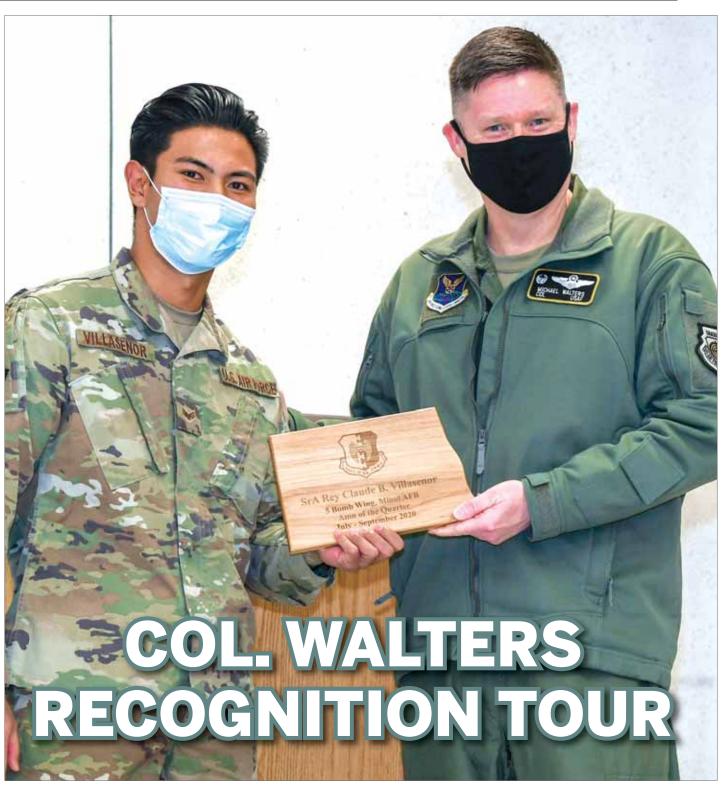

## ARNORTH to expand military COVID-19 operations to North Dakota

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Nov. 20, 2020 —

At the request of the Federal Emergency Management Agency, the Department of Defense is deploying approximately 60 U.S. Air Force medical personnel to support hospitals across multiple locations in North Dakota. U.S. Army North (ARNORTH), the Joint Force Land Component Command of U.S Northern Command, will oversee the military operation in support of Federal efforts and the state.

"Our actions demonstrate our steadfast commitment to help communities in need as part of the whole-of-America response to the COVID-19 pandemic in support of FEMA," said Lt. Gen. Laura J. Richardson, ARNORTH and JFLCC commander. "North Dakotans can expect the same high quality care we've provided in other cities across the U.S. as we continue to coordinate alongside our local, state, and federal partners to respond to the pandemic and help save lives." The personnel, who are primarily nurses, including critical care nurses, will provide much needed assistance to several hospitals in four North Dakota cities. The hospitals are Essentia Health-Fargo and Sanford Medical Center in Fargo, CHI St. Alexius Health Medical Center and Sanford Medical Center in Bismarck, Altru Hospital in Grand Forks, and Trinity Hospital - St Joseph's in Minot.

The military medical personnel will come from several locations, to include Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Ohio; Joint Base Langley-Eustis, Virginia; Joint Base San Antonio-Lackland and JBSARandolph, Texas; Eglin Air Force Base, Florida; Keesler Air Force Base, Mississippi; and Joint Base Andrews, Maryland.

Under the command of ARNORTH, elements of Task Force 46, formed primarily by the Michigan Army National Guard's 46th Military Police Command, will deploy to Bismarck, North Dakota, to assist in the arrival of the Air Force Medical Specialty Teams. Designated as "Task Force Center," this scalable organization will provide oversight of the military medical teams.

Additionally, elements of the U.S. Army Reserve's 377th Theater Sustainment Command from New Orleans, and the 4th Expeditionary Sustainment Command from San Antonio, along with elements of the 1st Infantry Division's Sustainment Brigade from Fort Riley, Kansas, will provide multi-component sustainment services to the military medical teams.

The Task Force and the sustainment commands also continue to support the military COVID-19 response effort in El Paso, which ARNORTH announced earlier this month, following an approved FEMA request for assistance.

