Army & Air Force Exchange Service Honors Vietnam Veterans in Ceremonies Worldwide

Force Exchange Service honored Vietnam Veterans for their distinguished service during pinning ceremonies worldwide for National Vietnam War Veterans Day.

Veterans received free lapel pins, provided in partnership with the United States of America Vietnam War Commemoration, on March 29, as lasting mementos of our Nation's appreciation for these heroes whose service was often underappreciated.

"Many of the Veterans who served during the Vietnam War did not receive the homecoming they deserved," said Exchange Director CEO/Tom Shull. "While serving in the Army as a platoon leader during the Vietnam era, I saw many Soldiers return home broken. These heroes served honorably and made tremendous sacrifices. The lapel pin is a small token of our Nation's appreciation, reminding Vietnam Veterans that we honor their

DALLAS - The Army & Air was canceled because of the COVID-19 pandemic. The 2021 ceremonies followed Centers for Disease Control and DoD guidelines to ensure safety for the Veterans and their families. The ceremonies were contactless. with Veterans taking the pins from a tray or table.

"It's great to see any Veteran being recognized," said Air Force Master Sgt. (Retired) Stanley Richardson, who received his pin at the U.S. Army Garrison Exchange in Wiesbaden, Germany. "Especially for those of us who served in such difficult times and didn't get the same welcome home that our troops now get when they return from a deployment."

At Camp Foster in Okinawa, the Exchange gave out the commemoration pin and other mementos at the customer service desk with contactless interactions.

"I am very proud of the nation's commemoration that honors Vietnam Veterans who served and supported our country during a critical time in our history," said U.S. Marine Corps Chief Warrant Officer 5 (retired) Curtis J. Kozlesky, who received his pin at the Camp Foster store. "During the war, we gave so much; some gave the ultimate sacrifice and we are very proud to be Vietnam Veterans."

The message "A Grateful Nation Thanks and Honors You" is engraved on the back of each pin - the side closest to the wearer's heart.

The ceremonies honored Veterans who served on active duty from Nov. 1, 1955, to May 15, 1975, regardless of location.

"Even though I was drafted, it was an honor to serve," said Army Veteran Armando Enriquez, a combat engineer who survived a tour in the war during his 20 years of service and received his pin at the Wiesbaden Exchange. "I think this is great that we are being recognized because we didn't receive the greatest reception coming home back then."

The Exchange is a 50th Anniversary Vietnam War Commemorative Partner, planning and conducting events and activities that recognize Vietnam Veterans and their families for service, valor and sacrifice in conjunction with the Commemoration.









NATIONAL VIETNAM WAR VETERAN'S DAY

On March 29, 2021, a pinning ceremony was held at the Base Exchange to celebrate National Vietnam War Veteran's Day. The ceremony began with a proclamation to honor the sacrifices of Vietnam veterans. Afterwards, each veteran was given a pin, a carnation, and a goodie bag as a small token of gratitude for their service. The pinning ceremony has been an annual tradition for three years, and while the event was not as large as it was in past years due to COVID-19, it was still an important reminder to pay tribute to our nation's Vietnam veterans. "Throughout this commemoration of the anniversary of the Vietnam War and every March 29 thereafter, we will honor all those who answer our nation's call to duty. We vow to never again confuse personal disapproval of war with prejudice against those who honorably wear the uniform of our armed forces. BOSSIER CITY, La. -- Training for B-52 pilots is moving into the future via a new innovation effort by Air Force Global Strike Command and STRIKEWERX.

STRIKEWERX, the command's innovation hub, is aiding Global Strike's effort to build a stateof-the-art training capability for training pilots to accomplish air refueling in the B-52 bomber via the Mixed Reality Air Refueling Training Challenge.

The Challenge, initiated with AFWERX, is open to industry solutions from March 16 to April 13. The Showcase event for selected industry solutions will be held in early June.

It is open to all industry, government, academia, and individual contributors. The Air Force will then evaluate solution submissions with the intent of funding all, some or none of those ideas for further development.

challenge brings together virtual reality, physical components the pilots can touch and get feedback from, biometric sensors such as eye tracking, and artificial intelligence to replace an in-person instructor pilot that provides a complete solution for training pilots," explained Russ Mathers, STRIKEWERX director. "We are honored to help develop a unique solution that strengthens AFGSC and the B-52 mission."

