WASHINGTON (AFNS) -s of 2017, approximately two million people currently serve in the U.S. military with millions of veterans serving before them in the several hundred year history of the country's armed forces. All of these service members chose to don their respective service's uniform for varying

reasons. Many sign up to give back to their country. Others join for a steady paycheck, to learn a new skill, or for the numerous benefits such as medical and education, available to service members.

For some, they join to continue a family heritage. Such is the case for Marco and Ivan Kalkbrenner, two brothers who chose to continue their family's legacy of service, following

in the footsteps of their father and grandmother. Ivan is an Air Force staff sergeant currently assigned to MacDill Air Force Base, Florida, as a security forces member. Marco retired in 2017 as a master sergeant following 20 years of service, also as a security forces member.

While their paternal grandmother began the family's lineage, it was their father, Anthony Dimitri Kalkbrenner, who instilled the extreme sense of pride and service to the

military.

"My father would give you the shirt off his back for anyone in need," said Ivan. "He was just that type of person; an incredible role model. They really broke the mold when they made him and I'm striving to become more like him."

Anthony served in the Navy and served 30 years, retiring as a chief warrant officer four, the highest warrant officer position in the Navy at the time. During his career, he was stationed around the world, including

stops at Norfolk, Virginia, and Spain, where Marco was born. Early in his life, Marco was engrained in the military culture, inspired by his father's service, mentorship and discipline.

"When you heard my dad talk, you knew he had Navy running through his veins,' Marco said. "He didn't force us to be in the military, we did it because that was our calling. I

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# Air men, Sol diers strengthen j oint skill sets in Exercise Predictable Iron

JOINT BASE LEWIS-MCCHORD, Wash. (AFNS) --

irmen from the 62nd Airlift Wing participated in a joint exercise with the 82nd Airborne Division to drop equipment and personnel at two drop zones during Exercise Predictable Iron Aug. 20 to 24 at Pope Field, North Carolina.

Airmen from the 7th and 8th Airlift Squadrons crewed two C-17 Globemaster IIIs to assist more than a thousand Army paratroopers in the exercise as joint training between the 62nd AW and 82nd Airborne.

"It is crucial that the Air Force and Army work well together because without

each other the mission fails," said Capt. Jared Barkemeyer, 7th AS pilot and aircraft commander for the two services and one of the C-17s. "Without the reliable transport the Air Force provides, the Army could not execute their objectives in a timely manner via airdrop.

"The airdrop insertion at a mass scale is something no other nation in the world can provide," he continued. "But, without the Army, the Air Force would strictly serve an air-land mission and, as a service, we would become less flexible to user requests."

The Airmen worked alongside Soldiers to load equipment onto the aircraft, as well as with jumpmasters and paratroopers to help them maintain their readiness requirements for airborne missions.

"Every jump I've been on the Air Force has been extremely helpful, accommodating and willing to work with us," said Maj. Brian Plover, 173 Cavalry Scout, 2nd Brigade operations officer. "I have had no issues at all with the Air Force in my time jumping or as a jumpmaster."

A benefit of the joint exercise was determining where there may be shortfalls and strengthening those areas to become more efficient or effective. "It's important that the Air Force participate in these events to ensure that we are ready to do what our nation expects of us, which is to insert the 82nd Airborne anywhere in the world within a short time frame," Barkemeyer said.

"Also, during these events we identify shortcomings between eliminate them in order to strengthen our jointforce initiative."

Over the course of three days, Airmen and Soldiers dropped 40 tons of equipment, such as armored vehicles and re-supply containers, as well as 1,005 paratroopers.

"Working with the Army was great," Barkemeyer said. "Inserting hundreds of jumpers into an objective area tests the crew's abilities, as well as strengthens our habit patterns. The 82nd jumpers are some of the toughest service members around and being able to airdrop them is an honor.