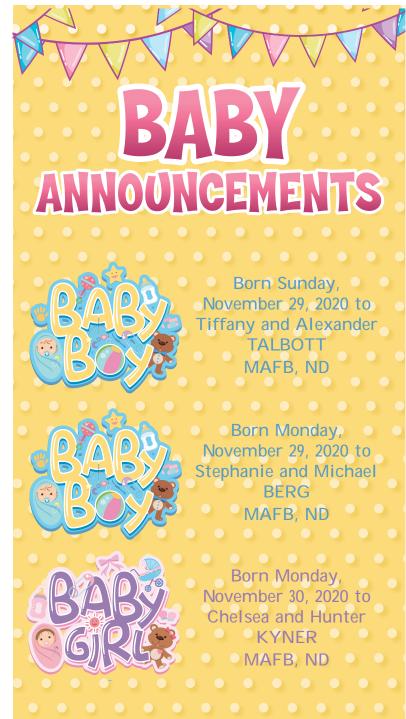

## **First Term Officers Course**

MINOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. --

As a newly commissioned officer arriving at a first duty station, there can be a swarm of things running through your head. Not only are you faced with the real world aspects of your job that you need to focus on, but you also have to think about being a strong leader and the nuances of communication. It can be overwhelming and can make you feel like your head is spinning trying to keep on top of everything at once.

Though I am not "newly" commissioned, my Air Force career is still in its infancy. I have been in for just over a year and a half but Minot is my first real duty station. Coming to a new base in a new place, faced with learning the ins and outs of my job, balancing my work and home life, making sure I am able to lead effectively and doing right by those I oversee can feel like a lot to handle. However, remembering that this isn't unique to me and that I am not the first person in this position opens up room for learning from others experiences and absorbing their words of wisdom.

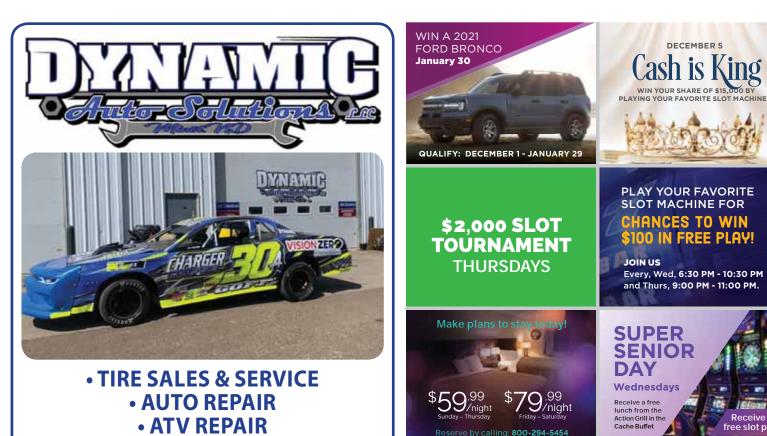
This is where the First Term Officer Course comes in. A person who is brand new to something, can't be expected to know it all. Even if you learn concepts and discuss subjects in a classroom setting, there's something to be said for learning and applying it all in the "real" world. FTOC allows new officers to learn from the wealth of knowledge and experience of commanders, senior enlisted, and subject matter experts from right here at Minot AFB. It gives them face time and allows for direct discussion about things that these people have seen, gone through or have had to handle throughout their career and lives.

Initially there's time for inner reflection and learning the "why" behind what you're doing. This theme of introspection runs throughout the duration of the course with discussions on conscious bias, emotional intelligence, communication and helpful ways to avoid burnout. We are all human after all and understanding that in yourself and the people you lead, will help empower you to grow your leadership skills and grow compassionate leaders.

Some of the impactful moments of FTOC were having the chance to speak with flight, squadron and wing commanders. If you're new and just starting out at your new duty station and happen to walk by them you might have the inclination to stiffen up. Of course, customs and courtesies are always important but it's easy to forget they are human and have been in your shoes. Having the time to listen and talk to commanders in a more relaxed environment allowed new officers to hear their stories and ask questions.

Listening to our leaders discuss their takeaways over their time in the Air Force helps establish a foundation for young officers. Those stories help serve as mentoring sessions as a leader. and can help shape a young officer's perspective, but FTOC helps even further by discussing the things a new officer may be faced with daily Challenges such as conflict resolution or to sit down and listen to members of the helping agencies to understand the resources available for those in need. It doesn't always need to be dealing with something serious, it could also just be recognizing when your people just need to dial it back. That's where conversations of knowing your people and harboring a culture to promote a strong and healthy environment for you and your people to grow and develop come in.

