FORT MCCOY, Wisc. (AFNS) --

eserve Airmen from the 927th Aeromedical Staging Squadron, MacDill Air Force Base, Florida, along with Soldiers and Sailors from around the country partnered together, completing Engines Running Onload and Offload training during Exercise Patriot Warrior at Fort McCoy, Wisconsin, Aug. 15.

During an ERO scenario, crews of four people are required to carry their patient on a litter to an aircraft or medical vehicle, which will then take the patient where they need to go for further treatment.

Although it may sound easy, the teamwork element is extremely vital to accomplishing this segment. Not only are aeromedical evacuation crews responsible for the patient, they are accountable for ensuring the crew has proper personal protection, making sure that the awaiting aircraft is at a low speed ground idle. From there, crews will have to work together to load and unload patients in a timely matter.

"We learned a lot training with our other military counterparts," said U.S. Army SGT Kyle Keefer, 437th Ground Ambulance, 2nd Medical Brigade. "It's great to have all of the different services together, we continue to learn new things and develop chemistry with each other so that once we're deployed, we're familiar with how each service operates.'

Development of chemistry is essential to mission success as

the opportunity for deployment is only a call away. Continuous practice will ensure that the crews are ready for anything that comes their way.

'We wanted this training to be beneficial not only for our Air Force Service members, but the other branches too,' said Senior Master Sgt. Brad Clark, 927th Aeromedical Staging Squadron senior noncommissioned officerin-charge. "In a deployed atmosphere, there might be a time when one of the Navy members might have to load a patient onto a C-130 aircraft with an Airman and we want that situation to not be unfamiliar to them downrange."

In addition to having fellow Reserve Soldiers and Sailors in attendance, members of

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the Canadian Army were also on scene for observation of the training.

"Watching and observing how the U.S. troops conduct their patient evacuation training is very helpful for us," said Canadian Army Captain Jean-Phillippe Desgroseillers, Canadian Forces Health Services Center, healthcare administration officer. "We learned a lot from this and can take this process back with us

and teach our troops about a simpler method to evacuating patients."

The desired intention for exercise Patriot Warrior is to ensure that Reserve Airmen and their counterparts are mission-ready. Joint integration provides each service with the opportunity to learn from each other and develop rapport with their counterparts.

e was only 3 years old when he unexpectedly lost his father to a heart attack in 1986.

Although too young to understand how to grieve for his dad, Richard Cooper's life changed in an instant. After the loss of his father, he experienced more upheaval when he was separated from his three older brothers and raised as an only child by his

His father figures came primarily in the form of coaches and teachers.

Today, Cooper, a marketing specialist with the Air Force Services Activity, has become a father figure himself as a volunteer with Big Brothers Big Sisters of San Antonio.

After the mortgage crisis of 2008 caused a career change, Cooper began

pursuing his bachelor's degree in marketing which required 120 hours of community service. While his classmates volunteered at local food banks and pursued administrative opportunities, Cooper wanted to do

something more meaningful.

He remembered driving past Big Brothers Big Sisters and wanting to see what it was about. He applied, interviewed and was selected as a "big" to be matched with a "little."

Then, Dec. 9, 2012, Cooper met his new 5-year-old little brother, Rashawn. The youngster was only 9 months old when his father was killed in action in Afghanistan in 2007. Rashawn's father never had an opportunity to meet or

Rashawn's widowed mother, Liz Lewis, an advocate for Wounded Warriors and Gold Star families, found herself focused on providing opportunities for Rashawn to

She reached out to the Big Brothers Big Sisters organization in 2012 and a few months later Rashawn was matched with Cooper.

Lewis says one of the greatest gifts she could

give her son is the opportunity for him to have an amazing man such as Cooper in his life.

"The program is so worth it. It's no cost to the parent and for single-parent homes it's a blessing," she said.

Prior to his match with Rashawn,

Cooper didn't have a direct connection with the military.

"(Being matched with Rashawn) gave me a better appreciation for our armed forces," Cooper said. "Sometimes we hear about good and bad things happening but a lot of people don't really see or understand the day-to-day sacrifices military families make."

