

# **B-52s arrive at Andersen AFB for Bomber Task Force deployment**

ANDERSEN AIR BASE, Guam (AFNS) --

Four U.S. Air Force B-52H Stratofortress returned to the Indo-Pacific region Jan. 28 for a Bomber Task Force deployment, conducting operations out of Andersen Air Force Base.

The bombers, from the 96th Bomb Squadron at Barksdale AFB, Louisiana, deployed in support of Pacific Air Forces' training efforts with allies, partners and joint forces. These strategicdeterrence missions reinforce the rules-based international order in the Indo-Pacific region.

"Deploying as a Bomber Task Force exercises our ability to produce agile, combat power in any location we are needed," said Lt. Col. Christopher Duff, 96th Bomb Squadron commander. 'Our strategic bomber missions demonstrate our always-ready global strike capability. We remain ready to deploy to reach

anywhere in the world at any time."

U.S. Strategic Command units regularly conduct training with and in support of the geographic combatant commands. USSTRATCOM Bomber Task Force missions help maintain global stability and security while enabling units to become familiar with operations in different regions.

"Bomber Task Force deployments also provide our Airmen opportunities to train and work with our allies and


partners in realistic, joint coalition operations and exercises," said Duff. "It ensures that we continue to maintain the highest level of proficiency and readiness."

point out that his plane is just as lethal as the other 2 more modern bombers in the Air Force arsenal. "This is not a special mission. We are used to flying half way around the world and returning the same day" according to Huyler.

Once Global Strike Command announced the flyover earlier this week, Capt. Huyler has been receiving plenty of social media messages. "Everyone is excited in the wing" according to Capt. Huyler, and for Minot AFB, the 5th Bomb Wing and the 23rd Bomb Squadron it will be special recognition of the mission they perform every day.

#### What Are Abandoned Minerals?

Many mineral owners and landowners are familiar with the concept of "abandoned" minerals but are not quite sure what that means. According to the North Dakota Century Code, a mineral interest is considered abandoned if it is "unused" for twenty years (N.D.C.C. § 38-18.1-02). A mineral is considered "used" under several different circumstances including production; operations are conducted "for injection, withdrawal, storage, or disposal of water, gas, or other fluid substances;" if the mineral interest is "subject to a lease, mortgage, assignment, or conveyance of the mineral interest recorded in the office of the recorder;" or if the mineral interest is subject to a recorded pooling or utilization agreement (N.D.C.C. § 38-18.1-03(1)).

But what if your mineral interests are non-producing with no operations being conducted and haven't been the subject of a recorded document for over twenty years? How can you prevent your interests from being "abandoned"? The final definition of a "used" mineral interest provides a safety net: a used mineral interest can also be an interest for which "a proper statement of claim is recorded" (N.D.C.C. § 38-18.1-03(1)(f)).


This "statement of claim" is more fully referred to as a "Statement of Claim of Mineral Interests" and it is governed by the same section of the North Dakota Century Code. This document essentially states the legal description of the mineral interest, the name and address of the interest owner, and is recorded in the proper county's office of the recorder.

So what happens if a mineral is unused and a Statement of Claim is not recorded after twenty years? The surface owner of the same legal description can initiate an action to succeed to the ownership of the lapsed mineral interest. This process requires notice to the mineral interest owners of record as well as a quiet title action in District Court, giving the mineral owner an opportunity to contest the proceedings.

## New Defender SUVs provide cooler, smoother ride for canines

JOINT BASE SAN ANTONIO-LACKLAND, Texas (AFNS) --

The Air Force Security Forces vehicle program delivered the first of new military working dog patrol vehicles to Robins Air Force Base, Georgia, as part of their initiative to modernize Defender equipment across the Air Force.

The improvements previous patrol vehicles is the result of AFSFC's vehicle program's input to the Federal Service Law Enforcement Vehicle Standardization initiative and is focused on keeping MWD handlers and canines mission-ready.

