#### What is a Power of Attorney?

Granting someone Power of Attorney is a decision that should be made carefully. Essentially, this document gives whomever you designate (called your Attorney-in-Fact) the authority to sign important documents on your behalf. The authority given can vary, however, based on the type of Power of Attorney you choose.

There are three main types of Power of Attorney: Power of Attorney with General Provisions, Durable Power of Attorney, and Special Power of Attorney

- 1. Power of Attorney with General Provisions: This is often referred to as a "non-durable" or "limited" Power of Attorney. It takes effect immediately upon signing but terminates upon the grantor's incapacitation, making it a less desirable option if your goal is estate planning.
- 2. Durable Power of Attorney: This is, by far, the most common Power of Attorney document we draft for our clients. This does not go into effect immediately; instead, it becomes effective upon your incapacitation, allowing your Attorney-in-Fact to handle matters for you while you are unable to do so. It can also be drafted with general provisions, allowing it to be effective immediately and beyond your incapacitation.
- 3. Special Power of Attorney: This document gives another authority to act for you but only on a specific matter such as opening a bank account or selling home. This type of Power of Attorney is useful if you do not want to grant someone the authority to handle all of your matters for you, but you do need assistance with a specific task. The document can be drafted to terminate upon the completion of the designated task or after a certain time frame.

In any case, all types of Power of Attorney terminate upon death. The authority granted by these documents cannot be exercised after the grantor has passed away.

### Columbia College happy to be at MAFB

#### NORTHERN SENTRY

MINOT AIR FORCE BASE --The office of Columbia College on the second floor of the Education Center is closed for now, but Program Coordinator for the MAFB, Linde Paige, has been working from home, as many others have been, in order to establish operations of the Columbia, Missouri based institution.

"Central Michigan University has left Minot AFB" according to Paige, "and now that we have opened an office on base we are the only stateside Air Force Base with Columbia College." Right now Linde Paige is busy taking phone calls from potential students, some who are just arriving at Minot after being assigned here in the last few months. But according to Paige "most of the degrees are set up so military members and their family can take classes that go where you go."

"We are all about providing quality education to our service members," said retired U.S. Army Lt. Col. Robb Boone, the college's associate vice president in charge of military locations.

The college will offer the following degree programs at the base: Bachelor of Science Cybersecurity, Bachelor in of Science in Management Information Systems, Bachelor of Science in Human Resource Management, Bachelor of Science Organizational Leadership, in Bachelor of Science in Public Administration, Bachelor of Arts in Human Services, and Bachelor of Arts in Psychology. In addition, the college will offer certificates in Human Resource Management, Management, and Marketing Management.

Paige is no stranger to the Minot AFB. Although her family traveled as she was growing up, they eventually settled in Minot as her father was from Upham. "We moved to Minot in 1978 to be closer to my grandparents who lived in Upham. I graduated from Minot High School in 1986, and also graduated from Minot State University and Central Michigan University." She is a first generation college and masters holder. Her 9.5 years of experience with Central Michigan University is especially valuable being that she worked from the same office that Columbia College now occupies, Suite 219. Linde has also worked for the other universities at MAFB in different capacities from teaching to administration. Included in that list are Central Michigan University, Minot State University, Park University and Embry Riddle Aeronautical University.

Besides being convenient, tuition at Columbia College is considered very affordable. For military members, the cost is \$250 per credit hour for undergraduate courses online or onsite. The Air Force tuition assistance program will mean no personal costs for students. Spouses of military active-duty spouses might also qualify for a grant for a class that would make it virtually free, according to Paige. The college also offers tuition discounts for spouses to continue toward completion of a degree.

In a unique approach to assisting military students, Columbia College has eliminated fees and the cost of books for its adult students with a program called "Truition."

"Even though the office is temporarily closed on base, I encourage those interested in continuing their education to give me a call."

