

ROYAL AIR FORCE FAIRFORD, England --

B-52 Stratofortress aircraft, equipment, and personnel from the 5th Bomb Wing, Minot Air Force Base. North Dakota, arrived at RAF Fariford, England, February 10 to execute the long-planned Bomber Task Force mission, a regularly scheduled U.S. European Command and U.S. Strategic Command joint mission

En route to RAF Fairford, U.S. Bomber Aircraft integrated with British Typhoon aircraft and Portuguese F-16s currently assigned to NATO's Icelandic Air Policing mission. Bomber aircraft also integrated with British Joint Terminal Attack Controllers (JTAC) to conduct bilateral Close Air Support training. The mission focused on enhancing readiness and interoperability for the controllers responsible for coordinating airstrikes to support ground forces.

Regularly integrating with our allies improves our cooperation operational capacity, capability and interoperability.

Occurring since 2018, bomber rotations through Europe maintain our readiness to execute a wide variety of missions across two continents, sustaining peace through deterrence.

"With an ever-changing global security environment, it's critical that our efforts with our allies and partners are unified," said Gen Jeff Harrigian, USAFEcommander. AFAFRICA "We're in Europe training and collaborating together, because consistent integration is how we strengthen our collective airpower.'

Through their rotation the bombers will be operating from RAF Fairford to continue to integrate with our partners and allies.

Bomber rotations reinforce the U.S. commitment to NATO allies and coalition partners to maintain our collective safety and sovereignty.



UPSIDE DOWN UNDER MARVIN BAKER

The world of communications is constantly changing and most of it runs parallel to the changes in technology. And for those of us who work in communications, it's sometimes been a difficult transformation.

As an example in each of the past three years, North Dakota has lost three weekly newspapers in the Dunn County Herald in Killdeer (2019), the Walhalla Mountaineer (2020) and the Cavalier County Republican in Langdon (2021).

In addition, nearly every daily newspaper in North Dakota has made changes to accommodate the changes in technology, most notably the Dickinson Press moving from a six-day daily to a weekly newspaper.

Those of us in communications are quick to blame social media for forcing some of the changes newspapers have had to endure. However, that's not always the

case. The owner of the Mountaineer wanted to sell, nobody wanted to buy, so the paper ceased publication. In Langdon's case, it was the issue of finding enough employees to keep the newspaper operating.

There are also examples of success in these changing times. They include the McKenzie County Farmer in Watford City and the Adams County Record in Hettinger. The Record is a paper that was set to close in 2019, but was saved by Jill Friesz of Elgin, who now operates four papers including Carson, Elgin, and New England.

Countless other newspapers in North Dakota are holding their own or doing well because of large subscription lists, savvy management, and just plain popularity among readers and advertisers.

There's also a new "newspaper" in North Dakota that is beginning to catch the attention of a lot of people across the state. It's called The Dakotan. It's an internet only publication based in Minot, and it has a daily presence for the convenience of its readers.

The Dakotan can be considered an experiment, at least in North Dakota, that appears to be working. Tracking data shows

some pretty impressive numbers which translates to a lot of eyes seeing the advertising which in turn, means a better bottom line.

This new launch, for the 21st Century, is like a once popular paper that started in North Dakota more than 100 years ago called the Non Partisan Leader. It was time for a change, and the Leader led that change for a number of years starting in 1915.

There have been digital newspapers in other states, but many haven't risen to the equivalent level of a strong daily because of specific focus on politics, sports, entertainment, or medicine. Thus if a digital, such as The Dakotan, is to succeed, it needs to cover all those bases and that's what it is working hard on accomplishing.

The first few days it was Minot only. Then reporters began branching out to Williston, Rugby, Bismarck. Soon there will be a state capitol reporter and correspondents across the state in communities

like Fargo, Grand Forks, Devils Lake, and Jamestown.

Press releases, sports, opinion, and numerous other aspects of a traditional daily newspaper have been added to satisfy a statewide audience. It's an exciting new way to sit at your kitchen table in your robe Sunday morning reading your newspaper on your iPad and sipping on a cup of coffee.

It's certainly worth a look and many will take a second look and a third because of the quality of the content. It may be found at (www.mydakotan.com). The Dakotan doesn't exist to replace any newspaper period. It is however, considered a complement to the traditional newspaper such as newspaper and TV have been for the past 70 years across North Dakota.

