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# Behind the Braids: Reservists play key role in first women's hair policy change in 70 years

ROBINS AIR FORCE BASE, Ga. (AFNS) --

Reserve Airmen have been instrumental in helping bring about the first major change in the Air Force's women's hair policy since the late 1940s.

As an outcome of the 101st Air Force uniform board, Air Force women will be able to wear their hair in up to two braids or a single ponytail with bulk not exceeding the width of the head and length not extending below a horizontal line running between the top of each sleeve inseam at the under arm through the shoulder blades. In addition, women's bangs may now touch their eyebrows, but not cover their eyes.

These new changes will be effective upon publication of the new standards in Air Force Instruction 36-2903, Feb. 10.

Maj. Alea Nadeem, a Reserve Airman who serves as the leader of the Air Force Women's Initiative Team, played a key role in bringing about the hair policy change.

"The Women's Initiative Team works to remove barriers for Airmen so they can continue to serve successfully and uses a common-sense approach to change outdated policies," she said. "The women's hair policy has been on the WIT's radar for a number of years."

Nadeem said active-duty Master Sgt. Johnathon Lind deserves a lot of the credit for bringing problems with the old hair policy into the limelight and tirelessly and relentlessly working toward a solution.

"For me, this all started in 2016 when I had a very courageous, young Airman who came to me and told me about all the problems she was experiencing from having to wear her hair in a tight bun all the time," Lind, who currently serves as the noncommissioned officer in charge of air traffic control training for the 4th Fighter Wing, Seymour Johnson Air Force Base, North Carolina,

said. "When I talked to my wife (who also serves in the Air Force and was deployed at the time) about this, she told me she was actually considering getting out of the Air Force because of the same problems. I had no idea it was such a problem for my wife and countless other women throughout the Air Force."

Lind and his wife, Tech. Sgt. Jocelyn Lind, started the Warrior Braids Project in hopes of bringing about a change to the Air Force's women's hair policy. Lind interviewed hundreds of women and started working with his various chains of command to try and bring about a change to the policy, with varying degrees of success. Lind said a number of fellow Airmen have been critical to efforts over the years, including Capt. Hailey Garrett, 1st Lt. Natasha Monroe, Senior Airman Emily Stanley-Cruz and Master Sgt. Ashley McCarthy.

In 2019, Lind and Warrior Braids joined forces with the WIT in hopes of accelerating a change in policy.

"We had a lot of great data and the WIT had a lot of great contacts, so our partnership was critical to getting the change approved," he said.

In addition to Lind, Nadeem said Capt. Sarah Berheide and 1st. Lt. Montana Pellegrini have been instrumental in the WIT's efforts to advocate for a change to the women's hair policy. Also, the first historic photos of servicewomen with their hair down were taken by a Reserve Airman, Chief Master Sgt. Jaimee Freeman, the enlisted executive to the chief of the Air Force Reserve.

"Our research and the research done by Master Sgt. Lind showed that the old policy actually had a negative effect on both operational and medical readiness," Nadeem said. "In addition, the policy didn't support a culture of inclusion for almost a quarter of our Total Force Airmen."

Thousands of women across

the Air Force provided feedback to the WIT and warrior braids. Many said that constraints to hair grooming standards resulted in damage to hair, migraines and, in some cases, hair loss.

When the time came to seek senior leader support for a new women's hair policy, one of Nadeem's first stops was Air Force Reserve Command headquarters.

"As a Reservist, my first thought was to find out what General Scobee and Chief White thought,"

Lt. Gen. Richard Scobee is the chief of the Air Force Reserve and commander of Air Force Reserve Command. Chief Master Sgt. Timothy White is AFRC's command chief master sergeant and Scobee's senior enlisted

"I wholeheartedly support the WIT's efforts to reform the Air Force hair policy for women," Scobee said. "It's imperative that we implement policies which account for all genders, ethnicities and backgrounds while ensuring leaders continue to foster a culture of inclusiveness. The time is definitely right to change the outdated hair policy for women serving in the Air Force."

"To me, this was a no-brainer," White said. "As a father of two daughters, I could see how the old policy could be a potential barrier for young women interested in joining the Air Force, and I could see how it was contrary to the culture of diversity and inclusion we are constantly striving for."

Scobee and White immediately wrote a letter to the Air Force uniform board in support of women's hair policy reform, saying the proposed changes would "mitigate safety, medical and operational risks, while fostering a culture of inclusion within the Department of the Air Force."

"Eventually, we got letters of support from seven of the nine major-command commanders and more than 40

commanders," Nadeem said. "Having the support of General Scobee and Chief White from the beginning was critical to our success."

