## Team Minot attends AFGSC symposium

Forty 5th Bomb Wing and 91st Missile Wing members attended the first ever Women's Leadership Symposium at Barksdale Air Force Base, Louisiana, March 13-15, 2017.

"The primary focus of the summit was diversity, recruitment and retention," said Chief Master Sgt. Liz Cloyd, 5th Bomb Wing command post superintendent. "It was all about where the Air Force started and the diversity females have brought to the Air Force."

The summit began with a panel of women sharing their experiences in several different career fields, specifically nuclear-capable, within the Air Force and Air Force Global Strike Command.

"A panel of women really brought to perspective things they struggled with and were able to overcome," Cloyd said. "We even heard

from civilians and what those women went through to be able to grow in their respective fields."

One part of the summit that stood out to Cloyd was encouraging women to bring their voice to the table.

"Not everyone thinks they have a voice," Cloyd said. "Can you imagine? Someone may be transgender and question their personal value or if the Air Force still wants them. We want everyone to feel valued, and I believe this summit really helped instill that in some women."

Those forty members came back from the symposium focused, and one thing that was made clear was the concerns of Team Minot members wouldn't go unheard, said Cloyd.

The responsibility of solving issues is in the hands of the team members.

"Our focus is a living, breathing thing," Cloyd said. "We are going to identify areas that our perspective communities are going

through and we are going to work on those things, bring them to the table, and see what we can handle ourselves and what we need wing leadership's help with.'

One issue resolved quickly by the team has been an ongoing concern for breastfeeding mothers, said Cloyd.

"So many moms have just figured things out, and that's not how it should be," said Cloyd. "We are supposed to have designated lactation rooms, but when that room goes unused for a while, it becomes a storage closet or office. We need to let our nursing mothers know that they still have a place within their work centers and they are valued and taken care of."

Senior Airman Joanna Deal, 5th Munitions Squadron munitions custody account technician, has been working with other females to ensure adequate rooms for breast-feeding mothers.

"We have noticed there is not sufficient rooms available throughout various buildings

on base," said Deal. "We are taking it upon ourselves to ensure women within our squadron and other squadrons on base have comfortable and inviting areas in their work centers to pump."

Cloyd mentioned that the most important take-away from the event was taking care of Airmen and ensuring they feel valued and appreciated within their workplace.

"We are now more focused on helping Airmen with issues they have and bringing them directly to the table to be resolved," Cloyd said. "We, as a team, have a direct line to the commander and intend to stay on top of addressing any issues that are brought up."

This isn't the first time this squadron has won. Senior Master Sgt. Shirley Quevedo, 5th CPTS superintendent, added that the financial services office also won at the Air Force level for fiscal year 2013 and four times at the major command level over the last 6 years. The Financial Management Analysis Flight, also known as the Budget Office, won the Financial Management Analysis Flight of the Year for 2012 and 2014 at the MAJCOM level.

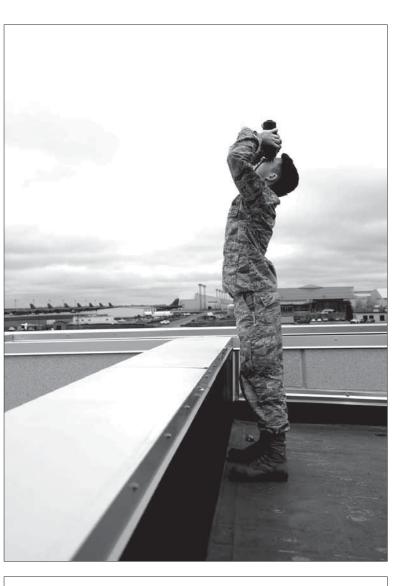

## Airman balanced through bodybuilding

As Staff Sgt. Semaj's alarm screeches throughout her bedroom at 2:30 a.m., she wakes for her morning cardio session, checks on her 6-year-old son, Jamel, and then laces up her running shoes.

