

Airman provides aid to Kent Island tornado victims

ORT GEORGE G. MEADE, Md. (AFNS) -- More than 9,000 homes and businesses on Kent Island were affected when an Enhanced Fujita-2 tornado tore across Maryland's eastern shore July 24, 2017. The tornado produced winds up to 125 mph and destroyed several homes, tore roofs from buildings and left thousands of people without power.

When Airman 1st Class Jesus Carrillo found out about the tornado, he didn't hesitate to provide aid.

Carrillo, a radio frequency transmission technician with the 707th Communication Squadron, learned about the tornado when he received an e-mail alert from the American Red Cross. The e-mail was seeking volunteers in the local area to respond to the aftermath of the tornado.

Dedicated to supporting his community, Carrillo submitted leave so he could join the relief efforts. Still fairly new to the Red Cross, Carrillo has been

a volunteer for a couple of months and assists as a disaster services and disaster action team member.

As a team member, his duties include providing food, shelter, comfort and care for families affected by major disasters such as fires, hurricanes and tornadoes.

"The disaster action team really interested me," Carrillo said. "Just being one of the first people on the scene and helping people in their immediate need is really rewarding to me. When I arrived to Kent Island on Thursday (July 27, 2017), it looked like a war zone. Trees were destroyed, houses were torn apart and debris was everywhere."

One of his first tasks was helping the disaster center that was established as a focal point for the tornado victims. The disaster center provided victims access

to social services, animal control, public health, the sheriff's office, a shelter organization and many other groups, according to Carrillo.

"I was overwhelmed at first – there was so much going on," he said. "Some folks were coming in barefoot and others without shirts. It shows you how much they have been going through and what some have lost."

After his time in the disaster center, Carrillo moved onto the "Hot Shot team" or "Mobile team," where he traveled through the community to reach people who couldn't travel to the disaster center.

Going out into the community to help families would cause a chain reaction, he said, because neighbors would see the volunteers helping a family, and then the neighbors would come to the volunteers for help.

"It was difficult to call it a day and stop helping," the 20-year-old Airman said. "We were tasked to help until 7 p.m., but we were often helping for another hour and half. It's the small things that do make a difference, like handing someone a bottle of water."

Carrillo recalled having to hold back tears during an interaction with an elderly lady during his assignment in the community.

"She had a grandchild with her and they were without electricity and water, and we ended up giving her a \$650 debit card to help with food and a place to stay," Carrillo said. "The lady was in shock about all the support and money. We sat on her porch describing all the things we were going to do to help out the community and get them back on their feet, and she started crying and some of

the volunteers started to tear up as well."

Carrillo said the training he received from both the Red Cross and the Air Force helped prepare him for these moments.

"The Air Force has taught me to be very adaptable and make do with the resources you have at hand," he said. "That is one thing that has helped me a lot-the mindset of being adaptable is critical when you're dealing with disasters that impact people's lives."

"We can always depend on (Airman 1st Class) Carrillo to lend a helping hand and selflessly dedicate his time to help others in need," said 1st Lt. Adrian Waters, of the 707th CS. "His caring personality and his energetic spirit are an undeniable asset to us."

Carrillo encourages other Airmen to get out and volunteer make a difference in their communities.

"Airmen are always looking for volunteer opportunities," said Carrillo. "This is a great impact that you can see directly. You can see the aide and how it affects people. The American Red Cross has various volunteer opportunities such as volunteer management, disaster services, disaster action team, disaster preparedness presenter and public affairs. Explore the options and find something you are passionate about."



North Dakota's thirteen state parks provide visitors a blend of activities for a fun-filled weekend away. PRAIRIE ADVENTURES



Water is first and foremost on a fisheries biologist's mind 24/7...water is everything."

Weather meteorologists, ranchers, farmers, and gardeners aren't the only ones paying attention to weather and North Dakota's dry conditions this year.

Fisheries biologists think about water, too.

A lot.

