SSGT. WILLIAM PATRICK **5AMXS WEAPONS SPECIALIST TEAM CHIEF**

SSgt. William Patrick is a weapons specialist team chief for the 5th Aircraft Maintenance Squadron. Before he joined the U.S. Air Force, he was a police officer in Prairie Grove, Arkansas where he is originally from. He moved here to become a part of Team Minot with his wife and three children. As a weapons specialist, Patrick loads B-52s with the various different payloads it is equipped to carry. Patrick and the three Airmen that he oversees have spent eight hours loading a full aircraft during the Prairie Vigilance exercise. As a team chief, he is his team's source for information. They will come to him for questions or guidance on anything pertaining to their weapons systems. Patrick will ultimately route all issues or concerns up to his weapons supervisors who can provide even further direction. All movements are coordinated with the 705th Munitions Squadron to ensure all Airmen are safe at all times. "Getting to see all of this first hand is humbling," says Patrick. "Everything is waiting on us. We make it happen."

Patrick says even though the daily grind can get old at times, he is always proud of what he does. His advice to Airmen at Team Minot is to never get jaded and always remember that every single Airman has an impact on



SRA JAVIER FRANCESCHI 5TH AIRCRAFT MAINTENANCE CREW CHIEF

SrA Javier Franceschi has been a member of Team Minot for about two years and is a 5th Aircraft Maintenance crew chief for the B-52H Stratofortress. Part of his job is to complete a series of final checks on the aircraft to ensure the safety of the aircrew before flight. Before the aircrew board the aircraft, Franceschi will brief them on recent work completed and any other information they may need to know prior to starting their mission. Additionally, he can prepare a B-52 for an emergency takeoff. To do this, he places small explosive charges called "start shots" behind the engines to cause an instantaneous startup. This allows for a much faster startup time compared to the slower start time of having the engines burn oxygen to startup."I've learned a lot about my job and a lot about the Air Force," says Franceschi. "I try not to get jaded. I really do love my job. Most importantly I love seeing the plane finally take off at the end of the day." Franceschi says he is particularly proud of how he and his crew performed during the Prairie Vigilance exercise. He says the aircraft can be unpredictable at times, so when things go well it puts their team at an advantage.



A1C AUDREY MOORE 5TH OPERATIONS SUPPORT SQUADRON WEATHER FORECASTER

A1C Audrey Moore is a weather forecaster for the 5th Operations Support Squadron weather operations flight and is new to Team Minot. Born into an Air Force family, she spent much of her time growing up at Hurlburt Field in Florida. Moore placed Minot Air Force Base as one of her top choices because she says she loves to experience new things. Moore's daily responsibilities include checking and tracking weather patterns around the base, which are used to draft weather advisories. She also writes a Terminal Aerodrome Forecast, or TAF, to predict weather changes 30 hours out. This can be as specific as listing accurate wind direction, as well as speed, a full day ahead of time. The information she provides is important to both B-52 and helicopter pilots at Minot so they can prepare for their missions and ensure safety of flight for their crew members. "You have to stay on top of it no matter what," says Moore. "No matter how good you are, the weather can always change." Half way through her 12 hour shift, she will create another TAF to update weather advisories. Additionally, Moore will take calls from aircrew members to keep them informed on cloud ceilings and freezing rain statuses. "Being confident is what makes anyone a good forecaster," says Moore.

Prairie Vigilance Exercise = Deterrence

"As Airmen stand guard for 12 hours, the wind chill is zero, and snow coming down, they have to wonder... why? Why are we doing this?" according to Maj Christopher Curtis, Director of Wing Plans and Exercises, Minot Air Force Base, North Dakota "I want them to know that anytime we execute a strategic readiness exercise, it gets a lot of attention. Their efforts get international attention, and the exercise is briefed all the way up to the President."

Prairie Vigilance is a Strategic Readiness Exercise. "B-52s are able to display our readiness as no other leg of the nuclear triad can. The B-52 and an exercise like Prairie Vigilance, give the President a credible tool to influence and shape foreign policy". Navy submarines and Air Force Intercontinental Ballistic Missiles (ICBMs) are always on alert. They make up the other two formidable legs of the Nuclear Triad but they are cannot be recalled once they are used. "The B-52 has the unique ability to takeoff, fly a mission, and make a very visible statement" Curtis said.

