USAF C-141 IS THE FIRST JET TO LAND IN ANTARCTICA **NOVEMBER 14, 1966**



The first C-141 to land at McMurdo Sound, Antarctica on Nov. 14, 1966 (USAF)

On November 14, 1966, a USAF Lockheed C-141 became the first jet to land in Antarctica as a part of "Operation Deep Freeze." Operation Deep Freeze began in 1955 when major nations collaborated to conduct earth science research in one of the least explored areas on Earth. The Air Force began its involvement in 1956 and continues running airlifts to

this day. Previously, the USAF had only deployed propeller planes to Antarctica, but on November 14, the 60th Air Mobility Wing landed the first jet carrying 12.9 tons of cargo. Over hundreds of missions, the C-141s would carry essential supplies to installations in Antarctica, as well as hosting passengers that included penguins, gulls, and seal pups. Lockheed C-141s would continue participating in Operation Deep Freeze until they were decommissioned from the Air Force in 2004. Due to the Antarctic Treaty of 1959, US military involvement in Antarctica, including Operation Deep Freeze, continues to be for peaceful and scientific purposes only.

STRIKEWERX Spark Sprint selects winners

BOSSIER CITY, La. --

Two Airmen were selected as finalists by Air Force Global Strike Command leadership and community leaders as part of the STRIKEWERX Spark Sprint (S3) event held Friday, Oct. 30, at the STRIKEWERX Innovation Hub in Bossier City, Louisiana.

The STRIKEWERX Spark Sprint (S3) event brought together six wing finalists from across AFGSC to receive coaching on how to best "pitch" their projects to obtain further support. Each finalist had three minutes to explain their idea, pitch their solution and present their prerecorded video; this pitch was then followed by two minutes to answer any questions the panel of judges had regarding

Airman 1st Class Paul Olexa, 509th Bomb Wing at Whiteman Air Force Base, Missouri, and Senior Airman Kalei Sloan, 7th Bomb Wing at Dyess AFB, Texas, were selected as the finalists from the group six presentations. Olexa and Sloan will now move on to represent the command and pitch their ideas at the 2021 Air Force Spark Tank competition.

Spark Tank is an annual competition, hosted by the Air Force Association's Air Warfare Symposium, which allows Airmen to pitch innovative ideas for solving unit challenges to Air Force leadership and a panel of industry experts who have the ability to further develop or implement the Airmen's solution.

Among the judges for the S3 event was the commander of Air Force Global Strike Command, Gen. Tim Ray, who took a moment recognize all the innovators for bringing their ideas to the table.

"To listen to you all solve with extreme ownership has been the highlight of my entire week," Ray said. "I appreciate your service and pitching in to make the mission

Olexa's pitch was the "MagRug," a durable polymer rug made up of light-weight sections with built-in magnets and a circuit for small lights aimed at locating dropped objects. Using pressure

and magnetic censors that light up to illustrate fallen objects, this device locates magnetic parts such as nuts and bolts, and reduces time wasted in the aircraft maintenance workplace.

Olexa noted that foreign object damage costs billions of dollars in damage to aircraft and other vehicles worldwide; a problem the "MagRug" could help solve. Olexa also mentioned that his "MagRug" solution could serve a purpose in more than just the world of aircraft maintenance, having applications in the private sector for first responders and emergencies.

Sloan's pitch was for the "StrikerAF App" which would improve a unit's sponsor program by: matching sponsors with new Airmen, providing up-to-date contact information and prompting sponsors to complete tasks. The StrikerAF App also simplifies initial contact between sponsors and Airmen, by providing new Airmen with an in-processing schedule and contact info.

"Our Airmen need to be more resilient. The building blocks of resiliency are sponsorship, DUI, suicide prevention and sexual assault prevention," Sloan said. "Through this app, we want to give Airmen a community where they feel connected and be able to talk to their peers."

The app has more capabilities aimed at providing Airmen that community: connecting them with peers before arrival to a new duty location, the ability to request ride with touch of a button, and a feature that allows Airmen to alert someone in when they are in an uncomfortable situation or going through a difficult time.

