

Physio Moments: A Step Toward Great Movement

Warbirds, welcome to another physio moment! Over the next few installments of Physio Moments I want to walk you through a game changing way of how to look at your body and identify areas that may need some extra attention and work. Before taking on physically demanding tasks and challenging training programs we must first possess the ability to move well before we move often, and this is what we are going to dive into. I have never claimed to be the smartest therapist out there and a lot of times I try and look for concepts that are simple, concepts that I can wrap my ahead around easily and ultimately improve how I look at my patients and treat them. One concept that has been a game changer in my approach to the body is called the Joint by Joint approach. Dr. Gray Cook from Functional Movement Systems developed this concept and once I learned about it I put

it into practice immediately. The basic premise of the joint by joint approach is that our joints in our body have 2 different primary tasks of being either a predominantly mobile joint or stable joint. Some of our joints need to be mobile and move well, where as other joints need to be more stable and effective at controlling movement. For these next few

issues of physio moments we are going to focus on the main joints in the body whose primary task is mobility. Mobility will always trump strength and stability, if you cannot move well then why would I increase your volume of movement or load up movement patterns that are hindered from a lack of mobility? If I did, I am

just placing you at an increased risk for injury which is the exact opposite of what I am trying to

My goal is to build resilient bodies that move well so that they can load up and move often. Through this we can work to mitigate injuries and pains caused from poor movement


quality and strategies.

My hope over these next few physio moments is to help you identify areas of your body that are not moving as well as they should and then providing some easy simple exercises you can perform at home to start improving upon your restrictions.

We are going to start from the floor up and kick things off in the next issue with the ankle so stay tuned and as always,

Avoiding Probate

Probate is the legal process by which an individual's assets are distributed following their passing. This distribution may be in accordance with an individual's Last Will and Testament, if they had one, or according to state law if they did not. However, the probate process is often time consuming

- 2. Beneficiaries: List beneficiaries on all of your financial accounts and life insurances, double checking them often for accuracy. Anything with a listed beneficiary or "payable on death" designation will not need to be probated.
- 3. Life Estate or Transfer on Death Deeds: Real property and mineral interests can be transferred to your heirs before your death while retaining an interest for you during your lifetime, using life estate or transfer on death deeds.
 - A life estate deed allows you to transfer property while reserving an interest during your lifetime or during the lifetime of someone else. Once the person who holds the life estate passes away, the Grantee fully owns the property. With a life estate deed, both the Grantor and the Grantee own an interest in the property as soon as the deed is signed. Because of this, a life estate deed is irrevocable-meaning, it cannot be revoked unless all parties agree.
 - · A transfer on death deed allows you to retain full ownership during your lifetime and conveys your full interest to the Grantee upon your death. During your lifetime, the Grantee has no interest in the property. The main advantage of the transfer on death deed is that it is very flexible—it can be revoked at any time unlike the life estate deed

50th Anniversary

First Minuteman III placed on alert at Minot

HILL AIR FORCE BASE, Utah --On Aug. 19, 1970, the very first Minuteman III intercontinental ballistic missile, known as ICBM, was placed on alert status at the 741st Strategic Missile Squadron, Minot AFB, North Dakota. The missile was emplaced in Launch Facility Hotel-02, just two months prior to its launch.

The ICBMs got their start in 1951 with Project Atlas which were later replaced with the Titan I and II missiles. The Minuteman missile development began in 1962 as a replacement to the Titan missile. The Minuteman missile was the first solid-fueled ICBM ever deployed and this technology brought about a revolution in missile development.

Throughout history there have been four versions of the Minuteman, the IA, IB, II and III. The Multiple Independently targeted Reentry Vehicle (MIRV) Minuteman III missile replaced the single-warhead Minuteman I and II models across six bases in the heart of our nation's homeland. This transition started at Minot AFB in 1970 where the older missiles were taken out of the silos as part of a larger modification program to convert the 91st Strategic Missile Wing to the first Minuteman III wing in the nation.

The new Minuteman III represented the ultimate ICBM capability available in the field of ballistic war missiles at the time. The Minot Daily News described the Minuteman III as, "standing 59 feet and 3 inches in height, weighs 76,000 pounds and can travel at a speed in excess of

15,000 miles per hour. Should the 'balloon go up' and the nation be forced to defend itself in an all-out nuclear conflict, the buried Minot missiles could be unleashed and be on their way to targets within a half-minute interval."

The Minuteman III ICBM still stands as the backbone of our nation's nuclear deterrence. These missiles are the most responsive leg of the nuclear triad, always ready and can be launched within minutes.

