

WRIGHT-PATTERSON AIR FORCE BASE, Ohio (AFNS) -- Ingenuity and collaboration were the keys to success as a group of Air Force Research Laboratory engineers took a series of tests to new heights.

At the request of NASA, AFRL rapid-response systems support researchers delved into the realm of space to help determine the effects of unintended electrical arcing on astronaut space suits during extravehicular maintenance.

NASA researchers came to the AFRL team with a simple question. How does an electrical arc behave in a vacuum? Although this may seem like a fairly simple question, it was a concept that had not been explored fully before.

"What was not understood were the ramifications of an arc in space," said Brett Jordan, electrical and electronic materials evaluation team lead. "What are the mass and velocity of the particles produced by the arcing, and what would be the effects of those metal particles flying off the arc in that environment?" To answer this question, AFRL began by determining how to build fixtures for a lowpressure test and performing proof-of-concept testing to determine the best method to reliably create an arc in the planned lab setting. This initial series of tests helped the researchers understand the materials, positioning and current needed to successfully generate the arc, as well as the proper test setup to use for an Earth-orbit vacuum

environment. With this initial data in hand, the team then began to prepare for low-pressure testing. Reaching out to fellow AFRL materials and electronics researchers, the team acquired a low-pressure chamber and secured a laboratory for conducting the tests.

"It really was a team effort," said Corey Boltz, electrical engineer and project lead. "We received assistance from many different teams throughout AFRL to make this happen."

After another round of experimental tests and setup, the team was ready to begin the final round of testing and data collection. With the assistance of NASA engineers, the AFRL team performed a series of 35 tests in the lowpressure chamber. Each test run was a careful exercise in control and precision. For each individual test, the team followed a rigorous process that involved precise placement of the test fixture, calibration of multiple high-speed data capture cameras and pumping the chamber down to extreme low-pressure atmospheric conditions.

The team completed the tests quickly, despite the complex setup required between each test run. From start to finish, the low-pressure test runs were completed in nine days. Jordan says this was possible because the AFRL test chamber offered capabilities that were not immediately available to the NASA team. Because

of the chamber's design, its pressure could be lowered to the necessary test conditions in about half the time it takes a typical chamber to achieve the same conditions. As a result, more test runs could be completed in a shorter period of time.

"For us, it was all part of our rapid-response mission, and the customer appreciated that quick turnaround," Boltz said.

The data gathered from the testing provided important data that NASA is using to structure their own set of tests.

"This data-rich testing enabled the optimization of tests being performed at three other facilities, which are adding various other factors related to the extra vehicular activity scenario," said Amri Hernandez-Pellerano, NASA technical lead. "The AFRL pathfinder tests enabled us to properly plan resources in this study."

Jordan added that since these tests were the first space vacuum work the group had performed, the testing event benefited AFRL as well by expanding the base of knowledge for electrical arcing in low-pressure environments. He said the data and processes established will be useful for the project researchers and other AFRL teams as they tackle future endeavors.

"As the systems support rapid reaction team, that's what we do," said Jordan. "We're proud of our mission. We take it seriously, we enjoy it, and when we need to come up with good answers quickly, we make it happen quickly."



Fir st Time: 173r d Fighter Wing hosts secretary of the Air Force

KINGSLEY FIELD, Ore.

(AFNS) -ecretary of the Air Force Heather Wilson visited the 173rd Fighter Wing Nov. 3-4, 2018, marking the first visit by a sitting secretary since Kingsley Field Air National Guard Base, Oregon opened its

gates during World War II. During her visit, Wilson had the opportunity to see firsthand the wing's mission, which is the sole training provider of F-15C Eagle air superiority pilots to the U.S. Air Force. The base coined the phrase, "America's air superiority starts here," to describe a mission vital to the interests of the Air Force.

One of her key messages for the community and the wing is the emergence of threats with capabilities comparable to the U.S., which she said requires a concerted effort to modernize and re-establish technological superiority.

"The thing that's driving all this is the threat—we've returned to an era of great power competition and we have to be prepared for that," she said.



That means an increase in readiness, an expansion of the number of squadrons, and an increase in the number of Airmen joining the ranks of fully qualified fighter pilots, something the 173rd FW executes every day.

Over the last several years the wing has added training

airspace making it the second largest range in the entire Air Force, second only to the Nellis Air Force Base, Nevada, range. Kingsley Field has also secured the longest lease in the Air Force, until the year 2095, largely driven by strong community support.