Many of us who have been around a while still believe we have ink in our veins and we love the smell of a paper coming off the press. That will never change. It will always be a fond memory for

just about every journalist. What is changing is how we present the news to the reading public.

Nearly all newspapers have included online versions in some capacity that are slowly but surely gaining readership. It eases the cost of press runs, slow mail delivery that has gone downhill over the last 20 years, and it presents the reader with breaking news.

Do yourself a favor. Take a look at The Dakotan. I think you'll like it. In no way, shape or form is The Dakotan on the internet to replace any existing newspapers. It's here to complement them and bring notoriety to every corner of our state; from Pembina to Bowman, from Crosby to Hankinson.

The motto of The Dakotan is "Real, Honest, Local News." And after meeting with the management on Feb. 4, I strongly believe that. It's here to present the news in a professional manner, to remain objective, and to gain the trust of the public at large.



Volunteers make Quilts of Valor for Service Members and Veterans

MINOT — After enjoying a warm meal together on Saturday morning, a dozen women from the Minot Quilts of Valor Foundation (QOVF) and the Quilters Guild worked steadily at sewing special quilts for those touched by war.

February 5 marks the national Quilts of Valor Sewing day, a day in which volunteers exercise their gifts in cutting, sewing, and quilt making to bless nominated service members and veterans.

"Quilts of Valor is an organization that started in 2003 by Catherine Roberts from Iowa," explained Lynn Heald, group leader for the QOV in the Minot area.

Roberts started the organization after she had a vivid dream of a soldier in despair who then wrapped himself in a quilt, and it changed his demeanor to one of hope and wellbeing. Mother of a son who served time in Iraq, Roberts was compelled to provide quilts of "healing" for service members and veterans to sooth their physical and emotional scars from war.

Nearly two decades have passed since she began the QOVF, and nearly 300,000 quilts have been awarded to service members and veterans. Roberts alone could not

volunteers around the country has helped bring her vision to life.

"The reason I joined the Quilts of Valor is I, myself, am a veteran too but haven't served towards any wars," explained Jackie Slagle, longtime member of the QOVF. "But those who have, I have so much respect for those people who have given so much to us. Quilting is my love, and it is just a way to give back."

Slagle said she also battled breast cancer in the past and being given a quilt helped comfort her during that time in her life. "When I was going through treatment and would use that quilt, I could feel the love from the people who gave it to me, so I can't imagine that the veterans we are giving these to don't get that same feeling," she

Judi Green, an initial charter member of QOV group in Minot, has a husband and two sons who have served in the military. She said she is honored to participate in this program.

"Today is my 50th wedding anniversary," Green said while holding back tears as her and others poured their hearts into making the quilts, "and I thought today was a good day to honor

several quilts ready to give to recommended recipients through the program. Richard Pederson (retired Army Corporal) and Frank Senn (retired Air Force Chief Master Sgt.) are next to receive Ouilts of Valor.

The reward ceremonies are scheduled at the convenience of the recipient and are held at churches, special locations, or in the comfort of one's home around this time of

Each quilt requires approximately 40 hours of labor and about \$300 in materials to make.



Red Flag 22-1

Maintaining strategic deterrence through multiple avenues. including intercontinental ballistic missiles and a bomber presence that is unmatched, Air Force Global Strike Command's mission is the cornerstone of the United States' defense. To maintain force readiness AFGSC and several other major commands throughout the U. S. Air Force participate in a multi-national training exercise called Red Flag.

This year's Red Flag 22-1 began Jan. 24 at Nellis Air Force Base, Nevada, on the Nevada Test and Training Range, the U.S. Air Force's flagship military training area. There, the U.S. Air Force and the nation's allies have enough space to freely operate any aircraft, ground vehicle or troop movement in a controlled environment.

Red Flag is held three times annually, providing training in preparation for realistic combat scenarios, increasing pilots' combat effectiveness in different airframes and their interoperability with other aircraft. The 414th Combat Training Squadron conducts Red Flag exercises, providing Airmen the experience of various intensive air combat sorties in the safety of a training environment.