With the backing of dozens of commanders and years of research and data in hand, the team made its case to the Air Force uniform board in November 2020. In late January, the board announced that the Air Force would be changing its women's hair standards.

In announcing the policy change, Air Force senior leaders expressed their support for the new standards.

"In addition to the health concerns we have for our Airmen, not all women have the same hair type, and our hair standards should reflect our diverse force," said Chief Master Sgt. of the Air Force JoAnne S. Bass. "I am pleased we could make this important change for our women service members."

Nadeem is serving in an Active Guard Reserve position as a Congressional budget and appropriations liaison with the Secretary of the Air Force Financial Management Directorate. She volunteered to be part of the WIT in 2015 while serving on active duty. In 2017, she was asked to lead the team.

"We have more than 600 activeduty, Reserve, Guard and civilian volunteers serving on the WIT," she said. "We are constantly striving to improve the lives of Airmen and their families by working with Air Force leaders to make policy changes. The new women's hair standards are a big win for the Women's Initiative Team and the Department of the Air Force."

"I think this just goes to show what you can do if you don't give up," Lind said. "If you believe what you are doing is the right thing, keep on pushing. You can make a difference."

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# An impactful moment

Graduation was held on Thursday, 11 February, for 49 Airman Leadership School students. Of those 49, 47 attended in person and 2 attended online. Commandant, as she has been since 2018, was MSgt Asua Rose, who with SMSgt Yucari Brown introduced the opportunity for students to step up on stage, in front of all of their peers, and tell a story about themselves. "We offered them all the opportunity to share a story or testimonial... something that they were passionate about, an Impactful Moment in their lives" according to Brown.

#### Dad Of The Year

The first student making his way to the stage was SA William (Billy) Roberts. Under the lights, and with a microphone in his hand, SA Roberts shared the story of the birth of his daughter last year. All births are an Impactful Moment in time, but this birth even more so as it took place in the back seat of a car and "I delivered my own daughter" according to Roberts. The Roberts family has 2 children ages 8 and 2, and a daughter born in March of last year. "My wife thought she might be in labor, so according to plans we called a friend. To be honest, it took a long time for him to get here (to the Roberts home). You know, I wasn't really believing that this was it, but we got her (his spouse) in the back seat of the car and headed out. It's early in the morning, you know, (around 4 A.M.) and we spotted a cop in a parking lot just outside of base. So, we pull up to him and I am freaking out when

I tell him that my wife is having a baby in the back seat of my car. The cop relays the message on his radio, and of course no one believes him. The next thing I know is that

wife is telling me that his {the baby's) head is out. So, I tell the cop... the baby's head is out!...and I can hear him yelling on the radio that the baby's head is out." The pace of the story continues to escalate as the baby is born in

the car. "I was panicking" according to Roberts, "more than she (his wife) was. But then there is that defining moment. The baby was born, and I am holding her. The doors of the car are open, and the cold is rushing in...and there I am, holding a slimy, wet baby. It was the most blissful moment in my life!" Roberts says with excitement in his voice. "So, what do you do? You have to make the most of that moment" exclaims SA Roberts "you just do!" The other players? SA Roberts' wife of 4 years, Amanda, and of course Avianna, the now almost 1 year old daughter born March 14th of 2020. For Roberts this story shows the strength of the human spirit to "get through a lot of crazy situations." With limited note cards prepared, SA Roberts

chose to "speak from the heart." SMSgt Brown was the advisor for this part of the Airman Leadership School, and shared

that they gave all the students a chance to take their turn and share a story. "This time there were only Airman Leadership School (ALS) however, some of the students have asked to come back to the next class and share their story or testimony' according to Brown "there were so busy with that they just

didn't' think they had the time to organize a presentation. It's like paying it forward. They have an inspirational moment to share. All of them (the students) are thinking about themselves taking the reins of leadership. They aren't just worrying about themselves anymore."

#### Sharing That Impactful Moment

Also taking the stage was TSgt Johann Gonzalez. His story was different. "I want to share a Moment of Impact. I hope it helps someone in this room." Gonzalez was given up for adoption, but on a Christmas Day his Mom returns and wants custody. The situation with his Mom and Stepfather ended up being abusive, both for his mother and for him. At 17 Gonzalez left home and his next

was a recruiting station because "I really didn't know where else to go. "My attitude? Nothing's going to scare me!" It was the Air Force recruiter that put TSgt Gonzalez's feet back on the ground by simply explaining to him "you got nowhere to go, no choice, that's why you are here." The story fast forwards to a point where Gonzales is deployed with his girlfriend of 2 ½ years back at home. "The letter, well the Dear John letter didn't come from my girlfriend, it came from someone I knew. My significant other was hooking up with my flight chief back home. I was in a dark place." But his superior "grabbed me and said, You have people who need you. You gave them a promise that you were going to get them back home. They need to get you back, so you can get them back. You gotta care!" And that was the Moment of Impact that TSgt Gonzalez needed. He did return, and now he is going steady with a college student who plans on finishing a nursing degree. TSgt Gonzalez is the primary mentor for Airman Leadership School, and he says that he has learned "a lot!"