Semaj, a 432nd Aircraft Maintenance Squadron supply craftsman, does this every morning to keep her body in shape in preparation for her next bodybuilding event where she hopes to earn her professional status.

As the light thud of her feet sounds on the harsh pavement she is focused and determined to get back on

"Bodybuilding was on my bucket list," the South Florida native said. "It's been much more than that because the gym is my happy place and I consider the stage my home."

During the preparation for her first competition in 2015, she found out her godbrother had passed, but she attributes weightlifting to helping her

cope.
"When he passed, I found that the gym helped calm me down and helped me find peace knowing he's in a better place," she said. "I also knew he wouldn't want me to stop training."

That year she placed second in the bikini category of the Lackland Bodybuilding Classic.

Since then she has moved up in the category and, recently, competed in her first show as a figure competitor.

"I did pretty well in bikini, but I knew I would never turn pro in that category," she said. "I had to lose so much weight and muscle and it was very discouraging. I made the jump to figure because I want to go professional and step on the Olympia stage."

While the stage is familiar to Semaj, coming from a performing arts school background, she said she still

experiences butterflies.

As she posed in front of the judges at the 2017 National Physique Committee Southern Championships in Orlando, Florida, Semaj said a number of questions raced through her mind. What are the judges thinking?

Am I smiling right? Does the competitor next to me look better?

After whittling the competitors down, the announcer called her number. She had taken second place, which was a significant achievement as it was her first competition in a new class.

"I was in shock," she said. "My heart dropped and I had the biggest smile on my face, knowing all my hard work had paid off."

Competing doesn't just help her cope or inspire her confidence, it has also helped her become a leading role model in her family, despite any doubt she has encountered.

"My mom didn't want me to get into bodybuilding at first," she said. "As a kid growing up, she was my role model, but as I've started my journey she now looks up to me which is a great feeling.'

Semaj's mother is proud of her as a nationally qualified amateur bodybuilder in the figure category, an Air Force staff sergeant, part-time student and, all the while, a full-time single mother.

"A lot of people tend to make excuses (for) why they can't do certain things, especially getting fit," she said. "I hear things like 'I don't think I can, the diet is too hard or I'm too busy.' I like to get up on stage and show it can be done no matter what."

Semaj said the excuses most people make only

drive her to chase her dreams even more, but to do so she maintains a strict schedule. After her







morning cardio she gets Jamel ready for school and drops him off on her way to work

where she manages, orders and tracks parts to keep MQ-1 Predators and MQ-9 Reapers in the air.

Next, she picks her son up from daycare and takes him with her to complete another workout, this time with weights. Then it's back home to do her own homework and help with his school work. Once the hard stuff and dinner are out of the way, they get to enjoy each other's company by practicing Jamel's football skills, reading and showing off their selfie photo talents.

"When I decided to start pursuing bodybuilding my first thoughts were how my little one was going to adapt because he's my life," she said. "We made the transition from fried foods to baked and we live an active lifestyle. When I go to the gym he plays in the child area and he's adjusted well."

Jamel will even join his mother during plyometric exercises and posing at home, giving her a run for her money on pushups.

Looking back before she joined the military, Semaj didn't expect to accomplish all that she has to date.

"I saw my friends and the paths they were going down and I didn't want that for myself," she said. "I knew I needed to get outside of Florida because with the mindset I had, I was going to either be in iail because of my friends

or I'd still be living with my family."

In 2007 she began talking to an Air Force recruiter between her college courses and working as a childcare provider. Shortly after

she started, in her words, "practically living at the office" and spending most of her days helping the recruiter sign more recruits before. eventually, picking her own Air Force specialty code.

"One day my recruiter's best friend came into the office and was talking about her job in supply," she said. "She just sold it well and that's how I chose my job."

Ten years later, she still doesn't regret her choice. Being in the military has given her opportunities she didn't expect and her appreciation for her job has never faltered.

"The saying goes 'you can't fly without supply'," she said.

