Northern Strike 22-1 brings arctic training to Michigan

LANSING, Mich. - The Northern Strike 22-1 exercise will unite service members from several states and partner forces Jan. 21-30 at Camp Grayling Joint Maneuver Training Center and Alpena Combat Readiness Training Center, which comprise National All-Domain the Warfighting Center (NADWC).

"We are excited to kick off the year with the winter iteration of Northern Strike," said Lt. Col. Adam Jenzen, Northern Strike land component exercise director. "Over the past nine years, the Northern Strike exercise series has grown into one of our nation's best reserve component exercises. This is the third year for Northern Strike's winter iteration, and we are continuing to evolve by further integrating special operations forces alongside our conventional and multinational forces."

The Northern Strike exercise series, sponsored by the National Guard Bureau, provides a venue for units to maximize training. The summer iteration of Northern Strike is in August.

"Michigan has some of the best military training facilities in the country, which makes it the perfect place for visiting units and defense industry partners to work together in a complex, alldomain environment," said Maj. Gen. Paul D. Rogers, adjutant general and director of the Michigan Department of Military and Veterans Affairs. "Northern Strike is one of the reasons our state is receiving national recognition as an innovator in the future of warfighting." "Winter Strike" is held

annually in northern Michigan during the coldest part of the year, so visiting units can train in subarctic conditions. Snow, high winds, and single-digit temperatures are commonplace at the NADWC this time of year.

Winter Strike is a cost-effective way for units across the DoD (and reserve components in particular) to experience cold-weather joint all-domain operations. The ability to easily transport people and equipment via rail and roadway helps units save time, money and training days. Air component units can

fly to Alpena CRTC without leaving U.S. airspace.

"Being able to operate in cold weather is a critical skill for any warfighter to possess," Jenzen said. "The winter iterations of Northern Strike provide the perfect opportunity for units to complete arctic training objectives without the time and money required to travel to more remote locations like Alaska."


In addition to enhancing defense capabilities, the exercise series brings an average of \$30 million to Michigan's economy annually in military pay, travel and spending in northern lower Michigan.

"Everything we do at Northern Strike would not be possible without the support we receive from the local community," said Jenzen. "Northern Michigan is truly one of the most militaryfriendly communities in the country. Protecting them and our nation is why we train as hard as we do."

Both units are assigned to the U.S. Air Force major command, Air Force Global Strike Command.






You Know You Are Getting Older When




What are your interests/hobbies? I love to craft, make shirts, Pinterest, traveling, and summer. My family is a big Moto family.

Advice I would give to a new provider. Ask all the questions. Make sure to be organized, it makes life easier. Those interested I would tell them to go for it. You never know until you try something.







The Great Backvard Bird Count is underway Feb. 18 through Feb. 21 and participants don't have to be expert ornithologists to participate.

In fact, they don't even have to be expert birders.

Even if one's interest is merely as a casual observer, it's still easy to participate – especially because it's the 25th anniversary for the Annual Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC).

Even if one doesn't have 15 minutes to spare every day of the count, any number of days are better than nothing.

Rules are simple and it's easy to participate:

•First, new Great Backyard Bird Count participants can download the free Merlin Bird ID app and submit entries. Past participants can enter their data on their eBird mobile app or eBird website. Information on using Merlin Bird ID or eBird is on the GBBC website, (www.birdcount.org).

•Grab a pair of binoculars, watch birds for 15 minutes (or as long as you can), noting the species and number observed. It can be from an office or apartment window, school, workplace, or while strolling through a park, for example. If it's a bit chilly outside and a stroll in the great outdoors isn't on the menu, simply sit in the parking lot.

•Map your location and enter your information.

The GBBC is one of several citizen science based programs through the Cornell Laboratory of Ornithology. It's in conjunction with the National Audubon Society and Birds Canada and enjoys worldwide participation.

Admittedly, North Dakota isn't a birding hotspot in the dead of winter. Both North Dakota and South Dakota had less than 1,000 participants each in 2021. Regardless of the number, though, it's still important information and a fun winter activity.

Plus, it's intriguing to see what is in the state this time of year. Some northern species filter down from the Arctic and Canada, wintering in the state while others gut it out and spend their entire lifetime in the Peace Garden State.

For example, snowy owls just might make a person's list given the fact they will, at times, venture this far south in

The horned lark is a fun, winter bird flitting around in the state.

Novice participants don't have to go it alone if they're uncomfortable with their bird identification skills. In addition to the Merlin Bird ID app check out Audubon Birds app or the website, (allaboutbirds.org/guide), for example.

On top of that, there is a free webinar Feb. 16 at 1 p.m. CST to help beginning birders. Just go to the GBBC website, (www. birdcount.org) and scroll down the home page to register.

