AF pilot selected for NASA astronaut training

DWARDS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AFNS) -- Lt. Col. Raja Chari has been selected by NASA to join the 2017 Astronaut Candidate

Chari relinquishes command of the 461st Flight Test Squadron June 9 where he oversaw developmental testing Iraqi Freedom and of the F-35 Joint Strike Fighter for the past couple of years. Simultaneously, he

served as director of the F-35 Integrated Test Force.

Chari will leave Edwards AFB as a colonel select. He has flown more than 2,000 flight hours in the F-35 Lightning II, F-15 Strike Eagle, F-16 Fighting Falcon, and F-18 Hornet including F-15E combat missions in Operation deployments in support of the Korean while he awaits a peninsula.

The Iowa native

graduated from the U.S. Air Force Academy in 1999 with a bachelor's degrees in astronautical engineering and engineering science. He continued on to earn a master's degree in aeronautics and astronautics from Massachusetts Institute of Technology and graduated from the U.S. Naval Test Pilot School.


Chari is one of 12 new astronauts introduced on Wednesday who will train for missions into Earth's orbit and into deep space.

The seven men and five women comprise the 22nd class of American spaceflight trainees since 1959. According to a NASA release, the group is the largest NASA has selected in almost two decades.

The 12 new candidates include six military officers, three scientists, two medical doctors, a lead engineer at SpaceX and a NASA research pilot.

Chari will report for duty in August to begin two years of training as an astronaut candidate. Upon completion, he will be assigned technical duties in the Astronaut Office flight assignment, according to NASA.

Air Force realigns Grand Forks AFB under ACC

WASHINGTON (AFNS) -- The Air Mobility Command and Air Combat Command commanders have agreed to the realignment of the 319th Air Base Wing, Grand Forks Air Force Base, North Dakota to ACC effective June 13, 2017.

The move will align Grand Forks AFB, which hosts active duty RQ-4 Global Hawk operations, under the major command

that organizes, trains and equips Airmen to perform remotely piloted aircraft missions.

"This realignment places a base that is focused on the RPA mission under the command with responsibility for it," said Gen. Mike Holmes the ACC commander. "I have no doubt that by streamlining the organization, we can find new and better ways to support and carry out this

important mission."

Approximately 1,400 people will transfer from AMC's 319th ABW to ACC under the realignment, but will continue to support RQ-4 operations by collocated squadrons belonging to the 69th Reconnaissance Group of the 9th Reconnaissance Wing, Beale AFB, California.

"I am proud of the Airmen of Grand Forks

AFB for their tireless dedication to mission, the Air Force and Air Mobility Command,' said Gen. Carlton D. Everhart II, the AMC commander. "The realignment will be relatively transparent to Airmen as they transition to Air Combat Command and continue to make critical contributions to national defense.'

Air Force Stands Up New Headquarters **Space Directorate**

WASHINGTON (AFNS) -- Secretary of the Air Force Heather Wilson has approved the reorganization of the Air Force headquarters to establish a Deputy Chief of Staff for Space Operations, who will be a three-star Air Force general officer.

"This is the next step in our

effort to integrate, normalize and elevate space operations in the Air Force," said Wilson. "The United States is dependent on space and our adversaries know it. We must organize and train forces to be able to prevail in any future conflict which could extend into space."



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The new directorate will begin operating in early August. Over the next two months, the Air Force will work to stand up the Deputy Chief of Staff for Space Operations directorate – or "Å-11" – by establishing an initial A-11 cadre, establishing operations and identifying the senior leaders who will lead the new staff.

"A new three-star deputy chief of staff for space ... will increase decision making speed and help ensure freedom from attack and freedom to maneuver." said Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. David Goldfein. "The Air Force culture evolved to own the skies and is now best postured to lead space into this information age and prepare our people and systems to achieve space superiority so the warfighter has what's required to win."

The deputy chief of staff for space operations will be the advocate for space operations and requirements to meet the demands of a warfighting domain, according to Air Force officials. The directorate will also consolidate space functions from multiple parts of the Air Staff.