But an exercise like Prairie Vigilance is not easy to carry out. "We have over 1,500 Maintenance personnel, 500 Security Forces personnel, and 100 aircrew from two different bomb wings" explains Curtis. Both wings are working together day and night to carry out the exercise.

In addition to the 5th Bomb

Wing at Minot Air Force Base, there were B-52s, aircrews and numerous maintenance personnel from the 2nd Bomb base, Louisiana taking part in the exercise.

"It is a daunting task to execute a strategic readiness exercise with B-52s, but it shows our allies, and adversaries, that we are ready and that we are capable" according to Curtis "Prairie Vigilance may be an exercise but it has real world

expertise and dedication to the 5 BW mission was essential in planning this exercise".

The nearly 60-year-old B-52 will be the workhorse of the Air Force's bomber fleet another 30 years at least, reinvigorated with upgrades to boost its range, power, sensors, and bomb-carrying capacity. Once complete, Air Force Global Strike Command's improvements to its 76 B-52s will provide the equivalent of an extra 22 bombers' worth of weaponcarrying capacity.

The multitude of upgrades are already well underway and will continue into the late 2020s, providing aircraft built in the 1950s and '60s-the last B-52 was built in 1963—with modern engines and radars, new capability to carry more smart weapons internally, new communications and connectivity, and the ability to deliver the most advanced missiles in USAF's inventory. B-52s will also remain a key part of the American nuclear deterrent.

The changes are significant enough that the upgraded bombers could be redesignated from B-52H to "B-52H+" or "B-52J." A new radar will mean a new nose, perhaps without the electro-optical blisters on the radome made obsolete by wing-mounted Sniper or Litening targeting pods. The aircraft's twin-engined pods on the swept-wing bomber will also look different, and the five-person crew will likely be reduced to four.

The Air Force has already spent some \$1.4 billion in this round of B-52 upgrades and will invest another \$3.8 billion over the next five years—and considerably more in the years that follow. Specifics are not yet available.

said Maj. Gen. Andrew J. Gebara, director of strategic plans, programs, and requirements for Air Force Global Strike Command in a September Air Force Magazine interview. In addition to its upgrades, the B-52 will also be able to launch the Air Force's most advanced missiles, the new AGM-181 Long-Range Standoff (LRSO) nuclear cruise missile and the hypersonic AGM-183 Air-launched Rapid Response Weapon (ARRW).

Over-engineered from its inception, the B-52 airframes remain remarkably viable, with decades of structural service life remaining, Gebara said. Even with combat systems largely unchanged since the 1991 Gulf War, mission capable rates remain about 80 percent and the platform itself remains among the most versatile in the force, capable of firing standoff missiles, dropping gravity and precision-guided bombs, and laying mines.

In fact, the B-52 will long outlast the newer B-1 and B-2 bombers, both of which are expected to retire in the early 2030s when the new B-21 stealth bomber joins the force.

AFGSC Commander Gen. Timothy M. Ray wants only "must-have" upgrades, Gebara said, "Nice to haves" did not make the cut, he said. Among those that won't be added are the Large Aircraft Infrared Countermeasure System, or LAIRCM, which was dropped after the Air Force withdrew its B-52s from close air support and refocused them exclusively on dynamic force employment missions. The LAIRCM was primarily a defense "It is going to ... be a very different against low-level infrared threats, Gebara commander of AFGSC's 8th Air Force,

NEW ENGINES

Engines, however, are a must. Without new power plants, Gebara said, "it's not going to be an airplane anymore—it'll just be a static display."

The B-52 Commercial Engine Replacement Program seeks to replace each B-52's eight antique TF-33 power plants with modern, business-class jet engines. The goal: 30 percent more range or loitering time, reducing demand for aerial tanking, and increased reliability such that, once installed, the engines should never have to be removed for the remaining life of the airplanes.

