Dakota schools vulnerable to outbreaks caused by vaccinepreventable diseases, such as measles, mumps, or pertussis," said Lexie Barber, an epide-miologist with the NDDoH.

Because of low immunization rates in previous years, the NDDoH partnered with North Dakota State University's Center for Immunization Research and Education to communicate with key stakeholders across the state to better understand the attitudes, opinions, practices, and policies surrounding school immunization requirements, and exemptions to those requirements, in North Dakota.

Thanks to hard work from North Dakota schools. health care providers, local public health units, NDSU, the NDDoH, and the North Dakota Department of Public Instruction, school immunization rates have improved dramatically in North Dakota. "This is great news for the state of North Dakota, but there is still room for improvement. It is necessary to reach immunization coverage of 95 percent or higher to maintain adequate immunity to prevent disease and ensure schools are a safe and healthy environment for students," said Barber.

Before entering school in North Dakota, children must have five doses of DTaP, four doses of IPV (polio), three doses of HBV (hepatitis B), two doses of MMR, and two doses of varicella vaccine.

There also are vaccines that are required for adolescents when entering seventh grade. Seventhgrade requirements include an immunization against tetanus, diphtheria, and pertussis (Tdap), and meningococcal disease (MCV4).

Children can be vaccinated at local public health units or private health care providers. Parents of children who will be attending kindergarten or seventh grade this upcoming fall are encouraged not to wait until the last minute to get their child vaccinated; make an appointment now. My how things can change: With December's weather looking about as bleak as bleak can get and January only somewhat better, a February snow melt meant all is good for North Dakota's wildlife, after all.

Well, kind of, sort of, but not really. It's still a little too early to be giddy about spring and how wildlife fared over the winter.

As December rolled in January, N.D. Game and Fish Dept. big game biologist Bill Jensen admitted that the state's deer population was off to rough start to winter. The saving grace was November was extraordinarily mild.

Couple that with the February reprieve and things are a tad more optimistic than they were even a month ago.

But, no, don't get too giddy that all with be well with wildlife.

March still looms and, quite honestly, March is as critical – if not more so – for wildlife than whatever December and January may dish out on any particular

Because March is when North Dakota typically receives its greatest snowfall amounts - not there ever is anything typical or normal about North Dakota weather.

Generally, though, not only is it the month for the most snow, it tends to be wet, heavy snow with more moisture content compared to dry December and January snows.

March is also the time when white-tailed and mule deer does are in their third trimester for carrying fawns.

And the third trimester of March, April, and May is when 75 percent of a fawn's fetal growth occurs.

If stressed, especially during those last three months, fawns potentially have lower survival rates, Jensen explained.

Not only is March weather critical, but extra movement can cause stress on does – and that includes if they're pushed from winter

cover even in nice weather.

It's hard on all deer when pushed away from winter cover, Jensen added, especially if pushed off established trails where it's easier walking with less expenditure of energy.

Here's the bottom line: Jensen is optimistic that despite the bitter December weather, the January and February break was enough so overall mortality might not be as bad as it could have been.

The key is what March offers up in terms of weather. "The winter we do have left is crucial," Jensen stressed.

Jensen knows of situations in past years where deer managed to survive brutal winter weather only to succumb as grass greened in the spring.

Sadly, in some cases humans could unintentionally compound the stress on deer and other wildlife - even after the weather reprieve - by partaking too soon in the seemingly harmless and enjoyable ac-

tivity of antler shed hunting. Undoubtedly, it's a great pastime and wonderful excuse for some outside exer-

Normally, it's an activity one should embrace with wholehearted glee.

But the truth is that for this winter at least, those sheds can wait a few weeks. "It's not like they're going to rot," Jensen said. True, a rodent may munch on an antler tip but generally a shed dropped this winter will be in just fine of a condition in April or May as it will be in early March.

Get out and embrace shed hunting - just be patient. Give the deer a few weeks for them to conserve what energy reserves they may have left.

It could mean the difference between a healthy or dead fawn and a dead adult deer tipped over as grass greens.

An antler really isn't worth it.

Be patient, good things come to those who wait.





