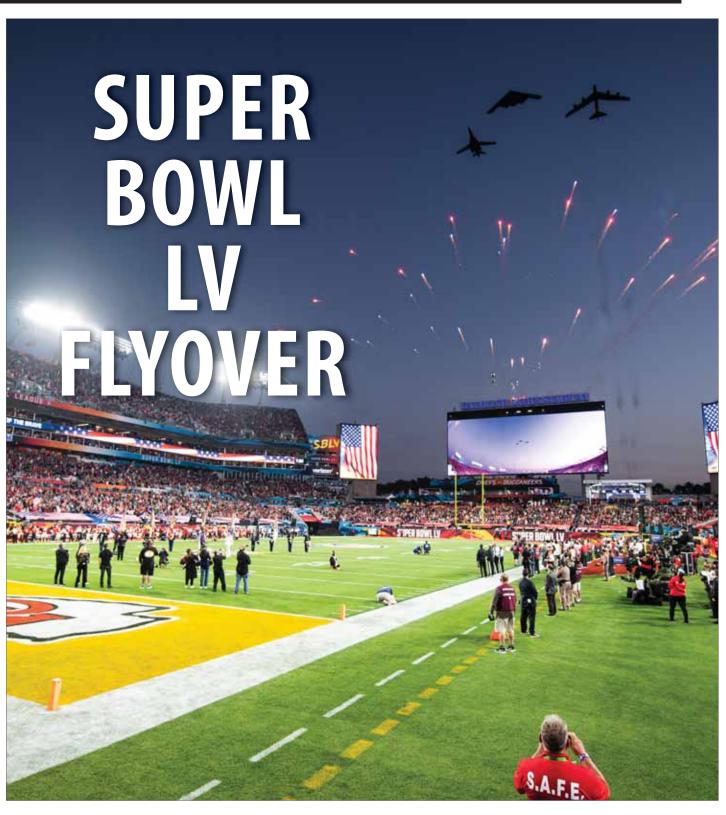

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## New aircraft parts store opens for the flight line

On Feb. 8, 2021, Col. Michael 5th Bomb Wing Commander, and Capt. Roy Cruz, Director of Operations for the 5th Logistics Readiness Squadron, cut the ribbon on a new aircraft parts store at Minot Air Force Base, N.D. The warehouse, located on the flight line, is the first parts store on base since the late 1990s.

Previously, maintainers used the main parts warehouse down the street. Once the new aircraft parts store becomes fully operational, the 5th Aircraft Maintenance Squadron is projected to save about 16,000 hours of time annually. Leadership hopes that the warehouse will allow assets to be more readily accessible to

maintainers and reduce transit time to acquire parts, streamlining maintenance for Minot's B-52s.

"I applaud your creativity, and your willingness to not walk past a problem," said Col. Walters. The project was a collaboration between the 5th LRS and 5th AMXS and has opened up an extra 5,000 square feet of space for parts.

The B-52H Stratofortress has been in service for nearly 60 years, and is one of the oldest planes still in service with the Air Force. Through the diligent work of Team Minot's aircraft maintainers and supporting squadrons, the bomber is expected to stay in service until at least the 2040s.

There was an empty desk in the office of the 91st Operations Group, one that Col. Kristen Nemish, Commander of the 91st Operations Group, knew she had to fill. The Deputy Commander position became vacant due to a retirement, and there were not a lot of options for finding an immediate replacement within the active-duty force. In Col. 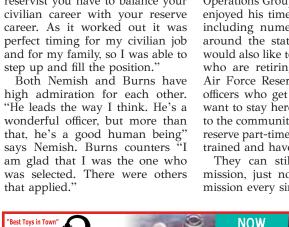
Burns is quick to point out, "it's been a great experience. As a reservist you have to balance your

that applied."

