ore than 800 Airmen, Sailors and Defense Department civilians from nine states completed exercise Sentry Aloha, a large-scale fighter exercise, , Dec. 19, at Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam.

The Hawaii Air National Guard exercise is held several times a year to provide aircraft with dissimilar combat training among participating flying and support units. The fighter aircraft consisted of the 199th and 19th Fighter Squadrons' JB Pearl Harbor-Hickam-based F-22 Raptors, Oregon Air National Guard F-15 Eagles and Navy F-18 Hornets from China Lake, California.

The back-to-back combat training included in-air refueling by KC-135 Stratotankers from Iowa and Wisconsin Air National Guard air refueling units, a component that enables U.S. and partnered aircraft to operate virtually anywhere on the planet. Lt. Col. Matthew Ohman, Sentry Aloha exercise director, said the refueling capabilities maximized the fast-paced training.

"Exercises like this gives us a chance to just be part of the bigger picture and it builds confidence," said Chief Master Sgt. Donald Strickland, 128th Air Refueling Wing chief boom operator, "especially for our younger pilots and boom operators. It gives them exposure to other types of receiving aircraft and to see how quickly it all happens, opposed to the routines we're used to at our home station.

This helps us know what to expect when it's actually time to deploy." The integration of Hawaii's fifth-

generation Raptors and visiting fourth-generation fighters enabled aviators to enhance their aerial tactics and prepare for a multitude of war-fighting scenarios. The Department of Defense relies on joint efforts, such as exercise Sentry Aloha, to maintain air dominance and preserve the peace and stability

throughout the Pacific region.

also provides some of the best joint training the Air Force has to offer," said Ohman. "The focus of Sentry Aloha is to develop unit-specific, tailored scenarios that ensure the majority of tactical learning takes place in the airspace, not in the trenches of mission planning. This is unique from Flag exercises, which have inflexible scenarios given to units when they attend."

While JBPH-H maintains fifthgeneration fighters, it still upholds a permanent supply of aircraft-ground

have been asked to take on a tasking this large and it provided them muchneeded experience for upcoming deployments, slated for next year. The freshly-cooked meals also saved time for exercise participants and cut down costs of overall training.

Due to the unpredictable nature of aircraft operations, mission planners always need to be prepared to for the possibility of an aircraft mishap. Sentry Aloha flights were suspended for one day on Dec. 12, in response to a civilian aircraft crash into the waters by Honolulu airport. The pilot, an exercise contractor, was able to successfully eject before impact and received care within minutes of landing.

"I was extremely proud to see how well we worked together after [the aircraft] went down shortly after takeoff last week," said Ohman. "It was awesome to find out civilians from the community pitched in almost immediately to lend a helping hand in his recovery until the Coast Guard arrived. These extraordinary efforts by normal citizens is truly what makes me proud to be an American.'

The 199th Fighter Squadron is part of the 154th Wing, the largest wing in the Air National Guard. The Hawaii Air National Guard is comprised of nearly 2,500 Airmen whose federal mission is to be trained and available for active duty Air Force operational missions.

"Continual participation in events like this make us a stronger force," said Col. Sean Sullivan, Oregon Air National Guard's 142nd Operations Group commander. "These exercises are essential, not only for the pilots, but for the training and expertise of the maintainers, the aircrew flight equipment (Airmen), and our airfield managers. arah Behrend's tattooed arms and wild blue hair aren't the only reasons she stands out on the rugby field. Rugby is a relatively new hobby for Behrend, though her practiced technique paints a different picture. She performs with the intensity, coordination and endurance of an experienced athlete.

And she does it all from the seat of her wheelchair, facing an opponent that the crowd cannot see.

"In 2015, a doctor handed me a sticky note with seven small life-changing letters on it," the retired Senior Airman and Air Force Wounded Warriors Program member said. Those letters were CRPS/RSD.

After nearly two years of dealing with excruciating pain, Behrend decided to attend her first Air Force Wounded Warrior CARE event.

"Before that event, I was a recluse. I wasn't functioning," said Behrend. "But that first CARE event taught me to value myself and see past my disease and disability."

Behrend said the introduction

basketball and rugby competitors play in wheelchairs regardless of their mobility. It didn't take long before Behrend found both success and enjoyment in the activity.

Wheelchair rugby combines elements of basketball, rugby, and handball. Devoting herself to the offensive position of "high pointer," Behrend said she used her aggression to excel. Off the field, she constantly had to endure the unpredictable ebbs and flows of debilitating, chronic pain. On the field, she had an opportunity to reclaim some brief control in her life – in the form of attitude and effort.

"When I'm playing, it's the only time I'm free and feel like myself again," Behrend said. "No limitations, just free."

Through AFW2, Behrend not only found her release through sports, but was welcomed into an irreplaceable support network of coaches, fellow wounded warriors and team leads.

One member of that support network, Ilyssa Cruz, said she witnessed Behrend's resilience firsthand.

