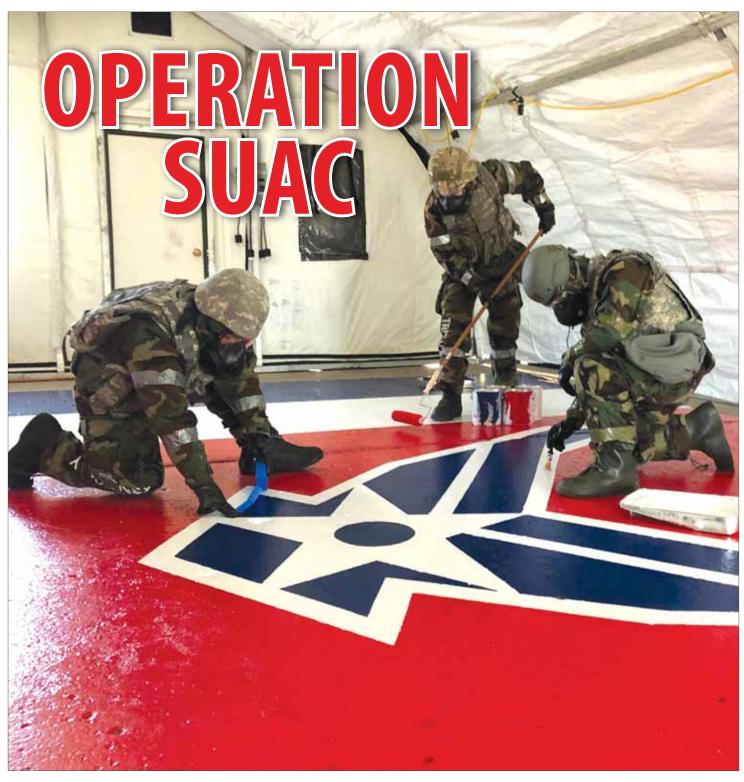

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Retired Airman starts pen pal program to help disabled teens

During her time serving in the Air Force, Technical Sgt. Heather Thomas (retired) was encouraged by her leadership to plan out a path for her life after retirement. "When I was stationed in England, I had a supervisor that really pushed for us to figure out what we wanted to do in life when we left the military. His way of doing that was to encourage us to volunteer at different places... and he figured that we would just eventually find our niche through volunteering, which is something that the military promotes anyways," she said.

Thomas began volunteering at schools and realized that she had a passion for working with youth. Having dyslexia herself, she also found that she was able to relate closely to some of her students with learning disabilities and possessed the extra patience that many children need from their educators.

Like many others, Thomas recognized a deficit in special education teachers in the United States, which encouraged her to pursue a career teaching students with learning disabilities and intellectually delayed disabled youth. According to the National Coalition on Personnel Shortages in Special Education and Related Services, 14% of public school students receive special education services, but 49 out of 50 states still report shortages in the field.

She is now attending Minot State University to receive a degree in Special Education Teaching. For her degree, Thomas is required to develop a service project, and she chose to partner with Minot's

Teen Night Out to begin a pen pal program with the 5th Medical Group at Minot Air Force Base,

Thomas was inspired by her previous volunteer work in the Air Force and decided to reach out to Technical Sgt. Carl Doan, her successor as Radiology Noncommissioned Officer in Charge and Flight Chief of the Diagnostics and Therapeutics Flight, for help. The pen pal program was not only beneficial for the special needs youth involved, but for the Airmen who participated. Doan said, "With Heather's coordination, we have exchanged several pen pal letters with special needs teens over the course of a few months. To my understanding, the letters have been very well received by the teens. It has been fun for our Diagnostics and Therapeutics flight members as well to help out and engage with members in our community while assisting one of our veterans with her school service project. Sometimes it's easy to get tied up in our daily routine and I think taking part in this project and sharing perspectives with our pen pals was a nice escape for everyone involved."

Thomas's service project was geared towards helping teens that are typically isolated (even more so since COVID began) build on their social and communication skills. They are able to continue working on the fine motor skills needed to write and build the academic skills of reading and developing vocabulary. "Everybody likes to get mail. If they are doing

something that doesn't seem like work but is fun, and they're able to learn, build those fine motor skills, read, and socially interact in a fun manner, then it's better than flash cards and sitting there writing the same word over and over!" said Thomas.

