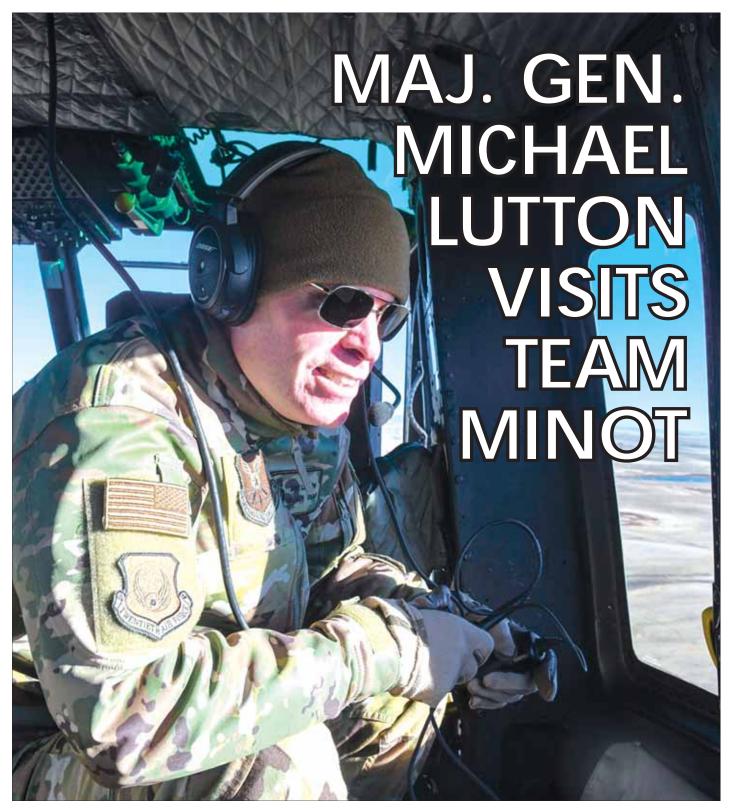

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Innovation at Minot AFB: Atomic Spark

In an age of rapidly advancing technology and the need for practical solutions to current problems, the Air Force is finding ways to draw ideas from everyday Airmen and foster an innovative ecosystem. AFWERX, the Air Force's one of a kind program that assists Airmen in efficiently developing affordable, useful capabilities by connecting them to technology developers, is a powerhouse of innovation. On an installation level, AFWERX supports individual spark cells, or innovation cells, to bring Airmen's ideas to life.

Minot Force previously hosted two spark cells, BullyWERX and BUFFWERX, but has recently combined the efforts of both wings to create a more efficient joint cell called Atomic Spark. Thanks to the dedication of Capt. Matthew Matuszak, 91st Operational Support Squadron, TSgt. Dominic Garcia, 5th Civil Engineer Squadron and Director of Innovation for the Bomb Wing, TSgt. Israel Garza and MSgt. Peter Patera, 91st Missile Security Operations Squadron, Team Minot now has a unique opportunity to lead the way in innovation.

Atomic Spark began at an AFWERX conference in Las Vegas, Nev., in June 2021. At the time, Matuszak was directing the 91st Missile Wing spark cell and Garcia was in charge of the 5th Bomb Wing cell. "When we met, we thought it was kind of silly that we had two spark cells doing some of the same things and it was wasting a lot of resources, so what if we just pooled our efforts instead? That would make a lot more sense," said Matuszak.

The team named the new jointwing innovation cell Atomic Spark as "an homage to the nuclear capabilities of the B-52 and Intercontinental Ballistic Missiles," according to Garcia. From there, they were able to secure \$100,000 from AFWERX to set up a facility at Minot AFB. Through their own handiwork and with the help of Marvin Sanders, Director of Skills and Development at MAFB Arts

and Crafts, the Atomic Spark team built a one of a kind maker space within the Arts and Crafts building.

So why does Team Minot need Atomic Spark? Matuszak said, "A lot of good ideas die in the process. By the time it gets through multiple supervisors or leadership, maybe it doesn't get approved or it gets lost in the weeds and is never seen or heard from again. We have our own pool of money that works very rapidly, and it skips a lot of the contracting processes that take a lot of time. Small companies get to prototype the tech, and we work directly with the Airmen to take an industry approach to solve existing problems without all that lag time. An easier way to understand it is as a rapid capabilities office. You take an idea, and you work with industry or existing solutions that the Air Force hasn't adopted vet. and prototype it, bring it to life, and then sustain it."