"The exercise was a total joint success," he continued. "The Army users received all the training they needed as scheduled, and the 62nd AW provided every lift on time thanks to the aircrews as well as the outstanding 62nd AW maintenance support that kept the aircraft mission ready all week."

During one of the personnel airdrops, the Army also practiced dropping the caster assisted A-series Delivery System, which is a new method to drop door bundles, a container of equipment pushed out the doors of an aircraft.

"It's pretty much a door bundle on

Master Sergeants of the Air Force, participated in the 2018 Senior Enlisted Statesman Forum Sept. 6 at Offutt Air Force Base, Nebraska.

The forum, the first of its kind since Wright's tenure began, was an opportunity to discuss the future of the Air Force focusing on policy, training and resilience.

"I updated them on the current enlisted programs we have, ranging from enlisted Professional Military Education to promotions to policy updates and some potential changes like bereavement leave and fitness," Wright said. "I admire, respect and look up to them and I wanted to spend some time with the folks whose shoulders I stand upon."

Although many strides have been made over the years in realms such as technology, Wright said there is an overlap in the hurdles he faces today to those faced in the past. The forum was a means for him to receive instant feedback and gain perspective and knowledge from the prior Chief Master Sergeants of the Air Force.

"They are very experienced," Wright said. "They have lived the same life in various eras, so it was really good to hear from them and their perspective. I was able to glean some knowledge and mentorship about how they handled things during their time in the seat. I think the value of having mentors, period, is extremely important."

Wright's predecessors, although retired, still play a huge role in developing Airmen. Many still engage frequently with

Airmen at venues such as Professional Military Education schoolhouses, making it vital for them to be informed of program innovations.

"The former Chief Master Sergeants of the Air Force are still tremendously involved in our Air Force," Wright said. "They continue to do speaking engagements at graduations, banquets and professional enhancement seminars, so I wanted to make sure they are kept up-to-date on what we are doing and we are in sync in terms of messaging.'

While the attendees may have benefited from the forum, Wright said he wants the real beneficiaries to be the 295,000 enlisted Airmen across the service. His focus is on growing those numbers and retaining the talent already in-house.

"I think the enlisted force will benefit in that I will take the advice, guidance and mentorship I received and continue to make all the enlisted programs better," Wright said. "We will continue to do things we have been doing to help our enlisted Airmen become more lethal, ready and resilient and better led."

Although no date is set for the next forum, Wright said he hopes to continue open dialogue with the retired chiefs.

"I think we will do this once a year," Wright said. "We get other opportunities to meet, just not as focused as what we did yesterday, so we agreed that we would like to come together like

Overall, Wright felt the forum was productive and he said he is excited to take what he learned and apply

"It was a pleasure to be here," Wright said. "It was an extremely successful event that further increased my admiration for the former Chief Master Sergeants of the Air Force."

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## Air Force's fir st Invisible Wounds Center opens

EGLIN AIR FORCE BASE, Fla. (AFNS) --

he 96th Medical Group opened the Air Force's first **Invisible Wounds** Center Aug. 30, at Eglin Air Force Base.

More than 120 people attended the event and toured the new facility, including Air Force Surgeon General, Lt. Gen. Dorothy Hogg, 96th Test Wing installation commander, Brig. Gen. Evan C. Dertien and members of the local community.

Hogg, the guest speaker for the ceremony, thanked everyone who helped standup the center and also reaffirmed the Air Force's commitment to providing 'Trusted Care' to our military members.

'Standing up this facility is just the first step of many in our commitment to care for our warriors with invisible wounds," she said. "We owe these brave men and women the very best treatment possible. Today, we make good on that commitment."

The center will serve as a regional treatment center for post-traumatic stress, traumatic brain injury, associated pain conditions and psychological injuries.

"The center is ready to treat retirees, Guard, Reserve, and active duty members from our sister services who carry the weight of invisible wounds," said Hogg. "Our goal is to eliminate barriers to care. We want to treat our service members with dignity through every phase of their recovery."

