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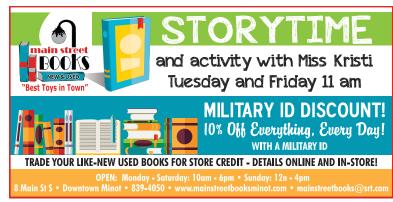

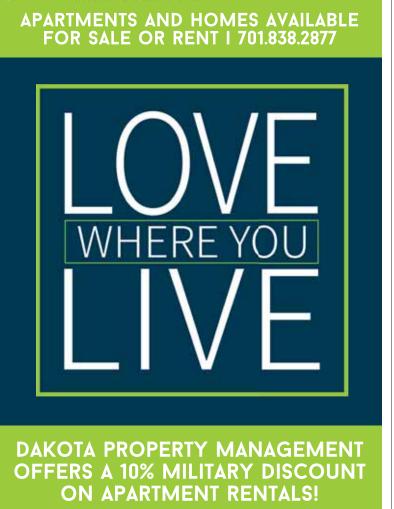

The Big Mac Salad recipe we're sharing is calculated at 585 calories per serving. The McDonald's app shows a Big Mac sandwich at 550 calories. This is a good reminder that salads don't always save calories, and brings awareness to what we're putting into our bodies.

Foods that are "alive" are as close to their original form as possible (fruits, vegetables, nuts, seeds, poultry, fish) and help fight inflammation. A steady diet of "dead" (or processed) foods leads to chronic inflammation, which can result in increased blood pressure, weight gain, elevated blood sugar levels, and arthritis. The human body is not designed to function properly under stressful conditions (poor nutrition).

Living food comes from nature, has a short shelf life, may seem expensive, and provides high nutrition with low calories, along with vitamins/minerals that are natural to the body. "Dead"

food comes from a lab or factory, has a longer shelf life, is cheaper, has low nutritional value and higher calories, may be "fortified" with vitamins/minerals that are not assimilated as well in the body, and many contain cheap fillers.

Some examples of living vs. processed foods are potatoes vs. potato chips or french fries; salmon vs. fish sticks; chicken vs. chicken nuggets; oats vs. instant/flavored oatmeal; berries vs. fruit snacks; water vs. Crystal Light; almond or natural peanut butter vs. Nutella or Biscoff spread; and banana vs. banana chips.

Sometimes a Big Mac hits the spot, but the Big Mac Salad contains more "living" ingredients. This week, pay attention to your food choices and see if you can incorporate more living foods - your body will thank

For Tonya Parker the news of being assigned to Minot Air Force Base brought tears to her eyes, but not tears of joy. Like every other city, Minot evolved from a bustling Main Street, and downtown business district. "There is a story to be told about downtown Minot," according to Parker "and that story, along with the unique dining and other businesses has given me an opportunity." That opportunity came when she was asked to organize a team building event for her place of employment, Freedom Financial. "I had a lot of fun doing the research on downtown Minot and coming up with stops on our (Freedom Financials') tour. From that we had the idea for the Taste of Minot," says Parker. Going from dining stop to dining stop in downtown Minot covers about a mile, and during the walk Tonya stops along the way and talks about the buildings and the history of downtown Minot. Some of the information is historical in nature and some of the information are stories that have been passed on from generation to generation. All of the information makes for an interesting 3-4 hour tour. On a recent tour, the group of 8 guests received a quick synopsis of The Fair building on the corner of Main & 2nd Avenue. Highlight? Well, The Fair had one of the first operating elevators in downtown Minot. Our first gourmet dining

stop included bread from Prairie Skies Bakery, and a selection of wines, oils and other interesting dipping sauces from Gourmet Chef. 3 samples of wine and 9 different unique tastes later, and we were off to our next stop, which included a couple of short historical moments that talked about different buildings and the fountain which now rests on the corner of Main and First Avenue. Did you know that the fountain has had several homes over the years? And now it is a "must see" part of any downtown walking

