As Concerns over Privatized Housing Linger, Air Force Begins Independent Inspections

Starting in mid-June, thirdparty inspectors will begin touring privatized military housing at Department of the Air Force installations and they'll keep going for the next 28 months, checking every one of the department's approximately 55,000 units.

The process, which is scheduled to end by Sept. 30, 2024, will bring the Air Force in line with a Defense Department memo released in January directing all the military services to have independent inspections of all their privatized housing.

The other military branches have already begun their inspections—the Navy started in October 2021, the Marine Corps followed in January, and the Army launched a pilot program in February.

The Air Force will start with a pilot program as well, at Goodfellow Air Force Base, Texas, according to a release from the Air Force Installation and Mission Support Center.

Independent inspections are required by legislation in the 2020 National Defense Authorization Act, which mandated that the Pentagon establish "a uniform code of basic housing standards for safety, comfort, and habitability" and start conducting inspections based on that code by Feb. 1, 2021.

It's one of more than 30 requirements related to privatized military housing included in the 2020 and 2021 NDAAs, as lawmakers reacted to news investigations that uncovered widespread fraud and unsafe living conditions ignored by housing companies. Airmen and other service members alleged that companies failed to conduct needed maintenance but created false records to keep collecting performance bonuses from the services.

Those revelations led to an FBI investigation, which culminated in one company, Balfour Beatty Communities, pleading guilty to fraud and agreeing to pay \$65 million in fines and restitution.

Still, a recent Congressional investigation found that Balfour Beatty employees have continued to submit incorrect or incomplete work order information, and several service members told lawmakers their personal experiences of dealing with employees that dismissed problems, changed work orders, and made shoddy repairs.

With third-party inspections, the Air Force is hoping to get a "consistent and effective assessment of the entire inventory," of privatized housing, said Mark Wall, Air Force Civil Engineer Center Housing Program Manager, in a statement.

Under the 2020 NDAA, the inspectors cannot have a relationship with the federal government or the companies operating the privatized housing. The law also requires the Pentagon to establish minimum credentials for inspectors.

Tenants will be notified prior to inspections taking place, as required in their lease agreements, and Air Force officials are urging residents to work with the inspectors to ensure the process is useful.

"The residents have a place in this process and it is important that they are heard," Wall said. "We highly encourage Airmen, Guardians, and their families to support the inspection and assessment of their homes to ensure their needs for quality housing are met well into the future."

The United States officially allowed women to join the military on June 12, 1948 with the passing of the Women's Armed Services Integration Act. After they had served in the Women's Army Corps, Navy Women's Reserve, Marine Corps Women's Reserve, and the Coast Guard Women Reserves under special legislation during WWII, the United

aircraft and Navy vessels that might engage in combat, but it was a step in the right direction towards a more modern, inclusive military.



Final Events Make it Real ROD WILSON

The UH-1N Huey helicopter announced its arrival long before it came into view. It was one of those perfect, blue sky days at Minot Air Force Base. The gathering waited for touchdown and the embarkment of Col Christopher Menuey on his fini helo flight, final helicopter flight for us civilians, as Commander of the 91st Missile Wing at Minot Air Force Base. In just a few short days Col Menuey will relinquish command of the 91st MW and head to his new assignment in Omaha, Nebraska.

LOOKING BACK

A few thoughts entered my mind as we waited for Col Menuey's arrival. First would be how short a time two years really is. In July of 2020 at the height of the pandemic, Col Menuev took command of the 91st. The ceremony was outside, and guests were limited. We struggled with the correct pronunciation of Col Menuey's last name. I smile now as people in Minot still query me "how do you pronounce the Commander's last name?" In August of 2020, we would have our first Military Affairs Committee meeting via Zoom as large public events, especially on Minot AFB, were either postponed, cancelled or moved to a virtual platform.

The Huey arrived and gracefully touched down. The scene was very cordial as Col Menuey shook hands and thanked members of the helo and ground crews as they surrounded the Huey. Everyone moved forward and a small, celebratory bottle of champagne was presented to Col Menuey. Indeed, one more event to check off in his final days as Commander of the 91st.

