Air Force Global **Housing Symposium** aims to correct housing issues

JOINT BASE SAN ANTONIO-LACKLAND, Texas (AFNS) -

"Families First" is the mantra behind the Air Force's Housing Privatization program improvement plan which is taking front and center attention mold," and panel discussions at the Air Force's Global Housing Symposium, which kicked off May 7, in downtown of the program leaders San Antonio.

major lines of effort, outlines 27 initiatives to correct housing agenda is a daylong project issues identified following a servicewide review of health and safety concerns.

Col. Michael Beach, Air Force Housing Program chief, said ensuring Airmen and their families live in safe, quality homes is not a fire-and-forget mission.

"Our most important resource is our people," he said. "We've listened to residents, reviewed survey feedback and have taken a top-to-bottom look at our processes, policies and procedures to identify what's broken, and fix it."

Beach is taking that same message to the Global Housing Symposium. There Air Force housing management staff and base civil engineers from across the Air Force are gathering alongside project owners to discuss the current, worldwide status of Air Force housing under one roof.

Commencing with a keynote peech from Hon. John Henderson, assistant secretary of the Air Force for installations, environment and energy, the symposium is slated to update, train and

keep them up to date and able to serve the Airmen of their installations with the highest service level possible.

The agenda boasts experts speaking on "everything you wanted to know about where attendees will have the opportunity to ask questions concerning policy changes, The plan, which includes five roles and responsibilities and manpower. Included in the owners' meeting where Air Force leadership and the project owners will discuss the best course of action moving forward for the privatized housing program, with Airmen and their families' health and safety at the center of the conversation.

> The symposium is a biennial event organized by the Air Force Civil Engineer Center to bring Air Force housing professionals together to improve housing services for Airmen and their families. This year's event is an opportunity for program leaders to discuss "Families First" and address some of the health and safety concerns they're working to overcome.

"The Air Force is committed to restoring trust in the privatized housing program and providing military families safe, quality and wellmaintained base housing," Beach said.

The Air Force began to utilize housing privatization in 1996 as a quick and effective vehicle for transforming the

Air Force Special Operations Command's Preservation of the Force and particularly proud."
Family hosted a caregiver More than 20 of AFSOC's and resilience education, or CARE, summit at a resort in Gatlinburg, Tennessee, April 22-27.

The summit promoted a whole-family approach to resilience and readiness for AFSOC's wounded, ill or injured service members and their caregivers.

"I'm really proud of the CARE summit efforts," said Lt. Gen. Brad Webb, AFSOC commander. "This is focused on the caregivers. For those of you who participate in this, this is a labor of love. When you get to see the difference it makes with the families who are attending

these kinds of summits, this is an area where Air Commandos are taking care of Air Commandos and I am

Air Commandos and their caregivers attended the summit, receiving numerous resilience resources and networking.

Katie Dean, wife and caregiver of Staff Sgt. Jason Dean, 20th Special Operations Squadron special missions aviator who was injured in a helicopter crash last year, commented on the summit.

"We love the abundance of resources that are available," Dean said. "I learned about resources that I hadn't even heard of before. As Jason moves forward with surgeries, and if he can fly again or if he gets out, I know there's a lot of resources we can tap into and and what we've dealt see what benefits are there and available for us."

Staff Sgt. Dean previously tried pain management and physical therapy to recuperate from the crash, with little success.

"Some of my bones were broken in the crash and it injured my back and neck really bad," said Staff Sgt. Dean. "Kaye Creasman." **AFSOC Wounded Warrior** program manager, was one of my case managers as I was seeking treatment. She helped met at the summit. me get into the (Preservation of the Force and Families) program and receive more individualized treatment."

As Staff Sgt. Dean continues with a tailored treatment plan, he and Katie learn more about the process and make connections with families in similar situations. there's so many stresses

"This summit is super beneficial," Dean said. "We've learned about the groups out there to help us. Then there's also just the bonding; talking to other guys that are hurt or have some type of illness or something like that. To be able to sit, talk, share and meet new people is great. It's also great to talk to the other members that are the caregivers."

At one point during the summit, all the caregivers gathered together in a conference room to share their stories.

"When the caregivers were together, just being able to listen and hear that other people have similar struggles is enlightening," Dean said. "It's like, 'Oh, there's somebody battling that too!' We have a great support system at Cannon (AFB) and of course we talk about our struggles with. It's just nice to really be able to have someone that can say, 'I definitely understand where you're coming from. This happened to me too.' From a caregiver standpoint, it's nice to have that other caregiver to lean on and say, 'Well, my husband went through this and this is how I helped him."

The Dean's linked up with other caregivers they

"There's several couples we've really gotten close to and we can see ourselves hanging out with them in the future," Dean said. "We plan on keeping in touch with them. Programs like POTFF are instrumental;

The active duty 388th Fighter Wing and Reserve 419th FW conducted an integrated combat capability exercise April 30-May 2 at the Utah Test and Training

The friendly and enemy forces were made up of F-35 Lightning IIs from Hill AFB, F-16 Fighting Falcons over an eight-hour tour from the 311th Fighter Squadron at Holloman AFB, New Mexico, and 80th FS at Kunsan Air Base, South Korea, and a team of contracted aggressor pilots from Draken International, at Nellis AFB, Nevada.