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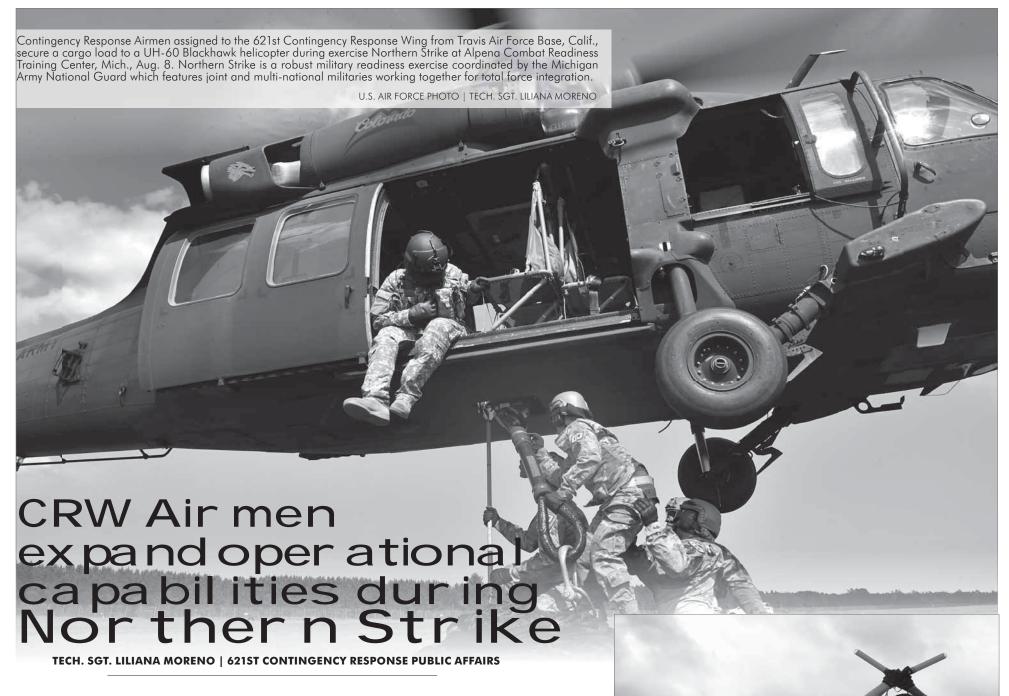
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GRAYLING ARMY AIRFIELD, Mich. (AFNS) -he distinctive sound of aircraft propellers

echoed over the airfield as dozens of aircraft arrived to take part in the joint and multi-national exercise called Northern Strike 2018 from Aug. 4 through 18.

The 821st Contingency Response Group from Travis Air Force Base, California, deployed two small teams in support of the exercise. With one team at Grayling Army Airfield and one at Alpena Combat Readiness Training Center, both located in northern Michigan.

Northern Strike is a robust military readiness exercise coordinated by the Michigan Army National Guard and features Army, Navy, Marines, Air Force, Coast Guard and military members from Estonia, Germany, Hungary, Latvia, Lithuania, Poland and the U.K. working together for total force integration.

With approximately five thousand participants, the primary mission of the exercise is to maximize the fullspectrum combat readiness of each unit participating.

During the exercise, the CR teams worked alongside multiple Army units and the Air National Guard's 165th Airlift Wing from Savannah, Georgia.

"It is critical to our mission that our counterparts know how a CR team fits into their operations," said Capt. Jared Foust, 921st Contingency Response Squadron maintenance flight commander. "Communication is the number one challenge between services. We talk different, our command structure processes info and requests different, and we work different. It comes

down to face-to-face meetings with our counterparts to understand how we can better support each other."

The first mission for the team at Grayling AAF was to help load an Army M142 High Mobility Artillery Rocket System into a C-130H Hercules aircraft for transportation to the Alpena CRTC.