Principal Defense Advisor on Space Reaffirmed

On June 9, Deputy

Secretary of Defense Robert Work reaffirmed the Secretary of the Air Force will continue to be the principal advisor to the Secretary of Defense on space over the next year, giving Air Force and DOD leadership time to revalidate the current approach. As the principal advisor, the Secretary of the Air Force has responsibilities to guide and advocate for space related programs across all services and defense agencies.

"While we are integrating and normalizing space on the Air Staff, we are also strengthening the integrated service staff supporting the Principal DOD Space Advisor role so that major issues are addressed, operations and acquisition is streamlined and every service is heard when it comes to space," said Wilson.














Take Care of Your Bones: June is National Dairy Month

eeping our bones healthy is a lifelong process. As we get older, our bodies may break down bone faster than we can make new bone. This can cause problems if our bones don't have enough stored nutrients to keep them strong. Eating nutrient-rich foods and getting weightbearing physical activity help keep our bones in good shape no matter what our age.

Did You Know? Fat-free (skim) milk has slightly more calcium than whole or 2 percent milk. Whole milk usually has about 291 mg of calcium per serving, while fat-free milk provides 302 mg per

Get Your Calcium Calcium provides strength to bone framework. Individuals between ages 19 and 50 need 1,000 milligrams (mg) of calcium each day, while those over the age of 50 need at least 1,200 mg each day.

Drinking milk instead of sodas or other sweetened beverages is a good step toward better bone health.

Good Sources of Calcium Milk: 300 milligrams (mg)/8 ounces

Nonfat yogurt: 415 mg/8

Large taco with cheese: 340 mg

Sardines: 324 mg/3

Fortified orange juice: 300 mg/8 ounces

Swiss cheese: 270 mg/1 ounce

Vanilla ice cream: 170 mg/8 ounces

Collard greens: 100

 $mg/\frac{1}{2}$ cup

Spinach: 59 mg/2 cups Broccoli: 50 mg/½ cup Don't Forget the Sunshine Vitamin

Vitamin D is essential to bone health. Without it, bones may become thin or brittle. Although our bodies make vitamin D naturally from exposure to sunlight, people who live in the northern part of the country do not have adequate exposure to sunlight to make enough vitamin D. Deficiency is becoming more and more common. Nutrition experts recommend 1,000 (or more) International Units (IU) of vitamin D each day through fortified foods and/or supplements.

Good sources of vitamin

- Salmon: 794 IU/3oz.
- Tuna: 154 IU/3oz.

• Milk: 115 IU/8oz. Eat Plenty of Greens

Leafy greens are a good source of calcium, vitamin K and many other nutrients that are important for bone health. Good examples include parsley, Swiss chard, kale, broccoli and spinach. Aim to eat at least three servings (2 to 3 cups) of vegetables each day.

Note: If you are on Coumadin or another blood-thinning medication, remember that maintaining a consistent intake of leafy greens is important. Check with your health-care provider before making dietary changes to include more leafy greens.

Reduce or Eliminate Smoking

Smoking also may increase bone loss, along with all the other negative

impacts it has on the heart and lungs. Quitting smoking reduces the risk and prevents further damage

Consider Other Bonehealthy Nutrients

- Magnesium: found in halibut, almonds, spinach and beans
- Boron: found in dates, raisins, prunes, almonds, hazelnuts, peanuts and

• Zinc: found in oysters, beef, pork, baked beans and yogurt

Consider Supplements Sometimes we may not get all the nutrition we need from our diet alone. Supplements can help bridge the gap to ensure we are getting the nutrients our bones need. Depending on our food choices, we may need supplements of calcium, vitamin D and magnesium to ensure bone health. Talk with your health-care provider before adding a supplement to your diet, and always inform your health-care provider of any supplements you take.

Keep Moving Staying active is important for bone health. Whenever your heel hits the ground, it helps increase bone density and decrease osteoporosis. Try these weight-bearing, bone-friendly activities:

- Walking or jogging
- Dancing
- Weightlifting

Research shows that weight-bearing exercise, such as walking, for a total of 30 minutes each day may not only stop bone loss but also can increase

Spring and early summer isn't busy just for humans.