AFGSC's role in Red Flag 22-1 is to demonstrate the lethality of the 5th Bomb Wing's B-52H Stratofortress, Whiteman AFB's B-2 Spirit Bomber's flexibility, and how they work with the rest of the Air Force to provide support and strategic deterrence on a worldwide scale.

Red Flag Nellis 22-1 has

force, including the U.S. Air Force, Navy, Marines, Space Force, Air National Guard and U.S. Air Force Reserves. The Royal Air Force (UK) and the Royal Australian Air Force also participate, bringing the total number of personnel involved at around 2.900. While the 388th Fighter Wing from Hill Air Force Base, Utah, is the lead wing for the exercise, over 100 aircraft participate in the exercise; ranging from strategic and stealth bombers, search and rescue aircraft, close air support, air refuelers, drones and tactical fighters all participate to sharpen their skills.

"The training prioritizes 'first timers' combat missions, mission commander upgrades and flag unique experiences that contribute most to readiness and partnering," said Col. Jared Hutchinson, commander of the 414 CTS. "Participants will engage with 57th Wing professional aggressors, integrate with other units in the execution of the U.S. Air Force's core functions of air superiority, intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance, rapid global mobility, global strike and command and control, and learn in the world's best combat debrief, while writing themselves into the next chapter of the Air Force's heritage."

The exercise enables AFGSC to train with other MAJCOMs and foreign allies, creating a stronger bond and unity to help maintain competitive advantage necessary to defend the nation and enhance global security.

"Allies attending Red Flag multiple units from across the joint 22-1 will perform the same

roles as our U.S. participants," said Col. Hutchinson. "They will be mission commanders and functional leaders. The 5 BW's culture of innovation enables Airmen and assets to operate and perform B-52H operations with unmatched skill compared to near-peer adversaries. Exercises like Red Flag enhance command and control priorities, demonstrate strength and enables personnel to retain skills.

Whiteman AFB's B-2 Spirit Bombers and the 5 BW's B-52s provide Red Flag with a unique

set of abilities. Their joint training goal is to enhance how bombers and all of the various AFGSC mission sets, fit into the Department of Defense's vision of deterrence and defense.

Dorm Airmen receive love from FBS on Valentine's Day

On Feb. 14, 2022, local animal rescue For Belle's Sake brought the dorm Airmen some Valentine's Day love in the form of furry faces. Several cats and dogs were brought from their Sawyer, N.D., facility to play, cuddle, and brighten what may have otherwise been a normal day for the young men and women.

FBS is run by Master Sgt. Christian Bird and Tech. Sgt. Shelby Bird, Carla Albertson, and a team of dedicated volunteers who rescue, rehabilitate, and adopt out about 100-200 animals per year. They have rescued every animal from dogs and cats to lizards, donkeys, and more, with many coming in as strays, owner surrenders, or court ordered surrenders due to neglect or abuse.

The idea for the nonprofit organization began in 2012 when a military veteran was forced to surrender his 75 animals and refused to give them to anyone but the Bird family due to their military affiliation and reputation in the community. That same year they found Belle, a dog who was suffering and dying in a field after being hit by a car in Sumter, S.C., and held her as she passed away in their home. With their years of experience in animal rescue and in honor of Belle, the Birds founded FBS to fully support the animal welfare needs of the communities they serve and save as many lives as possible.

The Birds decided to continue their rescue mission after PCSing to Minot AFB and used their unique situation to bring joy to the Airmen in their charge through Pet Days. "Anxiety, depression, PTSD, missing home, long weeks at work, etc., are all very common experiences that our Airmen go through. Shelby and Christian are advocates for their community in more than just animal welfare and after a Pet Day at work, noticed a visible and immediate shift in the attitudes and mental health of their Airmen. Knowing that petting and playing with animals reduces stress-related hormones, anxiety and depression as well as eases loneliness... Shelby decided to approach the dorm manager with the idea of hosting an event to bring those benefits to the Airmen who couldn't have pets."

The most recent "Dorm Pawty" was coordinated by FBS and Airman 1st Class Janette Nowak, 5th Communications Squadron COMSEC Accountant and Dorm Liaison. Nowak mentioned the overwhelming support that the event garners each time it is held,

and believes that dorm events are a key part in maintaining the wellbeing of Minot's single Airmen.