The Starving Rooster with owner Jeremy Maheny not only was a tasting spot, but a chance for us to get out of the rain. (Yes, I said rain...and we loved it!) Well, the Starving Rooster building used to house a mill, and because the new milling machine was so efficient at separating grain from chafe, the roosters who used to hang out on the milling floor would not get any grain...thus they were starving...and so Starving Rooster. Jeremy treated us to one of the Starving Rooster's Cuban pizzas, and we were off again to one of Minot's breweries, Souris River Brewing and a visit with owner Aaron Thompson about the brewing process, and yes of course, there was more food. We were all happy that we did some moderate walking between stops as the exercise was good to work off some calories. However, it can also be noted that Tonya was treating us to historical facts from downtown along the way. It seems that fires in downtown Minot destroyed many of the

original buildings, and the top 2 stores of what is now the Parker Center took years to complete!

Next stop? Arnies 2.0 Lounge and Bottle Shop and a visit with new owner, Melissa. Without saying much more, the transformation of hometown bar, Arnies, into Arnies 2.0 Lounge and Bottle Shop is one of the many changes in downtown Minot that makes this area a "must stop" for great food. Melissa is from South Carolina, and our featured drink was Mimosas. Word on the street is that the Saturday & Sunday brunches at Arnies are beyond description...on my dining bucket

Our last stop, again after a short walk back down Main Street, was Magic City Sweets... WOW! Who could have ever guessed that you could put ice cream on a donut and top it with crunches. Well Christine Staley, owner of Magic City Sweets, did just that. Ice cream is good any day of the week, and even in winter according to Christine. I think the general consensus was, we'll be back!

Our Taste of Minot adventure ended. We were stuffed (gourmet food stuffed) and certainly the 3-hour gourmet tour went by fast. 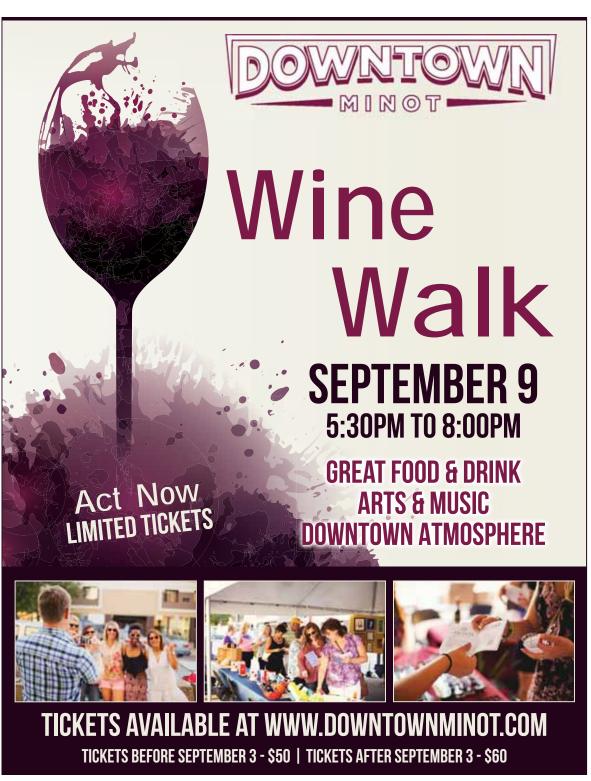

### CHILI-LIME SHRIMP WITH **GREEN ONIONS**



**INGREDIENTS** CHILI-LIME MAYONNAISE 4 1/2 OUNCE GUAJILLO PEPPERS **2 CUP MAYONNAISE 4 TEASPOON CHILE DE ARBOL** 12 TABLESPOON SALSA HUICHOL HOT SAUCE OR FAVORITE HOT SAUCE 4 TABLESPOON FRESH SQUEEZED LIME

