## A cry for help

MINOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. -- The beautiful landscape of the north unit in Theodore Roosevelt National Park was a site to behold. The weather was perfect, the campfire was crackling and the s'mores were sweet. Fourth of July weekend had officially kicked off for the group of close-knit outdoor enthusiasts.

Sharing marshmallows and laughs, the group of seven Airmen from Minot Air Force Base, North Dakota had not a care in the world. Nothing could ruin their much-needed break from the grind of military life. They were free as birds. Then suddenly, they were pulled out of their euphoric states when they needed help, we just ran. I had a good idea of where it was coming from because I had camped there before."

The group tore down the dirt road toward the man's pleading cries. Flashes of jumbled words flooded their heads. Help. Bleeding. Attack.

"I heard 'blood' and 'attack' so I took my concealed-carry weapon out instantly," Velazquez said. "I felt like I could protect myself and instantly became worried about protecting this guy's life too."

After an estimated half mile of running, the Airmen found themselves within 150 feet of the man, when one word caused them all to stop dead in their tracks. The Airmen contemplated their options, knowing they didn't want to harm the animal, but unsure how much time the man had before his injuries became catastrophic.

"I was scared," Velazquez said. "I was thinking about proper use of force. Do I just kill this animal and suffer all the consequences? I really didn't want to, but at the same time this guy is non-stop screaming for help. I was torn on the right thing to do. I was balancing a man's life with a bison's."

While the group hastily discussed what to do, they knew they had to call for help immediately. That posed another problem.

"I was starting to stress because I couldn't find cell phone service," said Allie Staffen, 91st Missile Maintenance Squadron facilities maintenance technician. "I didn't know how much time we had, so I thought if I don't find it soon, I'll have to run back to the car and drive to find it." The moment Staffen turned to run back to camp, she caught a signal and immediately dialed 9-1-1. "It was the clearest onebar service I had ever had!" Staffen said. "I don't know how it worked, but so thankful it did." While Staffen relayed the information to the emergency operator, relieved she camped there

often and was familiar with the area, the rest of the group did everything they could think to get the bison to move away from the man. A group of campers and hikers had also formed, putting even more pressure on the situation.

"There was just chaos," Velazquez said. "Everyone was yelling, it was stressful. I tried to stay calm and do the right thing."

Velazquez decided to fire his weapon into the ground, to scare the bison away. Instead, the animal started toward the group. Worried they were its next victims, they all piled into a nearby car for safety. After a few minutes, the bison suddenly turned and walked off into were answered right when we got him in that car."

Still on the phone with the 911 operator, Staffen explained the man was safely in a car and on his way to meet the ambulance, which was just pulling into the park. The man was going to be okay.

"Everyone's adrenaline was rushing, but we were really relieved that everything worked out and we were lucky enough to be in the right place at the right time," Staffen said. "I'm really glad I was with a group of Airmen out there because we all jumped to the call and knew what we had to do. We had each other's backs."

The group returned to camp and continued to enjoy their holiday weekend. The campfire had died. The s'mores were cold. But the feeling of saving a life made them feel freer than the beautiful open plains of northern North Dakota.

heard a scream for help.

"By the third time hearing this guy, we knew it was serious," said Senior Airman Christopher Velazquez, 705th Munitions Squadron support technician. "Once we realized there was an actual person being sincere who "I heard the word just as my flashlight caught its eyes," Velazquez said. "Bison."

The wounded man had climbed up a small rock formation to get away from the angered animal. That left him stuck, with the bison waiting below.



the darkness.

The group shot out of the car and up the rocks to the injured man. They found a deep gash, almost to the bone, on the back of his leg. The man was delirious due to a significant amount of blood loss. Working together, the group applied pressure and bandaged the wound with a shirt. They picked the man up and helped him down to the car they had piled in moments before. "I felt so relieved when

we got him in that car," Velazquez said. "Before he was in it, it was unknown. Are we going to get him in time or are things going to get worse? INOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. -- The Minot Air Force Base library was recently awarded Air Force Library Program of the Year for 2016.

This award is given to the library that excels in mission accomplishment and innovation, leadership and management, and customer focus.

Sharon Emerich, 5th Force Support Squadron library circulation technician, attributes their achievement to the hard-working staff who created the events hosted throughout the year.

"We take ideas that we see elsewhere and put a creative spin on them to improve our programming," Emerich said.

During 2016, the library provided free services such as book rental, movies, music and printing which saved Airmen approximately \$1.7 million.