Looking forward, Semaj said she will continue to pursue her dreams of competing on the Olympia stage as a professional women's bodybuilder while, also, chasing her education in sports medicine. No matter what, she will continue to inspire others and find a balance for herself as a student, Airman and mother through her love of bodybuilding.

## Unicorn Macaroons





#### **INGREDIENTS:**

Macaron Shells 90 grams egg whites (3 large egg whites), room temperature 55 grams (~ ½ cup) superfine sugar (granulated sugar in food processor until fine) 200 grams (~ 1 and 2/3 cup) confectioner's sugar 110 grams (~ 1 cup) almond flour ¼ teaspoon cream of tartar pinch salt food coloring, I use THIS gel coloring sprinkles, lots of sprinkles piping bags Cotton Candy Buttercream Filling 8 tablespoons butter, unsalted, softened 16-24 ounces confectioner's sugar, sifted well few drops cotton candy flavoring, I used THIS one edible glitter or sanding sugar pink food coloring, optional

#### **INSTRUCTIONS:**

Place room temperature egg whites in mixer bowl. With whisk attachment, whisk at medium speed until foamy, about a minute. Add superfine granulated sugar and cream of tartar. Mix until VERY stiff peaks form. You should be able to reverse the whisk and have the peak stands very tall without falling. Split into two even batches. Add food coloring here if desired. Add a bit more than you think you need, as it will fade slightly when baking. In a different bowl, sift together almond flour and confectioner's sugar. Repeat and sift a total of 4-5 times, removing any large pieces left behind after each sift. Add almond flour mix to stiffened egg whites. Using proper folding technique (see blog post for explanation of this!), fold until you can ribbon an "8" that holds into the batter. This should take about 50 proper strokes. THIS is the most important step in proper macaronage. If you want the swirled look, put each color into its own piping bag Place the two piping bags together into a new bag. You will then have one bag with the two inserted color mixes. Pipe macaron circles onto paper-lined baking sheets using the macaron template from our MACARONS: 101 Guide and instructions available HERE. To pipe swirls, simply squeeze evenly at a 90 degree angle and twist slightly counter-clockwise. Stay in the same spot, only rotating your hand in the same center point. Sprinkle with sprinkles immediately. Let the shells rest at room temperature for 30 minutes to form hardened tops. Bake at 290 F for about 16 minutes. Be sure your oven temperature is exact. Use a thermometer to verify. Remove and let cool completely before removing from baking sheets. Cotton Candy Glitter Buttercream Filling Add softened butter to mixer. Whip until smooth. Add remaining ingredients and mix until smooth. Add more confectioner's sugar as needed for tight enough texture. Finishing Pipe filling between two shells and enjoy!

he desks are cleared. The dust has settled. The 2017 North Dakota legislative session is in the books.

Now let's sort through new laws pertaining to the state's sportsmen and sportswomen.

The most contentious legislation was a bill, which failed, closing all private land to hunting without permission. "It was a very emotional issue and it always is when it comes up," described N.D. Game and Fish Department Deputy Director Scott Peterson.

Here's a look at some of the new laws:

House Bill 1150 allows hunters to pay the license fee for a preference point if they know in advance they do not want or cannot hunt the upcoming season. For example, they want to gain a point while not risking getting a license for species they know they wouldn't be able to hunt in the upcoming year. The proceeds go to the Game and Fish Department's Private Lands Open To Sportsmen (PLOTS) program.

HB 1204 allows young hunters 12 to 16 to get a one-time apprentice license if they haven't already obtained Hunter Education certification. They would need certification to hunt in subsequent years. In addition, Peterson said hunters turning 11 before the end of a calendar year are now eligible for a statewide antlerless whitetail license.

Under HB 1207 anyone abandoning property on Game and Fish Department Wildlife Management Areas will lose it if unclaimed after 90 days. The property then belongs to the North Dakota Wildlife Federation for auction, with proceeds helping fund the Report All Poachers program.

HB 1367 allows personal watercraft (PWC) operators to tow skiers, tubers, etc. without another person acting as an observer if the PWC has mirrors on both sides.