Students had the option to write their own letters or use a template, and Thomas took it upon herself to shuttle all of the letters to and from the base. She hopes that the opportunity to write to pen pals will have a positive, lasting effect on the teens she works with.

"We know that if we can help and give kids certain additional benefits while they're younger and their brain is still developing that they end up better off. If we wait until they are older and their brain is already developed, then it's harder to help them and often they won't make as much progress. Our goal is to help each student to someday be independent, productive members of society," Thomas explained.

Through her studies at MSU, Thomas learned about Teen Night Out (TNO), a program for disabled teenagers that allows them to socialize and learn with their peers outside of a school environment through extracurricular activities such as sports, prom, and more. She has spent many practicum hours volunteering with TNO for her degree and hopes to spread the word about the successful program to parents with disabled teens or potential volunteers.

Thomas and the TNO volunteers are an important part of closing the gap in youth special education. Because of their dedication and

drive, disabled children are able to grow, learn, and build confidence, therefore becoming the best versions of themselves that they possibly can!

Technical training now includes respect in curriculum

JOINT BASE SAN ANTONIO-RANDOLPH, Texas (AFNS) --

A cultural development course, delivered to Airmen during their initial technical training, is adding respect to their mandatory curriculum.

Airmanship 200 is the second of three development courses that new Airmen receive to impart a common understanding of Air Force values through guided discussions. It bridges the gap between the Airmanship 100 course at Basic Military Training and Airmanship 300, which is offered at the First Term Airman Center.

An instruction block on respect was previously available as one of several optional supplements military training flights could include in their Airmanship 200 program. A memorandum released March 4 by Maj. Gen. Andrea Tullos, Second Air Force commander, made the instruction block compulsory, adding it to another four required lesson blocks, covering identity, ownership, self-discipline and decision-making.

The decision to add the new mandatory curriculum on respect came about in recognition of the importance of diversity in the Air Force.

"Respect was chosen to be included as a core lesson because our Airmen need to have awareness of our diverse culture and the important role every Airman plays in supporting our National Defense Strategy," said Master Sgt. Kristen Jordan, Second Air Force military training leader functional manager.

Senior Airman Courtney Collins, 335th Training Readiness Squadron, recently completed Airmanship 200 and found the discussion on respect to be especially valuable to younger Airmen.

"Respect is the foundation for professional and personal relationships, no matter your rank," Collins said.

The Airmanship series stemmed from a working group in 2019 that identified a need for reshaping and defining Airmanship in early development stages for Airmen. The intent is to ensure deliberate development in a stair-step approach at the appropriate times.

According to Jordan, development does not end at the completion of the three Airmanship courses.

"The ultimate goal is to develop Airmanship all the way through the 900-level so that even the highest enlisted Airmen are continually developing their skills as leaders and warriors," she said.



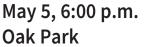

written above the entrance to the 5th Civil Engineer Squadron heritage room. This quote is not only part of our WarBull culture but it fuels our motivation to tackle whatever comes our way. "WarBulls can to anything, just not everything," said Maj Chris Bahrij.

The WarBulls were just coming off a very successful Nuclear Surety Inspection with several Inspector General Inspectors giving individual coins for superior performers and superior teams. Before we could catch our breath and celebrate, we got the call that we needed to make something better. The something didn't matter, we just needed the intent and timeline. As it turned out, this something was the welcome "red carpet" painted on the airfield next to Base Operations. With Base Emergency Engineer Force known as Prime BEEF day coming around the corner and some significant DV's visiting the following week, the WarBulls went all in and treated as a war time training mission.

The WarBull advon team meet up on a Saturday to complete the initial reconnaissance before practicing their joint writing skills. Using the Operation Order five paragraph format

While the OPORD gave the outline of the mission it did not reveal or account for all the challenges the team would face and overcome as details were uncovered. Starting Monday morning the challenges started to amass.

Mission must be completed in nine days or sooner.

The airfield paint 2) contract was already awarded and scheduled to be painted by a contractor during the annual airfield closure in July.

Concrete surface temps were 27 degrees which meant the paint would not adhere or cure. Paint surfaces needed to be 50 degrees for 72 hours per specification for airfield epoxy paint.

Two snow events were forecasted for the week, and the average temps were well below 50 degrees.

Due to Winter Storm this commander-directed work Uri, the approved airfield epoxy paint was not available as there is a national shortage of epoxy.

Prime BEEF Day training was focused on Mission Oriented Protective Posture drills and operating day to day missions in MOPP 4.