"I think the major factor for us winning this award is our programs," said Julie Reiten, 5th FSS supervisory librarian. "We have special programs happening at all times to promote education and literacy."

With programs such as a library quest, puppet shows, and interactive story times, Reiten said the focus is on families.

"After we implement a program, we work on it over the years to make it better and better," Reiten added. "We don't settle for mediocracy--we go the extra mile."

In addition to their unique programs, the library staff stood out above the rest by participating in many events throughout the year such as the Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics Fair. During this event the staff demonstrated their STEM materials such as a Lego robot, a remote control car built with an electronic kit, and a 3D printed object.

Although they have a sufficient sized staff, Reiten believes their success is due to help of volunteers and collaborations with other base agencies.

"We wouldn't be able to do what we do without assistance from volunteers and other organizations," Reiten said. "They help us

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## For Belle's Sake: military couple runs animal shelter

A luscious green meadow sits beside a small highway in Sumter, South Carolina, April 1, 2012, broken only by a single crossroad.

The sun cast its final rays over the horizon as a lone driver, ready to put the day to rest, navigated toward her home. The stop that cut off the serpentine of traffic gave her a moment to reflect on the day's activities. She inspected her surroundings prior to taking off again, but a glimpse of light brown caught her eye from afar.

She focused on the tuft of fur that offset the backdrop of a perfect field of grain in the breeze. In the middle

of the field lay what was probably once a beautiful dog, left to rot and wallow in her own loneliness. From her body blossomed a grotesque flower of garbage and decaying nutrition. Without hesitation, the driver whipped out her phone to call for help.

An Air Force couple answered that call and raced to the scene, just as they would for any other situation.

"We've been rescuing animals since 2010," said Master Sgt. Christian Bird, 5th Communications Squadron cable maintenance and cyber transport systems section chief. "We always saw stray animals or dead ones on the side of the road, so we decided we wanted to do

#### our part."

Twilight glimmered beyond the clouds as they arrived to assess the demise of this pit bull mix. She wagged her tail for the calm voices directed at her, and continued to do so as she was carried to a place she could call home.

"Some of the animals we rescue need some form of rehabilitation," said Tech. Sgt. Shelby Bird, 5th Bomb Wing self-assessment program manager. "Whether physical, behavioral or mental, we take them all in and help them recover."

Christian and Shelby have learned over the years that 99 percent of animals marked as red flags at animal shelters have mental or behavioral issues that are environment-induced. The Birds introduce these animals to a new environment which helps

eliminate their bad behaviors and gives them a fair shot at a home.

When there is a hurt animal, Christian and Shelby ensure its treated properly and adopted into a home that provides time and patience to properly care for them.

After the Birds arrived home, they examined the dog. A prior-military emergency medical technician made his way to their house to further assess injuries since the closest afterhours veterinarian clinic was over an hour away. This malnourished dog, now named Belle, had two shattered back legs, a broken back and all the skin and muscle missing from one side of her body. Crawling within the injuries were hundreds of red ants, eating away at what was left of her body. Aside from massive blood loss and organ failure, the Birds knew that Belle would go through a long and painful recovery process, and would most likely not survive. Shelby knelt beside Belle, gently holding her hands out. She knew that if there were two options, it should be Belle's