"It's a very supportive community, and that matters to our Airmen and it matters to inspire the next generation of young people to consider the Inited States Air Force whether it's active, guard or reserve," said Wilson. Wilson's history with the Air Force dates back to college, she graduated from the Air Force Academy and served for seven years in the 1980s. She said there are some differences in the service now and one of them is readily evident at Kingsley Field. "It's a guard unit that has an active association so that is very unique," she said referencing the active association with the 550th Fighter Squadron. "One of the things that's different about the Air Force from when

I was on active duty is the closeness of the active, guard and reserve. The operating tempo is much higher, but that also means that the integration is even more important today than it was 20 years ago."

Kingsley Field added more than 90 active duty troops several

years ago, and they help increase the number of student pilots the wing graduates in a year.

Although her visit spanned just over 24 hours she made time to meet with Airmen from the most junior to the higher ranks and she hosted a town hall for more than an hour. The base theater reached capacity

and still more people filed in to stand in the back. During her presentation she asked each Airmen to write on a three-by-five card something they would like her to know.

"If there is anything you would like me to know, anything at all, please write it on the card, I will read every one of them on the plane when I leave," she said.

Keen Sword 19: Historic first JGSDF jump from USAF C-130Js in Japan

YOKOTA AIR BASE, Japan (AFNS) --

36th Airlift Squadron C-130J Super Hercules became the first U.S. aircraft to drop Japan Ground Self-Defense Force soldiers on Hiju-dai drop zone, Oita prefecture, Japan, Nov. 4, during exercise Keen Sword 2019.

The JGSDF's 1st Airborne Brigade soldiers, observed by U.S. Army Alaska Soldiers, jumped from the C-130J Super Hercules, showcasing the exercise's capability to bring military power together to train.

"It is great that we are finally able to drop JGSDF paratroopers from U.S. aircraft in Japan," said Capt. Jeffrey Larkin, 36th AS C-130J pilot and Keen Sword 19 C-130J mission commander. "Also, this is the first time that (the 36th AS) will fly over Hiju-dai drop zone. This is another exciting moment for us because we can fly in an atypical environment."

Since 2015, the 36th AS and JGSDF's 1st Airborne Brigade have been conducting joint jump training during Red-Flag Alaska. This historic first combined jump training in Japan will allow for more opportunities for future training and collaboration to strengthen bonds between the two nations.

The jump highlighted the strong commitment of the U.S. and Japan to a free and open Indo-Pacific region, but the aircraft was just one moving piece in a large-scale area seizure scenario during Keen Sword 19.

"We delivered service members, between U.S. and Japan Self-Defense Forces, from Okinawa to Misawa," said Larkin. "Also we conducted mass Container Delivery System drops at Hiju-dai (dropzone)."

The scenario: The 120 JGSDF paratroopers at the Japan Air Self-Defense Force Tsuiki Air Base at Fukuoka prefecture conducted airdrop training from the U.S. C-130J aircraft at Hiju-dai exercise areas, Oita prefecture, located approximately 810 km from Yokota Air Base.

"Everything was excellent." said Greer. "As a jump master, they jumped safely and accurately. This is most important thing for jumpers, and they were professionals during the airborne operation."

Keen Sword gives U.S. and Japanese forces an opportunity to practice critical air, maritime and amphibious capabilities essential for Japan's defense and for regional security. The exercise is also the latest in a series of bilateral field training exercises that for more than 30 years have increased combat readiness and interoperability between the U.S. and JSDF.

"The scenario gave us the opportunity to practice tactical airlift to deliver supplies and personnel at a moment's notice." said Air Force Staff Sgt. Brian Gates, 36th Airlift Squadron C-130J loadmaster. "Any joint training provides greater awareness of how U.S. military and JSDF train to prepare for future contingencies and it help us stay ready to provide joint support when we are called upon."








Cranberry Jalapeno CREAM CHEESE DIP



Tart cranberries, spicy jalapeños and sweet sugar come together to create a delicious holiday appetizer that will have your guests begging for the recipe!

INGREDIENTS:

- 12 oz fresh, uncooked cranberries
- 1/4 cup green onion
- 1-2 fresh jalapeño peppers
- 2 Tbsp. cilantro (optional) • 3/4 Cup sugar
- 1 Tbsp. lemon juce
- 1/8 tsp. salt
- 16 oz. cream cheese (whipped)

INSTRUCTIONS:

• Use hand food chopper to chop cranberries. (This process is a bit time consuming, but it is best to not use a food processor to chop these as the cranberries liquify too much.)