Airfield painting is not taught at tech school for Civil Engineers and is not part of any upgrade training.

Although we faced different challenges, each addressed and up channeled for resource reallocation and risk acceptance to the mission. Multiple Small Shelter Systems were anchored to Jersey barriers and heated to warm up the concrete. Airfield waivers were approved for regular pavement paint to be

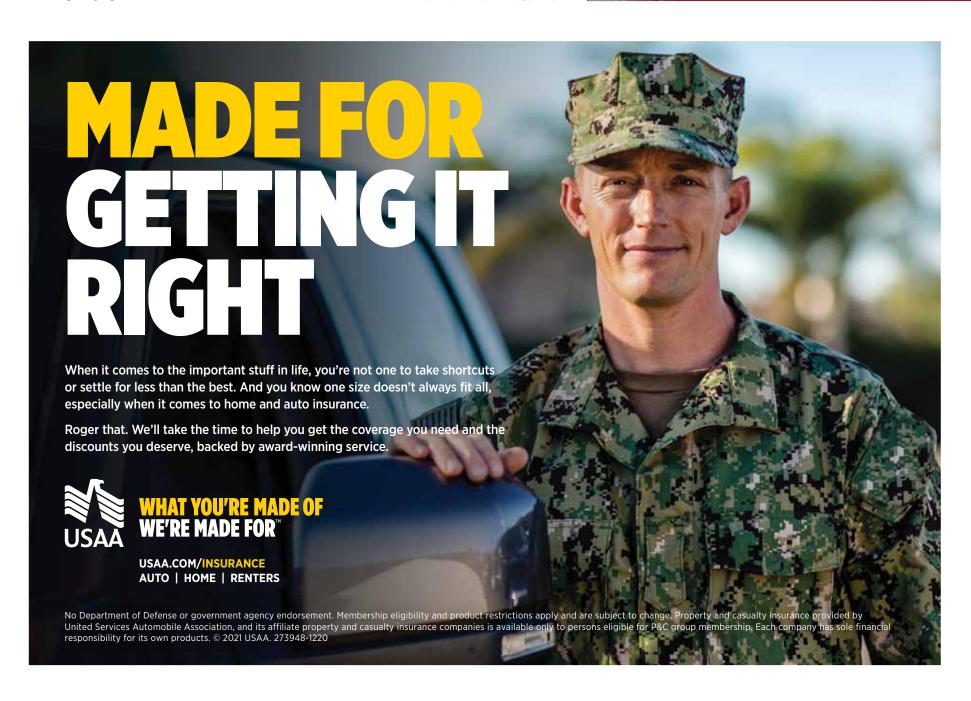

SPRING FRITTATA



6 LARGE EGGS 1/4 CUP HEAVY CREAM 1/4 TEASPOON SALT AND PEPPER 2 TABLESPOON CHIVES, CHOPPED 1/2 CUP MOZZARELLA CHEESE, GRATED **2 TABLESPOON BUTTER**

INGREDIENTS

1 CUP MUSHROOMS, CHOPPED **4 ASPARAGUS SPEARS** 1/4 CUP RED BELL PEPPER, DICED

When ready to cook, start the Traeger grill and set the temperature to 350° F. Preheat, lid closed, for 10 to 15

In a medium-sized mixing bowl, combine the eggs, cream, and salt and pepper. Whisk to combine. Stir in the chives, if using. Stir in the cheese. Set aside.

Melt the butter in a large oven-proof skillet, preferably nonstick or well-seasoned cast iron, over medium heat on the stovetop. Saute the mushrooms, asparagus, and red bell pepper until tender, about 5 minutes. Stir in the ham.

Distribute the ingredients evenly over the bottom of the skillet. Pour the egg mixture evenly over the vegetables

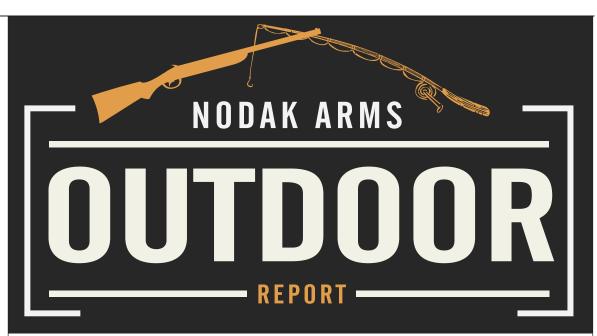
Place the skillet on the grill grate and cook the frittata until it is firm in the center and lightly browned on the bottom, 15 to 20 minutes.