"We have some influence over every sphere of the movements for this mission," said Master Sgt. Kyle Prewitt, contingency response team chief at Grayling AAF. "It provides a look at some unique mission sets for our CRG members and a wonderful opportunity in smaller scale environment that allows more flexibility for training."

The small team of aerial porters, air traffic controllers, command and control, communications maintenance and ramp coordinators quickly went into action and started planning all the moving pieces to complete the mission.

"This is the first time I'm going to be able to do my job," said Airman 1st Class Karley White, 821st Contingency Response Support Squadron aerial porter. "I'm excited," White exclaimed.

Once the HIMARS was loaded into the C-130. White smiled and quickly crawled underneath it to secure it with chains onto the aircraft floor.

Her face showed a sense of accomplishment and pride once the HIMARS was all secured.

As ground operations continued, the CR air traffic controllers stayed busy working side-by-side with the Michigan Army National Guard to ensure safe and secure air flow for all aircraft participating in the exercise.

Northern Strike also afforded the CR teams a unique training opportunity to expand operational capabilities with rotary wing aircraft and gain sling-load experience.

'Our real-world experience from Hurricane Maria involved a massive amount of rotary wing ops. In response, we are seeking out opportunities like Northern Strike to get all CR personnel familiar with this type of aircraft," Foust said. "This exercise gives us a chance to work around rotary wing assets daily...I'm talking Navy, Army and Marine helosall the flavors! Getting our guy's sling-load capable and comfortable with rotary wing airframes is a need for our customers."

When asked, how is such a small team able to make a big impact during the exercise? Prewitt said, "It all starts with understanding the customer requirements and communicating what we can

"Mission planning and trust in your team is a must," he added.

Prewitt believes that early planning helps build relationships and trust with partner units. Which in turn, allows a CRT chief to make sure their team is well prepared for the mission, he said.

'Everyone takes a lot of pride in being a team who can get any job done...I have never been anything but amazed by how well they do their jobs," he said. "Our Airmen are always prepared to do whatever the mission asks them to do."

He knows flexibility is a key factor and even with the best planning efforts there are always changes.

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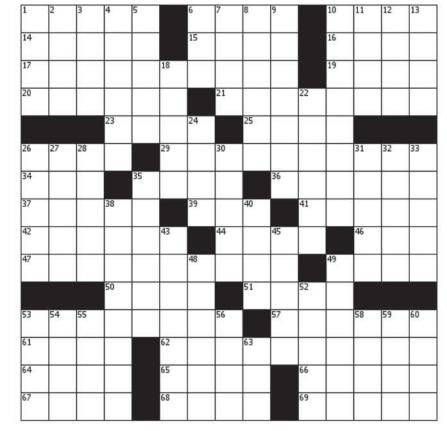

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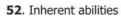

CUBAN CHICKEN Black Bean Rice Bowls



INGREDIENTS:

Chicken

3 Tbsp. vegetable oil

2 large chicken breasts, diced

2 Tbsp. ground cumin

1 Tbsp. chili powder

1 Tbsp. dried oregano salt and pepper to taste

4 garlic cloves

Zest and juice of 1 orange Zest and juice of 1 lime

Black Beans

2 tsp. vegetable oil ½ yellow onion, diced 3 cloves garlic, minced

2 cans black beans, drained 2 tsp. ground cumin 1 tsp. smoked paprika salt and black pepper to taste

Cilantro-Lime Rice

1 tsp. vegetable oil 1/2 yellow onion, diced 1 ½ cups Jasmine rice 3 cups low sodium chicken broth Zest and juice of 2 limes ½ cup cilantro, chopped salt and black pepper to taste

INSTRUCTIONS:

Chicken

- To a blender, combine the ingredients for the chicken marinade. Add the cumin, chili powder, dried oregano, salt and pepper, 4 cloves garlic, zest and juice of 1 orange, and the zest and juice of 1 lime to the blender. Blend together until everything is finely chopped and smooth.
- Add the chicken to a bowl or a Ziploc bag and pour half the marinade over the chicken. Toss to coat and allow the chicken to sit for at least 30 minutes, or overnight in the marinade.
- Heat a large skillet with vegetable oil over medium-high heat. Once the pan is hot add the chicken and cook, 10-12 minutes or until browned all over and cooked throughout. Add the remaining marinade to the skillet and cook until it has reduced slightly, about 5 minutes.

