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## **Team Minot hosts** distinguished visitors

As the United States Air Force moves into a newer era of strategic deterrence, leaders from all over the country are taking part in important discussions about the future and reliability of the nation's nuclear force. On April 30, 2021, Team Minot hosted several distinguished visitors for an exclusive tour of the base and an opportunity to learn about what Team Minot does on a day-to-day basis.

Attendees included Gen. Charles Brown, Chief of Staff of the Air Force, Gen. Timothy Ray, Commander of Air Force Global Strike Command, and United States Senators Jeanne Shaheen (D-NH), John Hoeven (R-ND), Angus King (I-ME), Deb Fischer (R-NE), Joni Ernst (R-IA), and many other important civilian and military leaders.

Over the day, the distinguished visitors were guided by Airmen and leadership from the 5th Bomb Wing and 91st Missile Wing, including Col. Michael Walters, 5th Bomb Wing Commander, and Col. Christopher Menuey, 91st Missile Wing Commander.

Visitors began the day with a round-table talk that included representatives from many of Minot Air Force Base's resilience agencies. They were able to hear firsthand experiences from leaders in supporting Team Minot on issues such as diversity and inclusion, force support, and spouse resilience. Later on, visitors were also given a brief on the new female body armor for Security Forces and heard many opinions on the upgrades from Minot's female Defenders.

Sen. Ernst said, "I want to emphasize more about the level of support that is being shown by this group of bipartisan senators from the Armed Services Committee for our Airmen and

their leadership. We were able to join civic leaders with [military] leaders last evening and engage them in discussions as well, and talk about the level of support for our service members...'

After the brief, visitors were given a tour of a B-52 Stratofortress and were able to find out more information about the 5th Bomb Wing mission and Global Strike Command as a whole. They were also able to learn about the operations of the 91st Missile Wing as they toured a missile silo and launch facility.

Speaking on some of the upcoming changes in store for Minot AFB, Sen. Hoeven said, "To have [the senators] here and supporting Minot Air Force Base is really fantastic. Specifically, that means new things that are being developed for Minot AFB. For example, upgrading ICBMs with the Ground Based Strategic Deterrence (GBSD), that'll be the new Intercontinental Ballistic Missile. That's a huge project and their support is vital for it. And for our bombers right now, we have the air launch cruise missiles... as well as many upgrades to the B-52 bomber which is the workhorse of our bomber fleet. We're also getting helicopters for the missile mission.'

The Senate Committee on Armed Services, of which Senators Fischer, Ernst, King, and Shaheen are part of, as well as the subcommittees, are all vital to Team Minot's mission as they provide planning, support, and budget oversight for deterrence operations and personnel affairs.

Upgrades to the entire nuclear triad are estimated to cost \$1.7 trillion over 30 years according to the Arms Control Association, and the Department of Defense estimates total cost for the GBSD to be around \$264 billion.

Will there be problems with the budget? Sen. Hoeven said, "Everything gets debated in Washington D.C. The budget, based on conversations I've had... is doing well in the Senate. There's been more pushback in the House, but I think we're going to be on track."

Hoeven explained that the GBSD is already in development and has plans to be completed by 2036. Upgrades to the B-52 Stratofortress fleet are projected to extend their lifespans to 2040 and potentially years beyond.

This is the first congressional delegation that has gone out of Washington D.C. to visit a military installation since the pandemic began, and the Senators were impressed with their experience at Minot AFB.

Sen. Fischer said, "This is such an important base and it's important for a number of reasons. First of all, the men and women who serve, and the care, training, the skill, that they all have... and use every single day to protect this country. Secondly, there is the importance of the base and being part of the bedrock of our national security. Having two legs of the [nuclear] triad... is so important to security as a nation.'


And Sen. Shaheen said. "I particularly want to call out the men and women who serve both here and in our armed forces. They protect this country and their skills and precision on their jobs is really commendable."

Sen. King said, "...One day of seeing is better than a thousand days of reading. And that's what we've been doing today, seeing and meeting the people who are on the front lines of defending this country."



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## Tragedy of war teaches leadership lessons

Every once in a while, life has a way of slinging a curve ball at your chin and waking you up. For me, it happened in the summer of 2002 during my "last trip" to the middle east when the war we all watch and read about materialized right in front of me. It taught me a valuable lesson in life and leadership.

It was supposed to be just another "check ride." I was flying with a crew handling an emergency aeromedical evacuation mission out of Kandahar, Afghanistan. After several previous flights into Kandahar hauling "beans and bullets," the missions once filled with trepidation had now become somewhat routine.

That's where the story starts.