The challenge will combine Artificial Intelligence, Augmented Reality and a physical model of the flight deck to make pilots safer and more efficient.

The challenge is seeking to solve four parts:

The human-machine interface, which is the replication of control on the flight deck

An automated virtual instructor in order to allow for students to practice by themselves

Biometrics to provide accurate feedback in the training program Making the model reconfigurable for other aircraft by the swapping out of controls

Maj. Mark Budgeon is project champion for this innovative

refueling trainer. Having previously lead innovation projects at the 307th Bomb Wing, it was a no-brainer to have him lead this effort.

"Our Commander (Timothy) Ray has interest in how far we can go with technology for this type of training. The beauty in this particular innovation project is that were focused on one particular task, which is very complex," Budgeon explained.

"There is no doubt that STRIKEWERX allows us to get to a solution at a much faster rate. STRIKEWERX has afforded us the flexibility in changing execution plans to innovate, which is directly in line with the Chief of Staff's call to accelerate 'change or die,'" he added.



This is a great base, with a great mission

An Interview with Col Christopher Menuey, Commander, 91st Missile Wing

The old saying goes "there are 2 things for sure, death and taxes.' When Col Christopher Menuey took command of the 91st Missile Wing last summer, there were 2 other "for sures". 1) That transfer of the command would take place and 2) COVID 19 would make the mission difficult, but as Col Menuey relates "There is no denying that it was hard to continue to operate through COVID 19, but we did. Their (Airmen of the 91 MW) personal lives took the hardest hit. But they maintained a determination to work through it.'

Col Menuey arrived at Minot Air Force Base in July, and COVID 19 numbers were somewhat under control. Soon after, however, the numbers would climb and base personnel would learn the meaning of HPCON (Health Protection Condition Level) Bravo, Bravo +, and ultimately Charlie. "We tried to focus on the family. During COVID 19 Airmen and families felt isolated...not much they could do. Many normal things were cancelled, so we tried to make things work. For example, Halloween took place, but we needed to have social distancing as you went through the lines. Now we are concentrating on building trust, unity and connectiveness and continuing General Ray's Striker culture initiative. We were able to roll out new on-boarding and really work on welcoming new Airmen and families to Minot. We also made an effort to reach down to the spouses and ask what we could do to stay connected with them during COVID."

Originally from Iowa, Col Menuey says "I spent my whole life there, all the way through High School." He then went to the Air Force Academy. "My first day visiting there was the day before I entered, so I didn't know what I was getting into, other than what was in the catalogue. I joined hoping to be a pilot, but my stomach just didn't agree

with me."

At the end of his time at the Air Force Academy, "I still wanted to do something operational, so working missiles was it, being I couldn't be in an airplane.

I have done 2 tours at Malmstrom Air Force Base, I started there, and I just came

After the academy I finished my training out at Vandenburg Air Force Base, went to Malmstrom in 1997. Returned back there as a group commander. I've done one tour also down at F.E. Warren, so when I came here it finished off the trifecta" Col Menuey says with a smile.

MINOT GIVES A UNIQUE CHALLENGE

Minot is unique in having the bomb wing as a mission partner, according to Menuey, "the teamwork between the wings is outstanding."

"The base is very close to the community here. There is a different vibe here" continues Col Menuey, "it's the friendliest of the communities we've been in. The business partners have taken time to build the relationship with the base, and make it better."

OTHER QUESTIONS & RESPONSES

THE MISSION OF THE 91 MW

Inter-Continental Having Ballistic Missiles (ICBMs) and the nuclear triad is foundational to our national security. Maintaining a combat-ready nuclear force is critical to that national defense. So, for this base, and the fact that we are down to 3 bases, we have come down to a pretty low number of nuclear weapons since the height of the cold war. In accordance with the START treaty, this nuclear force structure creates stability for the world and has helped prevent a great power war since the end of World War II. If we continue to move from those numbers, it would take a

lot of interaction and discussions on many levels. But it's critical that we maintain what we have, right now, and that is why we see all of the new modernization programs that are coming on line. Our military and government leadership understands the critical importance of these weapons and these systems and why we need to continue to update them and maintain the capability that we have as a deterrence in the future.