Since its conception, the Atomic Spark team has secured millions of dollars in funding for projects that will help streamline the mission at Minot AFB, and potentially even Air Force-wide. From UV light absorbing windows that generate power to individually heated clothing, and even the first 3D printed tool to be used in ICBM operations, Atomic Spark is already making waves and developing innovative solutions and efficient alternatives for the

"The spark cells are designed to procure and solve certain problems. They can be technological problems, process problems, they could be anything," said Garcia.
"The cells procure these issues and then help garner solutions and work with Airmen to get it from ideation to deployment or execution."

Innovation is no cheap task, but for Atomic Spark, where there's a will there's a way. "We've been spending the last four months setting up the physical location for Atomic Spark, but since I got here in December, I've been able to get

\$12 million worth of funding for projects across the installation. None of that is Air Force money," said Garcia.

Atomic Spark draws funding from the Small Business Innovation Research (SBIR) and Small Business Technology Transfer (STTR) programs, which provide valuable seed money to fund research, development, and projects for small businesses.

Because the spark cell works directly with small businesses and avoids the typical contracting process, Airmen are able to be more hands-on and expedite the development of new technology. Garcia explained, "What's even more incredible, besides the money, is that now you have the end user who had the idea, who is championing this project and they are working directly with the company. The company has 15 months to deliver something. The reason why that's special is if you think of the normal procurement process, you need to have leadership approval, programs officers, contracting, finance approval, and the end user will never talk to the company. Here, you choose a company you want, they build it for you, and it's more direct."

"It costs us extremely different compared to contracting out. It's way faster, and we are in total control of the process," said Matuszak.

Atomic Spark focuses on this Airman-involved concept, and their new facility is filled with state of the art technology, furniture, and other resources to foster innovation mindset and creativity in developers. Instead of looking like a typical military facility, Atomic Spark's environment was modeled after the idea of a successful technology innovation space, such as Google, according to Matuszak.

Though the program is quickly expanding, the directorial team must still balance their unit missions alongside running Atomic Spark. Patera said, "Myself and Tech Sergeant Garza, our primary

roles are Security Forces Weapons and Tactics. We have to coordinate through communication. We aren't dedicated to this as a primary like other spark cells. Most of them, their primary focus is the innovation cell but we are not. Our primary focus is what we do for our units. We do the best we can to help out."

Garza, who will be stepping into Patera's position at Atomic Spark once he leaves Minot, continued, "The 91st is the smallest missile wing, since we share with the 5th Bomb Wing. So manpower wise, we struggle the most in comparison. We try to balance it as best we can, and we are definitely trying to open it up full time so the Airmen have the opportunity to come in with their ideas."

Not only is Atomic Spark focused on bringing Airmen's ideas to life, but they hope to shift the innovation mindset within the Air Force. "It's been an uphill battle, but that culture is slowly shifting. Why do we spend ten hours doing this thing like we have for the past 30 years when, say, Amazon can do it this way and it takes them five minutes? It's changing the mindset and the culture," said Matuszak.

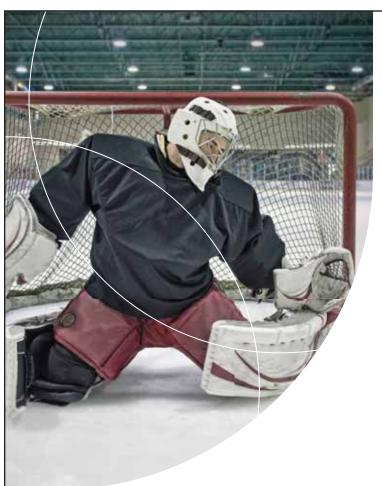
Garcia added, "We used to have the idea program back in the day and it created this culture that Airmen thought they had to have these big, grandiose, Air Force changing ideas, but they don't. There can be an incremental solution that can still have an impact across the installation or in your work center, and even those need help being brought to life. It's from the small to the big and

everything in between."

