

# 91st Missile Wing Change of Command

MINOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. --

Col Christopher Menuey assumed command of the 91st Missile Wing from Col Glenn Harris during a change of command ceremony on July 28, 2020 at Minot Air Force Base, North Dakota.

The ceremony was performed at the 91st Missile Wing Headquarters remotely, with minimal in-person attendance, to adhere to existing social distancing guidelines.

Those in attendance included families of both commanders and members of Team Minot.

Menuey comes to the 91st Missile Wing here, from the 341st Missile Wing, Malmstrom Air Force Base, Montana, where he served as the commander of the 341st Operations Group.

"Together as a team there's nothing that we can't achieve," Menuey said. "We will successfully accomplish our mission, we will take care of each other, we will develop others as leaders, we will have fun together and we will help each other to achieve our best."

Menuey has served in many strategic nuclear positions, including ICBM operational flight test, joint staff, current nuclear operations, and nuclear squadron and group command. Menuey's expertise and competence will bolster the

readiness of the 91st Missile Wing Rough Riders. He will be responsible for operations involving the wing's 1,800 Airmen and civilians in support of Minot AFB's Minuteman III intercontinental ballistic missiles.

"Colonel Christopher Menuey is a spectacular officer with a wealth of operations and leadership experience," 20th Air Force commander, Maj Gen Michael Lutton said, "I'm proud to welcome him to the Twentieth Air Force command team."

Menuey expressed his appreciation of taking charge of the Rough Riders.

"This really feels like a reunion, I feel very fortunate to catch up with so many former classmates and friends. It makes this assignment all the more amazing and I look forward to serving the Airmen and families of Team Minot," Menuey said.

Before relinquishing command, Harris shared his gratitude to Team Minot and the local community during his time as the 91st Missile Wing commander.

"No other community compares to the relationship we have here. Having spent close to 7 years of my time here it is awesome to see what Minot has become and will continue to become as we go forward," Harris said.

Harris' next assignment will be Executive Assistant to the commander of United States Strategic Command, Admiral Charles A Richard.



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## Air Force modifies funding for credentialing program

WASHINGTON (AFNS) Department of the Air Force officials recently announced changes to the Air Force Credentialing Opportunities Online, or AF COOL, program.

Air and Space professionals will continue to receive funding for approved credentials, though funding for preparatory classes, boot camps and coursework has been removed.

"The AF COOL program is a very popular program among our enlisted force," said Hildegard Buan, Air Force chief of Voluntary Education. "We wanted to keep this program open for our enlisted members, and in order to do so we had to make some tough decisions on policy changes. The money saved through these adjustments will ensure we can continue to offer more Airmen and Space Professionals the opportunities to earn credentials."

The AF COOL program provides opportunities for enlisted members of the Air Force and Space Force to earn industry recognized professional certifications and licenses to enhance an individual's active duty specialty, and to help with transition preparations for the civilian job market following active-duty service. Under AF COOL, uniformed

members will receive funding for credentials associated with their primary Air Force specialty code, one credential related to an awarded academic degree, one credential unrelated to their primary AFSC, and a leadership and management credential for E-7s and above. Additionally, the program continues to provide funding for exams and study materials up to \$500 per credential goal.

"Boot camp expenditures increased to more than 50% of the program's budget," Buan said. "Unfortunately. these increased expenditures couldn't be sustained, and required us to review and adjust our policies."

Members can also use GI Bill benefits for preparatory courses if the courses meet Veterans Affairs

approval requirements.

Policy adjustments were effective as of July 14, and are outlined in the new Air Force Instruction 36-2670, "Total Force Development, and Air Force Guidance Memorandum 2020-01."

AFI 36-2670 provides:

Individuals are authorized AF COOL funding for the following:

- Credentials associated with an Airman's or Space Professional's primary Air Force specialty code.

- One credential related to an awarded academic degree (bachelor's degree or higher).

- One credential unrelated to the primary AFSC.

- One leadership and management credential for E-7s and above.

- Airmen and Space Professionals within 180 days of separation or retirement must self-fund their credential costs and will be reimbursed by the AF COOL program after proof of completion. This provision goes into effect Dec. 25.

- AF COOL funding will be recouped if individuals fail to provide proof of completion of the Air Forcefunded credential within 120 days. AFGM 2020-01 provides:

- Preparatory courses, boot camps and coursework will no longer be funded.

- The cost of books is limited to \$500 per credential goal.

Currently, more than 1,650 credentials have been approved for funding. According to program officials, individuals can maximize their AF COOL lifetime cap of \$4,500 and minimize their outof-pocket expenses by researching other resources to offset costs. Those resources include: AF E-learning, The Skillport Library and Skillsoft Bootcamp Calendar.