When it was deployed in 1970 it only had a planned ten-year service life, but through a series of much needed life extension programs, the Minuteman III has remained viable for fifty years and is expected to remain in service until the 2030s, when it will be replaced by the Ground Based Strategic Deterrent weapon system currently under

development at Hill AFB. This makes the Minuteman III the oldest deployed strategic ballistic missile in the world.

The Minuteman weapon system is operated by and under the control of Air Force Global Strike Command, but is supported by the Air Force Nuclear Weapons Center's Minuteman III System Program Office and the AIr Force Sustainment Center's 309th Missile Maintenance Group and 748th Supply Chain Management Group at Hill AFB.

Here is a list of significant Minuteman III events that took place fifty years ago:

Date Historical Significance

Jan. 12, 1970 91st Strategic Missile Wing at Minot AFB, North

Dakota, began converting its ICBM facilities from Minuteman I to Minuteman III.

March 3, 1970 Firstoperational Minuteman III was completed at Air Force Plant 77, Ogden, Utah.

April 14, 1970 F i r s t Minuteman III missile accepted by the 91st Strategic Missile

April 17, 1970 F i r s t Minuteman III missile emplaced in Silo LF H-02 at 741st Strategic Missile Squadron at Minot AFB.

Aug. 19, 1970 F i r s t Minuteman III placed on alert status at 741st Strategic Missile

Sept. 16, 1970 Successful Minuteman III launch from Cape Kennedy, Florida, as part of the Special Test Missile Project, a post-research and development (R&D) effort to evaluate the Minuteman III's performance and accuracy.

Dec, 2, 1970 Successful Minuteman III launch from Cape Kennedy as part of the Special Test Missile Project.

Dec. 14, 1970 Last unarmed Minuteman III, now named "LGM-30G," was launched from Cape Canaveral, Florida (formerly Cape Kennedy).


Dec. 29, 1970 741st Strategic Missile Squadron became the first operational Minuteman III squadron.

Dec. 31, 1970 F o r c e modernization and emplacement completed at Minot AFB.





Air Force announces **GBSD** locations at three existing missile bases

AIR FORCE GLOBAL STRIKE COMMAND PUBLIC AFFAIRS

BARKSDALE AFB, La. --

The Air Force plans to begin military construction activities as early as 2023 at F.E. Warren AFB, Wyoming, as it moves forward in the process of replacing the aging Minuteman III ICBMs with the Ground Based Strategic Deterrent.

Malmstrom AFB, Montana, will be the second installation to begin military construction activities in 2026, with Minot AFB, North Dakota, beginning in 2029. The construction start dates are pending the completion of Environmental Impact Statements for each base in accordance with Federal laws and policies.

Military construction is phased ahead of the actual deployment of GBSD to allow time for initial beddown, ensure facilities are ready for any unique mission equipment, and support training and operational certification prior to the first sites obtaining operational status at each wing.

Using infrastructure at current locations allows both the Minuteman III and GBSD weapons systems to continue

meeting all nuclear surety and safety standards throughout their operational lives, particularly during the transition period.

"Ensuring missile bases remain missile bases makes the most sense for the taxpayer and the mission," said Gen. Tim Ray, commander of Air Force Global Strike Command. "The



Minuteman III is 50 years old; it's past time to upgrade the missile systems. Our goal is ensure our systems remain fully safe, secure and effective in the defense of our nation and allies."

GBSD is the most cost-effective option for maintaining a safe, secure and effective ICBM leg of the nuclear triad. The GBSD program's objective is to deliver a low technical risk, affordable, total system replacement, starting in the late 2020s, to improve the ICBM's capabilities and provide more efficient operations, maintenance, and security at lower lifecycle costs.

Air Force Global Strike Command is comprised of more than 33,700 Airmen and civilians assigned to two numbered air forces, 11 wings, two geographically-separated squadrons and one detachment in the continental United States, and deployed to locations around the globe. The command oversees two-thirds of the Nation's nuclear weapons including all bomber and Intercontinental Ballistic Missile operations for the U.S. Department of Defense. 5th LRS Airmen came up with the idea to modify a 463L Aircraft Pallet by attaching rollers in order to efficiently support multiple missions at Minot Air Force Base, North Dakota, the modification was readily adopted into their standards of operation.

Maj. Sarah McNair, 5th LRS commander, said the new pallets allowed the assets to be moved approximately 50-60 percent faster as well as reducing the amount of personnel needed on the K-loader and truck to unload the cargo by 50-60 percent as

"This idea is now being looked to be utilized by Air Mobility Command for many different applications of their mission sets and operations across the Air Force," said McNair. "It will also be likely used at other installations supporting the Department of Energy missions in ways we do here at Minot. McNair said their team is not only impacting the Air Force but the DOE as well."

