LITTLE ROCK AIR FORCE BASE, Ark. (AFNS) --

ittle Rock Air Force Base hosted Arkansas' largest Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics festival in conjunction with the Thunder Over the Rock Air and Space Show, with a field trip day Oct. 26 that drew more than 20,000 attendees, over 13,000 of whom were students.

The students, teachers and chaperones in attendance experienced exhibits focused on science, technology, engineering and mathematics with the goal of building interest in ŠTEM-oriented careers.

"We all felt a lot of responsibility to live up to the expectations of 13,000 students and their teachers,



but seeing the amazed looks on their faces drove home how important this experience was for our young people," said Maj. Kyle Sanders, STEM Fest director. "It was our chance to bring their textbooks to life and connect with science professionals from

the entire region." The exhibits included a robotics competition, drone races, a National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration high-altitude weather balloon launch, and NASA's Journey to

Tomorrow, a traveling exhibit that immerses visitors in a fun-filled interactive experience.

The festival offered a chance for Arkansas institutions and professionals to interact with a variety of students from across the state.

"This amount of student engagement you cannot put a price on; it's unprecedented in Arkansas," said Chris Lynch, Arkansas Department of Career Education STEM coordinator.

STEM careers are

projected to be the fastest growing sector in the next few decades. In partnering with the state of Arkansas, Little Rock AFB hoped to expose attendees to STEM careers by connecting them with professionals in a variety of fields.

"Both our nation and our local economy depend on technology to thrive," Sanders said. "We hope that this event helped inspire the next generation of scientists and engineers."

The **Š**TEM Fest also ran

throughout the Thunder Over the Rock Air and Space Show Oct. 27-28, and was open to the public. The festival exhibits complemented the air and space show by highlighting the vital role STEM plays in aviation technology and the Air Force.

"STEM is important because it's what makes the world go 'round," said Capt. Ian Bergstrom, STEM Fest augmentee. "It's important to get that into a child's perspective at a young age."

Reserve maintainers take part in Air Force light attack experiment

MOODY AIR FORCE BASE, Ga. (AFNS) --

It's not every day a pair of Reserve Citizen Airman maintainers get to help shape the future of the Air Force, but events like the recent light attack experiment can provide the opportunity.

Senior Master Sgt. Scott Lopez, 476th Maintenance Squadron maintenance superintendent at Moody Air Force Base, Georgia, and Tech. Sgt. Lauren Camarena, an electrical and environmental systems craftsman with the 476th MXS, travelled to Holloman AFB, New Mexico, for two months earlier this year to take part in phase two of the experiment.

The experiment tested the capabilities and maintainability of the AT-6 Wolverine and the A-29 Super Tucano light attack aircraft to determine which plane would best fit the Air Force's needs in a close-air-support role.

The AT-6 is a variant of the Beechcraft T-6 Texan training aircraft currently in use by the U.S. Air Force and Navy. The

A-29 is in service in multiple countries around the world. The planes flew multiple

times a day, testing things like reliability, ease of maintenance and cost to operate while 26 Air Force maintainers watched and documented.

Lopez worked as the maintenance superintendent of the team observing the A-29. His active-duty counterpart, Senior Master

Sgt. Ron Dedman from the 366th Aircraft Maintenance Squadron at Mountain Home Air Force Base, Idaho, led the AT-6 observation team. Camarena served as an observer, watching directly as civilian teams worked on the Super Tucano.

The focus on the maintenance piece was huge," said Camarena. "It's like the Air Force said 'let's look at this plane before we buy it The Airmen were not allowed to actually touch any of the maintenance during the experiment. More importantly, they were told not to express any opinions. "We're both very open and expressive people," said Lopez. "So we really had to be careful. We really toed that line." Each member of the observation teams signed a non-disclosure agreement prohibiting the sharing of information between the AT-6 and the A-29 teams "My team did their thing, their team did their thing," he said. "We were completely separated. And we just observed maintenance." During the experiment, Lopez led his total force team as they documented

more than 170 training missions flown in the A-29, including working with three allied special operations forces to train more than a dozen foreign joint terminal attack controllers.

"This was a joint operation," said Lopez. Pilots selected for the experiment included Airmen, Marines, and naval aviators. He also touted the combined operations with allied nations. "It was an

> awesome opportunity," he said.

Data collection, while the primary purpose of the experiment, was just the beginning.

The team also, in conjunction with the 49th Wing Weapons Standardization Section, certified Air Combat

Command's first munitions-load-qualified joint-service aircrew. They poured over more than 200 maintenance manuals and provided recommendations to build up the Air Force's maintenance capability for the OA-X project.

Army, Navy provide Tyndall much-needed support

TYNDALL AIR FORCE BASE, Fla. (AFNS) -hile Hurricane Michael created catastrophic

devastation to most of Tyndall Air Force Base, Florida, the relief efforts were a reminder of the symbiotic relationship between military branches.

In the days following the storm, the Air Force came in droves to provide support, with the Navy and Army not far behind Engineers from the Naval Mobile Construction Battalion 133, Gulfport, Mississippi, and the 46th Engineer Battalion, Fort Polk, Louisiana, hit the ground running.