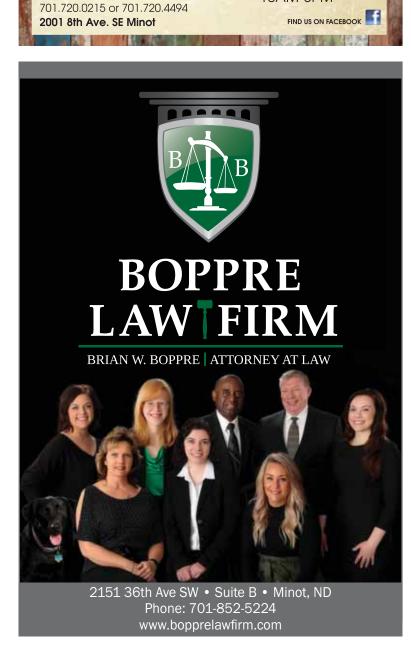

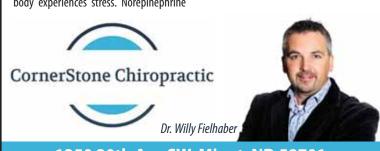

## **Dual Military Couples:**Navigating Military Life Together

According to the 2018 Demographics Report published by the Department of Defense, 10.9% of active duty Air Force members (enlisted and officer) are in dual-military marriages, meaning an active duty Airman is married to another active duty or reserve Airman. In some ways, dual-military life can be compared to a normal working couple's relationship, but it comes with its own unique set of opportunities and challenges.

Col. Kristen Nemish, Commander of the 91st Operations Group, and her husband, Retired Lt. Col. Mark Nemish, are an example of a couple with many years of experience as a dualmilitary family. After meeting at Malmstrom AFB, Mont., in 1999, the Nemishes navigated moves, career changes, and a growing family. In 2005, they were stationed together at Vandenberg AFB, Calif., and were able to get joint-spouse assignments until Mr. Nemish's retirement from the Air Force. After his retirement, Mr. Nemish took on a new career as a stay at home father, Key Spouse, and Minot AFB School Board member.

Individuals often have different career goals, and when in a dual-military relationship, it is important to sit down and have conversations about the future. There is one piece of advice in particular that has helped many dual-military couples.

"You need to have an open and honest relationship with leadership," said Col. Nemish, echoing the words of many other dual-military couples.

For Captains Dylan and Sara Fotheringham of the 91st Operations Group and 91 Missile Wing, talking to leadership actually ensured that they were able to stay together. "He told his leadership that he was going to propose, and his boss ensured would fly on the B-52 so that I could be stationed at Minot with Dylan," said Capt. Sara Fotheringham.

The Fotheringhams met in Pensacola, Fla., while volunteering at a Blue Angels show. They now have one son and three dogs, and are working through the ups and downs of dual-military life every

Some couples may opt to focus on their careers and follow every opportunity they are given. Others make the decision early on to focus on their family, and may turn down career opportunities in order to stay close. However, due to the nature of military life, the option to turn down opportunities is not always available, which is why communication and flexibility are so important in milto-mil relationships.

"It takes a lot of planning and foresight," said Capt. Sara Fotheringham. "You have to be

Capt. Matthew Rosa and Capt. Alyssa Ford of the 742nd Missile Squadron take plenty of time to plan out their future as much as possible. "Everyone's timeline is different, and we had to meet in the middle for our goals," they said. "The Air Force is constantly changing, so you have to consistently talk about what you want for your career."

Ford spent much of her early career at Minot in an office, but is now working as a Weapons Officer in charge of training. Since they met, Rosa has been moved to the 742nd Missile Squadron where he now works alongside his wife as a Squadron Evaluator. Because of their careers, they often spend weeks apart, but do have the opportunity to collaborate in some aspects of their jobs.

Even when stationed together, advantage of it by video calling dual-military couples sometimes face obstacles when it comes to performing work duties and being a parent. Being in the military can leave individuals on alert 24/7, so dual-military couples often rely on a strong support system of friends and neighbors to help with the challenges of family life.

Parents are required to have a Family Care Plan in the event of last minute changes, and many dual-military families use each other as step-in caregivers in the event of a call in. Even for Capt. Rosa and Capt. Ford, who only have a dog and two cats, there is a community of people who work together to take care of each other's pets while they are away from home.

Alongside relying on their peers, dual-military couples often lean on each other for support, especially when it comes to work. "I think our relationship would have actually been more challenging if one of us wasn't in the military," said Rosa. "I found someone with ambition and drive, someone who gets to thrive with me.'

Many dual-military couples feel that it is easier to let off steam about work when their significant other fully understands what they're going through. However, a clear line between work and personal life is important when maintaining a military relationship. "We have to make sure to we're present with each other when we're home," said Ford.

