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US, Japan bomber-fighter integration showcases alliance, global power projection

JOINT BASE PEARL HARBOR-HICKAM, Hawaii --

U.S. Air Force aircraft from the Pacific theater and the continental United States integrated with the Koku Jieitai (Japan Air Self Defense Force or JASDF) to conduct bilateral and theater familiarization training near Japan Feb. 3.

A U.S. Air Force B-52H Stratofortress bomber from Andersen Air Force Base, Guam, flew north to join one B-52H from Minot Air Force Base, North Dakota, in the vicinity of Misawa Air Base, Japan, as part of a combined Continuous Bomber Presence (CBP) and Bomber Task Force (BTF) mission.

The two bombers subsequently conducted bilateral joint training with 13 JASDF F-2s, four F-4s, and 28 F-15s, and six U.S. Air Force F-16s in the vicinity of Japan before returning to Andersen.

Collectively, the flights from the Indo-Pacific and continental United States demonstrate U.S. commitment to allies and partners through the global employment of military forces.

"For more than 60 years, the U.S.-Japan Alliance has been the cornerstone of stability and security in the region. The integration of bomber aircraft operations in the Indo-Pacific, alongside our Koku Jieitai partners, provides a significant opportunity to enhance our combined readiness, promote interoperability, demonstrate our global power projection and provide transparency across the region," said Gen. CQ Brown, Jr., Pacific Air Forces commander. "This mission fully demonstrates our enduring commitment to a Free and Open Indo-Pacific and our willingness to defend our interests and the freedoms enshrined in international law."

bomber forces regularly conduct combined theater cooperation engagements with allies and partners, demonstrating U.S. capability to command, control and conduct bomber missions around the world.

"This mission demonstrates the flexibility, long reach and responsive nature of our bomber force as we continue to assure our allies and deter aggressors globally," said Maj. Gen. James Dawkins, Jr., Eighth Air Force and Joint-Global Strike Operations Center commander. and multinational integration provides an excellent opportunity for our Airmen to maintain their readiness and hone their global strike capability.'

The bombers from Guam are assigned to the 69th Expeditionary Bomb Squadron out of Minot AFB, North Dakota, deployed in support of U.S. Indo-Pacific Command's CBP operations. Pacific Air Force's have flown CBP operations for more than 15 years in support of a free and open Indo-Pacific. These missions routinely operate throughout the region accordance with international law and norms.

The F-16s are assigned to the 35th Fighter Wing from Misawa Air Base, Japan.

Strategic Command has conducted bomber task force missions since 2014 as a demonstration of the U.S. commitment to collective security, and to integrate with Geographic Combatant Command operations. The first mission included B-52Hs and B-2 Spirits traveling from the continental United States to Joint Base Pearl Harbor Hickam in April 2014.

Honey Garlic CRISPY CHICKEN



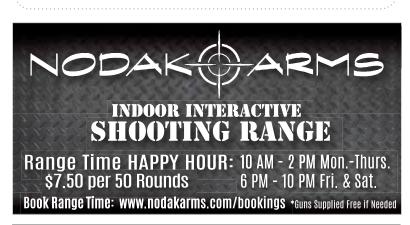
INGREDIENTS:

- 10 ounces boneless skinless chicken thighs cut into cubes
- 1 whole egg
- 1/3 cup cornstarch • 1/2 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 tbsp low-sodium soy sauce • 1/2 tsp black pepper
- Honey garlic sauce
- 1 tbsp canola oil
- 3 cloves garlic finely chopped
- 1 tbsp ginger finely chopped
- 5 tbsp honey
- 2 tbsp brown sugar
- 1/2 cup soy sauce • 1/2 tsp sesame oil
- 2 tbsp cornstarch

- 1/4 cup water
- 1 tsp sesame seeds optional
- 1 tbsp green onions optional

INSTRUCTIONS:

- In a mixing bowl, combine the cubed chicken thighs, eggs, 2 tablespoons of cornstarch, and soy sauce. Mix well and set aside.
- To make the sauce, combine the soy sauce, water, honey, and brown sugar in a bowl and mix well. In a pan, heat the canola oil at medium high heat and cook ginger and garlic until fragrant and soft. Pour the soy sauce mixture and let cook by stirring occasionally. While the sauce is slowly cooking, mix cornstarch and water in a small bowl to make a slurry. Slowly add the cornstarch slurry into the pan while constantly stirring the pan. Cook over medium heat until sauce thickens. Add sesame oil and mix well.
- To make the fried chicken, whisk together the all-purpose flour and the rest of the cornstarch and add them into the bowl of prepared chicken. Combine well. Heat about 2 inches of frying oil at 375 degrees Fahrenheit and fry the chicken in batches. Fry for about 3 minutes and remove from oil. Place chicken on drying rack for about 5 minutes. Fry the chicken another time for another 2 minutes or until golden brown and crispy. Remove from oil and drain off excess oil.
- Add the fried chicken into the pan with the cooked sauce and mix well.
- Top with sesame seeds and green onions