Security Forces members at Robins learned about the vehicle "hot dog" system, which automatically kicks in when the interior gets too hot for the canines. The full-size sport utility vehicles also have a more spacious interior that gives the

dogs a more comfortable ride.
"These new vehicles are definitely an upgrade," said Staff. Sgt. Matthew Cerulli, MWD handler with the 78th Security Forces Squadron. "I think the best thing is the 'hot dog' system, which, in case of an emergency,

we have to leave our dog in the vehicle and it gets too hot, an alarm will go off, the windows will roll down and the A/C will crank on to help keep the canines

"However, I think the dogs" favorite thing is the additional room. We have some large canines and in this new vehicle they can get up and stretch out as needed," Cerulli added.

"AFSFC's Vehicle Program seeks efficiencies in vehicle procurement, decreases redundancies and streamlines processes to improve law enforcement readiness," said Master Sgt. Michael Roth, Security Forces vehicle program manager at AFSFC.

Prior to the FEDSLEVES program, units sourced their own funds to purchase the necessary equipment, which required local vendors to upfit vehicles after they arrived at the installation.

"This program provides security forces units with vehicles that are standardized with preinstalled equipment packages," Roth said. "We also provide funding for (other) equipment in these vehicles, allowing them to go on patrol immediately. We're saving the units \$17,700 per patrol vehicle and \$19,500 per MWD patrol vehicle, so we're saving the unit both time and money."

Defenders at Robins AFB and their canines are rolling out in these ready-to-go SUVs.

"These vehicles are a big step forward in keeping our mission ready here at Robins Air Force Base," said Tech. Sgt. Seth Wilson, 78th SFS kennel master. "Our mission, along with the military working dogs, is to keep everyone on base safe, and these new vehicles allow us to focus more on accomplishing that."

Additional improvements include a radio prep package, which allows operators to plug and play their current radio systems, an upgraded emergency lighting and public address system, and increased weapons storage in the rear cargo area.


"These new MWD vehicles are a product of the hard work of the Air Force Security Forces Center's Vehicle Program team to modernize the fleet and keep Defenders and their canines mission ready," Roth said.

Security Forces units can expect to receive the new vehicles as their current ones reach their end-oflife cycle, Roth added.



## LOOK BACK

THIS WEEK IN USAF HISTORY USAF AIRLIFTS SUPPLIES TO NEW ENGLAND AFTER

**DEVASTATING BLIZZARD** FEBRUARY 8-17, 1978

In early February 1978, a massive blizzard blanketed New England in 27 or more inches of snow accompanied by winds up to 90 miles per hour. Approximately 54 people from Massachusetts, Connecticut, and Rhode Island died as a result of the storm, and nearly 2,100 coastal homes were destroyed. On February 8, 1978, Air Force cargo aircraft from units across the country began flying Army personnel, snow removal to the areas affected. Over the

course of the next week, Air Force C-5s, C-141s, and C-130s airlifted over 1,000 personnel and 2,339 tons of snow removal equipment to the New England area. Equipment included generators, communications equipment, bulldozers, and more. The mission, named after a similar operation in Ohio just a week prior, was called Operation Snow Blow II.







# Minot Area Council of the Arts allocates \$15,000 toward grants

The first round of \$500 grants will be made available to artists, groups, and organizations who were members of the Minot Area Council of the Arts in 2020. Depending on participation, a second round may be made available to new members who join in 2021.

## 'Continuity,' 'maintaining momentum' define John Roth's goals as acting Air Force secretary

ARLINGTON, Va. (AFNS) --

After decades of distinguished service, including at the highest levels of the Air Force's leadership, John P. Roth decided recently it was time to retire.

As a non-partisan civil servant for most of his career, Roth, 68, figured the new administration's arrival Jan. 20 would be the proper time to step aside after 47 years in federal service. It would be the perfect moment for a clean, natural break.

Then, reality arrived.