"Planning and carrying out the mission as part of a large, integrated force, at a high ops tempo is always valuable training," said Col. Michael Ebner, 388th FW vice commander. On a normal flying day at Hill AFB, there may be eight to 10 aircraft that take off at once, then eight to 10 more jets several hours later. During this exercise, fourship sorties launched every 30-45 minutes throughout the day.

Maintainers had to be refuel, reload and take off again, generating a total of 44 sorties a day. They worked in "cells." Each cell was made of crew chiefs, weapons and avionics technicians and overseen by a senior non-commissioned officer responsible for keeping up to four aircraft ready for flight.

that are involved with seeking treatment and having that supportive community is a huge help to both personal life, marriage, work and wherever you are."

Col. Thad Allen, U.S. Special Operations Command POTFF director, commented on the importance of the program's focus.

"AFSOC and SOCOM looked at themselves and asked what they needed to do for our families," Allen said. "I can't think of anything more important than caregivers. What we need to afford to do is take care of our families. Three times a year, I get the chance to talk to all of the new commanders coming into SOCOM. 





INSTRUCTIONS:

Preheat your oven to 450 degrees F, and spray a large baking sheet with a non-stick spray. Set aside. In one shallow bowl, whisk together the flour, salt, black pepper, and cayenne. In another shallow bowl, add the eggs. In a third shallow bowl, combine the panko and plain bread crumbs.

Taking each chicken strip, dredge in the flour and then shake to get rid of any excess. Place in the egg and douse to coat. Let any excess drip off. Then transfer the chicken strips to the bread crumb mixture,

In a large, heavy-bottomed saucepan, combine the honey, brown sugar, garlic, ketchup, pureed chipotles, hot sauce, apple cider vinegar, onion powder, and a dash of salt and pepper. Bring to a boil, whisking throughout. In a small bowl, whisk together the com starch and water until the com starch has dissolved. Add it to the saucepan, continuing to whisk until the sauce has thickened, about 3-4 minutes. Reduce the heat to low. Submerge each chicken strip in the sauce, and place on a plate to the side.

Prepare your rice by, combining cooked rice, cilantro, lime juice, lime zest and a dash of salt and pepemble your tacos by layering on rice, chicken, a drizzle of ranch dressing (if you are using) and a sprinkling of cilantro onto a warmed corn or flour tortilla. Serve immediately, and enjoy!

Air Force stopPED all new Tyndall rebuil ding efforts starting May 1

ARLINGTON, Va. (AFNS) --

he Air Force will be forced to stop all new rebuilding efforts at Tyndall Air Force Base, Florida, starting May 1 because of the absence of Congressional funding.

Secretary of the Air Force Heather Wilson announced the pending work stoppage March 27 at a public event, citing a critical need for supplemental funding to recover from the natural disasters that struck Tyndall and Offutt Air Force Bases.

Hurricane Michael inflicted \$4.7 billion of damage to Tyndall AFB in October 2018. Hurricane Michael was recently upgraded and recognized as a Category 5 storm. It was one of only four Category 5 hurricanes to make recorded landfall in the continental United States. The rare magnitude of destruction damaged nearly 700 buildings and forced the Air Force to relocate 11,000 personnel and 46 aircraft.

Then, in March 2019, a historic flood inundated Offutt AFB, Nebraska. Flood waters submerged dozens of buildings and much of the flightline under eight feet of water.

"Homeowners and businesses purchase insurance to protect themselves from these kinds of disasters, but that's not an option for the military," said Wilson. "When unavoidable catastrophes strike our

facilities, supplemental funding from Congress is our only recourse. If they don't step in, our communities, our readiness, and our security all pay the price."

Wilson said the work stoppage would prevent new waiting on supplemental contracts from being started, funding. including new rebuilding efforts. The work stoppage does not apply to contracts already funded for clean-up and repair efforts.

Wilson previously announced the deferral of

61 critical infrastructure projects across 18 states and five overseas locations worth a total of \$272.4 million as the Air Force prioritized funds to ensure the safety and welfare of its

"The supplemental funding and budget reprogramming requests are about more than just Tyndall and Offutt," said Wilson. "We're robbing other projects to fund minimal


recovery efforts because Congress hasn't moved forward yet with recovery funding. The lack of funding maintenance. Offutt AFB now for these projects is impacting all of our bases."

Wilson warned of more people and equipment while impacts rapidly approaching in the absence of a supplemental appropriation to recover Tyndall and Offutt. The Air Force expects to stop intensive depot-level aircraft repairs starting mid-May, which would ground five bomber aircraft later this fall and

create a long-term backlog for E-3 Airborne Warning and Control System aircraft recovery efforts and flying operations are also at risk if delays in funding continue.

"We'll continue to face natural disasters but we can't set the precedent of not rebuilding our bases following a storm like Hurricane Michael," Wilson said. "A natural disaster shouldn't decide whether our communities keep their bases."