Some of their cargo can typically weigh around 120 - 130 lbs. "As you can imagine, rolling cargo cans that weigh over a hundred pounds over gaps and floor dents, lifting up and down from one surface to another takes time and a lot of manpower to be done efficiently and safely.

McNair said they developed the idea to affix rollers to the top of the pallets, removing the D-rings along the sides of the pallet.

Normally the Air Force's aircraft pallets are a smooth surface to build and ship cargo

"Once the rollers were in place, they would no longer have to struggle to move the individual cargo pieces," said McNair.

Ťech. Sgt. Aaron Luetzen, 5th LRS air terminal operations NCO, said the sight of Airmen bearing the unsavory weather conditions for the sake of the mission was disheartening.

"I knew that there is absolutely a better way that business could be handled. It just took a little problem solving to redesign the current operations within the parameters that were in my control," said Luetzen.

After running it up through his chain of command, the idea was approved.

"We were able to modify these pallets with attaching rollers in order to efficiently change the way we can work missions," said Luetzen. "This is the first time these modified pallets have ever been used."

"It really goes to show that we as Airmen have a voice to make things happen if we can give our leaders valid answers and justification," Luetzen said.

McNair thought it was exciting to see how this unfolded from a simple idea to a working asset.

"To know that others are taking this idea and running with it in the Air Force to see how it can be used for so much more than just our one use [is exciting]," McNair said. "In this case, the response has been very positive with Luetzen being chosen to support this idea at the [Air Mobility Command] level."

"To be a part of something that could directly change how my career field operates in a magnitude of different mission types is great," said Luetzen. "I challenge others to take the step to bring their ideas to light, because it was a rather simple process once the ball started

Brown formally installed as 22nd Air Force Chief of Staff

JOINT BASE ANDREWS, Md. (AFNS) -- Proclaiming himself "proud, yet humbled," Gen. Charles Q. Brown, Jr. was officially installed Aug. 6 as the Air Force's 22nd Chief of Staff, becoming the first African American in history to lead a military service as its highest ranking officer.

In remarks following the formal "Change of Responsibility" ceremony in which he took over from retiring Gen. David L. Goldfein, the 21st Chief of Staff, Brown acknowledged an array of people who influenced his life. Among them were his wife, Sharene, and his parents, as well as a list of Air Force colleagues, including Goldfein and other "extraordinary leaders."

Yet, cognizant of the moment in history, Brown also noted, "Today is possible due to the perseverance of those who went before me serving as an inspiration to me and many others.

"Those like the Tuskegee Airmen, Benjamin O. Davis Jr., Chappie James, African American leaders across our Air Force and military, past and present, to include today's special guest, Ed Dwight, America's first African American astronaut candidate,"

"It is due to their trials and tribulations in breaking barriers that I can address you today as the Air Force Chief of Staff.'

Brown, who previously served as commander of Pacific Air Forces, was elevated to his new assignment during a solemn, socially distanced, 90-minute ceremony that focused on his achievements while also honoring Goldfein's 37-year service in the Air Force and his four years as chief of staff.

Among those paying tribute were Defense Secretary Mark Esper, Department of the Air Force Secretary Barbara Barrett, and Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff Gen. Mark A. Milley. The ceremony also honored Goldfein as Esper presented him with the Defense Distinguished Service

Esper honored Dawn Goldfein as well, presenting her with the Department of Defense Distinguished Public Service Award.

"Gen. Goldfein, Dave, our Airmen thrive in today's environment because of your strong leadership and your steadfast commitment to upholding the core values of the Air Force – integrity, service, and excellence, each and every day," Esper said. "The United States of America is safer because of you. Thank you for your lifetime of service to our great nation."

Moments later in remarks to the new Chief of Staff, Esper said, "In returning to the Pentagon, Gen. Brown brings with him more than 35 years of service distinguished by a depth of expertise and experience that makes him exceptionally qualified to be our nation's next Air Force Chief of

"I am confident you will take the Air Force to greater heights and I'm excited to watch you lead."

In her remarks, Barrett offered similar praise for Goldfein's service and accomplishments. Like others she expressed confidence that Brown has the correct mix of experience and temperament to lead the Air Force to a bright and dominant future.

Brown, she said, "brings a wealth of joint leadership experiences and global perspectives to his new role as 22nd chief of staff of the Air Force. Embodying the Air Force core values of integrity, service before self, and excellence in all we do, General Brown has the right character, experience, and perspective to lead the United States Air Force."