The legislature gave the Game and Fish Department authority to spend up to \$250,000 to assist youth shooting sports programs. It's not additional funding, Peterson explained. Instead, it allows the agency to spend its own money to help bolster programs such as National Archery in the School or school trapshooting programs.

The Game and Fish Department currently issue's more than 35 lottery licenses for species ranging from turkey to elk to deer for special non-profit organizations through previous legislative actions. Organizations such as the Mule Deer Foundation and National Wild Turkey Federation use a percentage of the proceeds to benefit wildlife and habitat conservation while other organizations provide hunting opportunities for wounded veterans.

As interest increases for lottery licenses, HB 1025 streamlines that process, giving Game and Fish Department responsibility for issuing such licenses. It also requires organizations receiving special lottery licenses in the future to dedicate 10 percent of its proceeds to a wildlife and habitat conservation proj-

In 2015 the legislature required hunting, fishing, and trapping licenses to be available online only as of 2016. However, retail vendors selling licenses typically lost money with credit card fees and employee time and expense. Senate Bill 2284 allows them to charge a 3 percent fee to help them recoup some of their costs, Peterson explained.

Overall, the legislative session didn't offer many surprises, he concluded.

Perhaps most importantly, it did so with relatively minor impacts to the state's resources and its hunters and anglers.

TRAVIS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. – Their name brings to mind the stories out of Hollywood blockbusters. Visions of deafening explosions and gun shots spin through the mind as one visualizes a service member crouching over a device, daring the sweat dripping from his forehead not to fall, praying he chooses the right wire to pull.

Though this is not the most accurate scenario of what explosive ordnance disposal technicians do, this t is what many picture when they hear the name.

What many are not aware of is how active EOD technicians are when they're at home station, and how often they work with their local community, especially at Travis Air Force Base, California.

The 60th and 349th Civil Engineer Squadron EOD teams cover a 33,000-squaremile response area, said Master Sgt. Kyle Spalding, 349th CES EOD program manager. They work with several counties and National Park Service police.

One of their main partnerships is with Point Reyes National Seashore, a 70,000-acre national park that attracts more than 2 million visitors a year.

"We work with Travis EOD multiple times a year," said David Schifsky, Point Reves chief park ranger. "They provide a critical service to Point Reyes. We don't have the training or authorization and it is crucial to protect the visiting public."

An example of the services Travis EOD provides to the surrounding area, is when MK2 Marine Markers, buoyant signal flares, wash up on shore to be discovered by visitors. The flares are either dropped in the ocean by aircraft or surface ships and sometimes show up in public places.

"The things that wash up have to be dealt with in a safe and appropriate manner, and Travis is very responsive and respectful to the marine mammals and everything here," said Schifsky. "There is a lot of history and relationships that have been developed."

When markers are discovered, the public usually notifies park rangers in some form or another and the rangers reach out to Travis EOD.

"We'll go out to the site, do reconnaissance on it, see what kind it, is the condition of it, and if it's safe or not," said Spalding. "If it isn't, then we'll take care of it – either explosively or through some other different procedure. We'll render it safe."

"We get an average of about two calls per month from the local community," said Master Sgt. Mark Walker, 60th CES EOD Operations Section Chief. "Our main calls come from Point Reves, when markers wash ashore, and The Presidio, a former military base, when items are dug up. After these calls, the second most common is when old

war trophies are discovered, such as WWII grenades.

"Usually (someone) will find some piece of ordnance, and call it in," said Spalding. "The local police will call command post and we will head out. We work hand-inhand with local police forces on explosive devices."

While local law enforcement departments have bomb squads, Travis responds to these calls because of a military munitions rule.

"The Department of Defense runs all munitions cradle to grave," said Walker. "If a military munition is discovered, it's our responsibility to dispose of it. The local bomb squads are not supposed to destroy them."

Spalding added to Walker's thought, "It's not just a responsibility thing. We have the most experience in these munitions, as well as more in-depth knowledge in ordnance."