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# *Tinker units produce first 3D printed engine component*

Members of the Oklahoma City Air Logistics Complex, an Air Force Sustainment Center wing, have produced the first additively manufactured metal component successfully tested on a U.S. Air Force aircraft engine, a significant milestone for future sustainment of aircraft like the E-3 Airborne Warning and Control System and the B-52 Stratofortress.

The OC-ALC used additive manufacturing, also known as 3D printing, to create a component for the TF33-P103 engine, an innovation meant to save time and improve efficiency. A collaboration between the 76th Propulsion Maintenance Group, the Reverse Engineering and Critical Tooling Lab, and the Air Force Life Cycle Management Center Propulsion Sustainment Division produced a 3D printed anti-ice gasket. The gasket is a critical part of safe and efficient operation of the TF33 engine, which powers the E-3, the B-52 and the E-8 Joint Surveillance Target Attack Radar System.

"This accomplishment is truly a historical first," said Johnny Tsiao, AFLCMC propulsion structural competency lead. "This is a digitally designed and digitally engineered component that represents a substantial milestone in Air Force sustainment. Although it is a basic component, the technology our OC-ALC team has developed will help resolve supply chain issues and help bring further capacities to support the warfighter."

The project stemmed from a supply shortage of anti-ice gaskets. Historically, maintenance workers visually inspected and reused

INKER AIR FORCE BASE, Okla. the gasket component. Recently, OC-ALC personnel noticed that the published guidance directed maintenance personnel to discard the gaskets, significantly increasing demand for the component and subsequently causing a supply shortage.

> "One of the things we found in this collaboration is that we could potentially solve the supply shortage by reengineering and printing something and prove it was safe to fly," said Richard Banks, 76th PMXG delegated engineering authority engineer. "This type of engineering makes it easier to source materials, greatly reduces lead time and ultimately helps to reduce logistical and supply issues."

> So far, the REACT lab has digitally engineered and printed 30 anti-ice gaskets. Members of the 76th PMXG performed a successful engine acceptance test run earlier this month. Compared to the original component sourcing method, the new anti-ice gasket manufacturing process reduces administrative lead time ----the

amount of time between an initial contract and actual component manufacture— from 120-136 days to 14-21 days.

OC-ALC engineers say they are optimistic about the future of 3D printing and its use in improving the Air Force sustainment process.

"We've implemented a crawl, walk and run approach when it comes to additive manufacturing," Tsiao said. "We haven't had a 3D printed metal component in Air Force engines before, but in the next 12-24 months, this technology will open the door to more complex and critical components that help to improve our sustainment efforts moving forward."

Air Force Materiel Command continues to encourage Airmen to be innovative and find new ways to streamline processes and save resources. ### Immigration Law

As military members are often deployed overseas, they sometimes find the love of their lives in foreign countries, posing a challenge when it is time to return stateside. While engagements and marriages are always happy occasions, if your new spouse or spouse-to-be is a foreign national, the event can be a bit more complicated.

In order to legally enter the country, your foreign national fiancé(e)/ spouse will likely need a visa.

You can apply for a fiancé(e) visa (K-1) if your loved one is overseas, and you want to marry in the United States. This visa allows your fiancé(e) to enter the United States for 90 days so that your marriage ceremony can take place in the United States. Once you marry, your spouse can apply for permanent residence and remain in the United States while the application is processed.

An alternative is to marry overseas and petition for your spouse to enter the United States on the IR1 or CR1 visa and then apply for him or her to become a Permanent Resident. Each visa requires a petition and detailed process with various supporting documentation and interviews.

Once your loved one is legally in the country with the appropriate visa, after marriage, you will also have to apply for their permanent residency. This is what is popularly referred to as the Green Card. The Green Card is very important for your foreign national spouse, allowing them to live and work in the United States permanently. As is the case with visas, the process of applying for permanent residency is detailed and requires completion of many forms and providing a great deal of documentation.

Immigration matters are challenging and stressful-particularly so when it involves your spouse. 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# Goldfein honored for service as Chief of Staff

WASHINGTON (AFNS) --With only days remaining in his service as the Air Force's 21st Chief of Staff, Gen. David L. Goldfein was commemorated in a July 31 ceremony at Joint Base Anacostia-Bolling, Washington, D.C., and in the announcement that one of his quotes was etched into the Air Force Memorial's Wall of Valor.

The memorial's newest etching reads, "This is our sacred duty. When protecting Soldiers, Sailors, Airmen and Marines, we fly to the sound of the guns ... or we die trying."