LFA- LAST & FINAL ALERT Also checked off the list was Col Menuey's LFA, or Last & Final Alert. This event would have been prior to the fini flight, taking place on the previous Friday and Saturday. Pulling an overnight alert seems fitting as more than likely Col Menuey will not be part of an actual missile wing administration again. There were photos and a small celebration as Col Menuey was welcomed back on Saturday by staff, family and friends.

FINI FLIGHT

As we sat down to reflect on his two years at Minot AFB, Col Menuey talked about how beautiful the terrain was as they headed south towards Lake Sakakawea on his fini flight. Having a sailboat anchored on the north side of the lake, we shared experiences of locations like Goat Island, near Indian Hills Resort. Goat Island is a popular destination and anchorage for sailboats as they travel Northwest on the lake. I had

For Col Menuey, the busyness of leaving Minot and preparing for a new assignment has shielded him from the reality of the end of his tenure in Minot. "It really hasn't been sinking in, but all of these lasts and final goodbyes and farewells are really making it hard," said Col Menuey. "Now I am starting to think of all of the things I am going to miss. I am really going to miss the mission. I have been in the ICBM business for a lot of years."

COMMUNITY TIES

Col Menuey pointed out that he will also miss the community ties. "Everything from the civic

leaders who have been great, to the programs that keep the base and Minot tied together, those are important and certainly will be missed."

For all of us at the Northern Sentry who have had the privilege of meeting and getting to know the Menuey family, we want to wish them well as they travel to Omaha. It is kind of like going home for Col Menuey and Tonya, which is always nice. Oldest son Michael, a recent high school graduate, will be headed off to Bozeman, Montana, where he will enroll at Montana State University. After the change of command, which has already happened at the printing of this article, it is now time to fold up one list and open up another ... "What to do when we arrive in Omaha?"

SHE'S NOT FROM AROUND HERE AMY ALLENDER

I'm not from around here. Sometimes that can be really hard.

Usually I'm too distracted by the fun I'm having and the quirky local culture to notice the hard parts about not being a native North Dakotan myself. Once in a while, though, the very not-fromhere nature of my existence creeps in.

If it happens to me, I bet it happens to others out there.

Those who have been born and raised here may never realize that life as a nonnative species can be uncomfortable for reasons other than the January wind chill. For me, this never comes into focus more clearly than on holidays. Here's what I mean.

Memorial Day came and went. For the end of May the weather was cool and windy (surprise!) not ideal for attending a memorial service at the park, cooking out, or spending the day on a lake.

In my house things were quiet. I've been swamped with projects, and my husband recently started a new job where he is often on call. Because of this, we made no

plans.

By 10 a.m., he'd been called in to work. The kids and I were on our own.

We had a great day. We played inside. We ran errands. When the wind calmed down, we went out to ride bikes and fly kites in the driveway.

But all day, a hollowness chewed on my insides. After hanging up from a FaceTime call with my mom, I was finally able to articulate the feeling.

Loneliness.

As I thought about the salad my mom tossed together while we talked on the phone, I envied the gathering about to take place. I envied the holiday's predictability for my relatives in Indiana. On any given birthday or federal holiday, I can guess with great accuracy who will gather, and where.

It's simple, easy, and completely enviable to someone who finds themselves "not from around here."

On Monday, I'm sure people across Hot Dish Land gathered with friends and family for hot dogs and lemonade. Kids went to grandparents' houses. Cousins played. Countertops were lined with Pyrex and open chips. It all probably seemed so conventional, so ordinary.

Sometimes, that's exactly what those of us who aren't from around here miss most: the ordinary simplicity of knowing where we belong on a holiday.

Lonely Holidays

Some of my sweetest memories of life in Minot have happened when I've been invited to spend a holiday afternoon with a local family. To them, my husband and I may have just been two more at the table. To us, it was the priceless gift of belonging and normalcy.

Even I, a lover of words, have a hard time finding one to sum up the warmth, impact, and relief a holiday invitation can have on the transplant's heart.

It's the difference between feeling like you will never truly fit in and knowing you are home.

To the locals: First, cherish the roots you have here. You've got something beautiful happening, just by knowing where you'll eat a burger on Memorial Day — just by having a standing invitation to any holiday gathering.