# **Flying Legends of Victory Tour bring iconic** World War II Aircraft B-17 Flying Fortress and B-25 Mitchell to Bismarck International Airport

July 20-26, 2020, Bismarck Aero Center, 2301 University Drive, Building 22, Bismarck, ND

'FLYING LEGENDS OF VICTORY TOUR', ARIZONA COMMEMORATIVE AIR FORCE MUSEUM

MESA. AΖ The Commemorative Air Force, Airbase Arizona is bringing two of the most iconic warplanes from World War II to visit Bismarck Municipal Airport, July 20-26. Rides and ground tours may be purchased for both planes. The public can experience a Living History Flight in a fully restored B-17 or B-25 Bomber on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, July 24-26.

Both aircrafts will be open to the public for ground tours Tuesday-Thursday from 9am-6pm and Monday, Friday-Sunday from 2pm-6pm. To schedule a ride book online at www.azcaf. org/tour or call 480-462-2992.

The B-17 Flying Fortress Sentimental Journey is one of only five currently flying in the world out of over 12,000 manufactured for combat during WWII - and is the leading exhibition warbird in The Flying Legends of Victory Tour conducted by CAF Airbase Arizona, a non-profit flying museum. The Boeing B-17 was most famous for operations in Europe but was used in every theater of war from 1941-45.

B-17 cruise speed was about 160 miles per hour; maximum altitude was 36,000 ft. At high bombing altitudes in unheated aircraft, extreme temperatures subjected many crew members to frostbite.

Sentimental Journey was originally manufactured and delivered to the U.S. Army Air Forces for war service in 1944 - too late for European service but flew missions in the Pacific Theater.

After the war, she flew for training, testing, and airsea rescue missions and was eventually sold for surplus and used as a fire bomber. In 1978 the aircraft was purchased by Commemorative Air Force (CAF) member and donated to the newly formed Arizona unit of the world-famous CAF. She was meticulously restored and is today maintained in tiptop condition and operated by all-volunteer crews from the membership of CAF Airbase Arizona.

The B-25 proved to be one of the best weapons and was possibly the most versatile aircraft of WWII. Heavily armed, it was utilized for the high- and lowlevel bombing, strafing, photoreconnaissance, and submarine patrol. Its most distinguishing role was in the historic raid over Tokyo in 1942 by the Doolittle Raiders. The B-25 saw duty in every combat area flown by the Dutch, British, Chinese, Russian, Australia, and US forces.

Our particular B-25J, Maid In The Shade, served her wartime duty with the 319th Bomb Group, 437th Squadron at Serragia Airbase, Corsica. There it was assigned Battle Number 18. The plane flew 15 combat missions over Italy and Yugoslavia between November 4 and December 31, 1944. The majority of the targets were railroad bridges. After the war, she was used as a trainer before being sold at auction and used as an insect sprayer. She was acquired by Airbase in 1981 and after 28-year extensive restoration, flew again in 2009.

The exhibition of Sentimental Journey and Maid in the Shade as part of the Flying Legends of Victory Tour is hosted/sponsored at the Bismarck Aero Center.

MINOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. - The 91st Missile Wing at Minot Air Force Base was awarded the Colonel Lee R. Memorial award Williams thus capturing the title of Best Intercontinental Ballistic Missile Wing in the Air Force Global Strike Command for the year of 2019.

To defend the nation with a combat-ready nuclear force is the mission of the 91st Missile Wing. A mission that the 91st MW takes pride in not just achieving, but excelling at.

Leading the way in AFGSC, the 91st Rough Riders dominated in numerous areas such as a sortie alert rate, launch facility availability rate, maintenance execution rate and mean time to repair; showing that the Rough Riders gets it done for AFGSC.

Winning the Colonel Lee R. Williams Award isn't just achieved by a wing for best rates though, the achievements and outstanding performance of the wing's Airmen and its servant leadership by commanders and noncommissioned officers all played a part. Legend has it that ancient Scottish warriors would take a medicinal mix of honey, herbs and spices before battle to give them strength and courage, and afterward to help heal wounds. That mixture later became part of the recipe for Drambuie. In today's world, who doesn't need strength, courage, and enhanced healing? Whether that works for you or not, duck with a glaze of Drambuie, honey, Dijon mustard, and Caraway is amazingly rich and delicious.

