

In an Air Force that often laments "the only constant is change," unprecedented encouragement from senior leaders to innovate is dissolving this phrase's negative connotation and driving Airmen at all levels to enact positive change within their organizations.

Innovators from across the Minuteman III enterprise have embraced Chief of Staff of the Air Force Gen. Charles Q. Brown, Jr.'s strategic imperative to "accelerate change or lose," adopting a rapid, collaborative approach to implementing innovation.

The Innovation Team aspires to serve as a model for system program offices and warfighter partnerships across the Air Force. In March, the team launched a joint Airmen Powered by Innovation (API) campaign to solicit innovative ideas from operators, system weapon maintainers and defenders, to name a few. The campaign is open to submissions from DoD employees and contractors through Dec. 31, 2021.

Minuteman III, America's most responsive leg of its nuclear triad, celebrated its 50th anniversary last year, and engineers and maintainers alike are no strangers to finding creative ways to keep 400 aging missiles on-alert 24/7.

A team of members from AFNWC and Air Force Global Strike Command, including from missile wings at Malmstrom Air Force Base, Montana; Minot AFB, North Dakota; and F.E. Warren AFB, Wyoming, has taken the lead on an innovation process to deploy projects faster while eliminating delays caused by lengthy or belated engineering reviews. Subject-matter-expert engineers within the Minuteman III Systems Directorate are charged with ensuring any changes to Minuteman III do not sacrifice weapon system integrity, safety or security-these individuals comprise over 1,100 years of experience across all subsystems and critical functional areas ranging from nuclear surety to safety and environmental.

"From my own observation of senior leaders in the acquisition community encouraging innovation and the renewed drive from our Air Force Chief of Staff General Brown, I saw a huge opportunity for Minuteman III," said Col. Erik Quigley, director, Minuteman III Systems Directorate. "I challenged the team with targeting areas of the weapon system or processes where we could take calculated risks and innovate without jeopardizing nuclear surety, safety,

The team is open to a wide scope of ideas, ranging from "quick wins" to long-term solutions that will keep Minuteman III safe, secure and effective for the next 16 years, until Ground Based Strategic Deterrent is fully deployed.

The Minuteman III Spark Accelerator team's goal is to continue working with Spark Cells and other partners beyond this year to ensure the innovative spirit of Minuteman III will continue and eventually outlive the weapon system as it reaches end of life. The team has already realized the benefits of its new collaboration with user innovation cells and is confident this Minuteman III partnership will serve as a model for other weapon system users and program offices to come together to support the warfighter and answer the call to accelerate change.

In early 2011, concerns of flooding began as local rivers and creeks ran abnormally high due to high soil content, above average snow pack, and persistent precipitation. The city of Minot began emergency operations on May 23, and by the 31st, a mandatory evacuation began. Over 10,000 residents of Minot, including over 500 offbase Airmen and families, evacuated to higher ground. The city partnered with Minot Air Force Base

personnel and the North Dakota National Guard to set up flood walls and provide aid to displaced families in the area. According to FEMA, about 11,456 acres of Ward County land were covered in anywhere between two to 15 feet of water, causing nearly \$700 million in damages. Minot AFB provided temporary emergency shelter for military members, DoD civilians and families who were unable to secure other arrangements. The 2011 flood was a tragedy of its own, but it proved the strong partnership and sense of community that Team Minot shares with the city.

Fleming Award Comes North

MINOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. -

For anyone who knows of Minot Air Force Base, you probably heard the phrase that has grown to be synonymous with the base and its people: "Only the Best Come North." The 54th Helicopter Squadron added emphasis to that phrase when they were recently awarded the prestigious Fleming Award for the year 2020.

Named after retired U.S. Air Force Colonel James P. Fleming, the Fleming Award was created to highlight the best helicopter squadron of the year in U.S. Air Force Global Strike Command. The award honors retired Colonel Fleming's courageous act of heroism when he saved several Green Berets from enemy fire while risking his own life in the process on November 26, 1968, near Pleiku, Vietnam.