N.D. Game and Fish Department Fisheries Division Chief Greg Power is one who pays attention to weather and water. Or in the case of this year, lack of

The agency currently manages more than 430 lakes – more than double from a couple of decades

That's because since 1993 the state has had a whole lot of water, growing small wetlands into fishable waters and larger wetlands into significant lakes.

True, there were a few hiccups along the way and a year or two of drier conditions, but overall North Dakota has been in an unusually long wet cycle.

This year's dry conditions have fisheries biologists like Power concerned. Granted, much of the state received early August rains and so far the drought hasn't occurred over an extended period of years.

Power has been in the fish business long enough to remember the state's last lengthy drought from 1988 through 1993. "That was horrible," he admitted.

It was hot. It was windy. It didn't rain until June 1993 when the skies opened up.

At this point, no one knows how long dry conditions will or won't persist. Maybe August rains signal the end.

One thing is certain, though, Power is pleasantly surprised that by early August no lakes had reported summer fish kills, despite hot, dry, and windy weather. He admits he's almost bracing himself for a potential influx of summer fish losses but rain and cooler weather could ease concerns.

Northern pike tend to be sensitive to warm water influxes, Power explained, and often are the first species to suffer summer losses.

Ironically, the Missouri River System is in good shape despite the drought, Power added, because of mountain river and stream inflows.

Another plus to the situation is many newer, larger lakes across much of the prairie aren't dropping as quickly as a person would have thought. Many of those lakes are better than expected for water levels, Power continued.

U.S. Geological Survey is conducting a study looking at interaction of lakes and ground water. While it's early in the project, it appears many newer, larger lakes could have a lot of interaction with ground water from an aquifer. Shortterm, they could fare better than anticipated, Power concluded.

Drought is nothing new to lakes west of the Missouri River, Power added. They have a long history of major water level fluctuations. While they may see significant declines in water levels in drought conditions, "the recovery of those lakes can be rapid," he explained.

Early August rains essentially just soaked into parched ground and didn't contribute to increasing lake levels. "But you've got to start somewhere," Power

Ironically, not all of North Dakota is suffering drought conditions. The northeastern part of the state is OK for moisture. "The issue is the western one-half to twothirds of North Dakota," Power said.

As a biologist who follows weather and water, Power stays in tune with short-term and long-term weather forecasts, so he has a hint of hope this drought won't be a repeat of '88 through '93: "In the big picture, so far climatologists indicate there is no evidence it could be longterm," he said.





Pumpkin Cream Cheese Swirl Muffins



INGREDIENTS:

- 1 3/4 cups all purpose flour
- 1 tablespoon pumpkin spice
- teaspoon baking soda 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 (15 oz) can pumpkin (pure pumpkin puree)
- cup granulated sugar
- 1/2 cup packed brown sugar 2 large eggs
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil 1 tablespoon vanilla extract
- 8 oz cream cheese
- 1/4 cup granulated sugar
- 1 large egg yolk 2 teaspoons vanilla extract

INSTRUCTIONS:

Preheat oven to 375°F. Place paper baking cups into muffin pan. Set aside. In a medium bowl, whisk flour, pumpkin spice, baking soda and salt until well combined. Set aside. In large bowl, whisk together pumpkin, sugar and brown sugar. Beat in eggs, vegetable oil and vanilla extract. Slowly whisk in the flour mixture, until there are no lumps. Fill muffin tins 3/4 full. In a medium bowl, beat cream cheese until smooth Add in sugar, egg yolk and vanilla extract and beat until well combined. Top each muffin with about 1 tablespoon of cream cheese mixture and use a toothpick to swirl it into the batter. This will not look smooth, but it will bake up much prettier. (You can see exactly how I did this in the video above.) Bake muffins for 18-20 minutes, or until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean. I liked these best at room temperature or even

"The mission of the Minot Public Library is to connect, enrich, and inspire and I believe that the tool library will do all of these things as it allows us to connect people to resources they might not otherwise have and it will hopefully enrich people's lives by making them more self-sufficient and maybe even inspire them to do more than they ever imagined they could," said Janet Anderson, library director. "Libraries are about more than just books and the tool library is just another step the Minot Public Library is taking to meet the needs of our community."