Black Beans

• Heat the vegetable oil in a large cast iron skillet over medium high heat. Add the onions and saute for 3-4 minutes, until soft and translucent. Add the garlic and saute 30-60 seconds. Add the black beans and spices and cook for 5-10 minutes. Using a potato masher, mash about half of the beans in the pan, then mix it all together. Season with salt and pepper if necessary.

ilantro Lime Rice

- Heat the oil in a large saucepan over medium-high heat. Add the onion and saute until soft. Add the rice and stir to coat with the oil allowing to toast for about a minute. Add the chicken broth and increase the heat to high, allowing it to come to a boil. Reduce heat to a simmer and place the lid onthe pan. Cook for about 15 minutes, until most of the liquid has absorbed.
- Turn off the heat and allow rice to sit with the lid on for an additional 5 minutes. Add the lime, cilantro and season with salt and pepper, to taste.
- To serve, divide the cilantro lime rice among bowls. Top with chicken and black beans. Add mango salsa and fried plantains if desired! Mango Salsa Recipes @ cookieandkate.com/2015/fresh-mango-salsa-

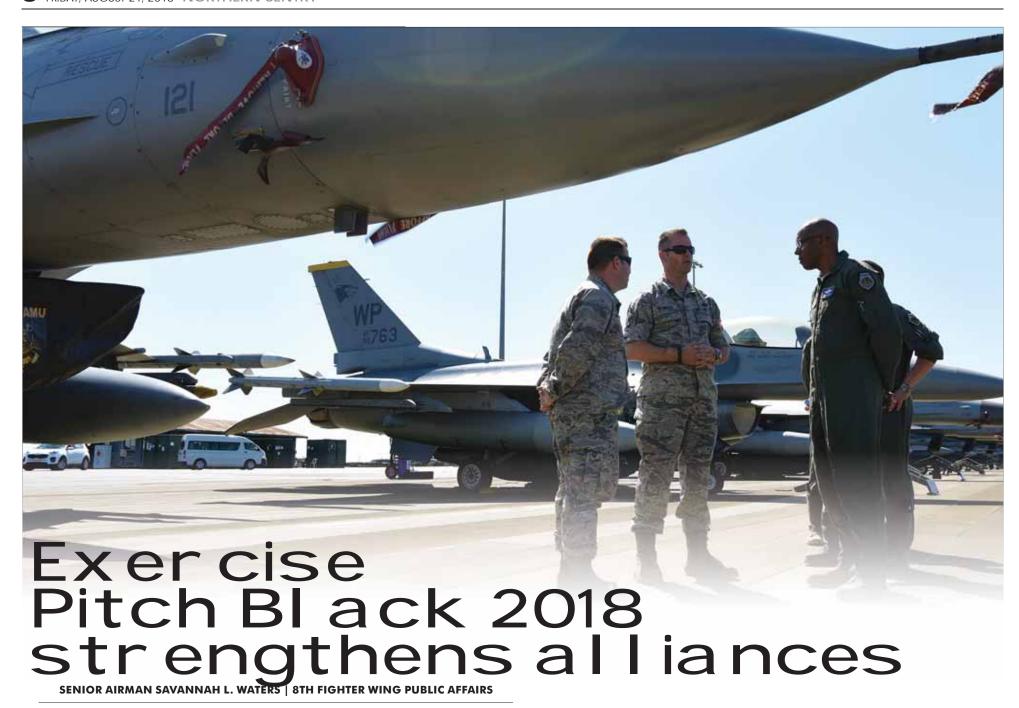












ROYAL AUSTRALIAN AIR FORCE BASE DARWIN, Australia (AFNS) --

xercise Pitch Black 2018 is a Royal Australian Air Force-hosted biennial multinational large force employment exercise held from July 27 through Aug. 17. This year's event, the largest since its inception, involves 16 nations, 140 aircraft and more than 4,000 personnel – approximately 150 of which call the 8th Fighter Wing from Kunsan Air Base, South Korea, their home.