They traveled in convoys bringing with them construction vehicles and equipment. Unable to bring everything they would need, they also arranged to have contracted vehicles meet them at Tyndall AFB.

Klein echoes his sentiment. "We have stood up to do hurricane response three times in the past two years and "We are all here to take care this is the first time we have actually been called out to help," he said. "The soldiers are getting to experience what the Army does, what the military does and what the Department of Defense does."

> At the end of the day, the Army and Navy have the same end goal – to return normalcy to the base and surrounding community.

"Contractors have thanked us for helping because the base is a huge source of revenue for the local community," said Bunter. "Hopefully this base recovers and hopefully what we do is a big help to everything."

Getting the mission up and running is also a priority. "We have to get it right so they are able to go out continue what their mission is," said Klein. "They run a very important mission out of this base, so it is important for the nation and DoD to get it up and running as quick as possible."

Thompson, who's work focuses on drug and alcohol prevention and is a nationally certified psychiatric technician, supported 12 mental health providers by providing patient care to approximately 9,000 beneficiaries and facilitated instructing more than 765 students through weekly Drunk Busters and Peer to Peer education on substance use

Thompson attributed winning this award as a team effort.

"I believe I won simply because my leadership believed in me," Thompson said. "They spent a lot of time putting together my package, making sure I was doing the things that I needed singing," he said. "My to do and making sure my passion was directed in the right direction."

Tech. Sgt. Anna Coker, 81st MDOS mental health technician NCO in charge, said she nominated Thompson for the award because he goes above and beyond each day.

'His ability to help the patients through their times



of need is a true testament of why I nominated him," she said. "Every patient speaks highly of the care. Thompson has always gone above and beyond throughout his career, and I am happy to see him recognized for his hard work."


She added that Thompson's impact on the alcohol and drug abuse prevention program contributed to Keesler winning the 2017 Air Force Surgeon General's Best Hospital of the Year.

"The most rewarding part for me is listening to someone who is struggling, and helping them walk out of the door better than they walked in," he said. "It feels good knowing that something I did or said helped them through a tough time.'








Creamy Chicken TORTELLINI SOUP



INGREDIENTS:

- 1 tablespoon, extra virgin olive oil
- 1 large sweet onion, peeled and chopped • 1 red bell pepper, seeded and
- chopped • 2 cups sliced carrots
- 4 garlic cloves, minced
- 1 1/4 pounds boneless skinless chicken breast, 2 large breasts
- 9 cups chicken broth
- 8.8 ounce package, DeLallo

INSTRUCTIONS:


Place a large sauce pot over medium heat. Add the olive oil and chopped onions. Saute for 3 minutes to soften. Then add the chopped bell pepper, carrots, and garlic. Saute another 3 minutes.

Add whole raw chicken breasts, chicken broth, dried thyme, crushed red pepper, 1 teaspoon salt, and 1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper to the pot. Bring to a simmer. Lower the heat a little and simmer 15 minutes, until the chicken in cooked through. Remove the chicken and place on a cutting board.

Turn the heat back to medium. With the broth still simmering, stir in the DeLallo Three Cheese Tortellini. Stir well so it doesn't stick together. Then chop or shred the chicken and place back in the soup.

Once the tortellini is cooked through, about 10-14 minutes, turn off the heat. Stir in 1/4 cup heavy cream, spinach, and parsley. Add a little more cream if desired. Taste, then salt and pepper as needed.



North Dakota Property Listed in National Register of Historic Places

STATE HISTORICAL SOCIETY OF NORTH DAKOTA

BISMARCK, N.D. – A Cold War Spartan missile launch site has been listed in the National Register of Historic Places. The National Register of Historic Places is the federal government's list of properties it considers worthy of preservation and recognition.

The Remote Sprint Launch Site 3 (RSL-3) in Cavalier County was accepted because it is the best preserved unit remaining of the Stanley R. Mickelsen Safeguard Complex that is not operational as an active military component. It contains three major components-the Sprint launch pad with 16 empty missile silos, the Limited Area Sentry Station (LASS) where one enters the site, and the large bunker Remote Launch Operations Building (RLOB), where service people maintained communications and equipment in ready for any potential launch situation while in contact with

the other Stanley R. Mickelsen Safeguard Complex units throughout northeast North Dakota.

Contrary to some misconceptions about the National Register program, listing in it does not prevent owners from altering their property, restrict the use or sale of the property, or require establishing times that the property must be open to the public. Entry into the National Register of Historic Places does give a property prestige, provides protection from adverse effects in federally assisted projects, and provides eligibility for certain preservation financial incentives.

observations and their expertise to create inspection criteria, technical data concepts and a structured concept of operations for the both the A-29 and the AT-6. They developed tactics, techniques and procedures that will be used to help shape the maintenance portion of the Air Force's light attack capability.

The observation teams sat in on daily flying schedule meetings to prepare them for the potential maintenance ahead and working with the operations team to ensure they had the most access possible to the maintenance that was going on.