Travis EOD teams also work with the surrounding area's law enforcement branches through numerous training opportunities.

"We do a lot of joint training," said Walker." We'll host different types of training for the FBI and police departments around here for their bomb squads. We just had a vehicle access class in October."

The Travis EOD unit also recently sent some Airmen to Chico, California to host a post-blast course for the FBI, said Spalding.

"Our viewpoint is a little

different than the civilian standpoint, so we add that to their training," said Spalding.

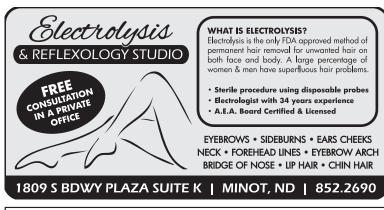
Travis EOD technicians also meet monthly with departments in Sacramento and San Francisco.

"We teach them our tactics and procedures so local forces can learn what we do in case the threats from overseas make it here," said Walker. "This is the most community interaction I've

seen at any base I have been at."

## Air Force releases annual sexual assault report

ASHINGTON (AFNS) -- Air Force reports of sexual assault increased slightly in fiscal year 2016, according to the service's annual report on sexual assault released May 1.

The Air Force received 1,355 reports of sexual assault in fiscal 2016, compared to 1,312 in fiscal 2015.

Expressed as a percentage of the total Air Force population, including active duty, Air Force Reserve, Air National Guard, and appropriated fund civilian employees, 0.21% of Airmen reported a sexual assault in fiscal 2016 compared to 0.20% in fiscal 2015 and 0.21% in fiscal 2014, illustrating a flat trend for annual reports over the last three years.

"We must continue to drive a culture of prevention while ensuring victims readily come forward and report sexual assault," said Acting Secretary of the Air Force Lisa Disbrow. "We must also be an Air Force that provides the care and

support victims need while holding offenders accountable."

Prevention of sexual assault is the responsibility of every Airman, said Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. David Goldfein.

"It's about trust," said Goldfein. "The crime of sexual assault shatters trust and has a direct and negative impact on our capabilities as a warfighting force. In my opinion, there is no such thing as a bystander in this fight. We are all in. From the newest Airman to the most senior leader, every one of us has a responsibility to step forward and help stop sexual assault before it happens."

The results of the fiscal 2016 sexual assault report will be compared to data from the Defense Manpower Data Center's 2016 Workplace and Gender Relations Survey, which is conducted every other year for the active duty service branches. The Air Force uses the Workplace and Gender Relations Survey to

measure the prevalence of sexual assault in the force.

The Air Force compares prevalence rates to reporting rates to evaluate Airmen's confidence in coming forward to report sexual assault and receive support. Ideally, the service wants to eliminate the gap between prevalence of the crime and the number of reports received, then see both numbers come down to zero, said Col. Mark Ramsey, the Air Force Sexual Assault Prevention and Response Operations Director.

"Our goal is to eliminate sexual assault from the Air Force, period," said Ramsey. "We have leadership engaged at every echelon. We have provided our Airmen with both an awareness of this scourge in our ranks and the bystander intervention tools to engage. Our best chance of eradicating this crime from our Total Force is through strong leadership, being good wingmen, exercising the tools we've been given, and keeping true to our core values."

## 9th AF transitions to Air Staff

SHAW AIR FORCE BASE, S.C. (AFNS) -- The Ninth Air Force headquarters transitioned into a Numbered Air Staff May 1, 2017.

The transition from Staff Directorates into an Air Staff prepares Ninth AF headquarters for the possibility to become a joint task forcecapable headquarters, and creates a seamless transition if called on to stand up a JTF, said Col. Rhude Cherry III, the Ninth AF vice commander.

An A-Staff consists of staff positions from A1 to A9, where each section handles different tasks including personnel, intelligence, plans and logistics. The switch to an A-Staff reorganizes personnel to reflect other service's numbered forces to better collaborate in a joint environment.