The transition team for President-elect Joe Biden asked Roth to step in as acting secretary of the Air Force. Roth accepted even though the job as acting secretary is one of the more difficult – and underappreciated – in all of government. It is a position that, by definition, is both temporary yet open-ended. It requires strong leadership but also restraint.

Even so, Roth didn't hesitate.

"If I can help, I'm happy to serve," Roth said during a Jan. 26 interview when asked how he responded to the Biden team's overture. "That's what I've done for 40 plus years; so a matter of perhaps a few more months, I'm

No one knows how long Roth will be serving as acting secretary. The Biden Administration must find and vet a nominee to put forward as the next secretary of the Air Force and then the Senate must consider and approve that

Regardless of how long it takes, Roth is clear-eyed about his approach to the job and his priorities.

When asked for his mandate in the job, the words "continuity" and "maintaining momentum" pepper Roth's description. His job, he says, is to keep the Total Force prepared and ready and to make sure the elements that have defined the Department's success remain in place.

"We as an enterprise need to continue our momentum," Roth said. "I think we have a terrific leadership team, both military and civilian. When the Chief (Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Charles Q. Brown, Jr.) talks about accelerating change or losing, I think that's an important concept. And obviously we are little beyond the Space Force's one year anniversary; we need to keep the momentum (Chief of Space Operations Gen. John W. Raymond) has established to build the Space Force moving forward, as well," he said.

"It should be transparent to Airmen and Guardians, and with any kind of luck, transparent to the nation, that we continue to do our mission," Roth said. "We're here to defend the country. We're here to represent U.S. interests. We're locked and loaded, and ready to go. Part of my job is to ensure that kind of stability and continuity."

Roth is perhaps the ideal candidate for the job.

As assistant secretary of the Air Force for financial management prior to being selected acting secretary, Roth managed the Department's sprawling budget and complex fiscal matters. That

job gave him an intimate view into almost every segment of the Department's operations.

Moreover, during his long tenure he served temporarily twice as undersecretary of the Air Force, which carried an even broader portfolio.

"A lot of the things that go to the secretary run past the under's inbox," he said. "I'm a trained budgeteer, and that's my sweet spot, but I did get involved in manpower issues and things like promotion boards, Departmentwide studies, and disciplinary matters. All of that, which I personally found fascinating, exposed me to other issues across the Department."

There's one other trait as well that Roth carries to the role. In a city where many are constantly reaching for the next, permanent post, he has a different perspective.

"I'm not auditioning for any job; I'm not looking for any other particular thing," he said. "I'm here to serve Airmen and Guardians. We are a missionoriented enterprise. We owe it to the American people to be ready to go and support American interests."

Roth uses a sport analogy borrowed from another acting official, Deputy Secretary of Defense David L. Norquist, who served briefly as defense secretary until Lloyd Austin was confirmed and installed. Norquist told Roth the job is like running a relay race and requires the ability to "hand off the baton" cleanly to whoever

"My plan, in whatever time period required, is to hand the baton off to somebody else," Roth said. "My goal is to ensure that the enterprise is able to continue to

operate in its normal, outstanding fashion and that I support the Airmen and the Guardians in terms of getting them what they need to do their jobs."


Asked for more specifics, Roth said, "Telling the Department of the Air Force's story and representing Air and Space Force interests as we launch into completing the (fiscal year) 2022 budget.

"My point is, the machinery needs to keep moving. We can't afford to sit idle. We need to keep the momentum on both the air side and the space side, and make sure we continue to focus ourselves on achieving the things the National Defense Strategy requires us to do," he said.

Serving as an acting secretary is a capstone in a career that has deep and multi-layered connections to the military for his entire life. Roth was a self-described "Army brat" who was born at what was previously known as Walter Reed Army Medical Center. His father had a long career in the Army and is buried at Arlington National Cemetery.

But his military roots are even more diverse. After earning his degree at the University of Virginia, Roth went to work for the Navy as a financial manager. He then moved to the Department of Defense and, finally to the Air Force. His brother, meanwhile, served in the Marine Corps.