## Strawberry Sweet Rolls



#### **INGREDIENTS:**

FOR THE DOUGH: 1 cup scalded whole milk 1/2 cup unsalted butter 1/3 cup granulated sugar 2 1/2 teaspoons dry active yeast

FOR THE FILLING AND GLAZE: 15 ounce can premium strawberry pie filling

1/4 cup cream cheese, softened 1 tablespoon butter 3/4 cup powdered sugar 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Zest of one lemon

2 large eggs 4+ cups all purpose flour 2 teaspoons salt

### **INSTRUCTIONS:**

Set the butter, eggs and cream cheese out to warm to room temperature. Place the milk in a small sauce pan. Bring to a boil. The moment it reaches a boil, remove from heat. (This process is called scalding, and it ensures the milk doesn't effect the yeast's ability to rise. Don't skip!) Pour the hot milk into the bowl of an electric mixer and add 1/2 cup butter, to bring the temperature down. Stir and allow the butter to melt completely. Then stir in the sugar. Touch the milk mixture to test the temperature. It should be close to luke warm. If it is not, add 1/2 cup flour and test again. Once it is just above room temperature, stir in the yeast and let it foam for approximately 10 minutes. (Hot liquid can kill yeast.) Place the bread hook on the mixer and turn on liquid can kill yeast.) Place the bread hook on the mixer and turn on low. Add the eggs, salt, and remaining flour up to 4 cups. Allow the mixer to "knead" the dough until it pulls away from the sides. Run the mixer for approximately 10 minutes to allow the dough to stretch and develop the gluten. If the dough seems too sticky after the first 2-3 minutes add an additional 1/4 cup flour. After 10 minutes, turn the mixer off. Cover the top with plastic, and allow the dough to rise until double in size, approximately 60-90 minutes in a warm kitchen. Dump the inflated dough out on a well-floured work surface. Fold into thirds and press flat. Then turn and fold into thirds again and press into a rectangle. Roll the rectangle out into a large 12 X 20 inch sheet. rectangle. Roll the rectangle out into a large 12 X 20 inch sheet. Using a large flat spreader, spread the strawberry pie filling (or fresh Using a large flat spreader, spread the strawberry pie tilling (or tresh strawberries) over the sheet into a thin layer. Leave 1 1/2 inches bare on one long edge. Be careful not to gouge holes in the dough. Starting at the covered long edge, roll the dough sheet tightly toward the uncovered edge to form a long tight log. Place a piece of parchment paper in a 9 X 13 inch baking dish. Then cut the log into 12 equal rolls, and place them in the baking dish to rise. This is a messy process. If strawberries fall out, just tuck them back in the rolls once cut. Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F. Allow the rolls to rise for at least 30 minutes while the oven heats. Then bake for 20-25 minutes, until the edges are barely golden and the centers of each roll are puffed up. For the Lemon Cream Cheese Glaze: While the rolls are in the oven, beat the cream cheese, butter, powdered sugar, vanilla and lemon zest beat the cream cheese, butter, powdered sugar, vanilla and lemon zest together until completely smooth. The moment the rolls come out of the oven, gently spread the glaze over the tops and allow it to seep down into the cracks. Serve warm or at room temperature.

# How music and singing benefits children

Music is everywhere: on the radio, in movies and television shows and as a backdrop when shopping or celebrating milestones.

Music is an integral part of cultures all over the world. Music can express emotions not easily conveyed otherwise. It also provides a sense of community and belonging and can help unite the divided.

Playing musical instruments or singing has a number of benefits. From the earliest days after their birth, children can be calmed by music. Music helps people work out their feelings and can be uplifting and comforting when people need a boost. While many people are familiar with the moodenhancing benefits of music, they may not know that music also has developmental benefits.

According to

Don Campbell, internationally known educator and author of "The Mozart Effect for Children," music enhances intelligence, coordination, emotional expression, creativity, and socialization skills. Studies have suggested that music and movement affect all areas of development. Music can bolster listening skills, improve motor skills, assist with problem solving, and promote spatial-temporal reasoning. Many others say that music can calm and focus the mind, which is why it so often employed by therapists.

In the book, "The Importance of Music," author Ellen Judson cites a 10-year study that tracked more than 25,000 middle and high school students. The study showed that students in music classes receive higher scores on standardized

tests than students with little to no musical involvement.