For the Fotheringhams, that meant thinking outside of the box to find ways of spending quality time together, even during a deployment. Technology has made being apart easier for families, and while deployed, the Fotheringhams took full instead of an afterthought."

Deployment, change of post, and normal job requirements often leave military couples apart for long periods of time. This can be one of the biggest challenges of mil-to-mil life, but a positive attitude and prioritizing family time when possible is one way that many couples cope with the

A mere two days after getting married, Capt. Sara Fotheringham was deployed to Qatar. "I like to think that Qatar was my honeymoon," she said. Two years later, she deployed again to England for a Bomber Task Force. Meanwhile, Capt. Dylan Fotheringham was able to stay and live his "dad life to the max," taking care of their son while his wife was away.

While deployment and career changes may be inevitable for many dual-military couples, maintaining healthy, happy relationships is still possible. The Air Force allows couples to apply for joint-spouse assignments, where a spouse will be given orders to the same base as, or a base near, their significant other, depending on the availability of jobs. It is not always possible, especially for couples in different branches of the military, but the Air Force has made strides to improve their policies to keep families together.

"At the end of the day, the Air Force sees us as individual Airmen. However, we're proud of how far we've come to have more policies to support dual-military couples and those with children, keeping dual-military families become more of a forethought year old.

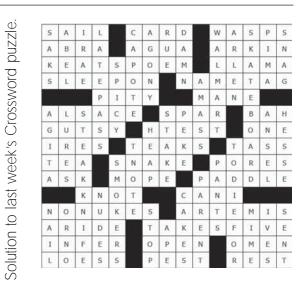

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## PROTECTING UR PAINT

Salt on the roads may make winter driving safer, but its corrosive effects can wreak havoc on your car. Follow these tips to protect your vehicle's body against the elements all

Promptly remove any snow from your vehicle using a soft brush or non-abrasive foam snow removal broom

Wash your car regularly to remove salt and debris, and don't overlook the undercarriage where road salt can accumulate and cause rust damage.

Give your car a thorough wax coat before the first snow, and touch it up with a spray wax throughout the season. Protect your vehicle as frequently as possible with garage parking, or invest in a removable cover.

Have any chips or scratches repaired before winter to prevent rust from taking hold and spreading. You might also consider applying a clear paint protection film to the areas of your car most vulnerable to new scratches or nicks.

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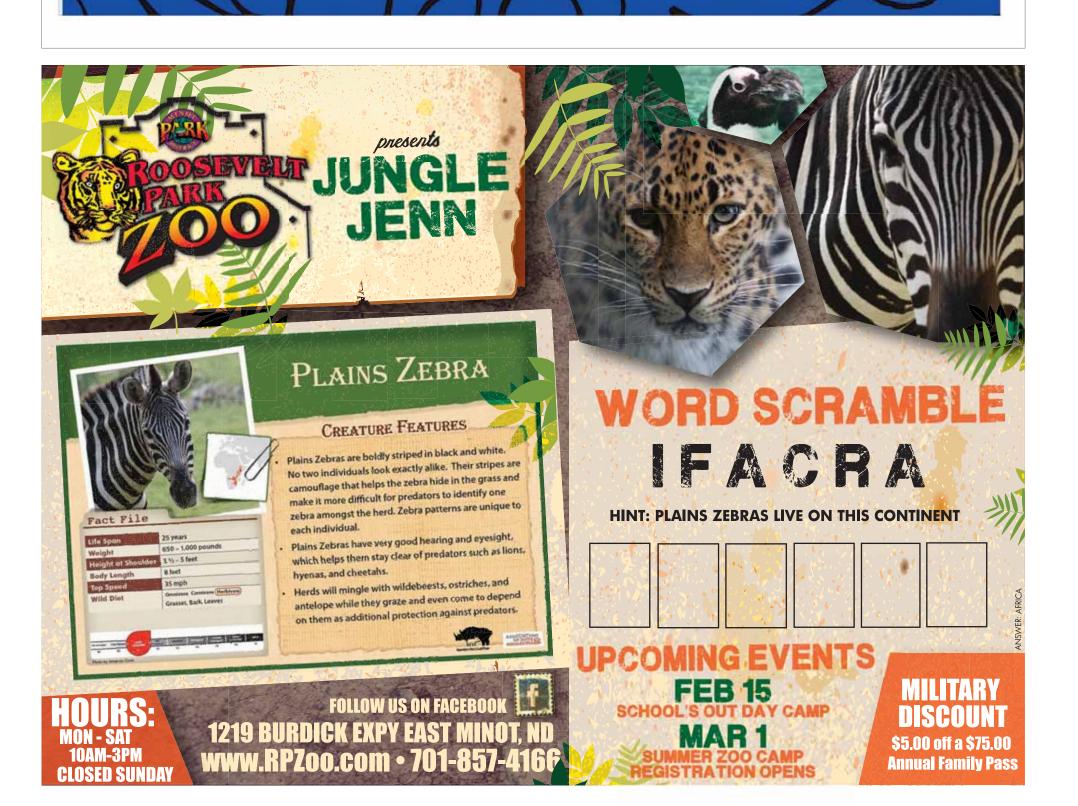
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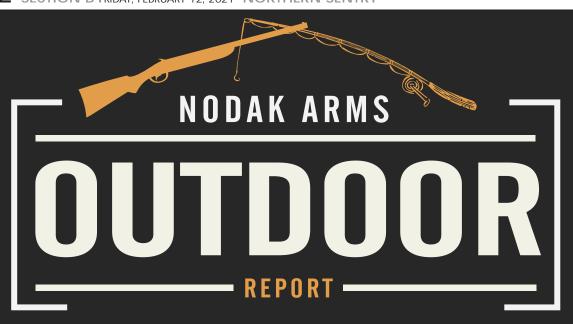