Allow the frittata to cool for 5 minutes before slicing into wedges and serving.

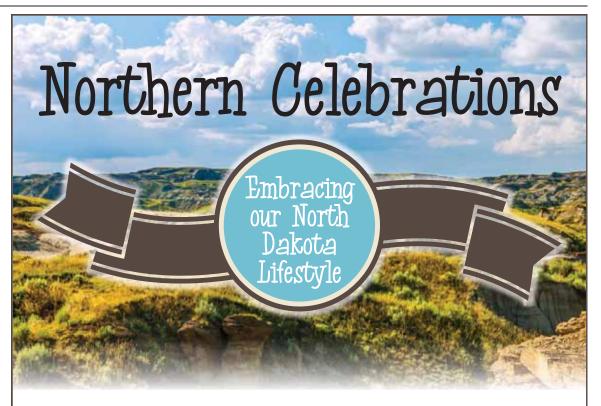

Think fishing

The month of May, warmer weather, and open water fishing opportunities are here - it's time to get acquainted and re-acquainted with some of the local opportunities for anglers of all ages.

The Missouri River System — Lake Sakakawea, Lake Oahe, and the Missouri River itself — and Devils Lake are widely considered the state's premier walleye destinations. Granted, there are good reasons for their popularity and it's all about finding and catching fish, especially walleye.

However, other lakes in the region are definitely worth checking out.

While largemouth and smallmouth bass garner the attention of anglers in many other regions of the country, walleye are king in North Dakota. Part of the reason is that they're a favorite to eat.

Plus it helps that they're fun to try to outsmart.

Lake Audubon, south of Minot on the east side of the U.S. Highway 83 embankment separating it from Lake Sakakawea, typically offers some nice early season, post ice-out walleye opportunities.

For one thing, it's shallower than the east end of Lake Sakakawea so its water temperatures tend to warm earlier.

The N.D. Game and Fish Department's annual netting surveys point towards good numbers of walleye in Lake Audubon with a nice mix of age classes for a variety of sizes in 2021.

The East Totten Recreation Area and its boat ramp are popular areas to launch and there's a fishing pier for families to shore-fish. Other boat ramps are also available along the north shore, including Three-Mile Bay just three miles east of the intersection of Highway 83 and N.D. Highway 37.

A creel survey will be underway in 2021 on Lake Audubon so anglers are asked to stop and visit with a creel clerk about the day's outing, its success and expectations, to help fishery biologists manage the lake. Creel surveys are conducted every three years on the lake

Just a note about open water fishing on Lake Audubon, though — the south portion of the lake is managed by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's Audubon National Wildlife Refuge and is closed to fishing. The reason is that the islands in that area are important nesting places for a variety of birds and the closure helps protect them from disturbance. Buoys mark the boundary identifying the lake's closed area.

Other walleye lakes worth checking out include Loon and Long lakes in Bottineau County. Lake Metigoshe typically draws the most fishing and recreational interest in the area but those two lakes could provide some walleye alternatives.

Two lakes north of Harvey have gained a walleye reputation in recent years — Antelope and Clear lakes. The Game and Fish Department is conducting a walleye study on Antelope Lake beginning in 2021. Anglers catching a walleye with a tag in its jaw are encouraged to submit its information to the agency. The three-year study will help biologists learn more about angler harvest.

Check out Hiddenwood Lake south of Makoti or Cottonwood Lake north of Butte for some potential walleye activity, as well.

While Lake Sakakawea is the most sought-after walleye destination in western North Dakota, some smaller lakes are also worth checking out west of Minot. If walleye is on the menu, look towards Blacktail Dam, White Earth Dam, or even Northgate Dam in the far northwest.

They don't have the notoriety of the "Big Lake" — Lake Sakakawea - but they're still a nice outing, especially for families.

Anglers can go to the Game and Fish Department website, (gf.nd.gov) and click "Fishing" on the homepage to access just about any information they may want regarding fishing opportunities in the state.

Stay tuned for more fishing opportunities, including Lake Darling, bluegill, and even bass in North Dakota.