The IWC, modeled after the best practices of the Intrepid Spirit Centers, will assemble a team of 18 specialties under one roof, providing treatment in an individually tailored, holistic and integrated fashion, using a combination of conventional and complimentary therapies.

"We're here for you, we're ready to serve you," said Dertien. "The facility and the capabilities we



wo U.S. Air Force aircraft and more than 90 U.S. Airmen are participating in "Angel de los Andes," a Colombian-led international search and rescue training exercise Sept. 3-14.

The Air Combat Command number 5 unit at Arturo Lema Posada Air Base in Rionegro is the staging ground for the exercise. This is the second time the Colombian Air Force has conducted Angel de los Andes, the first was in 2015.

"I'm confident that Angel de los Andes, with its mission to save lives, will extend and further our relationship, cooperation

and exchange of best practices which will benefit the U.S. and Colombian Air Forces," said Colombian Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Carlos Eduardo Bueno Vargas. "The significant importance of the U.S. being here is that we have the opportunity to strengthen our relationship so we can be prepared to confront future threats together."

One C-17 Globemaster III from the 14th Airlift Squadron at Charleston Air Force Base, South Carolina, and one C-130 Hercules from the 133rd Airlift Squadron with the Minnesota Air National Guard are among the eight U.S. Air Force active, guard and reserve components participating.

"The U.S. has been our "big brother" for many years and we have a special relationship based on gratitude and respect and that is why they are our guest of honor to this important exercise," Bueno Vargas said. "While all of the participating countries

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are important Colombian allies, the U.S. has a special relationship with Colombia since they have helped us overcome our most difficult moments, not only for the Colombian Air Force, but also for Colombia as a whole against narcoterrorism and

drug trafficking threats."

The first week of the exercise is focused on responding to natural disaster scenarios that include earthquake response, forest fire and open water rescue, as

are building here have the impact and the potential to change people's lives. This sends the message that we can talk about invisible wounds. It's okay to ask for help."

Art and music therapy, yoga, acupuncture, physical and occupational therapy and mental health services will also be included in treatment.

"Having all these services under one roof, complimenting each other, provides treatment and healing in ways that are only now being recognized," said Hogg. "The providers will also address physical, spiritual, mental and social wellbeing to further ensure positive health outcomes."

Hogg shared positive accounts from wounded warriors she met at Intrepid Spirit Centers on military installations around the country. She attributed their success to the mind and body approach to treatment and community involvement. She also

noted patient, caregiver and family education is key component in the healing process.

"We learned the best outcomes occur when a host of people are involved in the healing process," she said. "Complete healing and reintegration requires healing the patient as well as the family."

The ceremony concluded with a good news, momentous announcement for the military community.

Hogg said the Department of Defense recently accepted a proffer from Arnold Fisher, honorary chairman of the Intrepid Fallen Heroes Fund, to build an Intrepid Spirit Center at Eglin AFB, making it the tenth of its kind and the first on an

Air Force base. Plans for the ground breaking are underway, and officials expect a completion of the facility in 2020.

Fisher described these facilities as "centers of hope," and adds that these center are not built by the government, but by donations from the American people. He said that thought is reassuring because Americans believe this is the right model to treat invisible wounds, according to Hogg.

"Fisher is determined to continue his mission to build Intrepid Spirit Centers," said Hogg.
"Today the Air Force is forever grateful to him and all the donors who will

make the Intrepid Spirit Center here a reality." do you need more business?

he Air Force Reserve's 53rd Weather Reconnaissance Squadron is flying missions into Hurricane Florence over the Atlantic Ocean and Hurricane Olivia over the Pacific Ocean this week.

The 53rd WRS is the only Defense Department unit that flies reconnaissance missions into severe tropical weather during the hurricane season, June 1 through Nov. 30, to gather data for the National Hurricane Center to improve the center's forecasts and storm warnings.

The Hurricane Hunters' first mission into Florence is Monday, and they began flying into Olivia today, said Maj. Jeremy DeHart, 53rd Weather Reconnaissance Squadron Aerial Reconnaissance Weather Officer.