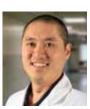
Part of that mindset shift includes education opportunities, which the Atomic Spark team hopes to expand in the future. Coding workshops, a Design Warfare and Thinking courses, Design Sprints, and Innovation Funding educations available to interested individuals and organizations are a few examples of the programs that Atomic Spark can provide to inspire future innovators. "The goal is to basically work more hand in hand... how can we better serve Team Minot as a whole?" said Matuszak

The Atomic Spark team is just getting started, but they have already made an impact at Minot AFB in changing the dynamic and bringing excitement and passion to innovation. At its very core, Atomic Spark is just as passioncentered as it is creativity and Airman-centered. "Passion is the magic that drives change,' said Garcia. "It is contagious, reenergizing, and progress forward to harness that individual passion and bring it together towards a common interest." With that, Airmen and Atomic Spark can successfully collaborate to bring modern solutions to quickly evolving problems. Not only do the best people come North, but so do the best ideas.

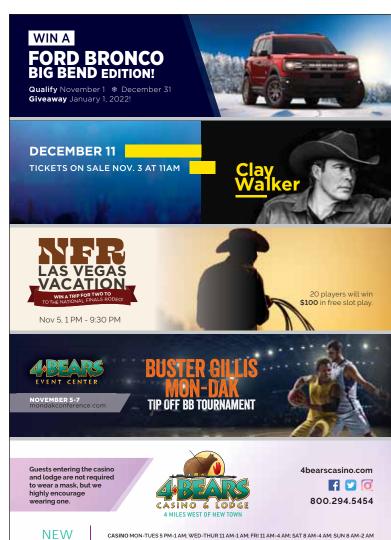






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Two Simple Words

Colonel Gary Kramlich was born and raised in Minot, North Dakota, the second of eight children to Gary and Glory After graduating Kramlich. from Minot High in 1992, he attended the United States Military Academy, receiving a commission in 1996 as a Second Lieutenant in the Infantry. He held multiple operational assignments as a Mechanized Platoon Leader, Support Platoon Leader, Brigade Planner and Rifle Infantry Company Commander. Upon relinquishing command, he attended the Naval Postgraduate School in Monterey, CA where he obtained a Master of Science in Operations Research in 2005. He then served as an Assistant

Military Academy from 2005-

He was assigned to the 82nd Airborne Division at Ft Bragg, NC from 2008-2012 as the Chief of Assessments, where he



deployed for a total of 26 months in Afghanistan for Operation ENDURING FREEDOM. In 2012, Kramlich took assignments in the Headquarters, Department of the Army G-3/5/7 as a Strategic Planner and later at the US Army Intelligence and Security Command at Ft Belvoir, VA.

Professor at the United States In 2015, he then attended the U.S. Army War College followed with two years in U.S. Africa Command in Stuttgart, Germany.

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SMOKED PUMPKIN SOUP



INGREDIENTS

5 POUND PUMPKIN, WHOLE 3 TABLESPOON BUTTER 1 ONION DICED 2 CLOVE GARLIC, MINCED 1 TABLESPOON BROWN SUGAR 1 TEASPOON PAPRIKA 1/4 TEASPOON GROUND CINNAMON 1/8 TEASPOON GROUND NUTMEG 1/8 TEASPOON ALLSPICE, GROUND 1/2 CUP APPLE CIDER **5 CUP CHICKEN BROTH** 1/2 CUP HEAVY CREAM FRESH PARSLEY, AS NEEDED

Using a sturdy knife, cut the pumpkin into quarters. Scoop out the seeds and stringy fibers. Separate the seeds from the fibers, and save the seeds for roasting, if desired. When ready to cook, start the Traeger grill and set temperature to 165 ° F with the lid closed.

Arrange the pumpkin quarters, skin-side down, directly on the grill grate. Smoke for 1 hour. Increase the temperature to 300 ° F and roast the pumpkin until it is tender and can easily be pierced with a fork, about 90 minutes. Let cool, then separate the pumpkin flesh from the skin.

Meanwhile, melt the butter over medium heat in a 4-quart saucepan or stockpot. Saute the onion and garlic until soft and translucent, about 5 minutes. Stir in brown sugar, smoked paprika, cinnamon, nutmeg, and allspice. Immediately add the apple cider, and cook for several minutes until the mixture is reduced and syrupy. Add the pumpkin and chicken broth. Let the soup simmer for 20 to 30 minutes. Blend soup until smooth. Add salt and pepper to taste. If it is too thick, stir in more chicken

Divide the soup into bowls and drizzle with the heavy cream. Top with a sprig of parsley, if desired.

