

# **Global Thunder Rolls at Minot AFB**

MINOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. -Airmen commenced participation in U.S. Strategic Command's nuclear command and training exercise, Global Thunder 22 on November 2, 2021.

Global Thunder is an annual command and control exercise designed to train USSTRATCOM components, units and task forces as well as assess joint operational readiness. Airmen and Guardians at Minot, AFB are taking part in the exercise to test and demonstrate their technical skillsets, which enable USSTRATCOM to confront any uncertainty and ensure the nation's safe, secure, credible and ready deterrent force.

As a part of the exercise, Airmen and aircraft from the 2nd Bomb Wing at Barksdale AFB, LA integrated with 5th Bomb Wing personnel at Minot AFB, to conduct combined B-52H Stratofortress planning, maintenance, security, logistics, and operations in support of the GT22 scenario. Day-to-day, both bomber wings maintain a combat-ready, globalstrike posture, enabling geographic combatant command requirements from either U.S.-based or forward locations around the world when called upon.

As part of GT22, in addition to bomber operations, the 91st Missile Wing validated the always responsive, quick strike posture of the Minuteman mail.mil or visit www.stratcom.mil.

III fleet, through various command post injects, maintenance actions, and training objectives. The 91st maintains a safe, secure, and effective 24/7/365 alert posture through the efforts of skilled maintenance, operational, and security forces Airmen.

With the 5th Bomb Wing, 2nd Bomb Wing and 91st Missile Wing training side by side, GT22 helps Airmen to enhance resiliency and interoperability both at Minot AFB and across Air Force Global Strike Command.

# AIRMEN OF GLOBAL THUNDER





On November 14, 1966, a USAF Lockheed C-141 became the first jet to land in Antarctica as a part of "Operation Deep Freeze." Operation Deep Freeze began in 1955 when major nations collaborated to conduct earth science research in one of the least explored areas on Earth. The Air Force began its involvement in 1956 and continues running airlifts to

this day. Previously, the USAF had only deployed propeller planes to Antarctica, but on November 14, the 60th Air Mobility Wing landed the first jet carrying 12.9 tons of cargo. Over hundreds of missions, the C-141s would carry essential supplies to installations in Antarctica, as well as hosting passengers that included penguins, gulls, and seal pups. Lockheed C-141s would continue participating in Operation Deep Freeze until they were decommissioned from the Air Force in 2004. Due to the Antarctic Treaty of 1959, US military involvement in Antarctica, including Operation Deep Freeze, continues to be for peaceful and scientific purposes only.

In today's paper you will find information on Global Thunder 22, an exercise that will cause heavier than normal bomber take-offs during this exercise.

Let me tell you that there is not much else in life that could excite me more than a majestic B-52 taking to the sky from Minot Air Force Base, or watching a flyover of a B-52 as it crosses the Magic City on a normal flight pattern.

The roar of the eight engines, the characteristic smoke trails, and of course the excitement of watching the mass of a B-52 take to the sky is unmatched...albeit I am told that the test launches at Vandenberg AFB of a Minuteman III can also speed up your heart and raise your blood pressure. I

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

MINOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. -- Maj. Gen. Michael Lutton, 20th Air Force commander, accompanied by Command Chief Master Sergeant Charlie Orf, visited Minot Air Force Base, North Dakota, Oct. 26-28, 2021.

Lutton's priorities for the 20th Air Force mission range from the safety and surety of the Numbered Air Force's nuclear weapons to the development and care of Airmen and their families.

"Our focus as a leadership team is to prepare our Airmen for any situation in which they could be called on to execute [the nation's nuclear] mission," said Maj. Gen. Lutton, "First and foremost, that A SAFE AND EFFECTIVE starts with deterrence."

#### **INTEGRATED LETHALITY -ENABLING THE 20TH AF** FIGHT

During the visit, Lutton met with members of the 91st Missile Wing who included security forces, missile maintainers, and flight engineers from the 54th Helicopter Squadron discussing first-hand how they work together collectively as a team to maintain a ready and lethal force.

Integrated lethality is one of Lutton's top priorities in 20th Air Force.