MODERNIZATION OF THE

On the horizon Minot will transition from the Minuteman III ICBM to the GBSD (Ground Based Strategic Deterrent) weapon system which will require new facilities and infrastructure to support the weapon system, on base and across the missile complex. We are modernizing everything about the weapon (ICBM). The Minuteman III that we have right now has had a lot of modifications made to it, but it's definitely had its' time serving as a deterrent and now the time has come to modernize and upgrade.

We'll be installing a modern new missile, along with that, all of the command and control consoles. The reason we need to modernize is that the Minuteman III system will face component age out and supportability challenges. We must modernize to assure continued ICBM readiness for our nation and allies.

CHALLENGES IN SECURING **FUNDING**

Minot receives outstanding support from our military and government leaders. We compete well for funding to support our base and its missions. Some of the other projects underway or scheduled to start soon include an indoor firing range and new helicopter and tactical response force facility.

Our national leaders know

how critical the nuclear missile and bomber missions are for the defense of our nation, so it isn't difficult to secure funding or explain the relevance of these missions. Providing nuclear combat power is foundational to our national security. Just like Teddy Roosevelt said, speak softly, but carry a big stick. We are America's big stick!

THE OMAHA TROPHY

Awards recognize the hard work and precision that goes on in the ICBM mission day in and day out. It's motivating and rewarding to see our hard work recognized. It's a testament to the character, commitment and credibility of our Airmen. To know that the 91 MW was recognized by USSTRATCOM as the #1 ICBM wing means a lot. This mission is an around the clock alert mission; 24/7/365. The Rough Riders never get to take a break or a down day.

When there's a holiday or directed down day, the whole wing doesn't take a knee...the mission continues. The personnel who work here are highly motivated, and they do a great job. And it's a mission that is executed with incredible precision and professionalism, without a lot of attention or fanfare. So, to see their quiet pursuit of excellence that provides incredible combat readiness and lethality awarded from the Combatant Command means a great deal.

It was exciting when so many of our civic leaders were here for the Trophy presentation. There's a community aspect to this award. The close ties and partnership the Minot AFB has with the community is incredible and like none other I've been a part of.

QUALITY OF THE AIRMEN

As far as Airmen, year by year the caliber of the young Airmen is better.

I enjoy my routine interaction with the Airmen that maintain and protect our nuclear inventory.

It's a tough mission...in a tough location. But, they have professionalism and grit that is second to none.

And retaining those Airmen?

Yes, we absolutely retain incredible talent in the Air Force, and based on the talent I see here in Minot, it's not a challenge. Our Airmen feel a sense of purpose as they provide combat power in defense of our nation. They feel a sense of family surrounded by a team that's looking out for each other. A team that strives to empower each other to lead, innovate and get after the mission. We do an excellent job of developing Airmen and caring for their families.

I get to interact on a regular basis with intelligent, motivated and hard-working young women and men that have joined the Air Force and our team here at Minot. I hear numerous reasons for why they join: some want to follow in a family member's footsteps, others are looking for a fresh start, some for the education benefits...but the underlying reason I often hear for choosing









the Air Force is how we take care of our Airmen and families. Our culture, our values and our leadership draw talented men and women into the Air Force.

WHAT WE'VE **ACCOMPLISHED**

I try to use the word family a lot. We try to help out Airmen and address family issues.

We've launched the diversity and inclusion task force, and we focus on making everyone feel welcome.

In addition, we've made great strides improving life for Minot personnel and their families.

A new welcome center was created to improve onboarding for all Airmen and families joining Team Minot. It provides a one-stop shop for all base inprocessing needs.

We have a new Housing Resident Advocate and a neighborhood council with representatives from each neighborhood to bring up and address issues.

A new ESC (Entertainment Social Center) that includes incredible video gaming with computers, Xbox, and Play

Station consoles, a movie theater room, and a table game room; a virtual reality game area and a broadcast area to stream video game competitions. This facility is leading the Air Force for e-gaming capability.

We are filling more True North positions that provide chaplains and mental health providers, which has drastically increased resiliency and caring for Airmen.

There are lots of activities to connect spouses and families from the wing down to the squadrons with meet ups at The Turf, spouse all-calls covering helpful info on various topics, and events to increase connectiveness and boost morale.