Normalizing food behavior means removing judgment. Food is not "good" or "bad" it is just food and we can adjust our behaviors. Most children have the instinct to eat until satisfied, and stop before becoming too full. Some of us lose this natural ability along the way. If you've ever eaten with a person who doesn't struggle with their weight, you may notice they eat more slowly, leave food on their plate, and set their utensils down between bites.

There are a few ways to make food and eating behaviors "normal". If you know you're going out to eat, you can pre-track most of what you think you'll choose. Once you know how many calories you'll spend on that meal, you can split the remaining calories between your earlier meals and stay close to your daily budget.

If something comes up you end up at fast food without planning - do the best you can. It is a meal you ate somewhere else

instead of home - it's okay! If you overdo a meal & think you messed up, you will continue in that pattern of thinking. If you realize it was just a moment, you can recover more quickly.

Focus on enjoying the meal, not trying to skimp on everything. You don't have to remove the top bun or the whole bun, or order your foods dry. Finding more foods rather than subtracting foods leads to greater satisfaction overall, which leads to improved habits. Instead of "I can't have that" think "I don't choose that", or I AM choosing that. When you're in charge of your decisions, you own them. them, tires are something few drivers think about until something goes wrong. A roadside flat tire or a tire rotation recommendation from a mechanic during a routine oil change appointment may be the only time many drivers give much thought to their tires. That no doubt leads to some confusion about what to do when tires inevitably need to be

The automotive resource Kelley Blue Book notes that the life expectancy of most tires falls between 25,000 and 50,000 miles. That's a big gap, and car owners can check their vehicle manuals to see if their vehicle manufacturer recommends a more specific replacement interval. It's worth noting that mileage is not the only barometer drivers should use to determine if they need to buy new tires. The following tips can help drivers determine if now is the time to outfit their vehicle with new tires.

· Measure the tread. KBB notes that a tire assessment should always include measuring the amount of remaining tread. Drivers can do this on their own in various ways. One method involves looking at the tread wear bars, which are little bridges in the grooves between the ridges. If the bars are even with the tread pattern, then the tire has very little tread remaining and must be replaced. The penny or quarter test is a popular way to determine if tires must be replaced. Insert

Though vehicles can't function without a penny or quarter into the center of the tread between two ridges with Lincoln's or Washington's head facing you. If you can see the very top of the head or the space above the head, the tire must be replaced. If only a little bit of hair is visible, then the tire is nearing its end. The tire has sufficient remaining tread if the some of the forehead is concealed.

- · Check for other signs of wear and tear. Little remaining tread is not the only sign tires must be replaced. Tires with cracked sidewalls, discoloration and/or bulging need to be replaced.
- · Confirm a larger issue isn't lurking. Uneven wear on tires is typically a byproduct of a larger issue. Though tires that have worn unevenly will need to be replaced, replacing them without correcting the larger issue will only lead to more uneven wear on the new tires. That's a costly mistake. KBB notes that poor wheel alignment or suspension issues are typically to blame for uneven wear. This issue can be fixed and should be addressed prior to purchasing a new set of tires.

Tires sometimes exhibit telltale signs that they need to be replaced. Before buying replacement tires, drivers can inspect their existing ones and ask their mechanic to confirm that a larger issue isn't affecting their performance.

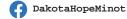

USSTRATCOM has global responsibilities assigned through the Unified Command Plan that include strategic deterrence, nuclear operations, joint electromagnetic spectrum operations, global strike, missile defense, and analysis and targeting.

Each U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service National Wildlife Refuge (NWR) across the United States plays an important role in conserving wildlife species. Their missions vary depending on species and location but it's still all about wildlife, conservation, and habitat.

Refuges vary greatly in size. Just consider Alaska's Arctic National Wildlife Refuge embracing 19.64 million acres and Minnesota's Mille Lacs NWR covering a mere 0.57acre. That refuge is just two small islands on Mille Lacs

Even though wildlife and a refuge's particular mission remains its management priority, many National Wildlife Refuges allow public use activities when they're compatible with its mission. Summer fishing, canoeing, and kayaking on Lake Darling and hunting opportunities available on parts of Upper Souris National Wildlife Refuge near Foxholm are one example.

While National Wildlife Refuges are usually thought of as public land managed by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and owned in fee title by the federal government, North Dakota has 41 National Wildlife Refuges with land in other ownership.

They're easement refuges because the Fish and Wildlife Service acquired various easements for specific purposes. Many were acquired to protect habitat or provide resting areas for migratory bird species, for

Up until August 2020, all of North Dakota's FWS easement refuges were closed to hunting. All but three were closed to fishing.