The Hurricane Hunters departed Keesler Air Force Base, Mississippi, today to operate out of Savannah/ Hilton Head International Airport, Savannah, Georgia, for Florence reconnaissance. Florence became a hurricane today and could impact the southeast coast, according to the NHC.

The Hurricane Hunters arrived at Kalaeloa Airport, Hawaii, Saturday and will continue missions into Hurricane Olivia as long as the system remains a threat to the Hawaiian Islands, said DeHart. Olivia is expected to affect the islands by Tuesday, according to the Central Pacific Hurricane Center.

The Pacific and Atlantic Oceans are data sparse environments due to the lack of radar and weather balloons in those areas, and satellite data can be incomplete, so the data the Hurricane Hunters provide is vital, potentially saving lives and property, said DeHart. During a hurricane, crews fly through the storms at 5,000 to 10,000 feet above sea level, flying through the eye of a storm four to six times to locate

the low-pressure center and circulation. During each pass through the center, they release a dropsonde, which collects weather data such as surface winds and pressure on its descent to the ocean surface. This information is sent to NHC by satellite communication every 10 minutes.

Providing this data to the NHC will keep the squadron busy this week, but it's not unusual for the squadron to fly multiple storms at the same time, said Dehart. The squadron's area of operations is vast, extending from the middle of the Atlantic to just past the Hawaiian Islands, and through an inter-agency agreement, tropical weather reconnaissance is governed by the National Hurricane Operations Plan. This plan requires the squadron to support 24-hour-a-day continuous operations, with the ability to fly up to three storms simultaneously with response times of 16 hours.

Last year, was the 10th busiest season on record, and the squadron flew Hurricanes Katia, Jose, and Irma simultaneously.

This month looks to be a busy one as well for the Hurricane Hunters. There are two other storms behind Florence. According to the National Hurricane Center. Tropical Depression Nine became Tropical Storm Isaac Saturday afternoon in the Atlantic and may become a hurricane on Monday. Following Isaac, is Tropical Storm Helene, which is expected to become a hurricane later today.

loved the military and serving and protecting the country. My dad had such pride in the military and I saw that and it rubbed off on me and my brother."

So in 1996, following an unsuccessful attempt at community college, Marco decided to join the military. With aspirations to be a pilot, and eventually an astronaut, Marco trekked to the local recruiter's office.

"I spoke to the Navy recruiter first, and he upset me because he told me I couldn't be a pilot," Marco said. "A couple days later I went to the Air Force recruiter. He was straightforward with me, told me not what I wanted to hear, but what I needed to hear."

Without a college education, he wasn't qualified to be a pilot, but was told he could still work on the aircraft as a crew chief. On July 24, 1996, the recruiter offered Marco a guaranteed position as an F-16 crew chief, his favorite aircraft. The catch was he had to leave that night. Deterred, Marco immediately phoned his father for advice who encouraged him to accept the offer.

Marco came home that day to a duffel bag, packed by his father with all the necessities, including a toiletry bag Marco still possesses. At the Military Entrance Processing Station, Marco asked the recruiter if Anthony could swear him into the Air Force.

"I knew when I joined the military that I wanted my dad to be a part of (my career),' Marco said. "My dad really didn't have a father figure, so I wanted my dad to be a part of everything I did in my life."

The request was granted, the ceremony completed and Marco was off to basic training.

A job change shortly followed and Marco graduated security forces technical training, where his father attended and pinned his security forces shield on him at Carter Hall.

Marco served in several locations around the world, including multiple deployments to Iraq and Bosnia. Keeping with his wishes of having his father heavily involved in his career, Marco asked Anthony to perform every reenlistment ceremony throughout his career. Without fail, Anthony made it happen, sometimes taking several flights to the other side of the world to complete the task.

"The reason I had my dad involved in everything military, was because he had so much pride serving his country. He instilled that in us when raising us. Take pride and ownership in what you do, both the good and the bad."