We also stood up a Diversity and Inclusion working group that is raising awareness, educating, and building unity for our minority Airmen. This includes partnering with civic leaders to explore opportunities for meeting the unique product and service needs of minority Airmen.

We have maintained high levels of advocacy to capture and maintain Department of Defense support initiatives such as

funding for the Minot Discovery Center, and adding a temperature -controlled dome over the fitness center sports fields- a long term effort that requires constant advocacy.

We brought online shopping and contactless delivery to the base commissary with a "Click to Go" program and tailored a guidance to maximize opportunities to enjoy North Dakota's outdoor areas.


FINAL THOUGHTS

Airman Leadership School Class 21-C



Airman Leadership School is a program designed to teach Airmen the principles of leadership and prepare them to become supervisors of other Airmen in the future.

There are approximately six to eight ALS classes held each year with 48 to 60 students in each class. The students are then divided into three separate flights until the end of the course.

There are four main lessons Airmen are taught during the course: professional Airmen, supervisor of Airmen, supervisory communicator and expeditionary Airmen.

These sections teach Airmen drill, ceremony and retreat

procedures, team leadership skills, how to perform tasks that involve both verbal and written communication, and the rules of engagement when deployed.

Throughout the six week course, Airmen go through peer

assessments, enlisted performance reports, problem solving and team building exercises in order to strengthen their bonds with one another as well as their leadership capabilities.

THIS WEEK IN USAF HISTORY

PAUL W. AIREY BECOMES THE FIRST CHIEF MASTER SERGEANT OF THE AIR FORCE **APRIL 3, 1967**

Paul Airey was born in 1923 and raised in Quincy, Massachusetts. He joined the Army Air Forces on November 16, 1942 and spent his more than 27 years in service as an aerial gunner, radio operator, first sergeant, personnel sergeant major, and as the first Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force. During World War II, Airey was a crew member on a B-24 bomber that was downed by antiaircraft fire over Vienna, Austria. The crew of that bomber were immediately captured and kept as prisoners of war until May 2, 1945. In 1967, he was promoted to the new position of

CMSAF, making Airey the highest ranking enlisted Airman. He aided and advised the secretary of the Air Force and the chief of staff on matters pertaining to enlisted airmen, such as assignments and promotions. He was also a strong advocate for enlisted professional military education and pushed the Air Force to give more training to Senior Noncommissioned Officers. After his time as CMSAF, Airey returned to Tyndall AFB, Florida where he became a first sergeant. Paul Airy retired on August 1, 1970 and moved to Florida with is wife, Shirley. He became an active part of the Air Force Sergeants Association, Air University Foundation, Airmen Memorial Museum, and Airmen Memorial Foundation. He passed away on March 11, 2009.

"We are able to deter our adversaries and keep our nation safe," said Brown. "Ît's an honor to be a part of the mission.'


Brown's favorite part of the mission at Team Minot is the impact the Bombers have on a global level.

28th SFS defenders receive new female body armor

ELLSWORTH AIR FORCE BASE, S.D. -- Female Airmen assigned to the 28th Security Forces Squadron received the Aspetto Mach V Female Body Armor (FBA) system at Ellsworth Air Force Base on March 2.

Previously, female defenders wore the same body armor specifically designed for their male counterparts.

"The old vests and armor didn't promote ease of movement or comfortability for women, but the new gear does as it is designed specifically for them," said Maj. Cory Cook, the 28th SFS operations officer.

The new gear has an adjustable back corset that tightens to fit, and also features a design that is not one-size-fits-all. This allows the vest to conform to the female torso and provide better coverage.

"The differences between the plate carriers are the sizes and fit," said Master Sgt. Jennifer Osborn, a 28th SFS flight chief. "Most of the male sizes are too large for smaller female frames, and the weight distribution differs between males and females."

This addition of female body armor came as part of the Reconstitute Defender Initiative, a comprehensive effort for the Air Force launched by former Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. David Goldfein to revitalize and reconfigure security forces squadrons.

"The Reconstitute Defender Initiative centers around making us more lethal and capable, meaning better training, better equipment, weapons, improved technology, and updated policies," Cook said. "The FBA is just one more step forward for increasing lethality for all Defenders."

Osborn touched on how this armor assists female defenders in accomplishing their mission.