Global Strike Command estimated in 2018 that the re-engining could cost \$22 billion, but would save \$10 billion in fuel, reduced maintenance, and personnel. The actual costs won't be known until the Air Force selects an engine. All of the major engine suppliers are competing, and a selection is expected next spring. Rolls-Royce, GE Aviation, and Raytheon Technologies' Pratt & Whitney are each offering variants of existing business-jet engines. Boeing, which built the B-52, will be the Air Force's integrator.

The project will be among the first competitions relying on digital models rather than real-world flight-tests to evaluate and select a winner. The Air Force shaved about three years off what might have been a 10-year acquisition process, thanks to streamlined Section 804 authorities. Gebara expects installations could begin in about five years.

Maj. Gen. Mark E. Weatherington B-52 than what I flew as a lieutenant," said, and therefore not deemed a priority. said that once the upgrades begin, the

command could see "30 to 40 refurbs," or engine replacements, per year.

CONNECTIVITY

While the engine replacement will take time, other changes are already well underway. Nearly complete is the CONECT upgrade, which adds Combat Network Communications Technology including data links, processing power, moving map and full-color displays, and the ability to retarget weapons in flight.

As of August, Gebara said, 69 of 76 B-52s had completed the CONECT upgrade, which began in 2014. CONECT replaces a series of Band-Aid solutions to improve targeting and connectivity that cluttered cockpits with laptop computers, connecting wires, and Post-it notes.

The Rube Goldberg solutions "show the innovation of our Airmen," Gebara said, "but it's also nice" to see the BUFF "come up to 21st century" standards.

NEW RADAR

The B-52's ancient AN/APQ-166 radar is slated for replacement, its analog/ mechanical systems is prone to all the shortcomings of older technology, said Gebara. He said the system was old when he first joined the Air Force nearly three

"When I started flying the B-52, it was a 20-plus-year-old radar back then," he said. "It's a maintenance nightmare for those poor guys on the line."

The replacement radar still has no official designator. Selected in July 2019, it is based on Raytheon's APG-79/APG-82 family of systems used in the Navy's F/A-

How the Engines Compare

Three companies have said they will pursue the B-52 re-engining competition. Here are a few of USAF's options:



Rolls-Royce BR725

THRUST: 16,100 pounds FLYING ON: USAF RQ-4 Global Hawk and E-11 BACN

The BR725 (military designation F130) is already in the Air Force inventory and has 200,000 combat hours, plus more than 22 million hours overall. Rolls claims 21 percent reduced toxic emissions, four decibels quieter, and better fuel burn than current generation engines.



GE Aviation CF34-10

THRUST: 20,360 pounds FLYING ON: Embraer E-series, Comac ARJ21

The CF34-10 flies on business jets with an on-wing time of 14,000 or more hours. Combined with earlier versions it has racked up 26 million flight hours.



GE Aviation Passport

THRUST: 18,900 pounds FLYING ON: Bombadier Global

Developed by GE Aviation for large business jets, the Passport engine first flew in 2015. It has more than 4,000 hours of testing since 2010 and features an 8 percent better fuel burn than other engines in its class.




Pratt & Whitney PW815

THRUST: 16,000 pounds FLYING ON: Gulfstream G600

Pratt claims 40 percent less on-wing maintenance than previous engines in this class and is touted as 75 percent quieter and producing 50 percent less toxic emissions than the existing engines.

18 Hornet, with elements drawn from the F-15E Strike Eagle. "We wanted an off-the shelf" solution that would be "most useful to us for the least amount of cost," Gebara said. Boeing, as the integrator, chose the radar.

The active electronically scanned array (AESA) radar will go into low-rate initial production in 2024 and include improved mapping and targeting range and increased capacity to engage multiple targets simultaneously. The solid-state radar will have no moving parts—easing maintenance.

"We'll be operations-capable" with the new radar in 2026, Gebara said.

The radar is what could enable AFGSC to reduce B-52 crews from five to four Airmen. While no firm decisions have been made, Gebara said, "If we are going to put all these upgrades in the airplane, it does make sense that [crew size] would eventually come down." He added, however, that nothing is "imminent."