Eventually, Marco became a security forces technical school instructor and in 2008, pinned the security forces shield onto Ivan, in the exact same location at Carter Hall where Marco received his shield 12 years before.

"It makes me proud that my brother decided to join the military and continue the tradition," Marco said. "Being a part of his training for tech school was cool. He knew me as 'Instructor Kalkbrenner', which is totally different than Marco. He had it a little bit harder (than other students). We played a bunch of jokes on him with my team instructors to let him know we were watching.'

Just like his brother before him, Ivan wanted his father to perform the enlistment ceremony. When Ivan got a short-notice opportunity to go to basic training, his father once again did whatever he could to ensure he enlisted his son.

"He would impress upon us, 'When you join the military, this is what it is," Ivan said. "You're there for each other no matter what.' So my dad

dropped everything and took off work. drove up and swore me in."

Being a military child, and with a brother serving as an instructor in the career field he was entering, Ivan figured basic training and technical school would be a cakewalk.

"The military definitely opened my eyes and it's a continual process of learning something new," he said. "But being broken down and built back up, I found a lot of my own weaknesses and made them my strong points."

Figuring his technical school would be a breeze with Marco serving as an instructor, Ivan received a rude awakening upon arrival.

"He pointed me out to his buddies and they all started smirking," Ivan recalled. "At that point I realized it was going to be interesting. I feel my brother made it harder on me, not out of spite, or picking on me, but to let me know there's no free rides. It doesn't matter who you know, you still have to put in the work and earn your keep. He made it very clear that's what I had to do from day one. Without that, I probably would have taken my whole career as a free ride thinking, 'Who do I know to make this process easier for myself?' That alone was one of the biggest lessons I had. You've got to earn your keep."

Throughout his career, Ivan also kept his father heavily involved, performing every reenlistment ceremony to date. He also called his father often, asking for mentorship through hard times and seeking guidance when needed.

"The whole time in the military, if he was around, I could always go to him. I loved his old school mentality on military things. No matter what the issue was, if I was conflicted, indecisive, or just needed someone to talk to, I would just give him a call. It didn't matter the hour, he would answer, just listen and after an



hour of listening, he would go into a lecture. I needed that in my life."

Unfortunately, Ivan no longer makes those calls, and his father can no longer reenlist him.

On March 31, 2016, Ivan was on maritime patrol in Florida when he got a call from Marco at 4 a.m.

"The first thing he said was, 'What are you doing right now?' I could tell in his voice something was off," Ivan said. "He never calls me at that hour and I've never heard the tremble in his voice like that ever. So my heart started pounding and he asked, 'How soon can you get home?"

Anthony had a major heart attack and passed away.

"I was completely crushed," Ivan said. "I've lost people in the service before; good friends, people I've deployed with. That really shook me. But losing your role model and mentor without getting to say goodbye or ask for some last minute tips on how to live, it crushed me.

Several years earlier, Marco and his father discussed preparations for when Anthony passed away. When the day finally came, Marco knew he had to be strong for his family.

"When my dad passed away I went into the mode of getting everything ready for the funeral," Marco said. "After all was done, it started to dawn on me that my dad isn't going to be there to reenlist me again."

The duty of reenlisting him could only be filled by Anthony, and with his 20 year retirement date approaching, Marco said it was time to leave the military. He set his retirement in motion, scheduling the ceremony April 1, 2017, one year and a day

after his father's passing, and exactly nine years after Ivan enlisted in the Air Force.

"I wanted to make everything symbolic to my dad's military career, so my retirement ceremony was all about paying tribute to my career in the military, but also paying tribute to my dad as well," Marco said. "I had it all planned out for my dad to officiate the ceremony. At the end, he was going to say, 'I put you in, I made sure you stayed in, and now it's time for you to go. You are dismissed.' Every time he would reenlist me he would say that."