> "Being in Minot, it can be hard to get out. Everyone's in their rooms and not many of us go out so it's really nice to do those events," said Nowak. "[For Belle's Sake] likes to bring their animals to interact with people because some of them have been in the shelter for a while, so they come onto base, we meet them at the dorms, and people just come by and play with them. It's been proven that Airmen like this event more than many others that we do, because who doesn't love petting animals? It always seems to brighten everybody's day."

> Nowak and several volunteers set up Valentine's themed decorations, cookies, and helped to manage the animals in the foyer of Dorm 221. Because dorm Airmen are not permitted to have dogs and cats in the dorms, events like this allow them to interact with pets that they may not get to see on a daily basis. "A lot of the Airmen have their own pets at home. They create strong bonds with their puppies, their old dogs, their 20 year old cats, and a lot of people like me miss those bonds that we used to have. Animals create a different relationship with you than any other human could. People want that connection that

they may not be able to have with their peers," she continued.

Not only are the parties beneficial to Airmen but the animals involved as well. "They go back to the rescue so tired and content," said FBS. "They get individual attention and lots of extra love. It is a great time for them to socialize with new people and build their confidence as well."

In the past, they have also facilitated petting zoos and school visits for the Minot AFB community to expand outreach and educational opportunities. "It's events like this that we would love to see expanded and continued," they said. "The more people that can be reached about animal welfare, the less need there are for rescues like FBS."

Because the Birds are also Active Duty, their volunteer team plays a vital role in continuing their mission. FBS is always in need of volunteers to help with their operations and outreach events. They also hold designated volunteer days and recruit individuals who are interested in volunteering from home to perform website updating, application processing, grant writing, fundraising, and more. US B-52 brings region together through first Middle East presence patrol of 2022

NINTH AIR FORCE (AIR FORCES CENTRAL)

SOUTHWEST ASIA --

Regional and coalition air forces joined a U.S. Air Force B-52H Stratofortress and two U.S. Marine Corps F/A-18 Hornets on a presence patrol mission across the U.S. Central Command area of responsibility Feb. 14.

The bombers' flight originated at Royal Air Force Fairford, England, and flew over the East Mediterranean, Arabian Peninsula, and Red Sea before departing the Middle East.

B-52-led "Today's

demonstration of joint, coalition, and partner nation combat airpower was a powerful projection of our combined strength across the Middle East," said Lt. Gen. Greg Guillot, 9th Air Force (AFCENT) commander. "By originating outside the CENTCOM AOR, the mission also exemplified the U.S. Air Force's ability to deliver combat airpower seamlessly across multiple combatant commands."

The mission, flown by aircrews assigned to the Minot Air Force

Base, N.D.-headquartered 5th Bomb Wing, was the first presence patrol of 2022.

U.S. Central Command, through 9th Air Force (AFCENT), facilitated six bomber task force missions throughout 2021 as a demonstration of the U.S.led coalition's commitment to promoting regional stability. The last bomber-led mission across the Central Region involved two B-1B Lancers on Nov. 11, 2021.

A DARK SIDE

They glistened like hidden treasures awaiting discovery. Lying in the bottom of a coulee, they beckoned to be released them from their fate, which, granted would probably have provided food and nourishment for a happy rodent.

The sheds were precious, they begged to be appreciated because, given their size, they probably were this bull's most valuable set of antlers. They meant he survived his first winter on the North Dakota prairie.

That little set of moose sheds now lay nestled on an end table. Perhaps that's an indication they're not exactly the biggest moose antlers when they fit neatly on a piece of furniture. That's OK; they're a matched set of antlers, shed side-by-side by a bull moose.

That's what makes shed hunting such an amazing activity.

Well, that and other things.

Things like being able to get outside after winter breaks, getting exercise, and watching spring eek its release from winter's grasp.

It's taking the dogs along so they get exercise, hoping they don't find too much mud and icky things to roll in on their own personal treasure hunt.

It's the opportunity to marvel at creatures that each year grow and shed antlers. Think about the energy and nutrients needed for a bull moose or elk to grow antlers of any size in a matter of a few months. Even growing those little sheds on that table put demands on that young bull. It's not a minor feat for deer to grow antlers, either.

There is an art to shed hunting. It involves knowing and understanding deer, elk, and moose movements in winter; knowing what to look for — things like game trails or perhaps across from a fence should antlers pop off as a deer lands, for example.