All we knew was that someone had been shot in the face while on patrol. The critical care air transport team traveling with us also had very little information. Upon arrival, the surgeon tending to the patient briefed the medics, then the flight crew.

"John" (not his real name, but nonetheless a very real person) had been leading his unit through a crowd, when out of nowhere someone shot him in the left side of his face with a small caliber weapon. The bullet shattered his lower jaw, traveled through his mouth and exited his right cheek. According to all accounts, he then walked to a vehicle and was driven to a medical care facility.

When I first saw him on the stretcher, his head was completely bandaged, much like a winter cap that only reveals your eyes, nose and mouth. On the five-hour flight, the medical team worked to make him as comfortable as possible. After we landed, a specialist immediately saw him and said he should continue his journey to somewhere with more advanced

While those arrangements were being made, I stopped to talk to John. Despite the numerous tubes and IV lines, he was in good spirits. I suppose enough morphine has a way of doing that for you. He communicated by writing questions on a note pad. He answered in the same manner. At one point, despite his condition, he had the energy to play an electronic game a nurse was carrying. I found that extraordinary. I can't reveal any

of the personal information he shared, because he is one of the guys you don't see or hear.

John was one of the many members of the armed forces doing the work the president asked us to complete after Sept. 11, 2001. He did this dangerous task in lessthan-desirable conditions under the cloak of anonymity.

Watching and talking to him, I suddenly felt the brutality and reality of war. Another human being with more guts than I will ever have was just doing his job when a nameless, faceless coward took a cheap shot, slithered back into the crowd and changed John's life forever. These are the kind of people we are fighting -- the same cowards who fly civilian airliners into buildings full of innocent people.

Eventually, I helped carry John's stretcher to the ambulance. I gave him my squadron patch so when the morphine wore off, he would have a "road map" of those who helped get him to his destination. The nurse put it with his growing collection of unit patches. With a handshake and a "thumbs up" they took him away.

I hope to see him again someday, standing and smiling this time, so I can thank him for the lesson in life I learned that summer's night.

The experience taught me a lesson in leadership. In 1910, President Teddy Roosevelt gave a speech in France entitled "Citizenship in a Republic." From it was gleaned his famous "Man in the Arena" comments. If you have never read the speech, I encourage you to do so. It is an excellent example of the men and women currently waging the war on terrorism -- the kind who put it on the line every day knowing the risk they take. They are the kind who are not afraid to try and make the world a better and safer place for everyone. They are the kind who, when the curve ball comes in chin-high, lean out over the plate a little more the next

They are true leaders -- the ones who encourage others to keep fighting regardless of the odds against them.

They are the kinds of men and women President Roosevelt would have loved. They are the true heroes. God bless 'em all.





A camera unit (sometimes called a "head") is attached to a specially designed clamp which holds on to a wheel. There are usually four camera units in a wheel alignment system (a camera unit for each wheel). The camera units communicate their physical positioning with respect to other camera units to a central computer which calculates and displays how much the camber, toe and caster are misaligned.

Often with alignment equipment, these "heads" can be a large precision reflector. In this case, the alignment "tower" contains the cameras as well as arrays of LEDs. This system flashes one array of LEDs for each reflector whilst a camera centrally located in the LED array "looks for" an image of the reflectors patterned face. These cameras perform the same function as the other style of alignment equipment, yet alleviate numerous issues prone to relocating a heavy precision camera assembly on each vehicle

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




## B-52 Hypersonic Kill Chain Employment Success

OINT BASE ELMENDORF-RICHARDSON, Alaska --

A B-52 Stratofortress from the 49th Test and Evaluation Squadron, Barksdale Air Force Base, Louisiana, conducted a successful simulated hypersonic kill chain employment from sensor to shooter and back during Northern Edge 21, May 5, 2021.

During the more than 13-hour sortie from Barksdale AFB to Alaska and back, the B-52 was able to receive target data from sensors via the All-Domain Operations Capability experiment, more than 1,000 nautical miles away miles away at Joint Base Elmendorf-Richardson. Once it received the data from the ADOC-E, the bomber then was able to successfully take a

simulated shot of the target from 600 nautical miles away using an AGM-183 Air Launched Rapid Response Weapon.

"We were really exercising the data links that we needed in order to complete that kill chain loop, and then get the feedback to the players in the airspace that the simulated hypersonic missile was fired and effective," said Lt. Col. Joe Little, 53rd Test Management Group deputy commander.

This was a successful showcase of Beyond Line of Sight Kill Chain employment, and notably, was a success in the highly contested and realistic threat environment that Northern Edge provides.

"The team did an outstanding job effecting this event both in planning and execution, said Lt. Col. Matt Guasco, 49th Test and Evaluation Squadron commander. "This is a win for the USAF and greater DOD as a whole but make no mistake, we are just getting started."