Unfortunately, that never happened. Keeping with his plan to honor his father's legacy, he went to a Navy recruiter and explained his intentions in honoring Anthony's legacy. The recruiter quickly volunteered to pull watch behind an empty chair, representative of his father's presence.

"To be at my brother's retirement, that my father was supposed to be at, it kind of brought me back and humbled me," Ivan said. "Being that my father wasn't there, he had the chair, but no one sat in it. (My brother) had a Seaman pull watch and stand at parade rest behind the chair during the entire ceremony. I saw it and it made sense. I kept staring at the chair, and started tearing up a little bit. He mentioned the chair at the end of the ceremony and that's when the water works turned on."

When Anthony retired from the Navy, he made a plaque of the Kalkbrenner's serving the military and their country. Engraved on the plaque is the names and service dates of every family member who has served.

"He said, 'I'm passing this

plaque on to you, when you retire, you send it to the next Kalkbrenner in the bloodline serving the country," Marco said. "So when I retired, I had that plaque, put my dates of service on there, and put Ivan's name on there, with the date he swore in, with a dash and a blank. I presented Ivan the same plaque, and said the same thing to him that my dad had told

Marco transitioned quickly from military service to civilian service as he joined the ranks of the Goldsboro Police Department in North Carolina, patrolling the city surrounding his last military assignment, Seymour Johnson AFB. While he has no regrets in choosing to retire when he did, he still feels the connection and brotherhood he felt for 20 years, often stopping by to say hello to his former Airmen at the base's entry control points.

"I became a civilian police officer because (of my) service in the military. I loved it so much that I wanted to do it as a civilian as well," Marco said. "I love the military and have the same mentality my dad had. It's my Air Force.

Marco said joining the military and following in his dad's footsteps is just the 'Kalkbrenner' thing to do now. Just as his father before him, Marco said he would be proud of his kids joining the military, but he wouldn't push them. However, both brothers believe the legacy will continue on.

"I don't think it's going to stop," Ivan said. "It's only a matter of time before Marco's kids, and my kids, start asking questions. Then we'll explain to them who my father and mother were and why we serve. Just like it did to us, something is going to light a fire in them and not make it go out. I hope it makes me as proud as my dad

well as, responding to an aircraft crash. The second week will focus on close air support and combat search and rescue techniques.

"In a real world humanitarian assistance disaster response relief event in the U.S. Southern Command AoR we would expect to work with these same partner nations that are participating in this exercise," said U.S. Air Force Maj. Juan Pazarro, 12th Air Force (Air Forces Southern) Colombian desk officer.

400 participants from 12 nations' air forces, including Argentina, Brazil, Canada, Chile, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, France, Panama, Peru and Uruguay.

"Managing 11 different nations can be challenging but I think that the Colombian's have done a great job at integrating all of these different countries, all of the capabilities that they bring to this exercise," Pizarro said.

The remaining U.S. units participating are: 571st Mobility Support Advisory Squadron at Travis Air Force Base, California; 48th Rescue Squadron, 306th Rescue Squadron, 612th Air Operations Center, 943rd Aerospace Medicine Squadron, 12th Air Force (Air Forces Southern) that are all stationed at Davis-Monthan Air Force Base, Arizona.

wheels," Plover said. "It's a new thing, every jump we push out a CAADS. It holds supplies that are needed immediately, such as water, food or ammo."

While the exercise provided the Airmen with the opportunity to work alongside Soldiers, it also provided a chance for Air Force crews from other squadrons to work together.

"I thoroughly enjoyed participating in this exercise all week," Barkemeyer said. "Working with my crew from the 7th AS, as well as the crew from the 8th AS, was awesome. We worked really well as one unit and had fun doing it."

Exercise Predictable Iron provided the opportunity for the Air Force and Army to strengthen their skill sets together and work toward a common goal. Exercises such as this one help accomplish the Defense Department's enduring mission to provide combat-credible military forces needed to deter war and protect the nation's security.



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
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

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