**GREEN ONIONS** 4 RUNCH GREEN ONIONS 4 TABLESPOON EXTRA-VIRGIN OLIVE OIL **SALT AND PEPPER** 

MAIN 24 WHOLE EXTRA-LARGE SHRIMP, PEELED AND DEVEINED KOSHER SALT

When ready to cook, set Traeger temperature to 375°F and preheat, lid closed for 15 minutes. Prepare guajillo peppers by cutting off the stems and slicing down the side of the pepper. Shake out any seeds and pull out dried veins. Roast peppers directly on the grill grate for 3 to 4 minutes on each side depending on thickness, or until they deepen in color but are not yet blackened. Be careful not to burn them, and if you do, be sure to discard them as they will become bitter. Place peppers in a bowl and cover with hot water, stirring occasionally for 30 minutes. To make chililime mayonnaise, add grilled peppers, mayonnaise, chile de arbol, hot sauce and lime juice into a blender and combine until smooth. In a bowl, season green onions with extravirgin olive oil, salt and pepper.

Sprinkle shrimp with salt and place directly on the grill grates for 4 to 5 minutes depending on size. Brush shrimp with chili-lime mayonnaise throughout the cooking process. Once shrimp are cooked through, firm, and no longer translucent, they are ready to go. While shrimp are cooking, place green onions on the grill for 4 to 5 minutes, or until they are slightly charred. Remove shrimp and green onions from the grill. Serve

with additional chili-lime mayonnaise and fresh lime zest. Eniov!

# THIS WEEK IN USAF HISTORY

**HURRICANE KATRINA RELIEF OPERATIONS BEGIN** AUGUST 30, 2005 -

Military and civilian services began relief operations on Aug. 30, 2005, after Hurricane Katrina devastated the southern U.S. First Air Force commander Maj. Gen. M. Scott Mayes, the task force's joint forces air component commander, set up 1st Aerospace Expeditionary Task Force-Katrina at Tyndall Air Force Base, Florida. The task force set up various air expeditionary groups for a massive disaster relief operation, and 8,000 Air Force, Air Force Reserve, and Air National Guard were deployed by September

7. Helicopters (including a UH-1N Huey from Minot AFB) flew 648 sorties and rescued 4,322 people. Other USAF aircraft from bases all over the country flew 4,095 sorties. The AF evacuated 26,943 displaced people and provided aeromedical evacuations for 2,602 patients. AF medical personnel at the New Orleans International Airport treated 16,714 patients, and transport personnel airlifted 11,450 tons of relief supplies.

# Project BEE and Minot donors band together to help families in need

When families find themselves in need, the Minot community never fails to lend a helping hand. On Aug. 17, 2021, local nonprofit organization Project BEE held a drive-up Diaper Giveaway just outside Pink's Bar & Grill and Karma Convenience Store off Highway 83.

The first ever giveaway, which handed out nearly 12,000 diapers to registered families, took place in July. This month's drive boasted nearly 8,000 diapers as well as baby wipes, gallons of milk (courtesy of Starbucks), teddy bears (courtesy of the Minot Minotauros), and resources from the library, Souris Valley United Way, Minot Fire Department, and Minot Air Force Base.

"We are just helping to meet the basic needs of local families who don't know how far they can stretch their next paycheck... this way we can get them some milk, diapers, and some fun stuff for the kids," explained Liz Larsen, Project BEE's Executive Director. "We can also get them resources, because a lot of these families just don't know what's available to them. This month, we held it out in Ruthville to really focus on our military families because we have quite a few clients that are military."

Many of the diapers for the giveaway are bought directly from the manufacturer and then repackaged into smaller amounts by volunteers. "We also have community members who are donating diapers, some people who just like to fulfill our wish lists, and right now we have the diaper drive on base hosted by SSgt. Andrea Payne," Larsen said.

Each family is allotted 30 diapers per child at the giveaways.

According to Allie Walsh. Development Director for Project BEE, the 30 diapers are meant to offer support to parents but they are not enough to last an entire month. "It's not about providing all of the diapers; it's more about supplementing. But, this event is in addition to what we do for our clients so if you're a client and a part of our diaper program, Dakota Diaper Pantry, then you would receive 30 diapers that month through the pantry and then an additional 30 through this event," she said. "The goal of this is to help our families and then showcase to the community what we at Project BEE have to offer. That way we're able to widen the understanding of the programs we have so that we can provide for more people. If you believe that this program is for you, you can apply online and become part of our program to receive diapers monthly.'

