

Stay tuned next week, as Tech Sgt Nguyen and fiancé Sage share one of their favorite Asian recipes.



North Star Farms Organic Opportunity

Heading north on main street in Carpio, ND, you soon run out of pavement and a smaller gravel road continues north to the banks of the Del Lacs River that winds around the northern boundary of Carpio. Soon you hit a clearing with a turn around and looking to the east you will see the gardening space of North Star Farms, owned, and operated by Marvin Baker and his wife Ilene.

Marvin has a lot of "past", including being a military veteran, working at various newspapers in the area, and most recently was the editor of the Kenmare news.

"We started organic gardening in 2006. I purchased some lots from the city of Carpio for back taxes, giving me about an acre of land. Then in 2010 I purchased more land and right now with the land by the river and the garden over by the greenhouse, we have about 3 acres." The only number that is small is the number of acres that Marvin and Ilene farm, from there we are talking numbers that are impressive. "We start planting in March. Onions? Well, we have just short of 16,000 plants, 700 tomato plants, 650 peppers, 400 Okra, and probably 400 broccoli plants. The onions are the bigey you know because you get one for one" shares Baker. "You put a tomato plant in the ground, and you get 10 pounds of fruit, but you put an onion in the ground, and you get one onion.'

And today that is where we found Marvin, planting onion plants on recently irrigated ground. "It's been so dry that I had to pump water onto this area before I began to plant," continues Baker as we take a tour and he explains that he pumps water from the Des Lacs River that surrounds most of his garden, using irrigation sprinklers that are much like what a golf course would employ for their watering

needs. "I'll probably work until dark tonight," shares Baker "and I am guessing I will get around 2,500 of the onions planted." And planting onions in the North Star Farms garden is not done with automation. Marvin has flats of onion seedlings, and every seedling, except the seedlings that Marvin feels will not grow in a garden setting, are pushed into the ground by hand. "The goal is to have the entire garden planted by 31 May. (May 31st for those non-

military folks). North Star Farms is one of few producers locally to be 100% organic. "We became 100% organic in 2006, so we've been doing this for quite a few years" according to Baker. To become organic North Star Farms had to contact a certification company. An audit of the North Star Farms property and seed inventory is done by an inspector "and we got the Okey Dokey, and so we were good." And the myth that organically grown produce is more expensive. "No, we are not more expensive" says Baker "we're competitive with everyone else and we're selling produce like crazy. I've always believed that we can drop our prices and not raise them. People will come knocking your door down to get your product," according to Baker.

For North Star Farms, Ilene Baker does the bookkeeping and Marvin does most of the physical labor for North Star.

When the garden starts to produce, Marvin will be found at North Prairie Farmers Market, where he was one of the principal founders.

In addition, North Star Farms sells CSA (community-supported agriculture) shares to Minot and Minot Air Force Base. "We provide 16 weeks of produce. For a family the cost will be \$575.00,

and a half a share, which is great for a husband and wife, will cost \$400.00" says Baker. "We have a delivery route that includes a stop just north of the Minot Air Force Base, so we can get those folks fresh, 100% organic vegetables. Over the years we've established a clientele, and that clientele has grown every year as more and more folks seek out organic produce."

The Bakers have a web site, northstarorganic.com, for those who would like more information, and there is also a sign up opportunity for the CSA shares. "We have until June 15th to sign up our CSA customers" explains Baker "then we have to sit down and figure out our routes and delivery schedule."

Before a quick trip to the green house we were able to see the garlic that has started to emerge under rows of straw in the garden. In the green house you will see the thousands of plants that will soon be planted. A couple of unusual varieties, cotton and peanuts, are part of that inventory.

We'll keep in touch with Marvin and North Star Farms to give you a progress report as the garden(s) are planted and skillfully managed by Marvin and Irene.

Custody Modification

As this school year comes to an end, many parents contemplate their custody plan and changes they might like to institute for the following school year. So, how does the process of modifying custody work?

First and foremost, courts do not like modifying custody agreements that were created less than two years ago unless there are exceptional circumstances. Exceptional circumstances are those which would harm the health and/or safety of the minor child in question. If you and your co-parent just went to court for a custody matter a year ago but you are not happy with the daycare that your co-parent is using, that is not going to merit custody modification.

Additionally, many custody agreements state that parents must first try mediation before going to the courts for a custody dispute. Mediation is a less formal environment in which both parties sit and discuss the dispute in an attempt to come to an agreement without the court getting involved. Attorneys are not necessarily needed for this process but may be used if the parties would prefer.