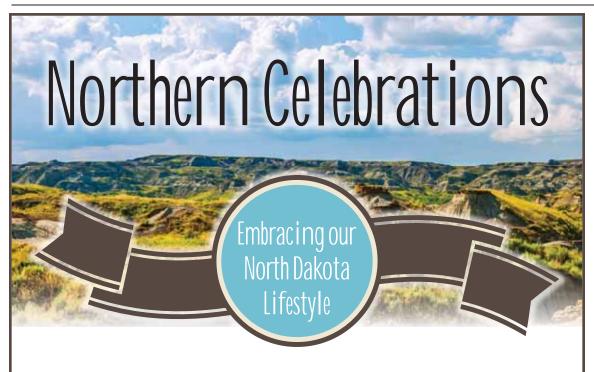

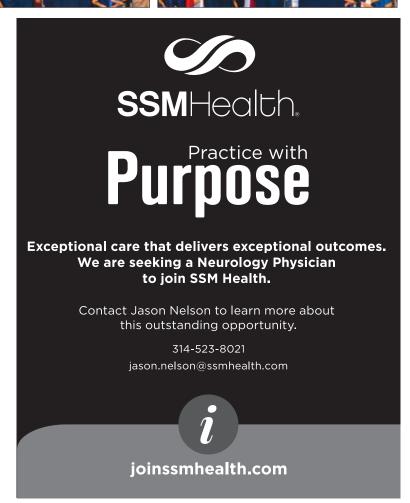


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Five Minutes to Thrive: The Truth About Suicide

Many of us have known someone who has attempted or completed suicide. This may be in part due to the fact that suicide rates have risen dramatically over the past 30 years, such that it has now become the 2nd-leading cause of death for Americans age 15-34, outranking both homicide and physical illness. And despite increased awareness of this issue, the trend continues.

A big part of the problem is the many myths surrounding suicide. Here are some realities: less than half of those who die by suicide had any known mental health illness. Military members who have deployed actually appear to be at a decreased risk for suicide. In nearly 1/3 of cases, people who attempted suicide did so spontaneously, with minimal warning signs or overt talk of suicidal thoughts or plans to those around them. Despite the oft-cited "22 veterans per day" statistic, the actual number is closer to 530 per year...not as dramatic, but still nearly double the risk of civilians. The two biggest stressors contributing to suicide are consistently shown to be relationship issues and/or financial troubles. And I believe, unfortunately, that not all suicide is preventable; even despite all our best efforts, we cannot make the decision for other people.

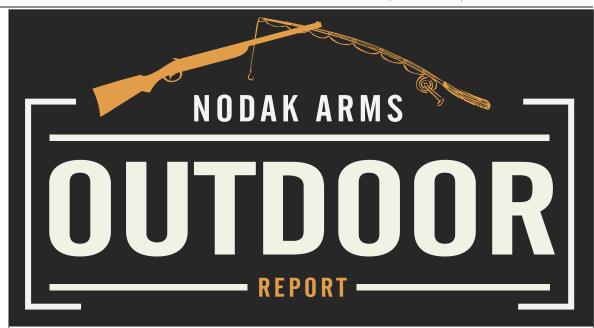
But by far the biggest misconception is that if people who are contemplating killing themselves are simply made aware of helping resources (like the 24/7 National Suicide Prevention Lifeline: 1-800-273-8255), they will take advantage of them. But we all know about the Mental Health Clinic and VA resources—yet military and veteran suicides still happen. What is far more important, is the personal influence of other people. We must be proactive in reaching out to others; we can't expect that in the darkness they will be able to help themselves. Ours is a shared responsibility, not just as Wingmen but as human beings, to aid each other in times of great need.

We often cannot know how or with what others are struggling, as many people try to present themselves in a constant positive light, hiding their inner strife. But that doesn't necessarily prevent you from being able to make a difference; you just have to be willing to get involved:

- Know your people; care for them before they need it. Establish a caring and supportive relationship with your coworkers and those whom you supervise. They'll feel more comfortable talking to you (honestly) about any possible personal concerns in the future.
- Pay attention to the warning signs. The most apparent indicators of possible suicide are: talking about feeling hopeless, feeling like a burden to others, feeling trapped, or wanting to die. But less obvious signs may be increased alcohol use, disappearing from social circles or self-isolating, demonstrating uncharacteristic sadness/anger/ aggression, giving away prized possessions, or even very suddenly improving or "feeling better." If you notice one or more of these behavior changes, it's time to have a direct conversation.
- Ask, Care, Escort (ACE). Be brave and directly ask the question: "Have you been thinking about killing yourself?" Then listen, encourage, and try to express understanding (instead of judgment) for how they're feeling. If the situation warrants, ask if you can bring them to someone who can help: supervisor, 1st Sgt, Chaplain, or Mental Health Clinic.

Move around for perch. Some nice-sized pike showing up, however. Ice conditions generally good with not much snow on the ice. Watch for some drifts, however. North-central area lakes somewhat slow although anglers willing to put in their time should find some success. No Missouri River System reports.