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Developing Self: Airman's Foundational Competencies Category

JOINT BASE SAN ANTONIO - RANDOLPH, Texas - The Air Force has identified 24 Airman's foundational competencies for all Airmen, as part of a systematic competency-based approach to develop the force. competencies are universally applicable to all Airmen and are categorized into four groups: Developing Self, Developing Others, Developing Ideas and Developing Organizations.

In this series on Airman's foundational competencies the first group explained is Developing

Developing Self includes following foundational competencies: accountability, perseverance, communication, decision making, information seeking, flexibility, resilience, initiative, and self-control.

Accountability is when an Airman demonstrates reliability and honesty; takes responsibility for actions and possesses behaviors

of self and team.

Though an Airman's rank, position, and even occupation may change, to be successful, accountability must be present throughout their career. Accountability includes looking after wingmen, upholding Air Force standards and core values, keeping promises, admitting mistakes, and taking personal responsibility for the team's work.

Observable behaviors for accountability include: leads by example, takes personal responsibility for unit performance and models professionalism and excellence in every endeavor

When accountability is present, Airmen make decisions even when they are difficult.

In addition to accountability, the category of Developing Self includes eight more competencies

Perseverance is when an Airman displays grit in accomplishment of difficult longterm goals.

Communication means an Airman effectively presents, promotes and prioritizes various ideas and issues both verbally and non-verbally through active listening, clear messaging and by tailoring information to the appropriate audience.

- Decision Making is about making well-informed, effective and timely decisions that weigh situational constraints, risks and

- Information Seeking Airmen demonstrate an underlying curiosity; desire to know more about things, people, one's self, the mission or issues; an eager, aggressive learner. Information seeking requires personal initiative.
- Flexibility describes an Airman who adapts to and works with a variety of situations, individuals or groups effectively.
- Resilience means an Airman negotiates, manages and adapts to significant sources of stress or

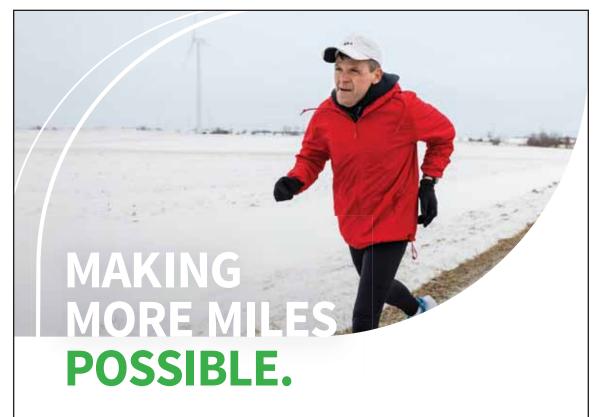
- Initiative is doing more than is required or expected to improve job results. Initiative as a foundational competency means an Airman takes action appropriately without being prompted. With initiative, an Airman strives to do a better job and thinks of creative ways to complete the job.
- Self-Control means keeping emotions under control and restraining negative actions when under stress. Self-control begins with emotional intelligence by knowing how to identify our own emotions and respond positively. Knowing what to do if you feel frustrated, angry, overwhelmed, anxious and sad is valuable for positive outcomes.

Understanding where an Airman scores on individual Foundational Competencies will help an Airman take ownership of his or her development. See image graphics to view competency levels of each developing-self competencies.

Airmen who want more information on the Airman's Foundational Competencies and to participate in a self-assessment can log in to MyVector and select Air Force Competencies from the main menu. The myVector competency assessment tool also allows Airmen to request feedback from their supervisors and/or 360-degree feedback from subordinates, peers and higher-ranking members. Also, the member is provided links to educational resources to address areas for improvement.

The Air Education and Training Command Directorate of Operations and Communications Competencies Division methodically developed the Airman's Foundational Competencies, which are a combination of knowledge, skills, abilities and other characteristics that manifest in observable and measurable patterns of behaviors.