If two years have passed and there is no mandatory mediation, custody modification starts out with a motion to modify primary residential custody. This motion is accompanied by a brief, which lays out all of the reasons why there needs to be a custody modification. This motion must be filed with the court and served to the defendant, your co-parent. Following this submission, the court will typically set the matter for a hearing, in which both parties will present their arguments.

Courts use a set of factors designed to help figure out what is in the "best interest" of the child. These factors do not outright favor mothers over fathers or vice versa. Parents must demonstrate that living with them is in the child's best interest, as opposed to being in the parents' best interest.

Once the parties have made their arguments, the judge will typically rule on the case within two weeks.







As summer approaches, Americans are looking forward to enjoying our Nation's rivers, lakes, and oceans. National statistics show that recreational boating is safer today than ever before, with the number of boating fatalities declining even as the number of boats increases. However, lives continue to be lost needlessly, and we must remain committed to boating safety. During National Safe Boating Week which is 22-28 May, we are reminded that practicing simple steps can make recreational boating safer and more enjoyable.

Drowning remains the number one cause of recreational boating fatalities. According to the American Boating Association, there were 613 boating fatalities in 2020. In many of these cases, life jackets were available on board, but were useless to the passengers in the boats because the speed and suddenness of the accident prevented them from having time to put on their life jackets. The chances of surviving a serious boating accident increase dramatically by wearing a life jacket. Modern life jackets are smaller, lighter, and more flexible, making them easier and more comfortable to wear.

The National Safe Boating Council, the National Association of State Boating Law Administrators, and the U.S. Coast Guard are working with other campaign partners to encourage safe boating practices through the 2021 North American Safe Boating Campaign. In addition to wearing life jackets, the campaign encourages boaters to enroll in a boating safety class, to ensure that boats are properly maintained and checked for safety, to follow regulations and guidelines relating to homeland security issues, and not to consume alcohol when operating a boat. By improving our skills and increasing our knowledge of recreational boating safety, we can reduce the loss of life, the injuries, and the property damage that occur on our waterways.

Safe boating also contributes to homeland security and frees the time of public safety officers to focus on enforcement issues. The same Coast Guard members, local police, and fire departments who respond to recreational boating accidents are also responsible for protecting the security of our nation's ports and waterways. By avoiding boating accidents, Americans can help these officials devote more time and effort to safeguarding our homeland.

In 1963, the Limited Test Ban Treaty prohibited open-air and underwater nuclear testing as a result of concerns from environmentalists and scientists.

Cooling System Tips

Have your antifreeze fluid changed and Cooling System flushed every 30,000 miles or 2 years. Newer formulas, however, may last up to 50,000 miles. To check coolant level, turn the car off and wait for the engine to cool. Locate the coolant reservoir (usually a translucent plastic tank) and eyeball the level of the coolant against the full and low indicators.

Just like human beings, the car needs to dissipate heat in order to avoid overheating and exhaustion. During combustion, the engine produces large amount of heat - about 4,000 degrees Fahrenheit. This is too much for the engine to bear so a cooling system is needed to keep it at a normal temperature. Cars usually overheat due to a damaged part in the cooling system, especially the radiator, the heart of the cooling system. It is therefore necessary that all its auto parts must be in proper working condition to ensure that the whole system works efficiently.

Aside from the radiator, the cooling system is composed water pump, freeze plugs, head gasket, thermostat, hoses, heater core, fan clutch and radiator fan. All these auto parts have special roles to perform thus the absence of one could significantly affect the whole cooling process and of course, the engine's performance. Take for example the hose, this may seem to be just an ordinary part but once broken, the coolant can escape and so it's no longer possible for the system to cool the engine. Even just the cap of the radiator is important. It holds the pressure in the cooing system; thereby,

affects its stability.

How does the cooling system of your car work? The coolant, which is a mixture of anti-freeze and water, is the one that absorbs the heat from the engine. It is drawn by the water pump from the radiator and is pumped through engine block and the cylinder head to absorb the heat from the engine and its parts. It goes back to the receiving tank of the radiator through the radiator hose. The radiator has tubes that contain large amount of water and has fin area to allow outside air to pass through. As the coolant spreads over the top of the radiator tubes, it transfers heat to the air.