• Devils Lake, Ed's Bait Shop, Devils Lake: Nicer weather packed snow so there is generally good travel on Devils Lake. Best walleye success remains around Creel Bay or the casino. Work shallow in 10 to 22 feet for walleye in the morning or evening. Try rattling spoons with minnow heads. Work deep for perch. No new pike reports.

 Devils Lake, Woodland Resort, Devils Lake: Walleye and perch slowed with anglers working harder and longer for their catches. Try small minnow dead stick rigs with light bobbers for the finicky perch bite. Also try jigging lures. Try buckshots or jigging Raps for walleye but they're equally finicky.

· Lake Audubon/Lake Sakakawea, Totten Trail Bait, Coleharbor: No new reports.

•Lake Darling, Karma C-Store, Ruthville: Lake Darling and Grano area somewhat slow for walleye and perch. Scattered pike success on Lake Audubon but generally slow overall.

·Lake Darling, Upper Souris Nat'l. Wildlife Refuge, Foxholm: Hit and miss walleye success on Lake Darling with anglers finding good luck one day and slow the next in the same location. Good water clarity for spearing. Generally good ice conditions.

·Lake Metigoshe, Four Seasons, Bottineau: Fair bluegill success but sort through for the keepers. Walleye somewhat slow with better success in the evening. Fair for pike.

•Lake Metigoshe, Lake Metigoshe State Park, Bottineau: Warm weather brought more anglers onto area lakes with nice bluegill and pike success. Most anglers are spearing for pike.

•Lake Sakakawea/Lake Audubon, Cenex Bait & Tackle, Garrison: South

side of Lake Audubon producing some walleye success. Lots of houses along the south shore and off the East Totten boat ramp. Several anglers moved houses off the east end of Lake Sakakawea.

· Lake Sakakawea, Scenic 23, New Town: Lots of activity in the Van Hook Arm with scattered walleye success. Access remains good off the ramp and along the ice. Try jigs and minnows or tip-ups in 10 to 20 feet.

•Lake Sakakawea/Missouri River, Scott's Bait & Tackle, Pick City: Missouri River producing walleye down river during the day using jigs and minnows, 3-way swivels, or crankbaits. Wing walls producing success at times with OK shore success at night. Lake Sakakawea generally slow.

•Lake Sakakawea/northwest N.D. lakes, Scenic Sports, Williston: Lake Sakakawea producing scattered walleye activity with better success around Tobacco Garden and White Earth Bay. Some nice-sized pike coming from back bays using tip-ups and smelt. Lots of small pike in the backwaters by the U.S. Highway 85 bridge. Kota-Ray continues producing decent panfish. Coyotes starting to rub with poor fur conditions for predator hunting.

•Lonetree WMA area lakes, Harvey: Area lakes remain generally slow with anglers finding some occasional success.

• North-central / central N.D. lakes, Towner Hdwe. Hank, Towner: Buffalo Lodge Lake continues producing some pickling-sized pike.

• Bottineau Winter Park, Bottineau: 10- to 25-inch base with all runs open and in good condition. Chair and carpet lifts open. 3 Sunny Side and 4 Backside tubing runs and lift open.

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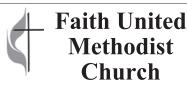

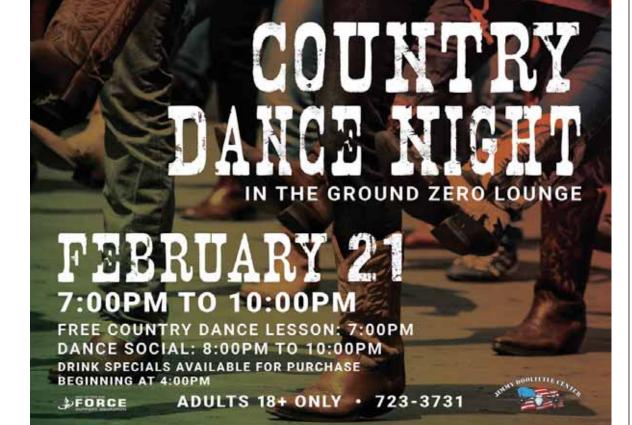

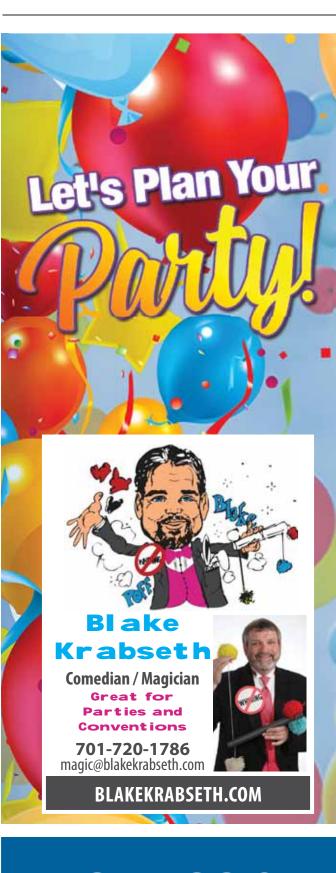