Rugby museum receives gown worn by Queen Victoria

PRAIRIE VILLAGE MUSEUM

Prairie Village Museum in Rugby, N.D., has acquired a ceremonial dress worn by Queen Victoria of England. The dress is one of numerous gifts Queen Victoria bestowed upon her personal dresser, Marie Downing Williams, when Williams left the Queen's service in 1886 to homestead in Rolla, N.D.

The dress and Marie Williams' story had been on display at the Rolla Public Library for 40 years. In June, the library board transferred ownership of the dress and several other items in the Marie Downing Williams/ Queen Victoria Collection to the Geographical Center Historical Society, which operates Prairie Village

Museum. The library board wanted to give more people an opportunity to learn about Marie and to view items associated with her service to the Queen.

Museum collections manager Stephanie Steinke says, "There are few, if any, dresses worn by Queen Victoria or other British royalty on display outside of England, let alone in the upper Midwest." Based on records provided, Victoria wore this particular dress during the 1870 Knight of the Garter Ceremony when Hugh Grosvenor, First Duke of Westminster, was invested with the Order of the Garter.


The dress will go on display at Prairie Village Museum

Friday, Aug. 11. An unveiling celebration is planned from 10 a.m. to 12 p.m. for members of the Geographical Center Historical Society and invited guests. The exhibit will open to the general public at noon that day. Steinke has spent hours researching Marie Downing Williams to verify and expand her story and to trace connections between the Rolla artifacts and Queen Victoria. Steinke has tracked down ship manifests, homestead claims and graveyard plots, each piece of information enriching the story of a Queen's dresser who left the palace for the love of Harry Williams, a fellow servant who dreamed of owning land in his own right first in Canada and then in Dakota Territory.


Marie arrived in Rolla in 1887 with nine trunks filled with wedding gifts from the Queen. She and Harry began farming their adjoining homestead claims, but Harry had meager success as a farmer and in 1910 they decided to rent out their land and move into town.

They rented a home in Rolla and opened it as a boarding house, where their borders dined on china, dish sets, and silverware gifted to Marie by the Queen. Eventually the Williamses moved back to their farmstead, but continued to rent out their land.

"Marie often loaned local brides her fancy royal dresses to wear for their weddings and gave away dresses and many other items to friends and acquaintances throughout her lifetime," Steinke said.
"Marie and Harry were not well off, so they also traded the Queen's treasures for goods and services. It is thought the Queen's Order of the Garter ceremonial dress, now at the museum, came to Mrs. J.P. Widmeyer, the wife of a Rolla physician, as

Celebrating Air Force heritage: The "Great Centennial" squadrons

JOINT BASE SAN ANTONIO-RANDOLPH, Texas (AFNS) -- This calendar year has marked many great anniversaries, including the 75th anniversary of Air Training Command and the 70th anniversary of the Air Force. August marks the 110th anniversary of the Aeronautical Division of the Sign Corps—an unbroken line of Airmen began with its creation on Aug. 1, 1907. This year also marks the 100th Anniversary of America's entry into World War I, and with it, some 43 active duty and reserve flying squadrons also celebrate or have celebrated their 100th anniversary. Their century of service reinforces something we all know implicitly—the enduring value of the squadron as the core of our Air Force.

While there has been much refinement in the character of the other Air Force organizations from numbered Air Forces, wings and groups over our history, the basic Air Force aerial framework at the squadron level has changed very little. Certainly names and missions of these squadrons have changed, but the essential fabric of a squadron commander, first sergeant and the arrayed staff and flight teams are largely the same. It is the essential Air Force unit, because squadrons have

often been attached and recombined into lethal fighting elementsretaining their organic identity while fighting our nation's wars.