Think about spring and early summer for those feathered and four-legged critters out there: Deer and pronghorn fawns are getting their young legs stretched and ready for life. And how many leaves, twigs, feathers, tiny branches, and whatever else fits the description for a soft bed were hauled by industrious birds for the perfect nest? Plus, after days of patiently tending to eggs, one or both adult deals with nonstop feeding of relentlessly chirping nestlings.

We humans see those birds daily but it's hard to pay much attention to just what goes into pulling off a successful nest as we focus on our busy lives.

So here is a peek into what's happening:

Not all birds are busily hauling nesting material. Industrious woodpeckers use their heads, literally, by excavating holes with their beaks. A close relative, the common flicker, may create a nest in an old wooden fencepost.

Hidden in the darkness of a wooden cavity, woodpecker eggs can't be seen by predators and don't need to camouflaged to blend out of sight so they're white. Plus, because eggs can't roll anywhere, they're virtually round.

Other birds take advantage of old cavity nests by reclaiming them and nesting in them after the original builder abandoned them for whatever reason.

Wood ducks nesting along some of North Dakota's wooded riverine areas also use excavated trees with the hen layering pillow soft downy feathers to create a mattress fit for a king, let alone her six to 15 creamy white eggs.

Burrowing owls, found in southwestern North Dakota, are another ingenious bird taking advantage of old prairie dog burrows to

nest deep within its cavity.

However, they take ingenuity to the next level: According to "Secrets of the Nest: The Family Life of North American Birds" by Joan Dunning, male burrowing owls carry, piece by piece, bits of cow pies to the entrance of the chosen abandoned prairie dog, badger, or fox hole. The female then shreds it.

By the time the pair is done the tunnel and nest are lined about an inch thick, plus – and perhaps most importantly – the entrance has a ring around its opening.

Studies show burrowing owl nests lined with cow pies have higher nesting success. The reason is that one of their major predators – badgers – will search out prairie dog tunnels for a meal and upon sniffing the cow pie-laden tunnel often left the tunnel alone, not associating the smell of an aromatic cow pie with food.

What some animals won't do to protect and provide.

Mourning doves, though, are a little less industrious yet they're still highly productive as parents. They mate for life. They work together to build their "house", albeit not the most extensive of construc-

They also take shifts in incubating the eggs.

Their dusky brown color hides whitish eggs from predators, even when occasionally nesting on the ground rather than among tree branches.

Because mourning doves incubate, fledge, and are on their own in five weeks, it's common even in North Dakota for a pair of doves to have two and sometimes three broods during the short summer season.

So, yes, for as crazy busy as spring and summer is for people, it's even busier and crazier for critters in the outdoors.

No Bake Summer Berry 9cebox Cake



INGREDIENTS:

19 oz graham crackers 8 oz cream cheese, softened 2 (3.4 oz) packages Vanilla Instant Pudding 2-1/2 cups cold milk 12 oz Cool whip (or homemade whipped cream) 3 cups fresh strawberries, sliced 1-1/2 cups fresh blueberries

INSTRUCTIONS:

2 oz white chocolate chips

Beat cream cheese and dry pudding mixes in large bowl with mixer until blended. Gradually beat in milk. Gently stir in Cool Whip or homemade whipped cream, reserving ½ cup. Spread a thin layer of cool whip in a 9x13 pan just to coat the bottom. Layer 5 graham crackers across the center of the pan, then 2 more, breaking them as needed to fit around the top and bottom edges. Spread a layer of pudding mixture over grahams and top with a layer of blueberries and sliced strawberries. Place graham crackers on top of berries, then pudding mixture, then layer of berries again. Repeat the graham-pudding-berries layers 1 more time (3 times total) and you should reach the top of the pan. Refrigerate for at least 4 hours or overnight until the graham crackers have softened completely. When ready to serve, melt white chocolate chips in a bowl as directed on package and drizzle over dessert. You can use a spoon to drizzle it over the tops of the berries or you can put it into a small zip-top bag and snip of the corner for an easy "piping bag."

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