Yet there can - and sadly, is - a deep, dark, disgusting side to shed hunting.

While the true art of shed hunting is doing it properly, appreciating nature and wildlife, there are those who drag shed hunting into an ugly pit.

This year wildlife across many areas of North Dakota came into winter in less than ideal health condition. The state's drought often meant less available nutrition for

creatures dependent on Mother Nature for their grocery store. Add an epizootic hemorrhagic disease outbreak in areas where it's never been documented, and those survivors joined an already stressed group of wildlife.

Some shed hunters show no regard to the stress cold temperatures and snow place on all animals as they struggle to move through snowdrifts, scratch and paw ice-crusted snow for food, and are pushed from valuable winter shelter providing much needed thermal cover in brutally cold temperatures and wind.

Perhaps worst of all are those who scout areas where deer and elk congregate, even pushing animals so they can be present when antlers drop.

All those people are looking for are the dollars attached to a detached antler.

There is a reason the Wyoming Game and Fish Department closed some Hunter Management Areas (HMA) to all public access in the winter. Similar to N.D. Game and Fish Department Wildlife Management Areas, several Wyoming HMAs play a critical role in providing essential big game wintering habitat.

Those vital areas congregate wildlife where they can survive a Wyoming winter. But they also drew countless shed hunters, innocent and unscrupulous alike, pushing some wildlife to the brink of death and beyond.

While North Dakota's Wildlife Management Areas still allow public access in the winter, activities such as snowmobiling and things that could harass and push wildlife are illegal.

Other public lands are closed to the taking of sheds any time of year, including all U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service lands, whether it's a National Wildlife Refuges or Waterfowl Production Area. Find out what is and isn't allowed on other public land, including shed hunting — U.S. Forest Service National Grasslands, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers land along Lake Sakakawea and Lake Audubon, or Bureau of Reclamation areas, for example. It's true shed hunting can be a great spring activity and a chance to reconnect with nature.

But it's equally true the dark side of shed hunting is all too common — and can be deadly for wildlife whether it has antlers or not.

Through with Chew Week is February 20-26

Through with Chew week is February 20 – 26. This week is set aside to bring awareness to the health risks of smokeless tobacco. It also serves to educate smokeless tobacco users on lifesaving screening information and creates inspiration for chewers to start their quit.

During Through with Chew week, First District Health Unit will offer free individual consultations with Certified Tobacco Treatment Specialist Bonnie Riely. During these consultations, tobacco users will learn about medication options, get free nicotine replacement products, and even receive a free oral screening kit. To get started or for more information, please contact Bonnie at 701-837-5171 or bfriely@nd.gov.

Smokeless tobacco can be as addictive and difficult to kick as smoking. The average dose of smokeless tobacco yields an average of 4.5 mgs of nicotine; the average cigarette provides 1mg of nicotine. Smokeless tobacco users tend to have somewhat higher blood levels of nicotine in the body for longer periods of time than smokers. While the relationship between smoking and diseases has been more extensively studied than smokeless tobacco use, the diseases associated with smokeless tobacco can be more painful, disfiguring, and lethal. Diseases such as leukoplakia (hard, white lesions which can be pre-cancerous); oral cancer in cheeks, gums, lips, tongue, and throat; stomach cancer and cancer of the voice box; heart attack; stroke; high blood pressure; gum disease; and black hairy tongue have all been associated with smokeless tobacco use. Muscle weakness, dizziness, and decreased physical performance can also be effects of smokeless tobacco use.

Current smokeless tobacco users are encouraged to see their dentists regularly along with doing self-screening. Monthly checks should be done to spot early warning signs of cancer. As deadly as mouth cancer is, chances of surviving are much better if found early. To begin, find a mirror and good lighting. Then check the following:

1. Face and neck: Do both sides of your face feel and look the same? Gently press your jawbone to feel for lumps.

- 2. Check lips and gums: Pull down your lower lip. Are there white and red patches or sores that bleed easily? Look very carefully at where you place your tobacco. Do you see changes in color or rough areas? Squeeze your lip and check between your fingers. Are there bumps or soreness?
- 3. Roof of the mouth: Tilt your head back and open your mouth wide to look for any lumps and see if the color is different from usual. Touch the roof of your mouth to feel for lumps.
- 4. Floor of the mouth: Put the tip of your tongue on the roof of your mouth. With one finger, press around the floor of your mouth. Do you feel sores, bumps or swelling?
- 5. Tongue: Stick your tongue out. Grab it with a piece of gauze or paper towel. Move your tongue from side to side. Look for any color changes or

If you see discolored skin, feel any bumps or soreness, or have a sore in your mouth that does not heal within 2 weeks, see a doctor. If you have trouble chewing, swallowing, or moving your tongue or jaw, see a doctor right away.