"The ops and maintenance relationship out there was second to none," Lopez said. "It was really unmatched." Lopez said the collaboration helped expand his knowledge of scheduling practices and the command structure and language used in ACC, as opposed to Air Force Reserve Command. between the 476th Fighter Group and the 23d Wing at Moody AFB. The 476th FG is a geographically separated unit of the 442d Fighter Wing at Whiteman AFB, Missouri.

"I think I brought back more of an understanding of close air support," Camarena, a former C-17 Globemaster III cargo aircraft mechanic, said. "Coming off a heavy aircraft and you're bringing people down to the fight – this one, you're actually in the fight and seeing what they actually do every day and why they need to do what they do."

The results of the light attack experiment haven't yet been released, but Lopez expects a decision to be made in either December 2018 or January 2019. No matter which aircraft is ultimately chosen, the part these two Reserve Citizen Airmen played in the process will be felt for decades to come. "It's an honor to be a part of that," Camarena said. "To kind of say 'Hey, we helped pick this aircraft for the Air Force.""

BASE, Fla. (AFNS) --From vigorous barking to dashing through waterbased obstacles, military working dogs and handlers with the 6th Security Forces Squadron participated in water aggression training to maintain full spectrum readiness at Adventure Island amusement park in Tampa, Florida, Oct. 29.

"We have 7.2 miles of coastline around MacDill and we always have to be ready to patrol it," said Tech. Sgt. Matthew McElyea, a military dog trainer assigned to the 6th SFS. "We never stop training and it's our job to keep our dogs engaged and excited about the job we accomplish together."

BMT cur r icul um changes focused on inspiring, devel oping Air men

JOINT BASE SAN ANTONIO-LACKLAND, Texas (AFNS) --

fter listening to feedback from the field, a few changes to the Air Force Basic Military Training curriculum will transform trainees into more combat ready Airmen.

The changes, which began Sept. 4, are entirely focused on readiness and lethality, Airmanship, fitness and the warrior ethos.

"The future of BMT focuses on creating disciplined, warrior Airmen who are ready to support our joint partners in conflicts around the globe," said Col. Jason Corrothers, 737th Training Group and BMT commander. "These changes to refine the basic training experience are about increasing our readiness and lethality while simultaneously instilling Airmanship and core values from the very beginning."

Restoring readiness is one of the Air Force's top priorities. The changes address readiness through a revamped expeditionary skills and weapons training curriculum, said Lt. Col. Jose Surita, 326th Training Squadron commander who has overseen the development of the revamped curriculum.

Basic Expeditionary Airmen Skills Training, which previously took place in week five of training, is re-sequenced to the final training week as the culminating event of BMT. Air Force recruits will also experience a beefed up Self-Aid/ Buddy Care regimen, called the Tactical Combat Casualty Course.

We need highly trained and ready Airmen," Surita said. "Readiness is the central theme across the BMT curriculum as we deliver trained and committed Airmen capable of delivering 21st Century airpower."

There is also an increased focus on weapons handling and familiarization, she said.

Airmen's Week, which was focused on a values-based "Airmanship 100" curriculum, was taught the week after a trainee completed basic training. Airmen's Week lessons, which are not being changed, are now incorporated throughout 8.5 weeks of BMT. This change gives end-to-end ownership of the training to the military training instructor corps, delivering a continuous immersion that accelerates "mind to heart" adoption of the Air Force core

Sgt. Robert Kaufman, military training instructor. "Airmanship 100 lessons focus on their resilience and challenge recruits to commit to holding each other accountable to our core values.'

With an emphasis on improving human performance, BMT will also see a bump up in the overall number of fitness sessions, increasing from 31 to 44 periods throughout training. Workouts will be a balanced mix of cardio, strength and interval training.

"Physical fitness is a critical component of readiness," said Master Sgt. Andrea Jefferson, military training instructor. "By increasing the number of physical training sessions, we build fitness habits that will help recruits perform both in the military environment, and in their personal lives.

BMT curriculum changes also includes a purpose built heritage program that introduces recruits to Air Force heroes, and weaves heritage and warrior ethos

throughout training. "We will be introducing warrior identity, as well as Air Force history and heroes, every week throughout training," said Master Sgt. Richard Bonsra, military training instructor. "Those topics will then be reinforced during all training events, such as naming physical training sessions after a fallen Airman to cement the experience."

Future changes to how heritage and warrior ethos are ingrained into BMT will include naming obstacles on the "Creating Leaders, Airmen, Warriors," course after Air Force heroes, said Bonsra.

"Over the last 70 years, we have become the most dominant Air Force the world has ever known, but there is no doubt we must be and can be better in the future," said Chief Master Sgt. Lee Hoover, 737th TRG superintendent, "The next generation of Airmen will take us there, so it's critical we start them on the right foot. These changes ensure we move in that direction."

Headquartered at Joint Base San Antonio-Lackland, Texas, the 737th TRG is the Air Force's largest training group, comprised of nine squadrons and more than 900 permanent party personnel. With an average daily load of 7,000 trainees, more than 37,314 Airmen graduated BMT in fiscal year 2017 and BMT instructors are postured values and warrior ethos principles "Our Airmen need to be to increase that number to more technically capable, but they also than 40,200 graduates in fiscal year need to be motivated," said Master 2019.
