Exercise Agile Tiger: Integrated deterrence in the heartland of America

WHITEMAN AIR FORCE BASE, Mo. (AFNS) -- Whiteman Air Force Base concluded the first iteration of Exercise Agile Tiger, designed to improve joint warfighter lethality through high fidelity mission planning, execution and debrief.

The exercise enhanced participants' ability to communicate, collaborate and operate together, ensuring unity of effort across the joint force.

Over the course of four days, 15 active duty, Reserve and National Guard units from across the Department of Defense collaborated in multiple DoD airspaces, made up of thousands of square miles, across the Midwest to train. Fighters, bombers, refuelers and other support units launched from six bases daily to engage in interoperability training missions.

Realistic interoperability training like Exercise Agile Tiger is critical for real-world success. As the first iteration, this exercise is an investment national defense.

"I'm pretty impressed with the team here for coming up with this on their own. This is the true definition of innovative Airmen: seeing the need for something and making it happen," said Col. Daniel Diehl, 509th Bomb Wing commander. "By bringing all the different players here, we can see where the gaps and seams in our training are, how our Airmen need to innovate in order to win in the future, and take those lessons and start applying them." Exercise Agile Tiger tests operational unpredictability through Agile Combat Employment concepts. Applying ACE concepts to training creates an adaptable, prepared joint force to credibly deter adversaries, assure allies and partners, and be prepared for tomorrow's challenges.

"The operational environment is defined by new challenges and modern capabilities," said Maj. Gen. Andrew Gebara, 8th Air Force and Joint-Global Strike Operations Center commander. "Our agile combat employment efforts provide on-call combat operations around the globe. Agile, back-to-basics training gets us to where we need to be. This exercise proves we are able to seamlessly integrate with other weapons systems in the field when called upon. We will remain always ready to compete, deter and win."

A key objective of the exercise is to replicate and predict real-world scenarios. From mission conception to execution, including more units with varied capabilities allows for a higher degree of realism.

intelligence Operators and designed Airmen complex scenarios to mimic contested combat both environments, in the air and on the ground. A-10C Thunderbolt II, UH-60 Black Hawk and Joint Terminal Attack Controller units engaged in advanced survival, evasion, resistance, and escape scenarios. Pilots collaborated through highfidelity mission planning, crafting


their best attack plan. Once in the air, B-2 Spirits and F-35 Lightning IIs integrated with B-1 Lancers and B-52 Stratofortress aircraft for coordinated attacks including longrange stand-off munitions.

Throughout the exercise, on-going communication and operability is critical. The E-3 Sentry provided a real-time threat picture and coordination of the battlespace. Additionally, numerous air refueling wings across the nation ensured the mission capability of all aircraft by operating the KC-135 Stratotanker, the KC-46A Pegasus and a KC-10 Extender, staged out of Whiteman AFB.

Challenging the participants' capabilities in simulated combat environments sparks innovative thinking, to increase their survivability and combat lethality. Exercise Agile Tiger demonstrates the greatest American combat advantage is not only our technology, but in our creative service members' ability to adapt, work together, and overcome adversity ... anytime, anywhere.

"It's important for me as the wing commander to ensure that the B-2 maintains its competitive advantage for years to come," Diehl said. "We are still the leading edge of the fight, as it needs to be. We are still making sure that we are the force that can fight tonight, and the more opportunity we provide to have realistic training scenarios ensures we can maintain that competitive advantage."

Spark Tank: Launches Innovative Ideas

There is a specialized place here on Minot Air Force Base that is designed to help Airmen discover and develop new concepts to assist in their workspaces. Snuggled in the back end of the Arts & Crafts Center is a top-of-the-line room filled with white board walls, computers, rapid prototyping technology, a 3D printer and a CNC machine. This room is called Atomic Spark. This unique and somewhat new addition to Minot AFB is enthusiastically led by Tech Sgt Dominic Garcia and Capt Matthew Matuszak, who goes by "Savage". The passionate purpose of this room is to give Airmen accelerated outlets to implement their ideas. TSgt. Garcia-or Dom as he likes to be calledand "Savage" help Airmen and civilian employees on Minot AFB capitalize on innovative ideas and turn them into realities.


