ARLINGTON, Va. (AFNS)

fter his first upclose view Jan. 15 of a ready-to-⊾fly T-X, the Air Force's training aircraft of the future, Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. David L. Goldfein could have been expected to marvel at the technical sophistication of a state-of-the-art plane designed and manufactured not only with future pilots in mind but with maintainers and software specialists as well.

He could have mentioned that the new plane's single engine generates nearly threetimes more thrust than the dual engines of the plane it is replacing as the primary trainer for all future Air Force pilots – the legendary but aging T-38C Talon.

He could have noted that the T-X has twin tails, slats, and big leading-edge root extensions that provide deft handling at low speeds allowing it fly in a way that better approximates real world demands and that it is specifically designed to prepare pilots for fifthgeneration aircraft.

But after climbing out of the cockpit during the visit to the St. Louis factory where Boeing builds the T-X, Goldfein, a former instructor-pilot, pointed to a seemingly mundane but critical difference – sight lines.

"I'd love to be an instructor again," a smiling Goldfein said after a detailed briefing by senior Boeing officials and a close inspection of a plane on the factory floor that included time in both cockpit seats. "The visibility is exceptional. I can see what the student is doing, what displays he is calling up; which challenges she's calling up."

To be sure, Goldfein took note of the technical sophistication of the plane and what that modern technology brings to the future of the Air Force. During a briefing with Boeing executives and engineers, for example, he asked pointed questions about not only the plane's performance but also how reliable – and fast – software is upgraded.

He asked about the way maintainers are blended into the training program. The answer is that the plane is designed with easy-to-reach and open panels and that virtual reality can be used to train maintainers.

Goldfein acknowledged the point. "We sink or swim on sustainment," he said.

Impressive and important as all of that is, Goldfein's history as an instructor caused him to highlight something else.

Unlike in the 57-year-old T-38, the instructor's position in the T-X is elevated, meaning he or she can see things that were not easily possible before body position and hand movements, which display is activated and when, and the kind of information that training pilot receives and requests during flight.

That difference, along with the updated technology and capabilities of the plane itself, along with better simulators and the ability to update software faster and more seamlessly, convinced Goldfein that the plane has the potential to deliver what future pilots and warfighters need. "The level of instructional

capacity is impressive," he said, noting that the new trainer will go into service in 2024 and reach full operational capability by 2034. Having a fleet of these trainers, he said, will allow pilots to train for fourth and fifth-generation aircraft.

Goldfein was careful to couch the change in a way that both saluted the service of the trainer he flew on his way to becoming a fighter pilot – the T-38 – and herald the arrival of a new tool that will teach generations of new pilots so that the interests and security of the United States are preserved.

"The distance between the T-38 and an F-35 (Lightning II) is night and day," he said, referring to the capabilities of the two aircraft. "But with this plane the distance is much, much smaller. And that's important because it means the pilots trained on it will be that much better, that much faster at a time when we must be able to train to the speed of the threat."

The contract for the T-X was awarded in September after a vigorous competition. The \$9.2 billion contract awarded to Boeing calls for 351 T-X aircraft, 46 simulators, and associated ground equipment to be delivered and installed.

The first T-X aircraft and simulators are scheduled to arrive at Joint Base San Antonio-Randolph in 2023. All undergraduate pilot training bases will eventually transition from the T-38 to the T-X. Those bases include Columbus Air Force Base, Mississippi; Laughlin AFB, Texas; Sheppard AFB, Texas; and Vance AFB, Oklahoma.

he room was silent until the instructor started to speak, her voice echoing off the auditorium walls, capturing her student's attention.

Staff Sgt. Symphony Leyk, 5th Force Support Squadron Airman

Leadership School instructor, said her favorite part about being an instructor is that she has an influence on leadership development of Airmen.

"They inspire me," said Leyk. "They show just how much they truly care about taking care of the Air Force, not just from a professional standpoint, but a personal one. The leaders developed here will no doubt influence the next generation of the Air Force."

For five weeks, ALS instructors train Airmen for their future role as a NCO in they want to see them the Air Force.