One notable achievement of the 54 HS in 2020 was their role in coordinating training operations with Canadian forces, a first for both sides.

"We did the first international aerial gunnery TDY [Temporary Duty Travel] for Global Strike Command," said Maj. David Operchal, Assistant Chief of Standards and Evaluations for the 54 HS. "In March of last year, before COVID hit, we took two aircraft an hour-and-a-half north of us to Canadian Forces Base Shilo and we integrated with Canadian Joint Terminal Attack Controllers in our helicopters and we conducted aerial gunnery training in Canada. That was a big deal because we had to work with US NORTHCOM, with the attaches office of the State Department, in addition to the Canadian Forces and then also working with 5th Bomb Wing. Security Forces customs came and met us when we did that so there's a lot of integration work with them."

The 54 HS also showcased their ability to adapt and overcome new hurdles presented by the COVID-19 pandemic by providing steadfast mission support for the 5th Bomb Wing and 91st Missile Wing, creating split shifts that mitigated the potential transmission of COVID-19 while also keeping the unit up and running.

"The nuclear mission and nuclear security is always occurring so, even with a global pandemic, we still needed to maintain ICBMs [Intercontinental Ballistic Missiles] on alert," said Operchal. "That required all the maintenance and security things that we normally did so we instituted split operations. We'd have two separate crews, we call them Beaver One and Beaver Two crews. We had to split ops to ensure that we always met the 91st Missile Wing taskings in order for both convoy movements and security movements, in addition to keeping all of our aircrew as trained as they could be without

being able to go TDY and also keeping up our proficiency as best we could."

Additionally, the 54 HS performance in Global Thunder [an annual command and control exercise designed to train U.S. STRATCOM forces and assess joint operation readiness] went above expectations, proving to be a ready force to be reckoned with. Coming up with an aircraft dispersal plan, the 54 HS were able to mitigate some of the exercise injects that came with Global Thunder.

Through continuous dedication and readiness, the 54 HS demonstrated what it means to be part of Team Minot, raising the bar for future Airmen to overcome and adding context to "Only the Best Come North".



- Your heating system or air conditioning just functions when driving, not when idling, or quits blowing when the car is still
- Your heating unit blows cool air, or the air conditioning blows warm
- · At the highest setting, your vents don't put out much air

A comprehensive evaluation of heating and a/c systems includes:

- Evaluating the interior and blower
- Examining radiator coolant level, hose pipes, pressure cap and thermostat
- Examining the compressor belt
 - Examining for leakages or other damages.







People are eager to get out and enjoy family, friendship, the outdoors, and activities.

While this is anything but complete, here are a few things taking place in June throughout the region: *June 4 - 6: Devils Run Car Show, Devils Lake. A local car show launched in 1993, Devils Run Car Show is now a regional destination for car enthusiasts. Look for food, entertainment, contests, and lots of amazing cars.

As the oldest city in McLean County, Washburn was an important community back in the heyday when riverboats were the most efficient and popular transportation mode to ship goods. Nowadays, Riverboat Days is an opportunity to gather for parades, volunteer fireman's breakfast, games, dances, and a host of other activities for family and fun

Planting hours are 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

*June 12: It doesn't get any better for a variety of interests when Minot's Dakota Territory Air Museum hosts "Authors, Artists, and Airplanes" at the museum. The daily entrance fee includes the day's activities.

*June 17 - 19: County fairs are a staple in rural America and the McKenzie County Fair draws people from the county and beyond. Activities include a draft horse competition, demolition derby, and rodeo.

*June 18 – 20: Underwood hosts the annual McLean County Fair.

*June 25 and 26: Walleye fishing tournaments are popular on Devils Lake and one of the biggest is the annual Devils Lake Chamber of Commerce tournament. Saturday's final weigh-in at Grahams Island State Park is capped off with a fishing seminar geared towards young anglers.

*June 25 – 27: Santee Lucky Mound Powwow, Parshall. Powwows and celebrations play an important role in North Dakota's heritage for everyone. It's an opportunity to learn about Indian culture and marvel at the colors, pageantry, and amazing talents of drummers and dancers of all ages.