Dom, "Savage" and the Atomic Spark Cell are uniquely open to any new idea that may help train, preserve, and improve work output, mission effectiveness or life at Minot AFB. If an Airman would like to see a new operation implemented or found a widget that could assist at the office, but the squadron or team does not have the funds or support, Atomic Spark is the place to go. Once an idea is submitted, Dom will contact the submitter, ask questions, and help figure out ways to make the idea possible. When the idea is fully formulated, the Atomic Spark team then helps secure funding for the project from a range of sources.

While the Atomic Spark is always available for idea submissions and collaboration, a very unique event is coming up on May 18 called the Spark Tank. At this special event, located at the Jimmy Doolittle Event Center 8 a.m. to 11 a.m. CDT, all these innovative ideas will meet for a once-a- year presentation. The Spark Tank Event will take the top ideas submitted through the base and present them thoroughly

to a panel of experts, funding investors and base leadership.

A top Award may be given out for the most innovative idea, and the goal is that all presentations will be funded and then carried out to create new and better processes for the Air Force. This event, in which submissions are due by April 29, is open to all active duty members stationed at Minot AFB, no rank restrictions at all. It is also open to certain civilian and contract employees with some regulations. At this time, Atomic Spark is not available to military dependents.

This event is kick-starting the innovation process, taking ideas formed by those who are closest to the mission and packaging and implementing them to benefit the units, Airmen, and Air Force. Imagine Spark Tank as "Startup Company meets the military." It is a way to harness the entrepreneurial spirit of Airmen and get innovative ideas into the workplace.

are in California and our neighbors have kept our driveway shoveled, even as the snow continued to pile up from storm number two last weekend.


Minot Air Force Base Facebook pages are also loaded with photos and stories of friends helping friends. And now, as we hear

Bomber Task Force Europe: Strategic bombers soar through NATO's Eastern Flank, complete successful 2-month rotation

UNITED STATES EUROPEAN COMMAND

The 69th Expeditionary Bomb Squadron's three B-52 Stratofortress aircraft, their support equipment, and approximately 300 personnel have completed their rotation as part of the two-month long Bomber Task Force Europe mission series at RAF Fairford today, returning to Minot Air Force Base, North Dakota.

Before returning to North Dakota, the three-ship of strategic bombers flew a final mission over Europe focused on integrating with NATO allies, which underscores U.S. and NATO commitment to deterring adversary aggression toward the Alliance.

Bomber Task Force Europe operations are routinely conducted across the European continent, showcasing the Air Force's unique ability to rapidly

field and deploy strategic forces at any time as part of the Agile Combat Employment concept.

"Our bombers provide a unique deterrence capability to the NATO Alliance," said Gen. Jeff Harrigian, U.S. Air Forces in Europe - Air Forces Africa commander. "The partnerships we have created throughout these rotations better support our ability to employ a strategic force in theater whenever we're called upon."

Throughout their rotation, the B-52 strategic bombers have built critical relationships throughout the Artic, Central and Eastern European regions, which has enhanced the coalition's ability to respond to incursions threatening freedom of maneuver and navigation.

A platform with over 60 years of service, the B-52 integrated with British and Norwegian

The Easter Winter Storm-**One for the Decade**

The Weather Channel named it Winter Storm Silas. AccuWeater called it a 'Historic Blizzard', saying this has been "one of the state's highest snowfall estimates... the storm was recorded in Minot at 36 inches." To us here on Minot AFB, many families are referring to last week's storm as the "craziest thing we have ever seen!" Almost all base residents, as well as most Minot citizens were relegated to their homes from the evening of Tuesday, April 12, until Friday/Saturday afternoon. Even when snow plows became available and driveways and roads were clear, many businesses and base organizations still remained closed. Being closed to base residents for 3.5 days, the Commissary did not open again until Saturday. The complete white-out conditions caused roads to be extremely dangerous and snow drifts to rise to over 8 ft in some areas. All throughout base housing residents were stuck in their homes, unable to even get out of their driveways. Minot AFB Homes and the team of workers from XS Dakota worked tirelessly day and night plowing streets and driveways in order to get residents free. Community Director Marcie Heller even put out 1-3 daily emails and social media posts out during the crises informing residents about plans and progress for snow removal, but the unprecedented snowfall on Wednesday made it almost impossible to keep up. Everyone was working as hard as they could to help.