- Chop green onion, jalapeño peppers and cilantro.
- In a medium-sized bowl, add chopped cranberries, green onion, cilantro and jalapeños.
- Add sugar, lemon juice and salt on top of cranberry mixture and stir gently until blended.
- Cover with plastic wrap and place in refrigerator overnight.
 Take cranberry mixture out of the refrigerator and stir all ingredients together. Strain out all liquid using a collander with small holes.
- Whip softened cream cheese with hand mixer until smooth (about 2 minutes) and spread cream cheese over bottom of a pie plate or 9x9 dish.
- Pour cranberry mixture atop cream cheese and keep in refrigerator until ready to serve.
- Use a spoon to spread over Ritz crackers and enjoy!



C-130 crew chief course gets rolling with new GITA

SHEPPARD AIR FORCE BASE, Texas (AFNS) -he Air Force and Air Education and Training Command seeks to improve the quality, speed and relevance of the training enterprise by introducing virtual and augmented reality technology with new ground instructional training aircraft, or GITA.

training aircraft, or GITA. The MC-130P Combat Shadow recently arrived on Sheppard Air Force Base and may look like the other Hercules aircraft that have been serving for more than half a century, but it brings several advancements to the training arena.

Staff Sgt. Joseph Martinez, a 362nd Training Squadron C-130 crew chief instructor, said the aircraft, brought in from the California National Guard in October, has a few key differences that give Airmen experience more in line with operational realities, as well as a insight to the different missions the cargo plane conducts.

For example, the braking system on the MC-130P allows Airmen to learn on equipment that is currently being used in the field, the instructor said. He said the majority of the C-130 training aircraft used at Sheppard have the obsolete multi-disk braking system, whereas C-130s in the field use a new carbon-style system. "This allows our Airmen to come in, get the training they need on this new-style brake and then utilize that at their home stations," he said, having graduated the first class Nov. 6 of C-130 crew chiefs to learn on the carbon brakes. Martinez said when the Air Force changed the type of braking system on the airframe, that meant changes to technical orders, or maintenance manuals, as well as the types of tools used to remove wheels and tires and work on the brakes. He said they are making due, but the important part is the Airmen are being exposed to the equipment before they get to their first assignment. Ernesto Acosta-Rivera,

362nd TRS training manager, said the process to get the new GITA to Sheppard began in August. He said the California Air National Guard is replacing their MC-130s with updated models, which meant tail number 0216 was available.

"It was pretty quick," he said of the acquisition process. "Within a month it was ready to fly from Moffett Field."

Acosta-Rivera said many of the aircraft used for training by the crew chiefs were older E models. Now when Airmen go to a 15-day course at Little Rock AFB, Arkansas, after their 69-academic-day course here, they'll be familiar with components they will see during their follow-on training. Martinez, who has served

on just about every C-130 variation ever flown and over as many locales, said he enjoys training new crew chiefs on the airframe and imparting his knowledge he has amassed over the years. After all, he said, he knows he is training his eventual replacement and he wants to train and inspire them.

"These Airmen need to know that what they are doing here is vital for our Air Force," he said. "If we cannot get these aircraft up in the air and maintain them correctly, then the mission doesn't happen and it actually can fail and people's lives are at risk."



FEDVIP is coming: Get to know dental and vision plans today

TRICARE COMMUNICATIONS

FALLS CHURCH, Va. (AFNS) -- The TRICARE Retiree Dental Program ends on Dec. 31, 2018. Beginning in 2019, dental and vision plans will be available through the Federal Employees Dental and Vision Insurance Program. Now is a good time to become familiar with FEDVIP options. FEDVIP 2019 plans and rates will be online in the fall, but you can look at 2018 plans and rates now.

FEDVIP offers a choice between 10 dental and 4 vision options. This fall will be your first chance to enroll in a FEDVIP dental or vision plan for 2019 coverage. If you're eligible, you can enroll in FEDVIP during the 2018 Federal Benefits Open Season. It runs from Nov. 12 to Dec. 10.

Who is eligible?

-Retired service members and their families who were eligible for TRDP are eligible for FEDVIP dental coverage. They're also eligible for FEDVIP vision coverage if enrolled in a TRICARE health plan.

-Family members of active duty

service members who are enrolled in a TRICARE health plan are eligible for FEDVIP vision coverage.

-Children enrolled in or eligible for TRICARE Young Adult aren't eligible to enroll in FEDVIP.

When do you enroll?

-You can enroll in FEDVIP during the Federal Benefits Open Season. This year's open season runs from Nov. 12 through Dec. 10, 2018. Your coverage will begin on Jan. 1, 2019.

-If you currently have TRDP, you must enroll in a FEDVIP plan during the Federal Benefits Open Season to continue dental coverage for 2019.


-The Federal Benefits Open Season is your annual opportunity to enroll in, change, or cancel a FEDVIP dental or vision plan.