"In the course of all this I punched a ticket in learning about all of the services. Maybe if I'd stuck around long enough, I would have been able to join the Space Force," he joked. "I have about as joint a perspective on the enterprise as you can get."

The Air Force announced 10 Airman leadership qualities which are now being integrated into a new feedback tool, for officers in the grades of O-1 through O-6 and senior noncommissioned officers in the grades of E-7 through E-9, to facilitate discussion between rater and ratee.

The qualities, found in the Airman Comprehensive Assessment Addendum - AF Form 724-A, focus on character and competence and are categorized under four major performance areas which coincide with both the major graded areas of the Air Force Unit Effectiveness Inspection program and the language used to describe expected performance factors provided to promotion boards: executing the mission, leading people, managing resources and improving the unit.

"The adjustments toward these new leadership qualities are imperative to shift the way we measure, incentivize, and reward the Airmen we need for the future," said Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Charles Q. Brown, Jr,. "We must have evaluation systems that provide constructive feedback, evaluate against qualities we value, and highlight future potential."

The Airman leadership qualities are expected to form the basis for the future officer and enlisted performance reporting systems. The alignment between evaluating units and evaluating Airmen is intended to further emphasize and accelerate an understanding and adoption of the associated leadership qualities.

"The major performance areas and Airman leadership qualities were developed over the last two years by looking at industry and sister service best-practices, academic literature, and most importantly the attributes we know will be required of our Airmen. They were refined over a series of Total Force focus groups to develop and validate the qualities we value in our leaders," said Col. Laura King, Air Force Talent Management Innovation Cell director. "We designed the addendum to be used in conjunction with the primary Airman Comprehensive Assessment form to serve as a guide for raters to help facilitate actionable discussions during feedback that incorporate the Airman leadership qualities."

Each Airman leadership quality is assessed on a five-point scale of proficiency levels: does not meet expectations, developing, proficient, highly proficient and outstanding. They are currently grade independent, understanding raters will account for the relative expectation based on rank and Air Force specialty code.

Over the past two years, the Department of the Air Force has made several large-scale modifications to its talent management system. initiative is part of a larger reform and the next step in the implementation of a more compreĥensive evaluation system.

"To improve how we make talent management decisions, we must measure what we value. These Airman leadership qualities make clear what we value in officer and enlisted performance. Our Airmen must understand what they are being 'graded' against to provide them with a clear understanding of expectations and aid them in their future development," said Lt. Gen. Brian Kelly, deputy chief of staff for manpower, personnel and services. "The objective is for raters to begin discussing and assessing ratees against the Airman leadership qualities to provide us feedback as they introduce the new measures they will see in future evaluation systems."

Over the coming months, feedback will be gathered from major commands throughout the Air Force. The data collected will be used to refine the Airman leadership qualities and the addendum before the

new evaluation systems are finalized. While initial use of the form will be optional, leaders are encouraged to use it to the maximum extent practical.

"We are working to build a system that defines the qualities we value and need in our Airmen," said Chief Master Sgt. of the Air Force JoAnne S. Bass. "I'm very excited that we are doing that in synergy with our officer corps, it shows that we value Airman leadership qualities across the ranks, from E-1 to O-10."

The major performance areas and Airman leadership qualities

Executing the Mission

- Job Proficiency: Demonstrates knowledge and professional skill in assigned duties, achieving positive results and impact in support of the mission.
- Initiative: Assesses and takes independent or directed action to complete a task or mission that influences the mission or
- Adaptability: Adjusts to changing conditions, to include plans, information, processes, requirements and obstacles in accomplishing the mission.

Leading People

Inclusion and Teamwork: Collaborates effectively with others to achieve an inclusive climate in pursuit of a common goal or to complete a task or mission.

Emotional Intelligence: Exercises self-awareness, manages their own emotions effectively; demonstrates an understanding of others' emotions, and appropriately manages relationships.