Other pitches heard during the event included the EOD Rapid Robot Deployment by Tech. Sgt. Kenneth Dunn and Tech. Sgt. Thomas Gilbert, 509 BW at Whiteman AFB.

It currently takes two people 10-15 minutes to deploy using the standard ramp; Dunn and Gilbert's solution would cut time and manpower in half using an off-the-shelf motorized wheelchair ramp.

innovative idea allows for a single person to quickly deploy an EOD robot and maintains the safety of personnel and equipment by reducing overall physical toll.

A new vaccine storage bin was pitched by Tech. Sgt. Mircho Plaza, 377 Air Base Wing at Kirtland AFB, New Mexico. The new bin would provide an optimal way to identify vaccines and prevent administration errors while improving inventory management and creating more storage space to accommodate more vaccines.

During his pitch, Plaza noted that 23 percent of all vaccination errors are due to personnel giving the wrong vaccine, which would be mitigated through the implantation of this bin. Additionally the implementation of this bin, would also save facilities 25 percent of storage

Joyce San Nicolas and Capt. Eric Schoenhals, 5 BW and 91 MW at Minot AFB, North Dakota, pitched "ATLAS". ATLAS is meant to streamline the Personnel Reliability Assurance Program data by keeping a personnel repository that allows necessary agencies/personnel to quickly and accurately administer precise oversight of their nuclear and postured missions. The pair noted that it currently takes 3,000 man hours to administer

PRAP and ATLAS can reduce that time by 75 percent, while also enhancing availability to inspect programs and reducing travel to bases for inspection.

"Commanders are really hard to get in touch with but they always have their personal cell phone," San Nicolas said. "Through ATLAS, a PRAP message can go to commanders directly.'

The final pitch was the Launcher Closure Door Hydraulic Actuator Power Unit Replacement by Staff Sgt. Justin Latham and Staff Sgt. Matthew Thorn, 341 Missile Wing at Malmstrom AFB, Montana. The team's idea to replace the units will not only improve mission effectiveness but also improve Airmen's quality of life by making the task of opening the launcher closure door much easier for missile maintenance teams in the field.

The current units providing power for the opening the missile silos is dangerous to load, unload and maneuver due to the age (increased chance of fire and

The pair outlined their pitch's benefits noting that a fleet refurbishment costs \$204,000, and fleet replacement with the solution would be \$47,320. The time for a fleet refurbishment is three-years versus the solution's two-week replacement time.







An Empty Trust is a Worthless Trust

Creating a trust can often be somewhat confusing. The process is usually new to the client and it requires a shift in one's thinking regarding ownership of assets. As a result, many people think once they sign on their trust document that everything is settled. However, this is really just the start. In order for your trust to be of any use, it must be funded.

Funding a trust is the process by which you transfer your assets to the trustee's ownership. Following are a few different types of assets and the typical process by which you can fund them into your trust.

Bank Accounts

Funding a trust with a bank account is a relatively simple process. It typically involves going into the bank with your Certificate of Trust (a separate, short document including important information regarding the trust) and changing the name on the account to the name of the trust or opening a brand new account.

Real Property

Real property (including surface and minerals) can be funded into a trust by conveying the property via quit claim deed. The deed lists you as an individual and current owner of the property as the Grantor and you as the trustee of the trust as the Grantee.


Life Insurance and other Funds with Beneficiaries

Life insurance, IRAs, and other types of assets that allow you to list a beneficiary can be transferred by listing the trust as the beneficiary. This way, when you pass away, the available funds will be given to the trust.

New Assets

New assets acquired after the creation of the trust can simply be acquired in the trust's name, preventing you from having to take further steps to transfer it after acquisition. For example, if you purchase a new home, the trust would be the purchaser and would be listed as the Grantee on the deed.