The Cornell Lab of Ornithology has an array of citizen-based programs designed to involve people in the world of birds while helping collect scientific data at the grassroots level, including Project FeederWatch, NestWatch, YardMap, or the Christmas Bird Counts. Details are available on their website, (www.birds.cornell.edu).

Ornithologists use information gathered during any of the citizen science programs. The Great Backyard Bird Count helps develop a "big picture" trend of overall bird populations – the more years data is collected, the more information is available to determine trends.

In turn, that helps determine how weather plays a role in bird populations, movement, and migration patterns.

It also helps quantify the potential role of diseases such as West Nile Virus, which hit crows especially hard, or avian conjunctivitis. It can also help identify what kinds of differences in bird diversity are apparent in cities versus suburban, rural, or natural areas.

Besides, it's intriguing to see what feathered friends are out and about on a typical frozen North Dakota February day. A person might be surprised at what they find - it just might be busier than one anticipates.

the winter. Look for them atop utility poles, fence posts, or bare deciduous trees taking advantage of their lofty perch to identify a potential, unsuspecting meal. They're not overly common in the winter and can be a treat to see for even veteran birders.

Some potential areas to visit include Upper Souris National Wildlife Refuge northwest of Minot where wintering grassland species could be observed or Minot's Oak Park. Look for woodland species there.

"We now have a substance any capacity that they are able Advocacy Center provides a variety of services to victims of child abuse and their families, taking a compassionate approach to reduce trauma, raise awareness, and put children all over North Dakota on the path to safer, happier lives. In 2020, they served 450 children and are continuously evolving their organization to sufficiently meet the needs of their clients.

Christal Halseth, Executive Director of NPCAC, explained, "We bring together a team of professionals who respond to extreme child abuse cases. Most of our cases are child sexual abuse, but we do respond to all crimes against children."

Typically, NPCAC serves children ages zero to 18 years old and their families with exceptions for older individuals, but they also offer resources for adults who are still being affected by their childhood abuse trauma. They work diligently with clients, law enforcement, and social services to reduce barriers and streamline the process, minimizing the trauma associated with reporting.

From there, NPCAC provides resources for mental health, forensic interviews, advocacy, medical referrals, and now substance abuse treatment to cover every aspect of child abuse

abuse clinical supervisor on staff who is providing treatment to children and parents... we noticed that in many of the cases we were seeing, there was some type of drug exposure or addiction that also affected the families. Even though we treated them for trauma before, we were missing that substance abuse aspect," said Halseth. They also offer telehealth services and comprehensive case management, prevention education, and outreach in their newly opened satellite offices in Bottineau and Williston.

Because NPCAC provides these services free of charge, fundraising events and contributions from the community are vital to employ professional, knowledgeable individuals and continue their mission.

NPCAC's biggest fundraiser of the year, the Champagne and Ice Gala, returns for its 12th year on February 26. Attendees can participate in a raffle for a diamond pendant provided by Knowles Jewelry, silent and live auctions, and witness a presentation by special guest Jenna Quinn on her own experiences with childhood sexual abuse.

Halseth encourages members of the community to donate in

to, whether it is a small monetary donation, volunteering their time, or dropping off comfort items (blankets, toys, etc.) or snacks to be given to clients. Even the smallest donation can make a big difference, and she has personally witnessed the impact that the community has had on NPCAC and vice versa.


"When I started at the CAC 11 years ago, there were two people on staff...me and the director. 



Every year snowblowers are one landscaping tool that seem to virtually fly off the shelves; particularly as heavy snowfalls begin to land. While snowblowers may be a popular tool; ranging from light duty all the way up to heavy duty machines capable of clearing small parking lots, one consideration that many prospective snowblower owners do not take into consideration is safety. As the snow gets deeper, the number of snowblowerrelated injuries increases. Snowblowers are potentially dangerous machines that need to be used carefully and with respect for their moving parts.

There are two basic types of snowblowers. A single-stage blower whirls the gathering/ blowing auger at a very high speed. The slower-moving gathering auger of the two-stage blower has more power. When a hand or foot is caught in any part of the snowblower, serious injury is likely. Keep all shields in place and keep hands and feet away from all moving parts. The snowblower operator must be responsible for everything that comes out of the machine's chute, including the snow discharge and any object the blower may pick up. Objects other than snow will usually be thrown farther than the snow discharge, so be alert to where the discharge chute is directed. If a snowfall is predicted, inspect the area to be cleared of snow and remove objects that may cause personal injury, property damage or damage to the machine. Check the area again before operating the blower. The small engine that powers a snowblower is also a source of risk. It is powerful enough to inflict serious injury, it produces toxic fumes that can be fatal, and the fuel presents a fire hazard. Electric snowblowers have



AFGSC Applying the Art of the Possible

The Air Force Global Strike Command Office of Logistics and Engineering (AFGSC/A4) has a reputation for rapidly testing new ideas and driving innovation that takes Air Force Global Strike Command to the next level. One of the latest ways AFGSC/A4 is innovating is by investing in the application of the Art of the Possible.

