91st Missile Wing Change of Command

Under a cloudless blue sky, against the shield of the 91st Missile Wing positioned proudly on the headquarters building, with a backdrop of two BearCats and two missile maintenance vehicles, Col. Glenn Harris relinquished his command of the 91st MW to Col. Christopher Menuey. Presiding over the change of command was Maj. Gen. Michael J. Lutton, 20th Air Force commander.

Once the command party were ushered into place, Senior Master Sergeant Timothy Herrman assigned to the 891st Missile Security Forces Squadron, began the Change of Command ceremony by singing the National Anthem.

"You kept Airmen in the front of your mind at all times," Maj. General Michael Lutton said in his remarks to the crowd, "vour leadership during COVID 19 was exemplary."

Col. Harris was then presented the Legion of Merit by Maj. General Lutton.

In his final address as Commander of the 91st Missile

Wing, Col. Harris reviewed the exceptional partnerships established between Minot Air Force Base and the Minot community. "Civic leaders promoting Minot Air Force Base have brought the Barksdale Trophy to the community." Col. Harris also pointed out the partnership that exists between the 5th Bomb Wing and the 91st Missile Wing. "I know that the partnership between the Roughriders and the Warbirds will continue to remain strong."

In thanking his leadership

team, Col. Harris noted the team functioned "efficiently and effectively, taking my command to the next level. The 91st MW is always ready, always responsive, and innovative...standing ready to protect our country and our families."

The Harris family, including Col Harris' wife Dona and sons Justin & Jordan, are headed to Omaha where Col. Harris has accepted a position with United States Strategic Command. (USSTRATCOM)













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Northern Sentry Historical Journals soon to be at MAFB Library

NORTHERN SENTRY

The first 44 of nearly 60 books containing historical copies of the Northern Sentry and its predecessor The Northern Star, were delivered to the Minot Air Force Base Library.

"I was so pleased when Julie Reiten, Supervisory Librarian at the Minot Air Force Base Library, accepted our offer to keep the bound copies in the base library on a permanent loan" shared Ted Bolton, "as the owner and publisher of the Northern Sentry , it seemed right to me, that this 47 year, week by week history of life on Minot Air Force Base should be easily available to those who serve here today.'

The rest of the books are in Garrison at BHG Publishers and will be transferred to Minot AFB within the next 30 days. BHG, The Minot Daily News, and now BAG LLC have all published a paper at Minot Air Force Base under the Northern Sentry and other banners like the Northern Star which was the name of the paper in the 80's and 90's.


According to Reiten "Historical newspapers provide glimpses of the smaller human stories that often are passed over in written histories. They're also a great resource for the Library. We handle informal historical questions, and we have done a few history-based programs with some help from the wing history offices including the Minot AFB History Geo-Scavenger Hunt which is running currently through August 15.

The editions vary in size, but in one spot the are a very accurate and chronological record of the Minot AFB.

"Thousands of Airmen and their families have passed through the gates over the last 47 years, and much of who they were and what they did was captured in the pages of the paper" relates Bolton

"At the Library, the books are easily accessible for those who would like to do their own research or would like to browse through them" says Reiten.



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

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Department of the Air Force introduces Arctic Strategy

WASHINGTON (AFNS) --

Secretary of the Air Force the Barbara Barrett unveiled the new, comprehensive Department of the Air Force Arctic Strategy,

The strategy outlines the Department's unique regional role and efforts to optimize Air and Space Force capabilities throughout the region in support of the National Defense

"The Arctic is among the most strategically significant regions of the world today – the keystone from which the U.S. Air and Space Forces exercise vigilance," Barrett said. "This Arctic Strategy recognizes immense geostrategic consequence of the region and its critical role for protecting the homeland and projecting global power."

The strategy outlines four coordinated lines of effort that Air and Space Forces will use to enhance vigilance, reach and power to the nation's wholeof-government approach in the Arctic region:

- Vigilance in all domains
- Projecting power through a combat-credible force
- Cooperation with allies and partners
- Preparation for Arctic operations

Vigilance in all domains: The number one Department of Defense priority is homeland defense. Air and Space Forces contribute to this priority by monitoring potential threats across all warfighting domains, including air, space and cyberspace.

When it comes to the Arctic, U.S. Air and Space Forces are responsible for the majority of Department of Defense missions

the region, including regional architecture for detecting, tracking, and engaging air and missile threats. Space Professionals in the region are responsible for critical nodes of the satellite control network that deliver space capabilities to joint and coalition partners, as well as the U.S. national command authority.