Second, your backyard gathering is never too commonplace to warrant an invitation to someone who isn't from around here. We aren't looking for lavish usually being invited into someone

else's mundane is what we've been longing for. Your extremely ordinary family get-together could be the bedrock of our fondest memories of life in NoDak.

Extend an invitation to your Fourth of July barbecue. Ask us to join you at the lake. (Really. Do it, because most of us don't know what that even means.) Task us with picking up paper plates for the Labor Day potluck. We'll be over the moon.

To the transplants: It's okay to miss your own family traditions. It's also okay to forge new ones, or invite new people into the old ones. Get to know the locals. Invite newcomers to join you in your own mundane celebrations. It won't be the same, but it can be sweet.

Life here is good, and I wouldn't trade it for all the lefse at the Hostfest. That's true, even on the rare occasion I feel the sting of not being from the place I now call "home."

Last Summer for Baseball's Souris Valley Sabre Dogs

What screams American Summer nights: Baseball, Family and Fun! Minot's own Souris Valley Sabre Dogs are here for one last baseball season in Minot. Since 2018, the wooden bat collegiate team has played here in the Expedition League. While some changes are coming next season for the league and team, it did not stop the enthusiasm and positive thinking of the current Sabre Dogs Team.

Prior to batting practice before the Sabre Dogs game on Friday, June 3, this reporter got to sit down with a few ambitious Sabre Dogs players to learn their stories, goals and what living in Minot has been like for them. Since the entirety of the Sabre Dogs team is made of excellent baseball players from around the US, each player has been scouted, or asked to play on this team for a reason. Souris Valley Animal Shelter: Here to Help

There is something about pets that makes most humans feel comforted. Animals offer unconditional love. Dogs, and sometimes cats, allow the human heart to be filled in ways that can't be filled by other companionship. Many pet owners would probably agree. Because of this unique bond between humans and their pets, the Souris Valley Animal Shelter seeks to be a helping hand in assisting animals who may need a little extra boost or help in finding their forever homes.

The newly built facility, located at 1935 20th Ave SE, houses anywhere from 5-10 cats and 10-20 dogs at any one time. These animals come from all over town and from various situations. Some are found around town and are in need of quick care. Some are released from their owners who cannot take care of them and some still are sadly obtained in devastating abuse situations. Whatever the case, it is the goal of the SVAS to care for and nurse the animals in their care the best they can. Their mission is, " [to] create a better world for pets and people by advocating for animals and moving communities forward."

The no-kill facility hosts events and fundraisers throughout the year to help raise money and donations for the animals in their care. At the up-coming event on Saturday, June 11, the SVAS is teaming up with Souris River Brewing, Up Your Ax, and Traveling Art Pub ND to bring downtown Minot the, "10th Anniversary Parking Lot Party". The event will host many activities, but the SVAS will be bringing their dogs that are available for adoption between 3-7pm. Guests will be able to interact with the pets and apply for adoption. Additionally, Souris River Brewing will donate \$1 for every beer sold that day to the Animal Shelter to benefit the animals. The event is familyfriendly but it is geared towards adults.

The SVAS is always looking for volunteers and foster families and information can be found on their website: svaspets.com. SVAS Community Relations Coordinator, Siri Aponte said they often have a waitlist and pets in the most urgent need, get places at the shelter first. However, the more people who are available to foster, the more pets can be placed quicker and spend less time waiting for care. So she encourages those who may be interested to apply to foster pets if possible. Aponte also mentioned that with the warmer summer months coming up, it is important for pet owners to take special care

This addition will bring in a full-time veterinarian, Dr. Logan Wood, to offer vet services exclusively for SVAS and make sure all the

shelter's pets are fixed before being adopted. As this vet clinic becomes a reality in July, the fiveyear goal, according to Aponte, is to evolve the clinic into a teaching vet facility where students can come from all over the state to learn about veterinary science. As the Souris Valley Animal Shelter continues to grow and offer more services, the more animals will be able to get care and bless more humans with their love.