The performance of your car is greatly dependent on your cooling system. No matter how gutsy its engine is, it can't work normally without a cooling system. The engine can even be inutile in an instant if it overheats and all other auto parts under the hood can also be damaged. They could melt as the engine burns the fuel inside the combustion chamber and the pistons in the cylinder could expand extremely that they can no longer move to complete the whole process in the engine. Your car can possibly overheat as well. Engine overheating is one of the most common problems auto users encounter. You can avoid this by adding water to your radiator. So if you notice a problem on a particular part in your cooling system, consult the best auto mechanic in town. But if you think the problem is worst, you may as well replace it right away.





Preparing for a PCS can be stressful, when a move involves children additional factors must be considered. How to mitigate childcare needs? What to do about school? How to prepare children for a big change? Child & Youth Services, along other support agencies, can help parents in finding the answers to these questions and more! If you have young children and need to place your child in care as you prepare for a PCS or upon arrival at your new location you may be eligible for Air Force Aid Society Child Care for PCS, often referred to as PCS Care. Sponsored by the Air Force Aid Society, the AFAS PCS Program is designed to help relieve some of the stress felt by families in the process of a PCS move and is completely free. AFAS PCS

provides 20 hours of child care per child at both the departing and inbound installation. Families may use the child care 60 days before the family's departure and 60 days upon arriving at the new installation. Eligibility Requirements: Member of the Air Force, Active Duty, Active Duty Member Retiring. How to Request Care: Completed Child Care for PCS Certificate obtained from the Airman & Family Readiness Center and Completed enrollment paperwork with the FCC Provider. For more information you can call the Family Child Care office at 701-723-6662 or visit: https:// www.dafchildandvouth.com/ expanded-child-care. School policy varies across districts, states, and countries. If you need support in navigating a change in schools

or preparing for homeschool, contact your school liaison (SL) by accessing the global directory https://www.dodea.edu/ at partnership/schoolliaisonofficers. cfm or call 701-723-1447 to speak with Minot's SL. At each location the SL can support all K-12 education needs: enrollment, school boundaries, graduation requirements, special education, sports & activities, student sponsorship, and more. A PCS is not just stressful on parents, the entire family must prepare for the change. If your children attend school make sure your school is aware of your upcoming move. Teachers, counselors, and administrators can be ready to support your student as they experience the highs and lows of preparing for a move. Contact

the Youth Programs to see about youth sponsorship options at your current and next location which allow your child to get connected with a peers prior to moving. Military Family Life Counselors are also a wonderful resource for both parents and children in facing the stressors of a PCS. The local Airmen & Family Readiness Center (701-723-3950) can help get you in contact with an MFLC. Finally, if your child is enrolled in the Exceptional Family Member Program (EFMP), be sure to work with your current EFMP-Family Support Coordinator (701-723-3950) to get connected to your next base. A great place to start in preparing for a move is https:// www.militaryonesource.mil/ moving-housing/ and if you have further questions about preparing for your student's transition give the School Liaison a call at 701-723-1447.

Family Child Care Utilizes STEM in Teaching

MINOT AIR FORCE BASE FAMILY CHILD CARE

During Month of the Military Child, 13 Family Child Care providers participated in Weekly STEM Challenges at Minot Air Force Base, N.D. Each provider was given three "mystery" items and asked to create an activity that was judged in three areas: innovation, relevance to weekly lesson plan, and inclusion of learning domains (social and emotional development, physical development, mathematics and reasoning, social studies, creative development, language and literacy development, and science).

Throughout April, the following three mystery items were placed in a large colorful box on each FCC doorstep each Monday morning: (week 1) purple foam sheets, paper plates, and sticky notes/ post-its; (week 2) purple masking tape, purple paper, foam stickers; (week 3) purple pom-poms, purple pipe cleaners,, and metallic star stickers; (week 4) purple yarn, paper cups, and rubber bands. The challenge began every Monday at 10 a.m. and ended on Friday at 10 a.m. The Family Child Care Coordinator, Alyssa Kelly, assembled and delivered each box and its contents, and the Flight Chief and School Liaison

Officer judged each activity. The four weekly winners were announced on Wednesday, May 12, 2021 at the Monthly Provider Meeting:

Week 1: Regina Corona Earthquake Sustainability Homes

Social Emotional Development: After the children build their house, they have to see if it will sustain an earthquake by shaking the plate. Emotions come to play when their house does not stay intact. I then explain to the children that it happens to people around the world who suffer from an earthquake. I let them know that when it happens to other people they pick up the pieces and rebuild their home.