#### Stories & Testimonials Define the Moment

For both SMSgt Brown and MSgt Rose, the Impactful Moments were important. "When you think back to your ALS experience" says Brown "you may not remember everything they taught you in class. But you more than likely remember the stories and testimonies that were shared, and that's important. A defining moment in time."

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# Airman Leadership School Class 21-B

Airman Leadership School is a program designed to teach Airmen the principles of leadership and prepare them to become supervisors of other Airmen in the future. There are approximately six to eight ALS classes held each year with 48 to 60 students in each class. The students are then divided into three separate flights until the end of

There are four main lessons Airmen are taught during the course: professional Airmen, supervisor of Airmen, supervisory communicator and expeditionary Airmen.

These sections teach Airmen drill, ceremony and retreat procedures, team leadership skills, how to perform tasks that involve both verbal and written communication, and the rules of engagement when deployed.

Throughout the six week course, Airmen go through peer assessments, enlisted performance reports, problem solving and team building exercises in order to strengthen their bonds with one another as well as their leadership capabilities. # Quick guide to 2020 tax information, resources for military families

It is time to file 2020 taxes, and service members and military families are fortunate to have access to many tax filing resources to help with the process. But before you begin, here are a few helpful things to know, including what documents are required, employee and independent contractor rights, and of course, where can you file (for free in some cases).

Keep in mind the IRS announced ot will not start accepting and processing 2020 tax year returns until Feb. 12. You can start working on your return now, though, to ensure you don't miss the deadline.

Steps for military families to complete their 2020 taxes:

Step one: The W-2s If you work for the Department of Defense as a uniformed service member or civilian, or if you are now a retiree

or annuitant, DFAS (Defense Finance and Accounting System) is responsible for providing your 2020 tax statements. Below is the list of when the electronic statements are released by branch.

•Retiree 1099-R available now

Reserve Component Air Force, Army, Navy W-2 – available now • Marine Corps Active & Reserve

W-2 – available now • Army Non-Appropriated Fund

(NAF) Civilian W-2 – available

•Active Duty Army, Air Force, Navy W-2 – available now

• Military/Military Retiree IRS Form 1095 – available Jan. 31

•Civilian IRS Form 1095 available now The full list can be found on the DFAS 2020 Tax Statement Schedule.

Don't forget to retrieve your special W-2s if you did a Personally Procured Move (Travel/Miscellaneous W-2) or had money in the Savings Deposit Program (1099 INT).

#### Step two: Civilian tax documents

If you have other sources of taxable income, employers have until Jan. 31 to send out W-2s and other tax documents. Examples of other items you may need to file are college tuition statements, bank statements, receipts, and mortgage interest statements.

If you are an independent contractor, your pay is reported on a 1099 form. You will want to gather the documents to support your business expenses before starting the tax filing process.

When in doubt, ask the professionals Military at OneSource (for free). Contact them at 1-800-342-9647. You can also use the live chat option available in the upper right-hand corner of their website.

Step three: Where can you file as a military member and military family (hopefully for

After you have gathered all of your tax documents, it is time to decide if you are going to file for yourself or use an external agency.



Military ID cardholders have a few options for free or discounted filing:

•Installation tax centers: Look up your installation's information by clicking here. In most cases, you have the option to set an appointment or walk-in.

• Military OneSource offers free tax filing support through its MilTax program. In addition to the e-filing software, MOS also provides consultants who can assist you. Click here to learn more: MilTax.

•IRS Free File – for any taxpayer with an income less than \$72,000, there is free federal filing on an IRS partner site. For income above \$72,000, access free fillable forms after Feb. 12.

•TurboTax – offers free federal and state tax filing for all enlisted personnel.

•TaxSlayer – free federal filing for all active duty military.

The regular due date to file your federal income tax return is Apr.

Step four: When will you get your refund?

This is really the most important question, isn't it? As usual, the

IRS expects simple returns that are filed electronically to have any refund paid within 2-3 weeks. But don't forget that clock doesn't start until the IRS starts processing returns in February.