The first step in becoming an effective leader is learning the proper material, said Silchuk. The real challenge begins by communicating what they have learned to their subordinates, peers and

Throughout the course, these future leaders learn how to effectively communicate the mission to their teams.

"Leaders are developed over time, so they'll have a lot of experience," said Leyk. "We equip them [with the knowledge] to share those experiences with their Airmen.

Using past experiences will promote trust between the NCO and Airman relationship, resulting in a more effective working environment. The more personal and engaging the conversation is the more effective it will be, according with the responsibility to to Levk.

"Our students learn the crucial parts of preparing their future Airmen for success," said Tech. Sgt. Zachary Silchuk, 5th FSS ALS instructor. "They will learn [there is not a] onesize-fits-all leadership style. Staff Sgt. [These future NCOs] will have to find out how to motivate their Airmen individually if grow personally and professionally."

Motivating people to be successful can be done in various ways, and ALS instructors strive to encourage their students to take the time to discover what will motivate each of their future subordinates.

Leyk said, preparing Airmen for the NCO role is done by encouraging them to invest in people and embracing a positive perspective in themselves and those around them.

"It is now their responsibility to train, guide, and mold their Airmen into our future leaders," said Silchuk. "A very daunting task that I strongly believe each one of them are ready to accept and carry out."

Airmen graduating from ALS are trusted lead those around them using all of the tools they have learned and their past experiences.

"The roles we hold today are not to be filled by us tomorrow," said Silchuk. "Our Airmen are our future."





Keto Sausage Soup WITH POBLANO PEPPERS & SPINACH



INGREDIENTS:

- 2 tbsp extra virgin olive oil
- 1 lb pork sausage Italian works
- 1 medium red pepper diced
- 1/2 medium Poblano pepper diced • 3 celery stalks diced
- tsp dried basil
- 1 tsp dried oregano
- 1 tsp dried rosemary
- 1.5 tsp chili powder
- 1 tsp ground cumin

INSTRUCTIONS:

• Heat olive oil in a large soup pot or Dutch oven over medium-high heat. Add sausage and cook, stirring occasionally, until the sausage is no longer pink inside, approximately 5 minutes. As the sausage cooks, break it into small pieces with a

• 1/2 tsp ground cinnamon

• 2 cups baby spinach

• sea salt and black pepper to taste

• 6 cups organic sugar-free chicken stock

• 1 cup Cheddar Jack cheese shredded

- Add the red and Poblano pepper, celery, basil, oregano, rosemary, chili powder, cumin, and cinnamon to the pot. Generously season with salt and black pepper, to taste, and stir to combine. Cook, stirring occasionally until the veggies have softened, around 5-6 minutes.
- Add the sugar-free chicken stock and simmer for 20 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add the spinach and cook for another 4-5 minutes, or just until the spinach wilts.
- Remove from heat and serve immediately, topped with shredded Cheddar Jack cheese and some additional diced Poblano pepper, if desired. Enjoy!



Spring Turkey Season Set, Online Apps Available

NORTH DAKOTA GAME AND FISH

he North Dakota Game and Fish Department is offering 6,025 wild turkey licenses for the 2019 spring hunting season, 370 more than last year.

Eleven of the 22 hunting units have more spring licenses receiving the turkey license. than in 2018, seven have fewer and three remain the same. Unit 21 (Hettinger and Adams counties) is again closed in 2019 due to lack of turkeys in the unit.

Spring turkey applicants can apply online at the Game and Fish Department website, gf.nd.gov. Applications can also be submitted by calling 800-406-6409. Paper applications are not available.

The deadline for applying is Feb. 13.

Successful spring turkey applicants must purchase a 2019-20 hunting license, as last the National Wild Turkey year's 2018-19 licenses expire March 31. In addition to the spring turkey license, hunters must have a fishing, hunting

and furbearer certificate, and a general game and habitat license. Also, hunters ages 16 and older must possess a small game license, or combination license. These required licenses must be purchased in advance of the successful applicant

First-time spring turkey hunters ages 15 or younger are eligible to receive one spring license valid for any open unit. To be eligible, the youth hunter must be 15 or younger on opening day of spring turkey season, and have never received a spring turkey license in North Dakota.