Overall, the typical goal of a trust is to ensure a smooth transfer of assets following one's passing. Setting up a trust without funding makes the trust essentially useless. By ensuring your trust is fully and correctly funded, after your death, your trustee will be able to have immediate access to all of your assets in order to manage it according to the trust's terms. It is always wise to consult an attorney to assist you in funding your trust, to make sure it is done correctly and no assets are missed. A thank you to our veterans

MAJ. GEN. MICHAEL LUTTON, COMMANDER, 20TH AIR FORCE

Every year, our nation honors service members who not only have died, but also those who have lived in service to our country. In every generation, since the birth of our nation, brave men and women took up arms to defend our way of life. Our citizens continue this selfless service today—in hospitals, trauma centers, on nuclear alert at sea or in our northern tier bases, as well as the countless frontlines combating terrorism so it does not reach our shores.

Citizens across the great states where 20th Air Force defends America--Montana, Wyoming, North Dakota, Nebraska, Colorado, California, and New Mexico--have fought in every American conflict since World War I.

Veterans Day began as Armistice Day - on the 11th hour, 11th day of the 11th month in 1918 - a day marking the end of World War I. Working with our Alliance partners, our military forces were decisive in victory. One such veteran was Martin Treptow who paid the ultimate price for our freedom and future. President Reagan noted:

"Beyond those monuments to heroism is the Potomac River, and on the far shore the sloping hills of Arlington National Cemetery, with its row upon row of simple white markers bearing crosses or Stars of David. They add up to only a tiny fraction of the price that has been paid for our freedom."

"Each one of those markers is a monument to the kind of hero I spoke of earlier. Their lives ended in places called Belleau Wood, the Argonne, Omaha Beach, Salerno, and halfway around the world on Guadalcanal, Tarawa, Pork Chop Hill, the Chosin Reservoir, and in a hundred rice paddies and jungles of a place called Vietnam."

"Under one such a marker lies a young man, Martin Treptow, who left his job in a small town barber shop in 1917 to go to France with

the famed Rainbow Division. There, on the Western front, he was killed trying to carry a message between battalions under heavy fire. We're told that on his body was found a diary."

"On the flyleaf under the heading, 'My Pledge,' he had written these words:

"America must win this war. Therefore, I will work; I will save; I will sacrifice; I will endure; I will fight cheerfully and do my utmost, as if the issue of the whole struggle depended on me alone."

Martin Treptow set an inspirational example of service before self and excellence in service to our nation. What is tremendously humbling is to see these same values over one hundred years later in our veterans today. Each veteran making the selfless decision to sacrifice their today for our nation's tomorrow. Each veteran leaving their home and community to serve. We are truly blessed to have men and women willing to sacrifice day in and day out to defend our great nation and democracy.

To all our veterans - thank you. Thank you for your service to our nation, for your dedication







Rated Preparatory Program now accepting applications for FY21 spring class

WASHINGTON (AFNS) --

Active duty Department of the Air Force officers and enlisted Airmen and Space Professionals interested in becoming a rated officer have until Dec. 31, 2020 to apply for the Spring 2021 Rated Preparatory Program.

This will be the third year that the Air Force has partnered with the Civil Air Patrol for this training. The 2021 class will take place at the Denton Enterprise Airport in Denton, Texas.

Rated Preparatory Program provides Department of the Air Force officers and for the first time enlisted applicants,

who are interested in crosstraining to a rated career field the opportunity to gain and strengthen their basic aviation skills," said Col. Scott Linck, Aircrew Task Force deputy director. "This program will allow them to enhance their knowledge through developmental modules and acquire valuable flight time in order to increase their competitiveness as candidates for future undergraduate flying training boards."

Applicants selected for the RPP will first complete an online self-paced ground course followed by a one-week inresident course to introduce them to aviation fundamentals. Program participants will garner approximately seven to nine flight hours, ground instruction and additional training time in a flight simulator.

Officers who complete the program are required to apply to the next available Undergraduate Flying Training selection board. Enlisted participants who complete the program are required to apply to at least one of three Air Force commissioning sources: U.S. Air Force Academy, Reserve Officer Training Corps or Officer Training School.