Also, put some thought into what you plan to do with your return. Installations around the U.S. have personal finance and counselors, OneSource has representatives who you can speak with over the phone. Tax extensions for military service members and their families

Any U.S. citizen, including service members, can apply for an extension on their tax return by filling out IRS Form 4868.

> However, you will be required to pay interest on your owed taxes (if applicable) from the date of the original deadline of April 15 until your extension deadline. In some cases, penalties may also apply.

> There are a variety of ways military service members can get an extension. Folks who are stationed overseas receive an automatic two-month (stipulations apply. Check here for more). In the case of a deployed

service member, they will get 180 days since their last day in the combat zone plus any days they were located in the combat zone before the filing date. In other words, if a service member was in a combat zone starting Nov. 1 they would receive an extension of 165 days plus an additional 180 days.

For both those who are stationed overseas and those who are deployed in a combat zone, simply attach a statement of qualification to your return by the extension deadline.

\*PLEASE NOTE: If you are stationed overseas and you owe taxes, you will have to pay interest on the amount owed even if you qualify for an extension. In other words, if you wait to file your taxes with the two-month automatic extension (which puts a due date of June 15), you will owe applicable interest on any amount owed from April 15 to June 15. The interest does not apply to those who are deployed to a combat zone.

# A MESSAGE FROM MINOT AFB LEGAL

Due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, the free tax services offered through Minot Air Force Base's Volunteer Income Tax Assistance program will be modified for the upcoming filing season. Airmen, E-1 through E-6, will receive tax services between 25 January and 14 March 2021.

All other eligible taxpayers, including the remaining enlisted tier, officers, retirees, DoD civilian personnel, and other branches of service will be seen on a space available appointment from 15 March through 15 April 2021. As a reminder, to receive tax assistance, you must bring photo IDs and social security cards for the taxpayer, spouse, and dependants. Once you have received and printed all your tax documents, you may schedule an appointment starting 1 February 2021 by calling 723-3026.

# How Do I Set Up an LLC?

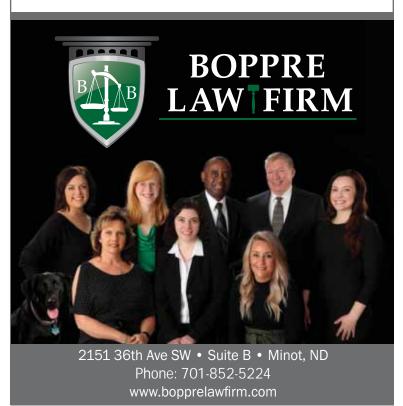
A Limited Liability Company (LLC) is a legal business entity. This type of entity has similarities to both an S corporation and a limited partnership and can be organized for any lawful business purpose. The owners of an LLC are referred to as members and these members are shielded from being personally responsible for the business's liabilities.

- 1. The first step is to draft Articles of Organization. This document is filed with the North Dakota Secretary of State and outlines the basic required information of the LLC including its name, the registered agent, principal place of business, and purpose of the LLC. Once these Articles are filed, it takes the Secretary of State a few weeks to review, approve, and complete the filing process.
- 2. The next step is to hold an organizational/first meeting. At this meeting, the members review and approve the Operating Agreement and Membership Agreement. These documents control the way the LLC and members conduct themselves. If there is any real property for the LLC to own, deeds can be executed at this time, conveying the property to the LLC.
- After organization, LLCs will hold at least annual meetings but often meet more frequently. Careful minutes should be recorded at each meeting in order to keep the business entity's records complete.

Spray a 12-cup muffin tin generously with cooking spray. In a small skillet over medium heat, warm the oil. Add the onion and cook, stirring frequently, until softened, about 7 minutes. Add the spinach and cook until wilted, about 1 minute longer. Transfer to a cutting board to cool, then chop the mixture so the spinach is broken up a little. When ready to cook, set the oven temperature to 350 ° F and preheat for 15 minutes. In a large bowl, whisk the eggs until frothy. Add the cooled onions and spinach, cheese, basil, 1 tsp salt and 1/2 tsp pepper. Stir to combine. Divide egg mixture evenly among the muffin cups. Place tray in oven and bake until the eggs have puffed up, are set, and are beginning to brown, about 18 to 20 minutes. Serve immediately, or allow to cool on a wire rack, then refrigerate in an air tight container for up to 4 days.

Roadside assistance calls to AAA often double, or triple, during winter weather, due to motorists spinning out on slick roads, flat tires, dead batteries and other breakdowns. Last winter, AAA responded to more than 312,000 roadside assistance calls. The most common calls were for tows, batteries and tires.