"The conduct of warfare is joint and the conduct of warfare is fundamentally about teamwork," said Lutton. "The more we can talk about integrated lethality, the

more we drive up readiness and mission accomplishment." Whether it be security forces,

operations, or maintenance, Lutton and Orf both emphasized the importance for leaders to understand the roles and issues impacting those defending the United States through combatready nuclear forces. With this, the 20th Air Force command team also underscored the need to ensure Airmen understand their role in national deterrence strategy and why they are the key to enabling effective mission execution.

# NUCLEAR DETERRENT

Additionally, safety is a parallel top priority. When it comes to nuclear operations, surety and improvements in weapons, the mission moves at the speed of safety. Although the Minuteman III is an aging weapons system, it continues to serve as a reliable and effective nuclear deterrent for the U.S., as well as its allies and security partners until replaced by the new ground-based strategic deterrent.

While going through the modernization process, Maj. Gen. Lutton explained how the 20th Air Force will take what it has learned from the Minuteman III and improve upon its replacement, the Ground Based Strategic Deterrent.

"We'll move at the speed of

nuclear surety," said Maj. Gen. Lutton. "Safety is a precondition for any operation that we do in the 20th Air Force."

#### AIRMEN AND FAMILIES -UPHOLDING OUR NATION'S DEFENSE

Maj. Gen. Lutton's third priority focuses on the development and care of the Airmen and their families. Listening and communicating with the Airmen and their spouses allows leadership to give back to families and ensure that programs and services are constantly evolving.

"They do world-class work for us and the nation, so they deserve a world-class environment to raise and develop their families," said Lutton.

As Airmen continue to push forward to adapt to an everchanging world, they are continuously challenged to incorporate innovation into their daily lives and work toward creating a lethal and more modernized Air Force.

"The Airmen have a valued contribution to the mission of their organization, the mission of the wing, the mission of the numbered Air Force and Global Strike," said CMSgt. Orf. "If we, as leaders, help our Airmen to understand their value, relevance and purpose, I think we all go a long way in creating a Striker.'



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# **A TAIL OF TWO PORK BUTTS**

Pork butt or shoulder is low cost, a very forgiving cut, and easy to prepare in a number of different ways, all of them wonderful. This cut is often made into steaks, a sliced roast, or chopped, but shredded (or "pulled") is the most popular. Pulled pork is flavorful, silky, tender, and delicious. There are two cuts that are somewhat interchangeable, the upper and lower shoulder, or "butts" and "picnic shoulder". The butt is usually a bit leaner, but both have plenty of fat and collagen that render into delicious siky iuices.

I prefer to work with bone-in meat for several reasons. One, there is no need for a net or string wrapping. Nets in particular make it difficult to work with when done, but more importanly, they interfere with building and keeping grat bark. Two, removing the bone creates thin edges that dry out when exposed to the gill environment. Three, the bone makes it super easy to tell when the meat is done for pulling. If the bone comes out of the meat with a slight tug, the meat is ready for pulling. The bone does not contribute any extra flavor, so den't worry about that if you can only find boneless butts.

For pulled pork, I use 205°F as my target temperature. When the Internal Temperature (IT) of the meat reaches 205°F, give the bone a tug. If it comes out, rest for an hour or more and the meat is ready for pulling. If I want a firmer texture, I will remove the meat from the gril at 195°F IT, rest, then chop. If you will be slicing the roast, cook to 185°F. Collagen starts to break down at 180°F and above, and that's what tenderizes the otherwise tough shoulder meat. Below 180°F it takes approximately forever.

To prepare the meat, we sprinkled Kosher salt over all surfaces and let it rest covered overnight in the fridge. This is called dry bining. Apply the same amount of salt as you would to season it

at the table. Salt will initially pull moisture out of the meat, but when rested for an hour or more, the moisture will be drawn back into the meat, along with the salt. This will help the meat hold its moisture through the cook. At any time after the salt is applied, you can apply the rest of the seasonings. We used black pepper, garlic granules, and paprika in equal parts. There is no need for any binder other than the natural moisture in the meat.

There are a lot of variations on how to prepare pork butts, but they break down into two main groups, wrap and no-wrap. We did both here so we could compare the results.

The no-wrap butt went on the smoker, fat side down, at 180°F at about 6:00pm. Four hours later, we set the temperature to 225°F and left it there for the rest of the cook. It was done at about 3:00pm the following day. At that time we wrapped it in foil and it went into a Yeti cooler, preheated with very hot water, to rest.

