Family fun at Frost Fire Park

Looking for an exciting weekend getaway to make the most of those cold, snowy days? Look no further than Frost Fire Park! Frost Fire Park is a ski resort and mountain biking mecca located in the Pembina Gorge of northeast North Dakota.

Opened in 1976 by two people with a passion for outdoor recreation, Frost Fire Park offers adventurers seven downhill runs ranging from beginner to expert, a 350 foot vertical ski lift, a terrain park, as well as ski/ snowboard rentals and lessons. In the summertime, the park offers a variety of downhill mountain biking trails (and rentals!) and a Summer Theatre with productions such as this year's Marvelous Wonderettes.

Frost Fire Park is now owned by the Pembina Gorge Foundation, which aims to preserve and enhance the experience of the area through historical, cultural, natural, and recreational opportunities. Recently, the park received funding from the Economic Development Administration to expand their infrastructure. Patty Gorder, General Manager of the park, explained, "I'm so grateful that they actually saw the effort in what we were trying to do and how big of an impact the contribution would have, not only on Frost Fire Park but on the community."

This year's opening date is planned for Sunday, December 12, and the Frost Fire team has been hard at work preparing the hills for the best winter adventure around. The park is able to supplement natural snowfall with "artificial" snow, created with a complex system of water pumps and snow guns. Staff spent over 200 hours making snow last season, according to Gorder.

But this labor-intensive process is all for a good cause. With constant monitoring of the snow guns and landscapers spending hours to shape the snow, Frost Fire Park is able to create the optimal terrain for downhill skiing and snowboarding.

Alongside the outdoor recreation, Frost Fire Park also offers comfortable lodging, a restaurant, and a gift shop that features the works of local artisans. Gorder also has many plans for the future of the park, from developing a deli to many family-friendly events and themed weekends.

A festive Christmas celebration will be held on December 19 with a special holiday theatre performance, hot cocoa bar, and cookie decorating for families. From December 23 to January 2, the park will be open all throughout the week to accommodate those on school breaks. At the end of the season, the park plans to hold the second "snocross" competition, which is essentially motocross in the snow.

Airman Receives Award from AADD

On Dec. 1, 2021, Airman First Class Dariana Gutierrez received a special award for her contributions to the wellbeing and safety of Minot Air Force Base. Gutierrez, who is the Primary Scheduler for Airmen Against Drunk Driving (AADD), has volunteered over 163 hours of her time within a two quarter period. She was presented with an Outstanding AADD Volunteer Award that included a plaque and two letters of appreciation, as well as the Command Chief's Coin from CMSgt. Brad Claypool, 5th Maintenance Group Chief, on behalf of 5th Bomb Wing Command CMSgt. Timothy Wieser, for her excellent overachievement in volunteer hours.

Gutierrez's work for AADD not only includes her duties as Primary Scheduler, but also a driver for the program. She has contributed to over 244 lives saved, and as of now, Team Minot has been able to go 44 days without a DUI.

"AADD is a response program, so we're there always on standby on Thursdays, Fridays, and Saturdays from 2100 to 0200 to pick up intoxicated individuals so we can mitigate DUIs and potential harmful incidences," said AADD President SSgt. Jan Mariel Punelas. "But it's not just about preventing DUIs, it's about helping Airmen who may not have a car to travel anywhere, need a pickup at the airport, or they may find themselves in a dangerous situation where they can't leave under their own power."

"[Gutierrez] has been a great liaison between leadership and Airmen and she also has a YouTube Channel talking about her experiences coming to Minot because she wanted to share her knowledge and experience of the world," said Punelas. Her dedication to helping her fellow Airmen and families is essential to AADD's goal of protecting the Air Force's most valuable asset: its people.

AADD is available to all Minot AFB military members and spouses, and is even available on holiday weekends. They are safe and reliable, as well as confidential. They are always looking for volunteers as well as highly motivated individuals continue on the legacy of helping others through leadership positions in the organization.

Congratulations! As we go to press the number of days since the last DUI is at 44. John Jeziorske is in charge of keeping the sign current and says "I am pretty sure this has not happened for at least three and a half years" referring to reaching the milestone of over 40 days since there was a Minot AFB DUI reported.