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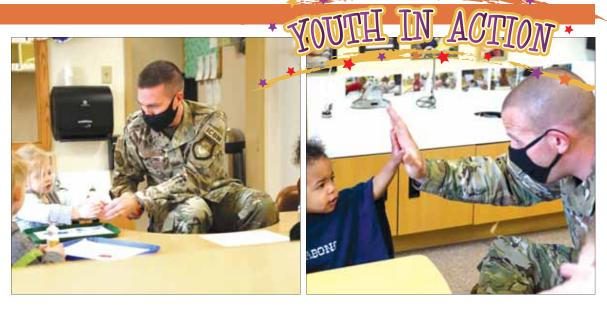

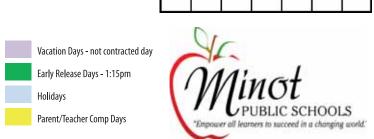

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All About Pets





As the weather begins to warm up in North Dakota, people, pets, and wildlife are emerging from the comfort of home and springing into action. However, with springtime comes another nuisance for pet owners: bugs. There are a variety of pests that can be detrimental to your furry friend's health, and it's important to take the proper precautions to be sure no unwanted critters are making it into your home or on your pet! Some of the most common bugs that can cause harm to your pet include ticks, mosquitoes, spiders, and fleas. And just like humans, some animals can be highly allergic to stings and bites from everyday bugs.

Here are a few measures you can take to help protect your pet:

- Prevent fleas and ticks with one of the many veterinarian-approved products available. There are a variety of applications, including collars, shampoos, topical treatments, and even pills/chewables. Consult a specialist to determine which method is best for your pet.
- Check your pets! It's especially important to give them a once-over after they've spent time in grassy or wooded areas, but even a trip to the dog park or trail can warrant a look. Be sure to check in all the nooks and crannies, feel for abnormal bumps, and keep an eye out for itching, swelling, or lethargy.
- Regularly clean your house and keep your yard mowed and maintained to prevent bugs from nesting. If your pet has a hypersensitivity to bee stings, it may be best to keep any flowers, fruits, or vegetables in an area away from where your pet goes.
- When in doubt, contact your vet. If you notice symptoms of an allergic reaction (itching, swelling, difficulty breathing, vomiting, etc.) be sure to call immediately. It's important to have an emergency veterinarian set up just in case your pet is having a severe reaction. Some clinics that offer emergency services nearby include: Pinkerton Animal Hospital, Core Veterinary Clinic, and Rugby Veterinary Services. Due to the amount of pets in Minot versus the number of emergency vets available, it's imperative to catch any reactions as soon as possible to give yourself time to drive to an emergency clinic further away, if need be. Early detection can also prevent worse conditions that can seriously harm your pet if left untreated.

In North Dakota, the most common types of ticks are the Black Legged (or Deer) Tick, the American Dog Tick, and the Brown Dog Tick. Venomous spiders include the Western Black Widow and Brown Recluse, but they are not seen too often in household settings. Fleas are often transmitted from other carriers such as other pets or wild animals. And as many residents know, North Dakota is full of mosquitoes and other biting/stinging bugs, so it's never a bad idea to stay viailant, not only for the health of your pet, but for your home and family as well!

What's the Difference between Life Estate and **Transfer on Death Deeds?**

A life estate deed and a transfer on death deed seem to accomplish the same goal at first glance. They both fully convey property to a Grantee upon your death. However, there are key distinctions between the two and your particular situation helps determine which is right for you.

Life Estate Deed

A life estate deed allows you to transfer property while reserving an interest during your lifetime or during the lifetime of someone else. Once the person who holds the life estate passes away, the Grantee fully owns the property.

With a life estate deed, both the Grantor and the Grantee own an interest in the property as soon as the deed is signed. The Grantor owns a life estate and can be referred to as the "life estate owner." The Grantee owns a future or remainder interest and is called the "remainderperson."

Either the life estate owner or remainderperson can convey away or sell their share of the property at any time. Specific value tables help determine the value of both interests based on the life estate owner's age. However, a life estate deed is irrevocable-this means that if you

convey your property to your children and reserve a life estate to yourself, you can't change your mind and take it back. Ownership can be made whole again if either the life estate owner or the remainderperson choose to convey their interest to the other

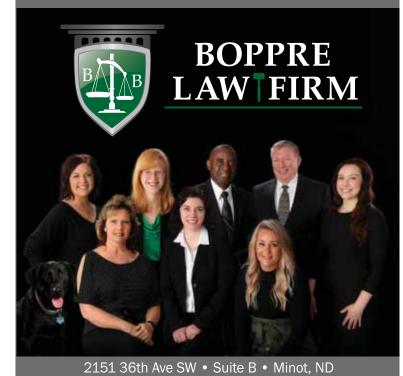
One advantage of the life estate deed is that it starts the clock on five year look back periods for things such as Medicaid eligibility. Some disadvantages are its irrevocability, as previously stated, and that it can open the property to creditors of the remainderperson.