The second butt went on the grill at 9:00am, It reached an internal temperature of 160°F at about 1:00pm that afternoon. At that time, we wrapped it in aluminum foil and placed it back inside the grill. It reached our target IT of 205°I at about 5:00pm. We removed it from the heat and poninin the cooler with the other one.

We served both at 6:00pm. We shredded them in bowls using a set of Bear Paws. Both had lots of juies in the foiland we stirred it all into the shredded meat. Opnions were mixed, with some prefering the sofer texture of the wrapped meat, and some peferring the stronger smoke flavor and darker, heavier bark of the no-wrap. Both were plenty juicy. We served barberue sauce on the side. Some guests used sauce and some ate it withou, but everyore loved it.

# **Department of the Air Force** nears 97% AD vaccination rate

November marked the Department of the Air Force's deadline for active component Airmen duty Guardians to receive and the COVID-19 vaccine. As of publication, nearly 97% of Airmen and Guardians on active duty have received at least one dose of the COVID-19 vaccine.

"Our Airmen need to be prepared to operate anytime, anywhere in the world," said Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. CQ Brown, Jr. "Getting vaccinated ensures we are a ready force to meet our commitments to the nation while protecting the health of our team and families."

Since the Secretary of Defense's mandate Aug. 24, the Department of the Air Force set the most aggressive timelines amongst the military services to ensure members are vaccinated.

"I am incredibly proud of our Airmen for coming together and getting vaccinated," said Chief Master Sgt. of the Air Force JoAnne S. Bass. "This is about readiness and ensuring our Air Force can continue to defend the homeland. It's also about understanding that we are not in the clear yet. Continuing safe practices to protect ourselves and others should always be in our cross-check."

The majority of the active

component was vaccinated prior to the Aug. 24 mandate. After the mandate, installation Military Treatment Facilities rapidly scaled up vaccination efforts in order to meet the Nov. 2 deadline for the remainder of the force. Many MTFs stood up mass vaccination procedures capable of administering thousands of shots a day.

"Thank you to our activeduty Guardians and Airmen for moving out quickly to meet the Department's vaccine timeline," said Chief of Space Operations Gen. John W. "Jay" Raymond. "Although we are encouraged by the falling number of cases, COVID-19 is still a very real threat. We need each and every one of you to be healthy and ready; we need you and your loved ones to be protected so our team can continue to protect and defend the nation."


Chief Master Sgt. of the Space Force Roger A. Towberman echoed DAF senior leadership appreciation for all those who got vaccinated, as well as those who made it possible - to include DAF medical personnel who worked tirelessly to vaccinate nearly 100,000 Airmen and Guardians in just over two months.

"This took leadership and teamwork at all levels,' Towberman said. "I'm proud

of our Guardians for their commitment to our readiness and each other, and thankful for all our Airmen enablers who made this happen."

Over the next 30 days, DAF will review requests for medical and religious exemptions accommodations. DAF civilians have until Nov. 22 to be fully vaccinated, and Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve members in a Reserve component status must be vaccinated by Dec. 2.

COVID-19 screening testing will be required at least weekly for all individuals entering a DoD facility who are not fully

your driveway, or anywhere else a stray might come. You can DIY shelters using plastic bins that contain blankets, food, water, and some type of insulation.

• Povide sustenance: At the very least, you can also provide food and water to a stray animal. If you are able to keep water in an environment where it will not freeze, this is ideal for below-freezing temparatures.

• Be careful: Carefully handling stray animals is important any time of year. Some animals will be more comfortable around humans than others, so keep an eye out for uncomfortable or aggressive body language to keep yourself safe. If you do not feel comfortable approaching a nervous or aggressive animal, call a local shelter to notify them of the stray and either stay nearby or let them know the location of the sighting. You can also contact Minot's Animal Control. Stray animals may also carry diseases that you do not want to bring home to your own pet. This is where it may be a good idea to keep them in the garage for safety until you are able to have them checked out by a veterinarian.

It takes a caring heart to take care of stray animals, especially in winter conditions. Whether you catch and bring one into your home for care, provide outdoor shelter, or even just make a phone call to someone who is able to help, you are doing a great service to the lost and wandering animals in Minot.