Too recent memories are of two to three days between reported DUI's. The Northern Sentry has had a seat at the table of the DUI Task Force and Airmen Against Drunk Driving. We have supported these programs with ads and distributed the AADD cards to bars and other establishments. But that is just the tip of the iceberg in making this number happen. We know that there is a concerted effort by MAFB personnel to curb the number of DUI's on Minot AFB. We have seen the number of days between DUI occurrences move up. When we approached the 30-day mark everyone was holding their breath for the possibility of reaching 40. Now we are on the threshold (remember I am writing this column on December 7) of 50 days! Even if we have to re-set (I have no crystal ball) and start over, we have a new target. In other words, we know it can be done.

As we look forward to the holiday season, remember to make plans for a designated driver if alcohol is going to be served. Don't tempt fate. Hand the keys over before your common sense becomes cloudy.

Is there a magic number for the board at the front gate of Minot AFB? Simple answer is yes. Any number over 44... The Department of the Air Force (DAF) has contracted an independent, third-party survey firm to administer the DoD Annual Tenant Satisfaction Survey for all DAF privatized housing sites. The survey will begin October 28, 2021. All tenants in DAF privatized housing will receive a link to access the survey via email. Tenants will have until December 13, 2021 to submit their assessments.

By using an independent third party, Airmen, Guardians, and their families will be able to provide their open, honest and anonymous impressions of living in DAF privatized housing. The survey is anonymous, and data will be shared with DAF housing program leaders and project owners to continue improving the privatized housing experience. CEL & Associates, Inc. (CEL), will administer the survey, which will be made available to all tenants living in privatized housing.

Housing continues to be a positive quality of life program supporting Airmen, Guardians and their families. The data and comments gathered via the survey are taken very seriously as they shape the evolution of improvements provided to service members and their families which advance the DAF housing portfolio.



"OPERATION CHRISTMAS KIDLIFT" BRINGS SOUTH KOREAN ORPHANS TO SAFETY DECEMBER 20, 1950



During the Korean War, Air Force Chaplains Lt. Col. Russell Blaisdell and Col. Wallace Wolverton set up the Seoul Orphanage Reception Center to provide food, clothing, shelter, and medical aid to approximately 4,000 orphans in the South Korean capital. When Chinese forces began pushing towards Seoul, the chaplains feared for the children's safety in the midst of a war zone. On December Capt. Tone Nobile, a flight nurse, comforts 19, 1950, Blaisdell met Col. T.C. Rogers, Fifth Air Force Chief of

Operations. Along with Lt. Gen. William Tunner, Commander of Combat Cargo Command, they were able to call in 12 C-54 Skymasters from the 61st Troop Carrier Group. Over 1,000 orphans were airlifted to safety on December 20. Nurses and medics from the 501st Air Evacuation Squadron also provided aid to the children, and most of them were able to make it out of harm's way because of the valiant efforts of the Airmen involved.



Civil Air Patrol celebrates 80th anniversary



CIVIL AIR PATROL NATIONAL HEADQUARTERS

Civil Air Patrol members throughout the United States and in overseas squadrons are celebrating the organization's commitment to community service today — a commitment that began Dec. 1, 1941, and has continued for 80 years.

More than 56,000 members, youth and adult members, volunteer their time and talent to perform essential emergency services, advance aerospace and STEM education, and provide youth programs that build character, enhance physical and mental fitness, and shape the leaders of tomorrow.

"Civil Air Patrol members draw strength from our 80 years of history," said Maj. Gen. Edward D. Phelka, CAP's national commander and CEO. "On this milestone anniversary, today's volunteers take great pride in continuing the important work of our predecessors. Just as we did in CAP's early years, volunteers continue to perform vital missions for America, including homeland security, youth training, the advancement of science and technology, and so much more. Our proud past is a launching pad for us to rocket into the future."

Civil Air Patrol was founded in December 1941, one week before the U.S. entered World War II. Since then, its mission has evolved over the past eight decades to meet the ever-changing needs of America's communities with advanced lifesaving technology and world-class programs in youth development and education. largest fleet of single-engine aircraft, CAP also serves as the official auxiliary of the U.S. Air Force to perform emergency services duties as assigned, including conducting search and rescue missions; supporting local, state, and federal agencies after natural disaster; providing pandemic relief; participating in joint training exercises; and more.