"General Goldfein's outsized impact goes beyond his achievements in aircraft development, new technologies, launch of the United States Space Force, or even revolutionary concepts like joint all-domain

command and control," said Secretary of the Air Force Barbara Barrett who presided over the ceremony. "His greater legacy is in the thousands of men and women he has led, mentored and inspired."

In his remarks to an audience that included Air Force Vice Chief of Staff, Gen. Stephen Wilson; Chief of Space Operations, Gen. John Raymond, and a collection of other, socially distanced dignitaries, Goldfein acknowledged his good fortune and gave thanks to his wife, Dawn, for "her caring and loving heart," and to others who helped him succeed.

"What an incredible honor to have an important declaration of obligation to our joint teammates forever engraved in the beautiful Air Force Memorial," he said.

"Dawn and I are thankful to have served with all of you together as Team 21.

"Dawn has not only been my best friend, she has been my teammate," Goldfein said. "Last week we gathered for a zoom session with our old combat squadron and the story of the shoot down and rescue was retold -- it was Dawn's courage and how she handled herself that truly inspired the squadron, so how appropriate that today Air University published her extraordinary book, sharing a military spouse's perspective. Dawn, more than anyone in my life, has given me a decided advantage."

During his tenure, Goldfein has achieved some notable milestones, including the development of the

B-21 Raider and the T-7A Red Hawk aircraft. Additionally, he pushed for innovative ways to improve readiness through the expansion of the Air Force's multi-domain capability, reshaping the force to exist in an era of great power competition, and helping pave the way for ultimately increasing the number of squadrons from 312 to 386.

"For 37 years I have gotten up every morning, put on the uniform of my father," he said. "Every day I am given the opportunity to work with the finest men and women on the planet, devoted to the same common cause and all focused on the same sacred duty."

Friday's ceremony was one of the first of events celebrating Goldfein's 4-year tenure as the Air Force's highest-ranking

military officer. He formally steps down Aug. 6 and will be replaced by Gen. Charles (CQ) Brown, who will become the 22nd Air Force Chief of Staff.

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# **Department of the Air** Force stands up Task Force to combat interpersonal violence

#### SECRETARY OF THE AIR FORCE PUBLIC AFFAIRS

WASHINGTON (AFNS) --

The Department of the Air Force launched a task force to address concerns regarding interpersonal violence among service members.

Secretary of the Air Force Barbara Barrett appointed Brig. Gen. April Vogel, the director for manpower, personnel, recruiting and services at the National Guard Bureau, to lead the task force, which will support members of the Air Force and Space Force.

"Interpersonal violence describes a wide spectrum of behaviors ranging from stalking and bullying to sexual assault, abuse and domestic violence," Vogel said. "We know these types of violence exist in our communities and we are working hard to prevent them from happening. But recognizing prevention is not yet foolproof, we must ensure our Airmen and Space Professionals feel protected and have the resources and leadership necessary to keep them safe.

As Vogel stands up the task force, her initial focus will be developing a research-based plan of action that leverages existing data on violence among and against Airmen and Space Professionals.

In support of the task force's efforts, the secretary of the Air Force and service chiefs, Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. David Goldfein and Chief of Space Operations Gen. John "Jav" Raymond, directed the staff to review past cases involving interpersonal violence

identify any themes or areas for improvement.

"We'll also be asking our service members for their input to help shape our task force's efforts," Vogel said. "We know our Airmen and Space Professionals in the squadrons, particularly our young members, are the ones most affected by interpersonal violence. We need to hear their stories."

In a memo to the force, senior leaders from the Department denounced interpersonal violence and urged affected service members to ask for assistance.

"Most importantly, if you are being threatened, harassed, stalked or bullied, please come forward and report it. As your leaders, we condemn any type of interpersonal violence in our force, and we will not tolerate it," the memo states. "If you feel uncomfortable reaching out to your commander or first sergeant, please reach out to another leader, mentor or person you trust ... You have options, and you do not have to do this alone."


Helping resources include the equal opportunity office, the chaplain, the inspector general, judge advocate office, family advocacy, violence prevention integrator and sexual assault response coordinator.

The task force will ultimately be developing recommendations for senior leadership review focused improving on Department policies, processes and actions in this area.

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# **Unarmed Minuteman III Test Launch**

BARKSDALE AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. --

A joint team of Air Force Global Strike Command Airmen and Navy sailors launched an unarmed Minuteman III intercontinental ballistic missile equipped with three test reentry vehicles from aboard the Airborne Launch Control System at 12:21 a.m. Pacific Time Aug. 4 from Vandenberg Air Force Base, California.