Airmen who can meet the requirements below are encouraged to apply:

1. Any active duty officer who meets UFT board requirements.

2. Any active duty enlisted Airman or Space Professional meets UFT requirements and qualifies for a commission through one of the three commissioning sources (Reference PSDM 20-96 for further information).

3. Be a U.S. Citizen.

4. Be of high moral character personal qualifications and (members currently having open law violations or criminal previously investigations, convicted by court-martial or having received an Article 15 are ineligible to apply).

5. Have the unit commander's approval and endorsement.

6. Have a current passing Physical Fitness Test score.

7. Have a Pilot Candidate Selection Method score prior to the RPP class start date.

8. Have less than 5 hours of total civilian flight time (applicants with greater than 5 hours of civilian flight time may apply, but will only be considered on a space available basis).

9. Officers: Obtain a U.S. Air Force Initial Flying Class I, 1A, Ground Based Controller or III

flight physical prior to entry into the RPP.

10. Enlisted: Obtain an FAA Class III physical prior to entry into the RPP (Reference PSDM 20-96; consult a local Aviation Medical Examiner).

11. Complete an on-line selfpaced ground course that will be provided prior to the class start

12. Be prepared to retake the Air Force Officer Qualifying Test and Test of Basic Aviation Skills at the first available opportunity upon completion of RPP, preferably within two to four

"When comparing applicant scores pre- and post-RPP, results show, on average, a 20% improvement in student AFOQT scores and a 35-point increase in PCSM scores," said Maj. Sean Stumpf, Aircrew Task Force talent management branch chief. "Approximately 90% of officers who went through the program in 2019 and applied for UFT were selected. We are hoping for the same results from the most recent class that went through the program this summer."

Vice Chief's Challenge creates new document templates, saves Airmen time

ARLINGTON, Va. (AFNS) --As teleworking and social distancing became a part of daily life, the Department of the Air Force was hard at work. Not only were Airmen delivering on daily mission requirements, they were also working hard to improve

the department from within. The 2020 Vice Chief's Challenge launched in February with a focus on working faster and smarter, and finding innovative ways to give Airmen back their time.

"Competing in an environment dominated by near-peer threats requires that we unleash our Airmen to think differently and to put their tremendous talents to use," said Air Force Vice Chief of Staff Gen. Stephen W. Wilson at the launch of the challenge. "Doing so will transform our Air Force to meet the rigorous demands of the next generation of warfare."

Airmen were encouraged to participate in the challenge by submitting ideas via the Airmen Powered by Innovation platform to solve problems related to automation or elimination of menial tasks.

One idea stood out as simple straight-forward, required only a head nod from Wilson to get started. The idea was to create official templates for common Air Force documents such as memorandums, Air Force biographies, talking papers and more.

"We asked for our Airmen's in identifying and help eliminating drains on their time that do not directly contribute to warfighting readiness — and our Airmen delivered," Wilson said. "The support for this idea was overwhelming. And for such a simple idea, it was clear that we could start work immediately."

The Department of the Air Force uses Air Force Handbook 33-337, The Tongue & Quill, to describe how official documents should be formatted and written. The handbook, which is a static file, was last updated in 2015, and includes images of what a properly formatted document should look like.

The average Airman typically makes a new document by opening the Tongue & Quill, reading the formatting instructions, opening their word

processing software, and begins formatting a document before beginning the first sentence.

An Airman having to format a blank document is exactly the kind of "menial task" Wilson was referring to when he launched the Vice Chief's Challenge.

Now, thanks to this idea submission, nine official templates are available for download on the service's e-publishing website. This website is available online and doesn't require a Common Access Card or other special login to gain access.

"Giving Airmen back the time they need to drive innovation and build our future is a warfighting imperative," Wilson said. "No one knows better what processes or tasks weigh on our Airmen, than Airmen themselves. We're excited to see what other innovative ideas come next."

The next step is to push the templates to the Air Force standard desktop, which would make the templates available to Airmen when they open a new Word document on an Air Force computer. This system update is expected to be accomplished before the end of November.