The 1st Aero Squadron was the only active aerial squadron in the Signal Corps when World War I commenced in Europe in August 1914. It had on strength six aircraft, 12 officers and 54 enlisted personnel. Though small and badly resourced, the most essential formation in the Air Force was already recognizably organized. Initially each aviation company in a squadron was supposed to have a commander and first sergeant, but their small, functional size made this inefficient, making the squadron the center of basic leadership functions.

By World War I, U.S. squadrons were broken into two or more functional flights to help with maintenance and operations, just as the Royal Flying Corps was arranged. Because of the unique nature of flying activities, the squadron moved quickly towards its modern characterformation dedicated to aerial operations, maintenance and support functions, unlike other Army units. With the world at war, the fledgling air service expanded as quickly as it could into 24

active and National Guard squadrons by early 1917, the result of a massive influx of "deficiency" funds from Congress to build a credible Air Force. The continued influx of personnel, and the investment in training and new aircraft, eventually allowed for the air service to reach about 10 percent of all Allied strength by Armistice Day. By that time, Brig. Gen. Billy Mitchell had mastered the art of concentrating air forces which had helped speed the war to an end.

The sheer number of units celebrating their centennials speaks to the grave conditions which spawned their birth. A case could be made that 1917 was the watershed in American air power history for this reason. While only two units in Air Education and Training Command are celebrating their centennial this year, the 87th Flying Training Squadron at Laughlin Air Force Base, Texas, and the 48th FTS at Columbus AFB, Mississippi, most of the other units were formed either as part of a training

cadre at several American air bases, or formed at the advanced flying fields of France at Issoudun.

Training was the common thread that united every aero squadron in 1917. There was no combat-ready squadron ready to fly under the American Expeditionary Forces flag in 1917 (though Americans would become aces and heroes in foreign units such as the Lafayette Escadrille). As these squadrons trained to fill the void, they became resilient teams bound by incredibly swift commitment to the war effort. Training made the difference. Even with a force with little experience, American aircraft enjoyed a 4:1 victory ratio over their enemies and counted 72 aces among its number.

American air power went from negligible to decisive in the space of barely a year. American squadrons spent more time in flight training and mastering aerial weapons than their counterparts and a tradition of providing pilots with a winning syllabus and

realistic experience prior to commitment to battle continues to this day in AETC's advanced flying squadrons.

We have come almost full circle in a way in 2017. It can be said that all squadrons are trained and readied for action by a single force development commander controlling the cycles of training. The squadron as the essential Air Force unit had been conceived primarily for aircraft; but other units, support, space and missile squadrons for example, have continued that heritage and can lean on some of the giants of Air Force history for inspiration.

It is good to pause for a time and embrace the Air Force's roots in this year of anniversaries, to think about how far we have come and what the next century of aerospace power will bring us. All will be well as long as our squadrons remain as they were conceived: cohesive, flexible, strong and expeditionary—and conceived for a mission of some gravity.

payment for medical care." Mrs. Widmeyer's granddaughter Barb Widmeyer Hanson donated the dress and other artifacts to the Rolla Public Library in 1977. The library had a special case built and displayed the dress for nearly half a century. Made of heavy black silk, the elegant twopiece dress features bands of embroidered nature and vegetation patterns. The three-quarter-length sleeves are trimmed with delicate pleated fabric, pleated back netting and black tassels. Black pleated netting edges the hemline and sweeping

"We had this beautiful piece of Rolette County history, but no one was coming in to see it," said library director Becky Sheridan. So, the library board instructed Sheridan to offer the dress and other artifacts to nearby museums with the goal of

providing the artifacts with proper care and greater public exposure. The Rugby museum was the first to say

yes to the dress. "The Rolla Public Library board has done the Geographical Center Historical Society a great honor by entrusting the Downing Williams/Queen Victoria artifacts to us for display and safe keeping," said museum executive director Cathy Jelsing. "The Order of the Garter dress is stunning and in exceptional condition. We are aware of the responsibility associated with caring for and preserving it and all of the objects in the collection and are taking steps to make sure we do things right." Items not on display have been documented and packed in archival storage; a professional conservator has been engaged to

evaluate all the objects and