The test demonstrates that the United States' nuclear deterrent is safe, secure, reliable and effective to deter twenty-first century threats and reassure our allies. Test launches are not a response or reaction to world events or regional tensions.

Airmen from the 625th Strategic Operations Squadron out of Offutt Air Force Base, Nebraska, were aboard the U.S. Navy E-6 aircraft to demonstrate the reliability and effectiveness of the ALCS system.

The ICBM's three reentry vehicles traveled approximately 4,200 miles to the Kwajalein Atoll in the Marshall Islands. These test launches verify the accuracy and reliability of the ICBM weapon system, providing valuable data to ensure a continued safe, secure and effective nuclear deterrent. "The flight test program

demonstrates one part of the operational capability of the ICBM weapon system," said Col. Omar Colbert, 576th Flight Test Squadron commander. "The Minuteman III is 50 years old, and continued test launches are essential in ensuring its reliability until the 2030s when the Ground Base

Strategic Deterrent is fully in place. Most importantly, this visible message of national security serves to assure our allies and dissuade potential aggressors."

The test launch is a culmination of months of preparation that involve multiple government partners. The Airmen who perform this vital mission are the most skillfully trained the nation has to offer.

Airmen from the 90th Missile Wing were selected to support the test launch. However, due to current COVID-19 travel restrictions, crewmembers from the 576 FLTS supported the launch with alert crews and an operational crew for the night of the launch. This demonstrates that even during the pandemic, Air Force Global Strike Command maintains various levels of redundant capability to assure a national deterrent.

"Our team of incredible 90th Maintenance Group professionals have done an amazing job," said Lt. Col. Joseph Edington, Task Force commander. "However, this is a joint effort, I'm extremely impressed of Vandenberg Air Force Base, the 576th Flight Test Squadron and all associated partner's hard work and dedication preparing our missile for the testing and monitoring needed prior to test execution. The attention given to every task accomplished here reflects the precision and professionalism we bring every day in our missile field to ensure our nation's nuclear

deterrence."



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# Air Force releases Support of Military Families community assessment results

The Department of the Air Force released the results of its recent community assessments on support of military families, giving communities an idea of how they can better support Airmen and families.

"The communities surrounding our AFGSC bases have already done a tremendous amount of work to get professional licensure legislation passed in their states," said Gen. Tim Ray, AFGSC Commander. "They have pushed for things like school of choice, a charter school at one base, and interstate compacts allowing easier transfer of school credits for high school students into local school systems."

In addition, Ray said one community pushed to build a Child Development Center just off base, and another worked to provide funds to improve their base library. The community assessments are meant to serve as a tool for even further improvement.

This is а opportunity for communities and bases to work together and build on recent successes," Ray said. "Airmen and family retention are competitive advantages for our command."

The Department of the Air Force will use the support of military family criteria to inform the strategic basing process this month. The intent with this initiative is to ensure locations where military members stationed are dedicated to advancing quality of life opportunities for Air and Space professionals and their families.

Professional licensure portability is critical to many military families, as spouses are often required to apply for a license in a new state in the same manner as a first-time applicant, the study found. Costs to transfer professional licenses for things like accounting, law, nursing, physical therapy, teaching and others to another state are often high. In many cases, waiting periods and adjudication are also required, which translates into tremendous lost wages. Legislation to make

those license transfers easier can help.

"The communities in AFGSC have been hitting this area hard for the last few years, and I'm extremely proud of how far we've come," Ray said. "However, there are still areas that can be improved."

In looking at education, the assessments took a full-spectrum approach, including things like academic performance, school climate, and service offerings.

"Educational options and opportunities in some areas are key decision factors for some of our service members on whether they stay in the Air Force or decide to separate," said Chief Master Sgt. Charles Hoffman, AFGSC Command Chief Master Sergeant. "Our military children deserve the best quality education no matter where their parents are stationed, and we hope the communities surrounding our AFGSC bases will do everything they can to make sure that quality education is available."

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# Verendrye and Enerbase hold ribbon cutting for fast car charger

The ribbon cutting took place in Minot at the Enerbase Travel Plaza at 4750 Hwy. 83 North.

The event included a demonstration of how the charger works. The Lignite Energy Council also had their Tesla Model X on display.

The charger is made by Chargepoint and has an output said Tom Rafferty, Verendrye's

charge a car to 80% in as little as 30 minutes depending on the type of car. Enerbase and Verendrye received approval for a grant from the North Dakota Department of Environmental Quality to pay for 80 percent of the cost of the project. The estimated cost is \$72,000.

"Being on the north side of town, this charging station is in an ideal location for airmen and civilians working on the base,"

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