"I started my job at the end of April (2018)," said Cruz, a team lead for the Air Force North West Warrior CARE Event here.


"My first event was Warrior Games with the Air Force, and that's where I met Karah. From the first time I met her till now, she has really progressed. She's been kicking butt the past couple months, participating in event after event."

And much of that progression happened in spite of a huge obstacle—in June 2018, Behrend lost her ability to walk. It happened as a result of a car accident injury, which caused her disease to creep its way to her spinal column and confine her to a wheelchair permanently.

Making matters worse, the spreading of her CRPS also affected her ability to fully control her hands. That makes all her athletic endeavors all the more difficult.

Despite near impossible odds, Behrend presses on.

"I take my life 10 seconds at a time," she said. "It helps me get through the pain, the frustration and the thoughts of not wanting to go on. It's okay to have those thoughts and feelings. Allow them, accept them, and embrace them. Allow them to motivate you to do something bigger and badder, just to prove to yourself that nothing can ever stop you."

She was diagnosed with a disease know as Complex Regional Pain Syndrome -- a rare, largely untreatable and widely unknown neurological disease. According to the McGill Pain Index, it is the most painful chronic form of pain known to modern medicine.

"It rates above amputations, phantom limb and natural childbirth," Behrend said. "It's a lot to handle on the good days."

But no one could see Behrend's pain. It was hidden inside of her body, sending incorrect nerve impulses to her pain receptors. She said her invisible wound even damaged her way of thinking. "I was very sick and tired of feeling like I constantly had to



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LOS ANGELES AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AFNS) --

he Air Force and its mission partners successfully launched the first Global Positioning Systems III satellite Dec. 23 from Space Launch Complex-40 at Cape Canaveral Air Force Station, Florida. The Lockheed Martin-built

satellitewas carried to orbit aboard a Space Exploration Technologies Corporation, or SpaceX, Falcon 9 Evolved Expendable Launch Vehicle. The satellite is known as "Vespucci," in honor of Amerigo Vespucci, the Italian explorer for whom the Americas were named.

"Launch is always a monumental event, and especially so since this is the first constellation comprised of 31 GPS satellite of its generation launched on SpaceX's first National Security Space mission. As more GPS III satellites join the constellation, it will bring better service at a lower cost to a technology that is now fully woven into the fabric of any modern civilization," said Lt. Gen. John F. Thompson, Space and Missile Systems Center commander and Air Force program executive officer for space. "It keeps GPS the gold standard for positioning, navigation, and timing information, giving assured access when and where it matters. This event was a capstone, but it doesn't mean we're done. We're going to run a series of procedures for checkout Bongiovi, SMC Launch and test to ensure everything on Vespucci functions as it was designed." GPS III's "Vespucci"

separated from its upper stage approximately two hours after launch. Engineers and operators at Lockheed Martin's Waterton facility will now begin onorbit checkout and tests which are estimated to complete in six months. Operational use is expected to begin in about a year.

'Today's launch could not have succeeded without the teamwork of dedicated professionals. I'm extremely proud of their accomplishment." stated Col. Steve Whitney, GPS Directorate director. "Today's launch is the beginning of the GPS III era, bringing greater capabilities for our military and civilian users worldwide.'

Vespucci will be vectored to augment the current GPS operational spacecraft. GPS satellites operate in medium earth orbit at an altitude of approximately 12,550 miles in six planes. Each satellite circles the earth twice per day. GPS provides the "gold standard" of position, navigation and timing services for billions of users worldwide. GPS III, the newest generation of GPS satellites, brings new capabilities to users, including three times greater accuracy, and up to eight times improved anti-jamming capabilities. "The first GPS III launch marks a significant milestone for the GPS constellation as well as our partnership with SpaceX," said Col. Robert Enterprise director. "This launch demonstrated the successful teamwork and cooperation amongst all mission partners

located at Los Angeles Air Force Base in El Segundo, California. Lockheed Martin Space Systems Corporation is the prime satellite vehicle contractor. The launch was led by Space and Missile Systems Center's Launch Enterprise Directorate, and was on the SpaceX Falcon 9 launch vehicle at Cape Canaveral AFS. Air Force Space Command's 50th Space Wing and 2nd Space Operations Squadron operate the GPS constellation from Schriever AFB, Colorado.

SMC is the Air Force's center of acquisition excellence for acquiring and developing military space systems. Its portfolio includes the GPS, military satellite communications, defense meteorological satellites, space launch and range systems, satellite control networks, space based infrared systems and space situational awareness capabilities.

As the U.S. enters a new era with the declaration of space as a warfighting domain, SMC is undergoing re-architecting as part of "SMC 2.0" efforts which will manage other significant U.S. acquisition agility initiatives that seek to build new partnerships with industry, allies, and Defense Department partners, in order to drive innovation within the space enterprise and speed the delivery of new capabilities to warfighters