Now, however, hunters and anglers potentially have additional opportunities on all 41 easement National Wildlife Refuges in the state.

There are caveats, however. The most important one is that all hunting and fish access onto private land on an easement refuge is still controlled by the private landowner — it's their land, after all. Go online to get the N.D. Game and Fish Department's electronic posting app to find out if the land was electronically posted or look for signs on land surrounding an easement refuge.

It also doesn't hurt to find out the landowner's name and get permission.

Some other easement refuge rules:

- Open with landowner permission unless not posted with signs or electronically — only to resident game species and legal fish species.
- Easement refuges remain closed to all migratory bird hunting, including mourning doves, cranes, ducks, geese, and swans.
- Trapping is only allowed on easement refuges for management purposes. Permits from the managing FWS office are required.
- Placing bait for hunting is regulated by the N.D. Game and Fish Department. Go to their website, (gf.nd.gov) for baiting regulations. However, baiting is prohibited on all Fish and Wildlife Service-owned land, including fee title refuges and Waterfowl Production Areas.
- · North Dakota hunting and fish regulations apply, including trespass laws, and standard North Dakota opening and closing season dates.
- · Some easement refuges are on N.D. Department of Trust Lands. They're open for hunting and fishing unless closed by the Department of Trust Lands. In addition, any FWS-owned land within an easement refuge is open to hunting and fishing with access controlled by the Fish and Wildlife Service.

Some of the easement refuges potentially available for hunting and fishing are found in neighboring Benson, Bottineau, Eddy, McHenry, McLean, Nelson, Pierce, Ramsey, Rolette, Sheridan, and Towner counties.

They're managed by Arrowwood, Audubon, Devils Lake, or J. Clark Salyer Wetland Management Districts depending on their location.

The bottom line is Fish and Wildlife Service National Wildlife Easement Refuges still play an important role in wildlife conservation. But now there might be more public use hunting and fishing opportunities.

Just remember it's often private land and permission is required if it's posted, whether signs or electronically.

One of the best ways to get more information about a particular National Wildlife Refuge in North Dakota fee title or easement — is to simply google its name to get the managing office and links to hunting and fishing information and maps.

AADD Shares Statistics

After completion of their successful Gate Greet event, SSgt Jan Mariel D. Punelas, President of the Minot AFB AADD Organization, took a few minutes to talk about the success of Airmen Against Drunk Driving in the Minot area, none more impressive than the 201 lives that were saved from the risk of driving, and being pulled over, when they were under the influence. "With DUIs on the rise we are wanting to show a bit more face and garner attention toward free and confidential resources available to all DoD affiliated members and their dependents. We want to keep reminding the masses that AADD is always available to help and always accepting volunteers,' according to Punelas. Every weekend volunteers staff the (701) 727-2233 line that fields calls from Airmen and dependents who have determined they need a ride home.

"AADD is a group of volunteers and is not an official government agency" Punelas continues "every Thursday, Friday and Saturday night we have volunteers, sometimes up to 10-15 per night, standing-by to pick up individuals needing a ride home." The phone lines for AADD and the (701) 727-2233 access number are donated by SRT, and our community partners will soon be asking for donations from Minot businesses to help fund gas cards to be given to the volunteers. Events like Gate Greets are important for recognition according to Punelas "it's also a great way to show the community what base organizations there are as well." Additional stats supplied to the Northern Sentry by Punelas show the importance of AADD, and the dedication the volunteers have:

Average calls/lives saved per weekend (depending on the season): 9-13

Average volunteers that help during the weekends: 6-11

Hours worked per week: 18 hours (6 hours a night for 3 nights)

Total lives saved thus far in 2021: 201

With Minot AFB personnel following the HPCON B+ directives, the activity in the bars has dropped significantly "but that just pushes people to private parties, and unfortunately the alcohol in a drink, and the number of drinks, are not monitored as closely" according to Punelas. Local bars were active in promoting AADD before the latest return to COVID 19 protocol and according to Sherry McGlaughlin, a local business owner "they'll be just as active when military personnel can return to bars in the future. We don't want our military personnel on the road driving drunk, and we'll do whatever it takes to cooperate and change the culture."