One concept floated in the early 2000s to justify reengining the B-52 was to enable the aircraft to become theater-wide, standoff jamming platforms. New engines would generate the needed electrical power for jamming emitters to blanket a wide area. That remains an option, but Gebara said there are no near-term plans to turn the bombers into jammers.

"It's not an imminent program," he said. "The plane will be around to 2050, and one thing that's exciting about the B-52 is, you never know what's going to come next." But, he said, "that's not something you'll see in the next few years."

MORE CAPACITY

The key attribute of the B-52 has always been its ability to carry a large payload. Now, even that is being expanded. The 1760 Weapons Bay Mod will enable "smart" weapons—such as the AGM-158 IASSM and GBU-31 JDAM—to be carried inside the bomber on weapons racks and rotary launchers, as well as on wing pylons, where they're carried now.

'This increases the smart-weapon capacity by about two-thirds," Gebara said. "And, if you do the math, that's like an additional 22 bombers."

Without the mod, only "dumb" bombs without sensors

or satellite guidance could be carried internally.

In addition to added smart-bomb capacity, the B-52s will be the only aircraft to carry the AGM-181 Long-Range Stand-off missile, or LRSO, and the AGM-183A ARRW (Air-launched Rapid-Response Weapon) hypersonic

The LRSO is the successor to the AGM-86 Air-launched Cruise Missile, which is now more than two decades past its original planned retirement date. The new LRSO, which is expected to be operational in the late 2020s, will be a very long-range, stealthy weapon that can be launched far from enemy air defenses. The highly classified program—USAF will not say anything about its dimensions, performance, or loadout on the B-52 will be built by Raytheon, which was selected to build the LRSO two years ahead of schedule, in early 2019, thanks to a successful Technology Maturation and Risk Reduction (TMRR) program with competitor Lockheed Martin.

The hypersonic ARRW will likely be the first operational hypersonic weapon in the U.S. inventory. Gebara said the B-52 would be able to carry two ARRWs on each of its two wing pylons. Little has been revealed about the ARRW, which uses a booster rocket to accelerate to hypersonic speed, then glides to impact.

'This thing is going to be able to go, in 10-12 minutes, almost 1,000 miles," Gebara said. "It's amazing."

Gebara said the CONECT mod made it possible to add ARRW to the B-52.

With CONECT, "we get all the advanced target handoffs," he said, "as opposed to the bombardier in the bottom of the plane typing in [coordinates] and hoping he gets it right."


The Air Force is also pursuing a scramjet-powered, airbreathing hypersonic missile—called "Mayhem"—which would likely be smaller than the ARRW and could be carried on fighter-sized aircraft, as well as big bombers. It will build on the Hypersonic Air-breathing Weapon Concept, or HAWC, that the Air Force is developing with the Defense Advanced Research Projects Agency.

"I believe that the near-term solution that we can succeed with and field quickly is ARRW," Ray said at a press briefing during the Air Force Association's virtual

Air, Space & Cyber Conference. "And we can do that [with] the B-52 and the B-1. We need to do that soon. And I believe, broadly, the Air Force has got it right that we want to [pursue] a scramjet missile configuration that can be launched from other platforms, as well. ... We should do both."

ARRW could achieve initial operational capability within "the next couple of years," Ray said.

Not yet clear is how to upgrade the defensive management system for the B-52. Gebara said that capability may not be characterized for some time.

TESTING, TESTING

In order to get so many new systems tested in a timely manner, Gebara said the B-52 test force will expand from two to eight aircraft: two each to test the radar, engines, new missiles, and other improvements, such as the weapons bay. That way, Gebara said, if there's "a delay on the engine for a month or two, because they find some unknown issue, that doesn't slow down the radar and the rest."

Ray said he is confident AFGSC's plans for testing and depot-level upgrade work will be effective. "I'm not concerned about the ability to do that," he said. "I think ...we've got a good game plan."

AFGSC restored two old B-52s from the Davis-Monthan Air Force Base boneyard in Arizona, but Gebara said he does not anticipate any more resurrections and that other test aircraft will be diverted from operations to complete tests.