App for military resources available to service members, families

The app makes it more convenient when users are away from their computers and are only carrying a smartphone.

Each year, Military OneSource connects hundreds of thousands of service members and their families to resources to help improve their quality of life, Slaton said.

The user-friendly design of the new "My Military OneSource" app is based on comprehensive data analysis and user input, including in-depth interviews with more than 300 service members, spouses and service providers; analysis of user satisfaction data input from military leadership and program managers; and a thorough review of best practices, Slaton said.

"To ensure the My Military OneSource mobile app continues to meet the needs of the military community, we will evaluate user feedback to help inform ongoing updates and enhancements, as well as new features," Slaton said, while also adding that feedback is particularly important to improving the site.

Besides the app, users can visit

the Military OneSource website on their computer. There's also a toll-free call center manned 24/7/365.

Users can trust the "My Military OneSource" app, website and call center because it guarantees their confidentiality with a few mandatory exceptions, Slaton said. Military OneSource must disclose illegal activities and situations to prevent harm to self or others.

Those eligible for Military OneSource are Defense Department service members, including National Guard and Reserve irrespective of activation status, DoD expeditionary civilians, Coast Guard members when activated for the Navy, survivors, veterans up to 365 days post-separation or retirement,

and family members of all the categories listed.

Military OneSource is a DoDfunded program that is both a call center and website that provides free comprehensive information, support and resources on every aspect of military life.

Military Community and Family Policy is directly responsible for establishing quality-of-life policies and programs that help our guardians of country, their families and survivors be well and mission-ready. Military OneSource is the gateway to programs and services that support the everyday needs of the 5.2 million service members and immediate family members of the military community. JOINT BASE SAN ANTONIO-LACKLAND, Texas – With less than a month to go in their annual call-for-topics campaign, the Air Force Installation and Mission Support Center is still looking for innovative ideas with potential to change the Air Force.

AFIMSC can be a powerful ally for anyone with an idea that can improve installation and mission support operations, said Dustin Dickens, an innovation program analyst with the center.

"Since standing up an innovation office two years ago, we've landed more than \$65 million in Air Force and

venture capital funding for I&MS initiatives," he said. "We've been very successful at connecting brilliant Airmen with Air Force and industry partners to bring their ideas to life."

The competition calls for Airmen to submit their ideas though the online Ideascale platform at https://usaf.ideascalegov.com/a/campaign-home/181.

Past Innovation Rodeo winners include:

• Mobile apps to make life easier for Airmen and their families, including one to centralize and streamline the subletting of short-term slots at military child development centers; one for base announcements and community events; and one to share feedback about customer experiences.

- An idea to replace the current manual mapping of underground cabling and wiring with the use of augmented reality;
- A project to leverage Geospatial Information Systems and aerial imagery for facility roof inspections;
- A proposal to use autonomous robotic lawn mowers to cut the grass in and around airfields at night to reduce aircraft birdstrike hazards

AFIMSC's innovation team

has also partnered with rapid acquisition leaders to convert Airmen's innovative ideas into reality at record pace. As such, winning projects are now in various stages of development, including an idea from the inaugural event in 2019 – an app now called the Wing Feedback App – that is currently in beta testing at Joint Base San Antonio-Lackland, Texas.

BAKED CANDIED BACON CINNAMON ROLLS



INGREDIENTS 12 SLICES BACON, SLICED 1/3 CUP BROWN SUGAR PRE-MADE CINNAMON ROLLS 2 OUNCE CREAM CHEESE

When ready to cook, set the Traeger to 350 ° F and preheat, lid closed for 15 minutes. Dredge 8 of the slices of bacon in brown sugar, making sure to cover both sides of the bacon. Place the brown sugared bacon slices along with the other slices of bacon on a cooling rack placed on top of a large baking sheet. Cook the bacon on the Traeger for 15-20 minutes or until the fat renders but bacon is still pliable.

Turn the Traeger down to 325 ° F. Open and unroll the cinnamon rolls. While bacon is still warm, place 1 slice of the brown sugared bacon on top of 1 of the unrolled rolls and roll back up. Repeat for all the rolls.