SSgt Punelas said that AADD is always looking for volunteers to staff the weekends. "We ask them to use their own automobile, and if there is a reason, AADD will pay for a complete detailing of their car if needed." For SSgt Punelas, her support of AADD is personal "my infant son and I were almost run off the road by a drunk driver. Things like that really bring the need for AADD home. If there are volunteers out there who want to help, they can get in touch with my amazing team via our distro-email MAFB. OperationSafeRide@us.af.mil. You can also text or call our AADD Phone line at 701-727-2233 (AADD)."

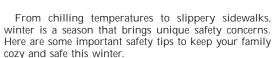






NOTES ON BEING SAFE

BE PREPARED FOR WINTER... **BEFORE IT SETTLES IN**



To start with, winter comes with a few hazards for homeowners, however there are plenty of things you can do to protect your property and your family.

Home Heating Inspection

The fact that your central heating unit, space heater, or fireplace was working properly at the end of last season does not mean it's ready for this winter. Before the frigid temperatures set in, advise to hire a professional to conduct a safety inspection of your heating units, as well as your fireplace's flue and chimney. If any potential hazards are found, act immediately to remedy them. If you'll be using space heaters, make sure your rooms have proper ventilation and that the units are not placed near anything flammable. Using unsafe heating systems can result in fire, injuries, or carbon monoxide poisoning.

Be Aware of Carbon Monoxide Poisoning

When is the last time you have replaced your carbon monoxide (CO) detector? CO detectors usually wear out in 5-7 years. Replace them with a "fuel-cell electrochemical" sensor type and with a "peak" level memory to alert you to the highest level of CO present. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), more than 400 people die annually of carbon monoxide poisoning. Carbon monoxide is a colorless, odorless vapor that is sometimes produced by gas furnaces and space heaters. Symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning include nausea, dizziness, severe headache, confusion, and unconsciousness. If you notice these symptoms in yourself or a family member, go to the emergency room

Clear Snow and Remove Ice

Falls especially those related to winter are the number one cause of injuries to adults. Since the majority of these falls happen when sidewalks, driveways, and walkways are covered in snow and ice, make sure any of these surfaces around your home are shoveled regularly and free from ice and snow. Keep in mind that simply clearing the snow may not be enough to keep the area safe; ice is always a concern during the winter. Your regular routine for keeping access to your home clear should include adding sand or rock salt to slippery spots. Pay particular attention to stairs, since they can be hazardous and icy in colder months. If you find it necessary to remove large snow build up from the roof of your house, use a roof snow rake (from the ground level) or hire a professional rather than attempting to climb on a ice/snow covered roof, reducing the possibly of falling off a roof.

Prepare for Winter Storms

Severe winter storms can cause widespread damage and disruption. Heavy snow often results in paralyzed transportation systems and automobile accidents due to slippery roads and stranded vehicles. Ice storms can topple utility lines and poles, and make travel virtually impossible. These conditions pose a threat to life. Individual preparation is the key to survival.

The North Dakota winter season usually begins in late November and continues until late March. On average, the state experiences three to four severe winter storms each year. Winter precipitation is nearly all in the form of snow and is often associated with strong winds and low temperatures. Winter storms are normally accompanied by strong winds, creating blizzard conditions with blinding, wind-driven snow, severe drifting, dangerous wind chill and heavy accumulations of ice and/or heavy snow. Since we live in an area prone to winter storms, it's important to plan for them early in the season. Stock up on the following supplies:

- •Battery-powered radio
- •Flashlights and lanterns, with spare batteries
- •Drinking water
- Non-perishable food that doesn't require cooking •Baby food and formula, if needed
- •Pet food
- Prescription medications
- •First aid kit

Winter Activity Safety Tips

In addition to making sure that your home is prepared and stocked to deal with the winter weather situations



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that you can expect as the days get shorter and the temperatures drop, it's also important to consider winter safety tips for the activities that you and the other members of your family are likely to participate in this

Know the Signs of Hypothermia

According to the National Institute of Health, anyone who spends extended periods outside in cold winter temperatures is at risk for hypothermia. Hypothermia can happen when your body temperature drops from its usual 98.6 degrees. It is a medical emergency if a person's temperature is 95 degrees or less.