# Stay Ahead of Trouble Motorists can help avoid winter breakdowns with

preventative vehicle maintenance, including:

Tires: Adequate pressure and tread depth are essential for stopping and going on ice and snow, but tire pressure can drop during cold weather. Make sure tire pressure matches the sticker on the driver's side doorjamb and the tread depth is above the wear bar indicators marked on the tires. Battery: The average life of a battery is 3-5 years. Cold weather can drain batteries quickly, and leave drivers stranded. Have a technician inspect the battery at least twice

Replace old windshield wipers and solvent: Precipitation and salty spray from the roads often make it hard to see when driving during the winter. Solvent and good windshield wipers can greatly improve winter driving visibility. If you break down or spin out during a winter storm, it may take longer for help to arrive. That's why it's important to be patient and pack an emergency roadside kit that includes blankets and extra clothes to stay warm, flashlights and extra batteries, an ice scraper, safety reflectors, a shovel, a first aid kit, a simple tool kit, water and non-perishable food, jumper cables and a mobile phone and charger to call for

# Safe Winter Driving

Motorists can also avoid spinning out on slick roads by remaining alert and driving for conditions. To stay safe on winter roads, AAA offers several winter driving tips:

Slow down: Always adjust your speed to account for less traction when driving on snow or ice. This often means driving below the posted speed limit.

Accelerate and decelerate slowly: Apply the gas slowly to retain traction and avoid skids. Also remember, it takes longer to slow down on slick roads.

Increase following distance: Allow five to six seconds of following distance between your vehicle and the one in front of you. The extra space will allow you time to stop safely. Never use cruise control: Using cruise control on any slippery (wet, ice, snow, sand) surface can cause your vehicle to lose control more

Don't panic: If you start to slide, hitting the brake is the worst thing to do. Instead, take your feet off the pedals and keep your eyes focused on where you want to go. Leave early: Expect trips to take longer in winter driving conditions.

By taking a few preventative measures and adjusting your driving practices to fit weather conditions, you can stay safer on the road this

# Air Combat Command appoints first Diversity and Inclusion Officer

BASE LANGLEY-EUSTIS, Va. In Castellon's twenty years of service, she has learned that there is a lot to understand in every job and many opportunities to give back. She says her investment in the Air Force has only grown over time and she plans to utilize that experience in this Diversity and Inclusion position.

"I feel really indebted to the Air Force in a lot of ways because if it wasn't for the Air Force, I wouldn't have received my CCAF Degree, I wouldn't have been selected for a commissioning

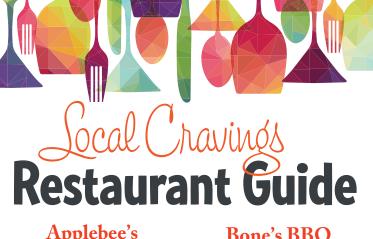

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# Challenges inspire the highest readiness level in Air Force Global Strike Command history

BARKSDALE AIR FORCE BASE, La. --

Air Force Global Strike Command's readiness levels are currently the highest in the command's history despite the global pandemic and aging aircraft across bomber and intercontinental ballistic missile fleets.

challenge challenge, command maintainers and depots have met challenges with planning and innovation. Although coronavirus has burdened the globe, it has also functioned as a force multiplier with Strikers.

"On the ICBM side, readiness is up because of coronavirus; on the aircraft side, readiness is up in spite of coronavirus," said Michael Morgan, AFGSC Operations and Communications executive director.

#### ANTICIPATORY APPROACH

From the beginning of the pandemic, AFGSC was at the forefront of response and  $innovation \\ --being \ \bar{p}roactive \ in$ establishing processes, instituting training and holding exercises as early as January 2020.

"AFGSC was out in front initially," Morgan said. "Back in February, it was our command that sent out the direction to our wing commanders to go through pandemic exercises.'

Tim Ray, AFGSC Gen. commander, has continuously praised the team's performance throughout the pandemic.

"Despite COVID-19, our forces are more ready than they've been in the history of the command," Ray said. "Because we understood the importance of executing our mission within any context, we took an anticipatory approach in the pandemic which allowed us not to just muddle through but build readiness in 2020. On the Nation's worst days, we are expected to operate and thrive. We are ready under all conditions. All conditions."

# **OPERATIONS**

In early 2020, maintenance forces were sent out to launch facilities to maximize intercontinental ballistic missile alert readiness. Because of this initiative, AFGSC ensured COVID-19 induced manpower shortfalls.

"The ICBM force's alert rates are the highest they have ever been in the command's history,' Morgan said, without releasing the exact numbers due to operation security.