"The more an Airman can move freely in her gear, the more agile she will be in carrying out her duties as a law enforcement officer," Osborn said.

In all, the security forces career field will receive approximately 7,000 units of the Aspetto Mach V Female Body Armor system, ensuring all female security forces Airmen will have properlyfitting, life-saving armor while accomplishing their mission.



Look for bays and shallow water areas for pike using smelt. Try Little Muddy or Skunk Hollow. Missouri and Yellowstone rivers continue producing walleye with jigs or floaters and minnows. Most small northwest lakes have open water shore-fishing opportunities but limited boat access yet.

Inside iMagicon 2021: Eric Stevens

Eric Stevens, owner and creator of ByCats4Cats, has a passion for creating. His business targets a very specific demographic: animal mascot (also known as fursuit) enthusiasts. Fursuits come in a variety of styles, giving each person the ability to become an entirely new character, even if only for a moment.

Stevens' journey with fursuits began in 1999, when he took a camping trip with some of his friends from online. He never could have imagined the trajectory that the trip would send his life on. "One guy had a tiger mascot costume. I figured I'd try it on, and it was so much fun. You're not you anymore, you're a tiger," said Stevens. "I went home and I researched what these things cost, because I had to get one, and I actually bought one but decided I didn't like it. So, I decided I'm going to try to make one. I taught myself how to sew and I did it as

In 2009, Stevens began selling his fursuits and by 2012, he took a leap of faith and quit his job at Paypal.com to pursue his business full-time. ByCats4Cats has taken off, and Stevens has sold over 350 fursuits to customers in 16 different countries across the world. "What's really cool is that I've accomplished everything I've ever wanted to do out of

my business. Right now, I hope that the demand stays high and I can continue putting out a product that people want. That's something I want to do until I

The process of making a fursuit begins with a commission request, where a customer will bring photos or drawings of ideas to Stevens. He will then send a quote and begin creating the suit, which can take anywhere from days to weeks to make. Stevens runs a one-man show and does all of the design and production of the fursuits on his own in his studio in White Bear Lake, Minn.

Each customer has his or her own reasons for wearing fursuits. Some people do it to escape reality for a while, some use it as a way to come out of their shell and show off a different side of their personality, and some want to just have fun! "It's something that somebody personally creates for themselves. It's like roleplaying or cosplaying but a lot more personal. When you put on the suit, you just lose all your inhibitions, and you're not yourself anymore. The simplest way to put it is that you just do it for fun," said Stevens.

LLCs and Commingling


What does it mean to pierce the corporate veil?






The wonder of the whooper

They fly with grace and grandeur, perhaps one of the most — if not the most — stately North American

Yet the whooping crane, standing about 5 feet tall with a wingspan of 6 to 7 feet, is a treasure few people ever have an opportunity to observe.

Even though they're the largest North American bird, they are also one of the rarest. While never believed to be abundant, scientists estimate about 500 to 700 whooping cranes existed across their historic range in 1870. By 1941, their migratory population plummeted to a mere 16 birds.

They were placed on the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Endangered Species list in 1967. Although the population of wild whooping cranes has fluctuated, it has increased in recent decades and is now back to about 500 birds.

And every one of them flies over North Dakota.

While researchers are working with experimental populations in various regions of the United States, the wild population nests in one place and one place only - Canada's Wood Buffalo National Park in far northern Alberta. They winter in one place and one place only — Aransas National Wildlife Refuge along the southeastern coast of Texas.

The two locations are about 2,500 miles apart and North Dakota is beneath their direct flight path.

Whooping cranes are snowy white with the exception of black wing tips, which are visible only when spreading their wings. They have a red crown on their head, yellow eyes, and an olive-gray bill.

In flight, whooping cranes extend their long necks forward and their long, slender legs backward behind its tail. They tend to migrate alone, in groups of two or three birds, or can accompany their cousin, the sandhill crane.

It could be easy to mistake a whooping crane for a sandhill crane under certain light conditions, but look for their distinctive white body and black wing

However, their coloration could also lead an observer to mistake them for similar white birds, including snow geese, swans, egrets, or pelicans. Whooping cranes, though, are much larger than snow geese

and their neck and leg extensions help differentiate them from other white birds.