No major changes are needed to equip B-52s to launch either the ARRW or the LRSO, and because the Air Force is determined to create an open-mission systems architecture for all its aircraft, it should be able to keep refreshing the B-52 throughout its remaining lifetime.

"That's what's wonderful about the B-52," he said. "It's like an iPhone: There's always an app that you can add to it and make changes. That's pretty exciting."



"But Is It Fair?": Determining Who **Receives Your Assets**

"But is it fair?" we often hear clients ask after they've described how they would like their assets divided after they pass away.

Perhaps they may be closer to one child than the other or they believe their grandchildren would benefit more than their children or they wish to leave cash to some children and land to others. In any case, often when someone wants to distribute their estate in a somewhat less than traditional way, they worry about whether or not it is "fair."


Our response is always the same: "fair" is whatever you want.

You've worked hard to compile your estate assets during you life and ultimately, you should feel free to gift it to whomever you choose without

Further, there are no laws in North Dakota, requiring you to leave your assets to anyone in particular in your will. However, if you wish to leave out a specific person, such as a spouse, child, or grandchild, it's very important that you specifically and clearly exclude them from your will. If you simply do not include them, they could argue that you excluded them unintentionally or accidentally, and petition the court to include them. If you fail to create a will, of course, then state law dictates who receives

In a will, it is also worthwhile to include a clause that deals with individuals who contest the will. Often these clauses state that the contesting individual receives a small amount of money (such as one dollar) and are barred from inheriting further. These clauses are wise to include in order to prevent disgruntled family members or long-lost relatives from contesting the will without good cause.

Individuals usually want their family members to feel loved and cared for, even after they pass away. Distributing assets "fairly" is often an expression of the testator's love but, ultimately, you should give your assets away according to your wishes without being guided by feelings of guilt and obligation. Through her social work, she hopes to bring recognition to many problems in the area, including diaper shortages for struggling mothers, lack of adequate clothing, transportation problems, and homelessness.

Describing one prominent moment that inspired her passion for helping other women, "I

was one of eleven black women to graduate in a class of about 860 people from the Air Force Academy," said Crook. She believes strongly in breaking down the systemic barriers that can often hold women back from pursuing their dreams. She also hopes to use her social work degree to bring light to the struggles of underprivileged women in the Minot community and provide them with the resources they need to lead better

"I think of it as running a race. I'm here to help people start the

While Crook dedicates plenty of time to her degree in Social Work, she also plans to continue providing nuclear deterrence as a Missilier. The ultimate goal for her career path is to find a job in social work that is flexible with her Air Force schedule.

"I have a heart and passion for both worlds," she said with resounding enthusiasm. Crook is a few years away from receiving her social work degree, and still manages to give 100 percent to the Air Force, ¬ and to her community every day. She is one of many Airmen who truly aim





THIS WEEK IN USAF HISTORY

USAF PILOTS FLY THROUGH MUSHROOM CLOUD OF "IVY MIKE" **NOVEMBER 1, 1952**

On November 1, 1952 the United States tested the first "true" hydrogen bomb, code named "Ivy Mike," on the island of Elugelab in the Enewetak Atoll. The detonation of the device was the culmination of an intense debate over the nation's response to news that the Soviet Union had detonated their own nuclear weapons. "Mike" produced a three mile wide fireball and left a 164 foot deep crater in the ocean floor. The mushroom cloud soared to above 55,000 feet and would

eventually span 25 miles high and 100 miles wide. After the detonation of the bomb, USAF pilots flew through the cloud to test the conditions and gather samples. Their code name was "Red Flight," and the group included four war veterans with ample experience flying in hostile skies. Captain Jimmy Robinson was the only member of Red Flight to perish, and was posthumously awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross. The test led to the discovery of two new elements (Einsteinium and Fermium) and opened up a new era in nuclear research. Capt. Robinson is part of the legacy of the many atomic veterans who have risked or lost their lives to further the knowledge of nuclear research.