U.S. Air Force Gen. CQ Brown, Jr., Pacific Air Forces commander, received an orientation of Exercise Pitch Black 18 and visited with participating Airmen Aug.

"The National Defense Strategy talks about strengthening alliances and attracting new partners," Brown said. "The Juvats (80th Fighter Squadron) are participating in an exercise with the opportunity to work with other countries' aircraft and military. It's a full integration of planning

efforts and capabilities, allowing us to really build those relationships so we can continue to work together in the future."

Exercise PBK18 allows participant nations to exercise deployed units in the tasking, planning and execution of offensive counter-air and offensive air support while using one of the largest training airspace areas in the world - Bradshaw Field Training Area and Delamere Air Weapons Range.

"The airspace here is about three times the airspace of Nellis Air Force Base, Nevada, one of our larger airspaces

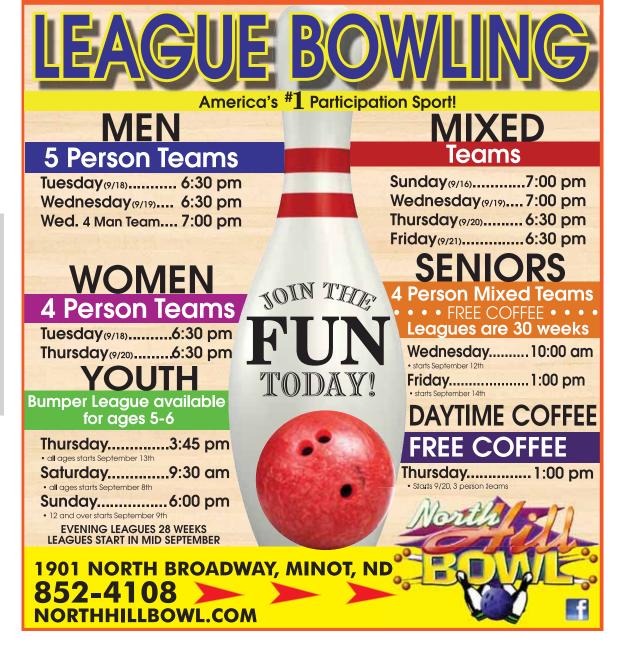
> > in the United States," Brown said. "From my personal experience as a command pilot, to have the vast airspace that we do here allows us to bring in a lot more aircraft, and strengthens our pilots' ability to test their warfighting capabilities."

Another unique aspect of this year is the exercise is conducted as part of the Marine Rotational Force-Darwin initiative, one of two components that comprise a force posture agreement between the

two nations and serves as a tangible demonstration of the United States' sustained commitment to the alliance and the Indo-Pacific region.

"As good as the U.S. Air Force is, each one of these nations has brought a new level of capability to the fight," Brown said. "As nations come together at Exercise Pitch Black, our allied forces show us how they operate, which will help us improve how we operate."

The ability to work with U.S. allied nations and partners and expanding capabilities at these

bases can give PACAF, especially 8th Fighter Wing Airmen, not only a change of pace, but a better appreciation of their personal capabilities, Brown said.

"Having been a part of the Wolf Pack a few times. I know how hard vou exercise," Brown said, who started his career at Kunsan Air Base, Republic of Korea, as a young lieutenant and later served as the wing commander, affectionately known as "the Wolf." "An off-peninsula exercise like Pitch Black provides the Wolf Pack a different

perspective from normal operations, as well as the chance to deploy and employ to different locations."

For the Air Force as a whole, there's value to deploying in different locations, Brown said.

"Airmen, no matter what country you're from, all think alike to an extent," Brown said. "Through this exercise, we can learn more not only about each other's Air Force, but about each other and how and where we operate, improving future joint operations."