In 2015, Civil Air Patrol became a Total Force partner of the Air Force in a noncombatant role, complementing the combined efforts of the Air Force, Air Force Reserve, and Air National Guard to preserve life and relieve suffering.

"Congratulations, and happy anniversary, Civil Air Patrol. I'm happy to be here with you, and to be working with you as a partner every day," said Brig. Gen. William D. Betts, vice commander, First Air Force and Air Forces Northern Command, who touted the organization's ability to always adapt so that its members stay mission-ready.

"Some of the technology used in emergency services missions today did not exist decades ago — GPS, forward-looking infrared, 3D scanning capabilities, digital photography, cell forensics and more, have changed the way CAP operates and the results are impressive, saving more lives, preserving property, and relieving human suffering in ways that could not have been imagined decades ago. This is what makes CAP an invaluable Total Force partner. The investment in dollars

Civil Air Patrol's education programs for youth span grades K-12 with science-based aviation and aerospace education curriculum, interactive STEM kits, and career exploration. Volunteer University, the organization's adult learning center of excellence, provides online, on-site, and ondemand opportunities for adult members to hone existing skills and learn new ones to help create a highly trained and effective volunteer workforce.

Programs for CAP cadets aged 12-18 focus on developing wellrounded community-minded servant leaders by integrating education, enhancing physical fitness, increasing confidence and more. Civil Air Patrol is also helping address the looming national pilot shortage with innovative programs like Cadet Wings that provide scholarships to train cadets 17 and older to be private pilots — an opportunity that can change the trajectory of a young life.



between two pieces of plastic wrap. Evenly pound the meat, being careful not to tear it, until chicken is 1/4-inch thick. Lay each chicken breast on a fresh piece of plastic wrap. Season chicken with salt and lay 1 to 2 slices of cheese on each breast followed by prosciutto or ham, then 1 to 2 more slices of cheese. Roll the chicken breast up like you would roll a burrito. Using the bottom piece of plastic wrap as an aid, fold the bottom of the breast up about an inch, then fold in the sides. Roll tightly. Wrap in the plastic wrap and tightly twist the ends to shape and compress the chicken. Repeat with all chicken breasts. Chill in the refrigerator for 1 hour. Season the flour with salt and pepper and put in a shallow dish. Combine the breadcrumbs, Parmesan cheese, butter and thyme. Season with salt and pepper and put in a second shallow dish. Whisk the eggs in a separate third dish. Arrange your workspace in this order: flour, eggs, breadcrumbs. Remove the plastic wrap from the chicken breasts. Coat each lightly with flour then dip in the egg. Roll in breadcrumbs, patting them to make them adhere. Arrange on the baking sheet. When ready to cook, set Traeger temperature to 375°F. Bake for 30 to 40 minutes, or until the coating is golden brown and the chicken is cooked through. Serve whole or slice into pinwheels with a serrated knife. Enjoy!





Relentless pursuit of improvement: Personnel **Reliability Assurance** Program boot camp

Chris Brannan and Scott Johnston, the Personnel Reliability Assurance Program managers at F. E. Warren Air Force Base, have been working to refine and improve their PRAP Boot Camp as far back as 2014.

PRAP is the overarching designation for two Air Force reliability programs: the Personnel Reliability Program and Arming and Use of Force. Within 20th Air Force, these programs are used to ensure personnel who perform nuclear-related duties are of sound mind and body on the job.

According to Brannan, the training is meant to bolster the knowledge level of the unit program monitors by identifying all of the major areas they will encounter while managing their programs.

As a graduate of the boot camp, Brian Cain, force program manager for the 90th Civil Engineering Squadron, shared, "There are several intricacies to the Personnel Reliability Program, but the PRP Boot Camp hosted by Chris Brannan and Scott Johnston did a great job deep-diving into the particulars of DoDM5210.42_AFMAN 13-501, Nuclear Weapons Personnel Reliability Program. Chris and Scott methodically dissected and presented the requirements outlined in each chapter of the DoDM/AFI, making the vital information easy to understand and later implement in the unit."