Based in a wealth of knowledge and experience from across the ranks of the Air Force, AoP is a concept that standardizes a process, identifies a system's constraints, and helps users manage their process optimally; the concept has quickly become something leaders see value in adopting.

AFGSC's То lead implementation of AoP, the A4 staff recruited expert, William Tsao from Robins Air Force Base to lead the way. "AoP is a game changer," Tsao said. "It's a constraint-based management system that I've seen lead to huge gains in productivity during my time at Robins and the best part [about AoP] is the standardization, ownership, that shops have over the system."

One AFGSC shop in particular that has seen success with AoP implementation was the Wheel and Tire shop, from the 2nd Maintenance Squadron at Barksdale Air Force Base.

When the Wheel and Tire shop began their AoP journey, there was a healthy level of skepticism, but innovation won in the end. "It [skepticism] was totally understandable; as humans, we tend to be naturally resistant to change,' Tsao said. "The team at the 2 MXS was very accommodating and interested in doing things differently because through the training they too saw that AoP could be value added to the mission."

One of the key principles behind AoP is limiting work-inprogress (WIP) so it does not overwhelm processes. Through AoP, the Wheel and Tire shop was able to determine an appropriate WIP level as well as break up their process in to smaller, more manageable segments. The latter is better known as gating, and the grouping of similar work within a process machine's overall flow helps a shop manage the process via smaller buckets of work.

"There were some growing pains much like any new effort," Tsao said. "One of the technicians, Tech. Sgt. Keith Jackson, initially didn't "buy" the WIP the calculations came up with, he even tried to beat the calculations only to later find that it took about 20 minutes longer doing it his way. After that experiment, Tech. Sgt. Jackson was sold and became one of the biggest advocates for AoP.

The impact of AoP on the Wheel and Tire shop has allowed them to stabilize their workflow, resulting in over 1,900 man-hours saved per year and a 23 percent reduction in overall flow-time. Another positive effect found was an increase in process consciousness for the shop, which led to the identification of several Continuous Process Improvement initiatives to be tackled.

With hard numbers and the successes from the 2 MXS, senior leadership was briefed and it was decided that the next stop for AoP implementation was north to Minot Air Force Base, North Dakota.

"It was a logical next step for us to spread the knowledge and to standardize shops within the command that supported the same mission," said Tsao.


Maintenance Squadron at Minot was able to replicate the successes seen at Barksdale; Tiffany Steele, Staff Sgt. Jacob Hatch and Tech Sgt. Jeston Jump were a few of the individuals who helped lead Minot's AoP implementation. Within a few weeks, the 5 MXS saw a 50 percent reduction in their flow-time.

The AFGSC 2022 Strategic Plan was recently released, and one of the lines of effort is modernization; AFGSC senior leadership is calling for creative, forward-thinking and outsidethe-box ideas to improve the force. The implementation of AoP and the improvements it brings the mission is exactly the type of innovation leaders envision will modernize the command for the battles of today and tomorrow.

"Innovation is a crucial part of our Modernize line of effort," said Lt. Gen. Mark Weatherington, Air Force Global Strike Command deputy commander. "The command is committed to investing in Strikers' innovative ideas and applying new concepts so that we can maintain our competitive edge."

In the near future, an AoP handbook will be released to all AFGSC units to educate and inspire others to implement the concept within their own shops and work areas.

Executing mission, fostering innovation, making history: Barksdale's first ACE exercise

BARKSDALE AIR FORCE BASE, Louisiana --

On Jan. 11-12, 2022, Barksdale executed an Agile Combat Employment exercise that sent two B-52H Stratofortresses to Blytheville-marking the first time the BUFFS have returned to the area since the closing of Eaker AFB, Arkansas, nearly 30 years ago.

Conducting the bomber ACE operations provided an opportunity for Barksdale Air Force Base, Louisiana, to apply and practice strategic maneuvers designed to operate not just at U.S. and ally military installations, but nearly any austere airfield worldwide.

A WEALTH OF STRATEGIC **OPTIONS**

A new age demands new strategies. The goal of ACE is to provide mobile, decisive counter attack options in order to be prepared for any contingency.

The defining factor in ACE is that it enables the U.S. Air Force to use nearly any airfield in the world as a temporary base to repair and rearm aircraft, greatly widening their threat range.

In a world of constantly shifting geo-political fronts, ACE provides a proactive approach to provide force multipliers to any combat theater.

The Pacific continues to cement itself as a region of escalating tension and opposing forces continue to grow their influence in the area. The pressure is on the U.S. and its allies to respond accordingly.

"How many small islands with 10,000 foot runways exist out there," asked Capt. Adam Carr, 2nd Bomb Wing weapons officer. "That's the fight that the B-52 is preparing for."