Transfer on Death Deed

A transfer on death deed allows you to retain full ownership during your lifetime and conveys your full interest to the Grantee upon your death. During your lifetime, the Grantee has no interest in the property.

The main advantage of the transfer on death deed is that it is very flexible—it can be revoked at any time unlike the life estate deed. However, because the property fully remains within your control, a transfer on death deed does not start the clock on the five year period and so the property would still be counted among your assets for Medicaid eligibility.

Ultimately, the decision between a life estate and transfer on death deed is dependent on why you want to transfer the property. If you simply want to avoid probate while still having full control over your property, a transfer on death deed might be the best choice. If you're concerned that you may have to apply for Medicaid in the relatively near future, a life estate deed might be a better option. In any case, a conversation with an estate planning attorney can help you make the right choice for your situation.

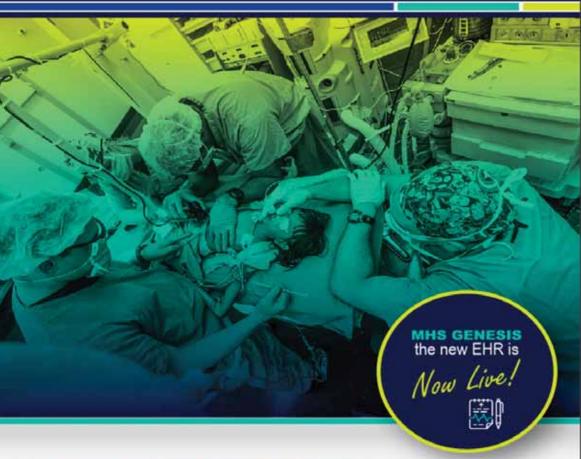

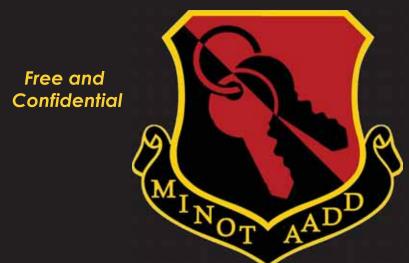

North Dakota National Guard Anderson promoted, Branden retires

FARGO, N.D. — Brig. Gen. Darrin K. Anderson became the newest North Dakota National Guard general officer today during a promotion ceremony at the Air National Guard Base, Fargo which was live streamed. With this promotion to general officer, Anderson assumes the duties of the North Dakota National Guard assistant adjutant general for Air from Brig. Gen. Todd M. Branden, who was honored during a retirement ceremony.

Anderson previously served as the commander of the 119th Wing, nicknamed the "Happy Hooligans" from August 2018 to March 2021, while Branden has been the assistant adjutant general for Air since October 2017.

Guests included Sen. Kevin Cramer and Maj. Gen. Al Dohrmann, North Dakota adjutant general who congratulated Anderson on what he called a

well-deserved promotion.

"Darrin Anderson's dedicated service to the North Dakota Guard, his wealth of experience and ability to be a visionary, strategicthinking leader has led to this promotion," said Dohrmann.

Anderson thanked the Airmen of the 119th Wing reminding those present that all the citations and accolades are due to the hard work and talent of the 'Hooligans.'

"This is remarkable organization that all of you helped build and sustain, and I can't thank you all enough," Anderson said.

Anderson said he tried to capture in words what the 'Hooligan Way' consists of, "very strong culture, a tireless work ethic, a spirit of innovation, empowerment and tenacity."

After the promotion ceremony, the audience members bid farewell to Branden during a retirement ceremony paying tribute to his 42 years of service to the North Dakota National Guard.

"Today we honor a man who's served a lifetime," Dohrmann said. "Congratulations on an incredible career; it has been a distinct honor to serve with you."

Dohrmann presented Branden with the Legion of Merit which is awarded to a member of the U.S. Armed Forces who has distinguished himself or herself by exceptionally meritorious conduct performing outstanding services.

Branden said his memories won't be about the awards, missions and accolades but rather the names and faces of the people he worked with throughout his career. He rendered a final salute to the members of the 119th Wing before the reading of the retirement order.