FTOC can be a powerful and very beneficial course for new officers to build their foundation and start their career at their first duty station on the right track. It encourages conversation and allows officers to engage with people from all career fields, backgrounds, ranks and experiences. When stepping out of the school house or other training environment and into the "real" world, first term officers may find there's a lot more on their plate then they realized. FTOC helps bridge those two worlds and empowers officers to be ready for not only being the best officers they can be, but also the best leaders they can be.

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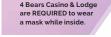

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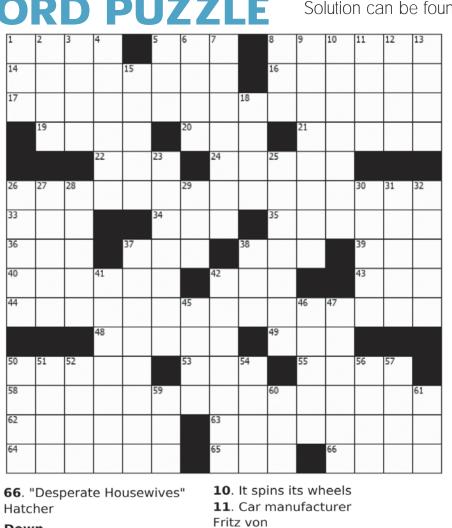

Changing routines and the environment also represent key factors for increased migraine severity. Migraine sufferers tend to be wired with brains that like things to be stable and regular. 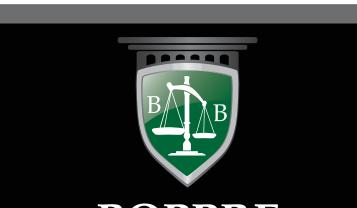

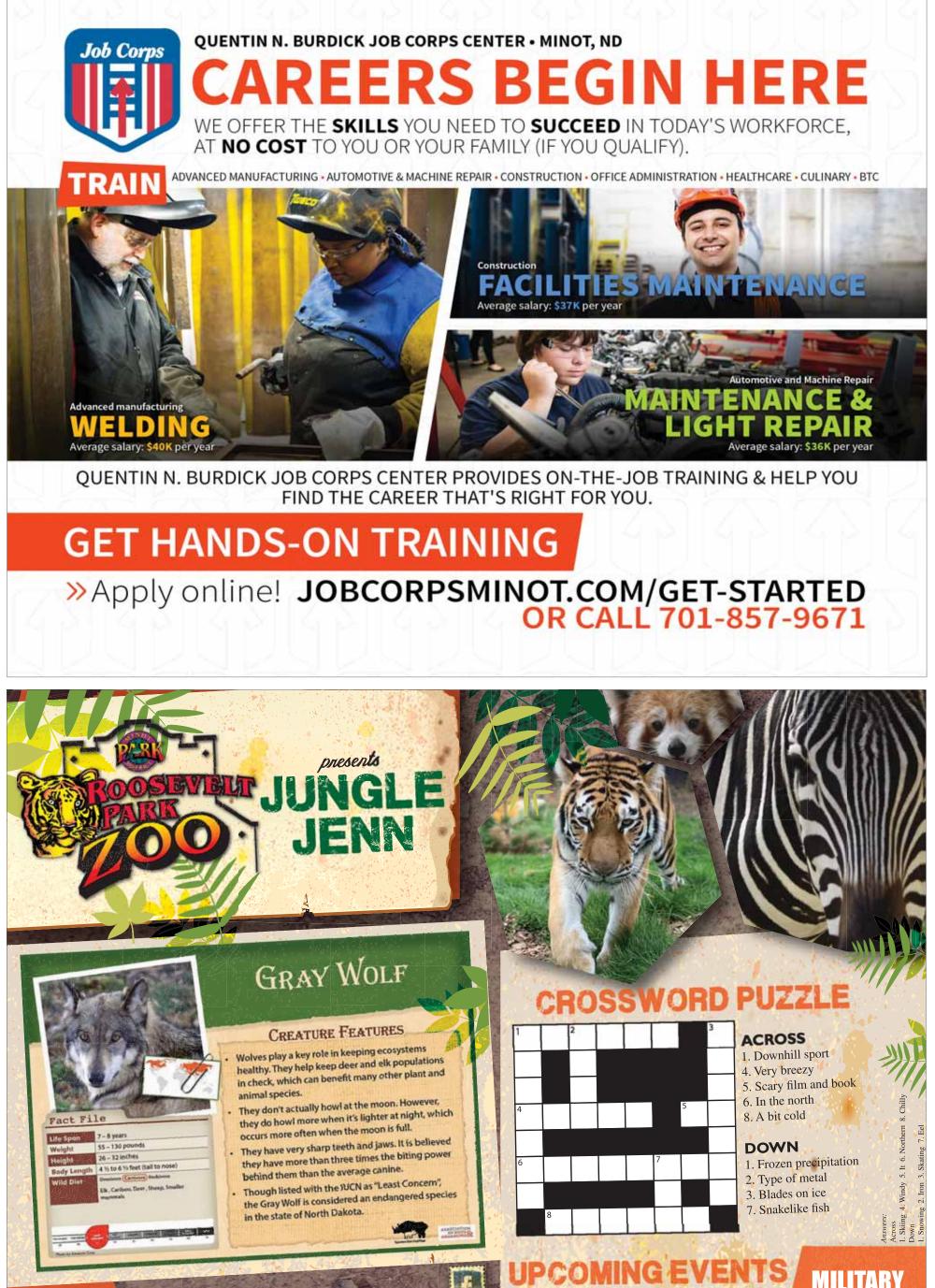
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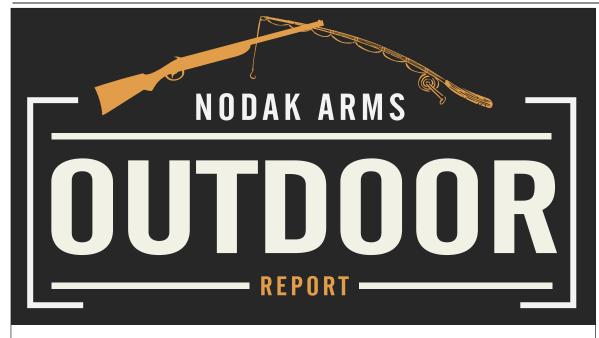