The ADOC-E is a joint team represents the operational-level "blue" training audience designed to experiment with synchronizing joint functions in forward locations. The ADOC-E design allows the synchronization of joint functions in forward, contested environment when traditional C2 structure effectiveness is degraded or denied. ADOC-E personnel have coordination authority capable of facilitating long-range joint fires and further hosting future capability provided through and advanced battle

management system approach. The ADOC-E use of current and emergent technology provides assessment opportunities experimental capabilities and concepts and accelerates employment of relevant TTPs and technologies supporting major combat operations.

NE21 is a U.S. Indo-Pacific Command exercise designed to provided high-end, realistic war fighter training, develop and improve joint interoperability, and

enhance the combat readiness of participating forces. This is done by providing a venue for large force employment training and multi-domain operations; tactical training for the full spectrum of conflict; execute and advance adaptive basing joint tactics, techniques, and procedures; advance live-virtual-constructive capabilities; and support U.S. Indo-Pacific Command's experimental initiatives.

## Military spouses: more than misconceptions

Military spouses stand at the center of a whirlpool made up of moving, checklists and change. They are always adapting and supporting their Airmen, but many of them are also out making a difference on base and in the local community.

Recently, five Malmstrom Air Force Base military spouses shared their experiences of getting involved, being military spouses and what they think are some of the most common misconceptions about being a military spouse.

#### **GEORGE SMITH**

George Smith is an avionics technician civilian contractor who has been on a temporary duty assignment to Duke Field, Fla., since August working on the new MH-139 Gray Wolf helicopters, which are set to replace Malmstrom's current fleet of UH-1N "Huey" helicopters. His spouse, Staff Sgt. Randi White, is with the 341st Security Forces Squadron.

"It can be very stressful being away from the family for any period of time," he said. "But I am fortunate to be able to come home every few months to be with my wife and kids."

During the conversion of the Gray Wolves from civilian use to military use, Smith is responsible for almost all of the electronics on the aircraft including communication, navigation, radar, system integration, and display systems. He also helps maintain an off-aircraft server used to track and monitor the performance of mission-critical components.

"The biggest misconception about military spouses is that not all of us are stay at home moms or dads," Smith said. "I have deployed seven times as a spouse and have been on numerous stateside TDYs. The spouse can serve their country without enlisting in the military themselves, you just have to put yourself out there and search for

#### IRIS COLON SALCEDO

Iris Colon Salcedo is currently a stay-at-home mom who is completing the process to become a licensed Family Child Care provider on base. Her spouse, Senior Airman Luis Adrian Salcedo is with the 741st Missile Security Forces Squadron.

As an FCC provider, Salcedo won't be limited to providing daily care during normal duty hours, but will have the ability to help parents who need care when they deploy out to the missile fields, are moving to or from the base, or who need extended child care outside the hours offered by their full-time provider. She'll also be able to participate in the give parents a break voucher program and military spouse appointment care.

Salcedo said that she thinks one of the most common misconception about military spouses is that people assume spouses just depend on their military member.

"From personal experience, I've seen that's not the case," Salcedo said. "There are women who have businesses of their own that work from home while taking care of their children. Some spouses are going to school full time or working full time."

Ally Watkinson is a dance instructor at Sole Dance Academy in Great Falls and her spouse is Airman 1st Class Christian Watkinson with the 341st SFS.

She has been dancing for 15 years and now teaches ballet to girls and boys ages 5-12. She teaches them ballet techniques.

"Teaching these kids impacts the community because they are coming into the studio looking to dance and learn new things, she said. "The smiles that they have after I tell them 'Yes! Good job! You got it!'" she said. "They are proud of themselves and that makes me proud to be their teacher."

As far as being a military spouse, Watkinson said the best parts are being able to see her husband pursue a career he loves, traveling and meeting new people while the most difficult part are things changing or happening when you least expect them.

#### MICHELLE ATTON

Michelle Atton is a therapist at Emily Wish LLC and also a social worker at a dialysis clinic in Great Falls. Her spouse is Staff Sgt. Matthew Atton with the 341st Civil Engineer Squadron. Atton provides individual therapy for a variety of mental health concerns, but her specialty is helping people struggling with eating disorders. In addition to one-on-one therapy sessions, she also helps manage an outpatient program and support group.

"We've had an influx of new patients ever since the pandemic started," she said. "I think it's important to talk about not being

ok and how hard it is to have to adjust in such a big way."

Malmstrom is Atton's first duty station as a military spouse and Great Falls is also her first home as a therapist. She said her boss is also a military spouse and has been very helpful in helping her adjust to her new life.