As such a flexible concept, ACE challenges predictability. Whereas heavy bombers were previously limited to military installations, integrating ACE enables them to appear nearly anywhere.

"By having a more lean and

the air before an adversary can pinpoint their location. With warfare innovations such as ACE, the U.S. Air Force limits the impact that enemies can have on those operations. AN OPPORTUNITY FOR INNOVATION

While the ACE deployment strategy is nothing new to the U.S. Air Force, adding the B-52 to the equation is.

The 5th Bomb Wing at Minot Air Force Base, North Dakota, recently executed the ACE concept in December of 2021, flying their bombers to Canadian Forces Base Shilo, Manitoba, then landing at Edwards Air Force Base, California, to be rearmed before returning to Minot AFB. Barksdale's

However, approach was a little different.

Instead of a military installation, Barksdale rearmed it's bombers at a rural airfield. With the help of two C-130 Hercules from Dyess Air Force Base, Texas, a small footprint of personnel and supplies were transported to assist the B-52s, mimicking what they would encounter in a real world situation.

"This is a directive from [Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. CQ Brown, Jr.] all the way down," said Carr. "Through every level of the Air Force, we're figuring out how we want to implement ACE."

The concept has been experimented with in the bomber community since 2019 and began seeing integration in early 2020.

This ACE exercise also incorporated an innovative new communication kit called a GoComm. The communication kit is a project started by Senior Airman Jordan Heck, 7th Bomb Wing client systems technican, to provide seamless Wi-Fi internet communication in locations where not otherwise possible.

the aircrew might need." Aircrews conducting ACE operate in remote locations, where portable communication infrastructures do not exist. ACE requires resilient communication to function denied, disconnected, in intermittent or limited bandwidth environments. The GoComm assists with such capabilities.

PAYING TRIBUTE TO A LEGACY

Now serving as an Arkansas Aeroplex, the chosen destination for the ACE exercise was once an Army Airfield turned Air Force Base that housed many aircraft, to include the B-52H Stratofortress' predecessor-the B-52G Stratofortress.

"This complex started as an army airfield back during World War II," said Barrett Harrison, Arkansas Aeroplex president. "After the war, the airfield was closed. Then it was reactivated in the 1950s as an Air Force base.'

The installation was a critical asset throughout the Cold War. During the Cuban Missile Crisis, the 97th Bomb Wing went airborne, ready to retaliate should the crisis have escalated. As the Cold War began to come to an end in the 1980s, discussions surfaced on the possible closure of the base as part of the post Cold War "Base Closure and Realignment Act." Military officials proposed renaming the base in commemoration of World War II General Ira Eaker, former commander of the 8th Air Force, with the idea that the name would prevent the base's closure by appealing more to military leaders.

However, following the resolution of the Cold War in 1991, Eaker Air Force Base saw official closure in 1992 to reduce strain on defense logistics.

This is Barksdale's first application of ACE, and as leaders imply, the first of many for the B-52. From Barksdale to Blytheville, no matter the scenario, the B-52 will continue to be a symbol of global deterrence, providing weapons on target, on time-anytime,







Australia, Japan, US converge on Guam for Cope North 22

JOINT BASE PEARL HARBOR-HICKAM, Hawaii --

Air forces from Australia, Japan, and the United States will participate in Cope North 2022 (CN22) Feb. 2-18, 2022, a humanitarian assistance and disaster relief (HA/DR), large force employment, and aerial combat training exercise.

The exercise kicks off with a HA/DR training event to reinforce the three countries' combined ability, and interoperability, to support the Indo-Pacific region during a natural disaster. Operations will take place at Andersen Air Force Base and Northwest Field on Guam; the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, including Rota, Saipan, and Tinian; Palau; and the Federated States of Micronesia.

Fighter aircraft from the U.S. Air Force, Japanese Air Self-Defense Force (JASDF), and

Royal Australian Air Force (RAAF) will conduct aerial refueling, close air support, and counter-air missions. These training missions will conclude with a large force employment exercise designed to enhance readiness and interoperability among the three countries.

Participants will also exercise Agile Combat Employment, or ACE, concepts during Cope North 22. ACE is Pacific Air Forces' model to project combat power via a network of distributed operating locations throughout the Indo-Pacific. Over 2,000 sorties are planned for CN22 across seven islands and 10 airfields.

More than 2,500 U.S. Airmen, Marines, and Sailors will train alongside about 1,000 combined JASDF and RAAF counterparts in CN22. Approximately 130 aircraft from over 30 units will fly in the exercise.

Eight additional countries will be sending 16 officers to participate in the International Observers Program, which gives international field grade officers the opportunity to observe key parts of the exercise in the hope that they will participate with aircraft in the future. France and India are both participating in Cope North this year-with India participating for the first time ever-after having observed the exercise in previous years.