In addition, singing and engaging in musical appreciation sharpens one's ability to communicate. Learning a piece of information attached to a tune will more readily embed that information in the brain. For example, many children learn the alphabet via song. Pairing lessons with song can help anyone retain information more easily.

Music also is fun, so much so that kids may not realize they're actually learning while singing. Matthew Freeman, development manager of "Sing up," a national singing project to help enhance music in children's education, states that children don't think of singing as work and may be more willing to participate. Song can be used to reinforce all different subjects, from language arts to mathematics.

Children or adults who are apprehensive about meeting new people can use music as a means to open the door to new friendships. Joining a choral group will immediately introduce people to others who enjoy music as well. Group singing is less intimidating than singing alone, so it takes some of the pressure off of a person and can staunch performance anxiety.

Music is beneficial throughout one's life and can be an enjoyable way to make learning more fun.







## Olympic Sword: 20th Air Force conducts first joint technical order rewrite

harged with employing ∠the world's finest nuclear deterrent force in defense of U.S. interests, 20th Air Force remains focused on sustaining and enhancing the integrated nuclear operations capability of the Minuteman III weapon

Drawing on examples of past Guardian Sword events, the first combined technical order rewrite in 20th Air Force history is convening at Hill Air Force Base, Utah, to vastly improve the two main TOs used by missileers who operate the weapon system.

The colossal three-week project, known as Olympic Sword, is a 20th AF endeavor that brings junior and senior missile combat operators and missile maintainers together from the command's three missile wings. Additionally, Air Force Nuclear Weapons Center engineers, contractors, members from the Technical

Order Management Agency office and the 532d Training Squadron from Vandenberg AFB, California, are on the team to efficiently update the 21M-LGM30G-1-24 and 21M-LGM30F-1-23, or dash 24 and dash 23.

The dash 23 deals with the NC2 communication equipment inside the launch control center, while the dash 24 involves the weapon system itself, to include the LCC console and other components.

During their short time together, they've been able to streamline processes, reorganize checklists, create procedures, cut out redundancies and significantly enhance the usability of each 800-plus page TO.

"At times there is a tendency to make change for change sake, but I can honestly say the changes we've made will make a

better product for the end user," said Capt. Shane Powell, 20th AF ICBM Emergency War Orders plans and programs chief. "This is a stepping block where we can build continuity, so future rewrites become more efficient to the point where we have not just a quality product, but an excellent product that is going to help everyone do their job better."

Missileers agree the crosstalk with skilled maintenance Airmen was an invaluable part of the process and are excited for the changes to impact current and future missileers.

"Having the maintainers help us streamline procedures and align maintainer and operator language has been extremely helpful," said Capt. Benjamin May, 341st Operations Support Squadron ICBM commander evaluator. "They are extremely knowledgeable and helped

paint a picture for why we should make certain changes or why they do things a certain way."

Throughout the project, participants also considered the training impact and ramifications the large-scale rewrite would have at the missile wings and the training schoolhouse at Vandenberg AFB.

Once the new TOs are published, the 532nd TS will review and update every single product used to train incoming missileers to integrate the new information in their course material, said Capt. Ryan Hepler, 532nd TS curriculum development chief.

While the new TOs won't be published until later this year, their impact will be felt at the wings as the missileers and maintainers in attendance plan to share what they've learned with their units.

"This experience has helped me see the bigger picture of our mission, while learning the operator's perspective," said Senior Airman Sterling Perry, 341st Missile Maintenance Squadron missile communications team chief. "I now understand why we get some of the questions we do, and I can now take that information back to my fellow maintainers. Once these TOs are published, both missileers and maintainers will be able to do our jobs more efficiently."







## Love for flying kept last KC-135 flight engineer flying for decades

DWARDS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AFNS) --(This feature is part of the "Through Airmen's Eyes" series. These stories focus on individual Airmen, highlighting their Air Force story.)

After a career that has spanned almost four decades, the last Air Force flight engineer for the KC-135 Stratotanker is set to retire at Edwards Air Force Base.

Master Sgt. Robert Self joined the U.S. Marine Corps in November of 1978 and will wrap up his military career next month as a fulltime Air Force reservist with the 370th Flight Test Squadron.