Physical Development: Children will use their fine motor skills to cut each piece and put them together. Each tab will be inserted into each hole in correlation with the letter on the tab and by the hole.

Mathematics and reasoning: Each child will match the amount of sticky notes to each number labeled on the sides of their house. Each sticky note will act as the windows and doors.

Social Studies: If the house

withstands or does not withstand the earthquake, they are learning that it happens in real life. Even windows and doors may break down and they learn that this is a natural disaster that occurs in real life. They are also coloring the world on the plate.

Creative Development: Children will use the plates to color and draw what they perceive the world to look like and what colors they'd like to add.

Language & Literacy Development: Each tab and hole will be labeled A, B, C, D, E, and F They have to match each letter to its corresponding hole in order to build their house.

Science: Movement of the plate which acts as the world, causing the house to shift, move, and collapse as if it were an earthquake!

Week 2: Kimberly Reeves The Color Train

Our theme of the week is transportation. I made train tracks with the tape. The children had to match the sticker colors to the color wagons. Afterwards, they played with the train on the tracks. They decided together which sticker goes on which wagon. It helped with fine motor skills (peeling off the paper on the back of the stickers), team work, color recognition and imaginary play.

Week 3: Lacey Ranucci Fishing Poles

Children will learn to form lines out of pipe cleaners and pompoms in this activity, as well as work on making patterns with them. They learned to sort the items as well and recognize differences. This week we are learning about the letter "L," so we find objects and listen for sounds that start with the letter, which is why we used lines in our activity and everyday learning. What do we do before we go upstairs and downstairs? "We line up." When we go to the park what are we supposed to do? "Line up, hold hands, and stay by Ms. Ranucci.'

Week 4: Cassidy Larson Cup Phones

We made phones with our cups and strings! We put the rubber bands over the cups before we painted so when we took them off the cups we could see lines.

Each weekly winner received a purple apron with pockets to use inside their homes for any creative activity they dream up (as well as extra weekly challenge supplies), and all 13 participants received a bracelet with the word "Mindfulness."

Regarding the STEM Challenges, Family Child Care Coordinator, Alyssa Kelly, proudly stated, "Minot AFB has an exemplary group of talented FCC Providers who teach remarkable, creative lessons on a daily basis. However, only coordinators and parents notice these lessons, as most teaching occurs within each FCC home rather than in a group setting, such as is the case at the Child Development Center or Youth Center. With these challenges, the teachers had the opportunity to showcase their skills and aptitude while having fun and connecting with these beautiful, resilient military children!"

When asked if next year's Month of the Military Child will have the same STEM Challenges, Kelly said, "We'll see! It's a mystery...." She added, "I am so grateful for the opportunity to highlight these amazing teachers on our base and if given the chance to do this again—maybe not exactly like these STEM challenges—I will, certainly, do it!"



Kicking off summer

Pigs really can fly.

And penguins fare quite well in the North Dakota summer sun and breeze – even if it's not at a zoo.

Don't forget alligators.

They're colorful, friendly, and loving life in the Great North Dakota Outdoors.

Well, OK, admittedly none of these guys are real but they truly will be in the state and it's not as part of a travelling circus.

Instead, after a year's hiatus, Sky Fest over Fort Stevenson is back at Fort Stevenson State Park May 29 through 31. Pigs, penguins, alligators, and an array of other kite designs, shapes, and sizes will fill the sky from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. each day.

Assuming, that is, there isn't too much wind. Yes, it can be too windy to fly kites. And the kites won't fly if lightning is within five miles but the way this year as gone for lack of rain, lightning and thunderstorms likely won't be an issue.

Amazingly, on the off chance that it's calm, some kites and other spinning objects can still take to the air, described Sky Fest founder, organizer, and kite enthusiast extraordinaire Rena Rustad, Roseglen. And others (bol kites and spinners, for example) will be bouncing merrily along on the ground and spinning away.

While there will be professional flyers demonstrating their kites, the public can fly their own kites throughout the festival. Don't feel bad if a person doesn't own a kite – there will be kites for sale.

Here's the schedule: May 29:

*Come 12:50 p.m. for the 1 p.m. free kids kite-making, ages 3 to 12.

*3:30 p.m.: Candy drop.

