A reason to run

MINOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. -Seven thousand, seven hundred and seventy-seven – that may seem like a large number, but not when counting days in a life.

Senior Airman Bryce Powers passed away in 2013 at 21 years old, but his Gold Star Mother Cathy Powers kept him alive in her heart. Gold Star families are the immediate relatives of U.S. Armed Forces members who died while serving, which can sometimes create issues in families.

"Four years in a row, I left my living family at home on Christmas to sit with him [at his grave] because I didn't want Bryce to be forgotten," said Cathy. "On the fourth year, someone told me that [the wreaths] were not Christmas decorations."

Every year on National Wreath Day, wreaths are placed by volunteers at over 1,600 cemeteries across the U.S. and each veteran's name is read out loud.

"After that, I told my husband that I was sorry for leaving them at home because I didn't want Bryce to be forgotten," said Cathy. "Bryce isn't forgotten; people are saying his name."

After this, she said something clicked in her brain, and she decided to get through the pain. For a while, she thought her problem was her weight but there was much more to it.

"I actually couldn't believe I could run," Cathy said. "When I started, I was very overweight and out of shape. The first exercise I could do was sit down on the ground and get back up ten times a day."

By running, Cathy found a whole new meaning to life. She not only runs for herself, but for Bryce.

"It's been a great way for me to just think about everything and deal with my thoughts," said Cathy. In April 2018, she signed up for a half-marathon.

"I wasn't a running person at all, and I ran on accident because I signed up to do something for Bryce," Cathy said. "I walked up

the hills, crying, and ran down the hills. When we were done, they called my name to the front and said I won first place for my age range. I thought I was gifted; apparently 17-minute miles is not very good, but I still bragged."

She continues to run and has lost over 140 pounds since then. When she mentions this to others, they focus on the loss and congratulate her, but that was never her intention.

"That weight represents so much poison in my body, mind and emotions," said Cathy. "I still have days that I feel sad, lonely and angry, but when I run, I physically work those feelings out so that when I'm done running, I feel better and happier."

The weight loss helped her find a new sense of pride.

"One day [last year], I went out [to where we store Bryce's bags] and found [his physical training] shorts," said Cathy. "I thought to myself, 'Wouldn't that be great if someday, I could ever wear those,' but they wouldn't even fit on one leg. Now I'm wearing them to every state I go to! He would not believe it; he'd be so proud."

Powers plans on running at least 1,000 miles total in all 50 states before 2020. As of Sept. 19, she has ran in 43 different states; North Dakota was her 40th.

"I remember going to Eielson AFB and Elmendorf AFB," said Cathy. "They must have had a lot of faith [for being the first state]. Now I'm able to say I ran in 40 states."

It's been a long year, but Cathy is close to completing her goals and hopes her story can help others.

"When I get to come on a base, it makes me feel like Bryce is still here," said Cathy. "Everyone kind of looks the same in uniform, so it just makes me feel proud to be part of this family and to still be included. It means more than people probably know."

Throughout the states, many people have helped her as well!

"A few weeks ago, I was in Wisconsin and my tooth broke," said Cathy. "I ran by a dentist's office and had been putting up with this [for a few weeks by then]. I just walked in off the street and told them what I was doing. He turned out to be a Navy veteran and fixed my tooth for free!"

He told her that he was moved by her story, but wasn't the only one, she said. In every place, she has touched someone's life and hopes to continue.

"At first it just changed my life, now it's changing a lot of lives and it just makes me so happy," Cathy said. "I don't care what they did in the military, whether they raised their right hand or were drafted, they showed up. I'm running for the average person; they're all heroes to me.'

Through her story, she realized that the number of days her son was alive was also important to others.

"I found out that's how many new burials there are in Arlington every year," said Cathy. "If they bury [about] 26 people a day, six days a week, it's about 7,800 or a little bit less. That just really touched my heart and I knew I wanted to do something with that number."

Knowing this, her final goal is to sponsor 7,777 wreaths for the veterans at the Arlington National Cemetery.

"I have chosen to share Wreaths Across America's mission statement because it fits my heart," Cathy said. "They remember our fallen, honor those serving and their families, and they teach the next generation the value of freedom. My goal with my running is to combine those things: to run with people and bring attention to our veterans and how much they give. It also makes me a healthier person, not stuck in a bad place, and personally, since my own son is fallen, makes me feel like I'm doing something great to remember him."

MINOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. -Seventeen incidents of drunken driving have happened this year at Minot Air Force Base.

Inconsiderate decisions like these reminded one Team Minot member of a traumatic duty he had to perform as a civilian medic.