Smokeless tobacco can be as addictive and as difficult to quit as smoking. Taking some time to get ready can increase your chance of success.

- 1. Set a date: This gives you time to prepare for your quit.
- 2. Make a list: Write down all the reasons you want to quit. Continue to add items to this list and put the list where you can see it.
- 3. Find your triggers: Learn the things that trigger your tobacco use.
- 4. Learn about medications: Many of the medications used for smoking cessation can be used for smokeless tobacco. To learn about the best medication options for you, visit with a Certified Tobacco Treatment Specialist.
- 5. Find support: When you have support, your chances of quitting increase. NDQuits offers free support. Call 1-800-784-8669 or visit https://ndquits. health.nd.gov
- 6. Develop a plan: Plan for substitutes, clear your home of all tobacco products, and decide how you plan to change your



SUNDAY SUPPER BEEF ROAST



INGREDIENTS

OR SIRLOIN TIP ROAST 3 TABLESPOON VEGETABLE OIL OR EXTRA-VIRGIN OLIVE OIL TRAFGER PRIME RIR RUR 2 CUP BEEF BROTH 1 LARGE RUSSET POTATO, PEELED AND **CUT INTO 1 INCH PIECES** 2 CARROTS, PEELED AND CUT INTO 1 **INCH PIECES** 2 CELERY STALKS, CUT INTO 1 INCH

PIECES 1 SMALL ONION, CUT INTO 1 INCH PIECES

2 FRESH THYME SPRIGS

Rub the roast on all sides with the vegetable oil and place 1 (3 TO 3-1/2 LB) BEEF TOP ROUND, RUMP on a rack in a roasting pan or Dutch oven, fat-side up.

> Season well with Traeger Prime Rib Rub. Pour the beef broth into the bottom of the pan. When ready to cook, set the Traeger temperature to 500°F and preheat with the lid closed for 15 minutes.

Insert the probe into the thickest part of the roast. Place the Dutch oven on the grill grates, close the lid, and cook the roast for 25-30 minutes, or until the outside is seared.

Reduce the Traeger temperature to 225°F. Add the potatoes, carrots, celery, onion, and thyme to the Dutch oven around the roast. Cover the Dutch oven with foil and continue cooking with the lid closed until the internal temperature of the roast reaches 135°F for medium-rare, 2-3 hours.

Add more broth as needed. Remove the Dutch oven from the grill and let the roast rest for 10 minutes before thinly slicing against the grain.

Serve the roast with the pan drippings and vegetables. Enjoy!



NOTES ON BEING SAFE

OKAY I'M STUCK. **NOW WHAT?**







North Dakota winters have a tendency to be severe, and bad weather came come on very fast, with little or no warning!

Even the experienced and safest drivers can find themselves temporarily stranded on North Dakota roadways, whether they be interstates, highways, or county roads. The Safety Office offers the following life-saving tips drivers should remember if they're trapped in their vehicle during a blizzard or stranded on the road during severe cold

Stav in the vehicle. Don't leave the vehicle to search for help. The highway patrol advises to stay put. It is very easy for people to get disoriented when battling blowing and drifting snow. Being lost in open country during a blizzard is extremely dangerous. In a vehicle, people have shelter from the elements and are most likely to be found a lot faster.

Be seen. Display a trouble sign on the vehicle. Hang a brightly colored cloth on the vehicle's radio antenna and raise the hood. Using the headlights also makes the vehicle more visible to emergency crews, but use them sparingly to avoid draining the battery.

Avoid overexertion exposure. Overexertion from trying to push a vehicle out of a snow drift, shoveling heavy drifts and performing other difficult tasks during strong winds, blinding snow and bitter cold may lead to a heart attack -- even for people who are in good physical condition.