Whooping cranes somewhat resemble pelicans in flight because both species have a long wingspan and black wing tips. One difference is the pelican's undulating series of several flaps of its wings followed by a long, graceful glide.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and Canadian Wildlife Service track whooping crane migration to help monitor and aid in population recovery. Because North Dakota is so important in their migration with birds stopping to rest and feed, anyone with the honor of observing a whooping crane is asked to report it. They may rest and feed on and around shallow wetlands along the central portion of the state.

The birds are on the move back north to nest and will be over North Dakota in the coming weeks of

Never disturb whooping cranes and, instead, note the date, time, location, and the bird's activity. If possible, note any leg bands, which could be on one or both legs.

Sightings can be reported to Lostwood National Wildlife (NWR) Refuge, (701) 848-2466, Audubon NWR, (701) 442-5474, or the N.D. Game and Fish Department, (701) 328-6300, as well as any area

By reporting a sighting people are assisting in research and recovery of the stately whooping crane. The information is used to identify critical migratory habitat areas, monitor status of birds with leg bands, identify migration routes and timing, and help determine survival and population numbers.

Just the opportunity to potentially observe the majestic whooping crane is yet another reason to get outdoors this spring – and again next fall when they return to Aransas. Grab a pair of binoculars, a bird identification field guide, and simply explore. Look up and listen. Pay attention to what is around and on wetlands and adjacent prairie or cropland.

And maybe, just maybe, someone will experience the rare and treasured opportunity of seeing a whooping crane.

20 AF staff augment missile alert force at all three missile wings

20th Air Force headquarters staff, in an effort to support 20 AF missile wings with combat mission ready (CMR) missile operators, are beginning to pull regular alerts at all three missile wings. This effort is not only helping relieve some of the scheduling pressures at the wings but also serves as a professional opportunity for both the HQ staff and the operators in

"It's important for us as a staff to be connected to the field directly," said Col. Cathy Barrington, 20 AF operations and communications director. "We need to know what's going on and be there with the Airmen who are performing alert duties. This helps us know conditions first hand, so we can make good decisions that support our Airmen in the fight."

Besides providing opportunity for the staff to stay connected to Airmen in the field, the alerts serve as a professional development opportunity. For example, for an upcoming software test happening in several months at Hill AFB, Utah, missileers from the missile wings will go to perform those tests, while 20 AF staff officers will cover the alert load at the missile wings. This opportunity will allow the missileers to

see how the testing process works and understand a little bit more about weapon system development. It will also allow them to offer up their expertise and field experience to highlight any issues or problems, or things that can be done differently.

Last month, Col. Matthew Dillow, 20 AF vice commander, travelled to Minot AFB to pull a week-long alert tour.

"I enjoy alert duty as a change of pace from the headquarters tempo," said Dillow. "It is interesting to experience the different field cultures at each wing. Interacting with Airmen in the field over a seven-day period helps with ensuring frank communication and feedback—I feel I can really become a member of the team at that MAF."

Maj. Jeremy Greever, ICBM codes branch chief, returned from alert at Malmstrom AFB, Montana just a few weeks ago.

"It amazes me how seamlessly our Airmen get the job done, especially in such a large area of responsibility as Malmstrom," said Greever. "It is extra impressive especially when you consider the relative young age of the Airmen from Security Forces, maintenance Missileers. It's such a fun thing to be able to pull alerts with the next generation of Missileers. On my last two alerts I learned so much from my crew partners,


and I hope they got some useful information from me."

1st Lt. Sierra Hunewill-Brown, 490th Missile Squadron crew commander at Malmstrom AFB, was on alert with Greever. She said that being on alert with Greever served as a great professional development perspective and learned a lot from asking him questions and their valuable conversations.

"Maj. Greever and I had a great week together pulling alert," said Hunewill-Brown. "He had great insight into many things far beyond just pulling alert, which was very beneficial to me. I learned a lot about what options there are for us following our first two crew tours, and how much the career field opens up, which is not something that I think we talk about enough. Also, he made great coffee!"

The initiative is set to continue for the foreseeable future and reap many benefits.

"What we are seeing with our missileers, is that this engagement is building better relationships," said Barrington. "We are starting to understand each other's roles and responsibilities better and we are building a better team. The more we work together, the better relationships that we build, and that enhances the force across the board."