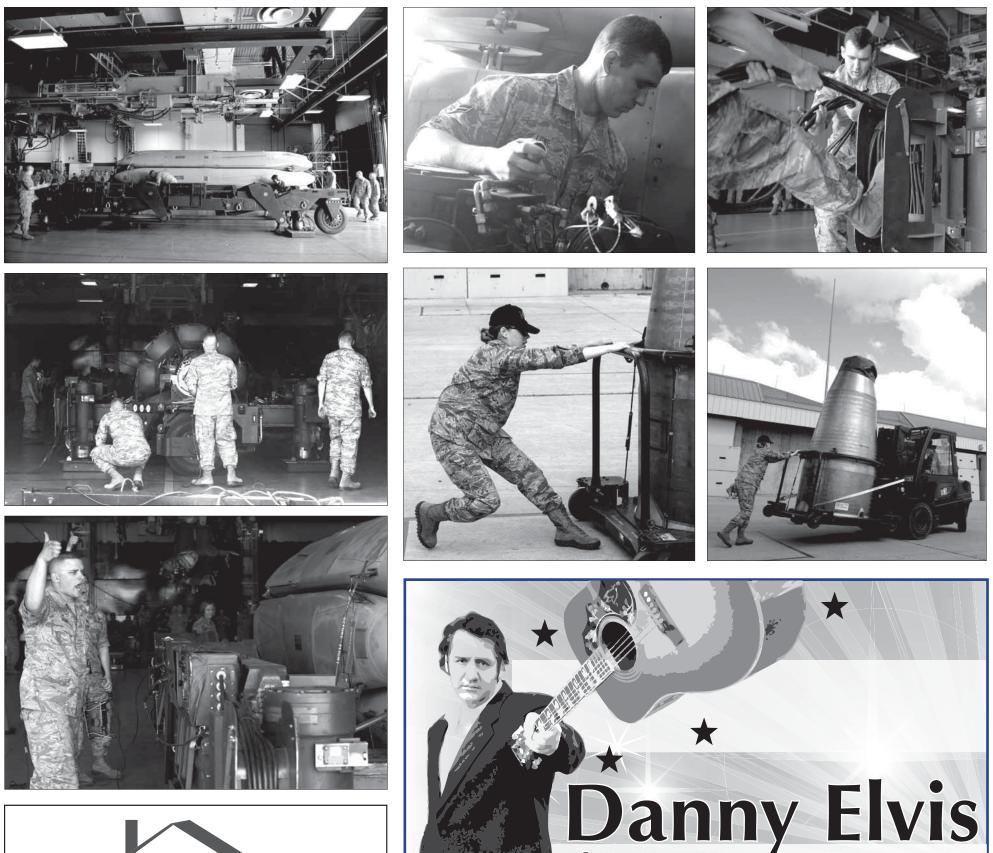

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Salted Caramel Chocolate Chip Cookie Bars



#### INGREDIENTS

- 1 cup unsalted butter, softened
- 1 cup packed light brown sugar
- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 2 large eggs 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 2 1/2 cups all purpose flour
- 2 cups semisweet chocolate chips
- 14 ounce can sweetened condensed milk
- 10 ounces soft caramels, unwrapped
- 1 teaspoon flaked sea salt

#### **INSTRUCTIONS:**

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F. Line a 9 X 13 inch baking dish with foil and liberally coat with nonstick cooking spray. In the bowl of an electric mixer, beat the softened butter with both sugars until light and fluffy, about 2 minutes. Add the eggs, vanilla, salt, and baking soda. Mix well, then scrape the sides of the bowl with a spatula. Turn the speed to low and add the flour. Beat to combine, then mix in the chocolate chips. Press half of the cookie dough into the bottom of the prepared baking dish. In a medium sauce pot, add the sweetened condensed milk and unwrapped caramels. Set over medium-low heat and stir until the caramels melt, making a smooth caramel filling. Pour the filling over the cookie dough base. Drop the remaining cookie dough over the caramel filling in small teaspoons-sized clumps. Bake the bars for 25-30 minutes, until the center is just set. Sprinkle with sea salt flakes and allow the bars to cool completely. Then lift the bars out of the pan by the edges of the foil and cut. Store in an airtight container at room temperature for up to 3 days.

#### INGREDIENTS:

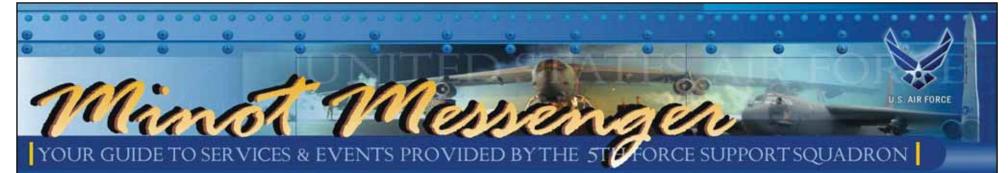
1½ pounds boneless skinless chicken thighs (chicken breasts will also work)
2 Tablespoons olive oil
1 teaspoon ground cumin
1 teaspoon chili powder
½ teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon peper
½ cup honey
Juice of one lime
2 Tablespoons soy sauce
1 garlic clove, minced

#### INSTRUCTIONS:

In a medium sized skillet over medium heat add olive oil. In a small bowl combine cumin, chili powder, salt and pepper. Rub on chicken and place in skillet. Cook for 3-4 minutes on each side or until chicken is no longer pink and 165 degrees. Remove chicken and set aside on plate.

Add honey, lime juice and zest, soy sauce and garlic. Bring to a boil over medium high heat and reduce heat and whisk until it starts to thicken. About 2 minutes.

Add the chicken back to the skillet and coat in the sauce. Garnish with lime wedges if desired.