Over the years, what started as just going over the staff assistance

visit checklist to improve PRP within the units, progressed into a slide presentation, Brannan explained. The slide presentation turned into three full days of information. After brainstorming together, Brannan and Johnston decided to make the information easier to digest and apply by going to three half-days.

"They can absorb that information, go back, apply it for the other half of their day, and then come back the next two mornings to do it again," said Brannan. "We have received nothing but positive feedback from our monitors that have attended these boot camps, not only with what content was discussed, but also with how the course is divided into the three half-days. This allows them to take it all in without information overload."

At the end of each boot camp, they conduct a quiz to see if there are any areas that need to be further clarified. If anything is identified from the quiz, they return to the topic and reinforce the content to ensure student understanding.

The success of Brannan's and Johnston's boot camp was shared with Maj. Gen. Michael Lutton, commander of 20th Air Force, during a meeting with wing commanders.

"The work of Chris and Scott is a great example of Airmen within 20th Air Force making a positive difference for our nuclear mission through quality training and a relentless pursuit of process improvement," said Lutton.

Winter hazards are not exclusive to driving, however. That means winter safety involves a consideration of a host of factors.

doing more indoor cooking. Carbon monoxide is produced through the burning of fuel in various forms, including stoves, engines, gas ranges, portable generators, and grills. The undetected as it builds up in enclosed spaces. Never warm up the car inside of a contained garage. Do not use portable flameless chemical heaters indoors, and have furnaces, water heaters and other fuel-burning appliances checked and serviced by a gualified technician annually. Be sure that carbon monoxide alarms are on every floor of the home, and take it seriously if the alarm goes off.

4. Black ice

Black ice is a common winter foe. Black ice forms when temperatures rise above freezing during the day, melting any snow on the ground and causing surfaces to become wet. If the temperature drops once more while the ground is wet, a thin, transparent sheet of ice can form. Black ice also may occur if moisture in the air condenses and forms dew or fog, and then the temperature drops below freezing, says the National Weather Service. Black ice gets its name because it looks black on asphalt roads. However, it also can form on sidewalks and overpasses, or spots shaded by trees or other objects. Slowing down and exercising extreme caution are essential.





DOD Looks at Ways to Improve Child Care Access

During the COVID-19 pandemic, the challenges faced by service members and their families in getting child care demonstrated just how important child care is to the military mission. And now the department is working hard to find new ways to ensure that those who need child care can get it, the deputy assistant secretary of defense for military community and family policy said.

"What the pandemic did, and what it showed us was that child care is not just a 'nice to have," Patricia Barron, who spoke on Tuesday as part of the Association of the U.S. Army's "Thought Leaders" seminar, said. "You've got to have it. If you're going to go to work, you've got to have your child care in place."

Deputy Defense Secretary Kathleen H. Hicks has challenged the department, and MC&FP to uncover new and innovative ways to expand access to quality affordable child care for military families, Barron said.

"We've been working really hard on what that could look like," she said. "And we've had a couple of things that I'm very, very proud of.'

Earlier this year, Barron said, the department kicked off a pilot program that allows military families to seek in-home child care providers, and the department will help pay for the cost.

"Now you can hire someone that comes into your home. They still need to be vetted, and still kind of have to go through the process that we would if we were to hire anybody to work in our centers. But you hire someone that comes into your home. And we will provide you with fee assistance to help pay for their salary," Barron said, adding she hopes the program will be expanded next year.

Barron also highlighted the DOD's "Military Čhild Care in your Neighborhood +" effort, which aims to get more child care providers eligible for fee-assistance by the DOD. Right now that effort is underway in Maryland and Virginia, but Barron said the program is expanding into other

states as well. "That'll

provide more opportunities for access to fee assistance," she said.

For parents needing short-term child care — such as a babysitter — Barron said the DOD has partnered with "Sittercity."

"If you go on to Military OneSource, we have waived the registration fee," she said. "You can go right into the portal there and you can put in your information and a list of people will come up — and of course it's up to you to talk to them and vet them and all of that. But they've had their background checks done."

Barron said both the DOD and the services are working hard to improve access to child care for military service members and their families.

"There's just never enough child care, because we have a young force," she said. "You know, we're always going to have young people coming in, we're always going to have babies ... and children.'