• Communication: Articulates information in a clear and timely manner, both verbally and nonverbally, through active listening and messaging tailored to the appropriate audience.

Managing Resources

- Stewardship: Demonstrates responsible management of assigned resources, which may include time, equipment, people, funds and/or facilities.
- Accountability: responsibility for the actions and behaviors of self and/or team; demonstrates reliability transparency.

Improving the Unit

- Decision Making: Makes wellinformed, effective and timely decisions under one's control that weigh constraints, risks, and benefits.
- Innovation: creatively about different ways to solve problems, implements improvements and demonstrates calculated risk-taking.



## More winter reads

It's still winter. The nights are still long and cards only and \$24.99 includes shipping. it's still dark.

That's the bad news. The good news is there are still some pretty darn good books to read providing glimpses into what North Dakota's Great Outdoors is all about.

One thing about North Dakota - we are The Duck Factory. Granted, we don't completely encompass the entire Duck Factory, more officially known as the Prairie Pothole Region. It also embraces portions of southern Canada, Montana, Minnesota, South Dakota, and Iowa.

But we are its largest share. It's celebrated in a N.D. Game and Fish Department book bearing its name, "The Duck Factory, A History of Waterfowl in North Dakota". The history, the people, the politics – both good and contentious - and perhaps most importantly, the birds: "The Duck Factory: is a compilation of history of waterfowl in North Dakota.

It's about the American Indian who celebrated waterfowl in ceremonies, societies, and oral histories.

It's also about those who pursued waterfowl with a passion, those who detested waterfowl with equal passion, and those who value waterfowl for simply being waterfowl.

It's about people dedicating their careers to researching, understanding, and ensuring waterfowl will always be part of not just America's landscape but North America and beyond.

And, yes, it's about the economics of what it means to be home to the largest number of ducks produced in the Lower 48 United States.

An uncompleted manuscript of North Dakota's waterfowl history pivoted the revival of a project originating in the mid-1990s, culminating with the book's 2017 publication,

In its own way "The Duck Factory" provides a peek into what makes up the fabric of what is North Dakota as well as the lives of North Dakotans - those of the past, present, and in a way, looking to what could be the future.

Reading "The Duck Factory" is more than ducks and geese, hunting, and habitat. It's an opportunity to understand North Dakota. Get the softcover book from the Game and Fish Department website, (gf.nd.gov) - credit

Another great read providing insight into North Dakota, its people, and its outdoors celebrates 40 years of an iconic magazine, "Dakota Country".

Bismarck's Bill Mitzel purchased the fledgling - and struggling - publication, "Dakota Country" a year after four Garrison businessmen started it in newspaper format in 1979. More than 40 years later, it's the premier hunting and fishing magazine of not just North Dakota, but South Dakota, as well, with subscribers throughout the United States.

That's not an exaggeration. My camo cap and jacket prompted a conversation with a fellow passenger in the Memphis, Tenn. airport a few years ago while returning home from an Arkansas duck hunt. Long story short, he subscribed to "Dakota Country: and recognized my name as a magazine contributor.

Each chapter of "40 Years of Dakota Country Magazine" features a reprinted article from that year along with a collection of news briefs in a chronology of changing times: Things like a new state record brown trout - 14 pounds, 12 ounces - caught in the Garrison (Missouri River) Tailrace in August 1982. Or in June 2005 when North Dakota had the largest number of available deer gun licenses – 145,600. In comparison, the book's 2014 news brief reveals North Dakota hunters would compete for 48,000 deer gun licenses in that year's lottery.

It's a journey through time - the joy and the struggle, the contentious, and the fun of life in North Dakota's outdoors. It's insight into North Dakotans or as one short sidebar described, "You know you're from the Dakotas when..." and the list includes things like "You expect to be excused from school on the deer opener." or "You can tell the difference between a gopher and a chipmunk at 300