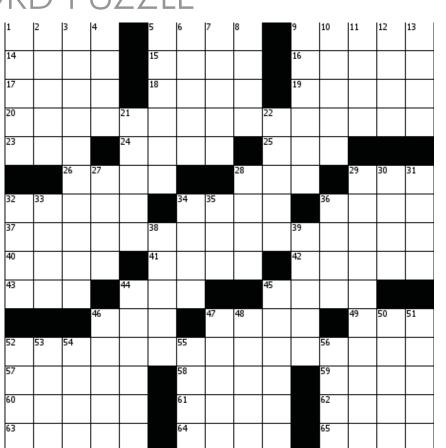

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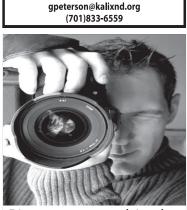
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## **Kennedy wins national** boxing title

INOT AIR FORCE BASE, ND-She remembers it like it was yesterday, and to be honest, it pretty much was. She was in fourth grade and her peers were discussing what they wanted to be when they grew up. She answered

almost instantly, "I'm going to be a professional boxer." Laughter broke out, especially from the boys. She hasn't forgotten.

Now 12-years-old and in 7th grade, Gracy Kennedy still finds nothing funny about her answer. Boxing is her life. Her great-grandfather was a professional boxer and her

grandfather boxed in college. Her father Tech. Sgt. Steven Kennedy, Air National Guard member with the 219th Security Forces Squadron, is involved in martial arts and other self-defense sports.

Gracy has only boxed for three years. In that short time, she has quickly rose the ranks in her weight class. She devotes herself to the sport, waking early every morning to run three miles, do push-ups, sit-ups, shadow box and hit the bags. Twice a week her parents drive the nearly two hours to Newtown for sparring. On top of the training, Gracy's diet is crucial to her success. During training and before

competitions, she limits herself to fish and fruit, not an easy feat for a 12-year-old.

After winning her regional title in Rapid City, South Dakota back in March, Gracy qualified for the 2017 Junior Olympic, Youth Open and Prep National Championships in Charleston, West Virginia in June. She had three months to prepare for her biggest fight to date.

Gracy was nervous when she walked into the arena for her pre-fight weigh-in, hoping and praying the months of training and dieting paid off. She aced the weigh-in and anxiously awaited her fight details from her coach. The news she heard wasn't expected. Her opponent didn't make weight, which resulted in an unopposed win.

Initially upset she wasn't going to fight, Gracy spoke with several coaches at the tournament who assured

her she had earned the title. "It takes a champ to make weight," they told her. Then she realized she was on top, a national champion. The first thought to pop into her head?

"Belle, what do you want," she asked.

Belle rested her head into Shelby's open palms, took a deep breath, and closed her eyes.

"We lost that one, but we vowed to do our best to save as many as we could in her honor," said Shelby.

Christian and Shelby named their service "For Belle's Sake Rescue and Rehabilitation." Since that day in 2012, they have

rescued over 700 animals while stationed at Shaw Air Force Base, South Carolina, and Minot Air Force Base, North Dakota. They work directly from their home, allowing them to have around 40 animals at one given time.

"You have to be selfless," Christian added. "You need to make sure you find the time, patience and commitment to see it through."

The Birds not only have the animals to look after, but also four young children. "It's not easy," said

Shelby. "You have to give something up to [help] balance the military, family and the shelter, so we don't sleep."

Their saving grace is the teamwork between Shelby, Christian and their children.

"One parent is taking care of the animals, the other is taking care of the kids," said Shelby. "We have a pretty good schedule and enough understanding and trust in each other to get everything done."

Christian and Shelby mostly take care of the animals, but occasionally, their children assist.

"They're involved, but not too much due to their ages and safety concerns," said Shelby. "They love playing, feeding and filling the water bowls for the animals."

The Air Force family has supported them as well. Military members sometimes volunteer for a couple of hours to take care of the animals.

"Where the Air Force takes care of us, we take care of them," said Shelby.

They also care for the animals of deployed Airmen to avoid giving their family member away to a stranger

or an animal shelter.

"Some people are unable to afford the high boarding cost of a facility," said Shelby. "If you allow us to bring your animal into our family, we'll give them back when you return from serving our country."

With so many responsibilities and a healthy balance, Shelby and Christian have made it all work in their favor. They don't plan on reducing any of their efforts due to one reason.

"Everything we do, we do for Belle's sake," said Shelby.

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