First District Health Unit has the tools and resources for smokeless tobacco users who want to quit tobacco. FDHU is educating the community about how smokeless tobacco can cause harm and encourage young people never to start using these products.

In 2019, nearly 12% of North Dakota adult males reported using smokeless tobacco in the last 30 days. Both adult and high school-aged males currently use smokeless tobacco more than six times the females' rate. FDHU recognizes the most effective way to quit tobacco is to make a quit plan. Our office assists those wanting to quit tobacco by providing educational materials and tobacco cessation resources.

In addition, the statewide tobacco cessation program, NDQuits, offers free support and coaching through phone and web programs.

"There is no such thing as safe a tobacco product," said Bonnie Riely with First District Health Unit. "The fact is smokeless tobacco is harmful and can cause a number of health risks that are associated with its use. Tobacco users should use the Great American Spit Out as an opportunity to quit."

Reducing the rate of smokeless tobacco use is a top priority for First District Health Unit because it reduces the risk of cancer, heart disease, birth defects, and even death. Events like Through With Chew Week and the Great American Spit Out give us the perfect opportunity to raise awareness and take action against tobacco use, the leading cause of preventable death and disease in North Dakota.

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## Super Bowl LV flyover took months of planning, coordination

BARKSDALE AIR FORCE BASE, La. (AFNS) --

For fans watching the Super Bowl Feb. 7, the Air Force Global Strike Command tri-bomber flyover over Raymond James Stadium in Tampa, Florida, lasted seconds.

For the team planning this historic event, however – the first flyover of a major sporting event featuring a B-1B Lancer, B-2 Spirit and B-52 Stratofortress the flyover has taken months of hard work.

"We started doing our initial planning for this flyover back in March of 2020," said Katie Spencer, Sports Outreach Program manager and Aerial Events coordinator for the Secretary of the Air Force Public Affairs Office. "The bomber trifecta flyover is something that Carla Pampe, the AFGSC chief of civic outreach, had been pitching to us for about four years, and this year it worked out for us to do it.'

Spencer and her team worked

with Pampe to get the flyover approved by Gen. Timothy Ray, the AFGSC commander. Once the flyover was approved at the major command level, Maj. Kendall Smith, the Directorate of Operations' Command lead, Bomber Force Management, began coordinating with the bomber units to see who was available to support the event.

"I reached out to all of our bomb wings and began working with them to see who had operational commitments that might conflict with the Super Bowl date," Smith said. "Then the wing commanders all got together to decide which wings would actually fly the event, and which units would send aircrew and maintainers to Tampa to represent the Air Force and AFGSC in media interviews on the ground."

After the units doing the flyover and static display in Tampa were selected, operational planning could begin.