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# US B-52H trains with Colombian Air Force, Ecuadorian Navy

La.-Two U.S. Air Force B-52H Stratofortress aircraft participated in "Brother's Shield" a Colombian Air Force lead exercise and in "UNITAS LXI" an Ecuadorian Navy lead exercise in the U.S. Southern Command's Area of Responsibility Nov 8, 2020.

This twofold mission began well before the B-52 crews took off that morning, there have been countless teleconferences and planning meetings to coordinate the combined training exercises between the U.S. Air Force our partner nation's militaries.

Brother's Shield was the first mission to be completed celebrating the Colombian Air Forces 101st anniversary. The B-52H crews supported the Colombian Air Force Kfir fighter aircraft pilots in air to air interception training while developing interoperability capabilities in order to increase hemispheric security and regional stability, under NATO standards

Barksdale Air Force Base, between the U.S. and Colombia. U.S. Air Force Maj. Angel Serna, 12th Air Force (Air Force Southern) Colombia desk officer, explained that the name of the exercise "Brother's Shield" developed from the close relationship between the U.S. Air Force and the Colombian Air Force. During this training mission, the Colombian Kfirs flew in a formation with the U.S. Air Force B-52Hs in order to shield them from enemy combatants.

> "Anytime we have the privilege to integrate with our allies in a fighter integration or naval exercise we are excited," said U.S. Air Force Capt Joshua Henry, 96th Bomb Squadron B-52H pilot and mission lead. "We identified a lot of similarities in the way that the Colombian's conduct their intercept training and working with the UNITAS exercise proved to be very beneficial as well. Further developing our tactics, techniques and procedures with the navy is always beneficial

for us as an air player since this is not something we have the opportunity to train on a consistent basis with real time naval assets."

UNITAS is an annual naval exercise conducted in the Atlantic and Pacific waters around Central and South America. The Ecuadorian Navy hosted this year's exercise Nov 2-11, with participants from eleven countries. The B-52 crews integrated and trained with joint forces for UNITAS to include the Ecuadorian Navy to provide a simulated dynamic targeting capability for naval forces.

"I haven't worked with the Colombian or Ecuadorian militaries before, but anytime that we as a community have an opportunity to work with partner nations we always learn a lot," Henry said. Colombia and Ecuador were very professional and a lot of our lessons learned were developed from the planning stages."