Registration for the event is required so that they are able to gather the correct amount and sizes of diapers based on each family's needs. Project BEE plans to continue holding the giveaways each month until the cold sets in and then start up again in the spring of next year. The Dakota Diaper Pantry is available yearround for clients who still need help during the cold months when no giveaways are scheduled.

Project BEE also offers a variety of other resources including emergency shelter, a career closet, a shower program, rental assistance, and more. # **Brown named honorary Tuskegee Airman**

ARLINGTON, Va. (AFNS) --

Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. CQ Brown, Jr. was named an honorary Tuskegee Airman and presented the highly symbolic red jacket during a ceremony at the Air Force Memorial in Arlington, Aug. 14.

Induction into the elite group of Tuskegee Airmen Inc. as an honorary member is a direct reflection of an individual's dedication to preserving the heritage and legacy of the "Red Tails" as well as introducing youth to aviation and science, technology, engineering and math opportunities.

Gen. Brown, just like the Tuskegee Airmen, you have been a trailblazer," said Jerry Burton, Tuskegee Airmen Inc. national president. "You, like them, have shown that hard work and staying on task results in success.'

Formed during the onset of World War II, the Tuskegee Airmen pioneered the way for desegregation in the military while simultaneously dominating the skies in Europe. Their accomplishments and famous Red Tails have been celebrated throughout history.

"I am grateful, humbled and proud, not only to receive the coveted red jacket, but to also have one of the documented original Tuskegee Airmen, Col. Carl Johnson, here with me today," Brown said.

Just as they did more than 80 years ago, despite public

scrutiny, the Tuskegee Airmen Inc. continues to set the standard for courage, leadership and innovation of today's Air Force.

"I am forever grateful for African American aviators that paved the way for me to be here," Brown said. "I also realized as the Chief of Staff of the Air Force I probably was not the first one to be qualified to have this position; I was just the first one to be given the opportunity."

The heritage of the Tuskegee Airmen remains a symbol of hope against the challenges the nation faces today.

Brown says he hopes to inspire young men and women the same way he was inspired by the Tuskegee Airmen.

"As the first Chief of Staff of the Air Force, or Service Chief, that's African American, I'm very conscious of the enormity of what this opportunity is for me but what it represents for so many," Brown said. "I hope that me being the Chief of Staff of the Air Force will be an inspiration to others so they can prepare themselves for that 'someday' when their chance may come."

•September 18: NPFM will be a part of the Downtown Fall Festival, and Rebel Athletics of Minot will be in attendance with a live gymnastics demonstration

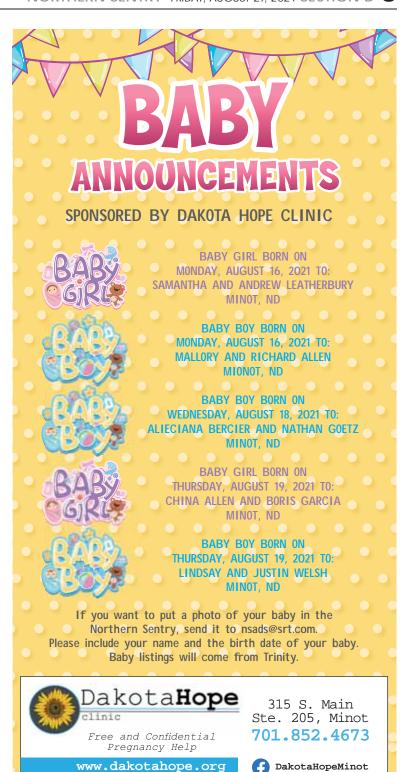
NPFM is always looking for opportunities to expand and improve, and the upcoming events are just a small part of the many ideas that they have planned for the future.