"Integrating space capabilities into joint operations fuels the joint force's ability to project power anywhere on the planet, any time," said Chief of Space Operations Gen. Jay Raymond. "The Arctic is no different. Spacepower is essential to Arctic operations, allowing us to see with clarity, navigate with accuracy, and communicate across vast distances."

Projecting power through combat-credible force: Protecting America's interests in the homeland and abroad entails more than a vigilant defensive posture. Joint Base Elmendorf-Richardson Eielson Air Force Base, Alaska. present combat capability with fifth-generation fighters as well as mobility and refueling aircraft. The Air Force provides the capability to reach remote

northern locations via the New York Air National Guard's 109th Airlift Wing which operates skiequipped LC-130s that can land

"Our unique positioning in locations like Alaska, Canada and Greenland are integrated with multi-domain combat power," said Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. David L. Goldfein. "These locations harness powerful capabilities, and their unwavering vigilance to protecting the homeland represents a strategic benefit that extends well beyond the region itself."

Cooperation with allies and partners: Alliances and partnerships are key in the Arctic, where no one nation has sufficient infrastructure or capacity to operate alone. Interoperability is especially critical in the Arctic due to the terrains, limited access, and low density of domain awareness assets. Many regional allies and partners have dedicated

decades of focus to the Arctic, developing concepts, tactics and techniques from which the joint force can greatly benefit. Indigenous communities possess millennia of knowledge about the Arctic domain passed down through generations. Working with indigenous communities helps Air and Space Forces understand the Arctic environment, enriches training and exercises, and ensures recognition of their contributions to Department of the Air Force activities.

"Strong relationships with regional allies and partners, including at the local level, are a key strategic advantage for the U.S. in the Arctic," Barrett said. "U.S. Air and Space Forces are focused on expanding interoperability with peers that value peaceful access in the region, and we appreciate our local hosts that have welcomed Department of the Air Force installations, Airmen and Space Professionals as part of their

communities for decades."

Preparation for The operations: Arctic's austerity requires specialized training and acclimation by both personnel and materiel. The ability to survive and operate in extreme cold weather is imperative for contingency response or combat power generation.

"Spanning the first airplane flights in Alaska in 1913 to today's fifth-generation aircraft and sophisticated space monitoring systems operating in the region, the Arctic has consistently remained a location of strategic importance to the United States," Barrett said. "While the often harsh weather and terrain there call for appropriate preparations and training, Airmen and Space Professionals remain ready to bring the nation's Arctic air and space assets to bear to support the National Defense Strategy and protect the U.S. homeland.

- Any student who did not receive a physical during the 2019-20 school year will need to have an updated physical exam to participate in activities.
- All incoming 7th grade students will need to have new physical exams regardless of whether they received a physical during 2019-20 school year.

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AFSFC launches software to monitor health of military working dogs

JOINT BASE SAN ANTONIO-LACKLAND, Texas (AFNS) --

The Air Force Security Forces Center at Joint Base San Antonio-Lackland officially launched the Kennel Health Assessment 2.0 project July 8. The purpose of KHA 2.0 is to ascertain the holistic state of all of the kennels across the Air Force to ensure the well-being of all military working dogs.

Master Sgt. Steven Kaun, Air Force MWD program manager started the project in 2018 as KHA 1.0. It had the basic bones of the current project, most importantly the need to track the status of each individual kennel, but because of competing priorities, KHA had to take a back seat. It was revived again when AFSFC and Air Staff leadership recognized the need for this information. In this second iteration, the project included a way to assign a grade to each kennel in the Air Force system.

"This is instrumental in our ability to communicate to senior leaders and key decision makers the data they need to make the most informed decisions when it comes to MWD readiness, health and its direct correlation to the MWD kennel facilities, which house these sensitive high value assets," said Tech. Sgt. Otho Nugent, Air Force MWD assistant program manager, who leads special project areas. "Currently there is nothing to capture the status of MWD kennels across the enterprise and we recognize this is a problem, so we have created a comprehensive solution and first ever product to get after the problem.'

The software will analyze four major focus areas administrative offices, kennel facilities, support areas and veterinary support. It will also analyze 10 sub-focus areas and 32 graded areas. These parameters will be used to categorize and advocate for enhancements and renovations to properly support more than \$116 million in MWD assets.

team developed a custom workbook to collect all of this data. Responses were

solicited from 74 field units at permanent Air Force bases and the information gathered will be compiled into a dashboard showing both individual and holistic kennel health across the Air Force. The team estimates the information can be presented within 30-60 days to senior leaders and key decision makers so that next steps can be taken to make any improvements where necessary.