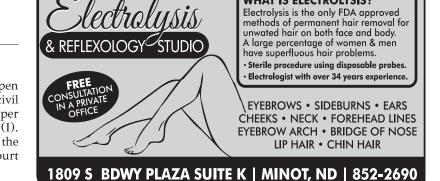

## A LOOK BACK THIS WEEK IN USAF HISTORY

USAF AIR DROPS BRIDGE SECTIONS TO FUNCHILIN PASS \_\_\_\_\_\_ DECEMBER 7, 1950 \_\_\_\_\_\_



The blown-out bridge at Funchilin Pass. (USAF Photo) After several days of unrelenting conditions and Chinese attacks, the U.S. Army's Tenth Corps and 1st Marine Division found themselves stuck on the wrong side of a bridge spanning the 1,500 foot gorge in the Funchilin Pass, Korea. 10,000 troops and 1,000 vehicles spent 38 hours maneuvering down the 11-mile mountain path to safety, only to find that the Chinese had blown out the bridge. Crossing the 16-foot gap

with vehicles, supplies, and exhausted soldiers seemed an impossible feat. However, Maj. Gen. Oliver Smith, commander of the 1st Marine Division, would not allow this setback to stop them. He requested an air drop of Treadway Bridge and plywood planks from Combat Cargo Command. On Dec. 7, 1950, eight C-119s from the 314th Troop Carrier Group deployed to the Pass. The planes carried one 2,900 pound bridge section each and dropped them in an unmarked zone. On the morning of Dec. 8, the stranded soldiers were able to rebuild the bridge and leave the Funchilin pass, escaping harm's way. The Air Forces involved in the mission also evacuated thousands of troops and tons of cargo, as well as dropping necessary supplies for the troops fighting. 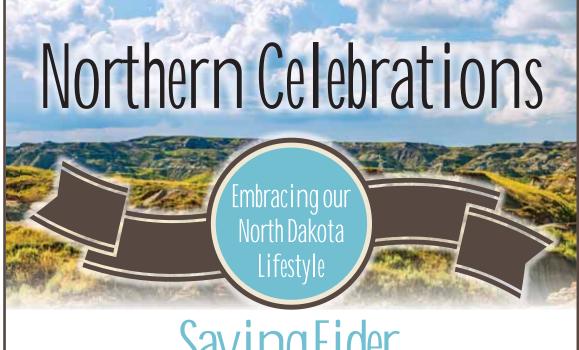

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## SavingEider Patricia Stockdill

So many things go through one's mind in the eternity that is the split second of realization assessing the severity, the danger confronting oneself: If it took losing my shotgun, my beloved Citori over and under, so be it.

I had to save Eider.

Our family has an unspoken rule – never, ever hunt along water's edge in late fall when ice forms along Lake Sakakawea's shoreline. We always, I repeat, always, follow that rule. Living along the lake brings healthy respect any time of year. We know that.

It's a rule I repeated to myself when Eider, our 11-year-old Brittany, and I went pheasant hunting on a gorgeous November afternoon calm, sunny, and warm.

We worked an area we've been many times, pausing on a hilltop so Eider could rest and get water.

Our return route took us halfway between the edge of a steep cliff and the public land boundary. As I passed along a chokecherry thicket, I checked for Eider. Not seeing her, I walked to the edge.

To my horror, she found an area to easily go down to the shore.

She was on the ice.

There was open water at the shoreline everywhere else on our hunt, but Eider went down the cliff at a narrow channel. Unknown to me, it iced over. I couldn't see it until I walked to the edge.

Calling her name, she turned, looked up, and walked towards shore.

Then the horror occurred: She broke through. Desperately swimming around in a small circle of open water, she couldn't pull herself out.

I already knew I couldn't reach her as I scrambled down the cliff, emptying my shotgun shells along the way. My mind was processing what I needed to do: If I could stand on shore and tap the ice with my shotgun, she could swim safely to shore.

As a former Hunter Education instructor, I know the No. 1 rule of ice safety – never venture to an open ice edge to try to save someone.

I didn't care. "Eider, we're in this together," I told her.

The shotgun became an axe. Grasping it firmly, I swung the butt end overhead as if chopping a log towards the open hole of water and Eider's face. Thankfully, she didn't panic as if knowing I would help and she didn't swim away.

For all of the details that will remain in my mind, I don't know how many "axe" swings I took with that shotgun butt slamming the frozen surface before the ice broke and Eider could swim towards me so I could grab her.

My swinging pushed my weight forward, driving my foot and boots into the mucky shore.

I hadn't fallen onto the ice but now I had to try to pull my foot out without losing my balance, potentially propelling me towards the ice and water.