Despite the challenges, many base residents were able to find ways to shovel out and all over base neighbors helped each other. Photos of neighbors helping neighbors popped up all over the Minot AFB Spouses Facebook pages, including a group of neighbors working together to create a path so that one car could be free to go make a store run for everyone. Another base resident, Kelly Phelps, looked out her window and snapped a photo of a bunch of people helping a stuck vehicle. "My husband was out shoveling to dig us out and at that point, the plows hadn't come through. The Airman in [the] truck was called into work and the road appeared to be clear, but he couldn't pass through

and unfortunately got stuck. My husband and other neighbors rushed out to dig him out!", said Kelly.

As most of the base completely shut down for days, the Missileers, Facility Managers, Food Service Technicians and Security Forces members out at the missile fields, were stuck as well. The 791 MSFS commander, Maj Zachary Hunt, who was in the field with his Airmen throughout the blizzard, mentioned that when the Airmen posted out started getting weather alerts, they realized it would likely mean a few extra days in the field away from family and loved ones. However, Maj Hunt said that most everyone remained positive and upbeat about the situation. He said, "The Dark Horses 'saddled up' per their motto and embraced being on the line in the most challenging time of the year. People also recognized that even being home would not be a walk in the park as Minot AFB got pummeled by the weather as well. Attitudes and professionalism remained top notch." While it was a different

than normal missile tour, Maj Hunt said everyone did a bunch of snow shoveling and it ended up being great exercise too. The Airmen pictured above are Capt Bryan Galcik, 91 OSS, Capt Brice Fields, 91 OSS, A1C Jonah Fouts and Amn Abner Sanchez, 791 MSFS/S3OC, who are "holding the line" as a remembrance from the April Blizzard of 2022. Maj Hunt said it was a good reminder that "All security force teams must be ready to deter, detect, deny, defend and defeat any threat in any weather condition day or night." He also noted that the same thing applies to the Missileers where the strategic deterrence never stops.

Society seems to sometimes dictate that when faced with overt challenges, most people will revert to helping themselves, but this storm has proven that to be the opposite. From families here on base helping neighbors digout driveways to the Airmen in the missile field standing strong, on Minot AFB it is proven that people help each other out when in time of need.

intructor-navigator, the Lt. Obenauf received a Distinguished Flying Cross Major Joseph Maxwell, unconscious and missing his helmet. Obenauf was unable to revive him and made the brave decision to risk death and remain in the burning aircraft in an attempt to save his fellow officer. He flew the plane to a lower altitude from the backseat position and at 450 mph in freezing temperatures, he set a course back to Dyess. Due to the elements, Lt. Obenauf's vision faltered while navigating the aircraft. He was able to perform a safe landing with the support of air traffic control and his own skill. Obenauf and Maxwell made full recoveries, and for his heroism and bravery, Lt. Obenauf received the Cheney Award, Aviator's Valor Award, Koren Kolligan Trophy, and a Distinguished Flying Cross.

SPRING MEANS TICK SEASON

They're small.

They're annoying.

But they can also be debilitating and deadly.

For some beloved dog owners, Tick Season is a yeararound occurrence. For others, it's a seasonal thing. How soon it starts, how long it lasts, and the types of diseases they can transmit vary with one's location in the United States. Some can be dangerous to humans, as well

In North Dakota spring means blooming flowers, plants growing...and ticks – typically brown dog ticks.

This year spring also means a blizzard to delay the official start of Tick Season.

Trust me, it will still come - Tick Season will be upon us sooner or later and proper preparation is always a good thing:

The best prevention is avoiding the areas ticks love best - wooded, weedy, or tall grassy areas, for example. Their preferred habitat, like the type of tick, varies by location.

While no method guarantees 100 percent protection, dog owners should consult with their veterinarian for suggestions on the array of available preventative products.

Topical products or tick collars can often kill ticks before they attach themselves. The drawback is they lose their effectiveness if washed off or diluted when a dog swims or is in water. They may also be less effective in places such as inside a dog's ears.

Oral medications don't wash off and tend to kill ticks guicker. However, that could mean dead ticks lying around the house at times.