"The transition allows the Ninth AF headquarters staff to align itself along common joint headquarters staff structures, so the nomenclature will be familiar to all Airmen assigned to Ninth AF," Cherry added. "The joint staff will learn of Ninth AF and its organizational structure such that we will be considered for Global Response Force tasking."

Becoming an A-Staff also supports Ninth AF's new mission: Ninth AF organizes, trains, and equips its headquarters to be a deployable, operational level JTF, and its subordinate commands to prepare and meet the demands of expeditionary taskings.

"Instead of just focusing on the stateside eight wings that are under Ninth AF, now we are focusing on how we take this organization, this headquarters, and make it a warfighting function," said Col. Bruce Munger, the Ninth AF director of operations.

Ninth AF will be the only Air Staff in the Air Force that is equipped to lead a JTF, said Munger. The transition of Ninth AF into a JTF capable headquarters not only makes it possible for the Air Force to lead a JTF, but it supports the Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. David L. Goldfein's focus area, "strengthening joint leaders and teams."

The Ninth AF staff will begin to train in various courses that will prepare them in case the Air Staff is called to stand up a JTF, including the rear mission support element course Ninth AF recently began offering for those deploying to a JTF headquarters.

With the new capabilities of the Ninth AF Air Staff, the Air Force will take another step toward contributing to the joint fight as expert leaders directing a JTF to fly, fight and win.

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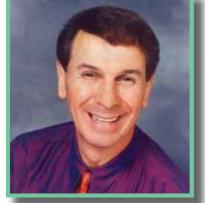

# North Dakota Department of Health Warns About Risk of Salmonella Infection from Baby Poultry

ISMARCK, N.D. - TheNorth Dakota Department of Health (NDDoH) warns of the potential danger to people who come into contact with live poultry, especially chicks, ducklings and other baby birds. Contact with live poultry or their environments can be a source of human bacterial infections. Multistate outbreaks of salmonellosis, an illness caused by Salmonella bacteria, have occurred every year for the past five years.

"During this time of year, baby poultry are often displayed in stores or given as gifts," said Michelle Feist, epidemiologist with the NDDoH. "People can be exposed to Salmonella by holding, cuddling, or kissing baby birds or by touching areas where the birds live or roam."

Anyone can get sick from Salmonella. Young children are especially at risk of salmonellosis because their immune systems are still developing and they are more likely to put their fingers, hands or other items into their mouths. In 2016, there were five cases of Salmonella infection in





North Dakota associated with a multistate outbreak of salmonellosis linked to live poultry. Of those five cases, one was under the age of five.

"Even if chicks and ducklings appear healthy, they may have Salmonella in their droppings or on their bodies," said Feist. "A bird that looks clean can still have germs on its feathers, beak and feet that can make a person sick."

The risk of acquiring Salmonella infections from baby poultry can be reduced by following these guidelines:

- Always wash your hands thoroughly with soap and water immediately after touching live poultry or anything in the area where they live and roam. Use hand sanitizer if soap and water are not readily available.
- Do not allow children younger than five years of age, older adults or individuals with weakened immune systems to handle or touch live poultry.
- Do not snuggle or kiss the birds, touch your mouth or eat or drink around live poultry.
- Do not allow live poultry inside the house or in areas where food or drinks are prepared, served, or stored.
- Do not give live baby poultry as gifts to young children.

Symptoms of infection with Salmonella can include diarrhea, abdominal cramps and fever, which usually begin within eight to 72 hours after expo The illness typically lasts four to seven days, and most healthy people recover without antibiotic treatment. Sometimes the infection can spread to other parts of the body, leading to severe and potentially life-threatening illness. Infants, young children, the elderly, and those who have impaired immune systems are at greater risk for severe Salmonella infections.

## Plan for Your Future Care

ife can change suddenly. We never know when we might be injured seriously in a car accident, suffer a stroke or experience some other sudden injury or illness.

These types of situations can leave people unable to speak for themselves, and family members and health-care providers may be uncertain about how to proceed with their care. Loved ones can feel overwhelmed if they don't know what types of treatment options you would consider.