*June 26 and 27: Midsummer Classic Car and Bike Show: Underwood brings back its annual classic car and motorcycle show in 2021.

Look for weekend interpretive activities or events at some of North Dakota state parks, as well.

One reason Fort Stevenson State Park typically ranks as the state's leading park in visitor numbers – besides Lake Sakakawea fishing – is the park hosts an array of events throughout the year.

In addition to its National Trails Day Hike, other June park activities include National Marina Day June 12 with kiddie boat rides and Frontier Military Days June 26, and 27 with free park admission Visitor

Cuisine Brings People Together

Both SrA Jayme Gore and TSgt Peter Ferrer agree that common ground is established when food discussing food. "One thing that brings everyone together is food" says Gore, and Ferrer agrees. "We don't really have special holidays like Cinco de Mayo that feature special foods, we just enjoy the recipes" continues Ferrer.

According to both Gore and Ferrer, there are usually small groups of AAPI airmen at most bases, and they enjoy the cuisine that is common to them.

A little research into the geographic area tells us that Asian American Pacific Islander is a broad term which encompasses those who have a heritage from the Asian continent and Pacific islands of Polynesia, Micronesia and Melanesia. With that large of an area with multiple heritage backgrounds, the cuisine that brings them together is varied. Both Gore and Ferrer are married, and for Ferrer, his wife Christina "loves everything about it (the AAPI cuisine). Gore's husband Eryk may be on board for some of the various food choices but "I love raw fish, and he refuses to eat raw fish" according to Gore. And what about finding the

ingredients to prepare the ethnic recipes? Both Ferrer and Gore agree that the MAFB Commissary does a pretty good job at stocking the more common staples. "The Asian section pretty much has what I need" shares Gore, "and there is the large Asian (grocery) store in Bismarck" ads Ferrer.

Gore is from Waianae, Hawaii, leaving there in 2010, returning in 2018 and hopefully making it back every couple of years. Ferrer is from Barcolod City on the island of Negros Occidental, Phillipines.

When asked about how often they prepare Asian meals, "I make it once a week and I make a large amount so I can eat it throughout the week" Ferrer responds. For Gore it is not as often, "A couple of times a month we cook Asian."

A quick discussion found the two Airmen discussing options for AAPI cuisine in Minot, "one restaurant had salted duck eggs" said Gore "I was really surprised".

Both agreed that any gathering of Asian American Pacific Islanders was certainly open to anyone who wanted to be included "we are welcoming to everyone" added Gore.

Ingredients

- 2 cups whole milk
- 2 cups granulated sugar 1 box mochiko flour
- 1 can coconut milk
- 4 large eggs
- ³/₄ cup butter, softened
- 1 tsp baking powder

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Butter a 9x13 inch baking pan

3. Bake for about 1 hour and let cool completely. 4. Cut and enjoy! (Store in an airtight container at room temperature for up to 2 days)

ΡΑΝΙ ΡΟΡΟ (SAMOAN COCONUT ROLLS)

Ingredients

- 20 frozen dinner rolls
- 10 oz. coconut milk (1 can)
- 1 cup granulated sugar

Directions

1. Coat a 9x13 baking dish with cooking spray and arrange rolls evenly to thaw.

- 2. Cover with plastic wrap sprayed with cooking spray to keep dough from sticking to the plastic wrap.
- 3. Allow the dough to rise until doubled in size (may take 4-5 hours).
- 4. Pre-heat over to 350 degrees.

5. In a bowl combine coconut milk and sugar and whisk together until sugar in dissolved.

6. Pour about 2/3 of the coconut mixture over the rolls and bake 20-30 min. or according to the dough instructions. 7. Remove from the oven and pour remaining mixture

evenly over the top of the rolls. 8. The rolls should be sticky and gooey on the bottom and can be served upside down or right-side up.