1/3 cup Kosher Salt

Traeger Pecan Pellets

or other pellets of your choice

#### **INGREDIENTS:**

• 5 pound Duck • 1/4 cup Drambuie • ¼ cup Dijon Mustard • 1/4 cup Honey • 1/8 cup Caraway Seeds

To prepare the duck for smoking:

Work your fingers under the skin over the breasts and rub kosher salt over the breasts. It is best to do this the night before cooking, but try to give the salt

at least 45 minutes to work. Duck is naturally juicy and tender, but the salt will add flavor and help the meat hold onto all the moisture it has. Salt needs time to work. At first, it draws moisture to itself. In time, the meat will draw the moisture back, bringing salt with it. This brine will help the meat hold its moisture while cooking. Salt is the only seasoning that significantly penetrates meat.

Ducks have lots of fat under the skin, which must be released for the skin to get properly crispy. To do this, we poke a couple hundred holes, all over the bird, in the skin with a sharp probe. Avoid poking into the meat. This is easiest to do when the skin is loose after opening it up for salting.

The next step is to tighten the skin. We do this by pouring boiling water over the bird, or dipping into a pot of

boiling water. Next, we split the bird by removing the backbone, a process known as spatchcock. You will get the same result from splitting it into halves, which is probably the best way

if serving the duck to two people. Once the bird is split, pat it dry with paper towels. Apply kosher salt to the whole bird, including the cavity area.

Mix Drambuie, Dijon mustard, honey, and about half of the caraway seeds in a pot



Reduce over medium heat to about half volume. While still warm, apply the glaze to the cavity side, then the breast, legs, and all the exposed skin. Reserve the rest of the glaze. Once it cools, you will need to reheat to reapply.

Everything up to this point can be done the night before. Keep the glazed bird refrigerated, then pop on the Traeger grill, skin side up, two hours before your planned mealtime.

#### **Record Lakes Stocked with** Walleye Fingerlings

North Dakota Game and Fish Department fisheries personnel are finishing stocking a record 180 lakes across the state with nearly 12 million walleye fingerlings.

Fisheries production and development supervisor Jerry Weigel said the number of lakes bested the previous high by nearly 30 waters.

"There is record water across the state, so timing of a near record walleye production could not have come at a better time," Weigel said. "Valley City and Garrison Dam national fish hatcheries contributed to make this happen. Both hatcheries have been outstanding in helping address our demand for walleye fingerlings.'

Garrison Dam National Fish Hatchery set a record for the most pounds shipped of these 1- to 1.5-inch fingerlings, with more than 8,400 total

pounds. Given the record production, walleve coupled with a record number of lakes stocked resulted in a lot of driving time for fish haulers.

"Just in the first seven days of this year's walleye production, haulers traveled more than 8,200 miles and stocked over 150 lakes with 7.6 million fish," Weigel said.

Crews had near perfect conditions with most lakes at or near record water levels, with flooded vegetation for the young fish to hide and plenty of food for them to eat, which bodes well for future fishing opportunities.

"One of the biggest challenges this year was access to some lakes," Weigel said. "As a result of last fall's record rains, a lot of local roads in central and eastern North Dakota remained flooded and often closed, thus making navigating some roads more challenging."

Later this fall, fisheries personal will sample walleye lakes to assess success of this year's walleye stocking, as well as what Mother Nature provided.

One common observation fish haulers noted while traveling across the state, Weigel said, was the high amount of fishing taking place, both from shore and from boats.

"It's a great time to fish for walleye," he added. "Statewide, there are a lot of opportunities, and a good chance of success. This is

especially true if you live in rural North Dakota where a lot of varied fishing opportunities exist."

Upon completion, graduates are issued a certification card that is recognized by any state requiring trapper education prior to purchasing a license.