Lt. Col. Chris McAlear is the

chief of the Air Combat Command Aerial Events Branch, and for the Super Bowl, served as the ground controller who vectors the aircraft in for the actual flyover.

"This flyover took a lot of extra coordination, because we were working with three different wings at three different bases. Normally you're working with one unit who is used to doing these types of flyovers, so it was a new dynamic for us." McAlear said. "Once we got the final aircrews selected and got the times from the NFL on when the National Anthem would end, I put together a detailed event briefing for the three flying

This briefing included maps of the area around the stadium, the staging area where the bombers would come together prior to the flyover, videos of the run in to the stadium, altitudes, time on target and more.

"It's basically everything the aircrews would need to know to get them safely in and out of the

flyover area," McAlear said. "In addition, we had to coordinate with the tanker aircraft at MacDill (Air Force Base) to schedule (KC-135 Stratotankers) for refueling of the flyover aircraft, so in all, a lot of teamwork."

The flyover also meant a lot of planning at each wing supporting the event, because for each aircraft flying, there was a backup aircraft in case of maintenance issues.

"We have contingency plans in place with backups for all three aircraft, so that means a lot of coordination with aircrew and maintainers on the ground," Smith said. "There were literally hundreds of Airmen involved in supporting this event from throughout the command."

In the month leading up to the big event, aircrews and maintainers supporting the flyover were media trained by their public affairs teams at home station, and interviews were done at each base prior to the actual Super Bowl event.

"One of the reasons we do flyovers in the Air Force is to inspire patriotism and future generations of aviation enthusiasts, and our aircrew and maintainers are great messengers to share the Air Force story," said Jennifer Bentley, chief of policy and public outreach for the Secretary of the Air Force Public Affairs Office. "This is also an amazing way to showcase the capabilities of our aircraft to the American public."

In the end, Bentley hoped all the effort and coordination that took place would culminate in a flawless flyover of Super Bowl LV.

"As the bombers soar over Super Bowl LV this year, the public will see a showcase of American airpower, and hopefully feel inspired and proud," she said. "But this flyover is also a testament to the hundreds of Airman and civilians behind the scenes who worked months and long hours to make it happen."

## Minot State offers tax preparation through VITA program

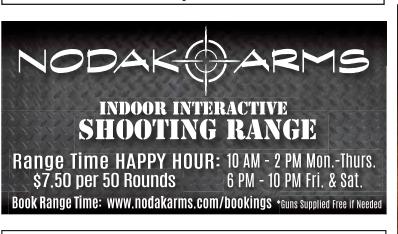

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## THIS WEEK IN USAF HISTORY

**OPERATION HOMECOMING BRINGS VIETNAM POWS HOME** 

**FEBRUARY 12, 1973**

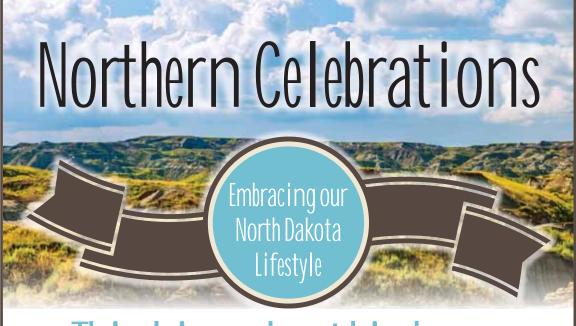
Due to the Paris Peace Accords of 1973, POWs were to be released from North Vietnam during a mission called Operation Homecoming. The first group of 40 POWs, which included some of the longest-held prisoners, left Hanoi on February 12, 1973 on a USAF C-141 Starlifter known as the Hanoi Taxi. The crew stopped at Clark Air Base, Philippines, to offer the POWs medical care, new uniforms, and delicious food

before returning to the United States. During the operation, 591 POWs were liberated. 325 of them served in the Air Force, 138 in the Navy, 77 in the Army, 26 in the Marine Corps, and 25 were civilian employees. There were also POWs released from South Vietnam, Laos, and China. Navy Cmdr. Everett Alvarez Jr. was the longest-held POW, having been in captivity for over eight years. "Everything seemed like heaven," said Air Force Capt. Larry Chesley. "When the doors of that C-141 closed, there were tears in the eyes of every man aboard."