GALBI (KOREAN BBQ SHORT RIBS)

Ingredients

- 3 lbs. beef short ribs sliced
- across the bone
- ³/₄ cup low sodium soy sauce
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sugar white or brown
- 2 tbsp vegetable oil 1 tbsp sesame oil
- 2 tsp minced garlic
- 1 bundle green onions minced
- 1 tbsp fresh grated ginger
- 1/4 tsp crushed red pepper flakes

Directions

1. Put everything in a gallon Ziploc bag except the meat and shake to mix all ingredients.

2. Add the meat and refrigerate for a minimum of 6-24 hours

 - ¹/₂ cup breadcrumbs
 - $\frac{1}{2}$ small onion

For the Pan Gravy

- 3 tbsp fat (from burgers)
- 3 tbsp all-purpose flour
- 1 tbsp soy sauce
- $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp salt or to taste
- 1/4 tsp black pepper or to taste
- 4 cups steamed white rice
- 4 large fried eggs (or as many as you desire)

Directions

Prepare and Cook the Beef Patties 1. In a large mixing bowl whisk together the grated onion, crushed garlic, an egg, salt/pepper, and soy sauce. Add the ground beef and breadcrumbs to the seasoning paste and mix with your hands, just until combined.

2. Divide and form the meat into 4 meatballs. Allow meat to rest, covered in the refrigerator for 20 minutes to an hour.

3. After the patties have marinated, preheat your skillet over medium heat. Meanwhile flatten the meatballs into an $\frac{1}{2}$ inch thick oval shape.

3. About two hours before you plan to cook, set the bag of marinated meat on the counter and allow to come to room temperature.

4. You can cook it on the bbg, on the stove, griddle, or table top grill. Cook the meat until medium rare or to your liking, 3-5 on each side. Serve with rice and side dishes such as kimchi.

FINADENE

Ingredients

- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup soy sauce
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup vinegar or lemon if you prefer
- 1 jalapeno pepper
- 2 serano peppers
- 4 stalks green onions
- ¹/₄ cup diced onions (optional)
- ¹/₂ cup cherry tomatoes (optional)

Directions

1. In a small bowl, mix soy sauce and vinegar. Slice the peppers and add them in. Enjoy over rice or as a side dish.

4. Press the patties into the hot skillet and sear the meat 3-4 minutes on the first side. Flip the patties and sear for an additional 3-4 minutes. Remove the meat from the pan and set it onto a sheet pan. Trasnfer to a warm oven while you prepare the gravy.

Prepare the Brown Gravy

1. Pour the fat from the frying pan into a heat safe bowl. Wipe out any charred bits from the pan.

Pour 3 tbsp of fat back into the pan and sprinkle the flour over it. Whisk until a paste forms. Cook the roux for 2-3 minutes on low heat until it begins bubbling and growing dark and begins to smell nutty.

2. Whisk the beef stock into the roux gradually to avoid lumps.

Heat the gravy, whisking frequently for 3-4 minutes or until the gravy thickens. Add the soy sauce, salt, and pepper, then give the gravy a taste and adjust the seasonings as necessary.

If the gravy isn't thick enough, mix a quick slurry of 2 tbsp of cornstarch and 1 tbsp of cold water and whisk into the gravy. Bring to a simmer until thickened. Ensure your stirring occasionally.

3. Fry eggs to your liking.

To Serve

1. Spoon a bed of steamed rice on a plate. Place a beef patty on top of the rice and pour a generous amount of gravy over it. Top the patty with a sunny side up egg. Enjoy!

Spread tomatoes and red onion on a lightly oiled sheet tray, place directly on the grill grate and cook for 30 minutes. Remove from grill and rest at room temperature until cool enough to handle. Cut each into a small dice and set aside in separate bowls.

Put a large pan on the Traeger and add the coconut oil. When the oil is melted and hot, add the diced red onion and garlic. Stir and cook for 60 seconds, or until fragrant. Stir in the spices and cook for 30 seconds more to toast the spices. Add the diced tomatoes to the pan and stir well.

Continue to cook, stirring occasionally for about 5 to 10 minutes, or until the tomatoes start to break down and dry up a little bit. Stir in the coconut milk and chickpeas. Cover the pan with a tight-fitting lid or foil and simmer the coconut chickpea curry for about 20 minutes, or until reduced slightly.