Pitch Black began

in 1990 as an exercise between Singapore and Australia. This year's participation includes Australia, Canada, France, Germany, India, Indonesia. Japan, Malaysia, the Philippines, Singapore, South Korea, Sweden, Thailand and the U.S. The exercise includes day and night flying, with participants operating out of both Royal Australian Air Force bases Darwin and Tindal.

In addition to the F-16s from the 80th Fighter Squadron "Juvats," U.S. aircraft participation includes Air Force and

Marine Corps fighters and bombers; refuelers; rotary wing aircraft; and supporting ground forces.

During his visit, Brown also met with various Royal Australian Air Force leadership responsible for directing and supporting the exercise as well as key defense and military leaders over the course of several days in country. The trip was his first since taking command July 26 and provided a firsthand look at not only the U.S. military's participation in the exercise, but also opportunities to strengthen the U.S.-Australia alliance and the Indo-Pacific region.



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he 100th Logistics Readiness Squadron is one of the largest squadrons at RAF Mildenhall, and is the beating heart that keeps the Bloody Hundredth's mission going.

RAF Mildenhall is one of the few bases with an aircraft parts store open 24 hours; leaving no room for a pause in the mission with a constant pulse for overseas and stateside bases requirements as well.

"Our daily mission is to provide logistics support to anyone on the flightline," said Tech. Sgt. Carlise Miles, 100th LRS NCO –in -charge of the aircraft parts store. "When an aircraft has broken components and a maintenance shop needs parts for repairs, whether overseas or stateside, we make sure we get them as soon as possible."

The store's main focus is to maintain assets that support the CV-22 Osprey, C-130 Hercules and the KC-135 Stratotanker. They store a variety of items and equipment, from toilet paper that is stocked in the aircraft to the propellers that lift the CV-22 Osprey. The APS also provides materials and parts for some transient aircraft that arrive at RAF Mildenhall.

"We have to know the parts, whether for aerospace ground equipment or aircraft maintainers, we have to know what we are issuing to make sure the part is up-to-date,' said Senior Airman Barnell Thomas, 100th LRS APS Journeyman.

The Airmen keep their inventory up to date by a computer database and a radio-frequency identification system. Requested items are first found in the computer database, which tells the Airmen the item location in the warehouse. The system also helps them stay up-to date with training and any needs the parts may require, from shelf life to handling instructions.

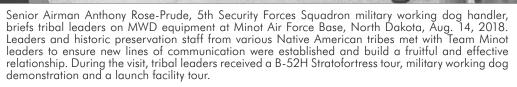

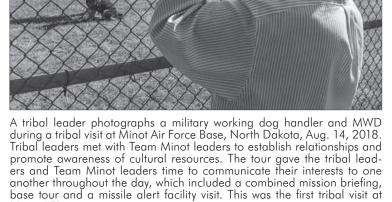

AFAS to award more than \$6 mil I ion in annual grants, schol ar ships

WASHINGTON (AFNS) -he Air Force Aid Society will award more than \$6 million in Gen. Henry Hap Arnold education grants and AFAS merit scholarships to the dependents of active duty and retired Airmen.

A total of 2,556 college and university students will receive the education grants and merit-based scholarships, ranging from \$500 to \$5,000, during the 2018-2019 academic year.

"Providing ongoing educational support to the families of Airmen is the generational impact that our founders General Henry Hap and Mrs. Bee Arnold envisioned when AFAS was established over 76 years ago," said retired Maj. Gen. and AFAS board president Judge William A. Moorman. "We are excited to continue their legacy in recognizing the academic excellence of these students with these awards."

The General Henry Hap Arnold education grants are awarded based on financial need and

take into consideration a family's income and the student's educational costs. Each year, named grants are awarded to students in honor of individuals or organizations that have exemplified extraordinary service to the U.S. Air Force. A select group of incoming college and university freshmen who completed the Gen. Henry Hap Arnold education grant application with a 4.0 GPA were invited to apply for the AFAS merit-based, achievement scholarships. Applications were evaluated based on cumulative GPA scores, high school transcripts and written essays. Each year, topics focus on issues that adversely affect school and college campuses. This year, students were asked to submit essays on sexual assault, bullying and school shootings.