Bomber Task Force Documented Well By ComCam

The crew members of a B-52 will be the first to tell you that the size of the plane is not descript as to the size of the cabin where 5 crew positions are filled, with everyone on task to complete the defined mission. The recent Bomber Task Force deployment to RAF Fairford in the UK would engage personnel of the 5th Bomb Wing including B-52 pilots and crew members, maintenance, support, security, administrative and public affairs personnel in support of what will most likely be the type of deployments that will become more common moving forward as the United States shows both allies and adversaries that the U.S. can take the battle to the enemy, wherever that may be.

During a majority of the sorties flown during the recent BTF, a 6th crew member would be assigned; not to fly or man one of the other 3 positions on the B-52, rather, the job of MSgt Burt Traynor of COMCAM (Combat Camera) was to record each mission through the eyes of a camera. Early in the BTF, social media was filled with photos of 2 Russian Su-27sfollowing a B-52 as it was flying a sortie over the Black Sea. But the Su-27s flying close was not the whole story. It was a move that was dangerous to both planes, the Su-27 cut across the front of the B-52 leaving a jet wash for the bomber to fly through. These are the types of events that a COMCAM crew will record as documentation for future use.

MSgt Traynor is assigned to the 1st Combat Camera Squadron, operating

out of Charleston Air Force Base, SC. "We have to be ready for any occasion when we deploy. We are asked to do so many different things" according to Traynor. On a B-52 the mission is challenging because there isn't a lot of room. "We have to work with the pilots to get to the windows. It is tight access, and some of the missions can be up to 18 hours long, which requires a lot of endurance" says Traynor. "We know that the imagery we capture is important, so we do our best. The sole purpose of having COMCAM on an aircraft is to allow the pilots (and other crew) to focus on their mission." And in Fairford, that meant that there were 3 COMCAM members, each with their own set of air crews to support. Once the B-52's land, at the end of the day, the COMCAM staff would transfer their captured footage so that "leadership could have the imagery" continues Traynor. Traynor has been with COMCAM for almost 4 years. He has been in the service for over 18 years and finds his COMCAM job "fun and rewarding. We get to fly in anything that has a back seat" Traynor says with a smile, "C-17s, T-38s, C-130s, Helocopters, B-52s, KC-135s, we have to be ready for anything when the time comes" according to Traynor. Working closely with MSgt Traynor and his COMCAM team were 3 members of the 5th Bomb Wing Public Affairs office. We'll have their thoughts about the Bomber Task Force mission next week.

Dealing with stressors in relationships

Research has shown that experts to examine the type relationship difficulties are at the heart of many problems in the military, and officials within the Defense Department's military community and family policy are putting in place programs for service members and their families to get help in their relationships.

Lee Kelley, the director of the military community support programs, discussed the need for such programs during a recent interview.

Kelley is intimately familiar with the problem having been detailed to serve as the deputy director for the Defense Suicide Prevention Office. In studying the complex nature of suicide, the Defense Department has found that relationships are a top contributing factor.

Beyond that, "relationships are the top reason that service members and families seek nonmedical counseling through some of the programs that I work with," she said.

Kelley went back to her regular job and gathered a group of of relationship support being provided to the community across the DOD around the world. "Through the course of this deep dive group, research was brought up about different relationship interventions that have shown promising results in the military community," she said.

The relationship campaign for service members and military families has been launched.

In the civilian world, most couples have families nearby or a network of friends they can confide in, Kelley said . There are churches or medical personnel they can turn to. Many times in the military situation, service members may feel there is no support group.

But there is, Kelley says, and she wants service members to know they are not alone, and there are ways to get that support.

"First of all, we want them to know that they should be comfortable seeking support through our counselors," she said. "What we're doing as a first part of the campaign is pulling back the curtain on what relationship support looks like. What is it? What does it even look like to sit down with a counselor? What kinds of questions are they going to ask me? Does it mean my relationships [are] over if I sit down with a counselor or ask for help?"

Service providers, like the military and family life counselors, will post on social media to talk about what relationship support looks like, what it sounds like, what it feels like, with the end goal being to normalize the experience of seeking help for a relationship, she said.

The second phase of the program is to define what skills an individual can build on to find success in relationships or recover when a relationship doesn't work out, she said.