In addition to the lowered temperature, someone experiencing hypothermia may have the following

- Confusion
- •Clumsiness and stumbling
- •Dizziness and drowsiness
- Apathetic mental state
- •Shivering •Slurred speech
- •Weak pulse and slow breathing

Dress Appropriately

When heading outdoors to participate in wintertime activities, whether you'll be hiking, skiing, shoveling snow from your driveway, make sure that you dress warmly. It's wise to dress in layers when you'll be exerting yourself in frigid temperatures so that you can start out properly insulated and then shed layers as your body temperature starts to rise as a result of your level of activity. It's advised to wear clothing made from synthetic materials to help conserve body heat. Avoid wearing clothing made from cotton fibers, when cotton gets wet, it takes some time to dry and during that time, you run the risk of becoming severely chilled and losing muchneeded body heat.

Use Caution on Frozen Lakes and Rivers

According to the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources (DNR), it can be very difficult to tell whether ice is solid just from looking at it. The color or thickness of the ice will not necessarily tell you how much weight it can support. In general, new ice, which has formed in the last couple of weeks, is stronger than ice that has been there for months. Ice on moving water, such as rivers, is generally weaker than ice on lakes. Always consult your local DNR office or Fish and Game Department about ice safety before heading out on the lake for ice fishing, ice skating, or other sports.

Use Proper Equipment

Skiing and snowboarding can be enjoyable winter pastimes, but you still need to keep personal safety in mind when you venture out onto the slopes. By wearing a helmet will help to prevent head injuries. If you don't own the right equipment, you can rent it from the ski resort. Many winter sports require specific equipment. Make sure that your equipment is in good condition and properly maintained. Once example is snow skis, they need to be properly waxed, and the bindings properly adjusted. Snowmobiles should be serviced at the beginning of each season.

Take Regular Breaks

Taking breaks at regular intervals is a good idea when you are enjoying the great outdoors in the winter. Go inside to warm up and get a snack and something to drink like a hot cup of tea or hot chocolate.

Tell Someone About Your Plans

An important tip that I cannot stress enough is telling someone of your plans before you head out in the snow or on a road trip. Tell someone where you are going and what time you will be coming back. That way in the event you are overdue, someone can alert authorities to start searching for you. If you are going to be in the wilderness, it's also important to stay on well-marked trails. Take a trail map with you and keep track of where you are while snowmobiling or skiing.

In closing North Dakota winters can be fun and adventurous, however they can also be dangerous. Take into consideration of you plan on doing, and above all use common sense

Again, these are just a few of the many important safety tips that need to be observed to enjoy a safe, healthy and enjoyable winter season

A BRIEF HISTORY OF VETERAN'S DAY **NOVEMBER 11**



President Eisenhower signing HR7786, which redesignated Armistice Day as Veteran's Day (va.gov)

On November 11, 1919, President Woodrow Wilson declared the first "Armistice Day" to honor the heroism and sacrifice of America's service members during WWI. Seven months before the Treaty of Versailles was signed to officially end the war, an armistice between the Allied nations and Germany was implemented. This cessation of hostilities began at 11:00 a.m. on November 11. In his proclamation, President Wilson said, "To us in America, the reflections of Armistice Day

will be filled with solemn pride in the heroism of those who died in the country's service and with gratitude for the victory, both because of the thing from which it has freed us and because of the opportunity it has given America to show her sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the nations..." Originally, the holiday was meant to commemorate WWI veterans and promote the cause of world peace, but in 1954 it was redesignated as "Veteran's Day" to honor all of the brave Americans who have served this country.

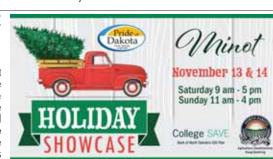

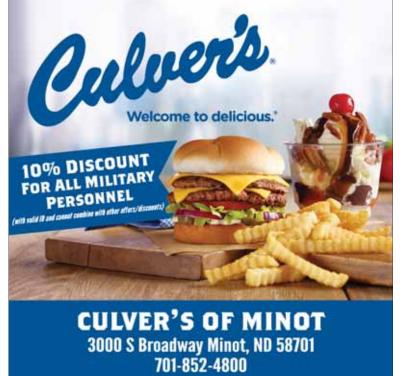


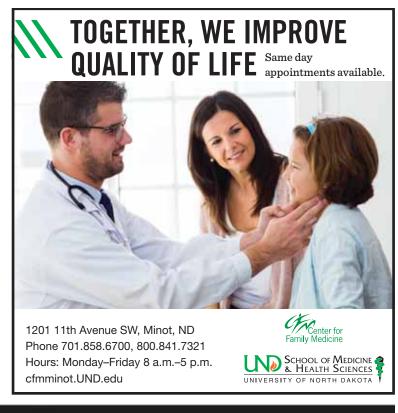
















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Military Family Appreciation Month