"Our Airmen and their families rely on the financial support we provide each year through the educational grants and scholarships," said AFAS CEO and retired Lt. Gen. John D. Hopper Jr. "Thank you to our generous donors, who make what we do possible. It means a great deal that we are able to provide financial relief to help offset rising college tuition costs for so many Air Force families."

Students who applied for the Henry Hap Arnold education grants are also eligible to receive an additional \$1,000, no-interest AFAS supplemental education loan for the upcoming academic year to cover incidental college expenses.

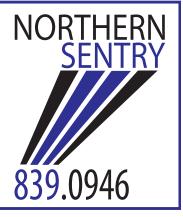

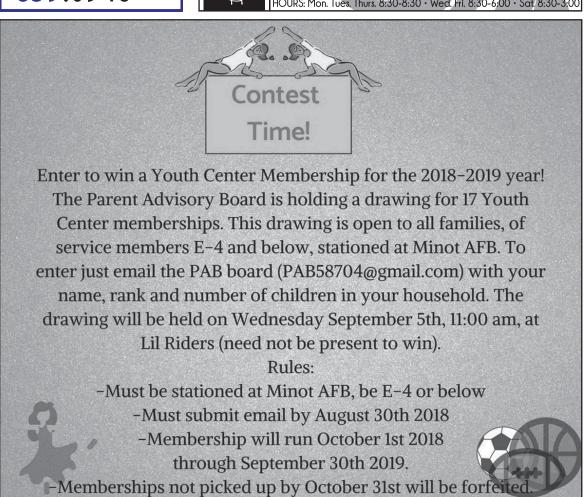

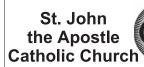

Rashawn, or RJ for short, became brothers, they connected instantly.

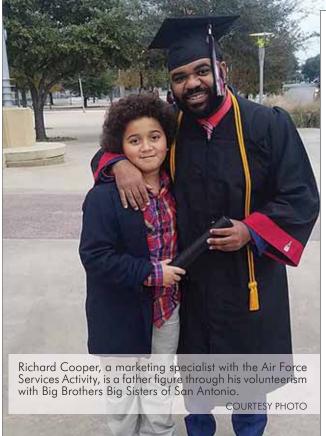
"Becoming a big brother was the best decision I've ever made," Cooper said. "At first I figured I'd volunteer a little on the weekends and give back like so many of the male role models did for me as a young boy, but RJ truly enriched my life and I immediately became invested in him. It was a humbling experience. RJ inspired me to be a better man."

According to its website, Big Brothers Big Sisters of South Texas' vision is that "all children achieve success in life."

In an effort to help children succeed, Big Brothers Big Sisters recommends mentors provide a minimum 12-month commitment in an effort to provide consistency, trust and mentorship to a little brother or sister. However, there are many bigs and littles who stay connected far beyond a year.

"RJ has been in my life for nearly six years. We are family. We will always be a part of each other's lives and share a special bond," Cooper

Big Brothers Big Sisters has been connecting mentors and children for more than



a century. The organization matches children ages 6 through 18 with adult mentors, operating in all 50 United States and in 12 countries around the world with the belief every child has the ability to succeed and thrive in life.

The program offers an opportunity to connect adults and children together, however, with a shortage of mentors and such high demand, male mentors like Cooper are especially crucial to the organization.

"We develop positive relationships that have a direct and lasting effect on the lives of young people. At any given time, there are up to 1,000 children on our waiting list," said Christina Martinez,

vice president of external relations and Big Sister of the organization. "It is critical for us to continue to recruit, train and match caring adults, like Richard Cooper, to children in our community who need the support. Most of the children on our waiting list are boys of color, and the majority of volunteers who enroll are female. We are always trying to fill the gap by intentionally recruiting caring and committed men, like Richard."