Place cinnamon rolls in an 8" x 8" baking dish or cake pan that has been sprayed with nonstick cooking spray. Cook the cinnamon rolls at 325 ° F for 10 to 15 minutes or until golden. Rotate the pan a half turn halfway through cooking time.

Meanwhile, take the provided cream cheese frosting and mix in the softened cream cheese. Crumble the cooked bacon and add into the cream cheese frosting.

Spread frosting over warm cinnamon rolls. Serve







Cold weather hunting and dogs

season is fully underway, upland hunters and their dogs don't have to settle into the couch

More than a month remains of upland bird season and even though temperatures dip sometimes rather severely - and it can be snowy and windy (no surprise there, perhaps), it's still possible to enjoy late season pheasant

The key to a successful hunt for that fourlegged Hunting Maniac is the dog must be healthy and in good condition to handle cold weather winter conditions.

A hunting dog is going to want to hunt and most likely, it wants to hunt regardless of the conditions. It is what they live for, after all. Because that desire is so strong, it's vital for human hunters to step up and be smart about late season hunting.

Winter requires special attention, especially cold temperatures. Watch the dog's body posture - they let you know when to be concerned. If they're slowing their search, less body animation, have a 'hunkering' backline appearance, or shivering, it's time to quit.

Wind and wind chills also enter into how much a dog can handle being out – or whether they should be out at all. A dead air layer exists between a dog's skin and hair. Wind and moisture take that air layer away and dogs can easily become more chilled. Short-haired breeds such as viszla, Weimaraner, English pointers, or German short-haired pointers are less able to handle cold and wind.

Cold air below 32 degrees tends to be drier than air around 30 to 32 degrees, which tends to have more moisture – and moisture can suck heat out of a dog. That's one reason it might be more comfortable for dogs to hunt in 20 degrees on a sunny, calm day than a cloudy day at 32 degrees.

Winter conditions also bring ice and sharp, rozen stubble, cattails, or sunflower and corn stalks that could cut a dog more so than during early season hunting. Even grass and frozen corn leaves can slice a dog open when it's cold

Ice is also horribly difficult on footpads, causing cuts. Because pads are warmer, ice and

It's nearly mid-November and while deer gun snow tends to accumulate between a dog's toes, causing irritations. Hunters definitely need to take note if their dog stops and tries to clean and chew ice and mud away from their feet and toes. It's an irritant that could create deeper wounds and cuts.

> While dog boots may seem like a solution to protect footpads, they can also cause snow to get inside the boot from the top and freeze as it touches the warmer footpad. All too often, good intentions of protecting a dog's feet can cause irritations and cuts.

> In addition, clean, fresh water is important year-around. Dogs can require more water in the winter than in the summer because they need more food in winter to maintain calories. More food means dogs need more water to properly digest food.

> A dog's caloric needs can nearly double working harder in winter's harsher conditions compared to when they're at rest in summer's heat. Some companies make special dog food for hunting dogs to help meet those increased needs.

> Dogs can become dehydrated when hunting in dry, cold air. Carry water for the dog in the winter when afield, just as a hunter would when it's warm. Like people, dogs sweat when they're exerting themselves in cold weather, although they pant rather than sweat. Dogs need water when active in the winter just as much as people

> They can also suffer frostbite and hypothermia. Don't transport dogs in an open pickup in the winter but if it's an absolute necessity, have a well-insulated, enclosed dog box with dry bedding. It should be the size of the dog. Cold air enters if the box is too large, which is even more detrimental when they're wet and cold after hunting.

Late season bird hunting brings special concerns but if done smartly, it doesn't have to deter hunting. Pay attention and use common sense when out. Watch the dog's body language, because while they might not rub their paws together or try to breathe warm air on themselves, they will tell you when enough is enough. Any hunkering, shivering, or alternately lifting paws are sure signals to quit.

Pay attention, watch the weather and dog, be smart, and never let it get to that level.