The winter of 2020, AAA responded to more than 312,000 roadside assistance calls. The most common calls were for tows, batteries and tires.

## Stay Ahead of Trouble Motorists can help avoid winter breakdowns with

Motorists can help avoid winter breakdowns with preventative vehicle maintenance, including:

Tires: Adequate pressure and tread depth are essential for stopping and going on ice and snow, but tire pressure can drop during cold weather. Make sure tire pressure matches the sticker on the driver's side doorjamb and the tread depth is above the wear bar indicators marked on the tires. Battery: The average life of a battery is 3-5 years. Cold weather can drain batteries quickly, and leave drivers stranded. Have a technician inspect the battery at least twice a year.

Replace old windshield wipers and solvent: Precipitation and salty spray from the roads often make it hard to see when driving during the winter. Solvent and good windshield wipers can greatly improve winter driving visibility. If you break down or spin out during a winter storm, it may take longer for help to arrive. That's why it's important to be patient and pack an emergency roadside kit that includes blankets and extra clothes to stay warm, flashlights and extra batteries, an ice scraper, safety reflectors, a shovel, a first aid kit, a simple tool kit, water and non-perishable food, jumper cables and a mobile phone and charger to call for help.

# Safe Winter Driving

Motorists can also avoid spinning out on slick roads by remaining alert and driving for conditions. To stay safe on winter roads, AAA offers several winter driving tips:

Slow down: Always adjust your speed to account for less traction when driving on snow or ice. This often means driving below the posted speed limit.

Accelerate and decelerate slowly: Apply the gas slowly to retain traction and avoid skids. Also remember, it takes longer to slow down on slick roads.

Increase following distance: Allow five to six seconds of following distance between your vehicle and the one in front of you. The extra space will allow you time to stop safely. Never use cruise control: Using cruise control on any slippery (wet, ice, snow, sand) surface can cause your vehicle to lose control more easily.

Don't panic: If you start to slide, hitting the brake is the worst thing to do. Instead, take your feet off the pedals and keep your eyes focused on where you want to go.

Leave early: Expect trips to take longer in winter driving conditions.

By taking a few preventative measures and adjusting your driving practices to fit weather conditions, you can stay safer on the road this winter.


With Veterans Day this past week, McRae chooses to honor those that served and are still serving today.

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



# A THROWBACK TO 1968

On June 25, 1968, the 455th Strategic Missile Wing was redesignated to the 91st Strategic Missile Wing. Within one year after the redesignation, 91 SMW was selected as the first Missile Wing in the Air Force to be equipped with the Minuteman III ICBM. Reliable as the Minuteman I had been proven to be, the Minuteman III was the state of the art in ICBM technology. With its Multiple Independently Targetable Re-entry (MIRV), Minuteman III was a powerful addition to SAC's inventory of strategic aerospace deterrent weapons. The switch from Minuteman I to Minuteman III was accomplished through the Force Modernization Program, otherwise known as "Force Mod". Preparations in every facet of the 91 SMW function began immediately upon notification of the Wing's selection for the program and, during the fall of 1969, the 91 SMW had accomplished all final

preparations. On January 12, 1970, the first flight to undergo the modification, Hotel Flight, in the 741st Strategic Missile Squadron, was released to Boeing, the prime contractor. Flight by flight, the Minuteman I was replaced by Minuteman III, and on December 29, 1970, all flights within the 741st SMS had been accepted by USAF and repostured, rendering the 741st SMS, the first Minuteman III squadron in the Air Force. The Force Modernization Program progressed true to 91 SMW style: smoothly, ahead of schedule, and without a hitch. On December 13, 1971, Oscar Flight was the last Minuteman III flight accepted by the 91 SMW. That acceptance drew to a conclusion the Force Modernization Program at Minot AFB, rendering the 91 SMW the only fully equipped, combatready Minuteman III wing in the Air Force.