You can make the decisions easier for them through advance care planning. That's the process of deciding your own future health care and communicating these wishes in the form of a written health care directive.

The North Dakota State University Extension Services has resources on its Aging Well website at www.ag.ndsu.edu/aging to help you with advance care planning.

Now is a good time to get started on your planning because National Healthcare Decisions Day is in April. But this year, it's an entire week - April 16-22.

How do you prepare a directive?

- Think about what would be important to you (based on your personal values and beliefs) if you become very ill or are injured seriously.
- Understand medical treatment options. Talk with your health-care provider if necessary.
- Discuss your thoughts, concerns and choices with those close to you.
- Choose a loved one to speak for you if you no longer can speak for yourself.
- Prepare a written health care directive.

Health-care providers and nurses in clinics, hospitals or skilled nursing facilities can answer many of the questions you may have about advance care planning. Faith community (parish) nurses, social workers and chaplains also may be available to provide you with assistance.

Most organizations have educational brochures that explain cardiopulmonary resuscitation, artificial hydration and nutrition, and other related issues usually addressed in a health care directive.

To write your directive, a good source is a document prepared jointly by multiple state agencies a few years ago: www.ndmed.org/image/cache/ND\_Advance\_Health\_Care\_Planning\_Resource\_Guide\_10-07-Final.pdf Also, if you find yourself in a hospital setting, the form will be made available to you.

The best time to develop a plan is when you are healthy. We plan for most important events in our life, such as the birth of a baby, going on a trip, heading off to college and retirement. So why wouldn't we plan for how we want to live at the end of our life?

## North Dakota Department of Health **Reminds Residents to Use Care While Cleaning to Avoid Hantavirus Disease**

ISMARCK, N.D. - TheNorth Dakota Department of Health (NDDoH) reminds everyone of the importance of protection against hantavirus disease. As spring begins, many people will be cleaning cabins and other buildings that have been closed for the winter. These are places where one is more likely to be exposed to the virus.

Hantavirus pulmonary yndrome (HPS) is a viral infection that causes severe lung disease. Infected rodents spread the virus in their urine, droppings and saliva. The virus is transmitted when an individual breathes in air contaminated by the virus, and on rare occasions, it can be transmitted through an infected rodent bite. The deer mouse is the primary carrier of the virus.

"People are most often exposed to hantavirus when cleaning or occupying previously vacant cabins, sheds or other dwellings and outbuildings that contain rodents, rodent droppings and rodent nests," said Jill Baber, epidemiologist with the NDDoH Division

"There is no treatment for hantavirus disease, except for supportive care, so it is

of Disease Control.

important to clean up rodent infestations properly to prevent infection."

NDDoH offers the following tips for cleaning a building with signs of rodent infestation to avoid hantavirus infection:

- Ventilate the space by opening the doors and windows for 30 minutes before you start cleaning
- Wear gloves and use disinfectant when cleaning up dead rodents or their urine, droppings and nests
- Saturate the material with disinfectant for five minutes before removal
- Mop floors and clean countertops, cabinets and drawers with disinfectant
- Use a commercial EPA registered disinfectant following the label instructions or a bleach solution made with one part bleach and nine parts water
- Do not stir up dust by sweeping or vacuuming up droppings, urine or nesting materials
- Do not let children play in crawl spaces or vacant buildings where rodents may be present

Symptoms of HPS usually begin two to three weeks after infection. Early symptoms commonly include fever, muscle and body aches, fatigue, headache, dizziness, chills, nausea and vomiting. Within a short period of time symptoms will worsen to include coughing and shortness of breath as lungs fill with fluid. People with HPS are typically hospitalized.

Fifteen cases of HPS have been reported to the NDDoH since 1993, when the virus was first recognized in the United States. Seven of the 15 reported cases were fatal. Nationally, 690 cases have been reported with 36 percent resulting in death through Jan. 6, 2016. More than 96 percent of the reported cases have occurred in states west of the Mississippi River.