Dogs should have daily "tick checks" when walking or playing in potential tick habitat during tick season. Be sure to check between toes, inside ears, and under "armpits". Run your fingers through their hair, gently pressing to feel any potential small bumps. If there's a bump, spread the hair to see if it's a tick.

Ticks vary in size, depending on species, from a tiny pinhead to something as large as a grape – especially if it's been attached for some time and drawn blood. They're brown or blackish in coloration.

ticks found throughout the country. It can cause Rocky Mountain spotted fever. Others are found in various regions in the U.S.

The American Kennel Club CHF identified seven major tick-borne diseases transmittable to dogs:

• Lyme disease: Caused by the deer (black-legged) tick, it might not show up for several months in an infected dog.

• Canine Ehrlichiosis: Caused by the brown dog tick, it's the most common and potentially one of the most dangerous to infect dogs. Like Lyme disease, it might not show up for months.

• Canine Anaplasmosis: Transmitted by deer ticks, it's also called dog or dog tick fever.

• Rocky Mountain spotted fever: Caused by the American dog (wood) and Lone Star ticks, it usually lasts a couple of weeks but can be deadly in serious cases.

• Canine Babesiosis: Brown dog and American dog ticks transmit this disease.

• Canine Bartonellosis: Caused by the brown dog tick, this disease can cause liver or heart disease if untreated.

 Canine Hepatozoonosis: Researchers believe this disease is caused when dogs eats an infected brown dog or Gulf Coast tick.

The American Kennel Club CHF website, (www.akcchf. org/canine-health/your-dogs-health/caring-for-yourdog/canine-tick-borne-disease.html), lists symptoms associated with each disease along with other information. Some tick-borne diseases take seven to 21 days to appear - or longer, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Preventions advised. Their website, (www.cdc.gov/ticks/ avoid/on pets.html), also has information on ticks and dogs.

A dog owner's best resource, though, is their veterinarian. They know what tick species are most prevalent in one's location, what diseases they carry, can make preventative recommendations, and can best treat your dog because they know him or her. Plus they may have additional tick removal recommendations or other tick-related

Use a clean, fine-tipped tweezers to remove ticks, grasping as close to its head and the dog's skin as possible. Use steady, even pressure to help ensure its mouth-parts (those biting tools) don't stay in the skin, pulling upward without jerking or twisting. Simply dispose of by placing it in alcohol, a sealed bag, or flushing down a toilet.

Air Force fields new rifle to Airmen

ROBINS AIR FORCE BASE, Ga. (AFNS) --

The Air Force Life Cycle Management Center's Small Arms Program Office is in the final phase of delivering the Squad Designated Marksmanship Rifle, or SDMR, to units across the Air Force.

The Air Force purchased approximately 1,464 SDMRs that will be distributed across the service based on approved allowances.

The SDMR is a semi-automatic, 7.62x51mm caliber rifle designed by Heckler & Koch for missions requiring combat over-watch with precision-fire capability to accurately engage targets up to 600 meters.

The SDMR was fielded to Air Force units this year. It is a multirole asset, set to meet multiple missions taking place around the world.

It will replace legacy M24 Sniper Weapon Systems for security forces defenders performing base defense operations in-garrison and in contingency support.

The SDMR is lighter weight in comparison to other 7.62 platforms and will also replace the M110 Semi-Automatic Sniper Systems rifle for pararescuemen and Guardian Angels, saving them 5 pounds in gear while out on missions.

Finally, the SDMR's precisionfire capability will be wielded by Air Force Explosive Ordnance Disposal technicians to eliminate small munitions in their standoff munition disruption activities.

"We're excited to field this incredible weapon system," said Matthew Hamer, Small Arms Program Office lead. "Being able to field one solution that can effectively achieve multiple missions epitomizes Air Force acquisition strategies and shows Airmen ability to adapt to any situation."



NATIONAL DISTRACTED DRIVING AWARENESS MONTH



Every day the majority of us get behind the wheel of a vehicle to drive to and from work or to simple run errands. However, how many of us are truly paying attention to the road? Did you know that distracted driving can greatly increase the chance of having a vehicle accident, becoming injured, fatally injured, or harming others? While all too often this question is answered with the cost of lives, many drivers are still placing themselves and others at risk. Some common distractions include: texting and talking on a cell phone, grooming, talking to a passenger, eating or drinking, using the navigation system, adjusting the radio, etc... Any of these activities may result in three types of distractions:

All driver distractions are not created equal. As a example, efforts to end cell phone use are greater than those to end other dangerous behaviors for significant reasons, which include:

1. Risk - One of the biggest reasons for crashes is the danger associated with the behavior.

Drivers using cell phones are four times as likely to crash, and there is no difference in crash risk

moment.