# SCALLOPED POTATOES WITH BACON & CHIPOTLE CREAM

INGREDIENTS 1 (7 02) CHIPOTLE PEPPERS IN ADOBO

When ready to cook, set Traeger temperature to 350°F and preheat, lid closed for 15 minutes. In a blender, blend chiles in adobo until a smooth paste forms. Reserve 2 Tablespoons, and save the rest. Make the Chipotle Cream: Bring the cream to a simmer in a saucepan on the stovetop over medium heat. Whisk in 1 tablespoon of the chipotle paste, then taste. Add more if you prefer it spicier. Stir in the green onions, if using. Peel the potatoes and submerge them in cold water to prevent them from turning brown. Oil a 10 to 12 inch cast iron skillet. Working with one potato at a time, very thinly slice it. Fan the potato slices in the bottom of the skillet. season with salt and pepper, then top with some of the chipotle cream and the cheese; repeat with the remaining potatoes until you have 4 to 6 layers of potatoes, chipotle cream, and cheese. Cover with foil. Transfer the skillet to the grill grate and bake the potatoes for 30 minutes. Then remove the foil to encourage browning. Continue to bake for another 30 minutes, or until the potatoes are tender and golden brown. At the same time, lay the bacon strips on the grill grate perpendicular to the bars. Remove the bacon when it is lightly browned and crisp, 20 to 25 minutes. Let cool, then crumble and set aside. Transfer the scalloped potatoes to a wire cooling rack and let rest for 15 to 20 minutes to firm up. Top with the crumbled bacon and dust with smoked paprika, if desired.

# A wildlife crime

Somebody ruined it for everyone else.

There is a reason "No hunting" signs embrace every corner of the pasture and CRP: It lies squarely on the shoulders of the people who poached a beautiful buck and left it to rot.

They knew exactly what they were doing.

It wasn't their first rodeo, evident by the fact they didn't even field dress it or remove its hide. Instead, they sliced out the loins – the delicious, most tender meat on an animal – took the hindquarters, and left the rest.

Their method of taking the meat was a sure indication they knew how to get what they wanted and get it quickly. They also knew it wasn't visible from the road by leaving in the shelterbelt.

But what they didn't know is there was a game camera on the property. No, make that three game cameras strategically placed throughout the area.

They also didn't pay attention to the nearby tree stand, probably because it was dark outside when they committed the crime.

Sadly, that deer wasn't the first – or second – one poached there.

Fences had been cut earlier that same year, even before deer season, and tracks led to the northwestern corner of the pasture - an indication a dead deer was likely at the end of the drive.

Two years earlier, a small doe was found wrapped in a garbage bag atop a knoll.

Judging by its skull damage the criminals obviously shot it at close range but didn't want to leave evidence by the road. Not only did they scoop up the remnants of the carcass, they also put the field dressed organs in another black plastic garbage bag.

Both bags were near the pasture, away from the road, and out of sight of a farmyard

At least they took a little bit of meat so, like the buck, it wasn't totally wasted.

It's the only way they can vent their frustrations when people aren't caught in the action of the crime.

Maybe it will wake up hunters to the fact that unless they police themselves, they will continue to find "No hunting" and "No trespassing" signs dotting the landscape.

They will also find themselves checking the N.D. Game and Fish Department's new app frequently to find out if land was posted electronically – no physical signage necessary when landowners go that route.

The public can play a role in discouraging poaching, as well, and they don't have to belong to the hunting community.

Anyone can report a wildlife violator, the all-too-polite way of saying what they really are – criminals.

When wildlife – any wildlife - is poached, everyone loses because wildlife belongs to everyone. It's the public's resource.

The easiest way to report a wildlife violation is to call the Report All Poachers telephone number, (701) 328-9921. Get as much information as possible — vehicle description, license plate numbers, etc. — and report it as quickly as possible when details are fresh in a person's mind.

Callers remain anonymous.

Reporting violations may or may not result in arrests, charges, or convictions.

But it might just make someone think twice if they know there is the potential they could be fined and lose hunting equipment and vehicles.

North Dakota is a member of the Wildlife Violators Compact (WVC), which means that if a game violation conviction costs the criminal their hunting rights in North Dakota, it also costs them those rights in all WVC states.

The Wildlife Violator Compact began in 1989 when Colorado, Nevada, and Oregon entered into the

#### SAVANNAH LUCKEY






#### ARIEL CHURBY

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# *New survey suggests military* teens are struggling

A recent survey of militaryconnected teens reveals that they have been struggling during the pandemic due to 18 months of lockdowns coupled with the added stressors of moving to new communities, school transitions and deployments.