Like Goldfein and those who came before, Brown as chief of staff is responsible for ensuring the Air Force is trained, ready and equipped to accomplish any mission at any time.

Yet he's also taking the reins of an Air Force in transition, one moving from a decadeslong priority on combating and containing terrorism to a new era of Great Power Competition. As part of that new focus, the Air Force and entire U.S. military must be trained, ready and properly equipped to confront, deter and if necessary, defeat, challenges from Russia and China. It also comes

at a time of heightened challenges from North Korea and other geopolitical shifts across Asia.

In his remarks, Brown said he would work to build on Goldfein's accomplishments while also adding his own imprint to assure that the Air Force remains the most advanced, professional and lethal in the world.

"I am committed to addressing today's challenges while preparing for the future so we can better compete, deter, and win," he said, surrounded by an unmistakable lineage of historic aircraft, including a gleaming chromeplated P-51 Mustang, a fifthgeneration F-35 Lightning II and a HH-60G Pave Hawk helicopter.

"To do so, we must no longer defer, but must accelerate the needed change and tough choices we've often discussed. We must develop and empower leaders and provide the quality service and

quality of life where our Airmen and families can reach their full potential," he said.

Adding a dose of realism, Brown said, "No doubt there are challenges ahead that will be difficult, but not impossible. I look forward to working with the Joint Chiefs, providing our best military advice to address challenges the joint force faces today and will face in the future."

As he noted in March when he was nominated to be chief of staff, Brown said again that he will continue to be guided by what he described as his "four tenets" of leadership - execute at a high standard; be disciplined in execution; pay attention to the details; and have fun.

In his farewell remarks, Goldfein like Brown listed those who influenced and shaped his career. Among others, he singled out Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force Kaleth O. Wright, calling him his "wingman."

Staying safe and healthy all summer

As the summer months wind down, leadership at all levels advocate for the continued health and safety of our Airmen and Space Professionals on and off duty. The Air and Space Forces top five leaders continued the conversation with a recently released memorandum vigilance in encouraging combatting the threats of coronavirus and injury from preventable mishaps.

"Our priority remains the continued health and safety of your families and you," stated the memorandum. "This summer may be different in some ways, but with outdoor activities and travel resuming, along with permanent change of station moves and continued high operations tempo, we remain vulnerable to an increased risk of accidental injuries and exposure to coronavirus over the next few months."

The memo also emphasized that the practice of good hygiene, social distancing and other personal measures recommended by the Center for Disease Control and Prevention would help mitigate the health risks.

"This summer brought significant challenges which affect the health and welfare of us all on many levels, from onduty operations to our off-duty activities," said Maj. Gen. John T. Rauch Jr., Air Force chief of safety and commander of the Air Force Safety Center. "To that end, we cannot compromise the mission or safety as COVID-19 lingers, operations change, and life adjusts to our current situation."

"I encourage our Airmen and Space Professionals to remain intently focused on accomplishing the mission safely in spite of the many distractions. Use sound risk management and make smart decisions for you and all those around you, on and off duty, 'said Rauch.

Summer is typically a time spent enjoying outdoor activities like trips to the beach, family vacations, barbeques, and summer concerts. This year, many of these activities were not fully available, due to pandemic restrictions, leaving many searching for other ways to enjoy themselves.

Many bought pools for their backyards or proceeded to natural bodies of water to cool off. Some experienced nature from the seat of their bicycle going down a mountain. While others enjoyed the solitude of camping in the wilderness.

Every activity brings with it some risk, none of which should be taken lightly. Safety experts agree that recreational and home activities must be managed effectively to avert any potential dangers that could cause injuries or fatalities.

Over the past five years, 64 Airmen lost their lives to onand off-duty preventable mishaps during summer months. Last summer alone, Airmen suffered

842 mishaps that took them out of work for at least one day. Sports, recreation and individual fitness mishaps made up the majority with 308, followed by motor vehicles with 147.

"These fatal mishaps were preventable and unnecessary; they affected loved ones, friends, and co-workers," said Mike Ballard, chief of Air Force occupational safety. "It takes the commitment and discipline of our Air and Space Forces at all levels to ensure our most precious asset our people – is preserved."

"While navigating the final days of summer and the enduring pandemic, I urge everyone to keep their well-being as their goal in all activities, at work, home, and during recreational or travel activities," said Ballard.

Many of these mishaps involved contributing factors like poor planning, inexperience, lack of skill, risky behavior, and the consumption of alcohol.

The memo added, "When you plan for the unexpected, and use your risk management training protective equipment, you directly contribute to the readiness of the Air and Space Forces."