"I really like how willing people in the community are to help each other and how even if they don't know each other, they're willing to go out of their way to help them and how involved the active duty members are in making sure they are taking care of one another."

#### **KELSEY CRAMER**

Kelsey Cramer is an adult foster care specialist at the Center for Mental Health in Great Falls. Her spouse is Senior Airman Troy Cramer with the 341st Missile Security Operations Squadron.

In the community, Cramer is an advocate for clients with mental illnesses. She helps assist them with a variety of tasks including making appointments, working with insurance companies and social security, arranging transportation, and completing

"The goal of my program is for clients to one day be able to manage their mental health and care on their own," she said. "I really enjoy being able to help my clients find solutions with tasks that seem very difficult for them and my favorite quote is 'everything is figureoutable.'"

Cramer also said that she thinks the most common misconception about military spouses is that they don't have educations or

don't lead successful careers due to their spouses careers.

"I have known many spouses who have found successful careers at every duty location." she said. "It is a bit harder at times having to move frequently, but it is doable."


On May 18, 1980, Mount St. Helens, located in Washington, erupted with a force 400 times stronger than the atomic bombs dropped on Japan nearly 35 years earlier. The Washington State Department of Emergency Services called for Air Force assistance for disaster relief operations shortly after. Personnel and planes from the 62nd Military Airlift Wing (MAW) and 36th Tactical Airlift Squadron at McChord AFB, Wash., the 63rd MAW at Norton Mount St. Helens erupted on May 18, AFB, Ca., the 303rd Aerospace Rescue 1980, creating the deadliest and most and Recovery Squadron from March economically destructive volcanic event AFB, Ca. , the 920th Rescue Wing at Patrick AFB, Fla., and many more units provided humanitarian support

and communications assistance in the wake of the eruption. While McChord was able to evacuate all aircraft before the smoke arrived, many planes stationed at nearby Fairchild AFB were grounded and by the morning of the 19th, over an inch of ash covered the entirety of the base. The eruption killed 57 people and caused over a billion in damages. 24 square miles of the valley were leveled by a debris avalanche, and hundreds of square miles of forest and farmland were destroyed. Mount St. Helens continued to erupt sporadically throughout the summer.



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## First B-1Bs resume flight operations

The first B-1B Lancers resumed flight operations May 3 following a safety stand-down issued April 20 by Gen. Tim Ray, Air Force Global Strike Command commander. Individual B-1B aircraft will return to flight as inspections and maintenance directed during the stand-down are completed on each aircraft.

During the safety stand-down, maintenance depot personnel disassembled the Augmenter Fuel Filter Housing and performed a series of robust inspections using the latest techniques. After each unit was determined to be free of defects, it was reassembled, pressure checked, and returned to service.

"We are proud of the tremendous efforts of our maintainers and B-1 partners in identifying, inspecting, and remediating any potential issues with the B-1B fuel filter housing," said Maj. Gen. Mark Weatherington, 8th Air Force commander, who is responsible for the Air Force bomber force. "The aircraft are still safe to fly

and we are confident that this stand-down has resulted in increased safety within the B-1B fleet."

The entire maintenance, depot, engineering and acquisition team must be commended for getting the B-1B bombers back into the hands of warfighters in a very short time, according to Air Force Global Strike Command officials. Although this was an Air Force enterprise-wide effort, special thanks must go to the maintainers at Ellsworth AFB, S.D., Dyess AFB, Texas and the AFGSC staff, as well as Air Force Sustainment Center's depot team, Air Force Life Cycle Management Center's B-1 Program Office and Propulsion Directorate, the Air Staff and the Secretary of the Air Force office of Acquisitions, Technology and Logistics on their efforts.

The precautionary safety standdown and holistic inspection of the Augmenter Fuel Filter Housing on each aircraft was ordered after an April 8 ground emergency resulted in the discovery of a discrepancy with the system.

#### **SWEET PEACH SPARE RIBS**



**INGREDIENTS** TRAEGER PORK & POULTRY RUB APPLE JUICE, FOR SPRITZING 1 TABLESPOON BUTTER

1 MEDIUM ONION, CHOPPED 1 1/2 CUP PEACH PRESERVES 1 CUP LIGHT CORN SYRUP 1/2 CUP APPLE CIDER VINEGAR

- 1/2 CUP BOURBON 1 TEASPOON WORCESTERSHIRE SAUCE 1 TEASPOON GRATED GINGER
- 1 TEASPOON DRY MUSTARD
- 1 CLOVE GARLIC, MINCED

Wipe the ribs with damp paper towels and trim off any excess fat. Season the ribs on both sides with the Traeger Pork & Poultry Rub.