# Thinking about birds can be a year-around thing

from Ithaca, N.Y., Cornell University, and the nonprofit organization Cornell Lab of Ornithology. In all honesty, that's OK because birds are a universal thing.

Cornell Lab of Ornithology grew from simple beginnings when Arthur A Allen came to the university as one of the country's first professors of ornithology, The story goes that he posted a sign "Laboratory of Ornithology" by his office door and that's how one of the world's leading conservation organizations -Cornell Lab of Ornithology - evolved. Today, it focuses on all things birds.

Really, this ties to North Dakota - or anywhere, for that matter - because the organization has umpteen ways to bring people from all over into the world of birds.

It's do-able in North Dakota even in the winter. For example, the Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC) is underway from now through Feb. 15. Just go to (www.birdcount.org) for

That's just one way the Lab involves everyone from scientists to avid bird enthusiasts to the casual public. The organization has an array of projects through their citizen science programs, which link information provided by people to scientists using the information for research, population trend data, etc.

In addition to the Great Backyard Bird Count other citizen science programs include Global Big Day, Christmas Bird Counts, NestWatch, and eBird, for example.

Global Big Day is really two big days, one coming up in May and again in October. The timing is perfect for North Dakota because that's when a lot of birds are migrating into and through the state. Essentially, folks from anywhere in the world simply get outside and bird for a day - part or all day, depending on one's inclination. Sightings are logged world, as well as ways to report sightings and into the Lab's eBird website, (ebird.org), more. and observers quickly see what birds were observed and where.

won't take place until December 2021 into

Granted, North Dakota is 1,000-plus miles early January 2022, people can find results from North Dakota counts - or anywhere a count was held - on the website, (www. audubon.org/conservation/science/christmasbird-count). Upper Souris National Wildlife Refuge northwest of Minot hosts a count each December, for example.

> The Christmas Bird Count launched the citizen science concept more than a century ago and it's still hugely successful.

> Project FeederWatch just might be the most amazing of all of the citizen science programs because participants don't even need feeders. Plus, it's super flexible. All it takes is a few minutes to note what birds are observed anytime between November and April: Look out a building window and check out what flies into a nearby shrub. Or look at what might be flying around trees, feeders, and heated birdbaths while walking to a store, school, or work. Whether it's for five minutes, five hours, or anything in between, just submit observations.

> This spring when nesting gets underway the Lab's NestWatch program is an amazing way to observe and learn about birds, nesting, and chick rearing. Participants learn how to become certified NestWatchers, reporting their information as well.

> Thankfully people participating in any or all of Cornell Lab or Ornithology programs don't have to already be ornithology experts. They don't really even have to know much about

> All they need is curiosity and a link to the Cornell Lab of Ornithology's website, (www. birds.cornell.edu). Clicking "Get Involved" links to their citizen science programs and other ways to get involved with birds and birding, while "Birds" is a link with a wealth of information about birds throughout the

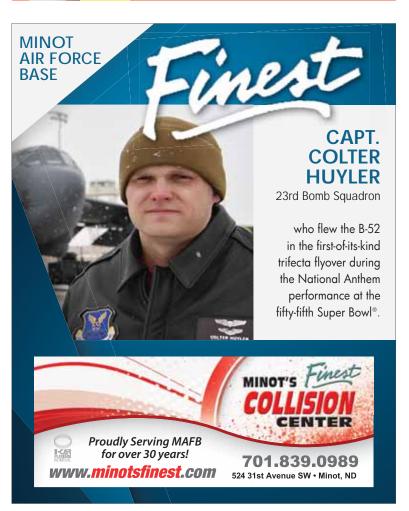

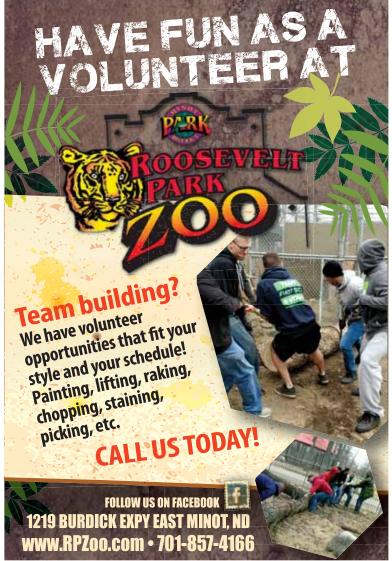