MINOT STATE UNIVERSITY Winot State finalizes rededication of WW9 Memorial

Air Combat Command proud of Tyndall progress

TYNDALL AIR FORCE BASE, Fla. (AFNS) --

he commander of Air Combat Command and command chief visited Tyndall Air Force Base Nov. 7 for the second time since Hurricane Michael caused catastrophic damage four weeks ago.

Nearly 2,000 military members are currently working alongside civilians and contractors to recover and reconstitute.

"The progress we have made in the last couple weeks has been encouraging and has exceeded any expectations that we had," said Col. Brian Laidlaw, 325th Fighter Wing commander.

Gen. Mike Holmes, ACC commander, and Chief Master Sgt. Frank Batten, ACC command chief, spent a majority of their time with the service members and thanking them for their hard work and perseverance.

"The recovery efforts, these things you have done, these three task force teams, the mission support group, the medical group and the commander's action team – I don't think you could have done it any better," Holmes said. "I really don't."

Since a number of missions, to include the 601st Air Force Operations Center, the 337th Air Control Squadron, the Air Force Medical Agency Support team, Air Force Office of Special Investigations, the 53rd Airto-Air Weapons Evaluation Group, the Air Force Legal Operations Agency, the 823rd **RED HORSE Squadron**, Detachment 1, and the Air Force Civil Engineer Center, will remain at Tyndall AFB, recovery efforts have shifted. "The announcement that the secretary of The Air Force made last week became a forcing function for some of our timelines and how we prioritize our resources," Laidlaw said. "Based on those timelines, we would like to have the mission support group and the medical group up and running in December." However, the three tasks forces stood up since the storm are still working hard on their initial goals and some are close to completion.

Task Force Raptor, comprised of more than 40 maintainers from Langley Air Force Base, Virginia, have been working 24-hour operations to make all the F-22 Raptors flyable.

"With the jets almost all gone, we would like to downsize the Task Force Raptor team down to 13 maintainers, so they can return to Langley," Laidlaw said.



Reservists credit teamwork in lifesaving mission

s if by fate, a weather delay in group of reservists to embark on a challenging 22-and-a-half-hour mission to help save a fellow service member.

When severe weather delayed own." a C-17 aircrew from the 315th Airlift Wing heading home to Joint Base Charleston, South Carolina was delayed in Germany Nov. 3, the crew was asked to take on an emergency mission transporting a burn patient to Brooke Army Medical Center in Texas.

'When our mission was delayed, everyone was a little frustrated because they had to get back to their civilian jobs," said Capt. Dennis Conner, the mission's aircraft commander from the 701st Airlift Squadron. "Then I get a call asking if we would stay out and take a medical evacuation mission because there was a Soldier who was pretty badly burned. There was not one hesitation, the entire crew stepped up. They put their had enough pain meds for our civilian lives on hold to do this; original flight time plus two they missed work and school to hours and we landed in Boston get him home."

The Soldier was transported from Hungary to Ramstein Air Base, Germany, by an Air Force aeromedical evacuation Surgical Research Burn Center at Brooke Army Medical Center in San Antonio.

According to the Daily News Hungary, "an American soldier was electrocuted at the Ferencváros railway station when he climbed up to a cargo train transporting combat vehicles." The article states carrying 25,000 volts above the train's cargo, potentially causing the incident. The man's body suffered second and third degree burns. What is more, he seemed to have

broken his femur," said Pál Győrfy, spokesperson for the organization.

"It was an unbelievable effort. No other country in the Germany allowed a world would go to the extent we did to help one of our warfighters," said Capt. Bryan Chianella, one of the 701 AS pilots on the mission. "We do what we can to take care of our

During the flight, the C-17 was scheduled to do an aerial refueling so it could continue to San Antonio without stopping, said Conner.

"It was chaos," he said. "Ten minutes before our AR, the tanker lost one of their engines and had to turn around. We did a lot of planning for this mission... We had several backup plans in place. We could only land in Boston or (Joint Base Andrews, Maryland) because if our jet broke down, he needed to be close to a burn center. Since we had strong headwinds, we didn't have enough gas to get us to Andrews; we had to try to make it to Boston."

"It was pretty stressful," said Chianella. "They only with our emergency fuel."

With the quick stop in Boston for fuel, the crew took off for San Antonio and landed at Lackland AFB, Texas then returned to home to Charleston with no further incidents.

"This was one of those missions where you make a difference helping a brother in arms," said Master Sgt. Glenn Walker, the flying crew chief on the mission from the 315th Maintenance Squadron. "We all came together as a team and worked like a flawless Swiss watch," he said.

Both Conner and Chianella also credited the crew's teamwork in making the mission a success.

"I was very proud of the entire crew. I didn't do anything special, the crew just did what they do and made this mission happen," explained Connor.