Before serving, stir in the fresh lime juice. Season to taste with salt, and garnish with fresh chopped cilantro. Enjoy!

"[What keeps me motivated are] My wingmen, just being able to look out for them and help them achieve their goals," said Vil.


With a deep belief in helping and serving others, Vil spends his free time volunteering and serving the community and would like to become a first shirt in the future.





Teammates in deterrence: Small business support to the nuclear mission

F. E. WARREN AIR FORCE businesses. BASE, Wyo. -- Minot A

While the mission of 20th Air Force is to "defend the United States with combat ready nuclear forces; on order, conduct global strike," 20 AF bases partner with small businesses to support our nuclear missions.

20 AF commands three intercontinental ballistic missile (ICBM) wings and one nuclear operations support wing: 90th Missile Wing at F.E. Warren Air Force Base, Wyo., 91st Missile Wing at Minot AFB, N.D., 341st Missile Wing at Malmstrom AFB, Mont., and 377th Air Base Wing at Kirtland AFB, N.M.

Together, the four installations contributed \$122.7M to small businesses during fiscal year (FY) 2020, Oct.1, 2019 through Sept. 30, 2020.

"Whether through nuclear deterrence or economic impact, 20th Air Force is dedicated to protect and support this great nation and the communities we call home," said Maj. Gen. Michael J. Lutton, 20 AF commander.

F. E. Warren AFB has obligated \$28.7M to small businesses, which is 94 percent of F.E. Warren's contract dollars. To break it down even further, \$18.8M is obligated to small disadvantaged businesses (a business owned by one or more individuals who are socially and economically disadvantaged), just under \$8.6M to service disabled veteran-owned businesses, and \$9.8M to women-owned small Minot AFB spent a total of \$47M; \$43M of that went to small businesses. Of the \$43M, \$19.4M went specifically to North Dakota small businesses.

2D LT EMILY SEATON, 20TH AIR FORCE

Malmstrom AFB has obligated \$19.5M to small businesses, which is 97% of Malmstrom's contract dollars. Of the \$19.5M, \$4.5M is to small disadvantaged businesses, just under \$1M to service disabled veteran-owned businesses, and \$1.1M to womenowned small businesses.

Of Kirtland's \$40.3M dollars obligated to contracts, \$31.5M is to small businesses. More specifically, \$14M to small disadvantaged businesses, \$405K to service disabled veteran-owned small businesses, and \$3M to women-owned small businesses.

Between Air Force initiatives and wing level efforts, the support and utilization of small businesses continues to grow.

Each of the four 20 AF bases house a small business specialist charged with helping companies identify and respond to every type of procurement opportunity the Air Force offers. For example, Mr. Chuck Weibel is a small business specialist at Malmstrom AFB. He conducts training for vendors, identifies potential opportunities for them to compete on, sets up product demonstration meetings between vendors and potential buyers, and seeks new and unique products that will not only benefit Malmstrom, but the Air Force as a whole.

Kirtland's small business office partnered with New Mexico's Procurement Technical Assistance Center to distribute the FY21 acquisition forecast to N.M. based small businesses. It has also engaged with the General Services Administration to discuss the FY21 acquisition plan and attended the Albuquerque Hispano Chamber of Commerce Procurement Summit.

F. E. Warren AFB has hosted, and Malmstrom AFB will be hosting, a pitch-day event bringing together small businesses from across the nation to help find solutions to challenges and problems identified by Airmen. Businesses are then selected for their solution and join the Small Business Innovation Research (SIBR) program. The SIBR program allows small businesses to explore new opportunities for research and development.

Communities are also invested in strengthening the connection between small businesses and 20 AF wings going into the future. The Greater Cheyenne Chamber of Commerce has developed a program to equip vendors in being competitive for the opportunities that will come with the ground based strategic deterrent system (GBSD) replacing the Minuteman III ICBMs. GBSD will be deployed to the three current 20 AF ICBM bases, F.E. Warren AFB first, followed by Malmstrom AFB, and then Minot AFB.