In 2020, AFGSC oversaw a readiness reset for the majority of the B-1B fleet following a standdown to allow time for in-depth maintenance. In 2021, the Air Force has directed the retirement of a portion of the B-1 fleet to create a smaller more capable force and make way for the B-21.

When AFGSC first inherited the B-2 from Air Combat Command, there were many logistical and sustainment challenges to overcome. But over time, AFGSC improved sustainment.

"Even with coronavirus, you'll see the B-2 rolling in and out of 2020 with virtually no changes in readiness," Morgan said. "It has been, and continues to be, at a very high level of readiness.'

Placing continuous bomber presence missions in the rearview mirror, the B-52 has played a significant role, alongside the B-1B and the B-2, in supporting dynamic force employmentfostering an era of strategic predictability with operational unpredictability and increasing manning availability as personnel can now carry out missions anytime, anywhere from their home stations

"Because you're not taking groups of Airmen and deploying them for six months in Guam or Al Udeid, they are ready at the homefront all over the country," Morgan said.

Whether it is from an ICBM, airframe, or aircrew perspective, operational readiness continues to significantly increase across the command due to the ability to accelerate change and innovate in the middle of a pandemic.

COVID-19 created barriers and forced Airmen to socially distance, or work from home. Although distance presented obstacles, it also provided opportunities to increase productivity.

"We've learned a lot this year with teleworking," Morgan said. our eyes to some of the things we can do virtually rather than physically.'

Teleworking presented opportunities for the command to focus, without distraction, on updating policies, instructions, supplements and directives.

"We're relatively caught up," Morgan said. "I've been with the command since it was stood up and for the first time in my experience, all of our ops AFIs are current. There is not one single one that is behind the power

A fundamentally important piece to AFGSC's success in communication is the fact the command minimizes bureaucracy.

"I've worked in MAJCOMs where it's taken me three or four months to get on the four-star's calendar, we don't have that issue or challenge here," Morgan said. "If it's important, we can get to the commander within a handful of days or even a handful of minutes, depending on what it is by leveraging a collaborative group and board construct implemented by Gen. Ray."

Bomber crews, missileers, and all supporting functions have maintained a mission-ready posture throughout the pandemic.

"AFGSC has been extremely successful at managing and mitigating the impact of COVID-19," said Col. Karyn AFGSC McKinney, deputy command surgeon.

From anticipatory approaches to increased communication, AFGSC's successes in establishing and maintaining readiness have been the product of a willingness to plan, adapt and innovate.

"COVID got us to communicate more," Morgan said. "There are some things we are doing now that will never go back.'

However, looking forward to 2021 and beyond, there are many challenges AFGSC must still face, such as force modernization.

"When you go from old to new, there is a bow wave of workload, manpower and resources,' Morgan said. "Looking forward I would call it a target rich environment to overcome deterrence for our nation.

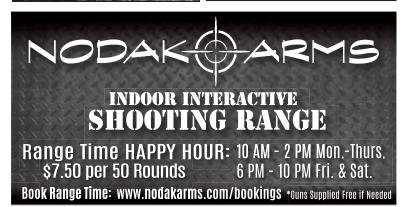

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# LOOK BACK THIS WEEK IN USAF HISTORY

FIRST TEST SATELLITE OF USAF NAVSTAR GPS IS LAUNCHED INTO ORBIT **FEBRUARY 22, 1978** 

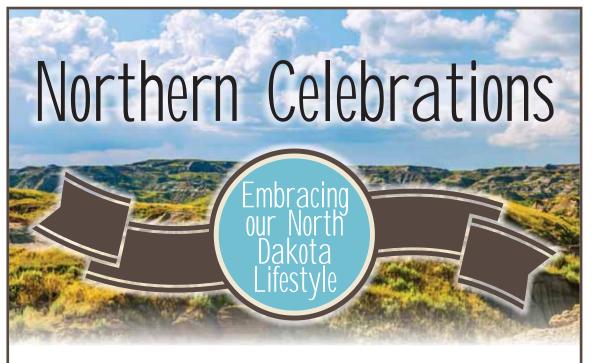
NAVSTAR 1 was the first GPS satellite launched from Vandenberg AFB, California. (USAF Photo)

On February 22, 1978, the United States Air Force launched its first Global Positioning System satellite into orbit. Known as NAVSTAR 1 or OPS 5111, the satellite was launched at 23:44 Coordinated Universal Time from Vandenberg AFB, California, and was the first of eleven test satellites that would be launched in the coming years. The Block I satellites were a precursor to the modern GPS constellation that provides accurate 3D location, velocity, and time information. Originally, GPS was envisioned as a military system, but over the years it has evolved to have a variety of uses for not only the military, but millions

of civilians nationwide. NAVSTAR 1 was retired from service on July 17, 1985, and the Block I satellites were replaced with fully operational  $\,$ Block II satellites, many of which are still operational today.