Spring turkey licenses are available only to North Dakota residents. Per legislation, an additional four spring wild turkey licenses are available to the Outdoor Adventure Foundation and three to Federation.

The spring turkey season opens April 13 and continues through May 19

Attitude of gratitude key to resil iency for disabled civil servant

t is Friday, March 21, 1997, final spring break of high school has commenced. What better way to celebrate than with the clamor of conversation and laughter among good friends.

The boyish compulsion to impress girls at any cost and the youthful mindset of invincibility included riding in the back of a truck on a seemingly innocuous afternoon drive to pick up a

For Kevin Waterhouse, then 17 years old, spring break came to an change. abrupt end when he was riding in the bed of the truck and the driver explanations suffice for nonlost control on a curve, crashing into a home at 80 miles per hour.

The impact of his body against the cab of the truck resulted in, among a gruesome laundry list of injuries, his spinal cord being severed in three separate places leaving him paralyzed from the chest down.

Spring break was not the only thing that ended for Waterhouse that day. His cross-country pursuits. His dream of attending the Air Force Academy or enlisting to serve in the Coast Guard. His ability to walk. All dashed in an instant.

"I never once considered that I might not have the use of my legs someday," said Waterhouse. "It never crossed my mind as a possibility, so all of my planning was military. Air Force, Coast Guard, police, maybe and all of a sudden I can't do my plan, my backup plan or the backup plan to my backup plan. I had to refigure out what I wanted to do with my life."

Almost 22 years, two degrees, countless people young and old being influenced by his story, and one book later, Kevin now serves as the wing commander's secretary for the 403rd Wing at Keesler Air Force Base, Mississippi.

After such an accident, especially at such a young age, one would expect a grieving period or maybe a period of depression to have occurred, but Waterhouse said he never went through a "why me?" phase. He credits the support from those around him as his initial catalyst towards resiliency and being able challenges he was faced with.

Despite the physical setback, in Yucaipa, California. The Waterhouse said being in a wheelchair has taught him a lot and given him valuable insight on the subject of resiliency and has allowed him to teach and help

According to the Merriam-Webster dictionary, resilience is defined as the capability of a strained body to recover its size and shape after deformation caused especially by compressive stress or an ability to recover from or adjust easily to misfortune or

Those black and white human elements such as a business model or a memory foam mattress, but human challenges are so unique to each individual facing them that resiliency cannot be defined or explained in so few

For Waterhouse, there is a lot of learning and adaptation involved in order to be resilient.

faith that no matter what happens you are going to have the strength to get through it or that you already have the strength to get through it. You just have to learn how to tap into it."

He also said an important factor of resiliency is gratitude. Focusing 403rd Wing commander, hired on and being grateful for what he has rather than lamenting over what he has lost allows for Waterhouse to maintain a positive accomplishments," she said. outlook and attitude which provides him with the ability to move forward.

After his accident, in his quest to figure out what to do with his life, Waterhouse said he traveled the country for 15 years. He worked at camps, volunteered at places like the YMCA and visited newly disabled people in hospitals with his service dog, Jade, to lift

"Extend the hand of service," Waterhouse said as advice to those facing a challenge. "There is nothing like losing yourself in service to help you be grateful for what you have."

Just like any other person's path in life, except for the part where he was in a wheelchair, Waterhouse did from time to time face adversity in the form of people underestimating his

Shortly after the accident, he revisited his life-long aspirations to serve his country by talking with an Air Force recruiter postaccident thinking surely there was still some way he could serve his country. The recruiter explained to him that due to his physical disabilities, the best way he could serve the military was to go home and pay his taxes.

Waterhouse, not allowing anyone to dictate his capabilities took the advice with a grain of salt and continued to push himself, despite setbacks like losing his leg and all of his toes to infection. He pursued higher education at Ottawa University in Ottawa, Kansas where he graduated first with a Bachelor's degree in business administration and later with a Master's in the same subject area.