Beware of carbon monoxide poisoning. Run the engine sparingly. Keep a window open for ventilation, and ensure the vehicle's exhaust pipe isn't blocked with snow.


Conserve your vehicle's fuel. Allow the vehicle to run only long enough for the interior to get warm.

Keep moving. Use minor exercises to keep up circulation and stay warm. Try not to stay in one position for too long.

Make us of your winter survival kit. That is why you packed it

in your vehicle in the first place, to make use of it. Remember if you have used it, replaced used items as soon as possible!

Always remember traveling during winter months use risk management practices as you would on the job, a little common sense goes a long way, especially when your stranded during a blizzard!



LOOK BACK THIS WEEK IN USAF HISTORY

FIRST TEST SATELLITE OF USAF NAVSTAR GPS IS LAUNCHED INTO ORBIT **FEBRUARY 22, 1978**

On February 22, 1978, the United States Air Force launched its first Global Positioning System satellite into orbit. Known as NAVSTAR 1 or OPS 5111, the satellite was launched at 23:44 Coordinated Universal Time from Vandenberg AFB, California, and was the first of eleven test satellites that would be launched in the coming years. The Block I satellites were a precursor to the modern GPS constellation that provides accurate 3D location, velocity, and time information. Originally, GPS was envisioned as a military system, but over the years it has evolved to have a variety of uses for not only the military, but millions

of civilians nationwide. NAVSTAR 1 was retired from service on July 17, 1985, and the Block I satellites were replaced with fully operational Block II satellites, many of which are still operational today.





Brass Band of Minot "Something for Everyone"concert this weekend

THE BRASS BAND OF MINOT

The Brass Band of Minot presents concert titled 'Something for Everyone" at 4:00 PM on Sunday, February 20th at Minot State University's Ann Nicole Nelson Hall.

The concert includes a variety of musical styles and tastes, starting with that perennial favorite British march, Kenneth J. Alford's "Colonel Bogey." The name comes from a golf term, but audiences may recognize it as the iconic song whistled by prisoners in the World War II epic, "Bridge over the River Kwai" or from any of a number of other popular films and commercials. The concert will continue with a special feature: an arrangement of Arthur Pryor's challenging "Blue Bells of Scotland: Air and Variations" featuring Trombone soloist Michael HarriSon. Next, the band will turn to epic movie music with the exciting "Robin Hood: Prince of Thieves," enchanting music from the classic musical "West Side Story," and a beautiful rendition of the song "You'll Never Walk Alone" from the musical "Carousel." Then, the band will swing into jazz and Dixieland with John Palmer's arrangement of the great gospel hymn, "Just a Closer Walk with Thee." With one last style change, the concert will include with a rousing arrangement of the early rock and roll classic, "Rock Around the Clock."

As North Dakota's only Britishstyle brass band, the Brass Band of Minot has been bringing music to North Dakota since 1994 when it was created by a group of Minot area brass musicians. Some of the founders still play with the band today, joined by musicians of a variety of ages and backgrounds from Minot and the surrounding communities and lead by Gordon Troxel, a farmer, businessman, and retired music educator from Berthold.

What is a "British-style brass band, and what makes it special? In addition to trombones, euphoniums, baritones, B-flat tubas, and percussion, which are familiar from concert bands, British-style brass bands also include cornets, flugelhorns, altoniums (also called alto horns), and E-flat tubas (they are a little smaller and higher-pitched than standard B-flat tubas). Except for the trombones, all the band's brass instruments have a conical bore which means that the brass

tubes they are made of gradually get larger from the mouthpiece to the bell, resulting in a sound that is darker, richer, and more mellow than the bright sound associated with trumpets. There are also some technical differences in how British-style brass band music is written and played that provide extra challenges to the players, but the appeal to an audience is the flexibility of that darker, richer, sound that allows the Britishstyle brass band to play a colorful variety of music and musical styles even though the band consists of only two types of instruments: brass and percussion.

"Something for Everyone" will be the third of this season's concerts for the Brass Band of Minot. Their season will round off with another concert on April 10th. Both performances will be at 4:00 PM at Ann Nicole Nelson Hall. Brass Band of Minot concerts are free and open to the public though cash and check donations are very welcome.