 ${}^{\bar{\!\!\!\!\!\!\!\!\!}}$ I was one of the people that had to go recover the body," said Senior Airman Gibbs Bellamour, 5th Medical Group Operation Squadron aerospace medical technician.

Bellamour solemnly recalled the events from a tragic vehicle accident he, then 22 years old, responded to as a medic in Philadelphia.

The accident was caused by a drunk driver who ran into a family vehicle.

"Family of five," Bellamour said. "It was a mom and a dad in the front seat. Three kids in the back."

Bellamour said when he arrived the drunk driver was on the side of the road and his head was bleeding.

"Everyone in the vehicle... [I'm] just going to say they were pronounced dead except for the mother," said Bellamour.

Bellamour shared that he had to recover the newborn who had been ejected through the front windshield.

"I spent six months in mental health trying to get that image out of my head," said Bellamour. "I kept dreaming about that kid."

These events affect not only the victims but also those that respond.

"It was the most horrific call I've ever been on because that mom ended up being told she was the sole survivor," Bellamour said. In addition, he also went on to explain that the drunk driver of the vehicle also recovered from the accident.

Paramedics and medics on base

explained that when they are called to a motor vehicle accident, often there has been alcohol involved.

"The danger is really for everyone else on the road," said Amy Johnson, 5th Medical Group paramedic. "The best one off is always the drunk driver."

Traumatic accidents happen every day in North Dakota. Impaired and distracted driving are among crimes the most often committed, killing someone every 30 minutes on average nationally, as reported by the North Dakota Department of Transportation.

Stay Alive From Education (SAFE), a national non-profit organization, will host an immersive no-holds-barred presentation from first responders on the dangers of distracted and impaired driving and the non-use of seatbelts at the base theater, Sept. 25-27, 2019.

They aim to empower the audience with information to make rational decisions regarding their well-being and the well-being of those around them.

Firefighters and paramedics will demonstrate the procedures and equipment they use to save lives when called to the scene of an accident. They will hold interactive discussions featuring their eyewitness testimonies and pictures of real-life trauma accidents.

Join the SAFE team and the base safety office Sept. 25-27, 2019, at 8 a.m., 1:30 and 3:30 p.m., at the base theater in exploring what Team Minot can do to educate Airmen and their families and prevent irreversible decisions. There will be another session on Sept. 26, 2019, at 5 p.m. to accommodate families and young drivers.

• N.D. Game & Fish Dept. game wardens: Not much activity throughout north-central area lakes. Scattered walleye success on the east end of Lake Sakakawea. Work deep. No Devils Lake reports.

• Devils Lake, Ed's Bait Shop, Devils Lake: Try vertical jigging with minnows around the bridges in 17 to 22 feet for walleye. Also try shallow in about 10 feet for walleye with some pike potentially mixed in. Recent rains could improve shore success on the main lake and feeder coulee creeks.

• Devils Lake, Woodland Resort, Devils Lake: Anglers doing more vertical jigging around the bridges and structures for walleye as they transition to a fall bite. Look for the traditional fall perch to pick up soon, as well. Pike remain slow.

• Lake Darling, Karma C-Store, Ruthville: Weather permitting, anglers still heading to Lake Darling with most activity up on the north end around Grano. Deepwater Bay on Lake Sakakawea slow for walleye.

• Lake Darling, Upper Souris Nat'l. Wildlife Refuge, Foxholm: Weather permitting, anglers are finding some walleye success on Lake Darling. Lake appears fresher after recent rains with less algae.

• Lake Metigoshe, Four Seasons, Bottineau: Not many anglers but those out continue finding some nice-sized walleye.

Lake Sakakawea/Lake Audubon, Cenex Bait & Tackle, Garrison: Improving fall walleye bite on the east end of Lake Sakakawea. Work deep in 40 to 50 feet from deTrobriand to Douglas bays. Try a variety of presentations. Mixed lleve success from Lake Audubon so use a variety of presentations and depths. Missouri River tailrace fair for walleye. Try the Spillway blowout area

- Be careful to avoid damaging harvested fields and roads after recent rains when hunting.
- Be careful of waterfowl and upland bird identification with uncolored ducks and rooster pheasants, as well as whooping cranes starting to move through with sandhill cranes.

Some improving success during the day.. Some salmon, trout, and catfish mixed in. Try 3-way swivels or crankbaits. Spillway area success varies with water levels. Try spoons or crankbaits from shore throughout the day for walleye. Salmon bite better on the river than Lake Sakakawea. Work deep for walleye and move around on Lake Sakakawea. Salmon spread out throughout the water column but

5) When ready to cook, set the temperature to 350°F and preheat, lid closed for 15 minutes

6) Transfer saucepan contents to a medium dutch oven and place directly on the grill grate. Cook 15-20 minutes until the top is lightly browned and bubbling.