All About Pets

Coping with the loss of a pet

There are many reasons why one might lose a pet: old age, an unfortunate accident, or changing life circumstances, to name a few. For those of us who truly care about our pets, losing them can be devastating. So how can you cope with the loss of a pet? Here are a few suggestions.

•Let yourself grieve — whether your pet has gone off to the rainbow bridge or simply another home, it is completely normal to feel a level of grief. It's important to recognize your feelings and if you need support, reach out to friends, family, or even a professional counselor. You can also try finding pet loss resources such as those at www.aplb.org. •Reflect on your time together — after the loss of a pet, it can be difficult to think about their memory. Writing your feelings down in a journal a great way to reflect and hopefully help turn your grief into gratitude. Something I like to do is use a stepping stone kit to imprint my pet's paw prints forever. When they're gone, you will always have a little piece of them in your life to remind you of all the great times you spent together.

•Spend time with other pets—humans aren't the only ones who have feelings about losing pets. Some pets can sense when there has been a loss, other than the obvious sign of not having their friend around. Unless your pet is actively giving you signals that they want to be left alone, spending time and giving attention to your other



pet(s) can benefit you both and help you walk through the grieving process together. Take your pet to the park, spend some time playing in the back yard, or cuddle up on the couch and watch a movie.

•Use your grief for a good cause — research has shown that doing good deeds can make you happier. After the loss of a pet, you can try curbing those negative feelings by doing something good such as volunteering at a local animal shelter, donating supplies to them, or if you're able, you can even sign up to be a transporter or foster for other animals in need.

•Get another pet—this one seems like the obvious answer to dealing with the death of a pet. However, this is not a decision that should be made impulsively! Bringing another pet into your home immediately after losing one will not always make you feel better right away, and if you are not in the headspace to properly take care of and focus on the new pet because you are still arieving the old one, it can rub off on them. Try giving yourself some time to grieve first. When you feel ready, start looking for a new friend. It's unfair to your new pet to compare them to your old one... all pets have different personalities, but that is what makes them so special. While a new pet can never replace your lost one, they can still offer the same companionship and give you another great, loving relationship to enjoy. Saying goodbye to our pets is never fun, but at some point it is an inevitable. Enjoy every moment you spend together - even the difficult ones — and when the time comes, just remember the love that they brought into your life.


The memorial service honored 54 veterans who are buried at McKinney Cemetery and three other local cemeteries.



But the years he spent hunting and ranching in the 1880s shaped not only what would become North Dakota in 1889 but the rest of the nation's citizens, its lakes, rivers, wetlands, mountains, prairies, and the wildlife that calls those places home.

Theodore Roosevelt earned the distinction of being known as the "Conservation President" among the hunting and conservation communities and for good reason. The list of national forests, national parks, what would become national wildlife refuges, and other conservation and environmental programs is extensive and unmatched in American history.

He credits his time in North Dakota for shaping his life to what would ultimately lead to holding the nation's highest office: "I would never have been President of the United States if it had not been for my experiences in North Dakota," he said in Nov. 8, 1918 speech, just months before his death.

Those hunting and ranching experiences also deepened an already engrained love of the outdoors, hunting, the environment, and – perhaps most importantly – the need for the wise use of natural resources for present and future generations.

Roosevelt and his contributions to the nation and state are recognized in a variety of ways. Heck, in North Dakota it starts with the U.S. National Park Service naming a park in his honor, the North and South Units of Theodore Roosevelt National Park. He established what would later be known as Stump Lake National Wildlife Refuge (NWR) in 1905, followed by Chase Lake NWR in 1908.

During Roosevelt's time as president he established five national parks across the United States, including Sullys Hill National Park, which was renamed White Horse Hill National Game Preserve in 2019.

The Theodore Roosevelt Center, Dickinson, created the Theodore Roosevelt Trail, a way to explore Roosevelt's legacy across North Dakota:

•Roosevelt statue, Dickinson: The statue and three kiosks describe Roosevelt's first major national speech presented July 4, 1886 and highlights his Badlands experiences.

•Theodore Roosevelt National Park, Medora: Established in 1947, the South Unit Visitor Center is located at Medora along Reclamation Act of 1902 (also called the Lowland or National Reclamation Act) establishing 24 irrigation districts in the U.S, including the Lower Yellowstone district. While irrigation canals are visible in North Dakota, Intake, Mont. provides the best viewing of its low dam and intake facility off the Yellowstone River.