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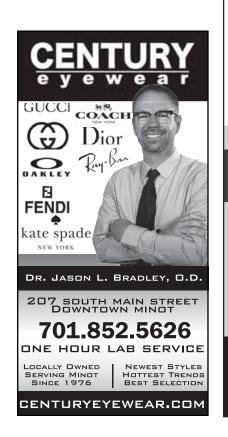

Department of the Air Force creates two new barrier analysis working groups for LGBTQ, Indigenous Nation members

ARLINGTON, Va. (AFNS) --The Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender and Queer/ Questioning Initiative Team (LIT) and the Indigenous Nations Equality Teams (INET) were recently formally established by the Department of the Air Force under the umbrella of its Barrier Analysis Working Group

The establishment of these two teams builds on the successes of the Department of the Air Force's other teams and allows the Department of the Air Force to identify and address the issues impacting diversity and inclusion for Airmen and Guardians.

The LGBTQ Initiative Team focuses on the LGBTQ community and identifies and works to resolve the issues that disproportionately impede the success of LGBTQ Airmen and Guardians.

The creation of this team comes 10 years after the repeal of Don't Ask Don't Tell, the legislation that prohibited LGB service members from serving openly. For many of the senior-ranking military members, some of whom served under DADT for nearly two decades, the creation of LIT is a watershed event.

Maj. Gen. Leah Lauderback, one of the group's founders and its military officer champion, reports a lot of excitement about the LIT, "I expect our group will grow-our community and allies want to help!'

The INET, a play on words for

the term Innit which is a slang term among tribes meaning, "yes, I agree," will review and analyze guidelines, programs, data and other information for barriers to

employment, advancement and retention of American Indian/ Native American and Alaska Native employees and military members.

"We are looking forward to representing our Airmen and Guardians who are a part of the indigenous nation's community," said Col. Terrence Adams, INET champion. "We are hoping to identify changes that will eliminate barriers affecting members within these groups. We cannot be aware of things that need to change unless we are talking about them with an open mind.'

Both of these teams may also

serve as an initial member/ employer resource group for both of their communities.

The Department of the Air Force created the BAWG in 2008 to analyze data, trends and barriers to service for the civilian workforce. Since then, the focus has broadened to include military personnel.

"Once again, our Airmen and Guardians are leading the way. With the addition of these two groups, we will have a better understanding of barriers to service which allows us to enhance our diversity and inclusion," said Gwendolyn DeFilippi, assistant deputy chief of staff for manpower, personnel and services. "Our Airmen and Guardians are the pulse of our Department's culture and the diverse backgrounds. Inputs from these volunteer groups is vital."

As of March 2021, the Department of the Air Force has established the following teams:

Black/African American Employment Strategy Team, Disability Action Team, Hispanic Empowerment and Action Team, Indigenous Nations Equality Team, LGBTQ Initiative Team, Pacific Islander/Asian American Community Team and Women's Initiatives Team.

THIS WEEK IN USAF HISTORY

USAF AIRLIFTS FOOD TO NETHERLANDS DURING OPERATION CHOWHOUND

MAY 1-8, 1945

During WWII, the Third Air Division and the Royal Air Force began a humanitarian effort to feed starving citizens in the German-occupied Netherlands. Operation Chowhound for the Army Air Forces and Operation Manna for the RAF, the joint effort brought nearly 11.000 tons of food to millions of civilians. Lt. Col. Henry Cervantes recalled, "The agreement with the German area commander required that we stay under

500-feet, remain within strictly mandated corridors, and not carry gunners aboard our B-17s." The mission was a daring one, given that the Germans could attack at any given moment if any of the planes were to stray from target drop areas. However, they were successfully able to drop muchneeded rations to the people of the Netherlands. In return, aircrews were greeted with messages of thanks plastered across tulip fields and grateful civilians waving Dutch and American flags. Operation Chowhound saved countless lives from starvation and many of the service members involved would remember it as one of the better memories of WWII.

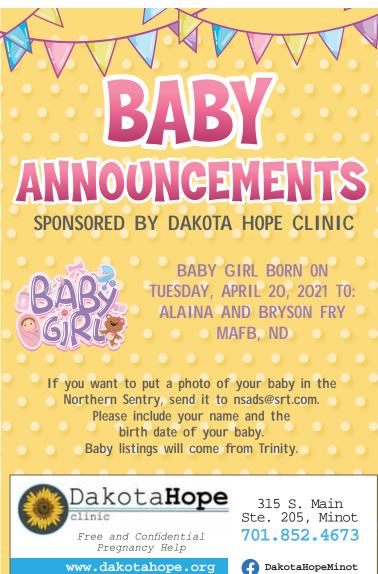