*8 p.m.: Night flying with spotlights, reflective LED lights on kites, and glow sticks. Rustad has a skeleton kite she lights at night for a "really cool effect"," she described. May 30:

*2 p.m.: Photos with Wally the Walleye.

*3 p.m.: Candy drop.

May 31:

The festival can be as interactive as a person wants. Kite flyers love to talk kites, Rustad smiled. They love to help beginning flyers and talk about the special kites they may have.

Attendees can fly kites. They can learn about kites. They can win prizes and maybe a special custom designed kite.

Or they can simply kick back in a lawn chair and enjoy the colors filling the sky.

Sky Fest is a kickoff to summer, Rustad suggested. "Bring a lawn chair, sunscreen, bring a kite if you have one, and we have kites for sale if you don't," she added.

This year marks the 8th anniversary of Sky Fest over Fort Stevenson, although it began almost 30 years as a small kite festival its founder, Deb Lenzen, called Skydance Sakakawea. When Lenzen retired, Rustad assumed the reigns and adopted its new name. The kite festival has grown from a small community event to a multi-state kite festival with professional flyers from places such as Arizona and Oregon sharing their passion with folks throughout the region.

Rustad and Christina Bond, Bismarck, are the core of the festival's success, although volunteers can assist – and would be greatly appreciated, Rustad added.

While the festival is free, park visitors have either a \$7 daily entrance fee or can use their \$35 annual pass. However, all military personnel receive free admission Memorial Day, May 31 as part of the N.D. State Parks and Recreation Department's tribute to those serving our state and country.

Visit Sky Fest over Fort Stevenson's Facebook page or go to their website, (www.skyfestnd.com) for more information or to volunteer to help fill the sky with color – and maybe even a pig, penguin, or alligator. Fort Stevenson State Park is located three miles south of Garrison.

Local Brewing Company Favorite for Many

In December of 2012, Bottineau native Aaron Thompson decided to answer a question he was asked many times while tending bar at a local establishment. "Everyone kept asking me, where's the local brewery? Where do I get a locally brewed beer?" Aaron shares. "I thought it was really time that someone do something about having a locally brewed beer."

And so, on December 9th of 2012, Souris River Brewing was born. The local snowboard pro, who has travelled to Norway and been named a Training Emeritus for Vail resorts, has gone down a different run in life, this run has made him a beer coniseur, producing beers with a unique local flavor and of course unique local names like Bakken Brown Ale (his personal favorite), Prairie Rose Pilsner and Henry's Pale Ale, just to name a few.

How does the snowboard pro transition to Executive Brewmaster? "Well if you don't know, you surround yourself with those who are smarter than you" says Thompson. And so Minot State University Chemistry professor, Dr. Bryan Schmidt entered the picture as the SRB Brewmaster. "Bryan is really smart. He was the President of the North Dakota Academy of Scientists, and so he has been an important part of our team."

But beer is only part of what

makes Souris River Brewing unique. An evening at SRB usually includes a signature SRB brew, and then a unique meal from a menu that features Walleve Bites. Poutine (a Canadian favorite), Elk Chili, and sliders made from 100% grain fed North Dakota beef. "We keep things local. We use North Dakota ingredients for our beer, and our menu is all North Dakota. We use soup bones and make our own soups...

you know...give them a true taste of North Dakota" Thompson says with pride.

Once you enter Souris River Brewing, you'll appreciate the atmosphere that has been created, all the way to the "bullet in the bar" laughs Thompson as he shows customers where the piece of lead is imbedded. "I built this bar myself, and when I cut the bar top, there was a bullet. Who knows where it came from".

It isn't unique to Souris River Brewing, but on most nights you can catch both Aaron and his wife, Dr. Jynette Larshus, working the floor and keeping the oft returning clientele happy. "The combination is pretty simple" says Aaron Thompson, "Great food, great beer and great service. That's what keeps our customers coming back."

So what does the future hold? "Well right now we've just put a new canning machine online. It will really help us in our out of market growth." The canning machine is the 4th major upgrade for Souris River Brewing, and certainly it won't be the last. "We're looking to expand. We would like to take over some of the space that is located south of our building" shares Thompson. That would allow us to expand our capacity. A recent law change helped out small breweries like Souris River Brewing that allows them to schedule up to 40, instead of 20, events per year. It allows the smaller breweries, like wineries, to participate in local festivals.

So when you get those visitors who ask about a restaurant and brewery that is local, "We meet the local North Dakota test," according to Aaron Thompson "we are all about local".