1/2 CUP SOY SAUCE 1/4 CUP MIRIN 2 TABLESPOON SUGAR **3 COINS FRESH GINGER**, EACH 1/4 INCH THICK 1 CLOVE GARLIC, CRUSHED 1/2 TEASPOON ONION POWDER **1/2 TEASPOON BLACK PEPPER 2 POUND VENISON, TRIMMED** 

In a mixing bowl, combine the soy sauce, mirin, sugar, ginger garlic, onion powder and pepper.

With a sharp knife, slice the venison into 1/4 inch thick slices. Trim any fat or connective tissue.

Put the meat slices in a large resealable plastic bag. Pour the marinade mixture over the venison and massage the bag so that all the slices get coated with the marinade. Seal the bag and refrigerate for several hours, or overnight.

When ready to cook, set Traeger temperature to 180° and preheat, lid closed for 15 minutes. For optimal flavor, use Super Smoke if available. Remove the venison from the marinade; discard marinade. Dry the meat slices between paper towels.

Arrange the meat in a single layer directly on the grill grate. Smoke for 3 hours or until the jerky is dry but still chewy and somewhat pliant when you bend a piece.

Transfer to a resealable plastic bag while the jerky is still warm leaving the top open. Let the jerky rest for an hour at room temperature

Squeeze any air from the bag and refrigerate the jerky. It will keep for several weeks. Enjoy!

# Air Force Global Strike Command strengthens workforce with robotic process automation

BARKSDALE AIR FORCE BASE, La. -- In a world that continues to develop technology that can process more and more information, how does Air Force Global Strike Command go about processing its own data, while advancing resources to achieve the mission?

Air Force Global Strike Command's Science and Technology Directorate, also ST, worked to known as answer this by guiding the collaborative effort between not only command directorates, but local organizations through a Partnership Intermediary Agreement to develop a robotic process automation implementation plan to increase productivity and efficiency throughout the command using bots.

By collaborating with Deloitte Development LLC to provide technological expertise, and the Cyber Innovation Center to support the program assessment guidance, ST ensured an effective technology plan would be in place for the implementation of robotic process automation development.

Maj. Ryan Chapman, technology advisor to AFGSC Chief Scientist, said the program is designed to do menial tasks such as data analysis for organizations and increase accuracy in operations by having an automated system in place to process tedious duties, allowing Airmen to complete higher-level tasks that require critical thinking.

"The bot can be used in any

organizational system that requires repetitive or menial tasks," Chapman said. "We all may have that part of our job that requires us to copy and paste data or information from one website, Excel sheet, or PowerPoint slide, to another, but bots can automate these steps, allowing us to all focus on higher-level work and Airmen

fresh out of tech school will be able to perform the higher-level tasks they were trained for."

The operation and assessment of this program is being led by AFGSC's Directorate of Operations and Communications, also known as A3/6. Using nine automatable processes provided by A3/6 as candidates, the robotic process automation is tracked by Deloitte Development LLC, to evaluate how much money and time would be saved by the program's implementation. This evaluation will support A3/6 with narrowing the candidate processes down to three for the next step of the trial phase.

Keith Tonnies, Deputy Chief of Current Operations at A3/6, said robotic process automation may be used to support a variety of organizations, including personnel, supply and logistics, to enhance the credibility of processed information. He also said the program will save the command money by reducing the amount of time members must focus on menial tasks, while allowing for more organizational duties to be completed in less time.

"It can be repetitive work that takes time to do, especially when you're double-checking and ensuring you haven't made a mistake," Tonnies said. "You want to ensure the data you've pulled is correct, but with the RPA [robotic process automation] it's automated, so there's no mistake."

The final selected robotic process automation programs are planned to be implemented first at A3/6 by early fall and later expanded to the rest of AFGSC.

"The process and coding should be scalable, developed for a single use case in a single shop, but ideally, it will be scaled from one small use case to all Air Force Global Strike Command bases," Chapman said.

This effort to provide efficient processes for AFGSC members and enhance production quality is a part of the goal of continuously promoting innovation and collaboration throughout the command.