With Eider preoccupied shaking off water, I supported myself with my hands on the ground, jerking my foot lose several tugs later.

Covered in mud, I grabbed my shotgun -Eider's lifesaving axe – and we scrambled back up the cliff for the one-half mile walk to the vehicle.

Wrapping her in a blanket, I said a prayer.

We never break our unwritten rule to say away from the water's edge when we're hunting during early ice-over.

Eider and I didn't break it that afternoon; neither of us knew ice formed in the channel. It simply wasn't visible from any of the angles we could see.

She was a dog; she wasn't thirsty when we were near the open water shoreline. And she already had water from her bottle I always carry for her. I didn't know she was thirsty.

We had no idea the danger that lurked below us.

My beloved Eider is fine, sleeping on her doggie bed in my office as I type.

My beloved Citori isn't.

But that's OK. It can be fixed or replaced. Eider needed help.

I was able to get her out from the shoreline's edge. I was able to pull myself from the muck without falling in.

We were lucky. Very lucky.

Yet we didn't do anything wrong, our intended route wasn't anywhere near the cliff edge or ice

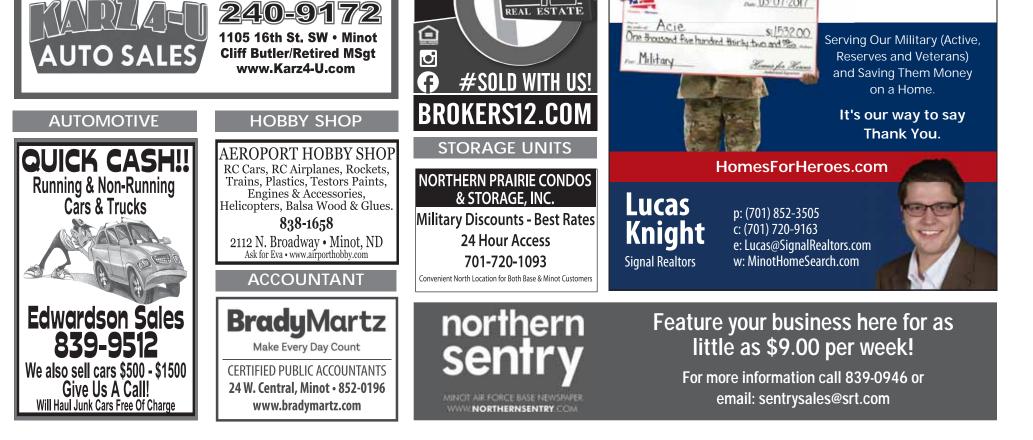

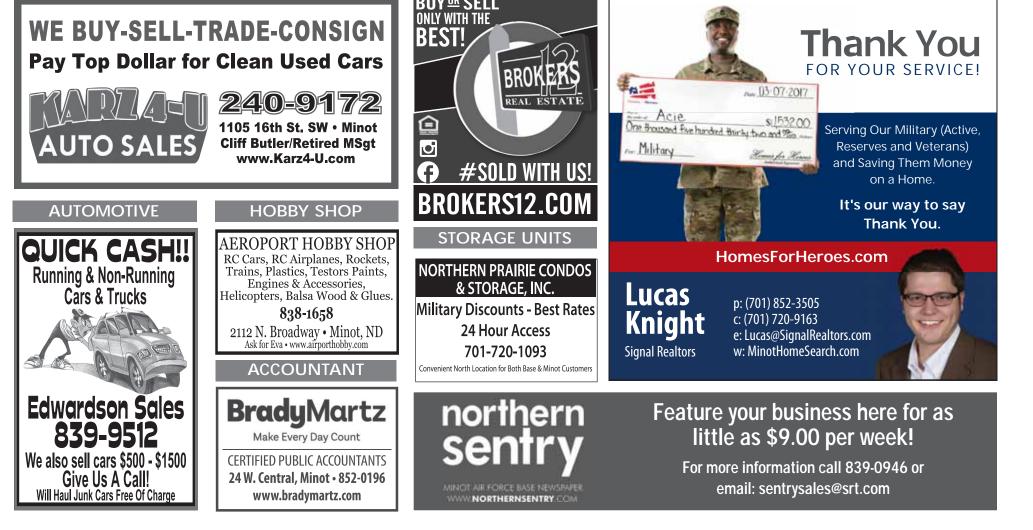