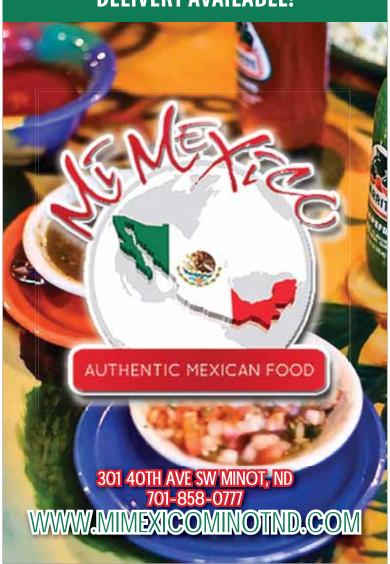

Minot Air Force Base welcomes a new Military and Family Life Counseling program School Counselor, Jazmin Ribeiro! Ribeiro provides non-medical counseling services to Airmen and families of Dakota Elementary, North Plains Elementary, and Memorial Middle

She has extensive experience in working with children, and has an Associate's Degree in Criminal Justice, a Bachelor's Degree in Behavioral Science, and a Master's Degree in School Counseling. While living at Dover AFB, Ribeiro had the unique opportunity to work with displaced families in the school district as a homeless liaison. She has also previously worked as an elementary school counselor while she and her family were stationed in Guam, and after moving to Minot AFB in August 2021, she has assumed the role of MFLC Counselor and is able to continue her passion for helping children and families.

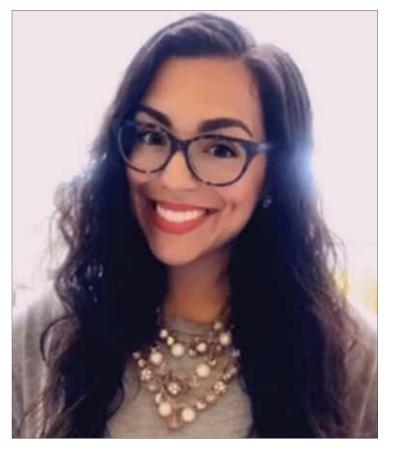
"I love listening to people," Ribeiro said. "I want to be everybody's full time counselor and therapist. My Bachelors degree is in behavioral science, which is like psychology. In the past, I was doing mental health with younger kids, and I was finding myself in schools a lot of times doing these services. I really like the environment and the people in the schools, and just how well the faculty worked with the kids and collaborated with mental health workers like me."

Ribeiro recognized a need for counselors at Minot AFB, especially in the stressful times of COVID-19 and as someone who understands the extra challenges facing military families. "We are a military family; I saw it with my kids. We went through the same struggles that everybody has gone through during COVID, on top of being military families. I see a lot of relocation and deployment struggles with other families, and I live it every day so I feel like I can really relate to the families and the kids," she said. "I think there needs to be this middleman that understands the concept of the military and what it means to

live a military life. I think a person that understands that is very helpful versus somebody who is just there to listen, because they don't always know how to relate."

Along with counseling families and children on military related problems, Ribeiro also provides resources for victims of bullying, those struggling with selfesteem issues, creating healthy interpersonal relationships, as well as discovering problems solving and time management skills. "There are counselors in the schools who deal with these things a lot more in depth, but I deal with them on more of a short term level. I'm an add-on and collaboration with the school counselors and other military resources," she explained.

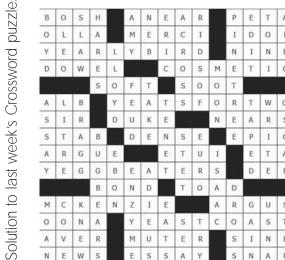

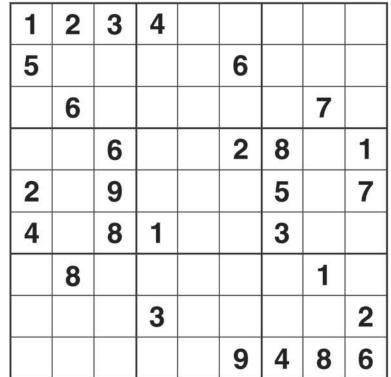

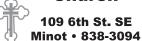