3. Prevalence - Cell phone use while driving is widespread. More than 2 in 3 drivers reported

talking on their cell phone while driving in the past month, and nearly 1 in 3 said they do so fairly often or regularly according to the AAA Foundation Traffic Safety Culture Index.

Cell phone use may not be the most dangerous distraction, but when you combine the risk (the likelihood of a crash) with the frequency (how often drivers are doing the behavior) and prevalence, the reason for putting an end to this deadly behavior becomes clear.

Drivers who used their cell phones and were involved in a

cell phones at any given daylight crash likely believed they could use

their phones safely. They didn't start their call with the intention of injuring or killing another person or themselves. Don't become a statistic. Make today the day you stop using your cell phone while driving. Pledge to drive cell free at nsc.org/pledge. Ultimately all of these activities mentioned above divert your attention away from the primary task of driving. Everyone who travels by car, as a driver, passenger, or even bystanders is at risk of being injured or fatally injured. Play it safe, find a safe place to stop your vehicle before using your cell phone. Navigation systems and radio devices should also be adjusted before you begin to drive. Don't risk it!

DAF updates leave program; includes support for fertility treatments, transition assistance programs

SECRETARY OF THE AIR FORCE PUBLIC AFFAIRS

WASHINGTON (AFNS) --

A recent update to the Department of the Air Force Instruction 36-3003, Military Leave Program, includes time for Airmen and Guardians who want to participate in a fertility treatment program at a military medical treatment facility. Authorized up to 35 days of Permissive Temporary Duty, they can divide the days into separate PTDYs if deemed appropriate by their medical provider.

"My wife and I have had our own struggles with starting a family, so I recognize what a strain this can be on our Airmen and Guardians, personally and financially," said Secretary of the Air Force Frank Kendall. "I wholeheartedly support this program, and I hope our teammates take full advantage of it."

This policy was championed by the Women's Initiative Team, one of the seven teams that comprise the DAF Barrier Analysis Working Groups.

"This change is significant for everyone struggling with infertility, just as I have the last 10 years of serving," said U.S. Air Force Master Sgt. Kristy Negron, a WIT member. "Infertility takes a huge toll, not only physically and emotionally, but financially. Being able to go PTDY for treatments will help ease some of the stress associated with the process by allowing time off work to focus on our life goals."

Military members can undergo

treatments at six different MTFs: Walter Reed National Military Medical Center, Bethesda, Maryland; Tripler Army Medical Center, Honolulu, Hawaii; Womack Army Medical Center, Fayetteville, North Carolina; Madigan Army Medical Center, Tacoma, Washington; San Antonio Military Medical Center, San Antonio, Texas; and Naval Medical Center San Diego, San Diego, California.

"I am passionate about this because I believe in taking care of our Airmen and Guardians," said U.S. Space Force Chief Master Sgt. Martha Burkhead, the WIT lead for this initiative. "I have had several members struggle with fertility issues and can attest to the rippling effects it has across the military."

Additional changes to the military leave program include: PTDY to attend a Department of Defense-sponsored employment seminar out of the local area under the Transition Assistance Program when the member separates or retires within 365 days; and nonchargeable leave to participate in

Month of the Military Child: **Deployment Support**

Since 9/11 more than two million children have had a parent deploy and nearly nine hundred thousand children have had a least one parent deploy multiple times. Deployment and separation are characteristic experiences for the military child. Despite the common nature of these experiences, it makes it no less difficult for children and families. The deployment cycle consists of five stages: predeployment, deployment, sustainment, redeployment, and postdeployment. Each of these stages introduces varying levels of stress to children. During deployment, children may face changes in school performance, lashing out in anger, worrying, hiding emotions, disrespecting parents and authority figures, feeling a sense of loss, and symptoms consistent with depression. An American Academy of Pediatrics study stated that 1 in 4 militaryconnected children will have an