The Military Teen Experience Report, conducted by National Military Family Association (NMFA) and founders of the website Bloom, polled more than 2,100 military teenagers between the ages of 13-19. They came from

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both officer and enlisted families and a balanced mix of activeduty, reserve, Guard, veteran and retired.

Participants answered questions about mental health/well-being, deployments, food insecurity, abuse and generational military service. The results highlight the deepening struggle military teens are experiencing today.

NMFA's Besa Pinchotti, executive director, says reaching military families is part of its core mission, but teen voices often go

unheard.

"Reaching adults is easy; reaching military teens is a challenge," she said.

More than 40% surveyed said they were experiencing low mental well-being, but the majority (45%) felt moderate feelings of wellbeing. The survey summary states:

"In our research, mental well-being and number of deployments or separations from a military parent were statistically significantly related to each other. Military teens who reported experiencing more deployments or separations lasting three months or longer generally reported lower mental well-being."

One teen respondent described a difficult aspect of his/her life.

"Loss. Not death, but having everyone around you constantly disappear. Adjusting to a new school is tolerable, but losing those close to you hurts like hell.'

Matthew Oh and Elena Ashburn, the military teen founders of Bloom, say they hope the survey amplifies voices.

"The COVID health crisis and pandemic restrictions have made it difficult for us to connect and thrive. Our survey supports this," said Oh.

Aside from inquiring about the mental health of military

teens, the survey also asked about family legacy and military service. A surprising 64% of military teens said they plan to serve in the military as an adult, an overwhelming majority of respondents. The survey's summary compares these statistics to a 2019 Department of Defense poll of American youth that found only 13% of Americans ages 16-24 had an interest in military service.

"We are the future. We are the military leaders of tomorrow. And from what this survey says, we are not ok," said Ashburn. "We need adults to listen to us, hear our story, support us."

Bloom and NMFA also wanted to know if military families have struggled to put food on the table through the pandemic. Nearly 36% of teens said they were concerned that they would run out of food before their families had money to buy groceries, and 28% said they were sometimes concerned. The answers weren't surprising for Besa at NMFA.

"We work on this day in and day out," she said. "Military families are worried about food, we know this. We are working to add provisions to the National Defense Authorization Act to support our families.'

She points to a recent 2021

NMFA study which says 14% of 11,000 military families surveyed visited charitable food distribution sites to make ends meet.

NMFA has designed programs geared for military youth in their popular Operation Purple Camp and will continue to push for policies that protect those who protect us and their families. They are lobbying for changes to SNAP benefits (formerly known as food stamps) and their ties to Basic Housing Allowance so military families can qualify for SNAP. They are also lobbying for a Basic Needs Allowance for military families who are financially struggling, especially those who are stationed in areas with a high cost of living.

Together, NMFA and Bloom plan on publishing a Field Guide for Military Teens — resources for teens and the adults who support them — in spring 2022.

Besa stresses that "Military teens of today are the future force of tomorrow. We need to support them now with meaningful policies and programs. That's what NMFA is focused on."

# **DoDEA Virtual School**

The Department of Defense Education Activity (DoDEA) launched a new program this school year aimed at expanding eligibility for dependents of members of the armed forces on active duty to register into the DoDEA Virtual High School (DVHS). The Expanded Eligibility Pilot is available to students in grades 9-12 for the 2021-22 school year and is now accepting applications for Spring semester. In order to be eligible for the program, students must be the dependents of active-duty military members serving in remote locations that do not have access to a DoDEA brick-and-motor school. Minot Air Force Base is one of the approved installations for this program and Minot Public Schools is prepared to process student requests. Participants registering in the DVHS as part of this program must obtain the approval of their local school system. Homeschooled students



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who do not have access to a DoDEA school can also register for the Expanded Eligibility Pilot Program. Enrollment in the program will be limited to 400 students, split evenly among the four services. Preference will be given to students entering the 12th grade. The pilot program was authorized as part of the 20-21 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA), giving it the authority to expand the eligibility for DVHS to stateside active duty military dependents in grades 9-12 who

are currently ineligible for the DVHS program. The program offers students the chance to take up to two courses from a selection of more than 30 courses that are already offered by the DVHS. These courses include Advanced Placement, world language, and Career Technical Education. 