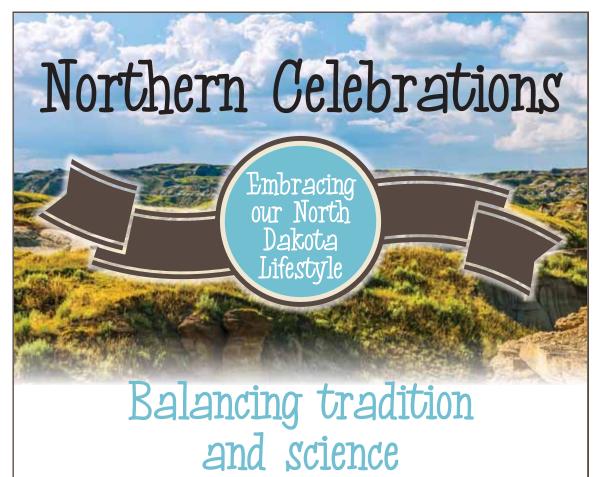

including hunting traditions.

Things like always hiking a favorite patch of prairie during grouse season.

Or setting dove decoys along a particular ol' patch of dead trees, even if its lonely, withered limbs are giving way to weather.

Sometimes traditions weave their way into the fabric of hunting regulations, even though the North American Wildlife Conservation Model drives — for the most part hunting regulations and wildlife management.

It's a model emphasizing the role of sound wildlife management and science as the drivers in management decisions and regulations.

Sometimes — and probably more often than one realizes — it's OK to weave tradition with science.

As much as hunters and the public would probably like to see wildlife regulations based solely on science, it's not a black-and-white situation even using the North American Wildlife Conservation Model as a guiding principle.

Take, for example, North Dakota's tradition of shooting only rooster pheasants. There really isn't a biological need to protect hens in the state. Admittedly, back in the early days when state wildlife management agencies were trying to establish resident populations of the glitzy import, it was important to protect hens.

It's also relatively easy under normal hunting circumstances to identify rooster pheasants from hens, making it a regulation based on sound biological information.

Fast-forward several generations and pheasant states really don't need to protect hen pheasants to sustain viable populations even when populations fluctuate. It's more of a social thing. It's only necessary to protect females of a species when populations are so low that harvesting them is detrimental to an overall population.

That's one reason North Dakota's sage grouse and prairie chicken seasons are closed — their populations are too low to justify hunting.

North Dakota has also has a traditional three-bird daily pheasant limit even though populations skyrocketed during the Conservation Reserve Program heyday of abundant grassland habitat - and tumbled with a

Traditions are part of the core of American fabric, corresponding tumble of CRP acreage coupled with horrific winter mortality.

> It goes back to the fact the socially acceptable threebird daily limit doesn't affect pheasant populations in good or bad years. In addition, rooster pheasants will out-compete hens when feeding in the winter. In years when pheasant populations are lower than normal or below average, having less roosters on the landscape can benefit hens. They have less competition when feeding, which translates into a better chance of surviving a North Dakota winter.

> North Dakota also has a "keep it simple" tradition when it comes to hunting regulations, believing that unless there are sound biological reasons to change regulations, they will stay as minimally complex as possible.

> Sometimes social issues remove management decisions from the hands of biologists. Examples include when the North Dakota legislature, at the urging of business interests, changed the state's pheasant season opener from its traditional second Saturday in October so it's now state law the season can open no later than 0ct. 12.

> Sometimes it still opens on the second Saturday; sometimes the first.

> So instead of hunters knowing it's a North Dakota tradition to open pheasant season on the second Saturday in October, state law moved it so it bounces around.

> The "keep it simple" concept went out the door on the state's pheasant opener. North Dakota has the latest pheasant hatch in the United States, yet the earliest opening hunting date.

> Another tradition is the second Saturday in September sharp-tailed grouse opener, again with a hatch later than other sharptail states.

> Yes, the North American Wildlife Conservation Model really places sound science as the driver of wildlife management decisions. State agencies do apply its principles.

It's just that sometimes there is wiggle room. Public opinion plays a role.

The challenge is making sure it doesn't tip the scales so it's not detrimental to wildlife, hunters, and the public.