Speeding Puts Your Family and Others in Danger

Every day we all see it, that one "guy" driving like a madman on their way to work in the early morning hours, whipping in and out of traffic, just to get ahead of one more car, for what, maybe free donuts?

Despite statistics showing that excessive speed is a factor in a third of all fatal crashes, a recent survey by Farmers Insurance Group shows that 69.2 percent of respondents admitted to exceeding the posted speed limit on the highway. In addition, 36 percent said they regularly exceed the posted speed limit by five or more miles per hour, and 22 percent said they repeatedly drive 10 or more miles per hour over the speed limit.

Speeding is a factor in 31 percent of all fatal crashes, killing an average of 1,000 Americans every month, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), which estimates the cost to society of speed-related crashes to be more than \$40 billion each year. Speeding is a problem not only on freeways, but also on local streets. Many commuters opt to take surface streets, thinking they can more efficiently escape traffic and avoid congestion.

Here are some interesting facts our office put together to demostrat the difference in speed vs time, from the HW 83/ County Rd 10A (46th Ave NE) to the MAFB main gate: The approximate distance is 10 miles. Driving 70 mph take approx

7 minutes

Driving 50 mph takes approx 10 minutes

Driving 35 mph takes approx 15 minutes

Reducing your speed from 70 mph to 50 mph greatly increases safety and only increases travel time by 3 minutes.

Traveling over the speed limit can be especially dangerous in bad weather conditions. Speeding was a factor in 53 percent of fatal crashes that occurred when there was snow or slush on the road and in 60 percent of those that happened in icy roads.

There are steps you can take to make your driving safer. Here are some useful tips:

* Take time to plan ahead. Make sure you allow yourself enough travel time so you don't end up rushing to get to your

destination.

* Check your local traffic report on the Web before you leave so you know where to expect congestion -- then you know if you'll need more time to get to your destination. * Adjust your driving to meet

road conditions. If the road is wet, slow down and keep more distance between you and the vehicle ahead of you. Also, roads are treacherous when it first starts to rain, as the water mixes with oils and other deposits to create a slick road surface.

* Be prepared to adjust to sudden speed reduction, for example, when you're exiting




from a highway, encountering sharp curves on a two-lane road or entering residential or high bicycle/pedestrian traffic areas.

* If you're late, you're late. Accept it and apologize when you arrive. It's better than endangering lives.

* Wear your seat belt. It's not only the law, it could keep you from becoming a speedingrelated fatality.

Giving yourself plenty of time to get where you're going, heeding weather conditions, and using your common sense will help you drive more safely. So once again I ask the question "Where are the free donuts"?

Summer H.E.A.T. kicks off with Click it or Ticket

NORTH DAKOTA DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

Minot, ND - Law enforcement agencies across the state will soon have extra patrols for summer H.E.A.T. (Highway Enforcement of Aggressive Traffic) during the Click it or Ticket campaign from May 24 – June 6.

According to the North Dakota Department of Transportation Safety Division, more people have died in motor vehicle crashes in warm weather months (May through October) than cold weather months over the last five years. Failure to wear a seat belt results in more motor vehicle fatalities in North Dakota than any other factor. Seat belts save lives and are the single most effective safety device to prevent death and injury in a motor vehicle crash.

In 2020 in North Dakota, 42% of motor vehicle fatalities were not wearing their seat belts.

"Every occupant of the vehicle should take a few seconds to buckle up. Every trip. Every time," said Lt. Michael Roark with the North Dakota Highway Patrol. "It doesn't matter where you are going or how long it takes to get there, make sure to always wear vour seat belt."

Preliminary crash fatalities in 2021 are trending higher than previous years with 30 fatalities as of May 16, making this campaign a vital part of the Vision Zero strategy to eliminate motor vehicle crash fatalities and serious injuries on North Dakota roads. H.E.A.T. will take place through August to encourage everyone to wear a seat belt, use appropriate child passenger safety seats, follow all posted speed limits, and drive sober and distraction-free.







NORTH PLAINS ELEMENTARY FEATURE WEEK 4