"With the proper support and funding this product can be captured, updated and displayed in a web-controlled database

allowing for live and analyzed data," Nugent said. "Funding for this directly correlates to Air Force MWD health, safety, quality of life and overall readiness."

The product will be available for security forces decision makers through a secured web platform and that will allow leaders to utilize the data to invest in their home station kennels to ensure that they are in compliance with the requirements for facility care and maintenance. This is incredibly important for Air Force mission readiness.

"Most wouldn't think that a kennel facility would have anything to do with readiness; however, this is inaccurate," Nugent said. "MWDs are required to be housed in these facilities, and if these conditions are poor then the health of the MWDs housed within them will diminish. Ensuring our most valuable assets — people and MWDs — have the ability to perform what they have been tasked and trained to do is at the heart of readiness. It is our job as an Air Force to provide these basic foundational needs for our K-9s to ensure they can perform to their max potential at a moment's notice."

Kennels must be up to standard on sanitation and preventive health measures, including food quality, waste disposal, insect and rodent control, water supply, vaccinations, training of personnel, safety measures and additional areas.

To effectively track this vital information, AFSFC plans to improve on KHA 2.0 and launch a more organized and professional database application that will contain the information collected and allow owners/ users in the field to update the information as needed. Funding an owner/user compatible database would allow the Air Force to control and monitor the information through contractual agreements, business rules and more.

"In order to maintain MWDs we have in inventory and to continue to enlist MWDs into the Air Force in accordance with our

regulations, we need to invest our time, money, and efforts into our kennel facilities," Nugent said. "MWDs are not seen as equipment but as sensitive, high

value assets that require training, love and attention to operate at Olympic levels by skilled handlers.





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Federal Employee Viewpoint Survey helps civilians voice their opinions

ARLINGTON, Va. (AFNS) --Federal Employee Viewpoint Survey will be available for Air Force civilian employees starting July 15.

The FEVS is a government-wide, Office of Personnel Management administered annual survey that Air Force civilian employees have been participating in since 2006. The approximately 100-question survey takes 20-to-30 minutes to complete and is anonymous. The survey includes questions about employees' work-life, job and organizational satisfaction, commitment, engagement, performance management and communication. It measures employee perceptions of whether their organization is successful.

Permanent, non-seasonal full and part-time civilian employees onboard as of October 2019 are eligible to participate and will receive a link for the survey via

an email from OPM. The survey invitation and OPM reminder emails will come from 'EVAF@ OPM.gov' between 15 July and 26 August.

In an effort to understand how the COVID-19 pandemic has affected the federal workforce, this year's survey will be a census including questions designed to gather information about how employees have worked together, used tools, received communications, maintained health and safety, employed work/life flexibilities, and more.

"Feedback through the FEVS provides insight into what our civilian Airmen think we're doing right and where we need to improve," said Lt. Gen. Brian Kelly, Manpower, Personnel and Services, deputy chief of staff. "The more people participate, the better sense we get for how to improve ourselves, our organizations and

our Department.'

highlighted Kelly three objectives for this year's upcoming Federal Employee Viewpoint Survey:

a. Increase survey participation b. Increase communication and feedback between leaders and employees on their concerns

c. Understand the Air Force in comparison to other Departments within the Federal Government

"The 2020 FEVS provides an opportunity to further strengthen communications and understanding between Air Force leadership and our civilian employees," Kelly said. "We are eager to hear what our civilian Airmen have to say.'



OCP rank insignia, badges, name, and service tapes will now feature a lighter, three-color background pattern, versus the current seven-color pattern, to

Air and Space Professionals increase readability and ease rank recognition.

"We received significant feedback that prompted this update," said Lisa Truesdale, Air Force military force management policy deputy director. "The current rank insignia, badges, name, and service tapes on the

OCP uniform are sometimes challenging to see against a seven-color background. Simplifying these features on a lighter, three-color pattern while not compromising the overall functionality of the uniform—will improve our situational awareness in day-today interactions.'

The Air Force name and service tapes will retain their current spice brown letter stitching,

while Space Force versions will still feature space blue stitching. Stitching for the Air Force rank insignia and badges will remain spice brown.

The Army and Air Force Exchange Service has already begun to transition inventories to the new three-color pattern name and service tapes. The Defense Logistics Agency is placing orders for the three-color pattern as seven-color backgrounds are phased out; some of the threecolor insignia name tags should be in the inventory by Nov. 2020.

The U.S. Air Force Academy implemented the uniform change for the June 2020 class and Basic Military Training is on target for Oct. 2020.

The current seven-color background rank insignia, badges, name and service tapes are and will remain, authorized



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


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