"We are excited for this incredible opportunity to partner with the Space Force in developing students and Guardians into high-tech problem-solvers," said Armacost. "Students and faculty will apply their expertise to projects vital to the Space Force mission to deliver impactful solutions for increasing efficiency, resiliency and sustainability for space capabilities."

Universities were selected based on four criteria: the quality of STEM degree offerings and space-related research laboratories and initiatives; a robust ROTC program; a diverse student population; and degrees and programming designed to support military, veterans and their families in pursing higher

Signing an MOU is only the first step in defining the partnership. Next, the Space Force will work with UND and each university that follows to outline specific implementation milestones to meet the program's four main

Establish opportunities for world-class research, advanced academic degrees, and workforce and leadership development for USSF Guardians

Identify and pursue research of mutual interest member universities, individually and collectively

Establish scholarship. internship and mentorship opportunities for university students and ROTC cadets

The Space Force designed the UPP to identify, develop and retain a diverse STEM-capable

workforce, but also recognizes there are secondary benefits of the program.

"Students who participate in the research or development opportunities created through the UPP do not need to become military or civilian Guardians," said Raymond. "Our nation

# **Pedestrian** Safety

**Know and Watch** your Surroundings

Remain vigilant at all times, especially

Did you know approximately 5,900 pedestrians in America are killed by automobiles every year? Almost onethird of these victims are children under the age of 15. All of us are pedestrians at one time or another, and are obligated to abide by the same traffic laws that assure the safety whether we are walking, bicycling or the motorist, or an adult or child. As parents we are also obligated to teach our children the importance of traffic safety, especially in housing areas where streets have a tendency of being smaller. Here are a few pedestrian safety tips to follow:

• Walk on the sidewalks – Stay on the sidewalks and crosswalks. Avoid walking in traffic if there are no sidewalks or crosswalks. If you have

no other choice, walk facing the traffic.

• Look LEFT, RIGHT, and LEFT for vehicles – Stop at the curb and look LEFT, then RIGHT, then LEFT  $\,$ again. Stopping at the curb signals drivers that you intend to cross. Cross in marked crosswalks and obey the

· See and be seen- Stay out of the driver's blind spot. Make eye contact with the driver when crossing busy streets. If walking at dusk or dark, wear reflective gear and carry a flashlight. Vision is more impaired

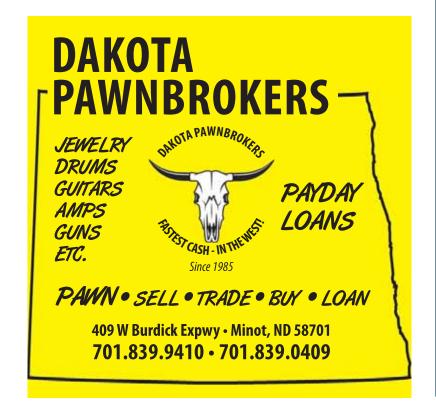
• Watch your children – Do not let your children play in the streets or close to the roads. Do not let them cross the roads without supervision. While walking through the housing area ensure to be aware of any cars pulling out of their driveways, especially if they are backing out. They may not always see you. Children are small, unpredictable, and cannot judge vehicle distance and speeds. Start teaching your children at an early age on traffic safety. Teach the colors of all of the traffic lights and the vehicle lights and what they mean. Educate the importance of not darting out on the road, even to chase a ball.

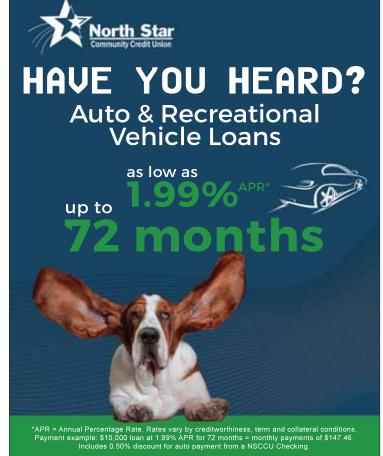
As a motorists on Minot AFB do not always assume the people around you are paying attention. Sometimes their attention can be diverted especially if they're children. All people are unpredictable and as a motorist, you should always be alert. You can encounter a pedestrian anytime and anywhere, even in places where they are not supposed to be. They can be hard to see, especially at night or while it's raining. Slow down if you can not see clearly. Stop for pedestrians who are in the crosswalks and when you stop for a pedestrian in the crosswalk, make sure you are far enough back for cars in the other lane to see the pedestrian in time to stop. If vehicles are stopped in the street in front of you, do not just assume you can pass them, maybe their waiting for a pedestrian to cross the road. When turning right on a red right, always look to the right as well as the left to make sure pedestrians are not crossing in the crosswalk. If you spot a pedestrian wearing headphones or using a cellular phone, be attentive for they may not hear your vehicle.