•Elkhorn Ranch: The Theodore Roosevelt National Park South Unit Visitor Center has directions and map to its remaining foundation stones at its original site— it helps avoid getting lost even with GPS. It's there where Roosevelt penned several books and sought solace in the passing of his mother and first wife. •Roosevelt statue, Minot: Another statue paying tribute to the

"Conservation President" is at Minot's Roosevelt Park. Originally named Riverside Park, it was renamed in 1919 after Roosevelt's death. The statue was donated to the City of Minot in 1924.

•White Horse Hill National Game Preserve (NGP), St. Michael: Located south of Devils Lake, White Horse Hill NGP has underwent a name change since Roosevelt established it but its woods and hills remain a treasure for wildlife enthusiasts with its auto tour route and hiking trails.

•Stump Lake and Chase Lake National Wildlife Refuges: Stump Lake NWR has changed dramatically since Roosevelt established its original 27-acres comprising four islands as a federal bird sanctuary in 1905. Now under the waters of Devils Lake, visitors can access a recreation area on the lake's east side. Chase Lake also began as a bird sanctuary. Northeast of Medina, it's home to the largest white pelican nesting colony in the country.

Roosevelt's conservation legacy, as well as his dedication to a strong America, lives on more than a century after his passing through the vast array of legislation and programs he championed, including the State of North Dakota.

Car care checklist for summer road trips • Part I

It's time for a drive vacation. You mapped a route, booked hotels, and made a checklist of things to do before you go. AAA reminds you to also make car maintenance part of your summer road trip preparation. Use this car care checklist to ensure your vehicle is ready for summer travel.

Check tires and tire pressure

Inspect all four tires and, if you have one, the spare tire as well. Look for cuts, gouges or sidewall bulges. Insert a quarter upside down into grooves to check tire tread. If you see the top of George Washington's head, it is time for new tires.

Check tire pressure when the car has been idle and tires are cool. Inflate as needed to the vehicle manufacturer's recommended pressure. You will find it listed in the owner's manual and on the sticker of the driver side door jamb. Do not use the number on the tire sidewall.



Listen to and feel the brakes

If you hear a grinding sound or feel a vibration when applying the brakes, take your vehicle to an auto repair shop for a brake inspection. A service professional will check the brake system for fluid leaks, and the pads, rotors, shoes and drums. If repair or replacement is needed, use the Repair Cost Estimator to help anticipate costs.

Secure and test the battery

Check the car battery to be sure cable connections are clean and tight, and the hold down hardware is secure. Have a service professional do a battery check to determine remaining capacity. AAA members may request a free battery check.

Top off engine oil and other fluids

Check that engine oil, coolant and brake, transmission and power steering fluids are at the correct levels for safe vehicle operation. When adding fluids, use products that meet the specifications listed in the owner's manual.


Note that newer car models may have sealed automatic transmissions without a dipstick, and electric power steering that may not use fluid.

Replace wiper blades and replenish windshield cleaner

Rubber wiper blades naturally deteriorate over time. If wipers streak or fail to clear the windshield thoroughly, replace the blades. Fill the windshield washer reservoir with fluid formulated to remove insects and other debris, and test to make sure the nozzles spray adequately.

ScriptCenter Locker sets to open in July

Department of Defense beneficiaries at Minot Air Force base will soon have the option of picking up prescription medication refills from a secure locker system starting July 12, 2022. The locker system will increase accessibility while fostering good social distancing practices decreasing face-to-face bv interactions and being located by other frequented areas on base. The 5 MDG Pharmacy staff are constantly looking for ways to help patients and increase convenient, reliable service. Each ScriptLocker can hold hundreds of prescriptions, with the exception of

refrigerated medications, and allows the patient to pick up their medication on their schedule. Members can enjoy access to medication pickups over the weekend, after the Medical Group is closed, and all while going about normal shopping. This will also allow those individuals who require more assistance to experience shorter wait times at the clinic pharmacy.