Serve with tortilla chips. Enjoy!

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'Operation Gunnar' rallies Minot Air Force Base

When 19-month-old Gunnar coughing and looking lethargic. His Davis became sick, the military community at Minot Air Force Base, North Dakota, came together to support one of their own.

Middle school sweethearts, Gina and Ryan Davis, moved to their first duty station at Minot AFB in March of 2017. Soon after arriving, Gina Davis found out she was expecting their first child. Gunnar was born on Jan. 18, 2018, at a healthy weight of 9 pounds 2 ounces.

Unexpected losses

The year 2019 has not been easy for the Davis family. "I lost my mother unexpectedly at the age of 46," shared Gina Davis, whose 18-year-old brother, Austin, moved in with her and her family due to the sudden loss. "Two weeks later, Ryan and I suffered a miscarriage at eight weeks pregnant." Gina Davis states, "One month after the first miscarriage, we suffered another miscarriage.

One week after their second miscarriage, duty called and Senior Airman Ryan Davis had to go on a temporary duty assignment to England, leaving his grief-stricken wife, brother-in-law and 19-monthold son, Gunnar, back home.

A turn of events

Friday, Sept. 6, Gunnar began

mother kept a close eye on him and was quick to notice that, by Saturday evening, he had developed a fever of 98.6. Within one hour, the fever had spiked to 104 and he suffered a seizure. After an EMT assessed him, Gina Davis decided to take Gunnar to the emergency room at the downtown hospital, but he was soon discharged after being given Tylenol.

night, Gunnar's Sunday conditions got worse. "He wouldn't eat or drink, he was vomiting and couldn't move," Gina Davis said. "He developed a rash that looked like pinpoint bruises just under the skin. I've done my research on medical conditions since becoming a mom and having a weakened immune system myself, I knew it was meningitis."

Davis rushed Gunnar to the ER and, once there, her maternal instincts kicked in again when the doctor was skeptical about giving Gunnar a spinal tap, which Davis insisted he needed. After the doctor and nurses saw

that Davis wouldn't budge, they agreed to perform a spinal tap. "She did the tap and, as soon as she saw the spinal fluid, she knew," Davis added. "The entire room turned into

chaos. There were people running around everywhere and hooking him up to monitors. Within the hour, they had us on a plane going to Fargo.'

A fight against bacterial meningitis

Although bacterial meningitis is rare in children of Gunnar's age, he still contracted it as he was too little to get the vaccine, which Gina Davis urges parents to look into. According to the Mayo clinic website, meningitis is "an inflammation of the membranes (meninges) surrounding your brain and spinal cord." Bacterial meningitis is caused by bacteria that "enter the bloodstream and travel to the brain and spinal cord." In the United States, one in 100,000 people is diagnosed with bacterial meningitis every year.

Once at Sanford Children's Hospital in Fargo, which is five hours away by car from Minot, Davis tried reaching her husband in Europe to let him know what was happening. Their son had arrived almost unresponsive due to brain and spinal swelling. Within the hour, his supervisor reassured her that Senior Airman Davis was on a flight to Minot.

Gunnar was placed on antibiotics, steroids and even morphine to help with the excruciating pain he was in. His father drove the five hours to the hospital once he arrived in Minot and was finally reunited with his family.

On Friday, Sept. 13, Gunnar's condition started to finally improve. His bloodwork showed that his liver function was back to normal and the doctors were hopeful. "We're not out of the woods yet," said Gina Davis. "Gunnar is at high risk for life threatening seizures due to the swelling of his brain and spinal cord. But he's responding well to antibiotics and pain medication."

"Operation Gunnar" begins As soon as the military community at Minot Air Force Base heard that one of their families had been hit with such tragedy, they quickly did what they do best: they gathered together and made the Davis family

their priority. Quickly, they began delivering food to Austin, who due to being exposed to the bacterial meningitis, had been quarantined to the Davis's family home with their dogs.

They also collected toys, blankets, books, clothes and food to donate to the Davis family in Fargo, volunteering to personally deliver the gifts for what is now known as "Operation Gunnar."

"My mom always said, 'it takes a village to raise a child.' And our village over at Minot Air Force Base rocks!" Gina Davis said. Now that they are out of the hospital and back home, the Davis family is relieved to be surrounded by their military village.