# Educating beginning hunting

Late winter and spring might not conjure up turn 11 in the calendar year can take a course. images of hunting. Yet in North Dakota, it's the the basics of hunting, firearm safety, and ethics and responsibility that come along with what it means to a hunter.

Now is the time of year when many communities across North Dakota, including the Minot area, host N.D. Game and Fish Department Hunter Education courses. It's the time of year when hundreds of volunteers contribute their time and dedication to introduce people to hunting.

North Dakota has one of the smallest wildlife and natural resources agencies in the country, which is why the nearly 700 volunteers scattered across the state play such an important role in teaching the Hunter Education program. As volunteers, instructors - especially those in small communities - often schedule classes around activities such as winter high school sports or busy farming times of the year.

As part of becoming a volunteer Hunter Education instructor a person must pass a background check, complete instructor training, attend in-service and training workshops, complete and submit detailed reports, and adhere to the Game and Fish Department mission and philosophies.

In other words, they're an extremely dedicated group of people contributing many hours to educate and encourage hunting, firearm safety, and wildlife conservation.

11 years of age and older, some instructors offer classes geared to specific groups, such as schoolaged students or adults only or girls and women

order to obtain hunting licenses. Children who to obtain an archery license.

There are a couple of exceptions: After the most popular time of year to teach individuals state authorized a one-time 'apprentice license" an adult who hasn't completed Hunter Education can get a small game license or apply and get drawn for a deer gun license and hunt. However, they must be accompanied by an adult 18 years of age or older with a valid North Dakota hunting license. That individual's license can't be an apprentice license, which means the person completed Hunter Education certification.

After getting one apprentice license, the individual must obtain Hunter Education certification in order to purchase hunting licenses or apply for lottery licenses.

Another Hunter Education certification exception is children less than 12 years of age can hunt with parent, guardian, or authorized adult but the child must possess valid hunting licenses.

Classes often fill early so anyone interested in attending an in-person class should go to the Game and Fish Department website, (gf. nd.gov), click "Education" on the home page menu, "Programs", and "Hunter Education".

The in-person Hunter Education course is free and includes 14 hours of classroom and handson training followed by a test.

An online course option can also be available, which includes online home study and in-person classroom hands-on learning.

Interested people can log onto the website to see if additional classes are available as well While the course is geared towards anyone as sign up to receive email or text notices when new classes are added throughout the year in the state.

Hunter education has been mandatory in North Dakota since 1979. Archery education North Dakota law requires anyone born after courses are also available at various times in 1961 who is 12 years of age and older to have the some North Dakota communities, as well, completed Hunter Education certification in although bow hunting education isn't required

SCHOOL LIAISON SPECIALIST CHILD AND YOUTH EDUCATION SERVICES Minot Public Schools student enrollment is accomplished online via the official district website, minot.k12.nd.us. Once logged onto the site find the "Enrollment" tab along the top of the page and click to get started. The registration process takes approximately 30 minutes and a computer, rather than a smartphone, should be used to complete this process. The following documents are

needed for registration: Parent/ Guardian photo ID, Copy of State Certified Birth Certificate, Copy of Immunization Record, Custody/guardianship paperwork (if applicable), Proof of Residence must apply to the dwelling (e.g.: Utility Bill - current within the last 60 days, Rental/Lease Agreement, Mortgage Statement, Home Purchase Agreement, Homeowner's/Renter's Insurance Policy, Ward County Property Tax Statement)- Parents who reside on Minot Air Force Base can use any one of the following for proof of residence: Lease, military orders, utility bill or military ID. To begin the registration process parents must first verify the school which students will attend based upon current physical address using 'Map My School', then complete a pre-registration form, create a 'PowerSchool' account, and finally complete and upload the forms. Military-connected families who live in town can opt to attend one of the base schools: Dakota Elementary, North Plains Elementary or Memorial Middle School. Kindergarten enrollment for the 2021-2022 school year is now open; students must be age 5 by July 31, 2021 to attend school in the fall. Families only need to enroll NEW students, if your child attended Minot Public School during the previous school year they will roll over to the next grade. For questions regarding the enrollment process for Minot Public Schools, families can call 701-857-4444. For general questions or questions about enrollment at other districts or private schools call the School Liaison at 701-723-1447.