After finishing his education, his life-long desire to somehow serve his country just like his Army Ranger father and his government-employed mother "Resiliency," he said, "is having remained. He took matters into his own hands and said he filled out over 180 job applications for federal employment. Evidently those efforts paid off and landed him with the Air Force Reserve as a civil servant in December 2017.

"I was so impressed by his positive attitude, personality and "There is no job too big or small. He attacks every project with enthusiasm. He is a great addition to our staff and this wing."

"The leadership team here has been very supportive," said Waterhouse. "They gave me my shot and gave me the chance to get in."

Surrounding himself with supportive people, believing in his ability to adapt and remaining grateful no matter what, continues to be the pillars of resilience for Waterhouse every day.

Air men and Soldiers build bombs together at combat shadow event

ine Soldiers got hands-on experience building bombs alongside Airmen as part of the combat shadow program at Bagram Airfield Jan.

Airmen from the 455th Expeditionary Maintenance Squadron AMMO Flight taught Soldiers from the 495th Combat Sustainment Support Battalion how to assemble GBU-54 Laser Joint Direct Attack Munitions. The 500-pound bombs will be added to the 455th Air Expeditionary Wing's built-up weapons stocks and will eventually be loaded onto F-16's for operational use.

The 455th AEW's combat shadow program allows Airmen and joint partners to tour different areas and get handson experience to learn about various mission aspects, leading to a greater understanding of how different organizations impact vital operations. The Soldiers participating in the bomb build came from various career fields including administration, logistics and medical.

"This allows the Army to get a closer perspective to what is being done inside the ammunition supply point and gets them closer to the Air Force mission set," Air Force Chief Master Sgt. Eric Barlet, 455th EMXS AMMO flight chief said.

Army 1st Lt. Jeffrey Waters, 495th ČSSB ASP accountable officer, said the joint bombbuild was a great opportunity for Soldiers to get away from their desks and do something exciting, while learning a new aspect of the mission.

"Desk work and bomb building couldn't be more different, so this event was perfect," Waters said. "This was a highly successful joint event between the Air Force and the Army, and we know the bombs that were built will be expertly placed to further our mission

Army Capt. Joe Baker, 495th CSSB personnel and supply officer, said he and his fellow

Soldiers appreciated working sideby-side with Airmen and getting hands-on experience in a different

"It's great for us to learn how the munitions are put together and prepared for use," Baker said. "The best part is getting to do some team building, so it's fun."

As the ASP accountable officer, Waters is ultimately accountable for all operations and all Army ammunition within ASP. Barlet said the AMMO Flight communicates with Waters' team at least weekly based on operational needs, and they regularly discuss joint infrastructure and operational developments.

"The Army and the Air Force have come a long way in building relationships and are now in unison when it comes to operating within the jointly shared ammunition supply point," Barlet said.


The relationship between the two organizations also spans beyond official duties.





Last chance for life: US, PAF air men exchange egress ideas

CESAR BASA AIR BASE, Philippines (AFNS) --

S. Air Force members from the 113th Maintenance in a subject matter expert exchange with Philippine Air Force 430th Aircraft Maintenance Group Egress personnel, during the Bilateral Air Contingent Exchange-Philippines, or BACE-P, at Cesar Basa Air Base, Jan. 22.

"Subject matter expert exchanges are an important way for us to learn (from) and teach our counterparts from partner nations," said U.S. Air Force Tech. Sgt. Ed Edens, 113th MXS egress systems mechanic. "It's especially important for egress when you have to be on top of your job because we can't (ops) test our system. Everything that we do has to be perfect."

Egress is otherwise known as the "last chance for life." The ejection seat itself is the last option for an aircrew member when it comes to surviving an unexpected aircraft or mechanical emergency.

Egress Airmen perform a full visual inspection of the ejection system which includes the seat and cockpit components. If anything is found broken or out of technical data specifications, it's the egress technician's job to ground the jet and pull the seat to repair the defect prior to returning the aircraft to flying status.

Edens brings with him 17 years of experience as a egress systems craftsman and has experienced emergency situations.

"I've experienced ejections in the past, and the first thing that goes through my mind, is did the pilot survive," explained Edens. "Job satisfaction comes from ensuring the pilots are safe and we did our jobs well."