Kelley is clear-eyed about what world," Kelley said.

can be accomplished. She knows that break-ups happen. "The worst thing that we can hear is that we may have a junior enlisted service member on the East Coast, and their significant other breaks up with them via text message from the other side of the country," she said. "We don't want that service member to feel alone. We don't want that service member to feel like there's no tomorrow. There are alternatives."

And service members and their families are responding. In fiscal 2019, counsellors conducted more than 260,000 relationship sessions through the military and family life counseling program. The program is accessible "to all of our active duty, National Guard and Reserve service members and families, regardless of activation status from anywhere around the

COVID-19 has forced some changes, and telehealth counseling is part of the process. Kelley said there has been an uptick in couples seeking counseling since the start of the pandemic, but it is continuing the rise the office saw in previous years. COVID-19 is also forcing couples to confront their problems in ways they might not have done in the past, she said.

Deer season fact or fiction

Deer gun season gets underway in a week, which means it's time to locate one's license, line up shells, sight-in rifles, and practice practice, practice. The "to do" list could also include testing one's knowledge of deer and deer hunting with a game of "fact or fiction":

Fact or fiction: Deer gun season is a North Dakota

Unfortunately, that's fiction. However, it probably should be a state holiday for lucky license holders especially considering it seems winning the lottery is easier than getting a deer gun tag in some places of the state.

Fact or fiction: It's OK to shoot a deer and put someone else's tag on it.

Wrong, wrong, wrong. That's definitely fiction. While party hunting is legal in some states, North Dakota is definitely not one of them. Plus, doing so could get the people involved in some serious trouble with their local game warden when they're caught.

Fact or fiction: The deer carcass tag needs to accompany the deer

it's called a carcass tag. It Dakota deer gun season. needs to accompany the meat to the meat processor.

If a hunter processes the meat themselves, it still needs to stay with the processed meat.

Fact or fiction: Deer – both white-tailed and mule deer – are related to moose.

Yup, that's another fact. Heck, moose are also related to the much smaller key, coues, and blacktailed deer - even caribou and elk. They're all members of the cervid family.

Fact or fiction: Fallow deer are native to North

Nope, that's fiction. Fallow deer were first introduced in North America at James Island, British Columbia, Canada, and a Kentucky recreation area.

Fact or fiction: North Dakota's "hunter orange" requirement includes a head covering and outer clothing measuring at least 400 square inches (that's at least a vest).

Yes, that's a fact. Some states may require just one hunter orange item but in North Dakota it's both.

And it has to be solid orange for a head covering. A two-toned cap of orange and different colored bill doesn't count. And speaking of hunter orange, while it's not required when upland game hunting, it's still a good idea because it makes hunters more visible to others in the field.

Fact or fiction: Camouflage orange is OK to wear while deer hunting in North Dakota.

Wrong. There's a reason it's called camouflage orange. Even though camo orange has hunter orange coloration in its design, it's not solid hunter orange. So skip wearing that camo orange cap or jacket while deer hunting. Instead, save it for upland hunting where solid orange isn't required. Or better yet, wear it to a local wildlife conservation organization's

fundraising banquet when things get back to normal after the pandemic.

Fact or fiction: North Dakota defines "edible flesh" as "both front quarters, both hind quarters, and back straps but does not include meat ruined by bullet or natural causes."

Yes, that's a fact, which a person would know if they read the 2020 North Dakota deer hunting guide, a summary of regulations hunters receive with

their license.

Fact or fiction: It's OK to bait on N.D. Game and Fish Department Wildlife Management Areas.

Nope, that's fiction. In fact, hunters should check regulations on other public lands regarding baiting. For example, it's also prohibited on U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service lands and several other state and federal lands.

Fact or fiction: The 2020 North Dakota deer gun season closes Nov. 22.

Yes, that's a fact. The four-month-plus long deer archery season with its unlimited number of licenses doesn't shut down until Jan. 3, 2021 while the state's muzzleloader season runs Nov. 27 through Dec. 13 for those lucky lottery license hunters.

And, finally, here's another fact: All hunters should keep "safety first" a priority, whether it's deer or any other hunting season.