With 34-and-a-half years of military service, 26 on active duty, Self has had a diverse set of assignments. He said the love of flying is what has kept him going, but with advances in technology, the role of flight engineer has been decreasing over several aircraft platforms.

"The flight engineer runs the fuel panel, watches the systems and is a technical advisor to all the pilots," Self said. "Maybe 15 years ago they had a flight engineer on the KC-135 and even a navigator. But over the years the technology has

improved and the systems in the airplane have gone to computers, so they have taken engineers and navigators out."

He first became interested in aviation in the Marines when he was a helicopter crew chief stationed in Hawaii. After a four-year term, he returned to his birthplace of Rhode Island to complete college. But the urge to fly brought him back to the military. He joined the Rhode Island Army National Guard where he served as an aeroscout observer and helicopter mechanic. He would fly in OH-6 Hughes Cayuse Light Observation Helicopters as a "flying sergeant.'

"We would fly really low with the doors off. We would pop up, radio coordinates to artillery and pop back down. That's beautiful flying, I loved it," Self said.

But as Self would see – and what would become a common theme in his career – changes in the military every few years would change his role, too. The unit in Rhode Island was deactivated, so Self went back to Hawaii to continue flying in OH-6s.

"But then special operations took them – took all the OH-6s and painted them black, so I'm out of a job," Self said.

The Army also eliminated the flying-sergeant career field to make way for junior

officers to fly in the second seat of OH-6s.

He then became an Air Force Reserve C-5 Galaxy mechanic at Hickam AFB, Hawaii, which had a sister unit at Travis AFB, California, that had C-5 flight engineers. He trained to be a C-5 flight engineer and managed to stay in Hawaii. But after some time, his unit at Travis AFB wanted him to come to California. To remain in Hawaii, he took a part-time air national guard position at a unit that had C-130s at Hickam. He became a trained flight engineer in the C-130 Hercules.

"Then that unit went away and got C-17s, and they don't have flight engineers," Self said. "After that, I started a new life and became a full-time reservist with the Big Crow program at Kirtland Air Force Base, New Mexico, working as a KC-135 flight engineer."

Big Crow is the name of two NKC-135 test-bed aircraft, which are heavily-modified KC-135s used for electronic warfare testing. These planes were also used as a target simulator for testing the Boeing YAL-1 Airborne Laser.

"Every time I switched aircraft I had to go back to school for training. I went to school for the NKC-135. Then they closed down the Big Crow program, and I had to go back to C-130s at

Rhode Island and at Peterson Air Force Base, Colorado," Self said.

Unfortunately for Self, every time he changed units he had to lose a rank in order for his new unit to administratively accept him.

"I've had four stripes taken off. So, after all these units closed down, I would apply to a new unit. They would say, 'Oh we can't take you unless you take a stripe off.' I loved flying that much, that I don't mind taking a stripe off."

While deployed overseas, Self received a message that would ultimately bring him to Edwards AFB in November, 2013. Since he was qualified to be a flight engineer in the C-130 and KC-135, he would have a job working on the Speckled Trout program, which used KC-135s.

"The Air Force called me and said you have all these qualifications, we can use you here," Self said. "When I got here the (Speckled Trout) program closed down and there was no testing for the C-130 anymore, so they made me a KC-135 tanker flight engineer."

Self has reached his high tenure of service, and it's time for him to retire. He had his final flight Jan. 18, 2017, and is taking the rest of his leave before officially retiring in March. Self said he plans on staying in the local area and may continue to work at Edwards AFB as a civilian.

The next step is for the Systems Program Office to validate and verify the changes to ensure they work operationally by testing them in the Strategic Missile Integration Complex at Hill.

The Numbered Air Force plans to host more Olympic Swords to bring Airmen together to continually improve the TO processes and in turn, ensure safe, secure and effective ICBM operations.

"One of the highlights was seeing the Senior Airmen team chiefs apply all their field experience to help improve the procedures that will be used by all the missile operators within the Air Force," said Master Sgt. Dan Sutton, 20th AF ICBM Communications manager. "Very few Airmen get to have that opportunity and see that their inputs have such a big impact."

This rewrite reflects the 20th AF's commitment to continuous process improvement, and many more task forces like this one will continue to leverage Airmen's experience and innovation to improve the nuclear enterprise.