in areas where children may dart out unexpectedly into traffic areas. These include base housing and school areas, near school buses and around ice cream trucks. While backing out of your driveway, always look in your back window as well as your mirrors to ensure no kids are behind you. If you have to, walk around the vehicle before driving out.

One last tip to keep in mind, if you see a child in the front yard or near a curb, always assume they will dart out on the road. If you always keep this in mind, this will lessen the chances of a child being struck. By paying attention to your surroundings, whether you are the pedestrian or the motorist. It could be a matter of life

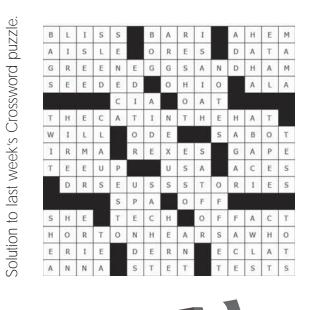

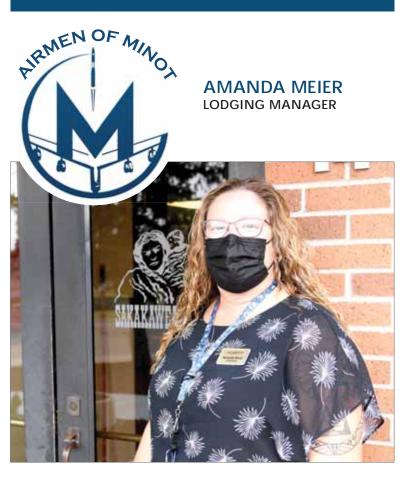

# The Mighty Eighth and J-GSOC welcome new commander

Lt. Gen. (select) Mark Weatherington relinquished command of the nation's bomber force to Maj. Gen. Andrew Gebara during a change of command ceremony at Barksdale AFB, La., today.

The commander of Air Force Global Strike Command officiated the event.

"I am particularly proud of the Eighth Air Force and the Joint-Global Strike Operations Center team," said Gen. Timothy Ray, AFGSC commander. "I take comfort in the leadership and team that will carry on the bomber tradition."

Family, friends, local community leaders and Airmen across the enterprise who could not attend the event in person were also able to view the ceremony via video live stream in order to keep in

accordance with social distancing guidelines and preventative health measures in response to COVID-19.

In his final moments as commander, Weatherington reflected upon his time within the historic "Mighty Eighth" unit.

"America's bomber force is second to none -- a testament to the professionalism and dedication of the men and women who maintain, operate, support and direct the free world's premier long-range strike force," said Weatherington. "It has been my distinct honor to serve alongside and lead these remarkable Airmen.'

With the passing of the flag, Gebara officially became the 56th commander of The Mighty Eighth, an organization with approximately 21,000 Airmen across six installations, proudly operating more than 150 E-4, B-1,

B-2, B-52 and T-38 aircraft.

"There is no doubt U.S. bombers remain and will continue to be in high demand in every area of responsibility across the globe," said Gebara. "We will continue to be ready to fight tonight, while bridging to the future force our nation needs to keep our country safe."

As the leader for U.S. bomber forces, Gebara also assumed the role of commander for the Joint-Global Strike Operations Center, which plans and executes strategic deterrence and global strike operations for U.S. Strategic Command air components.

The roles and responsibilities as the leader of the Air Force's bomber force are many, but Gebara said he remains eager for the challenge and puts faith in his newfound team.