Active Duty military, dependents, retirees and all eligible Department of Defense ID holders will be able to log in to the locker system with their ID or by fingerprint. This type of system is already

used at approximately 27 other Air Forces bases. Due to successful implementation at these installations, the Military Health System plans to add more than 20 additional units at stateside and European locations over the next few years.

With amenities such as other common shopping locations, plenty of handicap parking, ADA approved entry into the facility, open seating areas and walking distance for the dorm residents the Base Exchange atrium area was chosen as the location for the new ScriptLocker.



At one o'clock on June 2, 2022 the NOAA (National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration) came to the Minot AFB base theater. SKYWARN was there. SKYWARN taught base personnel to be watchful when mother nature gets angry. Meteorologist J.P Martin talked about what everyone should do during weather warnings and what they mean for everyday citizens.

Some interesting topics discussed included the Fujita Scale that measures damage from a tornado while the Enhanced Fujita Scale measures wind speed. The term 'Fujita Unknown' means that a tornado's wind speed could not be measured or didn't hit anything. The NWS (National Weather Service) protects life and properties to help people survive. According to Martin, weather spotters are critical to help people get the correct weather watches and warnings. The NOAA in Bismarck, ND has the 9th largest land in the NWS.

NOTES ON BEING SAFE

GETTING READY FOR TEEN WORKERS THIS SUMMER

"Youth comes but once in a lifetime," Henry Wadsworth Longfellow once wrote. So perhaps

while managers and supervisors are getting ready for summer-hire workers to grace our offices, we might take a moment to think of just how valuable, impressionable and fragile these youth really are. While contemplating the hiring of numerous of these inexperienced/ untrained workers, safety experts around the base are advised to take another look at teaching their teen workers to safeguard their health and productivity.

According to the National for Institute Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH). Approximately 70 teens under age 18, die of work related injuries each year. More than 200,000 are injured on the job, many requiring emergency medical treatment. These statistics have raised a red flag for base safety personnel. While OSHA is spearheading efforts to improve nation wide safety for working minors, our home team is examining where our efforts could best be focused.

Just by looking at the numbers above, supervisors need to spend more time and do a better job of

training the summer-hires. Indications are that many teens do not receive health and safety training on the job. They are pointed to a desk or work area. The assumption is that they receive training from observation or osmosis. Everyone needs to understand the child labor laws and gain a better understanding of how they affect safety. Because these laws can be overwhelming to understand, many co-workers and supervisors put their summer-hires at risk. They further place their introduction into the work force in peril by not giving them a need for safety applications. Here are some of the statistics presented by NIOSH. Although child labor law prohibits employing youths 16 and under in cooking and baking jobs, one third of the injured were identified as cooks. In another study, while older teens are prohibited from working on hazardous occupations and on motor vehicles, teen motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death

teens into the workplace teaches them a work ethic and useful skills, but it must be done without sacrificing health or safety. Some helpful hints are listed which can produce a work-oriented teen.

-Comply with child labor laws and safety regulations

-Assess and eliminate hazards -Evaluate equipment to be used -Supervise teen workers

-Train them to recognize hazards and use safe work practices, and fastidiously, faithfully evaluate their compliance

-Seek employees' assistance to develop an injury/illness prevention program

-Teach work-study skills in a comprehensive training class

-When possible, pair up experienced, mature workers with younger workers. Teenagers may require more safety training than older employees

-Stress the hazards of cordless and battery operated tools

-Make personnel aware of the hazard umbrella around the point of operation of electrical tools

More companies and defense

orientations, depending upon what they do. But, training must be ongoing, not one time a video or reading a manual. The summer-hire must become familiar with their workplace. They must understand employee safety and how to identify and deal with safety hazards. They must have personal involvement; somebody to go over safety issues with them. They must sense concern and care for their well being. Most are still in, or just out of high school and are eager to learn. Safety knows no generation gap. Teens have a tendency to believe that they are invincible and are too smart to have bad things happen to them. We in safety believe that familiarizing yourself with younger folk's way of thinking, culture and lifestyle helps. Keep tabs on what they are up to and why.

Remember: personal involvement, proper training, reinforcement and communication are the key to retaining good, safe teenage and summer hire employees.