# Preventing teen dating violence

What is teen dating violence? Teen dating violence (TDV) is a type of intimate partner violence. It occurs between two people in a close relationship.

TDV includes four types of behavior:

•Physical violence is when a person hurts or tries to hurt a partner by hitting, kicking, or using another type of physical force.

•Sexual violence is forcing or attempting to force a partner to take part in a sex act, sexual touching, or a non-physical sexual event (e.g., sexting) when the partner does not or cannot consent.

•Psychological aggression is the use of verbal and non-verbal communication with the intent to harm another person mentally or emotionally and/or exert control over another person.

•Stalking is a pattern of repeated, unwanted attention and contact by a partner that causes fear or concern for one's own safety or the safety of someone close to the victim.

Teen dating violence also referred to as, "dating violence," can take place in person or electronically, such as repeated texting or posting sexual pictures of a partner online without consent. Unhealthy relationships can start early and last a lifetime. Teens often think some behaviors, like teasing and name-calling, are a "normal" part of a relationship but these behaviors can become abusive and develop into serious forms of violence. However, many teens do not report unhealthy behaviors because they are afraid to tell family and friends.

How big is the problem?

TDV is common. It affects millions of teens in the U.S. each year. Data from CDC's Youth Risk Behavior Survey and the National Intimate Partner and Sexual Violence Survey indicate that:

•Nearly 1 in 11 female and approximately 1 in 15 male high school students report having experienced physical dating violence in the last year.

• About 1 in 9 female and 1 in 36 male high school students report having experienced sexual dating violence in the last year.

•26% of women and 15% of men who were victims of contact sexual violence, physical violence, and/or stalking by an intimate partner in their lifetime first experienced these or other forms of violence by that partner before

•The burden of TDV is not shared equally across all groups—sexual minority groups are disproportionately affected by all forms of violence, and some racial/ethnic minority groups are disproportionately affected by

many types of violence.

What are the consequences?

Unhealthy, abusive, or violent relationships can have severe consequences and short-and long-term negative effects on a developing teen. For example, youth who are victims of TDV are more likely to:

•Experience symptoms of depression and anxiety

 Engage in unhealthy behaviors, like using tobacco, drugs, and alcohol

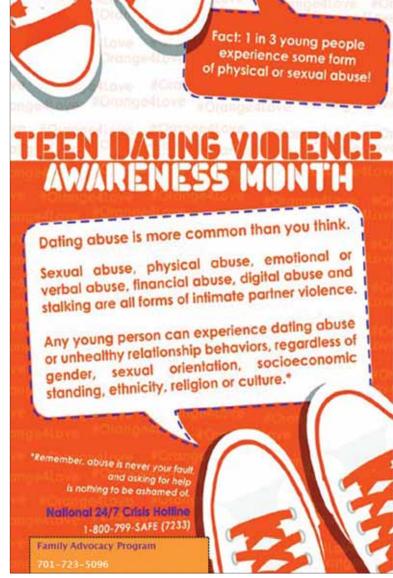
•Exhibit antisocial behaviors, like lying, theft, bullying or hitting •Think about suicide

Violence in an adolescent relationship sets the stage for problems in future relationships, including intimate partner violence and sexual violence perpetration and/or victimization throughout life. For example, youth who are victims of dating violence in high school are at higher risk for victimization during college.

How can we stop teen dating violence before it starts?

Supporting the development of healthy, respectful, and nonviolent relationships has the potential to reduce the occurrence of TDV and prevent its harmful and longlasting effects on individuals, their families, and the communities where they live. During the preteen and teen years, it is critical for youth to begin learning the skills needed to create and maintain healthy relationships. These skills include things like how to manage feelings and how to communicate in a healthy way.







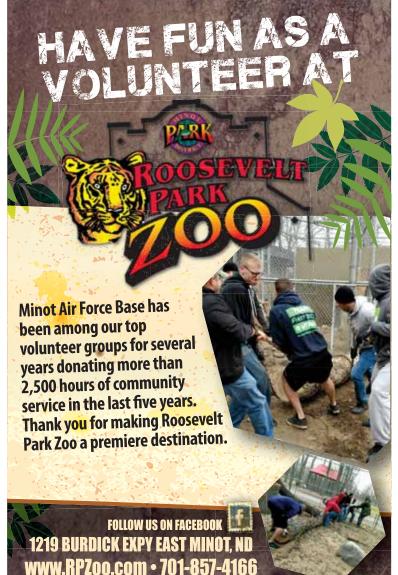

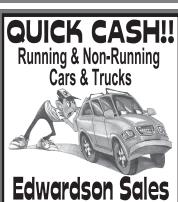
